## Expanded community garden proves very popular

Tucked away off Mylod Street in South Norwood, near the Walpole line, is a quiet place of tranquility and collective purpose.

It is a place that Susan Clare spends much of her time, from the time the first warming rays of spring thaw the frozen ground to when the final fleeting gasps of autumn finally give way to another winter.

On this land, Clare and many others have built a small community within a much larger one.

"I think the words are in the right order: community and then garden. That's what it is, a community first. The only success we have out here is for all of us," said Clare, who started the Endean Community Garden on a small plot of town-owned conservation land at Endean Park last year.

The garden, which is entirely or-

ganic, is something of an extension of Together Yes, the nonprofit organization Clare helped launch in Norwood. The group is dedicated to spreading the message of conservation and sustainability.

The Endean Community Garden gives physical presentation to these oft used concepts, and the idea of 'green' living.

"The whole town can be somewhat educated by what we do here. We want it to be educational," said Clare. "We try to keep it as natural as we can and as attractive as we can."

In its inaugural growing season last year, the Community Garden drew 32 families to pay a \$10 fee to have a plot to grow their own organic goods, with assistance from the town to plow and water the land. Space was limited, yet to garden was such an instant success that Clare had to create a waiting list of families wanting to purchase a plot.

With the expansion of another quar-

ter acre on the site, this year's gardening space has doubled to 64 plots. Clare said she still has a waiting list.

"We started at the end of April. By the end of May, we had a waiting list," she said.

Alberta Dugo is one of the many who purchased a plot as soon as the garden was announced last year. She grows zucchini, tomatoes, green beans, corn and cucumber, among other things.

"I've been waiting for years for something like this. I love it," said Dugo. "I used to live in Brookline and they have the Larz Anderson Park, and I had a garden there. The good thing about this is the location. You get almost 100 percent sun."

Aside from the expansion, Clare has also introduced a few new initiatives

this year, including weekly food deliveries to the Norwood Food Pantry. She said last year farmers were merely asked to give some of their extra crops to the pantry, but this year it will occur every Saturday morning beginning this week.

Additionally, the Community Garden now has a beekeeper on board. Local beekeeper Gerry Canelli, husband of Library Director Charlotte Canelli, has installed a beehive at the garden and has been showing people how to care for bees and produce honey.

Also this year, Together Yes has begun working with the Kevin F. Maguire Senior Housing complex on Brookview Circle to enhance their garden and

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# Planning Board approves DPW project

The Planning Board has granted major site-plan approval and special permits for the construction of new Department of Public Works (DPW) facilities on Lyman Place and Lenox and Winter streets.

In three separate votes Monday night, the board approved plans for construction of three buildings on Lyman Place, one on Lenox Street and two on Winter Street.

The project still must go to the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) for at least one variance and to Town Meeting for funding.

The replacement of aging public works facilities has long been a need for Norwood, said DPW Director Mark Ryan.

"The existing facilities are

inadequate for what we do," said Ryan. "Since 1987, we've been looking for that new magic site in Norwood [for a DPW yard]. We think we have the right plan. We have a good project. We know that it works."

Jeff Alberti of Weston & Sampson, the Peabody firm acting as project engineer, gave a full presentation on each of the three sites covered in the DPW project. On Lyman Place, the current structures will be replaced by an administrative building, vehicle wash and storage bay and salt shed. This will allow the department to keep all of its vehicles under cover and create a centralized public-works operation, he said.

There will be additional upgrades to the site, including sidewalks and crosswalks, and new water, sewer and storm-water

systems, he said.

"Overall, this will really address the short- and long-term needs of the Public Works Department," said Alberti. "We've provided the infrastructure in terms of sidewalks and crosswalks to create safe access."

Across the train tracks on Lenox Street, a small storage and workshop building will be constructed next to another building the town acquired and is already using as public works space. This is where a variance will be needed with the ZBA for setback relief to position the new building on the site.

The Winter Street plan includes an emergency backup salt shed and a storage shed for off-season equipment. Alberti noted that the DPW currently stores its

make it handicap-accessible while giving gardening tips to the residents. The Girl Scouts have been helping out with that project, said Clare.

"At first, they were a little nervous about the garden. But they've taken it over and really made it their own," said Clare of the residents of the Maguire complex.

The Community Garden will also be making an appearance at the Norwood Farmers' Market on Aug. 20, where children will have the opportunity to plant their own seeds into pots and take them home to watch them grow. Clare said she has also reached out to the

schools about having students come to the garden for class trips, but nothing has materialized yet with that.

Clare said the most important thing with the Community Garden is just that: the sense of community.

"When you gather a group of people wanting to get together and grow organic, you've got a really good group of people," she said. "We have gardeners who really know what they're doing and gardeners who have never grown anything before. We become a model for how to develop a community. The gardeners

take care of each other. If you go on vacation and can't maintain your plot, somebody's going to help you."

Clare said she maintains an email list for anyone who needs assistance watering or trimming their plants.

"Norwood was ready for this. All they needed was the information and an opportunity. They got the opportunity with this conservation land," she said.

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# DPW project budget holds steady before bids

The quest to bring modern Department of Public Works (DPW) facilities to Norwood reached somewhat of a milestone last week, with the announcement of a final cost estimate for the project.

Bryan Jarvis of Compass Project Management, the Medfield firm acting as consultant on behalf of the town, presented the project budget estimate at last Thursday night's Permanent Building Construction Committee (PBCC) meeting.

Jarvis said there were actually two estimates - one coming from Compass and another from project engineers Weston & Sampson of Peabody - and both came in very close to the previous estimate of \$16.3 million that was announced back at the end of May. Construction costs are estimated at \$14.3 million.

"We're still tracking very consistent. That was an encouraging sign," said Jarvis.

Prior to the last two cost estimates, the DPW project was expected to cost in the \$14 million range, however there have been some unanticipated ex-

penses mainly having to do with soil treatment. At the same time, the project team has worked to cut costs in other ways, including reducing the size of the new administration building planned for Lyman Place.

Jarvis said this will be the final cost estimate until there is an actual construction bid proposal, which the PBCC would then present to the next Town Meeting in the fall.

Jarvis said there have already been over 100 responses to a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) advertisement seeking potential builders that was published a few weeks ago. He said there will be pre-qualification meetings in the coming weeks to review all of the applications.

However, town officials have yet to decide how to fund the new DPW buildings, which include new vehicle and salt storage bays on Lyman Place and additional facilities on Lenox and Winter streets. The two scenarios discussed thus far have been a borrowing article or a debt-exclusion, a type of Proposition 2 1/2 override that involves raising property taxes to pay down debt for a specific project. Long-term borrowing would require Town Meeting

approval, while the override would go to the voters as a town-wide ballot question.

Town Manager John Carroll has announced plans to form a special committee to explore these and other potential funding sources for the project.

Meanwhile, Jarvis said he expects within a couple of weeks to have written approval from the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority (MBTA) to do some re-grading work along the train tracks that abut Lyman Place. Project officials have been working for some time to gain approval for the work, which is necessary to build the new vehicle storage and maintenance building.

"We did have two very productive meetings with the MBTA since the last [PBCC] meeting," said Jarvis. "We met on site this past Monday, [June 8] with them. They were very receptive to the proposal. They're looking at all the options."

### Town Hall project

The other project the PBCC is currently overseeing - exterior historic restoration at Norwood Town Hall - is running into a bit

emergency salt supply outdoors covered with tarp and tires.

Planning Board member Paul Donohue was concerned that the off-season building as appeared on the renderings was white. He felt that more muted earth tones would be more in keeping with the surroundings, including the Highland Cemetery.

Town Manager John Carroll said the building would not be seen from either the cemetery or Winter Street, but Alberti nonetheless said the color could be changed.

Of the Lyman Place plan, board member Debbie Holmwood said the town has done much work in recent years to improve the look of the downtown, and questioned whether the buildings were in keeping with that high standard.

"I know they're just for pulling trucks in and out, but it's still

right in the middle of our downtown," she said.

Ryan said the buildings would look attractive on the site, noting that much consideration went into creating something that would not overwhelm the surrounding structures like the Civic Center and Town Hall.

"The architect put a lot of work into making it as aesthetically pleasing as possible," he said.

"We can't make it look like the Civic and we can't make it look like Town Hall, but we've got to make it fit. We feel like it fits in," added Bill Kinsman, chairman of the Permanent Building Construction Committee (PBCC), which is overseeing the project.

The board was unanimous on the Lyman Place and Lenox Street plans, although Holmwood did object to the 20-foot setback requirement on

Lenox Street being brought down to 10 feet. Holmwood also cast the lone dissenting vote against the Winter Street buildings, as she felt they could have been better positioned on the site.

## A little Trayvon here at home

We didn't sit on that jury day after day, week after week, listening to the mountains of evidence presented by both the prosecution and defense teams, so our opinion as to the guilt or innocence of George Zimmerman is as irrelevant as yours. However, what no one can deny is that Trayvon Martin is dead because George Zimmerman thought he looked suspicious and went to investigate. If Zimmerman hadn't gotten out of his car that night and pursued Martin, the young man would still be alive. That is a fact, and it is indisputable.

Reports of suspicious activity are vital to law enforcement authorities. Here in Norwood calls by residents to police of what doesn't look quite right in their neighborhoods are littered throughout the police logs we publish on these pages weekly, and are growing in number as more and more homes are being broken into and the department requests more assistance from those living in the area. What also appear to be increasing are the calls of suspicion concerning black men. We have no statistical data to back up our observations, but we are the ones who pore through the logs every week and produce the final product in the newspaper, and it certainly appears to be a growing trend.

Years ago we received a call from a reader asking if it was necessary to distinguish in the logs whether a person was black. His point was that it was unnecessary and unfair given that the logs don't mention in the entries if a person is white and only serves to perpetuate the idea that black men are the cause of the majority of criminal activity in town. It was a good point, and we considered it closely, but ultimately decided that our job as a newspaper was not to fine tune the police log, but to report the calls as provided by the department. We do edit the logs for length and cut out many of what we consider to be less important notations, but we never change the substance of an entry.

If you follow the logs weekly, you too will have read of a call that notified police of a black man running down the sidewalk on a weekday afternoon in the rain. It didn't mention that he had a gun in his hand or had a white woman slung over his shoulder, he was just a black man running down Washington Street in South Norwood in the rain. This looked suspicious to someone. What are the chances that the caller would have notified police if the runner was white?

Calls of black men walking in certain neighborhoods or sitting in cars for extended periods are showing up more and more. Are black men causing more and more crime in town? Quite frankly, we don't know, but it is hard to believe that the increase of black crime is growing correspondingly with the number of log entries. What we do believe is that Norwood is becoming less and less homogenous and many long time Norwood residents are having a hard time adjusting. Over time assimilation is inevitable and the trends of suspicion currently permeating will lessen.

Recently, Governor Deval Patrick was quoted as saying that parents of young white men do not need to have "the talk" with their kids, unlike parents of black children, and he wasn't referring to the birds and the bees. He was making clear that white America still has very little idea of the difficulties black people, particularly young black men, face every day, including the reality that if you should venture into a neighborhood where "you don't belong" even if it's just to buy some candy and a coke, it may cost you your life. Or, at a minimum, running down Washington Street in the rain in the middle of the afternoon may warrant you being stopped and questioned. That is a fact, and it is indisputable.

of a snag with respect to costs.

Jeff D'Amico of Compass Management informed the committee that the price tag to repair and replace some of the wood tracery around the window arches of Memorial Hall is going to be greater than initially thought. Much of the wood has sustained a great deal more damage over time than was thought before the work began. When D'Amico brought this to the committee's attention at a previous meeting, it was estimated that the repair work would be around \$25,000.

According to D'Amico, however, the contractor has quoted a price of \$77,000 to do the work, with three laborers working over 21 days. PBCC members agreed that the work should be done, but questioned the contractor's es-

timates.

"That's a lot of time," said committee member Ted Callahan of the 21 days. "We should approve these repairs, but we should try to negotiate down the hours a little first."

PBCC member Ed McKenna agreed with the first point, saying, "We have to do the work. If you look up there, it's abominable."

Following the discussion, the committee urged D'Amico to negotiate a lower cost with the contractor to bring back to the next meeting.

Another price increase involves repair of a sagging 40-square-foot section of plaster ceiling in the Selectmen's conference room. Upon inspection, it was discovered that there is a second ceiling above the plas-

ter ceiling, which D'Amico said also has water damage and needs to be repaired. That will increase the cost for this work from \$15,000 to around \$24,000, he said.

"The amount of work has significantly increased from the original scope a year ago," D'Amico said. "The second ceiling needs to be replaced. The plaster has turned to dust."

PBCC Chairman Bill Kinsman also told the committee that Carroll was requesting that the committee fund the repaving of the parking lot behind Town Hall once the construction crew vacate it. Kinsman noted that this was not in the budget, and that the parking lot may not even be damaged during construction.

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# Police investigating break-ins

The Norwood Police Department is seeking assistance from the public following a string of residential break-ins over the weekend.

According to police reports, four break-ins were reported in Norwood during the weekend in the neighborhood off Pleasant Street between Dean and Gay streets.

One of those targeted was Dr. Fred Rondinelli, a lifelong Norwood resident who lives on Pleasant Street and runs the Allied Advance Physical Therapy office on Washington Street.

Rondinelli said he and his wife came home Friday night around 9:30 p.m. to discover that the screen window in their kitchen had been damaged and a

small pot had been knocked over and broken.

They also found that someone had stolen a laptop, iPod and designer bag from the kitchen and gone through their mail and taken an envelope containing a gift card.

"They tried to break in through the sliding door, which is on the back of the house, but they couldn't get the lock popped. So they pried the window open with what appeared to be a crowbar, and punched in the screen," said Rondinelli, who said he could "care less" about the stolen items except for the fact that his son's pictures were on the laptop and can't be replaced.

Rondinelli said he was out of the house most of the day on Friday. However, his wife did drop

in around 5 p.m. and his brother-in-law, who lives next door, was mowing his lawn until near dark.

"It was quick," he said of the break-in.

Similar break-ins were reported on Sunnyside Road on Saturday around 11:30 p.m., on Lawndale Road on Sunday at 2:15 p.m. and Pellana Road also on Sunday around 5:40 p.m.

Officer Kevin Grasso, spokesman for the Police Department, said it is unknown at this point if the incidents are connected. He did indicate that all four homes were entered from the rear, and urged residents to remain vigilant and make their homes appear occupied even when they're not.

"If something looks suspicious, call us," he said. "We do need help from the public."

# Staged mock child abduction

The Norwood Police Department will be conducting a mock child abduction drill in the Westover Park neighborhood on the morning of Wednesday, July 24.

There will be a strong police presence in the neighborhood on this day, however police are notifying residents that it is only a training exercise.

Police Chief Bill Brooks said in a letter to Selectmen that he volunteered the town for the site of the drill, which is part of the Metropolitan Law Enforcement Council's Child Abduction Response Team (Metro-CART).

"Metro-CART is a multi-

agency investigative unit designed to provide a rapid and coordinated response should a child be abducted within the region served by Metro. I served as its commanding officer until my appointment as Norwood's police chief in May of 2012," said Brooks in the letter, noting that he was also involved with starting the child-abduction unit when he was deputy chief in Wellesley.

Brooks said that of the 100 or so similar response units in the country, only 17 are nationally certified. The mock child abduction drill is a required step for Metro-CART to gain national certification, he said.

"The assessment unit will be

here on July 23 and will conduct meetings and planning sessions all day. The drill will take place the morning of July 24 and will likely entail a ground search for a simulated lost child," said Brooks. "In addition to the town providing a service to Metro in hosting the exercise, this will be an invaluable training opportunity for the Norwood Police Department."

Brooks said the team will likely use the nearby Cleveland Elementary School as a staging area for the operation. He said neighbors were notified well in advance of the drill. A pre-drill meeting was held at the Norwood police station July 10.

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# Board hears dispute over new TD Bank

The Planning Board held off this week taking action on a plan to build a new bank at the site of an existing gas station in Norwood.

Arista Development LLC is proposing to raze the existing Mobile station at 143 Nahatan St. and replace it with a 2,500-square-foot TD Bank with two drive-thru lanes.

According to its attorney Phillip Macchi II, Norwood-based Arista has signed a 20-year lease with four 5-year extension options to redevelop the property. The site is owned under a real estate trust in Dartmouth.

Macchi said the project has gone through town department review and will have no negative impacts on the town in terms of traffic or safety. On the positive side, the plan involves adding nearly 2,000 square feet of landscaping to the site and "significant upgrade" to the storm-water management system. The development will also bring both temporary construction jobs and permanent banking positions, said Macchi.

"The whole idea was to have a nice, attractive place for people to come in and enjoy and do their banking," he said at the

hearing Monday night. "We believe we provide everything that's required. We feel that this development will be a benefit both to the town and to the residents."

Matt Smith of Bohler Engineering presented additional details and renderings of the new bank, which he said is planned as a LEED-certified building in terms of energy efficiency. He said there will be around eight employees working during each shift.

It emerged during the hearing that there has been some dispute between Arista and the owners of Concannon's Village, the pub behind the Mobile station at 60 Lenox St., regarding aspects of the proposed redevelopment. Brian Concannon outlined some of these issues, including reconfiguring the shared right of way off Lenox Street that accesses both businesses.

Concannon argued that the design as currently proposed creates confusion as to where his customers would enter and exit his establishment. The current driveway is technically a two-way entrance and exit point to the pub and the gas station, however Concannon said it is too narrow for cars to come and go simultaneously.

Smith said there is no room to widen the right of way without obstructing the proposed

bank drive-thru, noting that there is also a steep grade change on the site.

"With the current right of way we have, we feel it will create confusion and it becomes a safety issue for our customers," said Concannon of the redevelopment.

Planning Board member Ernie Paciorkowski asked if more visible signage off Lenox Street directing customers to the right location would help. Concannon said it might, but added that the placement of new trees along Lenox Street will create a visibility issue for drivers.

Concannon said he was opposed to a plan to make the right of way a one-way entrance.

"We're willing to do anything within reason. We cannot widen that driveway to 24 feet," said John Stewart of Arista. "Unfortunately the lot is small. We didn't create this problem. Neither one of us have been able to come up with a scenario that makes everyone happy."

Following the discussion, the Planning Board voted to continue the hearing to the next meeting Aug. 12 to give the two parties more time to hopefully resolve the issue.

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# Lawmakers petition state housing chief in 40B fight

Norwood's representatives at the State House are taking another stab at amending the state's highly debated, 44-year-old affordable-housing law. Chapter 40B, which was enacted in 1969, allows housing developers in certain instances to skirt local zoning laws if they provide the necessary affordable units under the statute.

Chapter 40B dictates that all communities in the Commonwealth must provide at least 10 percent affordable housing as defined under the law.

In towns like Norwood that have yet to meet the 10-percent threshold, developers are free to pursue 40B housing projects that are often of much greater density than would otherwise be allowed under neighborhood zoning bylaws. This is the case as long as the development provides at least 25 percent affordable units.

In a recent letter to Secretary of Housing and Economic Development Greg Bialecki, state Sen. Mike Rush and Rep. John Rogers laid out the case for Norwood and other towns that

face challenges with the 40B law given that these communities already have a large percentage of rental-unit apartments. For example, about 40 percent of Norwood's 12,256 housing units are deemed affordable, yet the town is only providing 5.5 percent affordable housing as classified by the state's Subsidized Housing Inventory (SHI).

"Many of these communities wish to comply as quickly as possible with the requirements of Chapter 40B. However, they wish to do so through owner-occupied units. This would also address the need for first-time home ownership in the Commonwealth," said the letter.

Rush and Rogers also argue that community leaders are often discouraged from pushing developers toward owner-occupied condominium developments as opposed to apartments, not by 40B but by the way the state currently counts subsidized housing units.

For example, in a rental development of 100 units, where 25 percent of the units are to be occupied by income-eligible households, all 100 would count toward that 10-percent goal. But in an owner-occupied

development of the same unit count, only 25 SHI units would be counted toward the 10-percent goal.

The letter does not call for legislative change to 40B, arguing that it is the DHCD that dictates the amount of units that count toward the 10 percent. The letter ultimately asks the DHCH to consider a proposal: In communities with over 30 percent rental units, all 40B units - rental or owner-occupied - should count toward the community's 10-percent goal.

Selectman Allan Howard praised this effort, saying that while it may be a "long shot" it is worth the effort to try to lift the burden on towns like Norwood that already have more rental units than they can handle.

"Just like that letter says very clearly, we've more than done our share here for many years. And that's not even taking into consideration the well over 1,000 Section 8 vouchers that we have," said Howard. "The fact is we're doing our part in this town to help people get reasonable-cost living quarters. We deserve a break."
