## Officials react to pair of 40B projects

### Developments contain 600 units

Norwood officials are responding to a pair of large-scale housing development proposals that could add around 600 total housing units to the town on Upland Road.

Only one plan has been filed thus far, and it is for a 296-unit development project under the Chapter 40B Comprehensive Permit Act, the state's much-debated affordable-housing law, which allows developers in certain instances to skirt local zoning laws if they provide adequate affordable units.

The second project, which has yet to be filed but is also being planned as a 40B, would be located on an adjoining parcel owned by The Davis Companies of Boston and currently where the Mercer com-

pany operates.

According to Town Manager John Carroll, Mercer recently agreed to a 10-year lease to continue operating on the property, but on a much smaller section, while The Davis Companies has begun marketing the remaining 34 acres for what they are calling the Upland Woods Apartments, a 300-unit project located at One Investors Way.

The 296-unit project is on property owned by Braintree-based Campanelli, which acquired the 131-acre Upland Woods campus for \$17.4 million in 2003. Campanelli sold and redeveloped Building 200 for Universal Technical Institute in October 2005 for \$12.4 million, and currently owns two buildings totaling

410,000 square feet in addition to 58 acres with an ability to construct an additional 300,000 square feet.

The Campanelli 40B plan was filed recently with the Massachusetts Housing Partnership (MHP), a nonprofit group that works with the Department of Housing and Community Development to help increase the supply of affordable housing in the Commonwealth. The MHP has submitted a request with the Board of Selectmen seeking comment on the project, but the Selectmen first want to hear what other boards in town think about it. At their meeting last week, the board discussed the project briefly before voting to gather comments from other boards and commit-

Selectmen Chairman Mike Lyons said the project is "extremely preliminary" at this point, and that the board is in the now just in the information-gathering stage.

"It's hard to comment on it at this point," said Lyons, although he added, "It does seem pretty big."

Selectman Allan Howard, however, made it known that he opposes the Campanelli project and would prefer a housing development for residents over 55 years of age for the site.

"I am opposed to more large apartment complexes. You've got well over 6,000 multifamily units in this town right now. I want to see over-55 housing," said Howard in a phone interview last week. "We have a substantial number of seniors

## Civic Center 'excited' about new exercise equipment

The Norwood Recreation Department is preparing for a facelift of its fitness center, with the arrival of new equipment this week and a grand opening of sorts scheduled for next month.

With Town Meeting's vote last month to allocate \$60,000 from free cash to the Recreation Department, the Civic Center was in the process this week of replacing out old Nautilus exercise equipment with a brand-

new set of Life Fitness machines.

"We're excited that we're able to offer more modern equipment," said Linda Berger, program director for the Recreation Department. "We're getting a whole new circuit of arms, legs, chest and abs machines."

The equipment was due to arrive from Chicago on Thursday, and Berger said it should be installed in very little time. The gym will remain open to members, although sections will be closed off temporarily

as the machines are replaced one at a time.

"We don't want to affect the use for the patrons," said Berger. "We should have everything up and running by [Friday]."

The department also purchased five new treadmills, three of which have televisions built in, said Berger. The Civic Center has announced a "grand celebration" scheduled for Thursday, Jan. 10, at 5 p.m. Fitness staff will be on hand to assist participants with the new equipment and provide a few fitness tips. Free water bottles will be given out to the first 100 visitors. Additionally, there will be a drawing to give away a free one-year individual membership to the gym.

Berger said the new equipment is designed to take up less square footage, so the fitness

"We've learned a lot. For the first year, we did darn well," said Jean Taylor, one of the Farmers Market Advisory Board members.

## WE WANT TO ASK WHY

For starters, I don't suggest that what I have undergone, as a victim of violent crime, is comparable to that experienced by the victims at Sandy Hook Elementary School (deceased and survivors) and their friends, co-workers and families in Newtown, CT.

Regardless I, like many of you, rely on life's experiences while processing the unthinkable. One minute we are wondering if malls are safe, not too long after getting over the notion that movie theaters are not; next, we contemplate the doorways at our children's schools.

That a gunman could easily enter an elementary school and subsequently slaughter 20 children and 7 adults was something maybe only seen in violent video games, prior to last Friday. However, in the aftermath of the carnage, the most common question is "Why?"

I recall a conversation that I had in the early fall of 1984, with the managing editor of BOSTON Magazine.

The final draft of my feature piece, about the night I was shot three times, twice in the head and once in the left biceps, was in his hands. He wanted to know about its title: "I Never Ask Why."

"Because I know why," I told him. "I was eating in Chinatown, at 2:30 in the morning, and a punk, with a violent past and a nine-millimeter handgun attempted to kill me. I wasn't committing a crime; I wasn't buying or selling drugs. I went to Chinatown to eat," I said.

Going to Chinatown, at that hour, wasn't the brightest move. I understand, now, what I didn't know that Mother's Day, 1979. "Yes," I told the editor, "I never ask why" because asking why gets in the way of my ability to heal.

Such questions and the answers victims confront, I believed, in my case, and all such cases, are individual, in nature, even when there are mass victims, as in Newtown, CT.

For me, "Why" represented a huge boulder along my path to recovery. I wanted to ask questions that would serve as stepping stones to healing.

They weren't "Why" questions: "How can I cope, now that most of the vision in both of my eyes and the hearing in my right ear are gone?" "How, God, will I ever get out of this wheelchair?" "Will you help me to rely on faith and hope?" "How am I ever going to get around, if I can't drive?" "Will you help me, God?"

Yes, again and again, I asked "God." Doing so, and

relying on His grace, is what helped me then and continues to help me, today.

In these increasingly secularized times, where factions blithely denounce anything resembling prayerful expression in the public arena, our nation watched televised coverage, last Sunday, as an interfaith service provided momentary solitude and caused many to invoke gratitude, at a public high school in Newtown, CT.

Complete with comments from President Obama, it appears as if everyone, at that very moment of excruciating pain, torment and disbelief, was willing to rely on hope and many forms of prayer.

The gathering had commonality of grief and a similarity of shared spirituality.

It wasn't necessarily the spirituality of any one religion, perhaps not a religion, at all. There was, however, a desire to join hearts and minds around something bigger than the gathering.

That, my friends, is the cultural schism that needs to be confronted in our nation. Let other nations deal with their peccadilloes. For now, we need to focus on the fissures in our foundation that are there due to a culture that marches increasingly to the beat of self-interested tunes.

I am not suggesting, for one second, that you or anyone in Newtown, Connecticut, should refrain from asking the very understandable question, "Why did this happen?"

Nothing good happens after midnight. So, knowing the facts of my crime, and understanding that it would never have happened had I gone home, instead of out to get something to eat at 2:30 a.m., not asking "why" came easily to me.

It's different when the attack occurs at such an innocent time, to innocent children, in a bucolic town, at a



# DPW to seek designation

The Board of Selectmen recently voted to authorize Department of Public Works Director Mark Ryan to utilize \$5,000 in his budget to hire a consultant to assist him in seeking to have the chapel at Highland Cemetery placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Ryan said he would hire Concord-based Cram & Ferguson Architects, which constructed the St. Gabriel Chapel at Highland Cemetery back in 1903, to assist him in the application process to have the chapel listed on the National Register.

The chapel was donated to the town by the Lewis Day family and is available to the public for funeral services. Based

on a 2009 study that found deteriorations, Ryan said it would cost in excess of \$600,000 for the town to repair the structure, whereas Cram & Ferguson recommended that the town seek to have it listed on the National Register and make it eligible for grant funding.

"I think it's time now that we update this building," said Selectman Paul Bishop when the matter was discussed two weeks ago.

Two structures in Norwood are currently listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The Fred Holland Day House was added in 1977 and the Norwood Town Hall in 1996. Town Hall, which was built in 1927, is set to undergo significant exterior renovations beginning in March, with the majority of the work focusing on the bell tower over Memo-

rial Hall. Around \$10,000 was raised at the Norwood Neighbors Committee's annual Holiday House Tour earlier this month for renovations to the Day House.

that are in their houses and that are struggling to keep their independence. There must be state or federal funding for those types of projects, as there are for 40B.”

With the Campanelli project, Howard said he is mostly worried about how the development could impact school enrollment.

“I want to fight it as much as we can,” said Howard. “The thing I’m most worried about is more school kids for Norwood, and what I mean by that is we don’t have much capacity left for our schools. It wouldn’t take many [more students] at all for us to be required to build another school, and that would kill our financial picture. As it is, we’re straining to do the capital projects that we have.”

While he did not participate in the discussion at last week’s meeting because he is an abutter, Selectman Bill Plasko said the board in these cases usually meets with the Planning Board, Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) and the town planner to see if they can reach a consensus on their views of the project.

Planning Board Chairman Ernie Paciorkowski said the board a few years back approved an office building for the Campanelli site but that the tenant backed out when the economy dropped off.

Regarding the 40B project, Paciorkowski said the town is in a “tough position” because there is limited local control.

“We’re not really in a great position to turn them down. Hopefully we can work with them and bring the unit count down a little bit, or do what they call a friendly 40B, which is basically with a blessing from the town,” he said. “Like anyone else in the town, I think we’re apartment heavy. But no one wants to build condos. They all want to build apart-

ments. If they are coming to Norwood, we want them to look good. Norwood is so dense, wherever you put something like this in, it’s going to impact neighborhoods.”

Chapter 40B was enacted in 1969 to address a lack of affordable housing in the state by reducing local regulatory barriers and allowing developers to build more densely than allowed under zoning. It states that in communities with less than 10 percent affordable housing, a development with at least 25 percent affordable units can be constructed without the normal municipal permitting process.

The law continues to be controversial, and there have been several attempts to repeal it over the years.

Lyons said he supports affordable housing, but not necessarily the way it is developed with 40B projects.

“It should be, on some level, a smart-growth project. It seems to be more of a weapon that developers use at this point to skirt local zoning and things like that,” he said. “I’m in favor of affordable housing. I just wish that we had more control over location. We don’t have a lot of space, obviously, and we don’t have a lot of land. I don’t think we necessarily need to build on every square of it. We need to get to 10 percent affordable housing and that 40B threat goes away for the most part.”

Both Lyons and Paciorkowski pointed out that 40B doesn’t take into account Section 8 vouchers, which help low-income residents pay for their housing. Lyons said that with those vouchers, Norwood is probably already “way over” the 10 percent threshold of affordable housing.

“Affordable housing is not low-income housing,” Paciorkowski said.

building that represents innocence in a very serene and pure form.

Everything now is on the discussion table. How can we care for those with social and mental illnesses that leave most of us mystified, some petrified and others justified in their calls for more help from their Government?

How do we balance the rights of our citizens to legally own and carry firearms, with the interests of those who ex-

pect that public schools, theaters and malls will be safe from unstable individuals who set out to harm?

After all, the worst elementary school disaster in our nation’s history did not involve guns. In 1927, in Bath Township, Michigan, on May 18, 1927, when 38 schoolchildren, two teachers and four adults were killed; another 58 were injured.

The perpetrator, Andrew Kehoe, the school board trea-

urer, evidencing self-interest in the extreme, had made homemade bombs to exact his plan. He expressed his anger at being defeated in the spring of 1926, for town clerk.

Where do we draw the line? “Why?” is common, but it won’t fully confront the aftermath. My editor prevailed, the story is titled: “The Mark of Violence.” Too many of us are marked as a result of the self-interested evildoers in our midst.



staff is exploring ways to potential expand the program offerings at the Civic Center.

The 3,000-square-foot fitness center opened in 1984, which is when the Nautilus equipment was purchased. Rec-

reation Director Jerry Miller updated the Board of Selectmen recently on the process to replace the old machines. He said he initially approached the schools and local vendors to see if they wanted the equipment but said there was no interest largely because the machines are so old.

"It is really just so outdated," he said.

Selectman Helen Abdallah Donohue suggested that Miller might try asking local charities, senior centers or nonprofit groups if they wanted the equipment. Berger said a memo has been sent out, but otherwise the machines will be sold off for scrap metal.

Berger said the fitness center has a "really good follow-

ing" and has been a benefit to the community over the years.

"Everyone gets to know each other," she said. "It's a nice community benefit. It's a unique thing to be able to provide. Not a lot of communities have this as part of their recreation department."

The Recreation Department offers Norwood residents various rates for membership to the fitness center. Individual memberships are \$20 for one month, \$45 for three months, \$85 for six months and \$160 for a year. A one-year family membership for immediate family living in the same household is \$200. For adults, there is also a \$30 plan for 12 visits, and for college students \$36 for 40 visits.



come back," said Taylor. "We're talking about not adding a lot more vendors but adding more specialties. We can only handle so many on the Common without it being an issue in terms of the parking, and wear and tear of the Common."

The hours may also be shortened slightly from what was a noon to 6 p.m. schedule this year, said Taylor, although nothing is definite at this point. Otherwise, the advisory board will simply be taking a look at the experience from this year and trying to find ways to improve the offerings.

"This being our first year, there is a lot to take in," said Taylor.

Prior to this year, the Farmers Market was run out of the parking lot behind the Apollo Functions on Washington Street, not far from the Town Common. Several years before that, it was lo-

cated on Central Street, and part of the street had to be closed off down while the market was running.

When the decision was made to move the market to the Town Common, Taylor said it became apparent that an advisory board and manager would be needed to handle all of the logistics.

"Being on the Common, there are so many issues that you really have to have a board and a manager to deal with everything that comes up," she said.

The advisory board basically started from scratch this year, Valls told the Record last month, building a whole new program and vendor list from the ground up.

# Anonymous tip helps police nab Rite-Aid larceny suspect

An anonymous tipster helped Norwood police last week make an arrest in a crime from earlier this month involving the theft of personal belongings from employees of a Rite-Aid Pharmacy.

According to Norwood Police Department (NPD) spokesman Kevin Grasso, Jeremy Mishk, 32, of North Attleboro, was

arrested last Monday and charged with the larceny at Rite-Aid on Walpole Street.

Mishk is charged with two counts of breaking into a depository and larceny from a building, said Grasso.

On December 3, police responded to a report of a break-in to the employees' lockers at Rite-Aid Pharmacy, 469 Walpole St. Statements from employees indicated that a white male had asked to use the restroom, and surveillance cam-

eras showed him entering a secure area of the store.

"Once allowed access to the restroom, it also allowed him access to an area for employees only," said Grasso. "Security video shows the suspect entering the secure area, bypass the restroom, and walk into the employee area."

After the suspect left the store, an employee discovered that some of the

employee lockers had been forced open and personal belongings stolen, said Grasso.

According to Grasso, an anonymous tipster contacted Norwood Detective Paul Ryan after recognizing the suspect in a photo as Mishk.

On Monday evening North Attleboro Police arrested Mishk and he was subsequently returned to NPD headquarters for booking.
