

Not fare! Cabbies warned by Selectmen

Two Norwood taxi companies were on the hot seat at Tuesday night's Selectmen meeting for allegedly violating the regulations of their hackney licenses.

The owners of the two companies, London Taxi of Norwood and Family Taxi and Limo Service of Norwood, each received a warning from the Selectmen during show-of-cause hearings Tuesday night and told that further violations will likely result in the loss of their license.

"It's most troubling to me personally that these companies don't seem to care about the regulations of this town and just want to do things their way," said Selectmen Chairman Bill Plasko following the hearings.

Paul Murphy, safety officer for the Norwood Police Department, said he had received complaints about both taxi companies recently and felt the concerns warranted attention from the Selectmen.

The complaints over London Taxi, located at 126 Olde Derby Road, are about company owner Ahmed Rifai taking fares even though he does not personally have a hackney license. Murphy said he has received numerous calls about Rifai, who has multiple speeding and other violations on his driving record, continuing to take customers in his taxi even though he has been deemed unfit to have a license.

When confronted with this information, Rifai reportedly told Murphy over the phone that he was indeed continuing to take fares because his livelihood depended on it. He also told Murphy that he understand that this was in violation of the regulation.


Rifai admitted that he did have five

Rogers moves to block Upland Woods

State Rep. John Rogers (D-Norwood) has introduced new legislation at the State House that seeks to block a large-scale affordable-housing development at Upland Woods in Norwood.

According to a press release sent out

last Wednesday, Rogers tacked an amendment to a \$1.4 billion House bond authorization bill that would prohibit any Chapter 40B developments from being built in an Economic Opportunity Area in a city or town that has a so-called Tax Increment Financing (TIF) agreement with the developer.

"The [bill] would put a stop to an affordable-housing project currently

being proposed at the former Polaroid site on Upland Road in Norwood," the press release said, noting that the amendment now heads to the Senate for consideration prior to the summer recess.



NHS graduates told to pursue their dreams

The weather could not have been better for countless friends and family that came out to celebrate the graduating senior class of 2013 at Norwood High School at Sunday's graduation ceremony.

It was the second class to graduate since the new high school opened its doors in the fall of 2011, and for class Valedictorian Rachel Obeid and her fellow classmates it was vindication of four years of hard work.

"It's been a long four years, filled with hard work, late nights, laughter, goofing off, and growing up," said Obeid. "I would like to take a moment and ask each and every one of you to look to someone in the crowd that has helped you sit in these seats that you are sitting in today, where that is a friend, a teacher or a relative."

Obeid personally thanked her parents for their "selfless dedication" to making sure she and her brother both received a high-quality education.

"Both of my parents came to America not speaking a word of English and have tremendously succeeded beyond their role as

parents. I would go so far as to say that each of us sitting here today is beyond lucky. We are blessed," she said.

Obeid noted that high school graduation is merely one milestone in a lifetime of learning and advancing in many different ways.

"We will all continue doing something that we have always done our whole lives, and something that we will do until the final breath of life: We will continue to learn," she said.

Finally, she reflected on the

many classmates she got to know at Norwood High, the friends she will take with her and others she may never see again.

"We have planted our roots together. We have learned together. And despite all the 'togethers' we've had, the truth is I probably won't see more than half of you ever again," Obeid said. "And with that said, I want to thank you for being a part of my 'together.'"

In his remarks, Norwood High Principal George Usevich thanked the families for the "encouragement and help you have given along the way to make this day happen."

"I know it has not always been easy. But today, you will see that it was all worth it," said Usevich. "They have been nurtured at home and in school. They are ready to begin the next chapter in life. They deserve this gorgeous Sunday to celebrate



this important day."

Usevich also awarded a special Gold Diploma to Fernando Morales, who had to battle cancer in reaching graduation from the high school. Usevich said the Gold Diploma, which he instituted in 1991, is given out annually to a student who has managed to "persevere and endure while encouraging great challenge."

"It was not an easy four years for [Morales] to get to this special day. There would be numerous hospital visits, tutoring and a number of tough treatment days that meant not being able to come to school. This would become a part of a journey that would make it difficult to earn a diploma," said Usevich. "In spite of the trials, there was unbelievable courage, strength and a positive attitude, becoming a role model to athletes, class-

mates, underclassmen and our community. Fernando Morales is a great example of how we, as adults, can learn life lessons from those younger than us."

Four other honorary diplomas were presented to parent volunteers Maria Muller and Jim Little, and teachers Mary Boiardi and Cathleen Burt Shachoy.

School Committee Chairwoman Courtney Rau also addressed this year's class of graduating, noting that she remembered her own graduation 24 years ago not so much for what was said but by the pride and happiness she felt.

"I also realize that none of you will remember one word of what I talk about here this morning long beyond the party you attend this afternoon, but I can promise you that you will remember how you feel at this moment," she said.

ESOL students graduate with gratitude

When Hoda Nohra moved from her native Lebanon to America 12 years ago, she didn't know a word of English.

In her time learning the language through the Norwood Adult English for Speakers of Another Language (ESOL) program, Nohra has befriended many people from a wide array of cultures and developed skills she hopes will carry her to a job working at a bank.

For Nilu Patel, a native of India, learning English meant finally being able to converse with her children's teachers.

"I learned so much. The teachers helped me so much, and I made new friends," said Patel, who lives in Norwood.

Nohra, Patel and 66 other ESOL students received certificates for graduating from the program during a ceremony at the Veterans of Foreign Wars hall on Monday morning.

The program, which began in 2000, aims to help immigrants learn English and build connections within their community, said Director Ellen Borgenicht.

"Many of these people come to this country without a family. We foster connections with people and communities," said Borgenicht. "We've had some pretty amazing success stories."

Borgenicht said many of the ESOL students already have earned college degrees in their home countries, while others come to America with little education. The goal, she said, is to help them build skill sets that

they can carry on in pursuit of higher education and in the workplace.

"The thing is to view this as a beginning and not the end," she said. "We work with them to set goals. They really, truly appreciate who we are and what we do."

The ESOL program was originally run out of the Willett Early Childhood Center and then the Coakley Middle School before space became an issue. More recently, the Neponset Valley Chamber of Commerce has opened up its space on Vanderbilt Avenue at a reduced rate for the classrooms, which are held two to three days a week from the fall to the spring.



Street injustice

It appeared to be a fairly innocuous discussion on Tuesday evening regarding street vendor regulations on and around Washington and Nahatan Streets who show up during the warmer climes. Right now, on most days there is a colorful umbrella providing cover for a hotdog vendor usually positioned by the Veteran's Memorial. And for \$6 bucks you can get two dogs, a bag of chips and a can of soda. Not a bad deal for anyone. Or is it?

Washington Street in downtown Norwood is struggling, to put it mildly. Vacancies abound, rents are high and parking is scarce, making it difficult for those small businesses remaining to stay viable. With costs continuing to increase for electricity, gas, insurances and supplies, the last thing these tax paying restaurants surrounding the Town Common need is competition from street vendors, who make no commitment to the community other than a once a year permit fee.

Comments from Selectmen on Tuesday ranged from, "I think these vendors add to the atmosphere over there", to "there isn't anybody in the area selling hot dogs anyway", which may be true, but completely ignores the economic realities of restaurant owners who are probably screaming to themselves, "what about us?"

There are Chinese, Italian, Irish and Middle Eastern restaur-

rants within a stone's throw from the area in question. Pizza and sub shops, coffee specialty shops, fast food, ice cream/yogurt and donut shops, all vying for and relying heavily on the \$6 bucks someone just dropped on the two hot dog special mentioned above. These are the same businesses that are not only holding the line against Norwood Center becoming a veritable ghost town, but are supporting the local charities, sponsoring little league teams and trying to scratch together a few bucks to hang nicer signs and awnings that also "add to the atmosphere" in the area.

Street vendors aren't villains but they aren't town partners either. They contribute nothing economically; their transient nature makes them almost immune to health department scrutiny, and are a source of problems relative to where they should and shouldn't be located, creating pedestrian impediments and parking confusion.

On multiple occasions at the meeting relative to taxi problems, Selectmen kept reiterating that they don't want to impede people from making a living, and the same logic could be made for street vendors. But, a much stronger consideration should be given to the bricks and mortar business partners who

have stepped up and declared their allegiance to Norwood and only seek a reasonable competitive environment. What are the chances that these street vendors are going to collect the .75 percent Norwood meals tax that lands directly into the Town's coffers and benefits all Norwood residents? Is that a fair competitive environment?

There may be suitable locations for street vendors in Norwood, perhaps during sporting events when they are the only source of immediate refreshment. But, welcoming them with open arms in the downtown area is just a slap in the face to those who rely on what little foot traffic exists there now. Perhaps street vendors do add a bit of festivity to an otherwise staid environment for a few short weeks in the summer. But those few short weeks could be what make or break an established business's bottom line for the year, and whether or not they can continue to pay taxes and contribute to Norwood's economic vitality. A good deal on a hot dog and soda for one could very well be an economic disaster for another.

Norwood Center needs a lot of attention right now, and some consider it on the precipice of extinction, as residents know it. Street vendors aren't part of the solution, only lip-stick on a pig.

AMENDMENT NEEDS YOUR SUPPORT

To the Editor:

John Rogers deserves much credit in his recent amendment to a Housing Bond Bill in front of the House of Representatives. John wisely thought out of the box and amended the bill to disallow Chapter 40b housing projects on commercial areas that have a Tax Incremental Financial (TIF) contract already existing on such property. Essentially, he argued, that the two statutes are in conflict, and should not infringe upon each other. This is important to Norwood since it will stop the proposed 40b project(s) on the old Polaroid property, which is under a certified TIF with Campanelli Bros, the owner, through 2029. This contract was originally enacted and state-certified in 2004 and extended in 2009. Campanelli and UTI have both made use of the incentives.

This is only right and just that it be codified since Norwood has signed a contract with Campanelli and the state (yes, it is a certified TIF) that has provided tax breaks at the town and state level. Opinions have been promulgated that our contract with Campanelli has no teeth and can be broken at Campanelli's leisure. I disagree. A contract is sacrosanct and The Town of Norwood should bring this to court, if the Senate or Governor do not sign on to John's amendment and make it law. We have upheld our end of the bargain. Campanelli needs to do the same.

Please take time and contact Senator Mike Rush and the other senators on Beacon Hill so that this can be enacted into law. Norwood has done far more than most towns in providing rental units that are used in conjunction with Section 8 housing assistance vouchers and the affordable housing already provided. Leave our commercial tax base alone.



Marathon reimbursement anticipated

The Norwood Police Department is anticipating reimbursement from the federal government for its response in supporting in the Boston Marathon bombing investigation back in April.

In the aftermath of the twin bombings of April 15, which killed three and injured well

over 200 spectators near the finish line of the marathon on Boylston Street, Norwood deployed two of its officers to the city as part of the regional Metropolitan Law Enforcement Council (MetroLEC) response team.

According to Police Department spokesman Officer Kevin Grasso, the department has received word from the Federal Emergency Manage-

ment Agency (FEMA) that it will be reimbursed the costs of deploying these officers and replacing them on their regular shifts in Norwood. Grasso said the reimbursement is between \$4,700 and \$5,000.

Norwood officers Anthony Lopes and Will Fundora are members of the MetroLEC SWAT team that was mobilized in the immediate aftermath of the bombings.

Students' time in the program varies depending on their mastery of the language, said Borgenicht, noting that there are five different speaking proficiency levels from beginner to advanced level two and also a computer course.

"Many of them go through three or four years of this," she said.

The staff includes Borgenicht, an administrative assistant and four teachers, with funding coming from a state education grant. It is sponsored by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education's Adult and Community Learning Services, which help develop literacy skills needed for adults to qualify for further education, job training and better employment.

Norwood resident Cristina Ayala, who emigrated from Columbia seven years ago, told her fellow graduates to always keep learning and moving forward.

"One of the most important things in America is education. Never stop learning, because nobody knows what we can be in the future," she said. "Education is the road. Education is the way. Education is the power."

Nohra, who lives in Dedham, said joining the ESOL program was "the greatest things I have experienced in my life."

"They really are very, very helpful. I didn't know any English before this. Now I can explain myself," she said. "We made a lot of friends in a lot of different nationalities. The teachers are incredible."

Selectman Paul Bishop, who was the guest speaker, congratulated the graduates for their accomplishment, adding that diversity is what makes America great.

"This country will be a greater country than it is now. It will become a better world," said Bishop, in speaking of the contributions the students now will be able to make.

"We go to school two days a week and I would like it to be five, because our time in the school is very significant," explained Ayala. "Everybody helps us. The teachers are the best."

A quote on the program from Henry David Thoreau captured perfectly the sentiment of the day: "Go confidently in the direction of your dreams. Live the life you have imagined."

driving offenses over the past five years, and further confessed to having driven fares without a license. He apologized and said he would leave the fares to five other licensed drivers in his company going forward.

Selectman Allan Howard said he wanted "assurances" from Rifai that he would not operate a taxi without a license again.

Another concern voiced by Selectman Paul Bishop was over London Taxi's alleged lack of attention to Norwood customers.

He said several residents have complained about waiting two hours to get a cab, while London Taxi cabs supposedly "hang out" at the Westwood Route 128 train station waiting for customers.

Rifai promised both Howard and Bishop that he would improve service and stop taking fares himself.

The board voted unanimously to issue a warning, with the understanding that further violations will bring a much greater penalty.

In the next hearing, Danny Habib of Family Taxi and Limo Service, 63 Morse St., responded to accusations that his company had "taken advantage" of a resident on multiple occasions by charging her a flat fee rather than using the meter.

Murphy said he received the complaint back in January from a resident of Norwood Woods who complained that Family

Taxi on several occasions had overcharged her by quoting a flat fee of \$18 for a ride across town. Norwood Town Taxi charged her \$10 for the same route on the meter, said Murphy.

Plasko informed Habib of a town regulation that taxi companies must use the meter at all times when doing business in

Norwood. Habib, the company's manager and dispatcher, admitted that on a few occasions his drivers did not use the meter with this particular customer, but that she never complained to them.

Howard requested that Habib offer the resident a \$64 refund for what she was reportedly overcharged for the times the meter

was not used.

Habib agreed to this, and also stated that he would tell all of his drivers going forward to always use the meter.

Following the hearing, the Selectmen issued a warning similar to that of London Taxi.

ties can be devastated by developers roaming the Commonwealth unbridled, unimpeded, unchecked, with no accountability to the community," said Rogers in the release.

Chapter 40B, the state's much debated affordable-housing law, allows developers to skirt local zoning laws in community with under ten percent affordable housing if the project includes at least 25 affordable units.

Rogers said the Polaroid site was declared an Economic Opportunity Area under state law Chapter 40 back in 2009, which allowed for the establishment of a TIF agreement to "foster full-time job creation and stimulate business growth" in the area.

He said the 40B project,

which includes 296 rental apartment units over roughly 23 acres, achieves neither of these objectives.

"The obligations of Chapter 40B should not be allowed to supercede the application of Chapter 40," said Rogers. "My amendment reconciles these two laws and empowers communities to accommodate affordable housing while also promoting economic growth."

The amendment would also prohibit the state Housing Appeals Committee from allowing developers to overrule local zoning laws when a TIF agreement has been executed.

Selectman Allan Howard had previously spearheaded an effort to block the Upland Woods 40B project on the grounds of the TIF agreement with the developer. According to Howard, however, that effort was unsuccessful due to legal opinion that the TIF contract between the town and developer, Braintree-based Campanelli, does not prevent 40B development on the land.

"Our town counsel said they didn't feel it would hold up," said Howard. "I think the biggest reason the TIF doesn't hold up is that they haven't built anything yet that would thereby trigger the tax incentive."

But Howard said he is hopeful Rogers' amendment can change that through the legislative process.

"I think that's tremendous. I think it's brilliant on John's part, and I hope it goes through," said Howard. "It seems like 40B overrides almost everything."

For their part, Campanelli and its development team have stated that Norwood is a prime location for the development as currently proposed, noting that

the town now has just 5.5 percent toward its ten percent affordable-housing threshold. Representatives of the development team presented plans to the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) at a highly attended public hearing last month, during which they talked about the project's "smart growth" design principle and said that the new buildings would not materially impact traffic in the neighborhood. Following lengthy discussion, that hearing was continued to June 25. Campanelli is seeking 35 waivers from the ZBA.

Howard said the town has made several attempts to work with Campanelli on a scaled-down project, but to no avail. He said the firm has also been unwilling to consider his alternate development plan to provide housing for older residents, something the town needs.

"We've been very honorable with these people and they really haven't done much to assist us," Howard said. "They haven't been willing to bend at all on this and it's very disappointing."

Howard cited concerns over multi-bedroom units with the project and the potential impact of adding many new students to the public schools. He said the town would likely have to build a new school or significantly add to a current one, likely with little to no financial assistance from the state.

"That would be terrible for us. We couldn't afford it," he said.

Several boards and committees, including the Selectmen, School Committee and Planning Board, have also come out in opposition to the Upland Woods development.

Housing plan to focus on affordability issues

Public meeting set for June 27

The town is moving forward with a Housing Production Plan (HPP) in an effort to meet its affordable-housing requirements under state law.

The HPP is a community's "proactive strategy for planning and developing affordable housing" on its own or with a development partner, according to the state Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD).

It's something town officials are hoping can create some protection against much more high density housing projects allowed by developers under the state's Chapter 40B statute - at least for a time - while officials work to develop a more appropriate strategy for meeting Norwood's affordable-housing needs.

"We have more protection against 40Bs with a Housing Production Plan," said Town Planner Steve Costello at Monday night's Planning Board meeting. "I think it makes sense to protect ourselves against future projects."

The way the HPP works, the town would have to create a plan resulting in the development of at least 62 affordable units in town in order to receive a one-year certificate of compliance from the DHCD. With the certificate, the town would be free from 40B development for one year, and doubling the amount of units would create a two-year moratorium on 40B projects in Norwood, said Costello.

Campanelli of Braintree, which has submitted plans for a 296-unit 40B apartment complex on a large parcel it owns at Upland Woods, recently donated \$15,000 to the town for the HPP, which must be approved

by the Selectmen and Planning Board and be certified by the state before any units can be developed. The Selectmen accepted Campanelli's donation at a recent meeting, using the funds to hire a team of consultants to develop the housing plan.

A public meeting is scheduled for Thursday, June 27, at 6:30 p.m. at the Norwood Police/Fire station on Nahatan Street, and Costello said it will be a chance for residents and the consultants to discuss Norwood's future affordable-housing goals, including where and how affordable housing should be developed.

"It's a planning tool that could be useful to us in the future, or maybe we find it won't be useful," said Costello.

Either way, with several major housing proposals now forcing the issue, Costello said it will ultimately fall on the town's decision makers to at some point start adopting an overall strategy to deal with the 40B issue.

"That's a policy decision that has to be made in the town. The reason we never did it before is because there was never a political will to do so," he said.

In addition to the Campanelli project, another 40B development is planned for an adjoining parcel owned by The Davis Companies of Boston, currently where the Mercer company operates. Both projects are located on the site of the former Polaroid factory.

Mercer recently agreed to a 10-year lease to continue operating on the property, but on a much smaller section, while The Davis Companies has been marketing the remaining 34 acres for what they are calling the Uplands Woods Apartments, a 300-unit project located at One Investors Way. Costello said the developer of

that project has offered the town a "very attractive compensation package," although he did not get into any more details.

Under Chapter 40B, communities must reach a 10-percent affordable-housing stock in order to avoid future 40B projects, which are not subject to local zoning ordinances the way other housing projects are. Norwood is currently at 5.6 percent, with 705 of a required 1,244 affordable units to meet the threshold, said Costello.

"If the town was of a mind to be done with 40B, they could approve these two Polaroid projects and be done with it forever," said Costello.

The other options would be to fight every 40B project that is proposed in town, and likely end up in court, or develop a plan like the HPP to control the outcome of each project, said Planning Board Chairman Ernie Paciorkowski.

Either way, the 40B law is not going away, he said.

"The state wants this," he said. "I've said many, many times, there's no open space in Norwood for these developments."

A third major development, by Criterion Development Partners of Waltham, is for a 311-unit affordable-housing development at the old Plimpton Press property, a nine-acre parcel off Lenox Street.

The developer is looking to file the project under the state's Chapter 40R Smart Growth Zoning Overlay District Act of 2004. As is the case with a 40B project, Costello said, all the units in a 40R would count toward the town's affordable-housing inventory, not just the 25 percent required in the development. Unlike the Polaroid projects, however, the Plimpton Press proposal required Town Meeting approval.
