What to expect at Norwood bars and restaurants this winter

Norwood Town officials held a virtual meeting on Oct. 16 to discuss what preparations restaurants can plan for during the winter months to stay open and increase capacity.

Massachusetts and the country as a whole is experiencing an uptick in COVID-19 diagnoses, and with winter fast approaching, it is bound to make outdoor dining more difficult. Norwood Assistant Town Planner Patrick Deschenes said keeping outdoor dining an option for as long as possible is a big

priority.

“Obviously, it’s probably the safest measure to go with right now,” he said. “Heaters are definitely an option, but I also realize those are a hot commodity for a lot of restaurants right now. I imagine the back order on them is pretty long.”

Deschenes said any business looking to install heaters would have to notify the Norwood Building Inspector Matt Walsh, as well as get a sign off from the Norwood Fire Department on placement.

Deschenes said one unknown is snow removal. He said outdoor dining – which utilizes sidewalk space and blocks off parking spaces –

would probably have to end when snow removal commences in earnest (not for small accumulations). He said he would have to talk to Department of Public Works Director Mark Ryan before any decisions are made.

Town Manager Tony Mazzucco added they are trying to figure out a way to keep some tables outside even after plowing begins, perhaps moving them to the side of the restaurant’s building so they could get at the sidewalks.

“I think we could try to come up with something, but I think it may be a requirement

NAC remembers old friend and reviews parking

The Norwood Airport Commission (NAC) met on Oct. 14 and discussed continued proposals from Southern Airways while at the same meeting remembering former NAC member Les LeBlanc, who passed away on Oct. 7.

Commission Chair Mark Ryan said Southern Airways has been looking for up to 10 dedicated parking spaces in the Norwood Memorial Airport’s parking lot on Access Road.

Ryan said Airport Commissioner Russ Maguire put together a plan for Southern Air-

ways’ customers.

“I think it looks good, you’ve got them together so they’re not scattered around and not interfering with snow removal operations and it’s sort of out of the way of many other businesses so we’re not taking away from that,” he said. “I think it’s a good plan, but the one thing I want to discuss is do we charge Southern Airways an annual nominal fee for the benefit of reserving those spots?”

The plan was approved with a fee to be worked out later. The Commission also voted that



(NCM) on Nov. 11 at 11 a.m.

"For the most part, I'm actually looking to duplicate what we did on Memorial Day," he said. "I'm going to invite local politicians, state politicians, Congressman Stephen Lynch and anybody I can think of to send me a two minute clip."

Mulvehill said working with NCM last year was an amazing experience during a dark time, and he feels this

year, while still a different celebration, will have the same somber yet festive tone.

"(NCM Promotions Coordinator) Brian Boudreau did a wonderful job for me last year," he said. "He went around Town and shot some video of our corner memorials and veterans memorials like the Korean War Bench and stuff like that. I'm going to invite everyone I know to send me a clip if they wish and, locally, I'll schedule an afternoon and do a socially-distant ceremony at Memorial Hall, which I think will be awfully nice."

While on Memorial Day the Chair of the Board of Selectmen read a statement on behalf of all members, Veterans Day allows each member of the Board the opportunity to speak.

"I'm very excited about that," he said. "We're going to try to maintain as many traditional elements of the ceremony as we can... All the Selectmen usually march in the parade with us and they join me on the Dempsey Bandstand when we do it on the Common, ordinarily. So each of the Selectmen and the Town Manager Tony Mazzucco will have the opportunity to present their remarks concerning what Veterans Day means to them."

Mulvehill said there is also a surprise planned for the event, however since it is currently unclear as to whether it will be ready in time for Nov. 11, he didn't want to give specifics.

"The department is hoping to provide a very special dedication to several Civil War soldiers from Norwood, if the COVID-19 pandemic permits," he said.

Mulvehill said services provided to Norwood veterans have been solowed by the pandemic.

"So, we've been playing catch up," he said. "When the Town Hall opened up the day after Labor Day, we reopened for in-house interviews by appointment only and, in the month of September, we had 30 vets in my office. We're constantly bringing people in. My schedule for October is already full."

He said providing these services has been a challenge, and that the office has had to update the way it does things.

"The regional building, the JFK Building, is still closed," he said. "So my service officer who used to work in that building requested from the Veterans Administration to be able to upload claims directly by email. I'll take a completed application from the veteran from whatever town and email it to myself and forward to him and he forwards it to the VA, and then the VA works on the claim and makes an adjudication. It's a brave new world because it used to be all mail."

Norwood Trails hosting cleanup

Members of the Norwood Trails Advisory Committee are hosting a socially-distant trail cleanup on Oct. 31 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Shattuck Park in Norwood, starting on the Nicholas Street side of the park.

Trails member Lee Leach said this year, they've been able to organize one cleanup over at Hennessy Park that was very successful and they're looking to do it again before the real winter weather hits.

"It's basically just a couple of hours of getting in there and taking some trash bags with us," he said. "Maybe we'll bring some light tools like rakes and shovels if we need them. The Shattuck is pretty well maintained in that regard."

Leach said there's usually only light litter, with maybe some instances of branch trimming necessary to keep the trail passable.

"There are some reports of broken glass that we wanted to get out of there too, because we know some residents like to walk there with their kids," he said. "Broken glass doesn't fit well with young kids."

Leach said they did host a large organized cleanup last year in April for Earth Day.

"But of course you know what happened to our plans for

this year," he said. "Since we missed that we wanted to do something a little less formal. We're thinking that we will try to get a number of the other trails that we have been featuring in our talks and walks around Town so we can make sure they're in good shape for the public to use."

Leach said there is usually trash throughout the trails system. Sometimes it's left by walkers, sometimes by local kids and sometimes it can blow in from the road.

"We do work with the (Norwood) Department of Public Works and they know on the Monday after we do a cleanup to come out and pick up the trash bags we put at the trailhead," he said. "Mostly it's in several bags and they're not terribly heavy because you don't want to overfill. There are other pieces of trash like small pieces of metal or small appliances that are thrown in the woods too, often many years ago, and we're just trying to get the stuff we can out of there."

Leach said discarded needles were a concern, but the group has not found one yet at any of the parks. He did say they have discussed proper procedure with the Norwood Health Department should they ever come across any.

"Basically, it's just more or less the normal trash you'd expect," he said.

In other trail systems, Leach said the issue of dog poop can be a big problem. Sometimes walkers will just leave bags lying around, and other times it will be free and open, but he said regardless, dog poop is a serious concern for the local water table and the local flora and fauna.

"It's a pet peeve of ours and we do try to encourage in our meetings with announcements that dog owners are always welcome to exercise their dogs in the trails, but they should be respectful and do pick it up, which I think is pretty much being done for the most part," he said. "I'm hopeful that the Town can work to provide a station with poop bags available to dog walkers when they do enter the trails. I've seen that in other trail systems."

Does anyone care about the airport anymore?

There's quite a bit going on down at the Norwood Airport, the question is does anyone care anymore. It used to be that any effort to increase the size of planes or the volume of flights in or out would have caused major residential concern. Heck, it wasn't that long ago that when discussion of installing an ILS (Instrument Landing System) was taking place, there was major backlash from the citizenry. Not that the idea has been raised recently concerning an ILS, but with everything else going on, how long will it be before that issue raises its ugly head again?

So, let's review what's happening down there, and we won't even spend any time describing ongoing legal issues undoubtedly costing taxpaying residents hundreds of thousands of dollars in lawyers' fees in the last decade, that in and of itself being kept as low key as possible by public officials.

First, there is the introduction of Southern Airways as a major tenant. Here is a Google description. "Memphis, Tennessee-based Southern Airways Express (9X) is a commuter airline that flies to about 20 destinations in the Southern and Mid-Atlantic regions of the United States. It operates from hubs at Destin Executive Airport (DSI), Memphis International Airport (MEM), Pittsburgh International Airport (PIT) and Baltimore Washington International Airport (BWI). Its fleet consists of 14 Cessna 208 Caravan aircraft and nine Piper PA-31 Chieftains, each of which hold nine passengers. In 2016, Southern Airways Express acquired Sun Air Express (6G)."

Quite an impressive airline, but how do residents of Norwood feel about their airport now being listed along with Pittsburg, Baltimore Washington and Memphis International Airports? And, in this week's issue in an article describing the latest Airport Commission meeting, DuBois & King Engineer Jeff Adler gave the Commission an update on the company's project to pave the runways' safety areas. Paving those areas, for which the Airport already has ownership, would give each runway an extra 600 feet of space. This would allow larger and heavier planes to take off and land, potentially increasing the traffic at the airport. Right now, he said they are doing environmental assessments for that project.

Hmmm, is this a good thing? Do residents really want expanded runways allowing "larger and heavier planes to take off and land, potentially increasing the traffic at the airport." And doesn't paving the "Safety Areas" eliminate any safety those areas are supposed to provide? And why aren't airport commissioners coming before the Board of Selectmen and updating them regarding all of these "improvements on a regular basis so that residents watching the meetings can get a better handle on everything proposed down there?" And to top it off, at the same meeting commissioners weren't sure if they were even going to charge a fee to Southern Airways for the 10 parking spots the airline wants reserved for customers. Well, if they weren't going to charge a fee, why not set aside those spots for residents with no place to park their cars in the winter when street parking is banned, and let Southern Airways customers fend for themselves? At least it appears they will be charging the airline something for the parking.

So, with plans for bigger planes and more of them coming and going daily, how long do you think it will be before the whole issue of the ILS is raised again? The ILS, for those who aren't aware or don't remember, allows for planes to take off and land with instruments only if conditions don't allow pilots to see where they are going, and on the surface this may appear to some to be a safety improvement. But, for a little airport like Norwood, isn't it better for pilots to divert to another airport that has an ILS than to attempt landings in bad weather? Having no planes attempting landings in bad weather is a hell of a lot safer than having some trying to land using instruments, at least in this writer's opinion.

So, does anyone really care what is going on at Norwood Memorial Airport?

MORSE HOUSE A TOWN TREASURE

To the Editor:

The town of Norwood has owned the historic home of George Henry Morse at 1285 Washington Street in South Norwood for 45 years. Over time, with the many efforts of volunteers and donors, the Morse House began its journey of rehabilitation for use by the community. Now through the wisdom of Norwood town voters who approved the Community Preservation surtax of 1% on their property taxes a few years ago, the Norwood Historical Commission filed an application requesting \$50,000 of those funds to conduct a thorough professional property assessment and master plan for this historic home and property. The goal of the Norwood Historical Commission is to protect this home long-term for future generations.

The Morse House is truly a lens through which residents can appreciate Norwood's very distant past - but it's more than that. It serves as a tangible portal that bears witness to generations of the Morse family who served local history in a myriad of ways. George Henry Morse held many civic positions, including the town's first Assessor, first Selectman voted in the town's first publicly held election, and first Fire Chief. The ancestors of George Henry Morse also bear witness to centuries of highly motivated, civic-minded, forward-thinking, and industrious actions that shaped what Norwood



would eventually become. It is a remarkable history that connects all the residents of Norwood regardless of how long one has lived in the town.

The Morse House property on Morse Hill is situated in an area that is referenced, described, and documented to in a variety of historic written sources as being the vicinity of Norwood's earliest settlers of the Morse family, especially Ezra Morse. The house itself is an excellent architectural example of an Italianate style home circa 1860s. George Henry Morse represents the 9th generation of Samuel Morse (signer of the Dedham Compact) whose influential family members wasted no time in establishing strongholds in their new world when they arrived in the Massachusetts Bay area in 1635. George Henry Morse was a leader just as his ancestors before him. He built the house several years before Norwood be-

came incorporated and raised two daughters there. Preserving the history of our community through the restoration and rehabilitation of the George Henry Morse House will provide valuable cultural, social, and educational benefits for all residents to enjoy and appreciate.

to-door," Baguma said. "Trunk-or-Treat is a very nice event to go to, but we wanted to add a little bit more. With this event we're not only going to have our staff, but some students from the Norwood High School Drama Club."

Baguma said the event will work like a drive-thru Spooky World or haunted house. Residents will get to drive-thru the gauntlet and then collect a goodie bag of candy.

"We want to make it as much of an interactive experience as we can," he said. "We're going to put up different decorations and we're, hopefully, going to put up some holographic decorations and really give Norwood something it hasn't had yet."

Mahoney said the night isn't just all about fun.

"We always give the Halloween Safety tips in all the classrooms in the Norwood schools, and because of COVID-19, we couldn't do that this year," he said. "So in the gift bags it's going to have treats but also have tips on the bag on how to be safe during Halloween. We wanted to make sure to get that out to the kids as

much as possible."

Mahoney said the gift bags will be made with a reflective material, much like jogging outfits or neon vests officers or construction crews wear during night work. And the bags will include glow sticks.

"And then there will be probably around six police officers working the night in costume, and we'll have our baseball cards to put in the bag so the kids know which officers took part in the event," he said. "Most of the officers are SROs or SLOs."

Mahoney said the candy will be of a wide variety to accommodate everyone's tastes.

"We're actually at Costco right now trying to get some more, but it's going to be a good variety of lollipops, taffy, Tootsie Roll stuff, it's going to be good," he said. "We've gotten some donations, and the Police Department is pretty much kicking in the rest. I know there's other things going on - I think the Civic Center is taking donations for their movie nights, and we don't want to interfere with that."

Baguma said the officers are

really looking forward to the event, and added he at least doesn't have any stage fright about the performance.

"I think we're more excited than nervous. This event gives us an opportunity to be in a different suit than we're usually in and have the community see us in a completely different light."

Mahoney said if the event is successful, they might try to pull a bigger one next year if COVID-19 restrictions are lifted, and they could include more students from the high school and participants from the Norwood Fire Department.

The event is intended for children ages 12 and under, but all ages are welcome. The event will take place near the rear of the high school, and patrons should enter through Peabody Road and follow the student drop off signs. All vehicle occupants should be wearing masks while attending, and participants are encouraged to wear their Halloween costumes.

signage for those 10 parking spaces would have to be paid for by Southern Airways.

Also concerning Southern Airways, Maguire informed the Commission that the company's hanger operator, FlightLevel, will no longer be pursuing chemical de-icing this year, so Southern Airways will now di-ice in a heated hanger for the winter season.

Also during the meeting, DuBois & King Engineer Jeff Adler gave the Commission an update on the company's project to pave the runways' safety areas. Paving those areas, for which the Airport already has ownership, would give each runway an extra 600 feet of space. This would allow larger and heavier planes to take off and land, potentially increasing the traffic at the airport. Right now, he said they are doing environmental assessments for that project.

Adler also gave an update on another environmental assessment the company is performing for the airport concerning its plans to rebuild Taxiway C to conform to FAA guidelines. Basically, the idea is to realign the taxiway so it runs parallel all the way down. Currently, DuBois & King's assessment is that the taxiway creates unsafe situations because it does not run parallel through-out.

He said they are working to

put together a package for the Massachusetts Environmental Protection Agency (MEPA) for both projects.

"We're hoping that in the next few weeks we'll be able to do a submission on that and that would start a clock," he said. "The first step would be to get a MEPA certificate to say they're generally okay with the preferred alternative, the safety areas and for Taxiway C."

He said they've been discussing the project with the MEPA office and said the conversations have been positive.

"Right now we feel pretty good in talking with those folks in that they understand the need for the project and the need for updating the safety areas," he said.

The Commission also voted unanimously to approve payments for those environmental assessments. Ryan pointed out those payments are funded by the FAA.

Also during the meeting, Maguire related the sad news that former NAC member Les LeBlanc passed away on Oct. 7. He and the Commission expressed their condolences.

"Les had had some health issues and, unfortunately, last Wednesday night he passed away," he said. "He was appointed to the Airport Commission in March of 2002 and served for just over 16 years, until May of 2018. He was a

private pilot, well-known on the airport and had also had at one time a little aerial photography business and he was a retired Norwood detective as well. During the 16 years that he served on the Airport Commission, the airport underwent a number of major renovations."

Maguire said these included the reconstruction of the main runway, the reconstruction of four taxiways, the reconstruction of the west apron, the ABC lot apron and the Gate 3 taxi lane.

"He was also on hand when we did all the security upgrades following 9/11," he said. "Finally, and certainly not all-inclusive in the list, he was on the board when we completed both phase 1 and phase 2 of the Welch Administration Building. I know that Les loved the airport, and when he wasn't involved with Commission activities, he just liked to park out by one of the aprons and watch the planes take off and land, sometimes doing it for hours and sometimes daily. He definitely loved the airport. Even with his health issues he made a point to come down."

Maguire also reported that over the last quarter, the airport had \$13,000 in landing fees from customers.

"I've got to check my records on that, but that might be the best quarter we've ever had," Maguire said.

that if there's snow you need to pull tables in," he said. "We know that if on Dec. 10 we get a foot-and-a-half of snow we're going to have to pull everything in and we're probably not going to be able to use sidewalks until the spring, but there might be a reduced option."

Mug 'n' Muffin owner David Monhan said he's already seeing a reduction in outdoor dining use now.

"I think it's coming to an end and this week it's going to rain and I don't think I'll be able to do anything outside. But if I have two tables outside on the wall, maybe on occasion somebody would use them," he said.

Mazzucco said they would be willing to look at reduced plans for restaurants like the Mug 'n' Muffin.

The Board of Selectmen will have the final call as to when they want to end outdoor dining, but Town Planner Paul Halkiotis said that as long as Norwood restaurants can make it happen (without blocking plowing or public ways), the Town should try to accommodate them.

"It would be great to help them out," he said. "Over the winter we should take a look at our regulations and tweak them as we need to and I would encourage the restaurants to apply for outdoor dining in March and look at an April opening. If we have all these restaurants permitted by March and then the weather opens up, they'll be ready to do business back outside."

Norwood Health Department Director Sigalle Reiss said Norwood is currently a Phase III Step 2 community, which means the Town is considered a "lower risk" community. She said the biggest differences between Phase III Step 1 and 2 is gathering limits.

For restaurants and bars, Step 2 means bar seating can happen, but no staff can be working behind the bar, save for those with a Plexiglas barrier at least 30 inches high with a gap opening at the bottom no more than eight inches high.

"That's really to separate customers from the working space," Reiss said. "Parties must be seated at the bar and no standing."

She added that recreational games like arcades and billiards may be allowed, but no food is to be served near those games.

She said alcohol may be served onsite if there is food that has been prepared onsite. No bags of chips or nuts will do.

"The food also has to be ordered at the same time as the initial alcoholic beverage," she said. "A really standard bar is still closed until Phase 4."

For performances, Step 2 means that musical performances are allowed, but singing and the playing of brass or wind instruments is discouraged. If wind instruments, brass instruments or singing is to be done, there must be at least 10 feet between performers and at least 25 feet between performers and the first row of the audience. Plexiglass barriers cannot be used to reduce required distances. Indoor venues cannot have singing, but may have brass or wind instruments in accordance with distance.

Reiss said if an employee tests positive for COVID-19, then the employer is required

to notify the Health Department and assist the Department with contract tracing and shut down for a deep cleaning and disinfecting of the workplace in accordance with the current Centers for Disease Control guidelines.

"You are still required to do the cleaning as any other establishment or facility, but the 24-hour waiting period for restaurants has been removed," Reiss said. "The restaurant safety standards are really the only ones that had this 24-hour waiting pe-

riod removed. So cleanliness is important but really the focus is on person-to-person spread."

Norwood Health Agent Angelo DeLuca also wanted to remind residents that pets are not allowed inside restaurants or in the outdoor dining areas. He said service animals are the only pets allowed in any dining area.

"That basically leaves only dogs, with the exception of miniature horses," he said. "So please keep that in mind."

Dear Doctor: I bought new a 2014 Ram 1500. After 18 months the radio failed. FA replaced it free of charge. After 30 months the radio had shorts that killed the battery. The new battery installed would die so the dealer removed circuit fuse. FA Regional said that they will pay for new radio. The dealer said that new radio was ordered Sept 15, 2019. FA Regional claims that they cannot locate a replacement radio for my truck in all North America. Call in early January 2020 to FA Regional resulted in promise that they are still trying to locate replacement radio. Is this normal or am I getting a delaying tactic so I will give up? -Thomas

A) The radio's in today's vehicles are mini computers and very complex. I remove radio's every week and send them out to United Radio in Syracuse NY. for repair. I would suggest the dealer to send it out for repair if the new is not available. The good thing is we are at the beginning of February.

Dear Doctor: The steering wheel heater in my 2019 BMW 330i does not get hot enough. It's been to the dealer who replaced the original wheel with a new one. Same problem. The heater in our 2017 BMW Sport Wagon is fine. I tried the heat option in several 2019 and 2020 BMW models. Same problem. I contacted BMW corporate who indicated that the heated wheel was operating as per specs. I tried an aftermarket heater, but its only good for about 20 minutes. Any ideas? -Richard

paign to raise funds for the purchase and maintenance of 100 trees at Bird Park.

According to Mike Keimig, President of the Friends of Bird Park, "The diversity and number of trees at Bird Park make it a truly special place, but many of the trees are as old or older than the park and are aging out. Plus, storm damage and invasive species have taken their toll on the park's tree population. Our mission as an organization is to support the park, and the best way to do that now is to help ensure that the public, now and in the future, can enjoy the beauty and benefits of the park's trees as the Bird Family intended when the park opened almost 100 years ago."

In the last two years, The Trustees, the nonprofit organization that owns and manages the park, had to remove over 100 trees that were in hazardous condition. Another 25 came down last year due to severe storms. Each year, more of the stately hemlocks that were planted to provide a shield from the hustle and bustle of life outside the park fall or are removed because of damage by the hemlock woolly adelgid, a tiny sap-sucking insect that is causing widespread death and decline of hemlock trees in the eastern United States.

The Friends of Bird Park are partnering with The Trustees on the project, which will support a multi-year effort by the Trustees to remove the park's hazardous trees, improve conditions for remaining trees, and plant replacement trees. The choice and placement of new trees will be based on current and anticipated environmental conditions, the lifespan and other key characteristics of the trees, and the original park plans created by John Nolen, the landscape architect who designed the park. A wide variety of species are expected to be planted at the park, including oak, willow, fir, birch, hickory, sweetgum, tuliptree, larch, magnolia, maple, sassafras, shadbush, and holly.

The Friends have set a goal of raising \$15K for the Bird Park Tree Project. They are thrilled to announce that every dollar donated will be matched thanks to a generous donation by the Charles Sumner Bird Foundation.
