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Clock is ticking on Fire Chief David Hayes's tenure

Norwood Fire Department Chief David Hayes said he has worked hard during his first year as chief to rebuild the culture of the fire department and increase transparency with the public through an open-door policy. However, he may have to retire when he turns 65 in February under state law unless the state Legislature approves a bill allowing him to continue until age 70.

Several recent initiatives point to efforts to improve the department since Hayes's predecessor, Fire Chief George Morrice, received a union vote of no confidence in January 2021 from Norwood Firefighters Local 1631. Under his leadership, Hayes has instituted a fire prevention division; firefighters receive cross training in other roles; they received a free cancer screening; and new equipment has been purchased that has saved Norwood money and increased firefighter safety. Hayes also said he has morning meetings with his crew so that firefighters have input in decisions.

"I'm trying to empower the firefighters," he said in an Oct. 3 interview with The Norwood Record. "Before, the fire chief made all the rules and sat on an island."

As he described his efforts to improve the department, Hayes said he is contemplating whether he will be able to see them all come to fruition. In order for him to continue as chief past the age of 65, the mandatory age for retirement, the state

Documents obtained by The Norwood Record and interviews with stakeholders confirmed that there are different perspectives on when Haves should retire. While union representatives believe that a mandatory retirement age allows for other firefighters to move up the ladder, Hayes and General Manager Tony Mazzucco said this is ageism in a position that is mainly administrative in nature. The discussion has pitted Hayes, the unions, the legislators and the Town in a quagmire as the clock ticks down on Hayes's status as chief.

Hayes explained he believes the bill's passage may be hampered by what he called a "misunderstanding" with the state and Norwood union representatives as well as state Rep. John Rogers and state Sen. Mike Rush about how long he wished to remain as chief.

"The length of the contract is, to me at least, a red herring in the entire discussion," said General Manager Tony Mazzucco in an Oct. 7 interview. "It is increasingly becoming the norm in Massachusetts, as swapping leadership out every few years is not effective or good for a town."

On Oct. 13, 2021, Mazzucco and Hayes signed a five-year contract, effective Sept. 1, 2021, that would allow Hayes to be employed through Aug. 31, 2026 when he will be 68, according to a copy of the contract obtained by The Norwood Record. This contract is contingent upon legislative approval of H. 4287. Rogers and Rush jointly filed the bill at the request of the Board of Selectmen, and it was initially referred to the House's Committee on Public Service on Dec. 13,2021.

Meanwhile, the bill has remained stalled in the Senate's Committee on Bills in the Third Reading, with the last action taken on it on June 30, according to the mass.gov website.

In response to questions from The Norwood Record on the bill's status, Rush and Rogers released a joint statement on Oct. 4.

"This legislation is currently

Sun not set on Sunset Avenue

The Norwood Planning Board met on Oct. 3 and voted 3-1 in favor of supporting a Town Meeting warrant article to fix what's wrong with Sunset Avenue.

Sunset is a subdivision of about a dozen single-family homes off of Pleasant Street near the Morse Street intersection.

Developer Mario Gomes received approval from the Planning Board in 2015. Gomes was cited several times afterward for failing to follow the proposed plan on several items, most prominently the slope of a cul-de-sac going north toward Talbot Avenue.

Town Planner Paul Halkiotis said this hill was filled with what is essentially mulch, and would break down, subside and potentially become unstable. He said though the chances of it sliding down causing damage or becoming a hazard to people's health was unlikely, it was not built to engineering standards and was an issue. He said it could also make the cul-desac's pavement unstable.

"It didn't pass inspection. Afterward we were notified that the state came in and took money out of the performance bond for this development, related to a tax issue of the owner," Halkiotis said. "I realized the state could come back and take more or all of what was left of that perfor-

mance bond at a later date if it chose to. Given that the developer hadn't performed as well as he was supposed to, the Board decided to call the bond."

A performance bond can be thought of as a deposit or collateral; the Town keeps the bond from a developer in case standards and expectations of a project are not met. If there are no issues, the developer gets the bond back, but if the bond is called, the Town uses that money to fix what's wrong. The Board called this bond when the balance was around \$61,000.

The problem, according to Halkiotis, is that the two times they put out the bid to remedy the problems, no bids came in at or below \$61,000, which means they have to go to Town Meeting to ask for

they received was \$75,000 in March.

"In August, they bid \$116k," he said. "I can't tell you how many hours I spent trying to resolve this working with the Engineering Department."

Halkiotis said they can't really spend more than the bond without Town Meeting approval, and so Town Manager Tony Mazzucco suggested they go to and seek approval. Halkiotis drafted a Town Meeting Article to request \$66,730 (25 percent of which is a built-in contingency and likely wouldn't be spent) for the most recent bid to contract with the company who submitted the bid of \$116,000.

ever seen a situation where the performance bond wasn't enough to cover the cost of finishing a project," he said. "In 35 years I've been involved with pulling maybe half a dozen bonds, but there was always enough money to get the job done."

Planning Board member Debbie Holmwood said she

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more money. The lowest bid was against the warrant article, but only in principle. She said the occupancy permit for this project, which allowed Gomes to start selling the properties and make money, should have never been issued with this subsidence issue being known.

"Ok, everybody's heads are going to blow off, but I am been able to sell the last couple of units. He got everything he wanted – and I'm not saying this just because he cut down all the trees, but that's still sticking in my craw – and he blew up the rock which one neighbor asked him not to do. not in favor of this," she said. "We've spent way too much time and money on this and I "This is the first time I've have fought for not releasing any funds from bonds. It has happened before, it happened on Rock Street for 20 years, the developer didn't finish the thing and the Town ended up paying for it. I know we want to fix it, but I'm not in favor of spending more of the taxpayers' money, because if his certificates of occupancy weren't given to him, he wouldn't have

ing issue after issue with the property and said it wasn't right that Gomes was able to up and run with his money.

"If we didn't issue the certificates of occupancy and we had some enforcement, he wouldn't have sold the last two units for \$400,000, \$500,000 or \$600,000," she said. "He put it in wrong, have him take it out and put it in right. We knew this was going to happen with this guy. I am not in favor of going to Town Meeting and saying,

'Give us another \$65,000, because all we have is \$61,000 to fix a problem that shouldn't have come up in the first place.' It's nobody's fault but the developer's, and if we had some teeth and intestinal fortitude, we would not issue certificates of occupancy if the work isn't done."

"I agree with most of what Debbie said," Halkiotis said. "There's a chance that over time, that slope is going to move and the cul-de-sac and the pavement is up above that and it could eventually settle and could be worse. The condition of the pavement, the curbing would likely deteriorate over time and there would be some subsidence of that slope. Worst case scenario? There could be a sort of landslide scenario, but that's highly unlikely."

Planning Board Vice Chair Brian Hachey said he also agreed with Holmwood. Holmwood said she still votes against paying for these repairs based on principle.

"They all skipped Town and let us pay for it," Holmwood said. "Well I want a new driveway too! I can't get granite curbs on my street without ponying up. I know you can't unring the bell, but can we stop ringing the bell? We do this over and over. I am not in favor of using taxpayer money for this."

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Member Joseph Sheehan said they had a number of solutions for this and had a trusted engineer come in and try to fix the issue.

"I don't know what happened there, he was supposed to get it done," he said. "He touched the project and he came out looking worse than ever. This thing did drag on and on, and I think the money would have been sufficient had it been done earlier. And now there's a huge jump in what it costs to build anything in the last few years. We probably should have called the bond earlier and gotten on to fixing it."

Member Derek Mason said he agreed with Holmwood and that the Board needs to "develop some sharper teeth" to make sure this doesn't happen again. Hachey said they need to fix this problem, but they should also make sure it doesn't happen again.

"If there's a lesson to be learned from something like this, I think this is a lesson being learned," he said.

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Selectmen wary of capital budget's \$14 million price tag

The Board of Selectmen met on Oct. 11 at the Norwood Town Hall and discussed with Town Manager Tony Mazzucco the proposed \$14 million fiscal year 2023 Capital Outlay budget.

Selectman and Capital Outlay representative Bob Donnelly and Mazzucco went through each item on the list, and included two new ambulances totaling \$1.1 million, several planning and design studies combined at \$1.3 million, an addition of \$1.4 million to the HVAC replacement project at the Norwood Public Safety Building, \$2.8 million for the road repair program, \$4.5 million for the water line improvement program's third year and many other items.

The total funding requested is \$14,594,504 for everything. Funding sources for these purchases include \$1.1 million in ambulance receipts, \$1.04 million from a bond anticipation note (BAN), \$10 million total will come from borrowing, \$1.6 million will come from free cash, \$480,000 will come from partial grants/cash and \$150,000 will come from donations.

Members of the Board questioned Mazzucco and Donnelly about the price tag total. Donnelly responded by saying the Capital Outlay Committee will be looking to better plan for expenses in a more segmented manner in the future to avoid sticker shock. That being said, Donnelly warned they have some serious spending that needs to get done.

"We have agreed as a committee that after the holidays we will reconvene to take a deeper dive into challenging projects upcoming in 2024, 2025 and 2026," he said. "I think from that process, I'm hopeful that we can get a little more energy and conversation around the challenges that Capital (committee) does have. I sound like a broken record, but we have \$8 million designated for a stormwater project eight years down the line. That's one project we really need to start thinking strategically about. How are we going to finance these very longterm projects? It's going to be a challenge for us but I think keeping the committee front and center will help educate everyone so Town Meeting isn't hit with a big surprise. We have been talking about it."

Selectman Matt Lane asked about the \$1.4 million additional funds requested for the HVAC system at the police and fire station. \$4 million had already been approved at the last Town Meeting. Mazzucco said the problem is that if you put too big a budget number out for a project, sometimes builders find a way to spend it though it's not the most frugal way to get it done.

"If you put too big a number out there, say a \$5 or \$6 million number out there, they're going to jack the bid up," he said. "How much of a contingency we put into a budget is always a challenge. HVAC systems are always a challenge to come up with the right number."

Selectman Helen Abdallah-Donohue said residents are facing increased costs for just about everything now and have to now pay for the upcoming Coakley Middle School replacement project. She questioned the need for many of these projects, pointing to the water main relining and replacement project as one that could be taken perhaps a bit more slowly.

"If the two newest pipes were from 1960, that is 62 years old, she said. "Around the U.S.A., there are pipes in the ground that are 100 years old. In Europe, there are pipes in the ground still being used that are 1,000 years old. I'm not saying we should use 1,000year-old pipes. And those pictures that you use of the pipes, it's not right to keep using the same one every year."

Abdallah-Donohue was referring to a picture of a nearly clogged pipe before it was cleaned and relined that Mazzucco used during the presentation. "That picture you used "We take a new picture every year," he said.

"But how much can you impose on the taxpayers?" she said.

Mazzucco said there are debts being paid off this year and the net increase of debt service on the Town's current borrowed monies – debt service being the annual payment the Town is making – is around \$300,000, which he said is negligible to the average Norwood taxpayer.

Board of Selectmen Chair Bill Plasko pointed to the roughly \$1.3 million in design and planning services for future projects proposed by Capital Outlay. He said he was worried that approving these design studies now means they will essentially be forced to pay for these projects in the short term because estimates will no doubt significantly increase in the future.

Donnelly said the committee has definitely had this thought too, and actually pushed a few design projects back because of the implication of needing to build the following year or so. He said they've been focused on planning, and are organizing to better prepare by lining up design studies and project construction plans that are more likely able to be done sooner than later.

"This is something we haven't been able to do because we've been so focused on this year's plan and this year's Town Meeting," he said. "That is our concern as well, because if you think this year's plan is expensive, next year's is even more so."

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OPINION The gang is at it again

Definition of petulant: Unreasonably irritable or ill-tempered; peevish. Contemptuous in speech or behavior. Forward; pert; insolent; wanton.

It's funny how the definition of petulant perfectly describes Firefighters Local 1631 here in Norwood. Let's throw in childish too while we're at it. This group is never satisfied. And when they're unhappy things inevitably occur, like claims of inexplicable property damage made by Norwood officials where the gang works.

Like parents, the Board of Selectmen and Town Manager have to deal with the theatrics, but they don't bear the worst of it. The fire chief is the guy caught in the middle, not unlike an older sibling trying to keep the antics of his younger brothers and sisters from becoming too noticeable. Fire Chief David Hayes is the latest Big Brother to bear the brunt of Local 1631.

As this week's Page 1 story depicts, Hayes, due to Massachusetts state law, will be required to retire on or before February of 2023 because he turns 65 if legislation on his behalf isn't approved by the statehouse, said approval being usually granted post haste. Requiring retirement at one time made sense, given that the role of Chief years prior was more hands on, working on fires right beside his crew. No doubt, age should be an issue in any profession where rigorous work and stress can do irreparable harm to those not fit enough to carry out the duties, placing not only themselves but others in danger.

And there is a modicum of merit to the argument that there is little room for professional advancement of others within a department if the chief hangs on too long, though not nearly enough to require immediate retirement upon turning age 65, particularly if the current chief is doing a good job. And in this case, Chief Hayes in his one year as head of the department is doing a very good job. Want proof? Well, besides all the evidence provided in the Page 1 story, there hasn't been any Letter of 'No Confidence' issued by Local 1631 during his time at the helm, which they aren't hesitant to write when they're having a hissy fit. Not to mention Town Meeting supported an extension of Hayes' tenure after he received a rousing endorsement from Selectmen.

Have no doubt, this is all about control. Local 1631 and its state affiliate, the Professional Firefighters of Massachusetts, are making it an issue simply because they can, not because it's warranted. The job of fire chief is now mainly administrative, they can be on the site during a fire directing things, but the strenuousness associated with being a firefighter is not really applicable. And lack of advancement for others down the line? The guess at this address is that few in Town are worried about union members leaving for greener pastures. Norwood firefighters, by all accounts, do a good job, but they aren't irreplaceable, and where is it greener than working in Norwood? These guys are coddled like no other employees. They're likely not going anywhere. Perhaps Town management should consider hiring chiefs from outside the department in the future, thus obviating issues of advancement from within.

And one other point needs addressing. As mentioned above, approval by the legislature on issues of forced retirements are almost always handled and approved expeditiously. This request for an extension of Chief Hayes was filed by both state Representative John Rogers and state Senator Michael Rush, but has languished on the senate floor for months. It also appears neither has made an effort to return his calls to find out what is going on. When questioned by this newspaper, instead of getting on the phone and explaining it, they together issued a "joint statement". Really? In this 'joint statement,' they wrote "This homerule petition has become increasingly difficult, as it looks to subvert a 1987 state-wide law to protect public safety and public safety officials... We remain committed to serving the people of Norwood." What is glaringly obvious is that neither Rogers nor Rush has the testicular fortitude to go against Local 1631 and the state union and make this happen. Apparently their commitment to serving the people of Norwood is only true if their chance of re-election isn't threatened by unions exerting influence. We thought they were better than that.

The response was part of an overall mutual aid initiative through the Northeast Public Power Association (NEPPA), which is the organization that orchestrates public utilities all over New England willing to go wherever they are needed.

Morrissey said the two-person crew was part of a 56-person convoy sent to Florida on Sept. 27 at 6 a.m., before the storm made landfall. After the destruction wrought on Cuba and Puerto Rico, NEPPA began organizing crews before predictions of US landfall were made. Norwood Light's team made it to Jacksonville on the evening of Sept. 28.

"We volunteered two guys, which is one crew, and a truck,' he said. "The person who organizes the mutual aid for NEPPA takes the list of volunteers and trims it down - say they need 50, but 100 respond. They send the 50 - and in this case they sent down 56 people from 24 different utilities."

Morrissey said the convoy consisted of 24 trucks and included a mechanic, linemen and supervisors working from Sept. 29 to Oct. 4. Norwood Light's crew worked 16-hour days, as soon as it was safe to start. "They started the 16-hours days on Thursday and got released on Tuesday morning. They then started their drive back that day and got back on Thursday," he said. '

The crew took a digger truck with them to work down in the wet ground of the Florida plains.

"The guys, from what they told me, set about 12 poles and straightened out another 12 or so. In addition, it has a wench line on it too," he said. "So because of so much water some of the trucks would get stuck. They would use the wench line to pull those trucks out. They worked with three other municipal utilities with buckets."

Morrissey said the work went as smoothly as it probably could. The digger crew would set the pole and the bucket trucks would bring workers up the pole to get them ready to do wire transfers.

"We spoke to the NEPPA supervisor, who is from West Boylston, and he was very complimentary on the job our guys did," he said. "They just never stopped working."

The crew started in Jacksonville and then moved on to Bartow.

'The NEPPA crews were welcomed by the Bartow community and restored power to thousands of customers,"

Morrissey said. "A lot of singlephase laterals and service work was completed, and also changing out at least one concrete pole. Some climbing and hooks were used in the restoration."

Morrissey added that upon returning the Norwood his crew made it clear they weren't the only ones working hard down there.

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

The Norwood Record on Oct. 6, said he stands by the mandatory retirement age because of the health and safety risks of the profession. The risk for cancer and heart and lung disease increases with age, particularly in a job that continually exposes firefighters to carcinogens both during a fire and in the remnants that remain on their equipment.

"We take personality out of it," he explained. "The union does not support firefighters working past age 65."

"We said we would give him an extra 18 months," Ronco said. "All of this was verbal."

"Who are they to offer him?" Mazzucco said in response.

What concerned Ronco most, he said, was the precedent the bill's passage would set.

"If members want to advance, they can't do that if people stay," he explained, noting that firefighters may go to other towns for professional advancement.

As measures of his success

"Anything regarding a removal of a person from a position or an extension of service - we automatically testify against that," said Jacques, noting that the PFFM represents more than 12,000 firefighters in more than 200 Massachusetts communities.

Hayes described the situation as "a union thing."

"I don't think they are attacking me personally," Hayes explained. "I think I am collateral damage. They are trying to prove their power."

On Oct. 11, Hayes responded to the PFFM letter he received earlier this week, pointing out inaccuracies about "a phantom agreement" stating that he agreed with "Local 1631 and others" to stay on for a year after his birthday. In that letter, Hayes questioned the PFFM representatives as to whom those "others" were.

He also asked whether the PFFM's testimony at the Jan. 4 hearing and the follow-up letter would have been different had they known the true circumstances of his request. He stressed that at both the STM

some crossed lines of communication," Mazzucco said. "It would be very disappointing for our legislative delegation not to pull off what other legislative delegations have pulled off.

"We've got to recognize that the 1987 law is, in a lot of ways, dated," he continued. "It uses the term 'uniformed officers.' Being the chief is a stressful job, but it is much more of a management and administrative job." In response to concerns by both the state and Norwood unions about Hayes's age, Mazzucco said, "It is management's right to decide who we think needs to lead the department, and it's my responsibility to pick that person." Norwood Firefighters Local 1631 representative Paul Ronco said that the union "offered the chief an 18-month extension past his 65th birthday."

Hayes worked with Assistant General Manager Michael Rosen to secure up to \$200,000 for a feasibility study and a master plan for this facility, which has the potential to include at least 10 towns.

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

Black Earth sells raised beds and watering kits to promote growing of food at home, and delivers compost in spring and fall with instructions on how to use it to draw down carbon in a yard. About the presenter: Andrew Brousseau, after achieving a BS at UMass Amherst, moved out west to ski and follow up on his recent studies. While living in the mountains, he worked as a software developer and as an oceanographer for the University of East Anglia, going on 7 research cruises to the Southern Ocean and the Atlantic. However, he yearned to study nutrient recycling so returned to land to get an MS in the topic. He then dropped out of academia to join Conor Miller (founder of Black Earth) on his endeavor, just as the state of Massachusetts became the first in the nation to implement a ban on food waste going to landfills and incinerators.

HOW TO BE AN ALLY TO INDIGENOUS PEOPLES

Over the course of one hour, educator Rosa Blumenfeld provides a framework so that we can see the bigger picture of capitalism and white supremacy, and how these systems set us up to interact with each other as human beings on Turtle Island (the name for North America that is used by some Indigenous people). By providing a common language, we can start to see the roles that the system wants us to continue to play for its own profit and gain. Once we are able to see our roles, we can then make different choices based on our values and good hearts that lead us all towards truth and reconciliation.

All across Turtle Island there are thousands of Indigenous nations with their own distinct traditions, languages, and ways of being. There is no way to adequately capture the diversity and history of all these peoples. That is not what this course attempts to do. We are not authorized, nor do we wish to speak for any nation, tribe, or people. Rather we seek to provide colonial settlers who are on Turtle Island with a broad framework to better understand how to take responsibility for their position in the capitalist system and be good guests/allies on this land. About the presenter: Rosa Blumenfeld was born and raised in Vancouver on the traditional territory of the Musqueam people. She moved to Boston in 2006 and has lived here ever since. She is named after her grandmother Ana Rosa Romero Gallego, who was an Indigenous woman from the Muisca tribe, whose land is currently colonized by the nation of Colombia. She was trained as a radical, antioppression educator in the Paulo Freire model by seasoned labor educators from all over the United States when she was a union organizer for the Greater Boston Labor Council, and the North Shore Labor Council from 2006-2014. 
