## Sun comes out for Norwood Day

While Hurricane Dorian's edges were darkening the sky for the day before and most of the morning of Norwood Day, the 2019 event still attracted thousands of residents and visitors alike.

The weather was iffy at first and prompted the Town to move its fireworks spectacular from Friday to Saturday night, but the main event on Washington Street and the Town Common went swimmingly.

## McDonald's remodeling plan meets with resistance

The Planning Board met on Monday, Sept. 9 at Town Hall for a session that ran more than three hours and featured two public hearings, a zoning bylaw amendment discussion, and three interviews for the vacant Associate Planning Board Member position.

The main appointment of the evening – which lasted about an hour – was the site plan review and special permit public hearing for the McDonald's located at 32 Broadway.

Appearing before the Board were Christine Pimenta, area construction manager for McDonald's, and Bohler

Engineering's Jim Cranston, site project manager.

The corporate branch of the fast food chain is seeking approval for a remodeling project for the franchised central business district store that it would like to begin in May, 2020.

McDonald's filed its application with the Town in early July, and it was reviewed by the department heads and then sent back to the applicant with revision recommendations.

At the hearing, Cranston dia-grammed the project, which would entail bringing the site up to ADA

(Americans with Disabilities Act) compliance and enhancing the building – most visibly – with an upgraded façade and new signage.

More specifically, the current mansard roof would be removed for one with cleaner lines. Additionally, the single front sign would be removed and replaced with internally lit golden arches that would be displayed on a parapet that would be part of the new design.

Cranston also stated that parking spaces would be reduced from 70 to 62, with the three current handicapped parking spaces moved to provide easier access to the entrance.

The parking lot was, in fact, a dominant theme of the appointment, with Chair Ernie Paciorkowski asking Pimenta, at an early point, if the lot would be repaved.

When she informed him that it would be patched and paved, Paciorkowski asked, “Why would you do all this

work to upgrade that building... and not spend the money to repave it and re-stripe it... and have it look nice?”

Pimenta generally explained it as a project cost management decision: the store – as a franchise operation rather than a corporate one – was limited in its use of corporate funds.

This corporate/franchise separation was cited several times as an explanation for the corporate office’s denial of Town requests to replace fencing and screening around the dumpster and cooler area, repair curbs and bollards, and to repaint external walls.

Board member Debbie Holmwood, commented on this after Cranston’s presentation:

“You keep saying they’re doing all this work. I don’t see what work they’re doing.”

She then argued on behalf of reducing the parking lot’s size to make room for more

green space. Noting that there had been 40 police calls to the location over the past several months, she put forward that the underused lot was the reason why:

“I’ve got pictures of this thing – week in and week out – and there’s nobody ever in there but people hanging around with trucks, and the Police Department goes down there all the time because there are complaints from Broadway Market, from the vet.”

Asked by Pimenta how more green space would reduce the number of loitering kids, Holmwood replied, “It’s not lighted properly. They can hang down there. They can park their cars on the right side of the building. It’s not even a legal thing. It’s a hang for kids.”

At one point during this exchange, Cranston stated that they would take the Board’s requests back to McDonald’s for further review. Pimenta added the following:

“Sometimes, so many re-

quests will take a project completely out of budget that it will either get tabled or not be able to be done at this time until there’s more money freed up.”

Paciorkowski – speaking later – suggested to Pimenta that “I don’t think we’re going to ask for the Moon here. I think what we want to ask for are reasonable requests.”

Town Planner Paul Halkiotis – while acknowledging that a number of Town recommendations had been met – spoke of McDonald’s unwillingness to address the site’s needs from the cosmetic to the functional (he noted twice that the ADA has been on the books since the 1990s and that McDonald’s is only now addressing it).

He also agreed with Paciorkowski’s comments, building on them. “We don’t want you to say, ‘Ah! They’re not going to approve it if we don’t do all of these things,’ and walk away. That’s not what we want. We want a good looking store here in the downtown, so we encourage you guys to go back to the management and give this feedback to them.”

Halkiotis also reiterated his request that McDonald’s

consolidate the three parcels of land the store is built on into one lot through an ANR (Approval Not Required) application. “This is the window of opportunity for the Town to try to request McDonald’s to be a good corporate citizen and step up and make the improvements that were requested.”

The hearing was continued to Oct. 21.

The special permit hearing for internally illuminated signage for Daddy’s Dairy (95-105 Central St.) was continued to Sept. 23 to allow for modifications to the proposed signage.

Attorney David Hern went before the Board to again discuss a proposed zoning bylaw amendment regarding the conversion of certain historic residential structures. The public hearing regarding the Board’s Town Meeting recommendation vote will be on Sept. 23.

Finally, the last three candidates (of four) for the vacant Associate Planning Board Member position were interviewed. One will be chosen at the Sept. 23 meeting.

The Planning Board’s next meeting will be on Monday, Sept. 23 at 7 p.m.

Lease of Town-owned property located at 171 Nahatan Street, identified as Map 1, Block 2, Lot 1, consisting of approximately 10,642 square feet of land and a building. Parcel located in a central business zone. The term of the lease is ten (10) years, with an option to renew for an additional five (5) years at the Town’s sole discretion.

Value assessed in 2019 at \$1,209,300.

The minimum acceptable first year lease price is \$85,170. The lease period shall be for ten (10) years, effective November 1, 2019. There shall be an option to renew the lease for an additional five (5) year period, exercised at the sole discretion of the Town of Norwood.

A certified check or money order payable to the Town of Norwood in the amount of \$5,000 must be submitted as a surety deposit along with the proposal to lease the property. The purpose of the deposit is to guarantee that the proposer shall hold firm his/her price until an award is made and a contract is signed. The deposits of those unsuccessful proposers shall be returned within ten days of the bid opening, and the deposit of the successful proposer shall be returned upon the execution of a signed contract.

# Selectmen approve TIF agreement allowing Moderna to expand

The Board of Selectmen voted at its meeting on Tues., Sept. 10 to approve a Tax Increment Financing (TIF) agreement that would allow biotech company Moderna Inc. to expand its facility onto the Universal Technical Institute (UTI) site at 100 Uplands Rd. and bring an influx of millions of dollars of tax and building permit revenue into the Town's coffers over the next decade.

"Basically a Tax Increment Financing agreement is allowed by state law for communities to enter into an agreement with a firm to basically forgive a portion of the new assessed value added to the property that they will occupy," Selectman William Plasko said. "The basic value that is agreed to before they enter into the TIF agreement is still always at the full 100 percent of the value that it is at today. So it only applies to the new added value of the property."

While Plasko said there is "no magic formula" as to how a TIF is structured, it is negotiated between the two parties based upon what the business will offer to the community and what the company needs financially in order to flourish there. A TIF agreement has to go before the Board of Selectmen and receive its approval in order to go before Town Meeting.

Lynn Tokarczyk, the Government Incentives Consultant with Business Development Strategies, Inc. who consulted with Moderna Inc. on the proposal, added that a TIF is a state program administered by the state's Office of Business Development. This proposal is for 10 years and is structured at a reduced rate over time.

"I'm very pleased to be back here," Tokarczyk said, noting she was present three years before when Moderna

received its first TIF for its current site at 1 Moderna Way. She noted that Moderna "has already exceeded the expectations of the first TIF agreement."

Nicolas Chornet, the Norwood site head for Moderna, explained that Moderna is a clinical biotech company that deals with MRNA, or messenger MRA, research on a strand that is found in human cells. The company, based in Cambridge, is involved in collaborations with major pharmaceutical companies. The company has both a national and international focus as a pioneer.

He added that the Norwood facility is state-of-the-art and recently won a "Facility of the Year" award from the International Society of Pharmaceutical Engineers (ISPE). The site also is focused on environmental initiatives.

"Due to the company's expanded and potential growth, we made a strategic decision to secure the building at 200 Moderna Way," Chornet said. The building would be used for research and office space, with potential for manufacturing. The two buildings combined allow for a campus atmosphere to be created.

The new building has 229,000 square feet. Moderna plans to invest \$50 million into the site, with \$17 million of that directly toward the vacant 88,000 square feet of the building. UTI will vacate the building completely in July.

There is a potential for 100 full-time jobs to be added to Norwood's economy. In addition, 250 people will be transferred from the Cambridge facility to the new site.

"These are high-end, engineering, science, digital and IT jobs," Chornet said. There also will be contracting jobs for construction.

The company estimated that it has spent \$1.5 million in Norwood since it first opened in 2018.

Moderna already has contributed to the fabric of Norwood and will step up its efforts, the team said. Company representatives visited Norwood High School the previous day to discuss collaborating with its STEM program.

Tokarczyk noted that Moderna has discussed a scholarship program and summer internship program for current juniors and seniors interested in studying biotechnology.

As for the TIF structure, instead of a 50 percent flat rate over ten years, the Economic Development Committee, of which Plasko is the vice chairman, negotiated to have a 90 percent rate in the first year to benefit Moderna with 70 percent off of the new investment. The rate will go down to 20 percent in the tenth year, which will bring more revenue to the Town at the end of the agreement.

Selectman Thomas Maloney said he "wholeheartedly endorsed" the agreement. While he noted the \$80,000 in new building permits alone and the more than \$3 million combined revenue from the two TIF agreements, what impressed him was the company's commitment to Norwood's students.

"From my perspective, that's more important than money," he said.

Selectman David Hajjar was absent from the meeting.



Eighteen years ago, the Morse House in South Norwood was in disrepair and in need of a great deal of attention. It was used primarily as a repository for excess furniture and sports paraphernalia. So, a Norwood resident came along with a spectacular vision to restore the house to its original beauty.

Putting a great deal of value to its history and to the Town of Norwood, Dale Day, began to research the background of the Morse House and together with the assistance of historian, William Pudsey, Ph.D., formed a committee of volunteers and garnered the support and encouragement from many local businesses who donated their expertise, labor, equipment and materials to help make the restoration happen.

Knowing the Morse House had great bones, the decision was made to create The George H. Morse Meeting House, Museum and Education Center. After a few years of careful attention to detail, the house was opened up for use by the Community. Various exhibits have been held there showcasing Norwood’s Veterans; Art in Bloom with members of the Norwood Evening Garden Club interpreting the works of Norwood and Walpole high school art students each spring; and the Little Red Brick School. It also has been used by Norwood residents for wedding and birthday celebrations and for meetings and parties by town officials, businesses and many civic organizations including the South Norwood Committee, Aaron Guild Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Rotary, Together YES, League of Women Voters, Norwood Community Garden, Norwood Toastmasters, Norwood Historical Society, the Norwood Historical Commission, the Democrat and Republican Town Committees, Neponset Valley Young Democrats, and Progressive Norwood.

Now the baton has been passed on to the office of the Town Manager. Kudos to Dale Day and Dr. Pudsey, who gave

so much of their time and talent all these years to the Town of Norwood and to The George H. Morse Meeting House, Museum and Education Center. Everyone who has used the Morse House thanks them for everything they have done and owes them and other volunteers a great deal of gratitude. Please know it is greatly appreciated.

## SCOUT LEADER SEES HOPE FOR YOUNG FAMILIES

*To the Editor:*

Raising children today must seem difficult and scary, with so many unprecedented challenges and threats facing young families. Most parents want their children to be responsible, capable, helpful, and conscientious. They hope to nurture curiosity, creativity, and persistence. They want children to be upstanding, trustworthy, and kind. And they want them to be safe and to feel secure. This isn’t easy in a world that seems pitted against them – full of dangers (real and imagined), dishonesty, hypocrisy, and bullying – even at the highest levels.

As a new school year begins and families envision their children’s future, I urge them to consider how the character-building activities of scouting can help them “be prepared.” through the methods and ideals of scouting, youth learn honesty, fair dealing, courtesy, kindness, and resilience.

Families who have made room for scouting and stuck with it, despite already complex and active lives, know the enduring benefits. Children benefit from opportunities to gain confidence, learn about leadership and cheerful service, and how to work with other people. Adults benefit from leadership training, and the grown-up fun of fellowship and shared purpose.

Long ago, I could have il-

lustrated scouting’s value with stories of dedicated leaders who helped me grow from an insecure grade-schooler into an Eagle Scout and (fairly) confident adult. But we live in an entirely different world than the one I grew up in. Fortunately, scouting has evolved to keep pace. For example, the Boy Scouts of America has developed the STEM-based Nova awards curriculum to introduce youth to Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics, and to encourage further study. [Note: My examples are drawn mostly from my past eight years serving Cub Scout Pack 42, but Norwood has many scouting opportunities.

The BSA’s Cyber Chip program helps youth stay safe as they go online for education, research, socializing, and fun. Scouts earn the award and “re-charge” it annually to learn the latest strategies for dealing with tech threats. Cyberbullying, cell phone use, texting, blogging, gaming, and identity theft are among the net safety and “netiquette” topics.

The BSA also helps keep children safe by requiring that volunteers get background checks and complete the most up-to-date, expert Youth Protection Training. Adult leader training is constantly upgraded, such as the comprehensive online program (and the latest YPT) launched Spring 2019.

Most people familiar with cub scouts know about Pinewood Derby cars, but cubs design and build other craft, too, such as rockets, catapults, and balsa wood boats. They apply science and engineering principles, and learn to use tools safely, working with parents and grandparents to create them, then race, launch, and sail them.

You’ve probably seen cubs taking turns proudly carrying the flag in parades. Maybe you’ve encountered them around town “Scouting for Food,” caroling at Victoria Haven, replacing graveside flags for Memorial Day, touring the Day House at Christmas, ringing the bells in the town hall tower, or helping at the annual community day hosted by the First Congregational Church in Norwood.

Perhaps you read about Pack 42’s sold-out library fund raiser, March 2015, when scout families from local towns (29 cub packs) came to the Norwood Theater to meet “Diary of a Wimpy Kid” author (and Cubmaster) Jeff Kinney, hear how he got his start, get

## Police and Fire have busy week

Last week, the Norwood Police Department (NPD) and the Norwood Fire Department (NFD) had two incidents of note.

The NPD arrested Norwood resident Jacqueline Cieri, 32, of 140 Winter St. and charged her with trafficking fentanyl. The arrest was part of an investigation by Detective Anthony Lopes and members of the Norfolk County Police Anti-Crime Task Force (NORPAC). The arrest also netted \$20,000 in

cash.

According to NPD Chief William Brooks III, some of that money could be going to the department under civil asset forfeiture, which allows municipal police departments and the state to seize funds and property found to have been used in the commission of a crime.

“As far as the cash, under Massachusetts law the Commonwealth can proceed civilly against that money,” Brooks said. “This will be an action in the Superior Court brought by the district attor-

ney. Money that is deemed by the court to be proceeds from drug dealing is awarded to the Commonwealth. The district attorney, by statute, gets 50 percent of that money and the police get the other half.”

According to NPD detectives, while conducting surveillance they saw Cieri approach her car on the morning of Sept. 5 and get in. When she did, detectives approached and informed her they had a warrant to search her vehicle and home. They

the booths of local organizations, Town Boards, first responders, scouts and local youth sports organizations. A gigantic inflatable set of lungs were on display at the Town Common, as well as several circus games.

The start of the day saw the 13th annual Anne Lydon Award presented by Parks Department Superintendent Travis Farley to resident Patti Fanning.

"She has been instrumental to the Historical Society and the Day House, and you've done a lot for the community and this is our way to say thank you," he said to cheers from Lydon's family and, most loudly, former Selectman Helen Abdullah Donohue.

"I just want to say I'm happy to help and volunteer, especially about this history of Norwood," Fanning said. "It's been a lot of fun."

Lydon's family was on hand for the award ceremony as well, and said they are happy to see residents following in Anne's

footsteps every year dedicating themselves to the community.

"She was our mother, a mother of 11, and she did a lot of volunteering," said Paul Lydon, the youngest of the 11. "She was known as the button lady down here at Norwood Day. She was very active in the community her whole life. She passed in 2006, kind of unexpectedly, so we did this to carry on her memory and encourage people to give back and volunteer to the community."

"It's for the spirit of volunteering," said Paul's sister, Mary Sweeney.

Paul Lydon said the whole family always tries to make every year to Norwood Day.

"Whoever can make it comes in," he said, waving his arm to show the gaggle of Lydons around him.

"My brother's daughter is getting married today too, so we're all going there as well," Sweeney added with a laugh.

Resident Rick DiFlaminies said he comes out every year for Norwood Day, and he loved the

event because despite the weather, cold and rain-threatening or sunny, everyone still comes out.

"I usually come every year and you know, you never even notice the weather," he said. "It's a nice turnout and Norwood Day is great and I love bringing the grandkids out."

Residents Mark Wagner and John Gover said, "we have been to all of them, back to the first year when they had maybe 10 of these booths," pointing to the hundreds along Washington this year. # Norwood hosting World Cup Soccer - at least a kids' version

Three Norwood organizations are coming together this month to host the first-ever World Cup-style soccer tournament in Town.

Progress Norwood, Impact Norwood and Norwood Youth Soccer have all teamed up to put on the event, which Impact Norwood Program Director Aubrey Ciol said should be a blast.

"We've had a pretty good response," she said. "I think it's going to be a lot of fun. I mean I lose sleep over whether we'll be able to pull it off or not, but I think it will be a good time. People seem excited and happy."

The Cup will take place at the Coakley Middle School on

Sept. 21 from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. rain or shine. Coi said the idea started after the success of the spring dodge ball tournament.

"Back in March, Impact Norwood, along with the Norwood Recreation Department, hosted a first-ever dodge ball tournament, and we wanted to have an event like that where we promote a positive weekend activity for families and youth in the community," she said. "So now we decided to do a World Cup."

Coi said the choice of soccer was due to Norwood's ever-increasing diversity.

"We've been hearing the community has been celebrating more diversity of cultures, and we thought what better way to do that than to have a World Cup-style soccer tournament," she said.

Game play will be five on five, where teams of two students register to be randomly assigned to another team of two with an adult from the community assigned to each team. Once organized, each team will be randomly assigned a country to represent. T-shirts will be provided, but Coi said students and adults are encouraged to show team spirit by finding other ways to represent their assigned countries.

There are 16 teams expected total, with half designated for grades 5-8 and 9-12 respectively. Coi said if the response from the dodge ball tournament is any indication, the Cup should be a great event.

"I honestly don't remember exactly how many people or



# PBCC hears of HS roof fix

The Norwood Permanent Building Construction Committee (PBCC) met last week on Thursday, Sept. 5 and discussed several issues under its purview, including the leaking Norwood High School roof.

PBCC Chair Francis Hopcroft said he's been in talks with Norwood Public Schools Facilities Manager Paul Riccardi concerning the leak and its recent fix.

"The work is finished and it's really more of a patchwork thing. They've had significant problems, notably at the gym, but there were other areas too," he said.

Hopcroft said they were able to identify several areas of leaks near the gym, the loading dock and the roof near the library. He stressed that the Town is not on the hook for any of these repairs.

"The bottom line here is this is work that the contractor is going to provide on his own, and it's covered under the warranty as I understand it at the

present time," he said, but added it was not all good news. "But we know from those infrared pictures that were taken on an exploration of the entire roof, there were indications that there were other problems up there too."

Hopcroft said the School Department and the PBCC will lobby the contractor to come back and re-evaluate the status of the roof. He said he's wary at this point.

"I'm not satisfied, I mean we were looking at some serious money to do these repairs," he said.

Concerning the Hawes Bath House, Hopcroft said he's been speaking with Norwood Recreation Superintendent Travis Farley, and was pleased to report not one problem with the project, but some of the membership said they felt the site has not been maintained in some areas, and the grass there "crunched under his foot."

"The biggest problem over there is the grass," said Hopcroft. "I went down there and I stomped around on the grass. We paid significant

money to put that grass there, which is over and above what was required in the specification, but there was no other thing we could do in the circumstances." The grass is too dry due to lack of irrigation.

Hopcroft said he will continue to talk with Farley on the issue.

In other news, PBCC member Bill Kinsman said he will be leaving the committee due to what he said were health reasons.

"I'm sure that most of you know that I've had some real serious issues since June and I'm just not able to do it anymore," he said. "The recovery has been very slow; I'm actually in rehab right now."

Member Bill O'Connor said on behalf of the committee they were sad to see him go.

"We hope you get better, and if you do get better, come on back," he said. "If I recall there was someone sitting right here in this chair who called me back."

"You never know," Kinsman said.

The one engine has the power of a large V/6 – the engine is always in its power band. The Ranger does not look small with four full doors and seats four with comfort.

The EcoBoost twin turbo turns out an amazing 270 horsepower; axle gear ratio is 3:73. Combined with the nicely geared 10-speed automatic transmission, it makes for a very powerful combination. The Ranger has a smooth ride and again, power at any speed in all conditions. The engine is very quiet even under full throttle. The interior has all the features and options of a high-end truck; all controls are in reach and the audio system is now easy to use. The Base Ranger XL 2WD super cab starts at \$24,300 (destination fee: \$1,095). The top-of-the-line Lariat crew cab 4WD is \$ 38,385. Options can bring the MSRP up, depending on whatever you want to load it up with. Our test Ranger had the optional FX4 Off-Road Package. Even without this package, the truck has a smooth ride, however the Ranger did sit a bit higher than the non FX4 package model. There is no question that Ford has built a truck that will be a hit that fits when a full-size truck is too big. If interested in a mid-size truck, take the Ranger out for a long test drive. 
