

Endean Park improvements, golf trail eyed

The Norwood Trails Advisory Committee is working on an improvement plan slated for Endean Park, one of which the committee said it hopes to get together sometime this month.

There is a place close to the tracks where there's frequent flooding that makes the trail not passable, so we've started a application to be presented to the Conservation Commission to remedy that flooding problem," said Committee Chair Joseph Greeley.

Greeley said any time there's heavy rains the water comes in off the tracks causing the problem. He said the Conservation Commission manages the property, and they would have to approve any work involved to deal with the issue since the Trails Committee is an advisory board.

"There's also a state form to be completed by the Conservation Commission," he said. "We're hoping to get a plan in place and be able to present something to the Conservation Commission in July."

Member Ernie Paciorkowski pointed out that this is part of the Cross Country Trail.

"I don't know if it's a culvert you want to do or a wooden crossover, but you have to make sure that if that is the Cross Country Trail, you don't make it so it impedes people," Paciorkowski said, adding that it is also a sewer easement and a fire access road.

Greeley said there is no set plan as yet, but he did say that plans for a bench

BEH Airport suit continued

The ongoing lawsuit pitting Boston Executive Helicopters (BEH) against the Town of Norwood was back in court for an evidentiary hearing last Friday, June 28th.

After seemingly reaching a settlement in December of 2018, less than a week before the case was scheduled to go to trial, this agreement is now in dispute. Both Norwood and BEH legal teams and representatives met at the Joseph Moakley Courthouse at the Seaport in South Boston. After

three hours, the proceedings only got to the cross examination of one witness and has been continued to July 31 at 9 a.m., at the same location (Courtroom 21).

The Town's contention is that BEH had agreed to the December, 2018 settlement, while BEH states that no such agreement was reached.

BEH contends that the document filed by the Town has three material changes that BEH never agreed to. BEH is requesting that the original settlement, as written in December 2018 be enforced, not the document Norwood submitted to the court. Either that or reschedule a trial.

Stearns said it was incumbent on the plaintiff (BEH) to show why it would be unreasonable for the court to accept the attorneys' agreement for the new general release and settlement agreement.

The issue between BEH and the Town arose when BEH tried to become what is called a Fixed-Base Operator (FBO) at the Norwood Memorial Airport, which would allow them to provide aeronautical services like fueling, hangering, tie-down and parking, aircraft rental and aircraft

riage and Historical Character Parade will kick off at the First Congregational Church at the corner of Walpole and Winter Streets to end at the Town Common. The parade usually attracts about 300 children who decorate their conveyances or doll carriages or themselves. Children are encouraged to dress up as their favorite historical character.

At 2 p.m., the Historic Old Parish Cemetery and Public Reading will begin. This is year, as has been previously reported, volunteers will be reading Frederick Douglass' speech, "What to

at the Endean are ready for installation in the next two weeks.

Paciorkowski also said there was progress happening on trail marking, and the committee wants to start with the trails around Endean Park first. He said that's where they have the most experience and also because there is an Eagle Scout Project by Ryan Larson, who is planning to put a kiosk there. Paciorkowski said they need to keep it just color coded.

"So there wouldn't be any named trails, it would just be the Blue Trail, the Green Trail the Yellow Trail," he said. "Ideally, we just want to put the markings on the trees. Again, we should think of the Cross Country Team; I don't know how they do it. They must put markings up so everybody knows where to go."

Paciorkowski said he would work on creating way points on wooden posts to allow trail users to know where they are according to a corresponding map.

"Luckily, I work at a lumber yard to get the four-by-four cedar posts," he said.

Greeley reiterated they have to go through the Conservation Commission to start the trail marking.

Also discussed were the fields at the old golf course on University Avenue. The committee has been brainstorming for the last few months ever since The Skating Club of Boston, which has started construction on its new rinks there, agreed to let the Town of Norwood cut a trail in the area. The course will make a good trail, according to committee members, and they are also looking at the eastern side of the property just north of the East/West-running Runway 28 at the Norwood Memorial Airport.

"That's a lot of land," said Paciorkowski. "It's beautiful down there."

Greeley said he has gone and pulled the GIS maps of the property for the Conservation Commission and the Planning Department to start putting together a workable map for the Town to place the trail.

Paciorkowski said funding for the trail would most likely come from Community Preservation Act funds.

"We go to the (Department of Public Works) and say to (DPW Director Mark Ryan), 'hey, what can we do if we mapped out a trail,'" he said. "What an opportunity; of course it's down the road, but

if we mapped it out it's a pretty significant trail."

Member Brian Palmatier said he thought it would be a good idea to name the trails in the area after golf terms to honor the past of the site, like Eagle Trail or Birdie Trail.

"Or in my case, Double Bogy or the Lost Ball," said Paciorkowski.

"We found a lot of names we could use," Greeley said with a laugh. "We appreciate that the Skating Club of Boston has committed to this, though we don't really know what that means, we do appreciate it."

Greeley also said he wants to try to get some "bushwhacking" in at the Forbes Hill Man-

sion Property before it's no longer Town owned. He said there will be nine-acres of non-buildable wetlands around Purgatory Brook that, with agreement of the future owner, could be used as trails for residents.

"There are remnants of old trails. We went there two springs ago," he said.



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Norwood Cultural Council wants to hear from you

The Norwood Cultural Council (NCC) is looking for input from residents on what they should be looking to fund in the coming months.

To that end, the Norwood branch of the Massachusetts Cultural Council (MCC) has put together a survey online and will soon announce locations for an NCC council member to be on hand for a paper survey. The online survey can be found at: [surveymonkey.com/r/7K5GFS8](https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/7K5GFS8), and will be available for residents to fill out until July 26.

The NCC works to award grant funds from the MCC, usually around \$12,000 for each funding round. The NCC has worked in the past to fund projects that affect the most amount of people in the town for project that “promote excellence, access, education, and diversity in the arts, humanities and interpretive sciences in order to improve the quality of life for all residents of Norwood.”

Projects like music for se-

niors at the Norwood Council on Aging, music classes for Norwood seniors, funding for the Parkway Orchestra to come to Norwood, the Art in Bloom exhibition and many more are included. Residents and officials have to come to the NCC to get funding for their projects, and it’s usually like a shot in the arm for many community arts programs. The funds also go to help reimburse the cost of some school field trips.

NCC Member Kelly Artamonov said they will take responses from the community and start to formulate funding strategies and priorities.

“We will be hosting a public meeting in early August to discuss the results of the survey, and any Norwood resident is welcome to attend, listen, or provide additional input, if they wish,” she said.

Artamonov said the survey is designed so that Norwood can get the most bang for its buck, and also just to let community organizations know these funds are available..

We hope this survey helps us define what exactly the current residents would like to see

funded in the future, as well as help to raise awareness that these funds are available,” she said.

NCC member Kate Sibbing-Dunn said they want to get responses from as many residents as possible so they know what kinds of programming residents would be most likely to participate in.

“ We’re hoping to reach a wide audience with this one so we can incorporate information into our three year strategic plan which we are in the process of developing,” she said. “The results will go to us, the Council, and we will use them to discuss our funding priorities and possible opportunities to support the community that may not be currently being met. Of course, we have to do this given what our funding allows.”

The survey asks for what kinds of priorities the NCC should consider, what age population the answering party thinks should be prioritized, what current cultural programs should be maintained through this funding and more. The survey has eight questions total.

NOISE AND RESPECT

The Town of Norwood's distinction as a great place to live has been cemented historically over many decades. It has made its mark for many reasons, not the least of which is its recognition of those who have contributed not just to the well being of its residents exclusively, but to historical figures that have left positive indelible impacts on society as a whole with only a tangential association to this hamlet.

One such example is the recognition of Frederick Douglas by the Old Parish Preservation Volunteers who are hosting an Independence Day Event at the Old Parish Cemetery this July 4 at 2 p.m. The event will be a dramatic collective reading of Frederick Douglas' 1852 letter, "What to the Slave is the Fourth of July?"

One of the lines written by Douglas struck a nerve at this address. He wrote, "This Fourth of July is yours, not mine, You may rejoice, I must mourn." Given the nature of the times back then, it isn't difficult to understand Douglas' sadness. And, quite frankly, it isn't difficult to understand some of the same feelings many share present day. This column won't even attempt to mitigate the frustrations and vitriol ex-

pressed by so many when discussing the State of our Union, but we will express a wish. We wish everyone still had a love of country, because if everyone still loved the United States, then most sentiment expressed would be constructive in nature, devoid of selfishness and the quid pro quo maliciousness seemingly permeating every conversation both locally and nationally. Kennedy's quote relative to placing country before ones self seems so long ago and so forgotten. However, thankfully, not by everyone.

As is usual this time of year, a local newscast was reminding pet owners of how loud noises that accompany fireworks displays, amateur and pro alike, can scare dogs and other pets into either catatonic or manic behaviors, causing many to run wildly into the streets.

However, what really caught this newspaper's attention was a nearly throwaway line that similarly put a human face to the hazards facing houses pets.

The newscast detailed how victims of post-traumatic stress disorder face similar fears, flashbacks, and heightened unease from the booms, pops, and

explosions of fireworks displays. This, we suspect, is an under-told, yet important aspect of July Fourth celebrations. Think of the irony. Many of the very men and women who fought and served on behalf of this country are tortured by what should be a celebration of the freedoms they help perpetually preserve. It is a sad, double-edged sword that comes with their service.

We are not advocating for an end to fireworks, or anything of that sort. What we are proposing is a dose of understanding and introspection this holiday. Keep in mind that while Spot and Rover struggle with loud revelry, so might your neighbors, your family, and other segments of your community.

PTSD has taken a bad rap in recent years as some have threatened to undermine its tragic nature. This is not an affliction that should be marked by some Midwesterner demanding to bring a duck or a snake onto an airplane. First and foremost, it is another price our soldiers pay. This is not about bright orange vests on Chihuahuas; it is about those who wore a real uniform in defense of this nation and its freedoms.

Let us try to remember, amid all of this week's celebrations, that not all injuries are visible and not all wounds easily recognized. Celebrate as you normally do, with patriotic songs and fireworks that light up the sky. Just keep in your thoughts those who made all that possible, and those whose sacrifices may inhibit their ability to share in your enjoyment.

ConCom weighs in on scout project

The Conservation Commission breezed through their meeting Wednesday, June 19, as only one agenda item spurred most of the talking points.

Boy Scout Adam Gorine met with the commission to request approval of the implementation of a new walking trail in town, after discussing it with the Norwood Trails Advisory Committee. The proposed path would be in the William Pezwick Park area along the mill pond where an existing truck road currently lies. Gorine's project would begin with the existing path and then clear more space off of the path to lengthen the walk and lead walkers down by the pond.

Gorine is a member of Troop 49 and is looking to be-

come an Eagle Scout. In order to reach the rank of an Eagle Scout, Gorine explained that he needed to complete a project that would benefit his community.

"I thought out an idea of what a new path could be in that area and I think it would be a good one. I think it would be a really nice walk for people to enjoy," said Gorine.

"This path that exists today is only there because we have a sewer main and sewer main holes to be serviced," said Conservation Agent Al Goetz.

Goetz said that when he had first heard of the project, he was under the impression that the work would consist more of cleaning up the already existing truck path and banks of the brook.

"No filing was ever made to clear for a walking path. This path proposed by Adam is right along the banks of the brook and in order to do that there would need to be a conservation notice of intent filed with all the engineering drawings," Goetz continued.

"I look forward to having some kind of project, but not exactly like Adam's proposing," he said.

Commission member Joseph DiMaria said that he agreed with Goetz's concerns and asked if the plan could be

maintenance in the airport. According to BEH General Manager Christopher Donovan, plans for this started in early 2010. In 2012, BEH filed paperwork to obtain a permit to sell jet fuel at the airport.

According to Norwood, BEH could not obtain its FBO status because of not meeting certain requirements. BEH then sued the Town, accusing it of playing favorites with the current sole FBO operator at the airport, Flightlevel Aviation. BEH is also currently suing Flightlevel in a separate case, and filed two complaints with the FAA, one of which, a part 16 complaint, alleging the Norwood Airport Commission (NAC) violated federal grant assurances and also had engaged in "discriminatory and exclusionary practices."

The FAA agreed with BEH on the Part 16 complaint, and ordered the NAC to file a corrective action plan. This is one of the three material changes BEH's attorney, Michael Fee of Latham and Watkins LLP, is alleging took place to the term sheet settlement to form their basis for the evidentiary hearing on Friday. He said BEH in the term sheet settlement would be able to participate in the FAA corrective action plan, for which he says the

new settlement states that they can go to the meetings, but would no longer be able to participate. The other two material changes include an easement on BEH's leased land for Flightlevel to access fuel tanks, and an agreement from the NAC that BEH contends allowed it to place security cameras at its entrance gate and be issued clickers to open and close said gate remotely. Not in dispute as this settlement, among other aspects, is a \$750,000 payment to BEH for legal fees from the Town, and the granting of 71,000 square feet of the West Ramp/Apron and the DC3 Ramp.

Those changes, argued Town attorneys John Davis and Adam Simms of Pierce Davis and Perritano, were agreed to by Donovan and Town Manager Tony Mazucco on Dec. 17. However, Donovan in his witness testimony disputed that claim. Attorney Fee also pointed out that Norwood's Town Charter only grants the Board of Selectmen the ability to negotiate legal matters or vest that power in another official, which they say there is no record of in the Selectmen's Executive Session Minutes.

Attorney Simms said in his opening remarks that the

whole point of the settlement was to give BEH a level playing field with Flightlevel.

"Which is precisely what happened here; whether it's the term sheet or the later iteration of the agreement, the goal of the commissioners was to put BEH on an equal playing field as Flightlevel and not better," he said, adding that the new settlement was for fine tuning the original term sheet.

According to Simms regarding the alleged breaches, "None of them are material for the following reasons; the easement that Flightlevel would need to access its own fuel farm crossing the West Apron is about 4 or 5 percent of the total space on the West Apron that's going to be ceded to Mr. Donovan and his company," Simms said. "Flightlevel trucks would be driving through an easement for seconds and it's not even a daily delivery."

Donovan disagreed, and said during his testimony that the easement is significant because, at 4,500 square feet, it puts his competitor in a position of control over part of his property.

"I would never allow any easement that would allow my competitor to go over at their beck and call, nobody would

agree to that," he said, adding it would create a big disruption on his property where they would be parking and fueling aircraft. "You can't just start moving aircraft around; you can't allow people to go on and off your easement, it would make the property useless."

Simms also said that they would be giving BEH a seat at the table at the joint corrective action plan sessions with the FAA.

"This is the most comprehensive form of letting a private entity have some say in how a municipality is going to interact with the federal government that one could imagine, short of veto power, and that's what Mr. Donovan wants," Simms said. "The FAA says he can sit at those meet-

ings, what other seat at the table does Mr. Donovan want?"

Simms also pointed out that the Airport does not allow clickers for any entrances at the airport, hence the non-material nature of that change.

"It would be a violation of the airport's security plan filed with the FAA," he said. "I believe it goes back to the events of 9/11... They have a badge that allows them access to the airport... It's a secure facility, hence he will be treated just like all the other businesses there."

Donovan said he had been using clickers when the hanger was constructed, but sometime in 2013 or 2014 he was asked to hand them over to the Airport.

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
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PBCC has no word on NHS roof leaks

The Permanent Building Construction Committee (PBCC) met last Thursday, June 27, and discussed several issues on the St. Gabriel Chapel.

The Committee members began by discussing how they might fix a mistake on the memorial plaque in the chapel after the restoration was finished.

“We somehow managed to spell a certain person’s name wrong,” PBCC member Ted Callahan said.

Callahan said they might be able to fix it without having to take the plaque down through buffing and re-carving. PBCC member William O’Connor said he was concerned, even thought it was one letter, that they would have to take out the plaque and redo it.

“It’s going to cost some money, it’s going to be a pain to get it out the way it’s in there too,” said O’Connor. “If we can fix the name with some

kind of onsite edit, well that’s perfect.”

Callahan said it was an easier fix than that.

“You buff down the name and you get an overlay, it happens all the time,” he said.

Callahan said they are not sure, but it could be a warranty issue and the subcontractor will issue a report on what they will want to do to fix it.

The PBCC also discussed a revised change order to the Town for \$15,000 from Robinson Green Beretta Architects (RBG) for extension of service. The funds were a revision of a recent change order regarding the staging of the roof installation. Originally, the contractor had invoiced around \$19,360 for that work, which included labor and materials, but Callahan said they had got it down to \$7,735.

“That was primarily the rental for the staging so the roofer could get up there,” Callahan said.

He said RBG has stated it actually came in at \$15,000, so they are adding an additional \$7,336.

“It should be the last change order request,” O’Connor said.

Callahan said RBG is also looking for additional time spent in the field, which came in totaling \$12,600 on a contract originally totaling \$81,000.

The PBCC also discussed problems going on at the Norwood High School. In May, it was reported that the Norwood High School Gymnasium is experiencing se-

vere roof leaks, and the PBCC said it is looking into how those repairs will happen, but they have no updates at the time of the meeting.

At its May 27 meeting, the PBCC said infiltration tests found more leaks than were readily apparent. The tests showed problems between the NHS roof and the ceilings. Callahan said it might be a warranty issue. If it is a warranty issue, the contractor will have to pay for it, but

they are not sure if the Town might be on the hook for the repairs.

“That could be a football you don’t want to catch,” he said. “We met with the manufacturer and we did testing. The guys who are responsible for the warranty are going to let us know what they’re going to do to fix it.”

“Hopefully, it won’t cost the Town anything,” said member PBCC member Bob Silk.

revised to include work on only the existing truck path, making it more accessible to walkers without the need to file for permits with the town.

Gorine said that his original idea was to simply maintain and clear out the existing path and create another path which would lead down to the brook and that he would not have a problem reverting back to his original plan.

“As I went down there and

spent more time I realized that instead of having an offshoot, we could just have the trail contour with the river. Then I went back a second time and walked along the pond and realized ‘wait this is really nice’ which is how I got to what we have today,” he explained.

“I have to agree with Joe. I think you’d be better off if you just cleaned up the existing path because once you start touching vegetation

along the pond, a lot of that vegetation is breeding ground for the wildlife and stuff that exist around water bodies,” added Vice Chairman Cheryl Doyle.

Gorine agreed to set up a meeting with Goetz at the trail site to go over logistics of the revised project.

“I think what you are doing is absolutely wonderful and I’m very excited to see where your effort goes,” noted Chairman Stephen Washburn.

Gorine is hoping to get final approval of his project by the next Conservation Commission meeting, which is scheduled for July 17.

Coakley kids do well in national competition

The Spring of 2019 was another exciting one for the Dr. Philip O. Coakley Middle School's National History Day Club. This year, three student entries advanced to the national competition, which was held at the University of Maryland from June 9th through June 13th. Keira O'Donnell won first place in the state of Massachusetts for her paper on the invention of antibiotics.

Jackson Kiley, Niko Faller, Jacob Zhang, Ryan Lee, and Ben Guarin won second place in the state of Massachusetts for their group exhibit on the Cocoanut Grove fire. Abigail Lee and Audrey Haberlin won first place in the state of Massachusetts for their group exhibit on the Lowell Mill Girls. They also won a prize from the Sturbridge Village Museum for best project dealing with early American history.

While none of the projects placed at nationals, one project did receive recognition. Abigail Lee and Audrey Haberlin won an Outstanding Entry Award that recognized the merit of their project. All of the students that took part represented CMS with class and distinction. Since 1974, National History Day has challenged students to engage with the study of history. Students from around the country and world work to research and develop interpretations of the past based on a specific theme. This year's theme was "Triumph and Tragedy in History." NHD projects are judged at various levels of competition, from the school competition, to the various district competitions, to the Massachusetts state competition. The highest and most prestigious level of this competition is the national competition where more than 3,000 students from across the country and globe compete.

At the Dr. Philip O. Coakley Middle School, students choose to take part in this competition through an after school club. This club meets once a week after school from September through January. If students advance further in the competition, the work on this project continues through the entire school year. The rigorous academic work required of the club reflects the strong curiosity and quality of the students that take part. NHD Club members choose to do this competition on top of all of their other academic work, and our group of students advancing to nationals worked with the highest level of dedication and scholarship. They did extensive research in primary source online archives, visited libraries and hunted down works of prominent historians, and some even took weekend trips to complete research. Students spent countless long (and sometimes late) hours to craft winning entries. These students are very deserving of their magnificent achievements.

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Ask The Doctor

Junior Damato began servicing vehicles in 1969. He owns a 10-bay auto repair service center in Hyde Park and an 8-bay center in Middleboro. Junior is an ASE-certified Master Technician, ASE-certified L-1 and ASE-certified Natural Gas.

To the Doctor: My Taurus keeps displaying "battery recovery not connected" on shutdown. How do I reset the system? Any assistance will be greatly appreciated.

From the Doctor: Most late model Fords have a system in the body control module that prevents the battery from going dead from things like the key in the "on" position and listening to the radio. Battery replacement or low battery voltage can trigger this condition. A professional scan tool can reset the system by going through the body control module. The system can also be checked for any hidden problems at the same time. The system can sometimes reset itself after the vehicle sits overnight.

To the Doctor: I have a 2016 Jeep Cherokee with 30,000 miles. It has six cylinders, 4WD and Active Drive II. When driving up a small incline, the Jeep can't pick a gear and then it clanks into gear. It sounds like an older car shifting out of four wheel drive. When its really cold outside, the vehicle will not shift from low gear for several miles. I've been to two dealers who say all is normal. One said that these cars are just finicky. I'm afraid to take the car on a trip for fear the transmission will fail. Is this normal?

From the Doctor: Some new vehicles with six plus automatic transmissions do have, as I call it, shift confusion problems. I have seen many vehicles with these problems. In some cases, reprogramming the computer makes a difference. The other choice is manually shifting the transmission down a gear or pressing down further on the gas pedal. The cold temperature shifting is in 99% of vehicles. Preventing the transmission from up-shifting past second or third gear helps to warm up the engine and lessen emissions out the tailpipe. A remote starter is an excellent option during cold weather start ups to help heat the vehicle and in hot weather with the A/C set on, can help cool the interior.
