## Norwood Day takes in thousands

Washington Street was jammed with pedestrians, carnival rides and a giant brain on Saturday as thousands came to see what Norwood is all about.

Norwood Recreation Superintendent Travis Farley said the day was a great success for the Town, and said he was particularly happy with the fireworks from Friday night, provided by David Spiegel.

“It was definitely one of the bigger ones we ever had,” he said. “We had Gov. Charlie Baker come, which

added a whole other element we weren’t necessarily counting on.”

Farley said the attractions, especially the Pizza Mile, were a great success for the day.

“The street was filled almost all day,” he said. “By 3 p.m., we had to kind of kick people out because they were still hanging around. It could not have been any better. We had roughly 240 vendors, and a lot of people came out to show and see what Norwood was all about, which is great.”

During the day, many out-of-towners and new residents came by, which Farley said was kind of the point. He said

the vendors and booths from Town organizations were out there to get people informed of the many programs and activities Norwood offers.

“We had a lot of new families come up to our information booths and ask questions,” he said. “If you don’t really know a lot about the Town, in one day you can figure out which youth groups to join, churches to join or what the businesses have to offer and, in the process, meet a lot of new people. It’s a great time for someone who’s new to

## Boch open to possibility of selling “Saints Lot”

The Planning Board met on Monday evening, Sept. 10 in the community room of the Police & Fire Station (137 Nahatan St.) to continue two closely connected hearings involving Boch Automotive and its bid for increased open lot car storage.

More than 30 members of the public attended both sessions which – given the hearings’ extensive and charged commentary so far – were very brief, lasting a combined half hour.

The main hearing of the night – continued from Aug. 13 and opened on June 18 – concerned Boch Automotive’s major project special permit application for an open lot vehicle storage facility planned for 84 Morse St. in South Norwood.

The proposal has incurred

sustained opposition from local residents, both during the application hearing and in the months preceding it. This has led to several major changes.

One of the biggest was the announcement made by Boch representing attorney David Hern during the Aug. 13 session that the “Saints Lot” – the undeveloped section of the property bordered by Hawes Brook, the Neponset River, the dead ends of the “Saints” streets, and the Balch ball fields – would be removed from the current application.

This would eliminate 270 auto storage spaces, reducing the total to approximately 593, all of which would be located in the school bus yard (the “Bus Lot”) and in the section of the property on the opposite side of

## ZBA holds firm on Norwood Hospital

The Norwood Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) met with Norwood Hospital’s Director of Marketing, Communications and Public Relations Kim Kelley and attorney David Hern on Tuesday to discuss signage on the hospital’s property.

The result of the meeting is that now Norwood Hospital can put up signage only on the Draper Building to celebrate its upcoming centennial for a maximum of one year. The Board voted unani-

mously that the sign on the Draper be approved for one year with one message, subject to review of the message, and banner by the ZBA before the Town Building Inspector grants approval.

In previous meetings, the pair came in to ask for zoning relief for a large sign over the Draper Building and six smaller signs on the light poles on the hospital’s property. Hern had asked in previous meetings to grant the hospital the ability to put up

"The kid wants to come, and I get to see everybody, which is great," he said.

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
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# Selectmen mourn fallen heroes; discuss bright future

Tuesday night's Selectmen's meeting, held on the 17th anniversary of 9/11, was a time to remember the nation's 3,000 victims of the worst attack on American soil, an attack which claimed one of Norwood's own, Sonia Puopolo.

"They did not break us, and they never will," said Chairman Thomas F. Maloney after a moment of silent reflection.

Sonya was the wife of Dominic Puopolo, a former member of the Finance Commission before he moved to Dover.

"She had boarded a flight out of Logan to attend the Hispanic (Heritage) Awards in LA," said Selectman Allan Howard. "Dominic had run against me for the Finance Commission before he won the next year. Their lives were forever ruined by this dastardly deed."

The Selectmen voted unanimously to hold a Special Town Meeting on Thursday, Nov. 8. This would be two days after the general election on Tuesday, Nov. 6. To do so, the warrant would have to be signed by the Board on Oct. 9. If Town Meeting wishes to be continued, the date would be Nov. 15, because Nov. 12 is a holiday, Veterans Day.

Selectman William J. Plasko made a motion to have a separate meeting before the Special Town Meeting on the 36 Access Rd. lighting project so that, should any article need to be made at the main meeting, it can be brought forth then.

"If the project is ready to go out to bid, there are certain steps we are going to need to take," Plasko said. "We need to make sure Town Meeting takes action on it."

Both motions were approved 5-0.

Also, because there are five Tuesdays in October, the Board voted 5-0 to cancel the meeting on Oct. 30. Since Thanksgiving is Nov. 22, it also decided to cancel the November 20 meeting 5-0.

Plasko also briefly talked about his work on the Forbes Hill Task Force regarding the overlay district zone.

"I checked with an official today, and we should have a meeting date by the end of this week or the beginning of next week," he said. "We need to be able to bring a recommendation to the Board for the meeting on the 25th, so that you can bring a recommendation about the project to Town Meeting."

The meeting was also a night to remember local heroes who recently passed away and had a major impact on the community.

Longtime Fin Com member John Hayes passed away at the age of 86 on September 8.

"He was also a member of the Norwood Housing Authority and the Democratic Town Commission," Selectman Helen Donahue said. "He gave a great deal to the Town and contributed in making it what it is today. He had everyone's interests at heart."

"He was the longest-serving Fin Com director the Town has ever had," added Howard. "He was also a member of the Norwood Sportsmen's Association with me. He was such a great man."

Maloney called Hayes "a wealth of knowledge."

Donahue added that the Norwood Art Association lost its co-founder, Inez Reardon, earlier this month.

"She was able to take the Norwood Art Association and turn it into quite a professional group," she said.

On a brighter note, General Manager Tony Mazzucco discussed the upcoming informa-

tional meeting on Thursday, Sept. 20 on solar power at the Norwood Landfill. The meeting will take place at the Norwood Police Department community room at 137 Nahatan St. Tangent Energy will give a presentation.

"The proposed use of solar power will generate one percent



## A HELPING HAND

One of the things that make this country great is that, no matter who you are or what you face, there is probably someone willing to extend a helping hand and lift you out of your woes.

While yet another vicious hurricane barrels down on the southern East Coast, the call is again out for folks to prepare, keep safe, and evacuate. Some will heed the warnings; some will not.

What makes America great? We care. We always have, and always will. This nation, in war and peace, the normal and abnormal, always finds a way to stand tall and look out for the common man.

Our prayers go out to anyone in the path of the storms that will bubble out from the ocean this hurricane season. We also pray that those scarred by the events of 9/11 will find comfort, solace, and whatever help they need to move forward and beyond.

## FORBES HILL: WHERE DO I START?

To the Editor:

My understanding is that not one person on the committee is a conservationist. It appears that most members are business oriented. The committee should have included Al Goetz, someone from the Rec Dept., someone from the Trails Subcommittee, and some citizen conservationists. This would have given it an equal and balanced membership. It is no surprise that they just want to get rid of the property. Doesn't anyone on that committee get it about how building more housing and taking away open space DOES impact our 40B ratios. This means we will again be cursed with more apartment developments, more ruined open space, and ruined neighborhoods in the not too distant future. Gee, I wonder why that new exclusive housing development off Endicott Street got away with not including affordable housing? AND why in the Endicott Street neighborhood did they put a dog training business where a nice park could have been created?

Norwood has not bought any open space land since 1976 – unheard of in towns. We should have bought the property off of Morse Street instead of letting it become vulnerable to what has happened, especially since it's near Endean Park. Instead the focus has been too much on big businesses, car storage lots, car dealers, and apartment complexes. It's also a shame that instead of a bank going up next to Dunkin's on Nahatan that that land couldn't have been left unbuilt and landscaped for use by the new apartments. Boy what traffic there will be on Nahatan when Avalon and Plimpton apartments open on top of that new bank and the apartments there! In a short stretch from Washington Street to Pleasant (1 mile) you will have increased stop and go traffic dealing with six lights. Sorry I digress.

The Survey – I'd like to know how many were turned in out of the 22,369 residents ages 18 to 85+ in Norwood. If only a fraction or even a third responded, that DOES NOT give

this committee a mandate to sell the property to business or housing developers. It means they have to do more work to present more viable choices that have research behind them. Personally, I feel anyone not paying homeowners' property taxes should not have a say, as we are the ones who are most impacted by anything done at Forbes.

Secondly, I wonder if their decision (survey takers, too) is a gut reaction to the Forbes property expense combined with St. Gabriel's repairs, pending town hall renovations, and the HUGE tax increase homeowners got this year. A fast buck now could have negative impact in the near future. Did anyone happen to notice the timing of John Carrol's exit?

Here are a number of things that could have been researched and pursued regarding the Mansion before a survey ever went out:

- \* Music conservatory providing lessons (instrument and voice) and concerts throughout the year. Approaching BSO, Boston Philharmonic, the POPs, Berklee College, Lyric Opera, (Ernie Boch??), for help and insight; grant funding. (look at Hingham's Conservatory)
- \* Dance studio: ballet, jazz, tap, modern, etc... (look at Newton Lower Falls and Needham)
- \* Art studio rental space (numerous complexes like this across the state; Pittsfield and N. Adams come to mind)
- \* Writers' Retreat (various spots in the state); grant funding again
- \* Look into and how they preserved Bird Park in Walpole
- \* A solar farm to generate electricity for the town and help reduce bills (Why don't we have one at the dump like Braintree, Marshfield, Randolph, Rockland, and Scituate? Randolph got almost half a mil. in revenue from theirs.)

These ideas and more could have been presented in "open house" meetings downtown over the course of a year (scheduled for both days and nights for maximum turnout). Yes, this would take work (you volunteered) and have perhaps taken two years to do, but haste ALWAYS makes waste in the long

run.

I was literally sickened by what had been done by greedy Big Business to the historic insides of Forbes. Oh well, I guess the town was more interested in business bucks and instant gratification than trying to see if the building could have been grant funded and/or gone on the historic register. Forbes was every bit as historical and culturally important as the Day and Morse Houses and the Red Brick School House.

Finally, did anyone bother to consult Recreation and Trails for ideas? What about keeping a chunk of open space for cross country skiing or a challenge course or a nature reserve? Maybe the Audubon Society might have suggestions. Gee I wonder where all the displaced critters are going to go? Has anyone checked for endangered or protected plant/animal species? There are certainly some in Hennessey Field why not elsewhere?

Why are we taking a pristine location and destroying it with business and housing development! Why do you think we ended up with the 40B messes that we have. The quality of life in my neighborhood is going to radically change and not for the better thanks to Avalon and Plimpton Press apartment developments.

One final comment – I volunteered for Forbes but did not make the cut.

of the Town's power usage," Mazzucco said after the meeting. "This amounts to about 15 minutes. There are still some regulation hurdles.

"But you have a landfill that is not being used," he continued. "It is out of sight. The technology is far less invasive than wind. It is beneficial for

the environment and is a cost-saving factor for the consumer. It seems like a win-win for the Town."

On another environmental topic, Donahue urged residents to attend the upcoming Open Space and Recreation Plan meeting on October 16 in the Willet Room at Town Hall.

"We need your help," Donahue said, "We want to hear from everyone about what you would like to see in Norwood. Some of the options she mentioned after the meet-

ing included a dog park and walking trails.

Norwood Day was a huge success. The Board thanked everyone involved, from the marching bands to the high school volunteers, to the Department of Public Works for keeping the Town spotless after the celebration was over.

"There was not a piece of paper or a pothole or a tin can left," said Bishop.

The next Selectmen's meeting will be Tuesday, September 25 at 7 p.m.

# Fire does significant damage to 599 Washington St.

A fire in the roof of the building at 599 Washington St. in Norwood caused hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of damage to both businesses and the structure itself.

According to Norwood Fire Department Chief George Morrice, the first call came in at 11:21 a.m.

"We were on scene until

roughly 2:40 p.m. with most of our apparatuses," he said. "It went to a second alarm, and there was heavy fire in the cockloft area of the building."

Morrice said the cockloft, or small attic area, had several layers of building material, which made the fire difficult to get at.

"There were multiple ceilings on the second floor, there was a drop ceiling, a horse hair layer and then the

cockloft to the roof," he said. "It was a very physically-laborious process to get to the fire and attack it."

Morrice said that at this time, there was no reason to think the fire was inten-

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

the Neponset River (84 Morse St.).

In keeping with this theme, Hern began Monday's session with another major "Saints Lot" announcement, contingent on Boch's eventual purchase of the property:

"I'm here to tell the Board, and the public this evening, that my client has agreed that they're willing to allow the Town the opportunity to buy the property... They're willing to hold open for a year the possibility for the Town to purchase that lot."

Hern explained the applicant's decision, alluding to ongoing talk of potentially using Community Preservation Act funds to purchase the wooded, river/brook bordered parcel:

"This is a request we've heard from many people, and it seems that it would give the Town what many have asked for. At the same time, my client is willing to do this, and they said it would be fair for all concerned."

As with the Aug. 13 "Saints Lot" announcement, this one – according to Hern – was also a late development finalized shortly before Monday night's meeting.

Immediately after making it, he requested a continuance:

"That will allow us to be sure that we've submitted everything that needs to be submitted, to respond to the comments that the Planning Department has, and to also be able to review what we've only received today, including multiple letters on different issues. It allows us also time to work out that language (regarding the Town's option to purchase)."

The motion was made to continue the hearing as a couple of people in the murmuring crowd raised their hands, one asking (un-invited) if questions were being taken.

"Not at this time," Chairman Joe Sheehan answered.

"Not at this time. Thank you very much," the woman replied as she got up and left.

Sheehan went on to explain why no questions were being heard at that time:

"It wouldn't be efficient to have everyone asking questions and (giving) answers when we don't have a finished plan in front of us."

Upon suggestion from Boch Automotive Vice President Michael Clemmey, the floor was, however, opened for public commentary after the motion was withdrawn.

Despite this, only five members of the audience took advantage, and it lacked the intensity of the earlier sessions, with one suggestion – to sell the land to the Town for a dollar – delivered and met with general good humor by the Board, applicant, and crowd.

All questions heard, the motion was made and unanimously accepted to continue the hearing until Sept. 24 at 8 p.m. at Memorial Hall, with the stipulation that the applicant have everything ready within seven days for the Board to have adequate time for review.

The first public hearing of the night – regarding a modification to the special permit for the Subaru lot at 95 Morse St. – was continued, as well.

The modification in question would allow car carriers to unload on site and is integral to the resolution of the 84 Morse St. application, as it currently stands.

As Hern stated in his comments – with the approval of this modification – car carriers would approach the corner lot from Route 1 using Morse Street and then take a left onto Pleasant Street, after which they would access the site by taking another left, unload their inventory, exit back out to Morse Street, and return the way they came.

Unloaded vehicles could then be driven individually to the currently proposed 84 Morse St. car storage facility. This would eliminate one of that application's major points of contention: the car carriers' originally planned Union Street/Washington Street/Short Street delivery route to the site.

The hearing – opened on Aug. 13 – was continued from that date in order to resolve questions regarding the turning radius of car carriers exiting the 95 Morse St. lot.

According to Hern, a plan was filed late last week widening the Morse Street exit and creating an angle for car carriers to avoid crossing the center line into oncoming traffic.

However, because Town Engineer Mark Ryan hadn't yet seen the latest changes made to this plan in response to his initial recommendations, Hern suggested a continuance:

"Because of the timing of everything, I think it would be appropriate for Mr. Ryan to get a look at this, and be able to notify the Planning Department whether he still has any particular concerns."

The Board agreed, voting unanimously to continue the hearing until Sept. 24 at 7:45 p.m.

Due to the immediate continuance, no public commentary was heard.

According to Sheehan, both applications will be voted on together.

The next Planning Board meeting is scheduled for Sept. 24 at 7 p.m. at Memorial Hall.

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tional.

“At this time we determined it was accidental and caused by an unspecified electrical event,” he said.

Morrice said they are still investigating, and said the damage was extensive.

“It’s going to be a lot, there was a lot of damage,” he said. “I don’t know if they’ll end up gutting the building or tearing it down, that will be up to the owner.”

Morrice said there were no injuries reported during the fire, and the towns of Norfolk, Walpole, Westwood, Canton, Foxborough, Stoughton and Sharon all participated in helping to extinguish the flames after the second alarm was called.

Morrice said they are estimating the damage from the fire to be at \$500,000 for the building itself and around \$200,000 for the businesses inside.

Dozens of residents came out to the Town Common during the fire to watch the Norwood Fire Department douse the blaze. Black and orange smoke emanated from the building while firefighters went inside to take down the ceilings and get at the fire. That entire section of Washington Street was closed to traffic during the incident.

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signage once a year for the Draper Building and once every six months (maximum) for the six light poles. The rub in that request was that the Hospital was asking that they not have to come back to the ZBA every time they want to put up a new sign.

ZBA member Philip Riley and Town Counsel David DeLuca took issue with this in the past week. DeLuca contended, according to Hern’s recount of correspondence earlier that day, that the ZBA does not have the legal authority to grant what would essentially be a permanent zoning relief, even if the ZBA had the ability to review any sign that went in.

Hern presented what he felt was a compromise, which was ultimately rejected by the board. Riley said he had a problem with the language of the filing.

“Here in paragraph B, it

says ‘a series of double banner signs,’” he said. “I don’t think I’m prepared to vote to commit allowance for the hospital to put up an unknown series of signs because, it seems to me, as blanket approval for something they can do along the way. I want to see what you are putting up. My guess is I’m not going to have a problem with it.”

Riley said he wanted to continue to approve signage on a case-by-case basis, as he said he was uncomfortable approving anything that had the legal right to be changed within a period of time.

“I think we should continue on a case-by-case basis. For the moment, if all we’re voting on is the banner we’ve currently seen, and I don’t have a problem with that, I don’t have a problem with double banner signs on the light poles, but I don’t want approve that you could just

put up a series of signs.”

Residents Judith Howard and Fred Meyer said they had problems with the light pole banners themselves. Meyer pointed out that there have been some high-profile motor vehicle collisions in that area of the Town recently where people had been killed.

“Anything that’s going to distract drivers is not going to help the town. The sign on the building is one thing, but the signs on the poles will distract drivers based on the precedents,” he said.

Hern said they didn’t have to have the light pole signs and the hospital’s position was they would take them out of the request.

“If we had to pick our druthers the sign on Draper is our first preference,” he said.

ZBA Chair Patrick Mulvehill said he was glad to be finishing this debate.

“We’re, quite honestly, spending far too much time on this. I mean it’s three meetings on a sign,” he said. “This just seems like overkill, and we have case precedent we granted you three years ago. I think it was a reasonable grant.”
