Potential Chapter 40B shortage as Planning Board considers apartments

The Norwood Planning Board met on Aug. 30 and discussed the new census data with Town Planner Paul Halkiotis.

The short version is that the data from the census has now included additional housing units that have been built since the last census, and now Norwood finds itself in a bit of a bind. Chapter 40B of the Massachusetts State Laws states that a municipality must have 1.5 percent of its land or 10 percent of its housing stock dedicated to affordable housing.

“The additional housing

units have an implication for the Town’s subsidized housing inventory,” he said. “The Town’s number was 9.8 percent. Ten is the target. And the Town rolled backwards to 9 percent subsidized housing as a result of the additional housing units constructed between 2010 and 2020. This however does not affect the Town immediately. We still have safe harbor because we still have 1.5 percent of our land area set aside for affordable housing, but having more than 10 percent fortifies that and would help the Town to continue to enjoy that safe harbor.”

Halkiotis said new housing developments proposals are being required or encouraged to build affordable housing for first-time homebuyers or young families if the develop-

ment is over a certain number of units. He said the zoning has to require affordable housing, and to require it on a project-by-project basis would be akin to spot zoning. He said currently, there are no zoning areas for single-family housing that require affordable components, and that they are only in the Forbes Hill Overlay District, the Downtown Mixed-Use Overlay District (MUOD) and the Route 1 MUOD.

“All of those affect multi-family housing but we don’t have any inclusionary zoning for single-family housing,” he said.

Halkiotis has said in previous meetings that some affordability requirements are expiring on several multi-fam-

Forget leaving it to beavers

Lately, there has been some online controversy concerning the recent euthanization of two groups of beavers on Norwood Town land.

The controversy arose when, during a Conservation Commission hearing, it was related to the Commission that the Norwood Airport had applied for a permit to trap and euthanize those two beaver groups, one group on Norwood Airport land. The reason stated was public safety, as serious problems could occur from beavers wandering around the tarmac.

Norwood Town Planner and Conservation Agent Holly Jones said the Conservation Commission itself is not responsible for the trapping and



euthanization of the beavers.

“This was requested after the beavers had been trapped,” Jones said. “It is actually against the law to relocate any wildlife in Massachusetts. The reasons include spreading disease, as well as the potential to cause harm to the animal as it struggles to find its way home. Additionally, if the habitat requirements are present for an animal somewhere else, it is likely that there is already a

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

ily housing complexes. But he also said since the Downtown MUOD has not elicited the kind of development the Town was hoping for, that overlay district may be considered again to promote more development with affordable units.

The Board also met with David DePree and a consulting development team to discuss a preliminary plan to build housing at the southeastern end of the 83 Morse Street site.

The location sits adjacent to the Neponset River and would contain a mixed-use development of residential units and commercial space.

"We have a back corner ripe for redevelopment and the market is speaking to us again," DePree said. "And this time, we're not only thinking possibly more commercial space, but people are telling us that this would be a great spot where they can not only work and play, but also live, work and play."

DePree said Cathartes representative Jim Goldenberg has been talking with the Space Center to brainstorm what could work there. Goldenberg said the rest of the property has been successfully redeveloped, with only this one portion in the southeast of the site remaining.

"These are probably the most derelict and dilapidated buildings on the whole site," Goldenberg said. "They're the last ones to be redeveloped. They're vacant buildings along the riverfront, and we see it as a real opportunity to get in and clean up the area, clean up the blighted buildings, restore the riverfront and make it accessible, and create another element of this project that would be productive for the site."

Goldenberg said they are considering rental apartments for the site. Planning Board Member Debbie Holmwood said she felt that there should at least be a portion set aside for homeownership.

"I'm just throwing it out there, I would be remiss if I didn't ask," she said. "People like this kind of thing; they've done it in the South End. I think we're a little behind on this sort of thing. The South End, Lowell, Portsmouth, Plymouth, these old buildings are being refurbished all over and some of them, even in the South End, have homeownership."

Cathartes Director of Development Rob Simmons said they're open to the idea.

"As a company, we've done both for-sale and rent, and I think the concept of mixed-use itself lends itself pretty directly to the rental market as far as the demographic and what people are looking for, but we can certainly take a look at the for-sale," he said.

Attorney David Hern said the meeting was just to get a feel for how the Board feels about a residential development there. He said they will be working with the other relevant Town boards and agencies to make sure it's a viable

option and would come back to the Planning Board when a design has been agreed upon.

The Board also discussed a lack of meeting space for itself. Holmwood said she felt the Board could do better than the Norwood Senior Center, which is the current plan.

"I love the Senior Center, it's a great place, but it just doesn't feel like a professional meeting space for public boards," she said. "I think it's a little unprofessional for us to be meeting in the center, or even the Willett. I would like to petition the chair to see if there's some way to get us into a space in Town Hall."

Halkiotis said ideally, they need a room to seat 15 or 20 people if there's a project that draws a crowd. He said the old meeting space in the basement of the Town Hall – now an office space for the Health Department – was not ideal in that respect either.

"The Town has never had an adequate meeting space for these land use boards," he said. "Room 12? I think we maybe had 10 or 12 chairs set up there, but as you will recall when we had applications that were controversial or had a lot of public interest, people were hanging out in the hallway. And if people actually make the time and effort to come to Town Hall at night to come to these meetings, they shouldn't have to hang around in the hallway and try to hear what's going on in the meeting room. Unfortunately, this is not a new problem, it's just a problem got worse."

He added that the Senior Center space is now set up for hybrid meetings at public expense for monitors, microphones and an electronic setup.

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Norwood Hospital approved by state for emergency DoN

Moderna approved storage of thousands of gallons of ethanol

The Norwood Board of Selectmen met on Aug. 31 and discussed a recent update from the Norwood Hospital.

Chair Thomas Maloney said Norwood Hospital's parent company, Steward Health, applied to the state for an Emergency Determination of Need (DoN). The DoN was originally filed on July 30, 2021.

"(Town Manager Tony) Mazzucco received notification from (Norwood Hospital President) Sal Perla and I received notification from State Rep. John Rogers telling us the same thing, which is that the Commonwealth has approved Steward's application for an Emergency DoN, for a new Norwood Hospital" Maloney said. "That is really good news."

According to the DoN, which can be found at <https://bit.ly/3kDCOXP>, the new building will include an Emergency Department, a total of 130 beds (115 medical-surgical beds, three pediatric beds, and 14 critical care beds), five inpatient operating rooms, four outpatient operating rooms and five endoscopy procedure rooms. It will also have a cardiac lab, radiology services, an MRI unit, and a myriad of outpatient services.

"It carries a capital price tag of \$325 million. It will be a 130-bed facility as it stands now," Maloney said.

Mazzucco said the only thing standing in the way of construction now is the local permitting process from the Town.

"There are no more state regulatory processes to go through, so it is really up to Steward to come in and pull that demolition permit this month," he said.

The DoN process (<https://www.mass.gov/determination-of-need-don>) seeks a state approval for "substantial capital expenditure" (costly one-time purchases or construction projects), change in services and original licensure or transfers in ownership.

In other business, the Board approved an application for a VIF license for Moderna to store solvents and flammable liquids at their site on Upland Road. The license will specifically allow the company to store 6,000 gallons of ethanol, and up to 4,000 gallons of solvents in quantities less than 793 gallons stored at 200 Upland Woods Rd.

Senior Director of Manufacturing at Moderna Matt Barros said they have discussed the storage with the Norwood Fire Department and have received the sign off from them. Associate Director of Environmental, Health and Safety at Moderna Mike Pippos said the chemicals will be used to manufacture the COVID-19 vaccine the company developed and synthesizes.

Selectman Matt Lane said he spoke with the NFD to confirm the safe storage of the materials.

"They said everything that has gone to them has been really above board and we appreciate that," he said.

The storage, according to Pippos, will primarily be in 50-gallon drums.

"They would be stored in what's called an H3-rated room, which has certain building code criteria built around it," he said, "including firewalls, fire suppression, fire detection and containment of any leaks of materials, which has a grated floor to contain any materials. It will be stored at ambient temperature in the warehouse at our facility."

Pippos said the H3 provides for protection against a fire outside the storage facility for about two hours before any materials would be exposed to said fire.

"The exterior is a concrete facility built to an H3 construction rating, which means the walls are designed to protect against fire for two hours, minimum," he said. "It would take a substantial fire a minimum of two hours to get into that room."

Pippos also said, after questions from Norwood resident Bill Kinsman, that the materials are examined and compared to make

sure that if they do combine, they would not react with each other in an energetic or detrimental way.

"We do do a compatibility review to make sure that we're not putting anything that would generally be reactive with any of the materials we store in the room," he said. "So we do have a very good handle on what is going into those rooms. We do segregate those materials with other conditions such as cabinets that are also approved by the fire department."

Also on the agenda, the saga of the UAVE Gravel Pit at 973 University Ave. is continuing. Maloney read out the request for an extension of the company's permit to continue to quarry rock out the site, under the condition that it restore property of its neighbor, MS Walker, that it damaged by 90 days. But Maloney pointed out that the original permit extension for 180 days has already expired.

"They're already out-of-bounds," he said.

In a nutshell, UAVE had been found in the past to be simultaneously operating without a permit since 2015 and to be in violation of stormwater remediation requirements. All of that has been apparently fixed, but they also removed trees on MS Walker's property. Selectman Bill Plasko said he received a letter from UAVE's attorney with the application.

"I was told that some of the statements made by (UAVE's) attorney don't seem to be exactly accurate," he said. "For

population there, who might not accept the new individual. Mass Audubon writes, "Relocating wildlife is illegal in Massachusetts. It is detrimental to the wellbeing of wildlife as well as the public. Unknowingly, sick animals may be transported and released in other locations, causing the spread of disease."

The Board of Health issued the permit for the trapping of the beavers, requested by the Airport Commission. Jones and the Board of Health determined the beavers and the dam were a threat to public safety and public health by the management of the airport and the USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service Wildlife Services, who also performed the trapping work.

"Each of these experts confirmed that the dams would present threats to runway safety through flooding and attracting animal activity to the runways and I have full faith in that assessment," Jones said.

Jones added that if an animal is released into unfamiliar territory, they generally don't do so well, as they have to compete with resident animals, sometimes of the same species, for resources. She added that invasive species could potentially spread invasive species from one area to another, however Jones said she's not heard of that happening before.

The specific threats to public health and safety were not just the potential for plane strikes either.

"There is some concern about attracting animals closer to the runways, particularly

waterfowl like geese and ducks, which would be more likely to congregate behind a beaver dam than in a flowing stream," Jones said. "However, flooding of the runways themselves is also a concern; higher water levels to start could mean that in a big storm the runways could become inundated. The airport is frequently used for medical purposes like interhospital patient transfers and transporting organs for organ donation, and provides an important charter link for transportation off of the Islands, so keeping it open is important for public health as well as transportation logistics."

Jones said there are many natural elements that can dissuade beaver populations from growing around populated areas where they can cause trouble, but no repellent has yet been found.

"Believe it or not, there is a healthy population of coyotes at the airport and surrounding properties (such as the Walker property), which I'm sure do help control beavers," she said. "I have also seen fisher cats nearby. However, there is yet to be an effective beaver repellent in use."

Jones said in some situations, state law does allow for the use of beaver deceiver flow regulating devices. If you just breach a dam, that will temporarily stop the flooding said dam is causing, but the sound of rushing water alerts beavers to the fact that their work has been altered. The flow regulator, or beaver deceiver, works to slowly put the water back to

where it was going before the dam and keep the beavers in the dark about it.

According to the Massachusetts Division of Fisheries and Wildlife web page on beavers (Mass.gov/service-details/learn-about-beavers) the species is listed as "an important natural resource." Jones said she agreed with that, and in her line of work, wetlands are a big piece of the conservation puzzle. They are also a prime example of how reintroduction of natural species and systems can make life better for everyone, including humans.

"Beavers were nearly exterminated from Massachusetts due to historical trapping. They were reintroduced in the 1930s in the Berkshires, and have successfully begun reclaiming habitat throughout the state," she said. "This is a huge victory for wetland ecosystems, other animals who use wetland habitat created by beavers, and the role that wetlands play for water quality in our state. However, when beavers move back into environments that have been changed by humans, they can cause problems."

example, he references in the letter that they still haven't been able to get permission from MS Walker to cross their property to make these corrections. And MS Walker tells me they have already given that permission. And they tried to originally make a land swap, and MS Walker denied that land swap, and so maybe that's why they're behind and they didn't want to start until that was resolved."

Plasko said, however, he did not have a problem with the extension.

"In any event, it's a small

amount of time, and I don't have a problem with that if that is the only issue being addressed," he said.

The Board voted unanimously a motion to allow Maloney and Plasko to work on the letter and figure out what exactly is going on between the two companies.

In other news, the Board approved a request from Colorado resident Denis Plato to place a memorial bench at the Disabled American Veterans Park off of Route 1A in honor of his mother, lifelong resident of Norwood

Leah O'Leary. Selectman Helen Abdallah-Donohue said she went to school with O'Leary.

"We became friends when she was in the seventh grade," she said. "She devoted her life to service to others. After she got out of college, she volunteered in the American Red Cross and went to Vietnam. In those days, the nickname was a Donut Dolly. She drove an ambulance and helped soldiers."

The bench was approved unanimously.

Norwood resident Kelvin Chin will be hosting an Author Talk in person and in a virtual format at the Morrill Memorial Library on Sept. 21 from 7 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

The topic is called Forgiveness and Love, and Other Confusing Issues, and will also feature a short discussion on Chin's new book, Marcus Aurelius Updated: 21st Century Meditations on Living Life.

Chin said the book is a collection of essays on several different subjects and how ancient thinking can be applied to modern life. The idea of forgiveness, the subject of the talk, is not to think about forgiveness as a reset button to a relationship, whether that be romantic or otherwise, but rather a way of helping to understand a person, their motivations and how to move on from there. Chin said for many situations it may be much easier than one may think. However, serious and life-changing events can be tougher to deal with.

"You know, the husband or wife may be physically beating the other and abusing

each other emotionally, so how do you find the forgiveness there?" he said. "That's the tough one for most people. I say it's easy to forgive them due to the way I define forgiveness and love. I define love as accepting a person for who they are and not for who you wish they were."

Chin said it's different for every situation in terms of a real-world solution, but a

good emotional starting point is always acceptance.

"Let's say my wife is beating up on me," he said. "I accept that she's an abusive person. That's who she is, I'm accepting that person for who they are. That's a definition of love that Jesus promoted as a teacher. It doesn't mean you accept their bad behav-

She said it was the brain child of Extended Day Co-Director Sarah Taggart.

"Our staff jumped right in," she said. "It was just great to see all the children stomping their feet, shake their heads, play their instruments and rock-and-roll this afternoon."

The summer program has about 100 families register each year for a seven-week program from July 6 to August 20. Holzendorf said they have a lot of fun with the kids putting together the programs.

"The children enjoyed creating a project about themselves called 'All about me,' Superhero activity where they are their own hero character drawing as it comes to life," she said. "They also made ocean voyage ships and went treasure hunting, built science

projects with exploding volcanoes, painted, played games to challenge one another, had a Dinosaur week and made slime. The upper grades took a walk to enjoy lunch on the Common and topped it off with Daddy's Dairy ice-cream. They also took daily afternoon trips to Father Mac's pool to swim, or sprinklers for our younger groups and so much more."



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

ior, and my suggestion in the Nuances of Forgiveness essay, is for this example, you have decided, 'no, I'm walking.' But you walk away and accept them for who they are, even though they have way crossed the line. You've accepted them for who they are, but you've drawn a boundary and you've left."

Chin said forgiveness and staying in a relationship no matter what are very different things.

"And I think that's where a huge amount of confusion, conflation and inconsistency crops up in people's minds, because people are taught in some cases that they have to accept everything done to them and then it conflated into this whole karmic thing as well," he said. "Like, 'You did something to deserve it.' No, you didn't deserve it, you didn't do something bad and it's now boomeranging back

and coming down on you. No. That person who is abusive to you is responsible for their behavior. You're not responsible for what they've done to you."

Chin said he wants to reach people where they are, and not spend half the lecture explaining the different terminology that can be used as a way to make something needlessly complicated.

"I don't use New Age lingo, I try to distill that out because to me, if we really understand life and principles about life, we should be able to explain them in subject, verb, object and one-or-two-syllable words," he said. "It should not be that complicated and it should be words that people generally use. People who don't understand concepts very well tend to hide behind jargon. And it's true in the

legal profession that I came from – and I'm not saying lawyers don't understand what they're talking about – but a lot of jargon is used so that you have to go to a lawyer to understand something like Res ipsa loquitur (Latin for 'the thing speaks for itself'). So I try to remove all that from my teachings about life."

Chin said the idea of acceptance is something that Marcus Aurelius wrote about in his meditations. Aurelius studied the Greek philosophy of stoicism, and many people think stoics are emotionless and aim not to feel anything.

"It's not an accurate representation of stoic philosophy, it's about practical thought, pragmatism and how can we think about life in a different way than we generally do in order to improve our quality of life," he said. "It does address the issue of

sometimes how we get swept away by our emotions. I mean does that happen to anybody on planet Earth? Yes, yes it does. So it does address that, but what's happened over the years, over the millennia, people have distilled that down to 'Stoics are unemotional and anti-emotional.' That's just false."

Stoics, Chin said, are more about accepting what you cannot change and looking to change what you can.

"I have personally resonated with that my entire life, and people who know me, people who grew up with me in Norwood, they know I'm not emotionless, but I am very rational about the way I think about things," he said. "And that means clearing up inconsistencies about different subjects. So the book is a collection of 67 essays I've written where I try to clear up the inconsistencies in the thought

processes that have existed for millennia about various topics."

2020 Ford F250 Platinum

Let's start with the basics, the F series pickup has been a best seller truck for many years and after a week driving the Platinum, with the Tremor off road package I see why the F series is so popular.

Entry F250-series 2WD starts at \$34,035 destination \$1695. Our loaner Platinum is a fully loaded and even has the 6.7 liter diesel a (\$10,495) option and it is fully loaded. Base price on our Platinum is \$66,425.00. The Tremor package at \$3,975 adds off road tires and black wheels and black running boards. Electronic locking rear differential and limited slip front differential. Heavy duty gas shocks front and rear and more.

Power everything including heated /ventilated front seats and steering wheel remote engine starter that did work fine at 10 degrees all week long. It is a diesel and the engine does take longer than a gas engine to warm up. Plugging in the engine block heater makes for a very quick warm up, it is good for engine ware in cold start ups.

Our truck was like a luxury vehicle in every way possible. The 10 speed automatic transmission mated to the 6.7 liter diesel make this combination a match made in heaven. There is no lack of power at any speed for hauling whatever your needs are.

Entry level is high, but once in the truck the surroundings are more like an expensive car than a truck. A multi-function touch screen that like most vehicles is a small tablet. There is some road noise from the aggressive tires at 65 MPH. The ride is firm, the long wheel base does make the ride a bit less harsh.

The pickup truck market has gone crazy as have the prices. The diesel engines are up to a \$10,000 option but are the engine to have when towing loads on a regular basis. This is my opinion when it comes to a pick up. Make sure you get a truck that fills your needs. For most home owners the 1/2 ton F-150 will do what most owners need. The F-250 3/4 ton is a heavy duty work truck. The diesel engine is meant to work and not just drive around town especially stop and go and city driving. The 3/4 ton has bigger everything including brakes, suspension, tires etc. Either series can be equipped with whatever technology and safety equipment wanted as well as power side in steps which I do recommend.
