## Planning Board considers possible housing at Space Center

The Norwood Planning Board met last week and discussed modifications to Phase 1 of the Norwood Space Center at 83 Morse St. and what's up for Phase 2.

Town Planner Paul Halkiotis said that most of the time if there are minor changes to a site plan, he would just approve them himself.

"There were just a few too many for me to call minor changes," he said.

The center of discussion was of Phase 2. Space Center principle David Dupree and

attorney for David Hern were there to discuss specifics. Dupree said they are at full capacity for tenants, and it sets them up for what they'd like to do next.

Dupree said they wanted to focus on the big four-story building at the south of the property, which is primarily constructed of brick with wood frame "appendage buildings" behind. He said they are exploring options including demolishing a large section of the building so as to gain access to the considerable space behind it (about the same size as the building's current footprint).

"That would open up the thoroughfare and open up some

parking," he said.

He said they have not done any studies on the structural soundness of that building, but he said there is no roof, so obviously it will need a good deal of work.

"It's an erector set of steel with a brick skin; there's no floors and no walls," he said. "We'll have to bring an engineer in here to see if we can even use this. We don't know."

Dupree said they are definitely thinking of commercial use for the building, but also possibly a residential compo-

On Saturday night, Jan. 25, beer drinking patrons wielded hatchets and repeatedly let fly at the crowded Percival Brewing Company, located at the Space Center at 83 Morse St.

Rather than being cause for concern – or police involve-

# Forbes project fails to meet another deadline

The Norwood Board of Selectmen met in executive session before its regular meeting on Tuesday, Feb. 4, to discuss what to do about the proposed Medical City of Norwood after the proponent failed to meet another deadline.

The deal between the Town and Dr. Roberto Feliz has been going back and forth since the summer, with Feliz trying to come up with financing to buy the property for \$13 million and then build a \$250 million Medical City on

the site. Feliz has said in the past that he has been trying very hard to get the financing together and Board of Selectmen members and Town Manager Tony Mazzucco have pointed out that he has already paid a non-refundable deposit of \$500,000 to the Town.

The last deadline to close the deal was Jan. 31. Mazzucco said the Board is still figuring out exactly what it wants to do.

"We did not close," he said. "The Board is negotiating with the doctor and considering its options," he said. "Board members should decide in the next week or

two on how they want to move forward."

The options on the table are essentially to wait for Feliz to get his financing together or put out a new request for proposal for the site. Mazzucco said in the past that a new RFP process would be very time consuming for the Town and waste more money on maintenance and debt service.

The Forbes Mansion and its surrounding 27-plus acres of land were originally slated for hundreds of housing units when the property was purchased by a developer (the number fluctuated over time since the original proposal more than six years ago). The Town fought that plan along with the Plimpton Press development, since they were designed and approved under the State's 40B laws allowing a developer to ignore local zoning laws if a town does not meet affordable housing requirements (1.5 percent of land dedicated to affordable housing or 10 percent of housing stock within a municipality). Town officials believed they had 1.5 percent land dedicated to affordable housing, but

the State disagreed after its own assessment. Plimpton moved forward, and developers for Forbes Hill agreed to sell Forbes for \$13 million to the Town, which was hoping to stave off more dense housing.

The Town placed a zoning overlay district on the property to facilitate a fast sale and development proposal, and chose Feliz's proposal due to its focus on medical facilities and not housing. However, with this latest missed deadline, more dense housing could be on the horizon.

fundraiser of 2020 as – from 5 p.m. until 9 p.m. – a steady stream of people ebbed and flowed from the large main room of the establishment toward the intermittent cheers, thuds, and metallic clangs emanating from the hallway on the side opposite the main entrance.

It was there that a target range – enclosed on either side by high chain link fencing – had been built with its firing line 12 feet from two bull's-eyes painted onto a pine board wall.

After electronically signing a waiver, pairs of throwers would step up, receive hatchets and instructions from the attendant, and make their five best tosses at the targets.

Rachael Webber – a local

activist and one of this year's Dancing with the Norwood Stars contestants – organized the hatchet toss as one of several events leading to the big dance.

"I thought it would attract a young... sort of, hip, athletic crowd," she said of her rationale for the slightly unorthodox event. "Something different from a fundraiser."

Webber – a longtime admirer of the Circle of Hope's work (which entails providing financial assistance to Town residents stricken with catastrophic illness) – approached one of its Board members late last year and was named a Norwood Stars contestant. She immediately began seeking donations and planning her events, the next of which will

be a traditional fundraising dinner on March 7 at the Elks (152 Winslow Ave.).

"It all boils down to how well I can do for this foundation," Webber explained. "What is it going to take to raise the monies that people need in our community?"

At first, most trying the event tossed lightly with a two-handed, wood chopping hold as their throws caromed off the soft pine, after which the attendant would offer more pointers with each new hatchet. Adjustments would be made – a one-footed delivery, a wind-up, a rhythm and flow established – and, for many, their hatchets began to stick.

For Barbara MacCallum (who initially identified herself as Molly Hatchet – feel free to Google it) – her first round of throws didn't come so easy. Undeterred, she stopped for a moment to comment on her friend Webber's event as she headed back to the range. "It was actually the hatchet throwing thing that drew me," MacCallum said. "I mean, seriously, it would be a great draw if they had it all the time."

Helping her to fine tune her technique at the firing line was Eric Normand of Haul 'N' Axe out of Fairhaven. At one point, taking a break from his instruc-

tion duties while a group contest was playing out, he spoke of the secret to a successful hatchet toss:

"A lot of times, it's just getting the muscle memory down for people because it takes a lot of finesse and a lot of patience, and people are very quick to get frustrated." Normand explained while getting at its essence. "It's just a matter of breaking the shot down. Some people either throw it too high or too low. It's just finding that real sweet spot."

Haul 'N' Axe – as its owner, Adam Katz, described it – is a heavily insured mobile business that has been in operation for about a year and has been hired out for events across the country, as well as throughout New England and the Northeast, where its trailer or target range sets up at breweries like the Percival on a pay-to-play basis.

"Everyone laughs about the beer and axes," the alcohol TIPS (Training for Intervention Procedures) certified Katz said as he observed a group of waiting hatchet throwers who were standing in line, most with partially filled beer glasses in hand. "But it brings everyone back from a very technological age to primitive... It's human nature and it feels right. It gives you a break from cell phones and computers, you know?"

A little earlier in the evening, two women stood posing triumphantly for photos in front of targets riddled with their hatchet handiwork.

After some coaching from Normand, one of the two – Ally Pike – scored a bull's-eye with her first toss. "It felt invigorating. It was awesome," she said of the experience.

Cristi-Anna Zimirowski described it a little differently, echoing both her friend as well as Katz. "It's kind of, like, why haven't I done this before?"

At first, Zimirowski hadn't intended to try throwing (she was there – as Pike was – in support of their friend Webber) but "everyone was having so much fun, I decided to dive in and take the opportunity." Seeing Pike hit the mark on her first throw, her competitive juices kicked in and she ended up sticking four of her own, prompting the photos.

As for Pike, when asked if she had visualized anyone on that bull's-eye toss, there was no hesitation. "My soon-to-be ex," she said, laughing along with Zimirowski.

Toward the end of the night – as the now familiar thuds, clangs, and cheers began to wind down – Webber said goodnight to another guest and summed her inaugural event up. "It's been an amazing, very thoughtful community turnout. Can't ask for anything else."

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# Selectmen review liquor violations and personnel replacements

The Norwood Board of Selectmen met on Tuesday, Feb. 5 and discussed a host of issues.

The Board announced the retirement of longtime Building Inspector Mark Chubet and longtime Finance Director Thomas McQuaid. Town Manager Tony Mazzucco said both were powerful examples of what kind of good can be done in public service and that because they both gave what he called a "generous" amount of notice (six months for McQuaid) they should have no problem finding people to step into the soon to be vacant positions. He said in Chubet's case, Assistant Town Inspector Matt Walsh is set to be promoted to the inspector position and the Town will be looking for a replacement for his position.

The Board thanked both McQuaid and Chubet and congratulated Walsh on his promotion.

Mazzucco also announced that the Town has officially been designated as a Green Community under the Massachusetts Green Communities Act. Mazzucco said that will open up \$180,000 in grant money that could be used for LED light replacements in the Norwood High School and in other locations.

"And that's just for this year," he said.

Mazzucco said it will be an important resource to the Town, not just for upfront costs but also in energy savings over time. The designation took years to qualify for, and he said it was the result of hard work from all Town officials, including Town Planner Paul Halkiotis, School Facility Manager Paul Riccardi, Assistant Town Planner Patrick Deschenes, Assistant Town Manager Joe Collins, Purchasing Agent Cathy Carney and many more.

"There's so many more," Mazzucco said. "Kudos to everyone, it was really a team effort."

The Board had two show-cause hearings for serving liquor to an underage person, one for Sky Restaurant and another for The Courtyard by Marriott on 300 River Ridge Rd. Representatives from Marriott, according to Chair Paul Bishop, messaged the Board late on Tuesday that they would not be able to attend the hearing. The Board voted unanimously to continue the show-cause hearing to next week.

For Sky, owner Stephen Corcoran and manager on duty during the incident Erica Johnson were present. Norwood Police Department

Detective Brendan Green went through the details of the incident, which involved sending a 17-year-old individual into the bar to buy a Bud Light. He said the individual was searched beforehand for extra money and verified that the teen owned a vertical license showing he was underage by its orientation and two red lines of text on the license. He was sent in with two \$20 bills, for which the serial numbers had been checked. This is to make sure that any transaction involving the individual can be monitored to reduce foul play. The teen was also given a breathalyzer beforehand as well to make sure there was no alcohol already in their system.

According to Green, the individual was instructed to try to buy without showing a license, but to show it if they were asked. The bartender on duty looked at the license and served the individual, after which Green came in and informed the bartender that a report was to be filed.

Corcoran said this was the first violation for the restaurant in 18 years.

"This is the first time anything like this has happened and I'm embarrassed about it and I'd like to assure the Board that this is not the type of establishment we run, or Erica runs," he said.

Johnson said immediately after Green walked into the bar, the bartender came to her to tell her about it. She said that bartender was immediately let go.

"I actually took over and bartended the rest of the night," she said.

Johnson said the bartender apparently miscounted when checking the individual's name, which led to the error. But she agreed with Selectman Alan Howard that math should not have entered into it.

"This was a vertical license, she asked for the license but she didn't look at it, she couldn't have looked at it because she would have seen the two red spots or the vertical license," he said. "Even if someone is of age and they have a vertical license, they don't have to be served... We've had a half a dozen of the same thing for people. Maybe it's a busy night or something I don't know, but they take the license and they don't look at it."

Corcoran agreed.

"I couldn't explain it, it couldn't be simpler," he said.

The Board voted to issue a verbal warning to Sky that will not be reported to the Alcohol Beverage Control Commission, but it would be stored in Town files in case of further violations.

In other news, Bishop said

the Town is currently looking to employ a Fence Viewer. He said the position involves helping to try to settle property line disputes between residents. He said if the dispute is clear enough in favor of one resident or another, that Fence Viewer would be able to settle said dispute before residents would have to come to Town Hall. He said to call the Town Hall at 781-762-1240 ext 131 to inquire about the position.

Howard also reminded residents that just because the weather is mild, it doesn't mean you can leave your leaf and yard waste bags on the curb for pick up.

"How do we tell people that we don't start picking up leaf bags again until April?" he said. "Every year it's this way and you'd think people would get the idea."

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## FOVA reviews programs, plans Youth Art Month

The Friends of the Visual Arts (FOVA) Norwood deemed their recently sponsored art programs a success and made plans for their annual Youth Art Month (YAM) benefit during their meeting at the Coakley Middle School on Tuesday, Feb. 4. The organization, which began in 2013, supports the arts through its community art classes, scholarships and student art exhibitions.

FOVA Saturday Studio classes offered to middle schoolers and younger students in January, was well received by students and parents. "What was nice about it was that we didn't make the parents stay this time and some students were independent enough to not need the parents," said Laurie McGrory, visual arts department chair at the Oakley and FOVA member. "Some parents stayed for the first class in the hallway and there were a couple of parents who stayed all three times." Different art activities were available during the sessions. "We did three interconnected classes and for the first time I was able to do clay with them which I think was exciting for them. It ran, I think, better than the way we've done it before. We were able to build a better relationship with the kids since they were there for the three Saturdays." Two classes ran simultaneously with younger students in one class and fifth graders in the other.

A unique feature is the involvement of Norwood High School art students as teachers. McGrory and Elizabeth Mullaney, another art teacher at the Coakley, support the three Saturday classes but the art students lead the classes. "We try to get the high school kids to do as much as possible. They do a little lesson planning with guidance from us, they teach the class with guidance from us, so we're the back-up...they really take the lead. We had the largest number of high school volunteers."

Students did mono-printing, used bubble wrap as a print making material, learned to draw on tin foil and print it, as well as using shaving cream for print making. To ensure a quality experience, teachers nominate students for the program, but it is first come first, first served process to get into the classes. Remarking on student feedback to the experience, Nina Kelly, treasurer of FOVA said, "They're so easy going and grateful to be here. We just want them to come here and enjoy art."

McGrory revealed how she pumps up the confidence of the high school student teachers. "Even if you don't feel cool in high school, if you teach elementary school kids, you're like the coolest people on the planet!"

A separate art class event was Paint Night, held on Friday, Jan. 30. Open to all middle schoolers it attracted 20 participants. "Each student at Paint Night did their own version of Van Gogh's Starry Night," said McGrory. "We try to get kids to teach kids. Bigger kids teach the smaller kids." All students gain from the experience, with the high school students getting some teaching experience and a chance to paint. Participants also got pizza, dessert, and snacks over the two-hour session. "Kids had a lot of fun, the food was good," said Donna Miller, librarian at the Prescott and Willett schools and treasurer for FOVA. Concerns about attracting enough students disappeared when more students registered than were expected. "Some of the kids had some much fun last year at Paint Night so they did it again this year."

In preparation for the upcoming annual Youth Art Month (YAM) benefit, FOVA will host a "matting party" at Norwood High School on Tuesday, March 4. The drop-in event enables volunteers to help mat artwork submitted by students in the Saturday Studios classes for the YAM exhibition. The community is invited to help.

YAM takes place at the Norwood High School library on Wednesday, March 11 from 5:30 to 7:00 pm. "We set it up like a gallery. There will be a project called "Empty Bowls" where the students will sell bowls with the proceeds going to the Norwood Food Pantry," said McGrory. The event includes a student art show, food, music, t-shirts, and chances to win gift baskets. In its eighth year, the event helps raise money toward art student scholarships. "At the end of every year we give out scholarships," said McGrory. Norwood High School seniors can apply for the scholarships by filling out an application form with photos of examples of their artwork. 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

trying to do is to find a way to connect the dots," Greeley said.

"This is our first foray with Walpole in a public setting, and they have 19 years on us," Vic Babel said. He noted that members of each town can enjoy the other's trails, and partnerships can open up grant opportunities for both.

Recently, Babel went on a two-town trail walk with Walpole Trails Committee Member Glenn Maffei. He met Maffei at Hollingsworth and Vose Streets in East Walpole. They walked on trails parallel to the water and found a tunnel under Washington Street. To the right of that, they found an abandoned railroad track.

"We explored Hollingsworth in the woods there," he said. "It was quite interesting, because we found a bridge. It's quite beautiful there."

They continued walking up toward the Norwood Armory to the cemetery. If they kept going toward the Boch property and on, they would have reached the Norwood Light Department.

"It has the potential to be a great trail," Babel said.

"There's a lot of meat here," Greeley added.

Lee Leach and Babel also walked an area to see if there could be a trail at University Avenue near the Skating Club of Boston a couple of weeks ago. They discovered a berm there, and while most of the area was soft, they said they believed it could sustain a trail.

Greeley said some of the land there is under the auspices of the Light Department. He also called Leach and Babel "Norwood's Lewis and Clark." He praised them for helping to get "concrete accomplishments" under the committee's

belt.

The committee discussed its mid-year report, which highlighted its achievements from May through December 2019. The committee has 13 active members who regularly walked and explored trails; looked for new trail paths and updated the web page, which is available on the Town page. In addition, they have worked on exploring partnerships with other Town boards, businesses and neighboring communities. They have created five site-specific trail maps and brochures, started an e-newsletter and volunteered at cleanups and other community events.

Future plans include trail clearings, way markers, information kiosks and community events and walks.

Most recently, Leach attended the Appalachian Mountain Club (AMC) Summit, which was held on Sat., Jan. 25 at the Four Points Sheraton in Norwood.

"It was totally sold out, with 500 people from all over the region," he said. "This is the second year I've attended

it. I attended three workshops in the morning and three workshops in the afternoon."

There also were opportunities to network with environmental advocates from Maine to Washington D.C.

One of the workshops that most impressed him, Leach said, was called "Outdoors RX." It was designed to help maintain wildlife in urban greenspaces with local groups, with a focus on families and children.

"The subject matter spans the whole gamut," Leach said of the conference.

Greeley, who also attended the "Outdoors RX" workshop, said it included rainy-day planning for kids' activities.

What is important to note, Greeley added, is that the AMC is booking the conference in Norwood again next year. The attendees he met from Delaware planned on visiting Norwood Center and dining there, which helps boost the local economy.

"It's not only 500 people who come to Norwood," he said. "They come from all up and down the East Coast, and somehow they've landed in

Norwood. It's a great thing."

Greeley offered the group's assistance for engaging with next year's AMC summit.

Marguerite Krupp asked if the AMC presentations could be available online. Greeley said he would look into it as a resource.

One issue members wanted to note for hikers is that ticks are still prevalent year-round. Also, some land may be privately-owned, so they encouraged people to be respectful of people's and businesses' goodwill. Always let people know where you are going and be aware of your surroundings.

They also discussed the idea to have a night trail walk on Sat., March 7, near the full moon. It will be further explored at the next meeting on Tues., Feb. 11 at 7 p.m. At that meeting, Ellie McConnaughy will discuss a meditation walk planned on April 18 at 1 p.m.

Greeley added that the public is invited to attend all Trails Advisory Committee meetings, and that new members are encouraged to join.

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The Trails Committee is looking to partner with Walpole later this month to discuss what they can do to improve open space in the Town.

ment.

"We were thinking professional housing, which supports the employees of the businesses here," he said. "We also see it as a big draw to help revitalize South Norwood. If we bring actual residences here, professional workers are going to migrate to South Norwood. They're going to eat there and they're going to go to the stores. We currently bring in enough businesses here during the day, but they leave every night. What you want is people to stay."

Dupree emphasized that these are all just ideas and nothing has been planned or proposed yet. Halkiotis also said the area is zoned for manufacturing. Any possible residential use would require a zoning change, which would have to be facilitated by a Town Meeting vote. Board Member Ernie

Paciorkowski pointed out that any residential planning would most likely be contingent on what the engineer says should be done with the building.

"Is it all coming down, can it be saved, I think you have to figure that out," he said.

Dupree said they're preference is to not take it down, and that a study of the building would be the next step, which he said they're trying to commence as soon as possible. He said he would also want to start reaching out to the community on the idea of housing at the Space Center.

"The biggest thing would be the number of units," Paciorkowski said.

Regarding Phase 1, the focus is on the courtyard to the west of the property that the Space Center already utilizes. He said they want to use the courtyard for tenants, as well as

for events run by the Space Center itself. Dupree said he wants the courtyard to be furnished with trees, shrubbery, bushes, lighting, grass and a large gravel 40-foot by 90-foot platform.

"The idea is to have common doors for everyone to use," he said.

Dupree said the changes from the original plan include a full hard surface platform instead of gravel.

"We're currently trying to determine how the tenants use the courtyard," he said. "We created the space, the landscaping, the patio, we put out seating, a barbecue, and now we're going to see how the tenants utilize the amenities."

The Board discussed several other minor changes to the plan from when it was approved and voted unanimously to approve those changes.

# Norwood LWV celebrating 100th anniversary of women voting

All this year, the national, state and Norwood chapters of the League of Women Voters will be celebrating the ratification of the 19th Amendment, passed in August of 1920, finally granting women the right to vote.

The first event for this in Norwood is the 100th Anniversary Suffragette Tea, set for Feb. 12 at the Fred Holland Day House from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m., held in conjunction with the Norwood Historical Society. The event is free, and will feature author and WGBH Chief

Marketing Officer Tina Cassidy.

Norwood LWV President Courtney Rau Rogers said the idea for the collaboration was hatched when the Historical Society hosted a discussion on prohibition-era Norwood.

“The Historical Society has done a lot of programming around this time period of the 1920s, and they’re just wonderful partners to work with,” she said.

Rogers said this discussion will celebrate the founding of the national LWV on Feb. 14, 1920.

“It was as close to the date as we could get,” she said.

She said Cassidy will be dis-

cussing her book, “Mr. President, How Long Must We Wait?” which is a quote from suffragette Alice Paul to then President Woodrow Wilson.

“It was to get President Wilson to acknowledge the need for the 19th Amendment and get it pushed through Congress,” she said.

Rogers said the need to look back at this time period is especially important now.

“It’s a really interesting part of history,” she said. “It feels more important than ever to look back on all the work the women did in the early 20th



century to establish their full rights as citizens."

Rogers said she felt some if not many of those rights are slowly being rolled back by the current federal administration.

"Or maybe not so slowly, but certainly dramatically, and we want to look at what the role is of women in maintaining this society and, in addition, the League is looking very closely at its own history."

Rogers said the Suffragette movement had its own issues. As an example, African Americans and many people of color were not allowed to vote in some states, regardless of their gender.

"There were a lot of voices then that we didn't invite to the table," she said. "The League is really looking at how to make reparations for that history; how do we look forward to make sure that everybody has an equal voice at the table as we sadly continue to fight for voters rights. Voter roll purges are very real in some states in this country and disenfranchisement is very real in this country."

Rogers said Cassidy's discussion will focus on the movement itself, and she will be available during a question and answer period.

"I would imagine that there would be questions from the audience about how she equates this historical struggle to the continuing struggles today," she said. "And she'll be able to speak extensively on that."

Rogers said they will be gathering with a bigger presence at the Norwood Fourth of July Parade this year as well as planning an event to celebrate the actual ratification of the 19th Amendment later in August.

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
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
