Saad, Mazzola top tickets, turnout an abysmal 13 percent

Challenger Michael Saad topped the ticket in the election to fill two seats on the Board of Selecmen totaling 1,668 votes, followed by incumbent Matthew Lane with 1,615 votes. Current Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) member Shannon Greenwell garnered 1,061 votes. Around 13 percent of registered voters showed up on Monday's election

For the School Committee, current School Chair Anne Marie Mazzola was the leading vote getter with 1,766 votes followed by fellow incumbent Teresa

Stewart with 1,486 votes and Tylor Tourville falling short of capturing one of the two contested seats with 914 votes.

Planning Board incumbent Ernie Paciorkowski defeated challenger newcomer Eve Hogan with 1,281 votes to 944, a surprisingly close race.

Greenwell said after the votes were tallied that she's going to continue working hard at the ZBA and the MBTA Communities Task Force. She said the campaign was a real education in Norwood dynamics.

"I got to talk to a lot of people. I'm excited to continue the role that I've had and maybe build it into something else," she said. "We get to see a lot of community members who come before us on the ZBA, usually for very specific reasons all related to zoning, so it was nice to be able to talk to folks about issues that weren't just zoning, but are important. And that was something I really enjoyed and will look forward to on the next time around."

To be clear, Greenwell said she would definitely be interested in running for another position in the future.

"If the right opportunity pops up it certainly would be something I would try again," she said.

School Committee approves FY 24 school budget

The School Committee held an hour-long budget hearing on Wednesday, March 29 before its regular meeting, where it approved its FY 24 year's budget of \$54,824,886, by a 4-0 vote, an increase of 3.83 percent.

This increase brings the general fund base budget more in alignment with the Town's override pledge in 2019 to not raise the budget by more than 3.5 percent annually over a five-year period. While the amount allows the district to retain its vital services, it has apparently been challenging to meet the increasing needs of a larger and diverse student population in an inflationary economy.

The first draft called for a 10.42 percent increase over the previous year's allocation. This sharply exceeded the 3.5 percent annual increase allowed under the override pledge. After a meeting with the Finance Commission two weeks ago, the amount of the increase was reduced to 3.83 percent at the last School Committee meeting.

Business Manager Karin Sheridan gave a detailed presentation about how this num-

ber was derived. She explained that instructional services comprise the bulk of the budget at \$44,598,144, totaling 81.35 percent.

"When we began building this budget, the biggest challenge was level staffing from FY 23 to FY 24," she explained, noting that expense alone was a 3.3 percent increase. This, Sheridan said, made it virtually impossible to stay within the confines of the 3.5 percent override pledge.

General education costs comprised 64 percent of the budget. Special education made up 32 percent, while education for English learners totaled 4 percent. Sheridan noted that special education costs are higher, but some of the amount was offset by using circuit

NHS Drama Troupe sizzles in METG's "Ash to a Flame"

The Norwood High School Drama Troupe advanced to the state finals of Massachusetts High School Drama Festival presented by the Massachusetts Educational Theater Guild (METG) on Thursday, March 30 with a searing performance of "Ash to a Flame."

The Back Bay Events Center in downtown Boston hosted the final round performances by 14 schools from across the state over the course of three days. This group had been whittled

down from 112 first-round contestants in the annual competitive festival.

While "Ash to a Flame" did not win the finals, perhaps the troupe's biggest achievement took place behind the scenes because of the unexpected set modifications needed to accommodate the theater's smaller stage. The use of the play's centerpiece feature – the silks for the aerial acrobatics – was literally up in the air until hours before the performance.

Cast members Olivia LeSavage, Emma Naughton, Adwoa Kwakye and Sarah McCarey spoke with The Norwood Record on Wednesday, March 29. At that time, they were still uncertain if an alternate ending would have to be used for their totally student-driven production.

"We've had some challenges that we've had to face," explained LeSavage. "First was the reconfiguration of the play. We had to cut off a bit of the front."

"Their stage is 10 feet deeper than ours," added director Sarah McCarey, who also

Lane said he's excited to get back in the saddle at the Board, and said his opponents ran great campaigns and was happy to see strong civic democracy in Norwood.

"It brought out the best in us," he said. "Everything was really positive. So much at the national level is negative but whenever we would see each other, on the campaign trail or holding signs, it was really positive and that was nice. It set a good tone for the campaign regardless of what the outcome would be. Because if I was reelected, I would have to work with whomever else is elected and you really want to try to build that rapport early."

Lane said the low turnout, 13 percent, was a bit disheartening but understood at least some of the reasons why many residents may not have had time to come out and vote.

"Last year we had four elections," he said. "We had the election in January because of David's passing (former Board of Selectman David Hajjar), and then we had the election in April, and then the primary and then the general. It's a lot to ask of people so I appreciate that people came out. The turnout wasn't as great as I would have hoped, but again, people are busy and I appreciate everyone who came out."

Saad said he was looking forward to getting to work for Norwood residents.

"We're just looking to make Norwood a special place," he said. "I love working with people and I love doing things, so we're going to get things done."

Saad said he was so thankful to the residents of Norwood and to his supporters.

"We had a great team. I want to thank my family and I want to

thank Shannon and Matt for conducting great campaigns. I want to thank everybody who stepped up and put their name on the ballot; I want to thank my campaign team, my advisors, all the people who made it successful," he said. "I want to thank my wife Tammy too, and everybody who helped. We had a tremendous team with a tremendous message, and we're ready to roll up our sleeves and work."

School Committee member Teresa Stewart said she's looking forward to diving back into the school budget process.

"It never stops!" she said with a laugh. "The budget is all year long, it doesn't stop, and I was working on several things today hoping that I was reelected to continue it tomorrow."

Stewart said she felt immense gratitude that the voters of Norwood trusted her to get the job done.

"This is very important work and I'm honored to do it," she said.

Stewart has been on the School Committee for six years, and if with an average meeting length of three hours and other associated work, it's a pretty big commitment. She said. however, it's some of the best work she can do for the Town.

"Public education is extremely important and something I've always valued," she said. "Six years ago I ran because I was seeing things in my kids'

schools – they were very young at the time going into kindergarten – but I was seeing things that I felt could be improved. Over the last six years I think we've done a lot of more good work, but there's always room for improvement and more to do. Like the budget and the middle school project, the work is going to continue to evolve and you're never going to achieve all your goals, but trying to excites me."

Planning Board member Ernie Paciorkowski said he also wanted to thank the voters of Norwood, and was looking forward to getting back to pressing issues, like the MBTA 3A Communities Act and the formation of Norwood's Master Plan.

"First and foremost though we're going to get a new planner on board," he said. "There's so much going on in Town, between the hospital, Moderna's expansion and FM Global, they're going to do a complete rebuild down there. There's literally \$1.5 billion in redevelopment going on in those three places right there, so there's a lot going on."

Paciorkowski said he felt his opponent ran a good campaign and he was happy to see it.

"I'll continue to work in the Town's best interests and, to Eve Hogan, it was great, and I think competition makes everybody in all races better and so congratulations to Eve and I'm sure we'll hear from her down the road," he said. "I wish there were more contested races because it steps up everybody's game."

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

FinCom reviews water, sewer and storm management

Member Judy Langone steps down after 33 years

The Norwood Finance Commission (FinCom) met on Thursday, March 30 and went over the current iterations of the Town and School budgets.

The three areas of focus were the combined Town and Schools Facilities Department Budget, the Water and Sewer Budget and the Blue Hills Technical Vocational School Budget.

Concerning the Facilities Budget, Facilities Department Director Paul Riccardi said they are in pretty good shape, with about \$370,000 in increased requests versus last year's budget.

"About \$280,000 of that increase is energy costs," Riccardi said. "So we take that energy increase out – because of all the stuff we have no control over, energy is the least control we have. So if you take that increase out, our overall budget is up 1.75 percent."

Riccardi added that his department of 52 people has added

no new staff this year and that the staff comprises about \$5 million of the total \$8.5 million in the budget. Later in the presentation, Riccardi said he wants to try to reframe the Facilities Department as more of a service provider for building maintenance and construction – work that has already shown, according to Town Manager Tony Mazzucco, to cut down on future costs by doing the maintenance when it needs to be done.

"I really believe that it's time for everybody to look at the Facilities Department as a vendor; we're providing the service, and the money is kind of immaterial," he said. "Eighty-four percent of our work orders are in the School Department, and that will always be the case. It will always be the higher number."

He said he wanted to move away from the current model of trying to balance between the schools and Town Administra-

"Personally, I want to get my department out of the whole numbers game that we're playing with the budget," he said. "The budget's the budget. We're never going to be Wellesley, but we spend an awful lot of time trying to prove – and maybe I'm just being too paranoid - but trying to prove that everyone's getting a fair share here. Everybody is getting more than a fair share."

FinCom member Myev Bodenhofer said she didn't feel that was the problem, but pointed out the school department does need to get its endof-year report to the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) before the end of the year and getting that together has been slow because of the Facilities Department.

Riccardi said his Department

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
Consecutive U's, not ewes or you's

There aren't too many words in the English language with consecutive U's. The most common one is vacuum. And then there are the less common ones, such as continuum, having no gap, as in the sentence, "Masculinity is on a continuum." There is a Hawaiian style of a loose-fitting dress called a muumuu, which is worn mostly in the summertime. The word with successive U's that is appropriate for this week is triduum, meaning three (tri) days (dies).

For Christians the week before Easter, called Holy Week, contains a deeply meaningful triduum, or successive three important days. Except for Orthodox Christian worshippers this is Holy Week, marked by Palm Sunday. The Wednesday preceding Easter is not part of the triduum; it has the name Spy Wednesday, which conjures James Bond images, but such is not the case. Spy Wednesday gets its name because this is the day on which Judas betrayed Jesus to the Sanhedrin. Since Judas is considered to be clandestine, his actions leading up to a betrayal conjure up the image of a spy.

The Thursday of Holy Week used to be called Maundy Thursday. On its own, the word maundy means the ceremony of washing the feet of the poor, especially commemorating Jesus' washing of His disciples' feet, which is said to have occurred at the Last Supper. The more contemporary name is Holy Thursday.

The Friday of Holy Week is the second part of the triduum. My eight-year-old granddaugh-

ter has repeatedly asked me, why is it called Good Friday if Jesus or any other man was nailed to a cross to die. The answer is too deep for Colette to understand and, even when simplified, lacks traction.

Holy Saturday is the third day of the triduum, marked by a prolonged night-time service called the Easter Vigil, a portion of which is conducted in utter darkness with appropriate readings from the Book of Genesis. leading up to intense bellringing indicating the good news of the Resurrection. [For those of you keeping score, attendance at the Holy Saturday service "counts' for going to Mass on Easter Sunday itself.]

So there you have it, in case you are ever on Jeopardy or at a trivia night: the only four words in English with consecutive U's.

And, lastly and unrelated to the alphabet analysis, Happy Easter!

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BOH recognizes restaurant improvements

The Board of Health met in an informational capacity at Memorial Hall in the Norwood Town Hall.

Chair Kathleen Bishop said the meeting could not include any voting items since they did not have a quorum present due to illness, but she did take reports during the meeting.

worked on the makeup design and styling with LeSavage. "It's narrower, and the proscenium of our stage is cut off. So we had to practice on a smaller stage."

The next obstacle was whether or not the troupe would be allowed to use the silks, an integral feature for Ash, the protagonist, played by senior Emma Naughton. The METG expressed safety concerns.

The performers were told of three options for their show, but the details would not be finalized until hours before they took to the stage, Naughton said. They would be able to perform the original play with the silks in the center, move them upstage left, or not use them at all.

"It changes a lot of the story," she said. "We worked out three possible ways to perform the play."

"Which changed a lot of the ending dance," added McCarey. "We were told [on March 29] during fourth period that we wouldn't be able to use the silks at all by the owners of the space. But then some union people from the METG called [drama teacher John] Quinn to see if they could figure out a solution to our dilemma."

The school uses its own professional rigger for the apparatus, she explained. But the METG preferred that one of their riggers be used. If the rigger deemed the situation unsafe. the silks would not be allowed.

In the end, the silks were used at center stage. Naughton used them in a dazzling aerial sequence that punctuated Ash's metamorphosis from runaway to leader as she twirled above the crowd.

To add to the complications, had the silks not been used, the cast would have had to practice the final dance in a nearby park, according to McCarey. The troupe also had to bring its own lighting equipment and projector, as the last 10 feet of the stage were not lit. The opening scene, where guards search for Ash, also had to be rearranged,

as the theater only had one backstage door compared with the four at the high school.

"We had to change lines here and there and circle around a bit," McCarey said. "It's been a wild week."

"The last few weeks were really stressful," added Kwakye, who gave a powerful performance as Sybil, the fortune teller. She noted that the students were juggling rehearsals with classes, jobs, other activities and college plans.

The quartet remained optimistic about their performance. They had learned earlier in the day that they were invited to represent Massachusetts in the New England regional compe-

Despite these challenges, the cast gave a triumphant performance. Since its premiere earlier in March, more humorous lines were interjected into the somewhat macabre plot. The juxtaposition of the bleakness of "the system" with the kaleidoscopic colors of the circus-like society evoked emotions ranging from fear and outrage to courage and compas-

Flashback sequences of a young Ash showed how the unflinching control of "the system" ultimately could not crush her adventurous spirit. Dancers flowed throughout the play in sequences that captured the essence of the characters' emotions. In one scene, a character literally bent over backwards in an attempt to conform to the demands of "the system."

McCarey and Naughton said they have been performing together since middle school. While McCarey described reaching the finals as "surreal," Naughton fought back tears.

"We've been through a lot," McCarey said. "COVID robbed us of performing in the competition in freshman year. And people said we would have made it to the finals because we had a really good show. We were robbed of sophomore

year, and then we had the virtual festival. I'm really glad we got to create the show with the hardworking group of kids that we had."

LeSavage dazzled hundreds of attendees with her buoyant performance as Ringmaster Fallon. As the leader of a secret group of escapees from the dystopian society known as "the system," Ringmaster Fallon did not allow the secret she harbored about her past to temper her enthusiastic display of leadership.

"Our kids are learning to adapt really well," LeSavage said. "I think they learned that if they do their blocking in character, no one is really going to notice."

Her experience in the drama program over the past year changed her college plans, she added. While she had planned to major in psychology, she is now considering a career in the-

She added that incorporating talented middle school students into the cast "really gives me hope for the future."

Everyone added that they considered Quinn a father figure, noting they recently have spent more time in the theater than at home. Quinn helped them perfect "Ash to a Flame" by encouraging more humor, they explained.

For his part, Quinn said he was "surprised" by the compliment.

"I'm just their coach," he said with a smile. "I helped them polish it a little, but it's totally their work.

"The purpose of the competition is that young people are motivated by that," he added, noting the importance of the clarity of speech, performance and direction in a show. "But all 14 schools really are winners."

For those who want to see "Ash to a Flame," an announcement is expected soon about a future performance.

there is a new residential other person resigning for a kitchen in operation called Bandit Baking Co on Cameron Road and a new pizza location on Washington Street called Veggie Crust.

"They've been open for about a week," he said. "And the Revival Church was permitted last week and will be on the list for the next meeting as a new operation."

Other new establishments currently in the works include Mama's Bar & Grill at the old Shamrock's location at 179 Railroad Ave., Jersey Mike's at 1415 Providence Hwy. and Tipico Salvadorño at the former site of Norwood Pizza and Grill at 514 Washington man Resources about posting

"Jersey Mike's should be ready in April," he said. "It will be next to Chipotle. Mama's is going to take awhile longer."


looking to connect with primary care physicians' offices and I'm looking forward to continuing the work that's already been done."

the special education reserve fund of \$850,000.

Sheridan explained that the way the special education reserve fund works is that the School Committee has to vote to transfer the amount into the general fund so that Town Meeting can vote to approve it. There is \$300,000 already allocated for FY 23. The remaining \$550,000 will be used for FY 24.

"In this tough budget season, this is what we made the decision to do," she said.

Two of the biggest challenges this year, Sheridan said, have been special education transportation and the exponential jump in out-of-district (OOD) tuition costs. Orders for vans have been placed, but they could not be filled because of supply chain issues. This forced the district to contract van transportation services "at a cost of upwards of \$400 a day," according to Sheridan.

In addition, both populations experienced jumps over the past three years, she continued. In FY 21, only 141 students required special transportation; that number jumped to 203 as of Feb. 13. The number of OOD students jumped from 60 to 79 over that same period.

Population changes have been driving student needs, Sheridan pointed out. English language learners (ELL); highneeds students; students from families with low incomes; and students with disabilities have increased dramatically over the past decade. While Chapter 70 aid has increased in response to this, the caveat is that the state forces the district to contribute more money to its foundation budget.

One point Sheridan stressed is that, when the budget process began, there were 32 requests for new staff members. The override pledge holds the maximum additions to five. There are 10 full-time equivalency (FTE) benefitted requests in the budget – three SPED teachers, two EL teach-

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breaker funding and depleting ers, and five general education teachers. The five general education staff requests included an administrator for the Little Mustangs Preschool Academy (LMPA) and an elementary support specialist. Two interventionists and a nurse for the LMPA were previously grantfunded and had to be incorporated into the FY 24 budget.

> The preschool administrator and the nurse for the LMPA actually provide special education services even though they are in the general education budget, Sheridan said during the presentation. If the nurse's position had not been maintained, the department would lose \$665,000 in grant funding for mental health programming over the next seven years, according to Superintendent David Thomson. There was an increase in the use of revolving funds of \$1,376,516, explained Sheridan. This was a 34 percent jump from the previous fiscal year.

> The use of circuit breaker funds increased from \$4,091,302 last fiscal year to an estimated \$5,467,818. Because special education costs are expected to increase in the coming years, Sheridan said some funds need to be kept in the circuit breaker fund in case of emergency expenditures.

> "The other thing right now is that we're in the process of applying for extraordinary relief," Sheridan said. "I am hopeful that we may qualify for that."

> She stressed that the department always searches for grants. But some pandemic relief grants are drying up.

> One thing Sheridan said was "historical" was the jump in Chapter 70 aid that NPS will receive in FY 24 by 28.81 percent to \$3,654,816. This is due to the increase in high-needs and low-income students in the district.

> "The reason they give you additional funding is it costs you more to educate those students," she added.

> In addition to the foundation budget, there will be several warrant articles presented at Town Meeting regarding school funding. They were approved by the Board of Selectmen the previous evening.

> The largest warrant article request is for \$1,487,643 to be withdrawn from the override stabilization fund. This will help to "cover some of the district's extraordinary and unanticipated expenses" because of the population changes and transportation challenges Sheridan previously mentioned. This will be the first time money is being withdrawn from this account since the

override was approved in 2019. There will still be \$1,310,125 left in the override stabilization account, according to member Teresa Stewart.

"I think the schools have more than held up their bargain with that," said member David Hiltz.

One article calls for a onetime request of \$500,000 for special education OOD transportation costs due to the need to contract out for vans. If the department receives its van orders, this money will not be needed.

Another was for Medicaid reimbursement for care rendered in the schools. The amount of \$350,000 is being requested to go to the district through the Town's free cash account. Currently, Medicaid reimbursement money goes into the general fund and then needs to be appropriated to the district.

Another warrant article requested \$22,000 from free cash that the Town has received for homeless student transportation. There was also a \$60,000 request from free cash to pay for a consultant for the elementary school study.


Thomson lamented that "we are at the bare minimum" and unable to include many budget items he considered worthy of funding. They include an elementary health and physical education teacher, a high school business teacher, and a middle school computer science teacher to expand the Project Lead the Way program. Thomson said he feared that a growing student population would lead to larger class sizes.

During the regular hourlong School Committee meeting, Facilities Director Paul presented Riccardi department's budget of almost \$8.6 million. It is separate from the school budget because the Town and the schools share the Facilities Department.

Electricity and heating costs are jumping both because of the inflation rate and because it is harder to heat the buildings, many of which "are at least 60 years old." He noted that the Coakley's HVAC system was supposed to be replaced 18 years ago, and he hoped it would last until the new building is constructed and operational.

"We could have put in an astronomical amount to try to improve the elementary schools beyond what we do because they are wearing themselves out over time," he explained.

The facilities budget also was approved in a 4-0 vote, with member Joan Giblin absent from the meeting.

FISHMAN

Norton A, pioneer in Geriatric Dentistry, was born in Dorchester during the depression in 1928. He attended public schools in Dorchester, until he enrolled in Boston Latin School in grade seven, graduating in 1945. He attended Boston University, majoring in chemistry and premedical studies, graduating Phi Beta Kappa in 1948, at the age of 20. Too young to be accepted to medical school, he went to Northeastern University for two years, as a teaching fellow in chemistry, and earned a Master's Degree in 1950. He was accepted at Harvard School of Dental Medicine and, after two years at the Medical School and two years at the Dental School, he graduated in 1954 with a D.M.D. and a prestigious silver medal. Immediately after graduation, Uncle Sam called and Dr. Fishman spent two years during the Korean War at Sampson Air Force Base on Lake Seneca, in upstate New York. During that time, he had the good fortune to meet his wife to-be, Carol, and they married in June 1957. They bought a house in Norwood, and converted it into a home-office. Dr. Fishman taught part-time at Harvard Dental School as an Associate Clinical Professor and established his private practice in Norwood, Massachusetts, thereby allowing him to teach half time, see private patients, and be more available to family over the years. Dr. Fishman was elected as a Fellow of the American College of Dentistry (FACD). As one of the early founders of the American Society of Geriatric Dentistry and a pioneer in the field, Dr. Fishman developed and directed dental clinics at both Hebrew Senior Life and New England Sinai Hospital. He organized the first international conference on geriatric dentistry, and the subsequent publication of the Proceedings of the Conference on Dentistry and the Geriatric Patient. He was an avid gardener, birder, world traveler, and amateur orchidist. He was a recreational skier and tennis player who had, more recently, taken up snowshoeing and bridge. He was always a voracious reader, but his greatest love was his family. Dr. Fishman leaves behind his loving wife, Carol (Lowenberg) Fishman; as well as his children, Scott Fishman, Robin Borgestedt, and Lauren Petrie; as well as his most cherished grandchildren, Alexander, Sarena, Noa, Hanna, Jonah, Eliya, Solomon, and Bobby; and his greatgrandchild, Elizabeth. He was preceded in death by his life-long friend and brother, Harrison Fishman; and his beloved son, Jeffrey Neil Fishman. and others in the Finance Department have been working for "the better part of three months" to get the final report ready for

For the Water and Sewer budget, Department of Public Works (DPW) Director Mark Ryan said his budget is also staying relatively stable. He said for sewer, they are asking an increase for salaries.

"You'll see it has nothing to do with body count, we have not changed the number of employees," Ryan said. "This is just a matter of trying to allocate the monies appropriately under the Enterprise Fund. Last year we were a little low in our calculations so the increase of \$75,000 is just balancing out what really happens on a day-to-day basis for the personnel dedicated to the sewer operation."

An enterprise fund identifies the total direct and indirect costs of providing a service and works that into the fee structure so it's basically paid for when service is requested. Ryan said both water and sewer operations have been changed into enterprise

Ryan said the Sewer Operating Budget expenses are decreasing this year. For water, the department saw a slight increase in salaries and no increase in employees. Operating expenses saw a 9.6 percent decrease in operating expenses.

FinCom Chair Alan Slater asked how Norwood's water rates are doing. Norwood's water comes from the Massachusetts Water Resource Authority (MWRA) which provides for 80 municipalities. Ryan said one of the biggest loss areas of water is through leaking pipes – the Town is charged for that loss – and the department has been trying to find where that's been happening and plug the leaks.

The water usage is pretty stable, we're around 2.7 million gallons per day and we're not increasing," he said. "The Town is doing really well conserving water. I think the water main cleaning and lining program has aided in that and we're making great progress there. In sewer, there has been an increase."

Ryan said they are looking to tamp down that increase. He said former Assistant Town Manager Bernie Cooper had been noticing years ago that sewer water outflow, which counts towards the Town's total water usage, was increasing when actual water service was not. He said Cooper started a Town-wide study and found areas at the Norwood Airport where water was coming out the pipes.

"There was a big influx of infiltration and inflow going into there and we're addressing that now," he said. "We anticipate that will lower the quantity of sewer (water loss) being sent to the MWRA."

Selectman Bob Donnelly said that if a community is able to keep its water consumption stable, its rates remain stable.

"Or go down," he said, "whereas communities that see their water loss increase see their rates start to go up."

Ryan said they are currently level-funded for stormwater management, but added that is likely to change for the worse.

"I want to caution everyone that even though we're levelfunded this year, we'll start seeing some increases in the years moving forward."

Lastly, FinCom members said goodbye to member Judith Howard, who decided it was time to step down after more than three decades

"I will say it's been an awesome journey, it really has,' she said. "The economic times in which I've served for 33 years, we've seen it all. And I'm sure there's more that's going to happen and I will still be on Town Meeting. So I leave this with a happy feeling that I made a difference, and I didn't realize some people thought I was tough!"

"Judy was the best and we will miss her," Slater said.


