Residents want more drainage at proposed Moderna addition site

The Norwood Conservation Commission (ConCom) met on Wednesday, Jan. 18, and voted to continue a hearing on a notice of intent for Moderna's site at 1 Moderna Way.

The proposal, presented by Joseph Weed of Pare Corp., is centered around the construction of a building addition on the site. It comes under the ConCom's jurisdiction because it is 200 feet from the riverfront area – the intermittent stream running along Route 1A.


The continuance was granted basically as a matter of course, since the ConCom has previously stated it wants any proposal like the one presented to first be approved by the Norwood Planning Board. The hearing was continued to Feb. 1.

The issue of contention revolves around residents' concerns of improper drain-

age, resulting in water getting into basements along Washington Street as it runs parallel to Route 1A. Resident Lori Lovoulo laid out what happens in heavy rain in her Washington Street neighborhood.

"There is an overflow pipe from the storm drain system up above that causes the excess water flow to come down the hill, under Route 1A and then pours

NHS hosting Black History museum

Norwood Police Department Officer Geoffrey Baguma said he thought he'd try something a little different this year for Black History Month in Norwood.

He said there have always been the usual figures in Black History Month, and that's not a bad thing. Some figures are memorable for very, very good reasons, but there are many who can get lost in the cracks of history. Some are thought to be controversial; some have had their contributions lessened for political reasons. And still others weren't considered important enough at the time. So Baguma thought he'd enlist the help of some Norwood students to try and spread the word of some lesser-known African American history makers.

"I have some great volunteers from the public schools, some from the Coakley Middle School and some from the high school and I told them of the importance of embracing any Black contributions of all different cultures who made America what it is," he said. "We embrace Martin Luther King, Harriet Tubman, Malcom X, and you hear about them every year because of what they did. But I wanted to let them know that it was also important to do a little extra digging and find somebody they could connect with. To tell their story or their contribution and how it affected them and do a presentation, a story, artwork, you know anything about them."

The event is set for Feb. 18 at the Norwood High School Gym from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. Baguma said he's calling the event "Still I Rise," and will feature presentations, art pieces, and living history from participating Norwood students.

"There is such a rich history to be found, unearthed, that's the word I've been using, because people might not know of anyone beyond the very well-known contributors," he said. "I told them to look for someone in the past or those making contributions now. Hopefully, by doing that they get the inspiration to be fu-

Highlighting Conservation Commission's efforts

The Morrill Memorial Library kicked off this year's Sustainability Series on Tues. Jan. 17 with an hour-long presentation from Conservation Planner Holly Jones about the Conservation Commission (ConCom) as well as her role in promoting environmentally friendly activities in Norwood.

The series is an ongoing joint effort of the library in partnership with Progress Norwood, Together Yes and NCM to highlight the importance of protecting the environment for current and future generations. Twenty-five people packed into the Simoni Room to learn more about the importance of wetlands and the ConCom's projects.

"I know that education is important to the Conservation Commission in general," said Jones before her presentation. "So often we get ordinance violations just

because people don't know what they should be doing.'

An example she gave was of a resident dumping leaves and lawn clippings in a wetland over the course of time and then receiving notification that the waste must be removed.

Susan Clare, the director of Together Yes, introduced Jones. Clare, the manager of the community garden which Together Yes started in 2012, stressed that Jones is Norwood's first full-time conservation planner. Before, projects were overseen by a part-time conservation agent.

As the Town recognized the growing awareness of the importance of environmental stewardship, the role was elevated to a fulltime position. Jones works under both the ConCom and the Planning Director.

"When my role was created, it incorporated that role of conservation agent," she said. "And it also added in a few more planning projects. I've tried to focus on planning and projects that are related to the work of the Conservation Commission."

Much of Jones's work revolves around the enforcement of the Wetlands Protection Act, in tandem with the ConCom, she said. Some other duties include monitoring water quality, stormwater management, and oversight of the Town's

Jones also explained the ConCom's efforts to the audience, noting that it is one of the Town's three land use boards. Seven residents are appointed to serve by the Town's General Manager, she explained. They become experts in the Town's wetlands bylaw and the Wetlands Protection Act so that they can apply them in regard to local projects.

The Wetlands Protection Act actually arose in Massachusetts in response to a series of floods and hurricanes in the early 20th century, Jones added. This caused the

NFD receives grants for student awareness

Chief David Hayes is pleased to announce that the Norwood Fire Department was awarded \$4,381 for the Fiscal Year 2023 Student Awareness of Fire Education (S.A.F.E.) Program and \$2,277 for the Senior SAFE Program by the Massachusetts Department of Fire Services.

The funding gives the department the opportunity to work directly with students in schools and seniors to educate them about fire safety and prevention. Each program is tailored to the common needs of each age group and includes general fire prevention reminders and safe practices in the home. Lessons feature many safety topics including steps to take if a fire alarm goes off.

The lessons taught in the school-based program are in line with the standards of the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education Health Curriculum Frameworks and the state Department of Fire Services Curriculum Planning Guidebook.

Twenty-seven years after the introduction of the S.A.F.E program within schools, the rate of annual child fire deaths has decreased by 78%, according to the state's Department of Fire Services, which administers the two programs.

Selectmen hear good news from Light Department Winter Concerts returning

The Board of Selectmen got some good news from the Light Department regarding electric rates in comparison to other communities.

Norwood is one of a handful of Massachusetts communities that has its own electric provider, and as such has a bit more bargaining power when it comes to electric rates. Norwood Light Department Superintendent Kevin Shaughnessy gave a detailed report on the status of Norwood's municipal electric, cable and internet provider.

In terms of electric, Shaughnessy said the outlook is good for Norwood residents, mainly because Norwood Light has been able to secure longer-term contracts than other municipalities that have to go through big providers like National Grid or Eversource. He said however that doesn't mean the Town is not affected by shifts in electric prices. He said the cost of power is around 10 cents a kilowatt hour, whereas last year it was 9 cents.

"And that's mostly due to the cost of fuel," he said. "That's the war and other things going on and that's hurt us a little bit. But we're lucky in the sense that we have longterm power contracts. We're hedged typically a year ahead at about 80 to 85 percent. We looked to be hedged even more last year because of what was going on so we were hedged at 90 percent."

Shaughnessy said the Town is looking at lower average bills for residents, which is a relief.

"We're in a really good position compared to other towns," he said. "We haven't raised our rates and we haven't lowered our rates. Just by staying where we are, compared to Eversource – and we always talk about Eversource because they surround us. Every town around us, Westwood, Walpole, Sharon, Canton, their all serviced by Eversource. I don't want to pick on them but they're having a tough time right now because of fuel costs. So if you lived in one of those towns, you'd be paying almost three times residentially what you'd pay in Norwood. The average customer is paying about \$550 (a month) for a condo or apartment, and a house is probably closer to \$1,000, maybe \$750 is the average we look at in the industry. I looked at my house, and I have 3,000 square feet, and the difference for the whole

year if my house was in Walpole is about \$5,000. And that's a lot of money."

Shaughnessy pointed out that the Town has not raised rates since 2018.

In other news, the Norwood Concert Committee came in to let the Board know about the upcoming Winter Concert Season. Concert Committee Co-Chairs Paul Eysie and David Tuttle came by with Norwood' official Carillonneur Lee Leach to discuss the upcoming concerts at the Norwood High School auditorium starting this Sunday. The concerts will start 2 p.m. and go to 4 p.m. for free every Sunday until Feb. 19.

Eysie said the program has run for about 30 years now.

"I'd go another 30 if I could," he said.

Jan. 29 will see the Tom Nutile Band, Feb. 5 is Acoustic Fire, Feb. 12 is Dan Gabel and the Abletones, and Feb. 19 will feature Portrait in Jazz.

Eysie said he wanted to thank Olga Abdallah for her dedication to the Concert Committee. He said she started over 30 years ago.

"Ollie was one of the founders of the original committee, but before we had the program, she was a pioneer to help build the bandstand," he said. "The bandstand came first, and then the concert program and now it's a wonderful thing. I've never see anyone work for so long and so hard as Olga Abdallah, and I just want to say a big thank you."

Eysie added that Olga's sister Board of Selectman Helen Abdallah-Donohue has been working right alongside her.

"Although you're not listed as a committee member, you've been working right with us for the past 30 years and I know that you'll continue to do that," he said.

"It's been great," she said.
Eysie also thanked Town
Manager Tony Mazzucco for
his initiative to centralize the
Summer Concert Series, the
Concerts on the Common and
the Winter Concert Series under one committee instead of
three and to put that committee under the direction of the
Town Manager's Office. He
said this will allow the programs to continue regardless of
the waxing and waning of volunteer interest over the years.

"Some day, if we're not here to continue this program, the program will continue because it's all under the realm of the Town Manager's Office, so thank you Mr. Mazzucco for thinking ahead like that," he said. "It's that kind of vision that will keep this program go-

ing.'

In other news, Selectman Bob Donnelly reminded residents that nomination papers are available for elected positions in Town, including Town Meeting. He said starting at 12 p.m. to 1 p.m. on Jan. 28, there will be a signing event for residents looking to run and get their nomination papers signed.

Donnelly also remarked that former Town Manager John Carroll is stepping back from serving on the Massachusetts Water Resource Authority (MWRA) Board of Directors.

"He was the very first vice chair of the MWRA Board of Directors and we're sad to see him leave," he said. "He leaves a great legacy and was so well respected by the Board."

Selectman Amanda Howard discussed survey out now from the Neponset River Watershed Association (NepRWA). She said the survey is designed to help NepRWA ascertain extreme weather in the area by asking you what you've seen around Town.

"They'll be compiling all the data in the region from residents to try to get a good view of how the region is being affected with flooding or changes in weather patterns and what we can do to mitigate that further," she said.

Lastly, Mazzucco noted that it was two years ago Tuesday that Assistant Town Manager Bernie Cooper passed away.

"It was a big loss," said Chair Bill Plasko.

The 170-member choir grabbed the audience's attention, starting off their upbeat performance of "Kusimama" by Jim Papoulis with a burst of claps. A Swahili song, the title means "stand tall" in English. They integrated stomping and clapping to punctuate the

music's message of confidence.

"As you can see, these kiddos are pretty great," said Victoria Hervieux, the choir director.

She changed up the groove with "So Danco Samba" by Antonio Carlos Jobim, a Portuguese bossa nova tune. It featured performances by several soloists, who exchanged interplays of "do, do, do" and "ba, ba, ba."

The audience joined in on their final number, a fun rendition of "Let It Snow," a traditional favorite.

The honor choir began its set with "Candlelight Canon," which set the evening's tone of inclusivity and celebration. It is a song that commemorates the lighting of candles during Hanukkah, Hervieux said.

"In the glow of candlelight, all of the world comes together tonight," they sang. "And in the glow of the candles we see peace for you and peace for me."

ture contributors."

Baguma said he's wary of telling his students or the press about some lesser-known Black historical figures in United States history, as he doesn't want to potentially take away a subject from one of the students.

"Right now it's really in their hands, and the last thing I want to do is tell them, 'Hey, you should research this person,'" he said with a laugh. "I don't want to give them a list of people to look at. Ultimately it should be a person they have a passion to research. This is all through volunteering, really, and the makeshift museum is going to be like a living wax museum where people can either present the people they researched and were inspired by and can also portray them physically."

Baguma said he's encouraging the students now to dress up and disseminate their historical figures' stories as they may be displayed in a real museum He said he hopes that it will help bring the subject matter alive for those who come to see the ex-

"It's something that's very interactive with the public who come and receive this education," he said. "I think a museum is much more fun than usual presentations. Sometimes only reading things on a wall, well, it can have its shelf life."

The event will also feature a speaking session from noted storyteller Charlot Lucien. Lucien performed at the 2022 Juneteenth event that Baguma helped organize and has a specialty in Haitian history.

"He's going to touch on not only historical facts but also traumas, past and present," he said. "Traumas connected by experiences throughout history and how we can acknowledge those traumas and overcome them."

Baguma said he's also looking to include artifacts related to historical figures he's been thinking about during this process. But again, no spoilers.

"I'm looking to find more artifacts as well to include," he said. "We don't have a giant space, it's going to be in the gym. There's going to be art from the community, folks portraying historical figures, projects and presentations, it's really going to be so many things within the space that we have. I'm interested in inventors, people in NASA, others in the health fields. There are honestly so many people to choose from and I'm just waiting to see who everyone else picks."

Harley Racer's yard at 95 Washington St.," she said. "My family purchased this property in 1969, and shortly after purchasing, that water started to flow, probably because of development up above."

Lovoulo said the water goes from Racer's property, where there's apparently a stormwater outflow, through her yard and down to her neighbors. She said her family reached out to the Department of Public Works (DPW) decades ago and the department recommended they install an outflow trench, which they did, that flows into the nearby storm drain. She said the water flow now saturates the ground and destabilizes trees in the yard and that the trench no longer can do its

"My driveway is starting to sink in because of the water traveling and it's not making it to the storm drain anymore. It's going into Washington Street, into the sidewalk and traveling into my other neighbors' house," she said. "It freezes up in the winter, causing safety hazards for pedestrians, cars and my neighbor getting out of their driveway."

Lovoulo said she's concerned that the proposed project would increase the water because of an increase

said there's an intake pipe near Route 1A from a wetland and drains down the hill from near the proposed site. He said when it's overloaded, which is often, it flows as Lovoulo described.

"It's a gurgling flow when it's flowing," he said. "It's directly from the site in question and directly from the wetlands being affected by the proposed project."

Norwood Conservation Agent and Environmental Planner Holly Jones said the infrastructure is likely owned by the Massachusetts Department of Transportation (MassDOT), which consequently will be coming before the ConCom soon for improvements to the area, which will hopefully include the stormwater pipes there. Other residents said the outflow has been an ongoing is-

"I think they did a great job having the grades combined," added Niemisto, the mother of a seventh-grader. She said she enjoyed the cultural diversity represented in the music selections.


"I like how they incorporated the clapping and the singing," Carey added. "It was a little more interactive for the kids."





U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to create dams and reservoirs to prevent Boston from flooding.

'What they realized was that it was a significant money-saver to buy the land that already had wetlands on it instead of creating new wetlands with these very expensive and difficult to maintain dams," she said. She noted that sediment tends to build up behind dams, causing them to overflow eventually.

Trains and highways are allowed by federal law to be built over wetlands. But there is regulation of private land because of the negative impact development can have on neighboring properties.

"The quirk of the [Wetlands Protection] Act is that it doesn't actually protect the wetlands," she explained. "It protects the values that the wetlands give."

Some of those values include protecting public and private water supplies including wells and groundwater; flood control and stormwater management; and protection of fisheries and wildlife habitat, Jones detailed.

She added that another benefit is carbon sequestration. The excavation for the relocation of a runway at Norwood Memorial Airport "is one of the biggest wetland impacts that Norwood will ever see."

"The peat was as tall as me," she said. "And all of that is carbon."

Wetlands also reduce urban heat island effects, Jones explained. This issue has been raised particularly regarding environmental justice communities, where people of color and people with lower incomes historically have been disproportionately affected by environmental issues and less involved in the decision-making processes surrounding them. In addition, people from different religious affiliations incorporate rivers and wetlands into their ceremonies, she noted.

Conservation commissions first became instituted in Massachusetts in 1957, Jones explained, as a result of an act passed by the state Legislature. This enabled cities and towns to "become land stewards," granting it the "special superpowers" to accept land gifts and purchases of land with the approval of the Board of Selectmen without having to go before Town

"That gives the Town a little more flexibility to make those types of conservation purchases when a land might become available for sale," she said.

The role of conservation commissions statewide was greatly expanded in 1972, when they were given the responsibility to regulate development and engineer wetland resources. There is a delicate balance, Jones explained, between satisfying dual needs of construction and land preservation.

"I don't think there's another state in the country where wetland activity is regulated on a municipal level," she added, noting the Town's ability to create regulatory bylaws and set fees. "We have a little more insight into what's happening in our community."

And there has been a lot happening in Norwood, Jones stressed. From the expansion of the community garden to the community food forest and orchard, the ConCom has worked on efforts to provide residents with locallygrown organic food, some of which is donated to the food pan-

"I think there's a lot of energy around gardening in general," Jones said.

A larger-scale project that has generated community momentum is the new Bernie Cooper Memorial Park at what has been known as the Saint Streets Lot in memory of the Town's long-time assistant town manager. It is her biggest project, she said, and will take about 18 months to construct.

A fun fact about Norwood is that it boasts the largest trout population in eastern Massachusetts, according to Jones.

Jones praised members of the Trails Advisory Committee for their efforts. An upcoming trails project will cross Skating Club of Boston property and serve as a community connector.

Currently, there are no open seats on the ConCom. But that does not mean that residents cannot advocate for the environment, said Katie Neal-Rizzo of Progress Norwood. She encouraged people to become Town Meeting members. Ten signatures are required. There will be a sign-up event on the Town Common on Jan. 28 from 12-1

After the presentation, Clare complimented Jones on her dedication to her position.

"Her work is important in more ways than just the community garden," Clare said.

Jones's presentation will be broadcast on NCM's You lube channel in the next couple of weeks.
