Norwood settles lawsuit with BEH

Airport agrees to essentially all BEH demands

On Tuesday morning, July 30, at the Joseph Moakley Courthouse in Boston, attorneys for the Town of Norwood announced that, after an executive session vote on Monday, the Norwood Board of Selectmen voted to accept the Term Sheet Agreement for the settlement with Boston Executive Helicopters (BEH).

"We're just glad this issue is resolved and we can all move forward," said Norwood Town Manager Tony Mazzucco.

The lawsuit stems from several issues dating back to 2014. The catalyst was an

FAA Part 16 Complaint filed against the Norwood Memorial Airport, filed in 2015 and confirmed in 2018, alleging that the Norwood Airport Commission (NAC) engaged in unfair practices while BEH was trying to set itself up as a Fixed Base Operator (FBO). The FBO designation would allow them to sell fuel and perform maintenance work out of its hanger.

An initial settlement to the lawsuit was declared in December of 2018, literally days before the issue was set to go to a trial. The two parties announced that they had come to a meeting of the minds on a Term Sheet Agreement, which included

Norwood Sustainability Commission to establish soon

At the final of two informational sessions held by the Town of Norwood on July 30, Norwood Town Manager Tony Mazzucco said he hopes to have Norwood's Sustainability Commission up and running in about 30 days.

He said there is still some marketing to be done and he has to select members in the mean time, but he said he is hopeful. Any resident interested in applying should email him directly at managers@norwoodma.gov after

reading through the Position Description found on the Town's website at: norwoodma.gov/government/committees_boards/sustainability_commission/about_the_sustainability_commission.php.

Mazzucco said there have been strong showings at both meetings, with about 15-20 residents coming in to hear the presentation. He said this is a good sign, but stressed to residents the time commitment required for a full commission position. A full term would be

Morrill expanding its Library of Things

While books are becoming more and more accessible through online purchasing and digital pads, libraries are shifting focuses to not only being a library of books, but a Library of Things.

You may think of the Morrill as a neighbor if you need to borrow something like a tool box, a power washer, a stud finder or, most recently, a soil meter for gardening.

Morrill Technical Services Department Head Lydia Sampson said she started the program with the staff

of the library when she was hired two years ago.

"It's been a trend in libraries recently, both in Massachusetts and across the country. Some have really gone all in while others have just a few out of the ordinary things. We're looking to ramp it up here," she said. When we started it we thought we'd be expanding little by little. However, when we realized people were so excited about what we were doing, we decided to expand it further."

The library wants to be a place to borrow something that you may otherwise have to purchase and then only

about three years and the commission members' time commitment would be about five to 10 hours a month, according to the job description.

Though interest is a good sign, Mazzucco said he's seen it before, which is why the commission will have the ability to have an unlimited amount of Alternate Commission members and subcommittee members, with much less of a time commitment.

"I have noticed there is usually a lot of interest in the beginning, six months later some people are like, 'Oh I joined a committee and the world didn't change?'"

Norwood resident and Town Intern Erin Donnelly presented the overview of what the commission will be responsible for. Mazzucco summarized it as being the hub of all sustainability issues in the Town.

"Today, we have a lot of groups in Town focused on different areas of sustainability," he said. "But we're looking for a group that can bring that together and be a little more strategic."

Donnelly presented strategic goals and planning the commission will take part in, first pointing out what sustainability actually means, as it's not always clear. She said it means meeting the needs of the

present without compromising the needs of future generations, and that can be implemented in three ways, environmentally, socially and economically. She said the commission will be committed to environmental sustainability.

"The goal in the first year is creating a climate to figure out what Norwood can do to be more sustainable in the next five years and then the next 50 years," she said. "We've already taken much of the low hanging fruit, like installing LED lights in all the municipal buildings, but the Sustainability Commission is going to do the more difficult work of challenging initiatives that involve the entire community, and not just minute fixes."

She pointed out that the Town could be promoting programs like MassSaves, which is a free program that gives away full free LED bulbs for a homeowner, as well as an energy audit to recommend where they could be using less energy.

She pointed out many cities and towns have installed solar panels on their buildings. Mazzucco said the Town should be judicious in locating solar panels to where they make sense and he wants the commission to look into that. In his opinion, solar panels are expensive and require precious metals to work, so putting them in

the most effective places possible make the most sense. He said the high school, with its huge roof, would be an ideal location (once the roof's leaks are fixed), while the new Light Department Building on Access Road has too many close trees to make it an effective solar generator.

Donnelly also presented a plan the commission will most likely be working on, the Massachusetts Green Communities designation, which would allow Norwood to apply for green grants. One aspect of obtaining that designation is to have a plan to reduce the municipal usage of energy by 20 percent in five years (this applies only to municipal usage, not residential) and replace municipal vehicles with hybrid, energy efficient or electric variants as they become available.

Mazzucco said that "as they become available" is a very important point, as there are not hybrid ladder trucks or ambulances on the market right now. He did say the Norwood Police Department has embarked on a pilot program to put in four hybrid vehicles in service. The vehicles are able to conduct pursuit operations, as declared by the Michigan State Police, and he said if they are successful they will eventually replace the entire fleet.

Airport Commission is a clown show

What has been abundantly clear throughout this airport lawsuit debacle is that members of the Airport Commission think they’re smarter than everybody else, which of course has been disproven every step of the way by all other parties involved these past five years. WHERE DOES YOUR TRASH GO?

To the Editor:

Norwood’s semi-annual Hazardous Waste Recycling Day is approaching. From 8:00am to 11:00am on September 28th, all Norwood residents will have the opportunity to dispose of waste that cannot be collected through regular curbside trash and recycling pickup. Residents can drop off their items at the Recycling Facility located at 370 Winter Street. Liquids including gasoline, paint thinners, anti-freeze, and pool chemicals, and solid items like computers, TV monitors, computers, cell phones, refrigerators, and microwaves will be all collected. Although most residents don’t give their old computers, phones, and TV sets a second thought after disposing of them, these items do not just disappear.

Norwood sends its electronic waste to Complete Recycling Solutions (CRS) in Somerset, New Jersey, and CRS decides whether or not a product can be reused somewhere else in the US or in a different country. If the product is not salvageable, it is put through a shredder and is sent on a conveyor belt where magnets separate iron and steel from the remainder of the plastic waste. The iron and steel is melted together and sold as recycled steel. The plastic is then repurposed on its own. Though this process is more environmentally sound than sending electronic waste to landfills, it still takes a great amount of energy to transport large pieces of e-waste to recycling facilities and separate them so they

can be repurposed.

Disposing of electronic waste has posed a challenge to recycling centers for years. Electronic waste recycling costs towns in the US between 6 and 10 million dollars every year. It costs Norwood \$190 to process a ton of trash, while processing electronic waste costs around \$440 per ton. The money spent on recycling electronic waste could be better used to fix Norwood’s roads or to educate Norwood’s children. So why don’t we just throw our electronics in the trash?

If your old computer or television somehow ends up in a landfill, dangerous chemicals including mercury will seep into the ground and often affect water supplies in the surrounding area. What’s more, when materials from a computer are not recycled, they won’t be recycled into new electronic devices, which means that more materials from rainforests and other spaces must be extracted to make new products. This practice is not sustainable. Finally, disposing of electronic waste in landfills is ILLEGAL in Massachusetts, and recycling is just the right thing to do.

So what’s the solution? How can we sustainably dispose of electronic waste without breaking the bank?

The best way to reduce the environmental and economic cost of electronic waste is not to create it in the first place. A family can both help the environment and help the Town of Norwood by simply refraining from purchasing new electronics until they are truly necessary. If your phone or computer unexpectedly breaks, try to figure out if there’s a specific part that’s broken and fix the part, instead of getting a completely new device. And be honest with yourself, do you want a new

iphone because your old one doesn’t work, or because the new one looks cooler?

When you finally decide a new device is necessary, try to donate your old item for reuse if possible. Computers and TVs can be refurbished and reused by schools, low-income families, and charitable organizations that are not able to pay for new devices.

If your electronic device is not in good enough condition to be reused, then you can load it in your car and bring it to Norwood’s Hazardous Waste Recycling Day or drop it off at Best Buy or Staples.

In 2019, residents of the United States are experiencing the highest standard of living the world has ever seen. We live in a world where a family can buy a new TV every year and not pay for the environmental cost of its disposal. But our children and grandchildren will pay for the actions we are taking right now. If we continue to consume and dispose of electronic products that contain environmentally hazardous materials at the rate we currently are, natural spaces in our community and around the world will be destroyed from natural resource extraction, and dangerous substances like mercury will seep into soil and water supplies. I don’t think anyone improperly disposes of their computer or TV with this intention, but that does not change the environmental consequence of our actions. When we Norwood residents think about our behavior and its environmental impact, I hope we will begin to make the small changes needed to make our planet a more beautiful and livable place for ourselves and our posterity.

use it once.

“People think it’s fun when they see something on display or look at the pictures or lists we have online. We really have something for everyone,” she said. “There are practical things like household stuff, children’s items and things for older people. We hear a lot of ‘oh wow, that’s so cool you have that.’”

Sampson said they have yet to hear any negative feedback about the program.

“It’s more like ‘can you get this’ or ‘can you get one of those,’” she said with a laugh.

Sampson said they have a great variety of items for borrowing. Some of the exciting items they now have are colorblind glasses. Colorblindness can take many forms and, in some instances, special glasses can give a colorblind person a more accurate and greater spectrum of color than they currently have. But they’re expensive, so you probably don’t want to buy one pair to find out they don’t work for your particular condition.

“Colorblind glasses are something we felt were worth the investment because it’s something that’s unique and an assistive technology. Because of the expense it is re-

ally important to be able to try before you buy. That’s really one of the big incentives of borrowing something from the library, there are things that people need once a year or once ever and they don’t necessarily have to buy it themselves.”

More mundane but expensive tools are also very popular.

“We recently got a power washer for the summer season and it hasn’t come back for more than a day since we got it,” she said.

Sampson said this is a push to make the library more of a community gathering space than a singular use building. The staff at the library caters to whatever the community is interested in, be it dance classes, home up-keep classes or, the most popular class, knitting and crocheting.

“We have a lot of people coming into our knitting and crocheting programs here. We call them stitch doctor appointments for people who want to consult on a particular piece they’re making,” she said. “We know that Norwood is a community particularly interested in that and so we found a niche with the different kinds of knitting needles

for people to take out.”

She said they also have musical instruments as well as people who might be willing to teach you how to play them.

“We have a variety of handheld musical instruments and recently got a Table,” she said, which is a kind of tuned drum from India. “Knowing we have a big Indian community, it comes with a beginners guide to play.”

She added they have also gotten a cricket set.

“We heard Town Manager Tony Mazucco mention he’s seen people playing cricket on the baseball and softball fields, so we got a relatively inexpensive beach set,” she said. “We’ve tried to put things out there for all segments of the community... Our whole staff has really bought into it and gotten very excited about it. Everyone loves to see how excited patrons are when they realize they can check out something that’s unexpected, and we’ve gotten a lot of suggestions from our staff. I’m really proud of it and the support we get from our Director Charlotte Canelli and the Town in general.

the NAC agreeing to pay \$750,000 to BEH for legal fees and restitution. However, three other terms agreed to on the Term Sheet agreement were changed, according to lawyers for BEH, without BEH's agreement.

On Tuesday, Attorneys for the Town said they had redrafted the General Release and Settlement Agreement to address those three issues of contention, essentially agreeing to everything BEH requested. Attorney Adam Simms said that they will remove a small easement on the West Ramp granted to FlightLevel. Simms also said BEH will be allowed to participate in any meetings, correspondences or negotiations with the FAA regarding the formation of a corrective action plan in reference to the Part 16 complaint BEH filed against the Norwood Airport. Simms said they used the exact language from the Term Sheet Agreement dated December 2018.

Simms also said they would be providing clickers for access to BEH's offices from a pedestrian gate about 50 feet from the company's building. He stipulated that the airport would also be providing clickers to FlightLevel.

BEH Attorney Michael Fee said he needed time to go over the new settlement agreement while in front of the judge.

"I have just seen this revised settlement agreement 30 seconds ago, and I was just advised of it this morning," he said.

"I don't think he'd make a

mistake about this," Judge Richard Stearns said.

Fee still asked for a recess to discuss the issue with BEH Manager Christopher Donovan.

"I haven't had a chance to talk to my client about it so it's hard for me to say whether or not what Mr. Simms is presenting is true," Fee said. "I would like to discuss it, and I'm certainly not inclined to waste the court's time or anybody's time."

"I do have other things that are valuable that I could be doing," Stearns said with a laugh.

The court took an hour recess. Upon returning, Fee said BEH agreed to the new settlement.

"I'm glad to hear this is settled in a way that is reasonable for all sides," Stearns said.

BEH explained at an evidentiary hearing on June 28 the importance of the three issues the airport eventually agreed to. Donovan explained as a witness on June 28 that the easement granted to FlightLevel was to allow the company to access a fuel depot. Donovan contended that he would have never agreed to such an easement, formally or informally, because it would be giving FlightLevel unreasonable access to BEH's property. He said BEH would be parking, fueling and working on vehicles on that easement site. The FlightLevel easement would mean they would have to keep it clear of any such work or move vehicles whenever FlightLevel wanted them to.

The use of clickers was taken out, according to Simms' opening statements in June, because FlightLevel didn't have them, which is presumably why the new agreement includes a provision for FlightLevel to get two clickers as well.

In terms of the FAA Corrective Action Plan, the December General Release Agreement stated that BEH would be allowed to observe, but not participate. Donovan said during his witness testimony that was not enough, as it would not allow BEH to make sure the corrective

action plan would protect BEH from what he saw as a history of improper conduct within the NAC.

BEH had contended in the original complaint that the NAC was not allowing BEH to set up as an FBO, in what BEH interpreted as a retaliatory move against the company. During meetings with the NAC in 2014, BEH asked for ramp space on the West Apron, as well as space to build a hanger and underground fuel tanks as part of a plan to become an FBO. The NAC contended that it would allow the fuel tanks and hanger space, but only granted about 7,000 square feet of ramp space for BEH. BEH allegedly accepted the offer of the hanger, fuel tanks and ramp space at a further meeting, but said they would continue to seek additional ramp space.

The NAC said its members saw that as a rejection of the offer. BEH and Donovan argued it wasn't and requested the audio of the meeting, which was apparently destroyed. The NAC then required BEH to provide a huge number of financial records and projections. That's when BEH filed an informal Part 13 Complaint against the NAC alleging it was taking part in unfair practices and basically playing favorites with FlightLevel. The NAC then voted to table any consideration of BEH's lease and FBO permit application. The NAC refused to take further action or discussion for the FBO for the remaining three months of the year.

In February of 2015, the NAC offered 11,786 square feet on the apron. BEH argued that was too small to support a full-service FBO and that the conditions even exceeded the Commission's own Regulations and Minimum Standards. In March of 2015, BEH filed the Part 16 Complaint with the FAA which the FAA ended up agreeing to and pulled FAA funding for repairs and construction at the Norwood Airport in 2018. With this agreement now solved, the Norwood Airport can create its Corrective Action Plan for the FAA and again start to receive grant funds.



2019 Honda Passport

Honda has filled a void in their SUV lineup with the Passport SUV. Fitting between the Pilot and the CRV, the Passport is truly a mid-size vehicle. The Passport is built on the same platform as the Pilot and Ridgeline pickup. The super smooth, bulletproof, 3.5 liter, 280 horsepower V/6 engine still has a timing belt that will need replacement around 105,000 miles. The 9-speed automatic transmission keeps the engine low in RPM and in its sweet power zone at all speeds. The revised sport feeling suspension in our test AWD Elite model was on the firm side. Towing capacity in the 2WD is 3,500 lbs., AWD is 5,000 lbs.

The Passport seats five and has plenty of room for storage; fold down the rear seats for even more room. The interior design, with its slim-line console and push-button shifter, is very modern looking. However, the push-button shifter takes a short amount of time to get used to. The new touchscreen radio/infomat system is not the easiest to use, but it has a very clear center display, which is an improvement. There is finally a radio volume knob, but I am still looking for a knob that changes the stations. When is the radio tuning knob coming back? I hope soon.

Our test Passport Elite was finished in a gray color with black alloy wheels and looked great. The handling was very good and had a sport feel. It's loaded with a lot of safety features and blind spot warning is standard on the top-of-the-line models. Seats are supportive and our test vehicle did have seat heaters. My gas mileage averaged 20 MPG. Pricing starts around \$31,000 for a FWD to \$43,000 for the Elite AWD. The Passport is an SUV that rides on Honda's reputation and is a multi-fit vehicle for many uses. This is not the Passport from many years ago made by another manufacturer with just a Honda badge. This is a true Honda and a good one at that.
