Norwood rings in its 150th Anniversary year

Last Friday afternoon and evening, Norwood kicked off 2022 – and its 150th anniversary year – with a special First Night celebration held on and around the Town Common.

The free event was coordinated by the Recreation Department in cooperation with the Norwood 150th Committee, and featured a number of family friendly activities and live entertainment that led up to a 10 p.m. ball drop on Nahatan Street next to Town Hall.

The festivities, in the works for several months, had originally been planned to take place at a handful of indoor and outdoor venues. However, due to the latest COVID-19 surge, the decision was made – about 48

hours in advance – to move everything outdoors.

“It was just a lot of moving pieces,” Recreation Superintendent Travis Farley said of the two-day pivot, specifically mentioning the securing and re-scheduling of bands – several of which had cancelled due to the surge – and the relocation of different activities.

“I think, most importantly, the weather cooperated,” Farley added as some kids in the background wobbled across the synthetic ice skating rink that had been set up on Central Street. “So we had a good crowd, and it was a good night.”

On the opposite side of the skating rink, the Norwood 150th Committee and its volunteers had set up for the day in

Howard returns once again as Selectman

Former Selectman Allan Howard won the Board of Selectmen’s special election on Jan. 3, filling the seat left vacant by Selectman David Hajjar’s death last October. Howard previously served nine years on the Board, beginning in 2011.

His three-month stint begins Jan. 4, but Howard plans to run for re-election, and a full term, in April.

“I’m floored,” he said. “For a few minutes, I thought I had lost.”

“That’s the thing with lower turnout — it’s anybody’s ballgame,” said Norwood Community Media’s Gerri Slater said.

The results of the special election, the only race of the night, were close and called by 8:45 p.m. Howard carried four districts with 629 votes, beating opponents Amanda Grow and Matthew O’Neil, who received 599 and 446 votes respectively. Approximately 7.6 percent of registered Norwood voters participated in the election.

“I feel excited. It’s been a tough race,” Howard said.

He thanked his wife of 57 years, Renie Howard, for her support and expressed his plan to win re-election in April.

Howard previously told the League of Women Voters (LWV) he plans to use his three-month term to prove to Norwood voters that he will

be “a hard worker, a valuable contributor and transparent to those interested in our Town Government operation.” He marketed his prior terms on the Board as an advantage, saying, “now is the time for experience and not the time for on-the-job training.”

During an LWV candidate night last month, Howard said he believes the \$6 million to \$10 million in funds from the sale of the Forbes Hill Property would be best spent on the new Coakley Middle School building or new greenspace around town, projects Norwood voters could decide between. He also expressed support for changing the Board’s name from “Board of Selectmen” to “Select Board” and negotiating a contract between the Town and the Norwood Firefighters Local 1631 union.

After the polls closed at 8 p.m., Chairman of the Board Tom Maloney remembered

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Author details history of Norwood's past, on ice and off

Local author and former Norwood High School (NHS) hockey player Don Reddick recently released his new book, 'Norwood in the Time of Hockey.'

Reddick, who said he grew up in Norwood on the same street as several notable players including the Hebner Brothers (Richard and William), Dick Donovan and Neil Higgins, said the book details the years 1965 to 1972, during which NHS went to the Massachusetts State Championship five times. Reddick said the tournament rules were much different in those days, which led to Norwood's biggest rival becoming the distant Town of Arlington.

"Essentially in those days the state tournament had every town thrown into an elimination tourney," he said. "Arlington was one of the historic great powerhouses of Massachusetts hockey at the time. I think they had won the tournament five times. It was the four times in the state tournament where the rivalry

really formed. We weren't in the same league, we never played them, it was just for that period of time Norwood and Arlington had the best hockey teams in the state."

Reddick credited a lot of that work to then coach Don Wheeler.

"For 10 years, from 1962 to 1972, he just changed Norwood hockey," he said. "He was an ex-marine, and it was essentially a boot camp, mentally and physically for all the players in Norwood. He was a rough customer... He was tough as nails and he was very harsh."

Reddick added that the safety requirements at the time were not as stringent.

"There were a lot of guys without teeth," he said with a laugh.

Reddick said the book isn't just about hockey. He said he wanted to highlight the Town's notable events during the 1960s when he grew up. He said it was a very unique place and time to be.

"I think every generation has rose-colored glasses about how they grew up, but it really was a drastically dif-

ferent world from today," he said. "It was small town America as opposed to suburban America, and the Town was much more focused on its own little world. For example, high school athletics were much more important than they are today."

Reddick said big games, like the annual Thanksgiving Bowl against Dedham, were the events by which to mark the passing of time. But he said for him, hockey was the "fulcrum."

"It involved the whole Town; it wasn't just the kids on the team who went through it," he said. "The Town of Norwood celebrated and supported this team unbelievably. We used to play at the Four Seasons in Walpole and would get 4,000 to 5,000 people on a Wednesday night. And when we went to the Boston Garden – back then we used to have semifinals and quarter finals at the Boston Garden – we played in front of 14,000 people. They used to sell out."

Reddick added the post

Hajjar as a "full-time selectman," devoted to his town and church.

"It's sad that we're here," Maloney said. "We look to the future, but we don't for-

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get the past."

Grow, a Town Meeting member and vice president of the Norwood LWV, said she knew it would be difficult to beat a candidate like Howard, who has town-wide name recognition. This was her second campaign since the pandemic began.

"I'm actually really happy with the results," Grow said.

"With results this close, there's no reason to not keep engaging with voters."

Grow plans to run for the Board again in April, hoping her third campaign for selectman will be successful, as Howard's was in 2011.

Eligible Norwood residents must register to vote by March 15 to participate in the annual town election on April 4.

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Selectmen cautiously optimistic on 83 Morse housing

The Norwood Board of Selectmen met on Jan. 4 in a hybrid in-person and virtual setting and discussed a plan to redevelop a large portion of the Norwood Space Center at 83 Morse St.

The geography in question sits to the south of the site, and representatives from the Space Center and its development company Cathartes said they want to put in about 150 units of rental apartments with 20,000 square feet of retail space and about 20 or 25 percent of the units being designated as affordable.

“For a building of that footprint, it doesn’t sound like a whole lot (of retail space),” said Selectmen Chair Thomas Maloney, adding that he agreed with recently re-elected Selectman Allan Howard, in that the more retail or commercial square footage on the site, the more likely it would be acceptable to Norwood officials and residents.

Attorney representing 83 Morse and Cathartes David Hern pointed out that the Space Center has been extensively redeveloped and is almost exclusively commercial. Space Center representative David Dupree pointed out that since they started renovating the Space Center in 2016 – at a cost of around \$10 million – they have since attracted about 100 commercial tenants.

Cathartes representative James Goldenberg said currently they do not have a design of the development ready, but that they’ve been shopping the idea of the proposal around to different groups and officials in Town including the Norwood Planning Board, Town Planner Paul Halkiotis and Town Manager Tony Mazzucco, to get an idea of what the Town would like.

Hern said they are already considering suggestions and recommendations from officials and residents.

“We want to see if we can develop this as somewhat of a collaborative project where we take the input of the neighbors, Town officials and other people who would be affected by this and benefit from it and that’s why we’re here tonight,” he said. “It’s a good project and a good use of the property, and so we’ve been talking with the Conservation Commission as they are very interested in what improvements we can make. We’ve already made some improvements along the riverfront and we plan to make more. They’ve asked for some sort of public area; we’re not sure if that

can be done but we’ll look at that.”

Goldenberg said one major benefit to the Town from the project would be that it would likely not attract young families. He said the projects Cathartes has done in the past usually attract empty nesters and young professionals, and out of the 434 units comprising the company’s three most recent projects, only five of those units included families with young children.

“Often with residential projects communities have – often with good reason – concern that it’s going to be dilutive to the Town budget because there’s going to be a real strain on the school system,” he said. “The projects that we build tend not to have that effect. So we wanted to make that point.”

Goldenberg added that traffic would not be a big concern for this particular project.

“The use that we’re intending has a significantly lower generation of traffic than an equivalent retail use, and so we think the traffic impact would be negligible to the community,” he said.

Carthartes showed a slide with the predicted traffic trip generation for the peak hours for the proposed project, which came in at just 100 trips. The “equivalent retail use” would be for a 65,500 square-foot retail facility, and would come in at more than 400 trips, though no one discussed whether a 65,000 square-foot retail use would be feasible in that location.

“This is a very interesting project and the idea of the mixed-use is an exceptionally interesting use, but what will be good will be when we get additional information,” said Selectman Helen Abdallah-Donohue.

Selectman Bill Plasko said he was encouraged by what was brought forth, but ultimately agreed with Donohue.

“We need a lot more detail to know if there’s some reason why we would oppose it instead of going forward with it,” he said. “But we do need more affordable housing in Town, and I think we have an affordable housing plan – that I think has expired at this point – but it calls for smaller pockets instead of large developments. And this location and its mixed-use area is I think ideal, but we still have several other (mixed-use developments) percolating in Town and we may not want to support all of them. So we really need to get details and decide which is best for the community.”

The Board also discussed the upcoming March Special Town Meeting and topics including the

Coakley Middle School funding, the proposed rezoning of the Forbes Hill/Polaroid Factory Campus and the Norwood Hospital reconstruction. Mazzucco said no date had been finalized at the time of the meeting, but they are looking to hold the meeting sometime in the middle of the month.

Hern, who is currently the Town Meeting Moderator, said the legislature that allowed for remote Town Meeting expired in December, so that will be off the table presumably unless the State Legislature passes another similar piece of legislation.

“So the rule about reducing quorums no longer applies, remote Town Meetings no longer apply,” he said. “So any meeting we have going forward we should expect that it would be – except of course if there is a change by the legislature or something else – we should expect that it will be our usual traditional way, in-person. We don’t have those tools available to use anymore.”

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

Morse St. proposal needs to be monitored carefully

Of the jaded among us, the first thought of another proposed massive multi-unit apartment complex in Norwood would be that it didn't have a snowball's chance in hell of getting approved. Norwood just spent more than a decade fighting off 40B housing projects shoved down their throats, to date ending up with close to the worst possible outcomes. And why does the number of 150 units presented in this plan sound familiar? Because Avalon and Upland Woods and what was proposed at Forbes Hill all used the same number at one point or another. Have no doubt, the plan proposed on Tuesday evening to the Board of Selectmen concerning 83 Morse St. is no different than those.

Well, come to think of it, there is one major difference between this project and the others. This one is planned for South Norwood, and we all know how public officials go out of their way to protect the quality of the lives of those living in The Flats. Just think hockey rink.

According to the developers this idea is loaded with benefits to the Town, one of which being that 20 to 25 percent of the units will be designated "affordable." Man, that's generous of them. Interestingly though, based on the description by the state of Massachusetts, "Chapter 40B is a state statute which enables local Zoning Boards of Appeals to approve affordable housing developments under flexible rules if at least 20-25 percent of the units have long-term affordability restrictions." It must be just a coincidence that the generosity of the developers exactly matches the mandates established by the state because never once did Attorney David Hern or the developers mention 40B during their presentation.

Again, the jaded among us may look at that percentage of affordable units mentioned during the presentation as a veiled threat to this Town should it not bend over backwards to approve the plan. And for those thinking another 40B isn't possible because Norwood has reached its required limit of affordable housing to fend off aggressive developers, think again. Norwood is in constant imminent danger of not meeting the threshold, and does anyone think the developers or the attorney for the developers aren't acutely aware of this?

Selectmen Allan Howard and Bill Plasko were astute enough to notice that the commercial square foot percentage dedicated to this project is negligible considering the size of the project, but not to worry. According to the developers, should they build a 65,500 sq ft commercial building there instead of residential, the number of car trips would be around 400 per day, about four times what they are predicting for their presented plan, which would be merely a blip in traffic for the area. First of all, percentages would dictate the actual number of trips would be closer to 125, not 100 as they presented and doesn't even include those residents living there with cars (yes, some will utilize public transportation but the majority will have cars). And anyone who has traveled Morse Street during any time of day knows the curvature of the road around 83 Morse is tricky, not to mention the two bridges to navigate (hope the delivery trucks are aware of the height restrictions!).

All of the above being written, the current owners of 83 Morse have done a very nice job of rehabilitating what was once a horrible piece of real estate, and chances are very good that whatever they build will be nicer than what is there now. Cathartes, the development company taking part in the presentation has a good reputation, as did Campanelli and Avalon, the builders of the massive 40B housing developments in Norwood, very similar projects, at least in the number of residential units, to what is being proposed at 83 Morse. The term 40R, used by Attorney Hern during the presentation on Tuesday, is a Massachusetts General Law that encourages cities and towns to establish new overlay zoning districts to promote housing production and, more generally, smart growth development. It was the same tactic attempted by prior owners of the Avalon site when they first approached the Town about building behind the Shaw's Plaza. We all know how that turned out.

Could Norwood use more affordable housing? One could posit that it does, but the argument becomes much more dangerous when presented in the massive way it was on Tuesday evening. All residents of Norwood should keep an eye on what is going on at that site moving forward. And to the residents of The Flats? Watch your backs.

an available storefront, and its chairman, Tom Maloney (who is also the Board of Selectmen Chair), commented on how First Night had unfolded so far. "You can see how much the people of the Town love the Town. They came out for it." Maloney also spoke further on the Town's celebratory plans for the coming 12 months, noting that more anniversary events were still being added to the year's schedule.

One of the Norwood 150 volunteers was Jeff Maloney (Tom's second cousin), who has been living in Town for about a year and decided to help out while he was checking out the booths at Norwood Day. "I think it's nice to feel like you kind of belong in a place, more than it's just, you know, the town you happen to live in," he said of his motivation to take part. "So that's kind of why I was interested in getting involved in a few things."

As the bells tolled 9 o'clock, Farley and some volunteers gathered around the New Year Ball – resting near the main entrance of Town Hall – and tested the string of white Christmas tree lights that had been wound tightly around it. Shortly after, it was hooked to the crane parked across Nahatan Street and then hoisted to a height about half-way up the bell tower, directly above the "2022" ice sculpture lit up on the Town Hall lawn.

Seeing the beacon, the small crowd of people remaining on the Common began to move toward it, with a steady stream of kids and adults stepping up to have their pictures taken in front of it and under it, as the DJ continued to spin songs on the bandstand.

By a quarter to 10, the crowd along Nahatan Street had swelled imperceptibly to about 200 and – save for the

handful of ice sculptures and the DJ – the Common was empty. As Farley explained it, the decision had been made to bump the drop up to 10 p.m. in order "to give the families that were going to stay up at least a fighting chance to make it."

At 9:55 p.m., silent flashing red lights signaled the arrival of a Norwood Fire Department ambulance, which parked directly in front of the "2022" ice sculpture to tend to a woman who had inadvertently stepped off of the wall in front of it and fallen onto the sidewalk.

As the bells tolled 10 o'clock, her stretcher was loaded into the ambulance and – at 10:10 p.m. – the ball dropped to ring in the bumped up, bumped back Norwood New Year.

A few minutes later, Thelma Macomber of South Norwood was standing on

Nahatan Street with her four grandchildren, taking in the New Year ice sculpture and the night.

Her family hadn't gotten together for Christmas because two of her children had become sick with the virus, and she had come down with a stomach bug. Deciding to have the family over for New Year's and reading about First Night, they had all come by to see the ice sculptures and the countdown. When asked about what they had thought of it, four little voices ranging from the ages of 2 to 8 chimed from behind four protective masks: "It was awesome!"

When asked about his New Year hopes, Macomber's eldest grandchild, Bryson Henderson, spoke for many, if not most in Norwood and beyond. "Basically, that COVID will go away so that we can get back together and do things like we used to."

Coakley replacement designs sent to building authority

The Norwood Middle School Building Committee (MSBC) voted unanimously on Dec. 20 to instruct Overall Project Manager (OPM) Ai3 to send the current design schematic for the Coakley Middle School replacement to the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) for approval.

MSBC Chair Alan Slater said the vote was quick and very important.

“This is the culmination of what we’ve been working toward since we began meeting as a MSBC over a year-and-a-half ago,” he said.

The MSBA Board will now meet and, hopefully, approve the design, which Norwood Public Schools Superintendent David Thomson said based on feedback from the organization will, hopefully, also be quick.

“We did an educational plan for this project that the MSBA cited as ‘exemplary,’ and probably the best they had

ever seen,” he said.

MSBC member and School Committee Member Myev Bodenhofer asked Slater to confirm that the vote is only for the school building’s structure and the overall design of the facade is still under consideration. This question presumably came up because several residents and even a member of the Board of Selectmen expressed concern regarding the building’s facade design.

game celebrations were a bit different too.


"We had parades at midnight through Norwood Center after we won with thousands of people who would show up," he said. "And it was a different world, you know? They were all throwing beers up to the guys and they were all drinking. It was stuff that wouldn't go on today."

Reddick said that he played on the last two state final games while his older brother played on the first two. He said he felt uniquely qualified to tell the story of the time, not only because he was there but because he was able to collect stories from many other of his acquaintances who lived in Norwood during that time.

"I interviewed 60 or 70 guys for it and they just tell their stories," he said. "I had a lot of fun; it kind of percolated in my head for about a decade."

Reddick said he wanted to release the book to coincide with the 150th anniversary of the incorporation of the Town of Norwood.

"I wrote this for the Town," he said.

Slater said that is correct and that the aesthetic details of the building will be decided at later meetings and/or community forums.

Slater added that though the MSBC had already held seven community forums on the school and site design, they will have more meetings on the specific design.

"Once we get into the actual design process," he said.

MSBC member and School Committee Chair Teresa Stewart added that the name of the building has not yet been decided.

"Hopefully when the building is approved by Town Meeting in the spring the School Committee will take up the naming of the building," she said.

Currently, construction is slated to start in the spring of 2023 and end by the fall of 2025.

"So that's August or September of 2025, when kids and staff come back in the fall and they'll be occupying the building," said Ai3 representative Justin Thibeault, who went through an overview of the construction project plan.

Thibeault also discussed the financial implications if the Town was to move forward with the project. Basically, the MSBA is expected to reimburse the Town almost 30 percent of the estimated \$150 million the new school will cost. That means the Town will have to raise \$105 million, most likely through a budget override at Town Meeting in the spring. Thibeault said that means that for the average homeowner with a home value of about \$550,000, it will be an increase of \$390 a year in property taxes for about 30 years.

The design includes more than 260 parking spaces, a turf athletic field with lighting, two access points off of Washington Street and two distinct areas for students in grades 5 through 6 and students in grades 7 through 8.

Thibeault also focused on the new media center, which he said is designed to be a feeder system for the Norwood High School Media Center, which serves Norwood Community Media. He highlighted that there will additionally be a 600-seat auditorium for theater and music performances and a 290-seat gymnasium for basketball and other athletic exhibitions.

Two indicted for September fatal shooting in Norwood

The Office of Norfolk District Attorney Michael W. Morrissey announced that a Norfolk County Grand Jury indicted two men for murder on Dec. 29, 2021, in connection with the Sept. 19, 2021 fatal shooting of Shakim Lewis-Johnson, 28, of Hyde Park, as he was leaving the residence of a friend in the area of Sturtevant Avenue in Norwood.

The Norwood Police Department (NDP) and the Massachusetts State Police reported conducting an "extensive" investigation into the matter after being assigned to the case by the Norfolk District Attorney's Office, and arrested Anthony Loper-Feaster, 25, of Salem, on Oct. 18, 2021. The District Attorney's Office reported he entered a plea of not guilty at his district court arraignment that afternoon and was ordered held without bail by Dedham District Court Judge Jeanmarie Carroll.

The District Attorney's Office also reported the identity of another suspect in

the case, Ernest Payne, 27, of Prospect Street, Cambridge. As of the date of publication he remains at-large with an active warrant for his arrest.

"Norwood and State Police continue to work with our law enforcement partners to locate Mr. Payne and take him safely into custody," District Attorney Morrissey said. "Anyone with information as to his whereabouts is urged to contact law enforcement immediately."

Morrissey's Office stated no Superior Court arraignment date has yet been set. Assistant District Attorney Carolyn Hely is prosecuting the matter for the Commonwealth.

Shakim Lewis-Johnson was apparently leaving a friend's house in Norwood when the suspects allegedly shot him through his vehicle. NPD officers responded to the call and first secured the area before allowing Emergency Medical personnel onto the scene. Lewis-Johnson was transported to Massachusetts General Hospital by helicopter due to the

extent of his injuries and underwent emergency surgery, but did not survive the procedure.
