Skating rink at University Ave. back on the table

The proposed skating rink at 750 University Ave. is back on the table, this according to a letter from the Skating Club of Boston's parent company.

The parent company Tetra Tech, sent a letter from Vice President Sean Reardon to the Norwood Board of Selectmen notifying them of their filing a letter of intent with the Town's Conservation Commission on Tuesday, October 9. Selectman Bill Plasko said the current plan is bigger than what was presented to residents in the past.

"They are looking to go for-

ward with three sheets of ice," he said. "There will be two sheets for figure skating and competitions and the third sheet will be for ice hockey. We're looking to make arrangements with the community, the high school and Youth Hockey."

Plasko said it's still in the very early stages, but added he is hopeful that after three or four years of going back and forth with Tetra, something concrete could be on the table soon.

"As soon as something more definitive is put together, we'll come back to the Board

Norwood Marching Band takes home 1st place at two NESBA events

The Norwood Mustang Marching Band, organized by the Norwood Parents Music Association (PMA), took home first place in two New England Scholastic Band Association (NESBA) events recently.

Firstly, the band competed in Medford on Sept. 22 and brought home first place as well as in Melrose on Oct. 6. Katie McConnaughy, Publicity Chair, of the Norwood Parents Music Association, said the students were excited and elated for the accolades.

"They work really hard and so I think they feel excited that it's paying off," she said.

McConnaughy said the PMA is also feeling the excitement of competition.

"We're so excited, we love going and supporting the students and we like getting par-

ents and community members to go over and support the team as well," she said.

The 56-member band and color guard, composed of students in Norwood from grades 8 to 12, has a history of performing well at these NESBA events. According to PMA member Edward Ferris, the team has scored first or second place prizes at the NESBA finals (coming up this year on Nov. 7) for the last six years in a row, with two outright wins and four second places. He said they lost by literally two-tenths of a percent in one case.

Suffice to say, the competition is furious at these events, but McConnaughy said it's all just part of being on the team. She said during the most recent events, Norwood came out on top by a wide margin.

"We did have a good advantage going in, I think we had more than a five-point dif-

ference on both events," she said.

The band also took High Caption awards at both events, which highlight certain pieces of each competing band. She said they took all three caption awards at both competitions for Best Music, Best Percussion, and Best Color Guard, though she said that is also not irregular.

"I think they often win the High Caption awards," she said.

The band is coming back to Norwood on Oct. 21 to compete in the Massachusetts Instrumental and Choral Conductors Association (MICCA), where they perform Black Swan at Norwood High School at 4 p.m. The whole competition goes from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., where 10 Massachusetts bands will compete.



Forum stresses plenty of opportunity for women in the auto business

Prime Toyota Service Director Malinda Burgos says it happens to her a lot. A customer will ask to see the manager, so she'll go over to them and ask what the problem is.

"I definitely deal with it daily," she said. "People will ask to speak with the service manager or the director and they're like, 'No, I want to speak to the manager.' Well, that's me."

Alyssa DiChiara, General Manager at Tasca Kia said it literally happened to her the day before the Universal Technical Institute in Norwood held a forum for women looking to enter

the auto trades on Thursday, Oct. 4.

"You get immune to it," she said. "I had a very old gentleman who wanted to speak to the general manager. I walk out of my office and came out to shake his hand. He said 'I'm not shaking your hand. You're the general manager?' Yep, that's me."

DiChiara and Burgos said it's something they have to deal with on a daily basis. DiChiara said she was able convert the man's opinion on women in the vehicle trades by doing the job and doing it well.

"Always let your actions and skills speak for themselves. You have nothing to prove, just do your job and people will recognize and see it," she said. "That's

where I get my satisfaction from. I don't have to stand in front of someone and prove my point to them, I can show them. That makes you a stronger person."

The forum featured several speakers from most aspects of auto industry from delivery, auto repair and auto sales. UTI Norwood campus President Shawn Alexander said they've been hosting this forum for two years now, and from last year to this year, the Norwood Campus has already seen an increase in female students from 2 percent to 6 percent. Not a stellar rise to be sure, but he said they felt events like this, showing women already in the trade and thriving,

Norwood resident needs your help to kick cancer

Norwood resident Natalia Donnelly and her family is currently seeking donations from a Kickstarter campaign to help the family pay for eight months of cancer treatment at the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute in Boston.

The campaign, which started about two weeks ago, has already raised \$5,100 out of a \$10,000 goal and can be found at gofundme.com/kick-cancers-natalia-donnelly. Natalia's mother Jean Donnelly said it was amazing to see the community step up after such a short time.

"It's remarkable, you don't ever put yourself in this position, you always think this stuff won't happen to me or my child and you're literally blown out of the water with the information you've been given," she said.

"But people Nat has gone to school with and parents I have never even met and have reached out and come forward and donated money and Norwood as a community is making it so much easier for us to get through knowing that we have all this support behind us."

Donnelly said Natalia has been diagnosed with Stage 3 Brain Cancer, specifically choroid plexus carcinoma, and will be in Boston every other week for four to five days at a time undergoing radiation and chemotherapy.

The first inclination they had that something was wrong was at the end of July when Natalia said she was experiencing headaches.

"She was losing vision in her left eye, it was getting blurry and she was seeing squiggly lines and auras and so we went to her pediatrician," she said. "She wanted

The Norwood Record us to follow up with an eye doctor."

Donnelly said the eye doctor recommended an MRI the next week.

"We went to have an MRI in the morning and she got through 10 minutes of it," she said. "We got home and the doctor called and said she would have to have another MRI. They didn't get enough pictures, but they saw a mass on her left fourth ventricle."

After another MRI, Natalia

was in surgery to have the mass removed on Sept. 7.

"From that point, the tumor gets sent to pathology and we were given a time frame of about seven to 14 days to get the results from the biopsy," she said, adding they got the results on Monday, Oct. 1. "I got the telephone call from Dana-Farber that the tumor results came back with malignant cells."

Donnelly said it's been a tumultuous time for the family.

"Our lives have been turned upside down to say the least," she said. "So now she will have chemo and radiation treatments because of the type of tumor," she said. "Right now, she's at the Boston Children's Hospital getting ready to get a port placed on the right of her chest, and that will give the doctors access to administer chemotherapy. She's also having a lumbar puncture or a spinal tap and they'll take some fluid from her spine and send that to pathology to see if there are any cancer cells there."

Donnelly said the funding will help pay for treatment and travel to the city. To donate go to gofundme.com/kick-cancers-a-natalia-donnelly.

A MEETING OF THE MINDS?

To the Editor:

Kelli Noumi's letter, responding to mine, was very thoughtful. If the editors at the Record are willing to go one more week, I think we may get to a position that may attract broad attention.

1. Every Norwood department's costs are dominated by personnel. On the town side personnel cost increases are driven primarily by the COLA of 2.5% and fit easily within an annual revenue increase of 3.5% to 4.0%.

2. The school side has lane increases. Teachers on the top step of a lane get only COLA, while teachers on lower steps get COLA plus a lane increase. Other towns have fitted COLA plus lane increases within their revenue increases, but Norwood has not. In fact, Norwood's personnel cost increases have for some time used up all the increased revenue, leaving no money for added personnel, inflation, or additional materials.

3. I am talking about Norwood's annual percentage increases in school personnel costs, which are unsustainably high – not about school personnel costs or teacher pay, which are not. Our average teacher pay falls in the middle of towns like us. Many people confuse these two points.

4. However: I did my analysis when 41% of teachers were at the top of their lane. I have learned that that percentage is now in the high 40s. This lowers the overall average annual pay increase. (Caution: If many veteran teachers retired, the percentage of teachers at the top of their lanes would drop. This would put us back in the position of having unsustainably large annual average increases in teacher pay.)

5. Taking this new information into account, the school situation is now much closer to the town situation, as Ms. Noumi has ably summarized it. The schools need increases to meet Mass Core standards. Other town departments may need resources for new responsibilities (e.g., active shooter programs, the opiate crisis).

6. I hope town managers will provide details with their over-

ride proposal. It's not enough to say we need more money to meet Mass Core standards. How will the extra money be spent, specifically, to meet the standards? Same for the town side.

7. My original letter was wrong in describing how an override works. It does not expire after a limited time. However, new revenue does not grow as quickly as new need. If you set the override correctly, you can shift some revenue from earlier years and use it to cover the higher costs in later years, but only for a limited period. By the end of that period, either the town and schools will have found efficiencies to lower costs or an additional override will be needed. Fortunately, our Town Manager, Tony Mazzuco, has experience making this kind of arrangement work in other towns.

8. Ms. Noumi makes another good point that I want to repeat here. Norwood can afford an override – its tax rate is much lower than in other towns – and so should be persuadable if a good case is made. I saw this happen with the Public Works building.

Norwood Hockey fundraiser set for Oct. 20

The Friends of Norwood Hockey is holding its 27th annual Golf Tournament in memory of Tom Clifford on Saturday, Oct. 20 at the Norwood Country Club.

The tournament has been a huge fundraiser for the Norwood Youth Hockey organizations, with \$125,000 donated in scholarships to the Norwood High School (NHS) seniors and more than \$40,000 donated to support other Norwood hockey groups.

Friends organizer Anita Hennessey said the organization started with Clifford and Bob Dempsey and they are looking to attract more players to the tournament. She said the Friends have been chugging along steadily for the best part of the last three decades, and she wants to see it continue for another 27 years.

“At one point there was a lot of participation from the people who started the Friends, but now those people are getting older and moving away,” she said. “They’ve done a fabulous job over the last 27 years, but it’s the generation that’s benefited from these scholarships that are now in

college or graduated or starting jobs that are stepping up. We’re also looking for current families who have younger players to get involved too.”

Hennessey said Clifford started the Norwood Youth Hockey League in the 1960s and worked diligently to secure ice time on Saturdays at the then Tabor Academy (now St. Sebastian’s) and organized car pools for 5 a.m. and 6 a.m. to get kids on the ice. She said Clifford could usually be found at the New Pond and Petty’s Pond during the winter giving tips to hockey players and his two sons, one of whom now teaches at NHS.

“The mission is to get old teammates and to get parents who have aspiring hockey players together to share old stories and tips for the ice,” she said. “Then we have a dinner at the Old Colonial with raffle items like Red Sox tickets for next season, tickets for foursomes at other country clubs, gift certificates to local restaurants, car washes and those kinds of things.”

Hennessey said they first started the golf tournament with Bob Dempsey in 1992 to get the former players together and support Norwood

Hockey. Now, the Friends raise enough funds for seven scholarships a year awarded to NHS seniors. She said she got involved with the organization when two of her sons started playing.

“My kids have benefited from the Friends with all the time they spent in youth hockey. From practice jerseys and team jerseys and ice time, it’s been an amazing organization.”

Hennessey said it’s great to see the community come together behind Norwood’s players every year.

“Norwood always gets behind different groups, it’s a very collaborative community,” she said, noting that although she has lived in Norwood for 20 years, she still considers herself a transplant. “Any time I’ve reached out to the community, people have been extremely generous. My hope is to continue that tradition because I’ve certainly experienced that community here.”



are helping greatly to increase women in the industry.

DiChiara and Burgos were joined by Girls 'N Garages publisher Karen Sullivan, Penske's Jennifer Gaipo, Crown Lift's Ceila Labonte and was emceed by Interstate Trucking's Jill Winoski. Winoski started the forum off by letting the group of about 20 or 30 young women attending know that the auto industry will always be growing, as nearly everything transported in the United States is done so by truck. She said state government is recognizing that and will be investing in the industry for the next five years.

Ceila Labonte of Crown Lift pointed out that there is one thing that will always go along with trucks.

"Everything that gets transported on a truck, well it was put there by a forklift," she said. "So as long as we've got a trucking industry, we will have a forklift industry."

Labonte said the work is amazing, and she goes around New England and beyond to service and work on forklifts.

"I'm the only one in my branch," she said. "I haven't met another woman at Crown. Any time I get to do something like this, I'm always jazzed."

Labonte said it's not always

easy to be in a traditionally male dominated industry.

"Find a place that appreciates you and the work you do and make sure you're being held to the same standard as your male counterparts," she said. "It's not like you're not going to face sexism, because that's the world we live in, but don't let it affect how other people treat you in the industry... People are going to make you prove your worth, but the fact that you're in the room in the first place is enough. You're already most likely the first woman in the room; don't let anyone take that away from you."

Gaipo said she got into auto repair because she loved cars.

"I first fell in love with Mercedes," she said. "I mean who doesn't want to have a nice car?"

Gaipo said she first started working on cars and then moved to diesel to work on the Sprinters now owned by Mercedes.

"I worked there for about a year at Mercedes Benz in Boston and then to the Boston Duck Boats," she said. "I worked on diesel there and that was really fun."

Gaipo said the repair industry is always expanding, at least for diesel repair, and if you have those skills on a resume database like Indeed or Ziprecruiter, you're going to get a lot of headhunters.

"You're constantly getting notices of openings," she said. "I've been at Penske for more than a year now, and you don't have to fight for a raise. You know, no one really taught me how to speak on my own behalf or say I wanted more money. I don't have to worry about that with Penske. I have a pension, and there isn't a lot of careers where they still give you that."

Sullivan said she took a different route to the auto industry in her Girls 'N Garages biannual publication. She said her magazine came about more from a hobby, as she got into cars after marrying her husband. She said she finished her restoration project of a '55 Chevy Pickup years ago and that she wouldn't trade it for the world, but she found a lack of ways to connect with other women car enthusiasts.

"There's no women's auto magazine out there, and I wanted to find other women I could connect with across the region," she said. "You know, none of my girlfriends were really into it when I'd say, 'hey, you want to work on cars until 1 a.m. and do a lift on a Jeep?'"

She said the magazine is based on teaching people how to work on cars and where they can connect to do it. For more information on the magazine, go to girlsngarages.com.

for review," he said.

The Board seemed excited at the news, and Selectman Helen Abdallah Donohue said she's very glad the Skating Club is once again considering bringing a rink to the Town.

"How many years have these negotiations been going on? Three or four years we've been talking with the Boston Skating Club and this started under (former Town Manager John Carroll's) administration, and he pushed very hard to get them to come to Norwood," she said. "It's just such a wonderful concept that they're coming here. The Skating Club is over 100 years old and right from the start they said they would be willing to rent time to Norwood."

Donohue added that many residents have to travel somewhat far to get ice time now, and the Norwood High School Hockey Team currently has to travel for its home games as well. According to last year's schedule, the team played its "home" games in Dedham, Framingham, Milton, Needham and Braintree.

Selectman Alan Howard pointed out that the inclusion of the figure skating portion of the rink could be a boon to Norwood's prestige in that area.

"This is very exciting that this is on again," he said. "This was on again, off again, I don't know how many times, but at least several... It's very exciting that we're going to have world-class figure skating events in Norwood. I mean the best figure skaters in the world will be coming to Norwood for events. Folks, this is incredible to what this is going to add to the Town."

Howard is not wrong, as the organization hosted the 2016 ISU World Figure Skating Championships. Originally, in 2016 the Skating Club proposed

a site on Upland Road, but the organization's board of directors voted it down. The Town was also talking with the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation for a rink in South Norwood, but Town officials stated if DCR wouldn't throw down the \$9-10 million required for it, it would be a tough sell at Town Meeting.

In other news, the Board of Selectmen voted to grant an extension of a beer, malt beverages and wine license to the owners of S&H Supreme Fuel located at 145 Broadway. The issue of contention was that the owners broke a state law last year when they purchased a liquor license and failed to start providing said beverages within a year. According to Massachusetts State Law Chapter 138 sections 15 and 77, that is a violation.

According to the owners' counsel Gregory DeMarkis and partner Ankit Patel, they did not realize they had to start selling within a year.

"It was part of a project where the partners were going to renovate their convenience store and gas station and fix up the property," said DeMarkis. "Shortly afterwards, a difference of opinion arose between the partners and that project was shelved."

DeMarkis said the partners have now decided to sell the station, store and the license. He emphasized that the intention was not to buy the li-

cense and see the value go up, known as flipping; the very thing original law was intended to prevent.

"They're taking a loss on the liquor license," he said.

DeMarkis said the buyer is Ginesh Market Inc., and wants to transfer the license to Pam's Market at 210 Pleasant St. in Town and is represented by attorney David Hern. The Town will have to approve the transfer and it was also pointed out that the license will have to be renewed. DeMarkis said they are aware that the license will have to be renewed, since the deadline is the end of November and, while they could renew it with the Town during that time, he doesn't believe they could get renewal from the Alcoholic Beverages Control Commission.

Following a brief members' meeting, Hepler will talk about "McCarthyism In Massachusetts: Mary Knowles and The Morrill Memorial Library." This talk is free and open to the public.

Mary Knowles, South Norwood branch librarian, was fired by Morrill Memorial Library Trustees on June 1, 1953 for suspected Communist ties. A Senate Internal Security subcommittee subpoenaed Mary Knowles. Appearing before the committee, she refused to answer questions, invoked her Fifth Amendment rights, and in due course was convicted of 520 counts of contempt of Congress. Norwood's Library Trustees fired her. Seven years later the U. S. Court of Appeals in Washington, D.C. overturned her conviction. Hepler will explore this moment when American politics turned its gaze upon Norwood, and how McCarthyism impacted our community, our library, and the life of one woman driven from our midst.
