

Norwood High still plagued with water problems

The new Norwood High School project is nearing an official closeout aside from one ongoing issue.

A series of water leaks at the school has created the need to set aside some money for future repairs.

The Permanent Building Construction Committee (PBCC) addressed this issue at its meeting last Thursday night, during which representatives

from Compass Project Management - the consultant on the new Norwood High - gave an update on the final audit from the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA).

According to Compass project manager Bryan Jarvis, the final budget for the new high school was approximately \$66.06 million, which is around \$2.5 million less than the original bid from Rhode Island-based Agostini Construction and \$4.5



Summer reading is 'critical' for kids

A major piece of the Norwood public schools' push for kindergarten-through-high-school literacy exposure is to get kids reading early and often so that reading becomes not just a necessary school commitment, but a lifelong interest.

"The best way to prepare our kids is to get them to read, read, read," said Assistant Superintendent Alexander Wyeth in presenting the school summer reading program at last week's School Committee meeting. "That is the number one thing that will bring our SAT scores up. We hope to fos-

ter a love of reading and a love of learning. Summer reading is a critical piece to a student's success. It is a part of our K-12 literacy initiative."

The literary initiative is centered on improving classroom instruction to better prepare students for the standardized tests they will face at each level of their academic careers, said Wyeth.


"After a close review of our district's MCAS, SAT, and local data, Norwood's educators decided to spend at least two years (2012-2014) focusing our professional development and instructional efforts on improv-

Lutheran priest gives final service Sunday

It's not easy to say goodbye to a place you've called home for the past 18 years.

But for the Rev. Edward Saling, pastor of Emmanuel Lutheran Church of Norwood, it is a necessary part of the process for leaving his congregation in its search for a new spiritual leader.

"Every Lutheran pastor has a set of responsibilities as he

leaves his church," said Saling, 67, who has announced his intention to retire from the church at the end of the month. His final services are this Sunday morning, during the church's 8:45 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. worship services.

In addition to making sure the church records are up to date, making last visits to homebound members, and preparing the congregation for a change in leadership, a significant part of the Lutheran priest's job - the


final part - is to make sure that "Once you're gone, you're gone," said Saling.

Saling said the church doctrine dictates that the departing pastor must refrain from speaking with members on church issues for at least two years, part of the process to assure that the new pastor will have his or her own leadership voice. However, he said, there are a few close friends in Norwood he plans to keep touch with on a personal basis.

Saling and his wife Christy are moving to Centerville on the Cape, something he said they have been planning for at least a year.

"I have to say, it's been hard. It's hard to say goodbye. I'm going to miss it. Norwood has been a good home for us. It's been a very good time," said Saling, who came to the Emmanuel Lutheran Church in February of 1995, taking over for the Rev. John Kidder.

The Rev. Paul Peterson served as interim pastor during

live," he said. "I was warmly welcomed by the other clergy in town. They've been good colleagues. The impressions of the church were good from the beginning...just good families."

In his time in Norwood, Saling has seen many younger families join the church, which has been one of his goals. What

\$55,000 had already been raised or covered from existing sources prior to the current fundraising push. The church still needs to raise another \$12,000 or so to complete the project.

Saling said he has asked the congregation to reach out to him when the steeple project is fi-

the search process to replace Kidder. Saling, who came from Philadelphia, where he served as assistant to the bishop of the Southeastern Pennsylvania Synod, said the town of Norwood has made a "lasting impression" on him.

"It's been a hopeful place to

he is most proud of, however, is the establishment of a second Sunday-morning service at the church around 15 years ago. In addition to the formal worship at 8:45 a.m., Emmanuel Lutheran offers a more relaxed contemporary worship at 10:30 a.m. with accompanying world music. Between the two services, they bring in between 130 and 150 members every Sunday, said Saling.

"It's was not an easy thing to do," he said of adding a second Sunday worship service, adding that he was not sure initially it would draw enough members to continue with. "I will forever be proud and grateful for the support we had when we implemented our second service. It just took off and really grew."

Over time, the contemporary worship has become "just a really fun service to enjoy," and has helped open the church to younger families with children, said Saling.

Saling fulfilled one departing promise last weekend when he conducted Sunday worship from the steeple atop the church. Saling had said he would preach from the steeple if the congregation could raise \$12,000 by the end of May to put toward its repair. The steeple at the Emmanuel Lutheran Church stands approximately 90 feet tall and was constructed in 1948. The total cost of repairs is approximately \$80,000, of which

nally completed, as he would like to drive by and see it even if he can't have contact with the church.

"It was obviously something I was involved with from the start," he said.

As for finding a new pastor, Saling said the church will likely install an interim preacher in the coming weeks and appoint a search committee to find a permanent replacement. He said that process could take as long as two years, as the church must also conduct a self-study to identify its ongoing and future goals and needs.

And for himself, Saling and his wife will be busy for a while tending to their new home on the Cape, and also finding the right church to join. They plan to travel, sing in the choir, and pursue other hobbies like fishing and teaching music.

"It's hard to leave. I've been ordained for 41 years," he said, adding of his time in Norwood, "Eighteen years is a long time. It gives you time to put down roots. I'm going to miss the folks here. They are good friends and good leaders."

Following his final services on Sunday, there will be a special farewell service at the church at 4 p.m. followed by a reception.

Katie Brannelly passes away

Following a long struggle to recover from severe injuries sustained in a pedestrian accident in Norwood Center last year, resident Katie Brannelly died unexpectedly last Tuesday, June 11. She was 24.

Brannelly, a 2006 graduate at Norwood High School, attended Merrimack College and was a senior studying child psychology at Bridgewater State University.

Brannelly suffered significant head and lower extremity injuries from an accident in downtown Norwood on the night of March 8, 2012. Brannelly was walking with her boyfriend, Norwood High graduate Dominic Rossi, and another friend near Limey's Pub on Washington Street when they were struck by a passing car.

According to police, Rossi and Brannelly were both struck and found unconscious at the scene, while Rossi reportedly pushed another friend out of the path of the car, preventing serious injury. The driver, a 24-year-old Rhode Island woman, reportedly cooperated with police and was not charged with a crime.

Brannelly was initially in a coma, and was undergoing rehabilitation therapy at the time of her death. Rossi faces continued rehabilitation for his injuries. At the time of the accident, the town rallied its support for the injured couple, with a fundraiser held at the Olde Colonial Café supporting their ongoing hospitalization and medical care.

A large crowd came out for Brannelly's funeral service at St. Catherine of Siena Church on Tuesday morning. She was buried at Highland Cemetery. Memorial contributions in

School daze

A front page article in this week's newspaper has to do with ongoing water problems at the new high school, and comments made by the PBCC infer that perhaps these issues up on the hill aren't being taken seriously enough. The suggestion was made to set aside some monies to deal with future fixes.

Few Norwood taxpayers will ever forget the debacle that took place at the police and fire station after its construction. Nothing is more insidious or destructive than free flowing water in buildings, and the costs in both repairs, as well as the ensuing lawsuits, were a nightmare on Nahatan Street.

Short-term water fixes are only patches if the water has and continues to penetrate building materials. There are few scarier words to maintenance and facilities engineers than mold, which is difficult to recognize short term, but can cause long-term health problems and be extremely expensive to remove.

It was mentioned at the meeting that one of the contractors agreed to share "some" of the costs. Why just some and not ALL of the costs? This is new construction, the only reasons there should be leaks are if the contractors performed shoddy work or the design firms produced poor engineering. Either way, any suggestion that Norwood taxpayers are responsible for the repairs is outrageous.

Compass Project Management and Agostini Construction have received nothing but accolades for bringing this project in on time and under budget. Well, perhaps it's time to stop constantly singing their praises and start questioning at least some of their practices. This building has been open for about two years now, so there is no way these repairs fall under the category of normal wear and tear. Compass needs to step up and explain how they are anything less than fully culpable in this situation, and explain how the repairs will be made without Norwood having to write a check.

For the PBCC to suggest putting aside \$50 or \$100k for future repairs is a slap in the face to every person who agreed to pay more in taxes so that Norwood kids could have a better school. If they want to put aside some money, put it aside to fund lawsuits against those culpable should they fail to step up and admit responsibility.

This water problem is, hopefully, still just a minor blip in the overall scope of this very successful project. However, failure is failure and some group somewhere needs to make things right, and the solution falls squarely on the shoulders of Compass Project Management...

On another school related note, sanity appears to have again found a home in the Norwood School System, at least as it applies to summer reading. Another article on the front page of this week's newspaper details the schools' literacy program, getting kids to read as early in their lives as possible, and recognizing that summer reading is a key component in children's future success.

There was a time not too long ago when some members of the School Committee wanted to abolish required summer reading, spewing such nonsense as parents can't find the books, or they are too expensive, or that there is too much pressure on kids returning to school and having to prove they actually read the material. Such comments would have been comical if they weren't coming from elected officials. Thankfully, current administration recognizes the importance of reading, particularly in the summer, when many children actually begin to realize that reading isn't just a job, but an adventure!





million less than Town Meeting approved in 2009.

Additionally, the total state reimbursement for the project was around \$36.2 million, roughly 59 percent of the total cost, said Jarvis. Norwood's share of the cost was \$29.8 million, slightly less than the original \$30.5 million, he said.

PBCC Chairman Bill Kinsman praised the work of Compass, saying, "You guys did a great job on the high school, keeping us under budget."

However, one ongoing problem involves a series of failures resulting in some minor leaks at the school. It is unclear who is at fault for the leaks; however, in one instance the contractor agreed to share the cost of the repair when the cold water line separated a few months ago. The

work involved draining the entire cooling system at the school, removing around 2,000 gallons of glycol, a kind of antifreeze common in air-conditioning systems. The problem has since been fixed.

The overall cost of that repair was around \$40,000, a portion of which was picked up by the contractor.

"It hasn't been any massive leaks. You're talking a couple of ceiling tiles," said Jarvis, noting that there haven't been any more leaks recently.

But Kinsman noted that it is likely to be an ongoing problem and mentioned a letter from School Building Director Paul Riccardi recommending that between \$50,000 and \$100,000 be set aside in a fund for potential future costs for repairs.

"This has been a problem for us from day one," said Kinsman, adding that while he felt \$100,000 was "excessive," the PBCC could choose to allocate \$50,000 from the remaining project budget to the schools prior to the final closeout.

He said he was unsure how this would work and would discuss it with Town Treasurer Bob McGuire.

"I believe we should make the Board of Selectmen cognizant of this problem as well," in case they have to be involved, said PBCC member Bob Silk.

The new 227,000-square-foot Norwood High opened in the fall of 2011 following over two years of construction. The school was built through the MSBA's Model School Program. Norwood High was the first school built under

the Model School Program, which seeks to effectively adapt and re-use designs from successful, recently constructed elementary, middle and high schools. Participation in the program resulted in a savings of \$30 million on construction of the new Norwood High, which was modeled after the Whitman-Hanson Regional High School that opened in 2005. SBA has hailed White-Hanson as the standard for future school projects in the state.

DPW project moving along

Meanwhile, Jarvis and Compass are busy in the pre-bidding phase of the new Department of Public Work (DPW) project, which is on schedule to be presented to a November Town Meeting.

Right now, one of the more pressing issues - as it has been for some time - is to gain approval from the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority (MBTA) to do work on their land between Lyman Place and the train tracks that abut the property. The work involves regrading the MBTA embankment along the tracks to allow for the construction of the new DPW storage facility on the edge of the Lyman Place property.

While the issue has been talked about for months, Jarvis said they have finally been able to set up a meeting with the MBTA for later this month, adding that the T seems to be receptive to the proposal. Weston & Sampson, the town's design engineer, has recently submitted a permit for the work, said Jarvis.

Jarvis said Weston & Sampson also expect a 50-percent completion of project construction documents by the end of the month, at which time they will have a final cost estimate to match against the current \$16.3 million budget.

Meanwhile, the engineers also met recently with Town Planner Steve Costello to begin the filing process for major site-plan approval, said Jarvis.



ing student comprehension and writing. We believe this effort will improve student achievement in all content areas and this effort directly supports our district's improvement plan and strategic goals," the school's website states.

According to Wyeth, students who do not read over the summer lose roughly two months of the knowledge they have acquired from the previous school year, and teachers at the next grade level often find themselves spending the beginning of the school year playing catch-up.

"That is a huge statistic, and it's something we need to pay attention to," he said.

At the elementary level, students are required to read three books over the summer: one fiction, one non-fiction and a third book of their choice. In September, the teachers will lead discussions of what the students have learned from their summer reading, with "fun activities" used to reinforce that learning, said Wyeth.

"We want them to read as many books as they can over the summer and keep a log of what they read," said Wyeth, noting that the Morrill Memorial Library also participates in the school summer reading program and offers incentives for the number of books students read.

The elementary PTOs re-

cently organized a book giveback drive where school staffers were encouraged to donate books to their schools, said Wyeth. As a result, "A lot of great literature got into the hands of students for the summer," he said.

"It's really just a great community effort," he said. "There's a lot of choices for kids."

At the middle school, all students read one book in common over the summer and do a writing assignment at the start of the school year. Wyeth said teachers use this assignment to judge students' strengths and weaknesses in comprehending the reading and articulating it in their writing.

The curriculum includes partnership with Keys to Literacy, a Rowley-based company that maintains a professional staff of educational trainers. Professional development programs train teachers to provide literacy instruction embedded in classroom instruction using existing reading and curriculum materials, and to align the materials to the state's Common Core standards. Strategies include main idea and text structure, top-down topic webs, two-column note taking, summarizing, and generating questions.

Keys to Literacy is also used at the high school, where students in the first three years are given three summer reading op-

tions and must choose one. Seniors are given five different books from which to choose, said Wyeth.

"Our hope is that parents will support our effort and make sure their kids have some time away from the TV to do some reading," said Wyeth.

He said the schools also offer books on tape and audio/visual aids for special education students on individualized education programs.

Excellence in teaching

Superintendent James Hayden mentioned several Norwood teachers that have received awards this year.

Coakley Middle School history teacher Terry Martin was a semifinalist for Massachusetts Teacher of the Year.

Norwood High School history teacher Molly Uppenkamp won The Goldin Foundation's Excellence in Education Award.

Jennifer Rodger, a first-year math teacher at the Coakley, received Outstanding Teacher of the Year from Westfield State University.

Prescott Elementary School special-education teacher Mike Finnerty, who is retiring this year, was honored by the Orient Lodge of Masons as the 2013 Norwood Teacher of the Year.

Carol Thornton, who teaching reading at the Prescott Elementary School, received the Norfolk County Distinguished Educator Award.
