## ZBA holds off on UAVE vote

The Norwood Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) voted to table a vote on a special permit application from UAVE LLC for its gravel and stone pit operation at 973 University Ave.

The Board members said they wanted to defer so as to give themselves enough time to read up on the proposed modifications to the plan. However, those proposed modifications were not the most fodder for discussion.

UAVE, which is owned by Joseph Federico, encountered problems with its operation earlier this year in two major ways. The first was a lawsuit filed by the Massachusetts Attorney General due to issues with stormwater drainage and the potential contamination of Purgatory Brook and the Neponset River. UAVE agreed to a consent decree to pay funds to the AG's office and the Neponset River Watershed Association.

The more pressing issue of the night concerned UAVE's original special permit, issued in 2013 for gravel removal,

had expired. UAVE is before the ZBA to replace that permit with one that will last the estimated four or so years it will take for them to finish removing the rock and gravel there. Despite Norwood Building Inspector Matt Walsh issuing a cease and desist order for all gravel and rock removal operations, the Norwood Board of Selectmen and UAVE's neighbor, M S Walker, contend that operations have been continuing.

UAVE's attorney Daniel Bailey addressed several concerns at Tuesday's meeting, including issues of potential groundwater contamination. He said groundwater wells had been shut off in the area for decades due to previous contamination. He also responded to allegations that the site is unsafe and not fenced, which he also said was untrue.

ZBA Member Patrick Mulvehill said he was very familiar with the property and used to ride his dirt bike there when it was Town property untouched by gravel operations.

"I actually climbed under the fence to get onto Federico's property, I saw the cliffs," he said.

Bailey conceded that trees were accidentally cut down on M S Walker's property, purportedly by a third party landscaping company that made a mistake. Bailey also said there was about six square feet of slump due to erosion on the site that has affected M S Walker's property.

"We remain prepared to meet with the abutter at any time to address those issues," he said. "We have offered three times in writing to do so and they have never taken us up on that."

M S Walker representative Dennis McKenna said UAVE did respond to the issue of the trees being removed, but did not respond to the issue of erosion on the site.

"Mr. Bailey said they offered to meet with us three times, well that was under the condition that they were never going to shore up the land – that was expressed, it was put in a letter – they were not going to restore our land," he said.

Bailey failed to address the issue of

## NAC tables BEH lease

The Norwood Airport Commission (NAC) met for the group's regular monthly meeting on Wednesday, Dec. 9, and decided to hold off on a vote on Boston Executive Helicopters' (BEH) lease for use of two areas of the airport.

The two areas, the DC-3 Ramp and the West Apron, would be used for BEH's business as a fixed-base operator (FBO) for fueling, parking and taxiing. The lease is part of a 10-year dispute between the Town and BEH that resulted in several lawsuits in which BEH alleged not being treated fairly in its quest to become an FBO at the airport. After a settlement agreement last summer and a new filing by BEH in October asking the U.S. Federal Court to enforce said settlement agreement, the NAC and BEH looked like they could finally be ready to sign the lease and get to work.

However, that did not happen on Wednesday, and will have to wait at

the cease and desist order for work issued by Norwood Building Inspector Matt Walsh. M S Walker provided several photos and videos showing work taking place at the site, purportedly long after the cease and desist order was issued.

ZBA Chair Thomas Brady pointed out that while he does not dispute any violations discussed by M S Walker or the Board of Selectmen, those issues are not within the ZBA Board's jurisdiction to enforce.

"We can't enforce or punish Mr. Federico for violating an order he was given, whether it was from the Building Inspector or whomever," he said.

Brady added that Walsh had agreed to and approved of UAVE's plans to deal with the erosion on the site.

ZBA Member Philip Riley said he felt the numerous violations and issues that have cropped up present significant problems, and he felt they should not grant the special permit at this time. Firstly, he pointed to an earlier comment from Bailey, who said that a closing plan showing what the property should look like when the gravel and stone have been removed was not feasible, since he said there was not a clear idea of what was going to happen to the site when removal was done, if anything.

"To my mind the purpose this permit was originally grant for was to lead towards a structure on the property," he said. "I'm looking at the original decision

from 2013 – which happens to bear my signature – and on the first page there is reference to a comment made by Mr. (Jim) Hilliard, then representing the applicant, quote, "the plan is to remove gravel from this site for the purpose of clearing it to construct buildings."

Riley also pointed out that the original permit, though expired, seemed to only encompass the removal of gravel and not the topsoil, sand and rock that had been blasted and removed over the years.

"But I have a number of other problems," he said.

Riley also pointed to the untreated stormwater that had been discharged into the Purgatory Brook as referenced by the State Attorney General. Bailey had called the issue a mistake in paperwork at a previous meeting and said no stormwater had discharged, and that they just needed to upgrade their system to comply with stormwater permitting. But Riley felt this explanation may be misleading.

"It occurs to me that if, as counsel represented at a prior hearing, that if the state had no case to present and nothing had been done, that A., you might have tried the case rather than immediately settling it," he said. "And B, why would you need to fix the stormwater system if there was nothing wrong with it?"

Riley listed the other issues he had with the property that led him to feel the permit should not be granted.

ZBA Member Scott Murphy

said they should approve the permit, but with a host of about eight or nine conditions, as he felt denying the permit and leaving the site as it is now would waste the property.

Murphy said he felt protective conditions requiring UAVE to come to the ZBA and show the company's progress every year and that UAVE would have to apply for an extension later to finish excavating the property after two year. He said they need to be mindful of the applicant's issues moving forward.

"He worked for five years without a permit, and that's just not acceptable," he said.

The conditions Murphy floated to the Board included putting back the trees taken out of M S Walker's property, fixing the erosion and putting the property back to original condition, requiring that UAVE comply with the AG's consent decree on stormwater infrastructure, and to require the applicant to have a closing plan.

"There needs to be some kind of plan as to what this site is going to look like when the applicant is done taking sand and gravel off it," he said.

Brady and Mulvehill said they agreed with Murphy at least on the issue of not allowing the site to be abandoned. ZBA Member Jack Perry asked for more time to review the changes to the plans presented at the meeting and the conditions brought up by Murphy, and the Board voted unanimously to table the matter until Jan. 5, 2021.

# Selectmen discuss gas pipe installations during the last official meeting of the year

The Norwood Board of Selectmen met on Tuesday, Dec. 14 and quickly moved through the agenda of their last official meeting of 2020.

Dominating the discussion were two items involving National Grid. Mary Mulrone, permit representative for National Grid, explained a request to install 115 feet of four-inch gas piping at the intersection of Central St. and Railroad Ave. to service house number 244 Central St. and 90 feet to service the commercial space at 244 Central St.

Director of Public Works Mark Ryan provided a letter supporting the project. "I have not talked to National Grid about this. I recommend approving this with the condition that the entire Central St. shall be milled and paved," said Ryan, adding he wanted the paving of the entire right of way involving the project. "It is little over 30 feet wide." After questioning the decision to go from 6 inch steel piping to 4 inch plastic, Selectman Helen Abdallah Donohue concluded, "So, this is almost a corrective measure." Selectman David Hajjar asked if National Grid agrees about the paving. Mulrone said that National Grid will need to be approved for a permit with the details to be worked out. Selectmen, however, voted that the recommended paving be part of the condition for the permit approval.

Ryan also addressed the situation at Heritage Baptist Church, 615 Washington St. The congregation was forced to vacate the premises due to damage sustained in a storm on June 28. The basement of the facility was destroyed, requiring gas service to be disconnected. Restoration of gas service will require the installation of a gas pipe on Town owned property. "It's a high-

pressure gas main on Washington St. which changes everything about a gas installation, said Ryan. The building is built on a slab, so gas piping must be installed outside, not underneath the slab. "There is no way around it," he said. "Some may find it esthetically not appealing...the church could look toward painting it as the stucco they have there."

"This is a very important matter," said Donohue. "We'd be happy to help the church, however our duty is to protect all the citizens of Norwood and gas is an extremely dangerous entity."

She asked for a legal opinion about town liability in this matter. Customer Manager John Barkas of National Grid said that the proposed installation was the safest way to run the service in the building.

"The safest place for this service right now would be the location on the sidewalk," said Barkas. "The regulator would be outside. That's the safest way to have it."

"What happens if a snowplow, truck, fire truck or automobile hits it?" asked Donohue.

Barkas replied that bollards are used to keep it safe. "It is against code to use the existing service that is still there," Barkas said.

Since June, the church has been unable to use the space and has been renting space elsewhere. They are concerned about having the building unheated during the winter months. "This is only the realistic way for the church to get up and running," said Town Manager Tony Mazzucco.

Barkas said that the existing line cannot be used. "It's against code," he said. "Unfortunately, that's just the way the regulations are." He noted that they examined all possibilities before determining this was the only option. The

request was approved by the Selectmen after the lengthy discussion.

Other business included the introduction of Clayton Cheever, the newly chosen library director at the Morrill Memorial Library. He is currently assistant director at the Quincy Thomas Crane Library in Quincy. A request was approved to install a Viet Nam War Memorial bench at the James Sansone Memorial, on the corner of East Hoyle and Washington Streets, to be paid for by private funds.

Following up on the discussion from the Dec. 8 meeting regarding the gravel removal operation being conducted by UAVE LLC, it was noted that a hearing was in process before the ZBA. "Wait and see what the Zoning Board does tonight," said Selectmen Chair William J. Plasko. Mazzucco suggested there may be some slowdown with Town services as employees will be working from home in the next few weeks based on the rise in COVID infections. More information will be forthcoming.

Selectmen recognized the challenges of 2020 and thanked the residents, Town departments, school district and businesses for making it through the difficulties of 2020.

"God bless us all, everyone, as Tiny Tim said," declared Selectman Thomas Maloney.

## CPC discusses carillon and trails projects for funding

The Norwood Community Preservation Committee (CPC) announced that it has received five applications for projects for FY 22 funding through the Massachusetts Community Preservation Act (CPA) at its meeting on Wed. Dec. 9, including work to the carillon at Town Hall and two trails projects.

Chairman Peter McFarland said the project applications include the removal of the fire bell at the carillon on top of Town Hall. According to the Town website, there is a 51st bell that is not connected to the historic, keyboard-controlled 50-bell carillon that is most likely from the firehouse that previously occupied the site.

Three of the proposed projects have been spearheaded by the Trails Advisory Commit-

tee (NTAC). One is an ADA accessible walking path along Hawes Pool. Con Com and the Parks and Recreation Department are also involved in this joint effort. There is also a proposal for a trail study at University Ave. and a passive recreation project at the Winter Hill Street overlook at the landfill.

“The Board of Selectmen is currently reviewing them and has not discussed them in open

forum,” NTAC Chair and CPC member Joe Greeley said. “But I assume sometime in the next couple of weeks they will either accept, reject or amend.”

Selectman Matt Lane, a CPC member, confirmed it would be on the Board of Selectmen’s upcoming agenda.

He also brought up that the Special Town Meeting was not likely to be held until early February “because of the special preparation that needs to happen.” The CPC needs to review the applications and then

present them to Town Meeting for approval.

Greeley urged the members to stay abreast of the date of submission for the Town Warrant.

“We want to make sure that we don’t miss the window and delay things by four or five months if we are going to submit any articles,” he said.

McFarland said the fire bell project should be “put on a fast track” and that there is some-

According to NPD School Resource Officer (SRO) Geoffrey Baguma, they were planning a night of drive-thru magic with scenes, Christmas lights and holiday cheer, but he announced on Monday, Dec. 14, that due to recent COVID-19 spikes and restrictions, the drive-thru event would have to be put on hold for the foreseeable future.

"The Christmas Extravaganza being organized by our School Resource Officers for December 23 has been canceled," Baguma said in an email. "Our SROs envisioned a Christmas event that would serve Norwood families and boost the spirits of kids whose lives have been affected by Covid. But when we began planning the event a few weeks ago, Covid infection rates in our town - and across the nation and state - were

dramatically lower. Today, infection, hospitalization and fatality rates are surging so, recognizing the potential risks involved to our officers, to town employees and to volunteers, and to people who might gather for the event, we've made the difficult decision to cancel."

Baguma said, however, the need for donations for the holiday season is higher than ever. "People don't stop needing to eat because of COVID-19, and more infections means more closures, and more closures means more people out of work during a critical time. The Winter Wonderland was supposed to be a focal point for gathering donations of gift cards for those in need.

"If you can, we're asking for you to please go and shop in our local Town and try to grab a gift card," he said. "We just went through the Shop Small period a little while ago and we figure this will help to stimulate our local economy somewhat."

Baguma said the idea was to have residents drop off their gift cards at the event or at the Norwood Public Safety Building, and he said you can still drop off cards at the latter.

"Officer James Mahoney and I, as well as our School

Liaison Officers, go out and deliver those gift cards to the families and people in need that we're aware of," he said. "Then of course they come back and give those to the businesses. It's a nice way to give to people who need it and then that comes right back into the Town."

Baguma said he, NPD officers and NPD Chief William Brooks are all disappointed that the event had to be canceled.

"Chief Brooks applauds all the effort our SROs put into planning the event, and thanks those merchants and townspeople who had already stepped forward to help," he said. "We will be reaching out to our community in other ways as the holidays approach."

Residents can pick up gift cards from local stores all around Town, but the highest concentration of locally-owned shops and restaurants is in the Downtown and South Norwood areas. least another month before this part of the saga can be completed. The lease was originally submitted last year, and has now been returned to the NAC signed by BEH President Christopher Donovan. Town-hired attorney Mina Makarios, of Anderson & Kreiger, said the lease is ready for the NAC to sign and approve. However, there are a few things that both NAC Chair Mark Ryan and NAC member Mike Sheehan said they want to see changed before they sign.


Makarios said there were discrepancies between the plans BEH submitted back in 2019 on how the company intends to use the West Apron and the DC-3 Ramp and the plans created by the firm Norwood Engineering this year. Makarios said the discrepancies were in square footage numbers between the surveyed plan (newest) and the non-surveyed plan (original). BEH Attorney Eric Loeffler, of David & Cohen, said he didn't see a problem with including both plans in the lease.

"Unless I'm missing something, I believe both plans were approved," he said. "Our suggestion and request is that we use both. I don't think that's an insurmountable hurdle; I think we could work through it. If the Commission has a preference for one or the other that can work, but our preference would be for both."

Makarios said he also doesn't see an issue with that, as long as it is made clear that the Norwood Engineering plan had the correct lines and square footage. Ryan said he was not comfortable with including two plans.

"In my opinion, there's no way you can have two plans, because they are not the same," he said. "The plan of 2019 for the DC-3 ramp shows 15,295 square feet outside of the TOFA (taxilane object-free area) and the Norwood Engineering plan has an area of 14,930. So that's a discrepancy right there, and the lease is based on the area of the Norwood Engineering Plan, so I'm not going to support using two plans."

Loeffler said that would not be an issue. Ryan said he would entertain a motion to vote to allow Airport Manager Russ Maguire to sign with the NAC's authority on the leases; firstly on the DC-3 Ramp and then the West Apron, but Sheehan said he would not be comfortable with voting yet and would like to wait until a few details

had been sorted out.

"I'm not prepared to vote," he said. "I'd like to see added to this agreement that within 10 days of signing this agreement the lessee (BEH) will record this plan (the Norwood Engineering Plan) with the Norfolk Registry of Deeds Land Court so that there's no future discrepancies regarding what space is being rented."

Sheehan also said that BEH must have submitted a parking plan for the airplanes on the DC-3 Apron. Makarios said the Airport has not received a parking plan, and Maguire agreed. Sheehan said the lease and the Norwood Engineering plan were given to BEH in November of 2019, and he felt that if the company was willing to wait a whole year to get the plans signed and back to the NAC, the company could wait another month while the NAC includes its own provisions.

"I'd like to see the revisions done, I'd like to see the plan from Norwood Engineering recorded, and I'd like to see the parking plan for the DC-3 ramp and once the plan is approved and at that point if those revisions that we discussed and the plans are submitted for the parking, I'm prepared to sign this lease," he said. "But not until then."

Ryan floated the idea of scheduling a special meeting if BEH could get the changes and documentation turned around fast enough.

"I don't know how many special meetings we've had over the years at this time of the year when it's been sat on for over 14 months," he said. "I don't know why they couldn't just get the plan in."

Donovan said he wants to use existing tie-downs for parking, and could send a

parking plan over the next day. Ryan said the lease requires a plan delineating which areas will be used to house fixed-base planes and which would be used to transient planes. Donovan said that would be noted.

The NAC voted unanimously to solidify the revisions to the lease for the DC-3 Ramp and the lease for the West Apron members would like to see and will vote on the lease at its next meeting.

In other news, FLN's request for 26 parking spaces on the north side of the airport was found not to be in the jurisdiction of the NAC. Makarios said after reviewing the lease that if there is a dispute between FLN and BEH over whether or not FLN has the right to place those parking spots there, that's a matter between those two parties and not within the jurisdiction of the NAC.



one evaluating the cost of its removal this week. The carillon itself was already approved for a CPA-funded repair at the 2019 Regular Town Meeting.

“The bell repair part of the project is coming in at \$205,000,” he said. “We’ve allocated \$215,000, but the other portion of this project is the painting inside the bell tower.”

He added that there were five bids put in for this aspect of the project, and he hoped that the date could be extended by 60 days for the carillon-related projects to be in alignment.

“I’m expecting maybe a supplemental request for up to

another \$150,000 for painting the bell tower,” McFarland continued. “It’s one of those things where all three kind of coincide.

It doesn’t make much sense to be working up there if we’re going to be taking something out and then painting something and all this type of stuff. My feeling is, not just for the CPC but as a taxpayer item, I want to see this money used in the most efficient and effective way.”

If they are not done in the right sequence, MacFarland made the analogy of having a road repaved only for it to be torn up for repairs.

“My feeling is, if we can do

it in a sensible and methodical way of getting a supplemental project approved, we can get the request for the carillon and the bell removal done at the same time and do it, in my mind, in the right way.”

Member John Hall voiced his agreement for integrating the schedules. He asked that MacFarland work with Patrick Deschenes, the Assistant Town Planner, to facilitate this.

“We definitely want to get a public hearing in January,” McFarland said. Meetings are usually held on the second Wednesday of the month, and the CPC agreed that supplemental meetings could be added on the fourth Wednesday as needed.

The last project would be to get funding for interpretive signage for historical landmarks and locations. “I’d really like to see something for housing in the next cycle,” Hall said.

“We don’t have anything from the Housing Authority right now,” Vice Chairman Patty Starr said. “What we thought was going to happen has been delayed, and we’ve sort of put all of our coins in one basket, so to speak. It doesn’t look like that’s going to happen in the near future, so we’re going to have to go back to square one and look at plan B.”

The CPC also welcomed new member Catherine Walsh to its ranks. Walsh, who joined the Conservation Commission (Con

Com) this summer, has been a Norwood resident for seven years. The civil engineer and lawyer worked at Northeastern University for the past eight years and manages design and construction in its facilities division. Prior to that, she had a similar role at the Massachusetts Port Authority (Massport). She also volunteers at the Norwood Food Pantry.

“I’m grateful to be here,” she said, noting that Steve Washburn, a fellow food pantry volunteer and the Con Com chair, encouraged her to become involved in the Con Com, which led to her new role as a CPC member. “I’m looking forward to learning from you guys and working with you.”
