## Moderna and McDonald's — at Planning Board —

The Planning Board met on Monday evening, July 16 at Town Hall for a session that lasted two and hours and 15 minutes and featured five appointments.

Major items on the agenda included a site plan approval for Moderna Therapeutics, discussion of a special permit violation for the new McDonald's on Everett Street and Route 1, and its first official meeting with Town Manager Tony Mazucco.

The first appointment concerned the site plan approval for Moderna, located at 100 Tech Drive off of Plantingfield Road in the Upland Woods limited

manufacturing subdivision.

David Mackwell of Kelly Engineering, and Timothy Layne of DPS Engineering – representing Moderna – updated the Board regarding the latest site plans using a number of diagrams with Mackwell, at one point, synopsisizing what was being done:

“This project is really a building renovation that has some trickle down to the site. Those site improvements... are constructing a loading area within the old building footprint, adding a fence to the entire property and some security. Making a few improvements around the building for some mechanical areas, some trash recycling, and add-

## ZBA closes hearing on medical marijuana

The Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) met on Tuesday evening, July 17 at the community room of the Police and Fire Station (137 Nahatan St.). About 20 were in attendance.

The main item on the agenda was the continuation of the public hearing regarding Middlesex Integrative Medicine's (MIM) application for a special permit in order to obtain a license to operate a registered marijuana dispensary that it has proposed for 76 Astor Ave.

The hearing continued with Chairman Patrick Mulvehill reviewing the hearing and restating his position – after having visited both Goldfish and Velocity – that he believed they fell within the buffer

zone's guidelines.

Attorney Richard Staiti, for his part, opened by touching on the case law supporting his interpretation of the two businesses not falling within the “school” or “recreational facility” category while also going over MIM's cooperation with the Town in its effort to open its business in the Vanderbilt section of Town: one of its two medical marijuana overlay districts.

Paul Eysie – speaking first after Mulvehill – reiterated his support for the project and his reasons for them, while Jack Perry – speaking after Eysie – was more in favor of it than he had been in the first session of the hearing, while also informing his decision by his interpretation of the Town's zoning regarding marijuana dis-

## Three aces in the hole for local golfer

A hole in one.

For a golfer – even a very good golfer – to be able to go from the tee to the bottom of the hole in one lone shot and mark a “1” down on the scorecard is a mantelpiece rarity.

But three? With the third one 41 years after the second? That's something else altogether.

The same could be said for Norwood's Bob Lieberman, owner of a set of aces that spans 57 years from 1961 to 2018 and speaks of sustained golf excellence... and a little luck.

The 75-year-old who works on the course at the Norwood Country Club

scored his latest hole in one on Tuesday morning, June 12 while playing the back nine by himself, specifically because it was empty.

Starting off with a par and two bogeys (4, 5, 6), Lieberman stepped up to the 13th tee – a Par 3 playing 137 yards from tee to pin that morning – and pulled a 7 iron from his bag.

“Maybe in the early years it might have been maybe an 8,” Lieberman said while chuckling a little as he went over the details while sitting at his kitchen table. “But it was a 7 iron that I hit and...” so sent his shot up into the wind and toward the flagstick.

“This one was going kind of a wee

# FinCom approves reserve transfer for COA garage

The Finance Commission met on Thursday evening, July 12 at Town Hall for a brief meeting during which it addressed a reserve fund request for a construction project.

David Hajjar was absent.

The main item on the agenda was a reserve fund request in the amount of \$17,000 in order to complete the garage at the Council on Aging (COA) located at 275 Prospect St.

Assistant Town Manager Bernie Cooper and Property Manager Cathy Carney went before the Commission to update it on the project and to explain why the money already allocated to the project was insufficient to complete it.

According to Cooper, a major factor involved in the reserve request is the fact that building costs have been steadily skyrocketing, as of late.

"Anybody who has tried to get home repairs done recently has probably gone into sticker

shock. I know I have," he put forward as a relative comparison.

Cooper added to this another contributing factor:

"The original estimate was done quite some time ago. This was done well before the Annual Town Meeting last year. It was actually done the prior fall."

As Carney explained it, Town Meeting had allocated \$55,000 for the construction of the two-bay garage located behind the Senior Center, with the Friends of the Council on Aging contributing \$25,000 and grant money in the amount of \$10,000 making up the balance.

"We really thought that was going to be sufficient," she explained and – in the fall of 2017 – the Town went to bid for a wood framed building.

When it became clear that this would be too expensive, the focus changed to a pre-built metal building in January, 2018, only to roughly coincide

## Town Hall confusion and frustration at PBCC

The Permanent Building Construction Committee (PBCC) met on Thursday evening, July 12 at Town Hall for a meeting that fell just shy of two and a half hours.

Francis Hopcroft and Steve O'Connor were absent.

Appearing before the Committee were St. Gabriel's Chapel restoration project OPM (Owner's Project Manager) John Racine of RGB, as well as Dale Gienapp and Michael Nee of Gienapp Design.

All three were there to present an update on the Chapel, while Gienapp and Nee were also there to update the Committee on its plans for trying to solve the intermittent problem of the leaking windows on the North side of Town Hall.

Although these appointments took up the brunt of the session, the agenda item concerning the Town Hall renovation – which has experienced several changes in scope over the first half of the year, and for which finances were temporarily frozen by Town Manager Tony Mazzucco on June 12 – proved to be most noteworthy.

The Committee discussion regarding the renovation proved to be a disjointed one, with seemingly every aspect of the project was brought up at various points over its 40 minutes; from the most recent schematic scope, to the circumstances surrounding Mazzucco's financial freeze, to statements and re-statements of explanation regarding project objectives, to the PBCC's next steps regarding the matter.

Ted Callahan started things off by broadly informing the rest of the Committee on his and Chairman Robert Silk's June 29 meeting with Mazzucco regarding the project's pause.

Silk also proposed that the Committee ask for a schematic design estimate from McGinley, Kalsow (the firm handling the Town Hall renovation) "to see what we can do for the \$900,000 (allocated to the project by Town Meeting)."

This led to commentary from Chris Eberly, who explained as his rationale for arguing for – and getting – an increased project scope as his envisioning of "an enhanced, developed master plan" for

I know it can work, I've seen them do it with an elephant in the movie, "Operation Dumbo Drop". It just takes a little ingenuity.

Okay, perhaps the above idea is a little beyond the pale, but not much more so than the ever evolving plan by the Boch group to try and make the proposed parking site at 84 Morse St. seem even better for the Town of Norwood than it already appears. To sum it up, their plan is to use big car carriers, up to seven times a day, to carry up to nine cars on each load to Morse Street. ## RUSH SUPPORTS WE THE PEOPLE RESOLUTION

To the Editor:

Sen. Mike Rush deserves Thanks for his efforts in supporting the We the People Resolution, Senate Bill S2243.

The U.S. Supreme Court ruled that political spending is a form of protected speech under the First Amendment. The government may not keep corporations from spending money to support or denounce individual candidates in elections. This decision is known as the Citizens United Decision. This decision allows unlimited spending by any group on our elections. Our election system is now vulnerable to a floodgate of Dark Money. The term Dark Money refers to money that pours into our elections from undisclosed sources.

Right now, corporations and big money are controlling our elections with unlimited spending capability. This must stop. An amendment to the U.S. Constitution is required to overturn the Citizens United Decision. The We the People Resolution, as originally filed, called on Congress to convene an Amendment Convention. The We the People Resolution specifies that Corporations are Not People and Money is Not Free Speech.

Unfortunately, the provision requesting Congress to convene the Amendment Convention was defeated in the Mass. Senate. An Amendment to the We the People Resolution was filed that removed Massachusetts from joining five other states in calling for the Amendment Proposing Convention. Sen. Rush fought hard to try to defeat this

Amendment.

The We the People Resolution also specified that the Delegates to the Amendment Convention could only act on this one specified purpose only.

Sen. Rush spoke up to defend the need for the Amendment Convention. His valor and efforts to support the Resolution, as originally written, are truly commended.

Any Amendment proposed by the convention would then have to be ratified by ¾ of the States for it to be enacted.

Currently, there is no way that unlimited spending during our elections can be controlled or stopped. The We the People Resolution, as originally written, called on Massachusetts to join other States on Petitioning Congress to convene the Amendment Convention. The Amendment, when ratified, would remove the big money from being able to influence our elections and affect our democracy.

Sen. Rush stood up to get the big money out from influencing our elections. His complete support of the We the People Resolution is greatly appreciated.

pensaries.

“If we don’t have a spot for it (MIM), I believe that – if they successfully appeal a decision against it – then they can go in any zone.” He continued by saying that he couldn’t think of a better place for it than Vanderbilt.

Mulvehill then asked Staiti for help favorably interpreting the section of pertinent buffer zone bylaw reading “other locations where children may congregate in concentrated numbers” and – in doing so – removing Goldfish and Velocity from that category.

“Doesn’t that seal the coffin shut as far as the language on this?” Mulvehill asked.

“These aren’t public places,” Staiti answered.

“Where does it say that?” Mulvehill asked, before answering his own question, “It doesn’t,” and continuing, “It doesn’t say private places either.”

Staiti used the more specific language of the bylaw to form his answer:

“Are they congregating on ball fields, parks, and libraries, or at a place where they’re supervised?” Citing the Goldfish brochure, he continued, “By their own records they’ve said that the parents play a heavy role in supervising their children.”

Regarding Velocity, Staiti added, “They go in, they train, they go home. There’s no lingering around. There’s no loitering around.”

Finishing, he said, “The point is, it’s not like an arcade facility

where you could have kids dropped off. That would be a recreational place. These are places where, basically, there’s some kind of training that goes on; here the parents or guardians play a heavy role.”

Mulvehill asked Town Counsel David DeLuca – brought in for the hearing – to share his legal opinion. Standing to address the Board, applicants, and the audience, the attorney spoke generally of his comparison of the specifics of the case relative to the Town bylaw, before giving his conclusion: “It’s fair to say this: it clearly is not a school. Not as schools are defined in cases like this.”

DeLuca – generally referring to marijuana dispensary case law and sex offender regulations – also expressed concern with categorizing either business as a recreational facility. “It doesn’t com-

pare,” he said. “So I don’t think you have a school. I don’t think you have a recreation facility.”

Referring to the “other locations” aspect of the bylaw, DeLuca came down on the side of Staiti’s argument, saying that the bylaw – in specifying public places – “clearly charts a path... that are along the lines of defining those places as generally public places.”

Riley went further with the “other locations” clause, continuing with the Department of Public Health language that the Town bylaw is informed by referring to “children gathered for a particular purpose in a structured and scheduled manner” to conclude that the Velocity facility “probably meets as precisely as you’re going to find” that language.

After some public comment, the hearing was closed, with the ZBA taking the application under advisement. A decision will be made at the Aug. 7 meeting.

bit to the right of the hole, but when you're looking at it, maybe like a foot or two when I say to the right of the hole," he said. "And it lands on the green, and I can see it's on the upper level because that's where the pin was."

Having golfed – and golfed well – for most of his life, Lieberman watched the ball roll toward the cup "and I said, 'Go ahead. I dare you. Go in.' And about a second later, it disappeared."

"I says, 'Oh my God, I got a hole in one!' While I'm saying that, I'm also having this crazy thought, 'But there's nobody here to verify you got it!' I couldn't believe it!"

In a game so heavily imbued with the honor system, a hole in one without a witness is just as valid, just as much of an accomplishment. But to hit one with a witness, however, provides valuable confirmation, laying any wisps of skepticism at the claim to rest.

And, as good fortune would have it, as Lieberman was in the process of making his hole in one, his witness – probably the best witness – was on his way, arriving just in time.

"I was driving in my car, coming to work, right down our little access path where the 13th hole is," Golf Pro John Resnick recounted of Lieberman's ace. "I saw him hit the shot and then I looked and I saw the ball go in. And then he was celebrating, going berserk... He was celebrating pretty good out there on that 13th tee, with nobody around but me."

Resnick seemed amused thinking back on it, and when

asked if Lieberman had been jumping up and down, responded without hesitation.

"Oh yeah," Resnick said. "He couldn't believe it. I thought it was almost the response when you win the lottery. I think it was pretty special to him."

The details of his first hole in one from 1961 come easily for Lieberman.

"It was the old first hole at Brookline (Municipal Golf Course)," he said. "It's no longer there. It was a 155-yard hole. Par 3. Downhill. I hit a 6 iron."

Recollecting the second, at Brookline's 12th, Lieberman brought up an earlier freak accident at the same hole in which he was hit in the eye with a ricocheting tee that led him – due to an involuntary flinch that he developed during his swing because of that accident – to largely forgo tees and to hit everything, including the driver, off of the turf.

Lieberman's third followed this technique. "That one was off the grass," he confirmed.

Of those 41 years between aces, Lieberman had put down his clubs for at least 20 of them, focusing instead on becoming a successful amateur harness horse racing driver appearing at tracks from Yonkers, N.Y., to Scioto Downs in Ohio, to Plainridge Park locally.

"My wife couldn't stand me doing it," Lieberman said. "She was worried I was going to get killed."

Nonetheless, Lieberman kept at it, driving 100 races over his amateur career.

"It was quite a rush," he

said. "Quite a rush. I enjoyed it so much. But, when you get to a certain age, you realize that it's time to kind of call it quits."

And so he picked the clubs up again, easing back into the game and making this latest golf milestone a possibility made reality.

When asked if he knew of anyone with such a span of years in between aces, Resnick acknowledged that he didn't, adding that, "It's definitely a long time."

He went on to say that there had been two holes in one so far this season, with the first made (on the 8th hole) a week to the day before Lieberman's.

He also said that the Country Club gives out certificates commemorating these events.

As for Lieberman, he has the scorecard and the golf ball (which he had taken fresh from the bag, washed off on the 13th tee, and then pocketed after pulling it from the cup), and a photo of himself and Resnick taken at the 13th green, complete with the shot's details.

At his kitchen table, Lieberman's talk expanded from his latest hole in one to his whole life in golf: from his first golf experiences caddying for his father at Boston's Franklin Park, to making the Brookline High team, to being the 1966 New England medalist for the National Public Links, to being offered the chance to go to the PGA School in 1967, to so many other things that popped up along the way.

Speaking of his June 12 hole in one, Lieberman could have been speaking about all of it.

"I'll tell you, it's a hell of a long time," he said.

Town Hall that could be referred to as smaller Town Hall improvement projects were ordered – as funded – over the coming years.

Speaking of the master plan in relation to the long-term renovation of the building, Eberly spoke of its importance.

"It meant that when we get to the end of this (renovating Town Hall), we didn't have eight different projects that all looked different because they were done over 10 years," Eberly said. "We had one ultimate plan that we were ultimately working towards."

At one emblematic point about 25 minutes into the discussion, Bill O'Connor asked for confirmation that the project had, in fact, been put on hold, to which Silk responded that it was and Callahan responded that it wasn't.

Asked by O'Connor if McGinley Kalsow was actually doing any work on the project at the moment, Callahan responded, referring to an Aug. 7 meeting scheduled between the PBCC and the Board of Selectmen.

"We're trying to get back on track," Callahan said. "We're trying to take this stuff that he (Wendall Kalsow) put together for us in order to come up with some kind of a scheme going forward that can be accepted – going past the Town Manager – right to the Selectmen."

Eberly, who spent the majority of the discussion trying to clarify the independent situations between the PBCC and McGinley Kalsow, and the PBCC and Mazzucco, asked Callahan near the end of the meeting where the Town Manager stood on the project.

"That's what we're going to find out on the 7th," he responded.

"Well, no. Wait a minute Ted," Silk added. "He said to us, 'Come up with a plan.'"

"Well, that's what I'm trying to do."

"That's what we're trying to do," Silk repeated. "We've got to get involved with Kalsow to see what he says."

"So the next step is to hear back from Kalsow," O'Connor confirmed.

To which Eberly asked, "If he doesn't know the full scope of what he needs to do, how does he come up with a plan?"

"If you're confused, try sitting over here," Callahan said.

The PBCC will be appearing before the Board of Selectmen regarding the Town Hall renovation on Tuesday, Aug. 7. Its appointment is scheduled for 7:30 p.m.

In Town Hall leaky window business:

Gienapp and Nee went over a proposal to find the source(s) of water leaks for seven windows on the North side of Town Hall for which this has been an intermittent problem.

The project had been started by Gienapp in April 2015 but leading into a historic drought, the problem did not manifest itself and it never proceeded to the next stage.

After again becoming an issue last winter – and after discussion with the PBCC – Gienapp will amend its original proposal and prepare for the long-delayed Phase 2.

In Chapel stained glass window business:

Gienapp and Nee also went through four change order proposals regarding the window restoration currently underway at St. Gabriel's

Three of the four were tabled, with a modification of 42 steel reinforcing rods to better reduce stress on the windows approved at a cost of \$915.

The PBCC next meets on July 26 at 7:30 p.m. in Room 11 of Town Hall.

ing the loading area.”

The building – which is 136,000 square feet and entirely occupied by Moderna – will be used for office space, research and development, and manufacturing within the life sciences industry; Moderna Therapeutics specializes in cancer treatments.

Its lease agreement between Moderna and Alexandria Real Estate Equities is for 15 years, with two 10-year extension options.

Responding to a question from Chairman Joseph Sheehan about major changes to the site plan, Mackwell replied,

“The main thing is its much less intense use, as it’s not pure office space. So they don’t require the parking or the parking stalls.”

There will be no increase in parking. There will be an increase, however, in green space.

External construction is estimated to be complete within a month, with all construction work estimated to be finished within two.

Town Planner Paul Halkiotis, commented on the application, stating that departmental meetings had been held and that all of his requested revisions had been made.

“At this point, I think that we’ve got a good site plan,” he concluded before recommending that the Board approve it.

Following Halkiotis’ recommendation, the Board approved the site plan unanimously.

The second major appointment had to do with a special permit violation concerning the McDonald’s (31 Providence Hwy.) at the corner of Route 1 and Everett Street.

Specifically, the violation was in regards to conditions of the landscaping plan for the site – which require the plants buffering the property to grow to 30 inches in height.

Paul Farren – owner of the McDonald’s – appeared before the Board to address the issue, the root of which was the original landscape plan, which had – in its original listing of plants – species that don’t grow to the required height.

“There are purple rhododendrons on the plan – 41 of them – and the max height that they grow is 24 inches,” he said at one point, expressing his frustration with the situation, which has – to this point – involved two separate unsuccessful plantings.

“That’s a conversation that you should have had with the landscape architect that spec’d out plants that couldn’t meet the 30 inch height requirement of the bylaw,” Halkiotis responded, adding that “the person that’s been missing this whole time has been a project landscape architect.”

Farren, agreeing in part with Halkiotis but defending himself as well, told the Board how he fit into the scheme of things regarding the development of the site.

“Just so you understand where I’m coming at this, we are not included in any of these plans. It’s the company that does it with their architects,” he explained.

Farren went on to say that – after being informed by the Planning Department that the problem needed to be fixed, and being unable to find any of the 204 acceptable species – he had wanted to come back before the Board before going any further.

“It’s quite an expense to do all of this, so I want to make sure we’re at the 30-inch requirement, that we do it right, and that we work with you.”

Chairman Joseph Sheehan recommended that an extension

be given for the replanting and that Halkiotis be able to approve a substitute species.

While okay with this recommendation, Halkiotis also expressed some concern.

“If the original landscape designer – the landscape architect – spec’d out 40 plants that don’t come 30 inches high, I think we need to go back to him and say, ‘You should have been aware of what the zoning bylaw required.’”

Halkiotis continued, “If they spec’d out something that doesn’t work, they need to do a new plan. I don’t want to be authorizing 75 different this and 40 different that. I’m not really comfortable with that.”

Paciorkowski agreed with Halkiotis, while also expressing frustration with McDonald’s.

“Re-spec it with a different plan and come back and tell us what you want to do. It’s not fair to have Paul sign off on 150 plants. But, geez. You can’t get Mack and Maya for Hire to do this. I don’t know who did it, but I’d be looking for money back.”

Ultimately, the Board approved an extension until Oct. 15 with Halkiotis having approval over substitutions.

In the last appointment of the night, Town Manager Tony Mazzucco paid his first official visit to the Board, during which he shared his thoughts about planning in the Town and also talked about his ideas for expanding the Planning Department.

– as Cooper pointed out – with hurricanes in Texas, Florida, and Puerto Rico leading to a run on pre-made metal buildings and inflating the prices of whatever was still available.

The building – which was eventually purchased and is in place – requires additional work on its driveway and overhead doors, which will be dealt with over the next weeks.

Carney, however, cited as another expense the overhead heaters to be installed in order to keep the garage at 50 degrees for the Norwood Community Media (NCM) truck and COA van that will be housed there.

The plan is to install the heating system by sometime in the fall.

According to Cooper and Carney, the hope is for the Town to eventually recoup the \$90,000 cost of the garage by leasing out one of its bays to NCM.

The project’s history and the reserve request led Chairman Alan Slater to comment on the project as “a perfect example of why we need a Town wide facilities manager,” while also stating that Carney and Public Works Director Mark Ryan – who are sharing management responsibilities for the project – did exemplary work on it.

Carney – while agreeing with the idea of having one person in charge – put forward that one wouldn’t have had an effect on the inflated construction costs for the project, while explaining the rationale behind the approach taken on the garage:

“This one was kind of like: let’s get this one built.”

Cooper, at one point, added to this thought process, saying, “This has been a long time coming. We had hoped to have this last winter.”

He went on to say that the project was further delayed by the snowstorms in March, which kept Ryan from starting the foundation work until after April.

Slater – while accepting of the situation – closed the discussion with this comment:

“Hopefully, the next time we have these types of projects, we’ll have a Town-wide facilities manager to handle these things.”

The motion for a \$17,000 reserve fund transfer for the final phase of garage construction was approved unanimously.



## Post 70 staves off late fade, punches ticket to postseason

Summer appeared to be careening towards a stunning early end for the Norwood Post 70 American Legion baseball team on Monday night at Balch Elementary.

Until it wasn't.

Chris Petracca's 2 1/3 innings of no-hit relief slammed the door shut on Needham Post 14, during which time Norwood turned a one-run deficit into a 5-3 win to advance to the District 6 postseason tournament that begins on Friday.

Petracca entered in relief for Danny Quinn, who'd given up three runs – only one earned – over 4 2/3 innings of work. But Needham had turned a one-run deficit into a 3-2 lead in the top of the fifth after grabbing the pair of unearned runs off Quinn, leaving Norwood on the brink.

Enter Petracca, who recorded five of his seven outs via strikeout.

But in order his performance to stand up, Norwood needed to counter Needham by cashing in on one of their mistakes.

"In order to be able to capitalize on a mistake, you've got to be in position," Norwood manager Paul Samargedlis pointed out.

Thanks to Quinn's ability to limit the damage, Norwood was comfortably within striking distance come the bottom of the fifth inning.

Petracca led the frame off with a bunt single, followed by a Jason Denehy walk – one of three he had in the game – to give Norwood two on with nobody out.

It looked like Norwood was about to squander the opportunity after Jay Wladkowski and Michael Dooley struck out in back-to-back appearances and Cam Flahive hit a pop-up to second...

...but as Samargedlis said, in order to capitalize on a mistake, you've got to be in position to do so. Flahive's pop-up, hit a mile high, fell to the side of Needham's second baseman harmlessly to the Earth. With two outs, both Petracca and Denehy were off on contact anyways, giving each of them more than enough time to cross home plate and give Norwood the lead for good at 4-3.

"Our pitching, all year, has

either kept us in position to make our own mistake – which we have – or what you saw here, kept it tight enough for a mistake to bring us back into this game," Samargedlis said.

Charlie Gover added an insurance run in the bottom of the sixth inning for Norwood, when he scored from second base on what appeared to be a routine groundout to first base off the bat of Paul Manning. Gover was able to see

Needham's defenders had ignored him, enabling to break for home and cross the dish with just enough time to spare.

"That was Gover's read on his own," Samargedlis said. "That was a helluva read."

The heads-up play by Gover made it 5-3, not that Norwood needed the extra run the way Petracca was going. He worked around two walks through the nine batters he faced to ensure Monday night's game wouldn't

be the last in a Norwood uniform for its quartet of 19-year-olds – himself, Gover, Cam Flahive and Michael James.

"I didn't really think about it like that," Petracca said of the stakes. "I just felt good and tried to pitch like I did last time."

Norwood's postseason assignment is yet to be determined, although it will be playing its first-round game on Friday on the road.

Numbers continue to ascend in the Norwood Youth Field Hockey program, a trend which will only continue to bolster an already impressive high school operation.

# Mustang Hoop Camp takes on new look

Change has been noticeable at Mustang Basketball Camp, with the format of the clinic taking on a new look after a dozen or so years.

For the first time, the boys' camp merged with the girls' camp, bringing the future of basketball at Norwood High on to the same courts during the two weeks of sessions in the NHS gymnasium from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on weekdays.

Everybody wins in the new format, as proceeds raised from the camp goes to the booster program of both the boys' and girls' teams at the high school, camp co-director JJ Oliver said.

"We had a lot of feedback from parents saying you should do two weeks instead of one, so Amy [Lepley] and I decided that instead of me being the director, we would be co-directors and do two weeks," Oliver said. "It's a fundraiser for our booster clubs, so it goes back to both programs."

Oliver estimated about 80 to 90 percent of high school players for Norwood grew up attending Mustang Camp as kids. He took over the reigns of Mustang Camp

from Rich Cormier following his departure to Foxboro High to become its athletic director in 2016 and is prepping for his third season as head coach of the Mustangs. Lepley is set to begin her fourth season as head coach of the girls' team following Alex DaLuz's return to his hometown of Seekonk to coach the boys' varsity team there.

Players between grades 1 and 9 are eligible for Mustang Camp, broken into three divisions: "Ivy League" for the youngest players, "NCAA" for the middle-aged players and "NBA" for the eldest group.

Campers received instruction from a multitude of counselors, both boys and girls, and competed against one another, regardless of gender, in intrasquad scrimmages.

In addition to Oliver and Lepley, as well as boys' basketball assistant Paul Nimblett, many recent alumni of the Norwood High basketball program served as counselors at Mustang Camp. Ricky Meehan, Mike King, Jordan Matovu, Brian Wright and current Mustang Ben Tomasello were among the boys to help out, while Meghan and Kaylin Reen, Ally Copponi and Krista Bradley were among the returnees on the

girls' side.

A guest lecturer at last Wednesday's session was Kristen McDonnell, a guidance councilor at Norwood High who also happens to be one of the most accomplished basketball coaches in the state. Under McDonnell, the Braintree High girls' basketball team has won state championships in 2014, 2015 and 2018, along with a myriad of other South sectional titles.

"She obviously has the résumé for it," Oliver said. "We were really happy to have her."

Having a lecturer along the lines of McDonnell – or anyone else, for that matter – served its purpose in multiple ways, according to Oliver. While obviously the skills learned by competing in drills and scrimmages is important, it's equally necessary to learn about the mental aspect of the game from someone who has been there and done that.

"The kids don't know they need it, but they need a little more rest time where they're still engaged in basketball...but there's still a lot of basketball to be played throughout the week," Oliver said.

Doliner said she was expecting other players to stop by throughout the week.

"With summer jobs, it's really hard," she said. "Kids have to work during the summer so we ask that they try to at least pick one day to help."

Garczynski, Curran and Connelly all play multiple sports at Norwood, as did Smith, and as do the Hayes' to this day. In addition to field hockey, Sammy helped start up a girls' ice hockey team at Bridgewater last winter, while Coley continued her girls' lacrosse career as well at Worcester.

"They're continuing on with their awesome intensity level at college," Doliner said of the Hayes sisters.

The quest for a reliable pitching staff was the goal for Norwood Post 70 manager Paul Samargedlis all summer long.

Though it came down to the very last game of the regular season – something which appeared impossible after Norwood's 8-4 start this year – the pieces fell into place such that Norwood was able to get into the dance anyways with a 10-8 record by clinching on Monday night.

Danny Quinn and Mat Rice were Norwood's two givens on the mound over the course of the regular season, while the contributions from Cam Flahive, Chris Petracca, Jay Wladkowski and Michael James and others sure didn't hurt either.

Every arm on the staff, at some point either this season or in summer's past, worked with pitching coach Rich Cordani – a Holliston native and member of the 1991 LSU College World Series championship team.

After Monday's 5-3 win over Needham, manager Paul Samargedlis pointed out several of Cordani's contributions to the staff over the summer, including an important tweak he made with the starter of the win-or-go-home game in Quinn.

"He works with guys all the time," Samargedlis said. "He made an adjustment with Quinn's delivery, because his elbow was so tight. He just flexed it a little and he wasn't missing high today."

Even though it was in a losing effort the day before, Samargedlis said that Cordani helped Flahive work a changeup into his routine during a bullpen session prior to

a 1-0 loss to Franklin.

And Cordani could be seen in the bullpen with Petracca on Monday night, whom Samargedlis had strategically taken off of his usual second base and used as his designated hitter so that he could get loose at a moment's notice.

Beyond his impressive showing in relief on Monday, Samargedlis praised Petracca's entire approach to the game – a quiet dedication.

"You want more of your ability doing the talking and your play on the field. If more people did that, I'd say you'd have probably better competition," Samargedlis said. "I like that. The kid does something great, you're not gonna hear him talk. He's just gonna say 'when am I pitching next.' And he hit for us – he started the game with a double."

Charlie Gover, who caught virtually every inning this summer for Post 70, is also a calming force for the pitchers – as well as a plus-defender with the ability to throw out would-be base-stealers.

He allowed just one pass ball Monday vs. Needham – an inconsequential one, as the runner never came around to score – and also had a put-out on a weakly-hit ball by Needham in the top of the seventh, firing on to Flahive at first on a ball barely out of the batters' box for the second out of the frame.

Now that Norwood is into the tournament, Gover has no intentions of his career wearing a blue and gold uniform ending anytime soon.

"We feel confident," the sophomore-to-be at Bryant University said. "We feel that we should have had a much better record – we let a couple of games slip towards the end of the year. We're not afraid of anybody. We'll take anybody on and we're planning on winning this thing."

"They talk about their experiences playing at Norwood and playing at the college level, which is something that the younger kids should start hearing more," Doliner said. "Especially with field hockey, there's so many opportunities in this area to go on and play after high school."

One notable alumna who couldn't make it back this week was Kacie Smith, a 2015 Norwood High grad who set nearly every offensive mark there was while playing just two years of field hockey for the Mustangs. She's similarly shattering records at Stonehill College in Easton, an NCAA Division II program –

something there's an abundance of throughout the northeast, somewhat unique to this region.

"Not every sport has a great Division II program," said Doliner, herself an alumna of the Merrimack College field hockey program prior to its move to Division I. "Division III schools are all over, but to have that strong amount of colleges in this area, I don't think kids realize how many opportunities there are to play after high school."

The VW Golf has been around for many years and, during that time, has undergone changes in all aspects. It comes in many variations and models from electric, base, AWD, RWD, and our GTI test car. The GTI starts with a 4-cylinder, 2.0 liter, turbo-charged engine offering 220 horsepower and either an automatic or 6-speed manual transmission. I am driving the 6-speed manual this week. The GTI is everything a person that wants to be part of the driving experience needs, plus some. Start with entering the car. Open the heavy feeling door and sit inside. Shut the door and it has a solid sound. The front heated seats have a sporty look and are comfortable, with multiple adjustments available. Rear seats are also firm and fit two adults with comfort. The location of the brake, gas, and clutch pedals are perfect for me and the clutch pressure needed is very light. The shifter is tight and has short throws, and is easy to get into any gear. The center, clear audio system is simple to use and connect a cell phone to. The clarity on the back-up camera is the best yet, even on a bright sunny day.

This car has more power than I expected, and at low RPM there is no turbo lag. The engine is very quiet even at full acceleration (personally, I would like to hear *some* engine sound). Even the duel, low restriction exhaust system is quiet. The car rides and handles like an expensive sportscar, yet is not hard riding over bumps. VW did a great job on this GTI. Base S model starts out at \$26,415, our test SE is \$30,470. Autobahn version: \$36,170. EPA: 25 city, 33 highway, combined 29 MPG.
