

## Pentowski dedication scheduled

### School Committee sets goals

The School Committee has finalized the date and time for a ceremony to dedicate the room in which it meets to the memory of a former member.

#### Dedication date decided

At their meeting on August 22, members of the School Committee decided to schedule the dedication of the room in memory of the late Joseph "Mitch" Pentowski for Wednesday, September 26 at 6:00 p.m. The dedication and reception will be followed at 7:30 by the regularly scheduled School Committee meeting.

The Committee had originally planned to have the meeting at 7:00, but Committee member Eleanor Travers made a motion to push it back by half an hour, so that the reception in Pentowski's memory would not be rushed. The motion to hold the meeting at this time was seconded by Paul Samargedlis and approved by a unanimous vote.

The School Committee had been planning for several weeks to hold a ceremony dedicating their chambers in Pentowski's memory. However, Chairwoman Courtney Rau said the date and time could not be finalized until now, in part because the Committee had wanted to make sure that members of Pentowski's family would be able to attend.

Pentowski died on Friday, March 30 at the age of 83. A Korean War veteran, he had also been a town meeting member for forty years, as well as being a

## Refusing to let it die

### PBCC seeking architect for concession stand

The Permanent Building Construction Committee (PBCC) decided last week to seek the services of an architect to come up with a new proposal for a concession stand at Norwood High School, after several frustrating months were spent on a previous proposal.

The decision was made without a formal vote, but with all PBCC members in attendance appearing to be

agreeable to the idea at a meeting last Thursday. Compass Project Management President Tim Bonfatti, whose firm has been assisting the PBCC with the project, agreed to seek a qualified architect for the job, which he hoped could be done by a plumbing engineer.

PBCC Chairman Bill Kinsman noted that the project had been a source of frustration for both members of the Committee and others involved, having been projected to cost far more than its proponents originally envisioned and running into a series of logistical

setbacks. After a failed attempt to garner additional funding for the project at Town Meeting this year, the PBCC learned that Plumbing Inspector Edward Forsberg would not sign off on the project as it stood.

At the same time, Kinsman said he did not feel comfortable letting the project die, given that a group of volunteers had raised approximately \$30,000 for the project and a previous Town Meeting vote had brought the

# A Primary opening

School officials are warning the public to be especially cautious when schools open for the school year next month, due to unusual circumstances which see another important event fall on the same day.

Norwood's public schools will hold their first day of classes on Thursday, Sept. 6. In an unusual coincidence, Massachu-

setts citizens will be voting in the State Primary on the same day, a situation that neighboring Walpole will also face on its first day of school.

"The first day of school for every elementary building is an exciting time," Superintendent of Schools James Hayden noted. "Everyone comes dressed in their new clothes."

The fact that the Primary falls on the same day will make the day even more exciting - and cha-

otic - than normal for many Norwood families, Hayden said. He and the School Committee encouraged residents to be especially vigilant while driving to the polls or any other destination that day, as they will also have to watch out for large numbers of unusually excited students.

"Be careful of those kids," said School Committee Chairwoman Courtney Rau. "There

member of American Legion Post 70, the Norwood Knights of Columbus, Disabled American Veterans and the Metropolitan Life Veterans Association. Pentowski had been a member of the School Committee for 37 years, serving until 2010. Those who served with him on the Committee remembered him as a kindhearted man who always had the interests of the community and its children in mind.

"He [was] always there for the community," Travers said at the time of Pentowski's passing. "Always there for the children. Very, very nice man."

"Mitch to me, first and foremost, was a dear friend," Samargedlis said at the time. "He was a great American, as a veteran. And he was a person that the community could trust. Family and community were everything to him."

**Setting goals**

The School Committee also heard from Superintendent of Schools James Hayden and Assistant Superintendent Alexander Wyeth regarding the School District's strategic goals between now and 2015. Hayden noted that student lit-

eracy was made a primary focus of those goals, with the goal of ensuring that students are truly "college and career-ready" by the time they finish high school.

Wyeth said emphasis on reading and writing will be increased at all grade levels, with particular focus on strategies to foster "effective reading of non-fiction and informational texts." He added that comprehension routines would be implemented for grades six through twelve, as would new state regulations for English Language Learners (ELL) offerings.

According to Wyeth, local schools will follow an approach summarized by the acronym Strengthen Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Math (STEAM) at all grade levels, adding an "a" for "Art" to the previously used STEM acronym. He said doing this would involve continued Special Education Inclusion strategy workshops in grades six through eight, as well as the examination of student work to determine how existing practices should be modified.

In addition to differentiated instruction allowing for increased inclusion of Special Education (SPED) students, Wyeth said there should be increased integration of technol-

ogy into the curriculum, with the schools' five-year technology plan to be renewed "with an emphasis on teacher training." He also emphasized the importance of addressing students' emotional well-being via programs addressing bullying, drugs and the accessibility of extracurricular activities.

Wyeth and Hayden said they also hoped to increase the use of partnerships with businesses and organizations in the community to provide educational opportunities for students. Hayden noted, for example, that he had recently spoken to the owner of the Norwood Theatre about using that facility for this purpose after it opens at the end of August.

**Transfer for textbook purchase**

The School Committee also approved the transfer of additional funds for the purchase of new science textbooks for eighth graders. Roughly \$1,000 in extra funding was needed for the purchase.

Wyeth said the purchase was part of an ongoing plan to update materials available in the schools. He noted that new science textbooks had been purchased for sixth graders in 2010, followed by seventh grade science texts in 2011 and books for the eighth grade level this year.

# Police unveil new anti-drug strategy

Local police are stepping up efforts to fight drug trafficking in town, and say they want to share their strategy with residents.

The Norwood Police Department recently released a document, available on its web site, detailing what the Department says is an increase in the trafficking of heroin and prescription painkillers. Police Spokesman Kevin Grasso said there had been a noticeable increase in such activity locally.

Grasso said he did not have exact figures detailing how much of an increase there had been. However, he said it had been noticeable, particularly in the past year.

“Absolutely,” he said. “It’s quite serious.”

Grasso said former Police Chief Bartley King had taken notice of the increased drug activity before his retirement earlier this year, and assigned an officer to assist detectives with drug-related matters. He said that the officer, David Eysie, was the only officer who was currently assigned to focus solely to that task, though others have also assisted with it.

The Police Department recently released a twelve-page document, titled “Combating the Abuse of Heroin and Prescription Painkillers; a Strategy by the Norwood Police Depart-

ment.” The document, which Grasso said was largely authored by Police Chief William G. Brooks, outlines problems presented by the aforementioned drugs, details the Police Department’s strategy to combat the problems, and includes information for both drug addicts and the public at large.

Brooks’ document said his department would follow the New York City Police Department’s widely imitated Compstat model of “accurate and timely intelligence, rapid deployment of resources, use of effective tactics and relentless follow-

up and assessment” as he put it, in its anti-drug strategy. He said the department would rely in part on tips from residents, which could be made confidentially by calling 781-440-5181 or sending an email to reportatip@norwoodma.gov.

The document said landlords could play a major role in stopping the trafficking of drugs, since dealers often rent homes rather than owning them. It said documents are available to help landlords evict tenants who sell drugs, and that property owners have an inherent interest in preventing drug sales in their buildings, since “state and federal

forfeiture laws provide for the seizing of properties where owners knew or should have known that drug activity was taking place.”


The document noted that drug addiction is not an easy problem to solve, and that addicts often struggle with it for years before overcoming it, if they can at all. However, the document also suggested that the inability to curtail drug trafficking long-term may be due to a strategy centered on dealers and not users.

The document said the Police Department was instituting a drug intervention program, in which the Department helps addicts find a place where their addiction can be treated. Police said an important factor in this approach was reaching out to addicts shortly after a dealer they have been buying from has been arrested – before they can find a new source.

Grasso noted that the Department’s increased efforts to combat the spread of drug use coincided with its forays into social media. He added that the latter had proven useful in helping Police deal with the former.

“It’s been very effective,” Grasso said. “You see the responses we get through Facebook and Twitter and things like that.”



## CELEBRATING AMERICA'S CORNERSTONE

Forget Jan. 1, the real start of the New Year is really this weekend. When you really think about it, Labor Day is the turning point in many of our lives. It is when summer schedules and vacation time give way to a more regular working week grind. Kids go back to school, new jobs begin and the flip-flops go back in the storage bin.

Even the Red Sox, blowing up the team in dramatic fashion, have signaled to us that it is time to forget about the "Boys of Summer" and focus instead on changing leaves and Sunday football.

Like so many holidays, Labor Day runs the risk of losing its meaning in exchange for its place on the calendar. It is important to remember that the reason we all have an extra day to head to the beach or fire up the barbecue is because, long ago, the date was picked to honor the working men and women of this country.

Ah yes, we can already feel some of our readers already tensing at the very mention of the word "labor." When it comes to unions, there is increasingly a divide between those who think they have given the workingman a voice, and those who decry the

politics and business impact of these organizations.

While true it was intended to follow the lead of pro-union celebrations in other countries way back in 1894 when it became a federal holiday, Labor Day should really take on a broader perspective these days. We should set it aside to honor all who earn their pay with an honest day's work.

A rarely cited factor to the high unemployment rate is an increase in worker productivity.

It may be only a minor influence among the larger economic backdrop, and certainly one that is in part fueled by automation and technology, but American workers are getting more done, more consistently, in the course of a day than ever before.

Many of us may not endure the backbreaking toil of past generations (although certainly many laborers still do), but we are hardly the lazy group we are often accused of being. Unfortunately, we do our jobs well enough that companies can hire fewer people.

The downside is that bosses tend to dump more and more on our plate. The concept of a 9-5 job is increasingly quaint in an era

of long hours and constant connectivity.

It is a testimony to our workforce that we get the job done, done well and with only the tiniest bit of drama or pushback. This country used to make steel, now we design websites.

But hard work is hard work, whether by rough hands or a sharp mind. There will always be those quite happy to mooch off the nation's safety net programs, but most of us understand and appreciate the value of hard work. We thrive on it and it is what has made America a global leader.

On Labor Day, keep all this in mind. It is certainly fair to lament high unemployment, consider the need for better vocation-based education and training, and debate the economic policies that may best benefit the working class. But don't think too hard about all that, at least for one day.

Instead, raise a glass, flip a steak or kick back by the pool. This is a well-deserved day of rest and a rare opportunity to give yourself an overdue pat on the back for everything you do to support your family and country. We salute you as well and thank you.

will be lots of kids [traveling] the streets in various states of excitement."

Hayden said he expected things to be most chaotic at the start and end of the school day, with the first forty-five minutes of the school day - from 8:30 until 9:15 a.m. - to be particularly hectic. He said the schools would have staff on hand prepared to

help alleviate the chaos.

"This will be Wal Mart on steroids," Hayden said. "I'm planning on having lots of greeters, lots of people to help."

Hayden added that he had met with the Police Department to discuss traffic management for the day, and that he had provided them with maps showing drop-off points for students. School Committee member Susan McQuaid suggested that notifications regarding Primary Day be sent out via a Reverse 911 call. Fellow Committee member Paul Samargedlis, however, said his primary concern was not heavy primary turnout, but lack of turnout, in light of poor local turnout in recent elections.

Hayden said voters coming to the polling places on elementary

school grounds could help by planning to vote at times when the chaos of the school day beginning or ending would have subsided. He said the best times for voters to show up in order to avoid the chaos were between 7:00 and 8:00 a.m. or after the students had finished entering or exiting the building for the day. He noted that the student pickup rush took place between 2:30 and 3:15 p.m., and that voters should also avoid coming at that time if possible.

Hayden said local schools would not face a similar problem again come the general election on November 6, as students will not be in school that day. An in-service day is scheduled for that day, and as a result, classes will not be held.

# Town officials prepare for DPW project

Members of the Permanent Building Construction Committee (PBCC) met with other town officials, engineers and other involved parties Monday afternoon to prepare for the start of a major town building project.

The group met in Town Hall to discuss the proposed expansion of the neighboring facility that houses the Department of Public Works (DPW). During the meeting, they heard a presentation by engineers Jeff Alberti and Dave Steeves of Weston and Sampson, the firm selected for the project at the recommendation of DPW Superintendent Mark Ryan.

The PBCC had met four days earlier to finalize details of a contract with Weston and Sampson, with signing to take place Monday if both parties' attorneys had reached a final agreement by then. As of Monday's meeting, the contract had not yet arrived for signing.

During their presentation, Alberti and Steeves addressed issues that could become somewhat problematic as the DPW project progresses. Overall, however, they said it was expected to be smooth sailing.

"There's a lot of work to do in the next six months," Alberti said. "But we're up to the task."

Town Manager John Carroll was keen to learn the expected cost of the project, saying he wanted to be able to tell the Budget Balancing Committee how much debt the town would incur. Alberti initially said the projected cost should be known

by the end of January. This answer did not satisfy Carroll.

"I don't want to be looking at that in February," Carroll said. "We need to talk about that early on."

Compass Project Management President Tim Bonfatti, whose company has consulted with the town on this and other projects, said the information might be obtainable at the end of October, when Alberti said a schematic design would be completed. Carroll said he would like the information "even sooner," but Selectman William Plasko said it would be okay to wait until November if more accurate information might be available then, as Bonfatti suggested.

Alberti and Steeves said one factor that could complicate matters was the need to obtain approval for the project from the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority (MBTA), given the DPW site's proximity to a railroad station – a requirement they said they had only learned of recently. The engineers said they would obtain permits from the MBTA early on and confer with the agency on what could or could not be done on the site.

"This project should be straightforward," Alberti said. "It's just modification."

Alberti said Weston and Sampson wanted to speak to the MBTA regarding the line between the two properties, noting that the existing layout presented some logistical challenges. He said it would be easier if the line was straight, but that changing it was "not critical to the project."

"They [MBTA] seemed very approachable and open," Steeves added. "They just want open communication."

Yet to be determined was where DPW employees could work and store equipment during construction, with Alberti noting that modular facilities had been considered. It was agreed that, starting next Tuesday, a "working group" would meet twice a month to discuss the project's status. That group will include Carroll, Ryan, Assistant Town Manager Bernie Cooper, Assistant Superintendent of Public Works Gary Schorer, PBCC member Ted Callahan, Alberti and Steeves.

# Man arrested on drug charges

A man was arrested on drug-related charges last week, and is also being held at the request of federal immigration authorities, according to a statement from the Norwood Police Department.

At 3:20 p.m. that day, Norwood Police detectives assisted by detectives from the Norfolk County Police Anti-Crime (NORPAC) Task Force arrested Carlos Alexander Baez-Pena, age 29, of 6301 Chestnut W, Randolph on two counts of distribution of a class B controlled substance (cocaine), operating a motor vehicle without being licensed and providing a false name to a police officer.

During the investigation, police said, an undercover NORPAC detective referred to in police reports only as "Detective X" purchased cocaine from Baez-Pena on two occasions. The arrest took place at the corner of

Nahatan Street and Norwest Drive, although police said the apartment complex "played no particular role in Baez-Pena's activity."


When booked, Baez-Pena initially gave a false name and presented a Venezuelan driver's license. However, when officers transmitted his fingerprints to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), they learned that he was actually born in the Dominican Republic. Police said it was also learned that Baez-Pena had been arrested for dealing drugs twice before, in Boston and Needham, and that he had been deported twice by Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). Police said the Venezuelan license was fake.

Following Friday's arrest, Police say ICE placed a detainer on Baez-Pena and he was held over the weekend without bail. Detectives seized the car he was driving pending a civil forfeiture. Baez-Pena was arraigned in Dedham District Court Monday morning.

amount available for it to \$250,000. Those volunteers, led by Recreation Department Director Gerry Miller, have been primary advocates of the project.

"We feel that Town Meeting has mandated that we do this," Kinsman said. "So we're trying to come up with a way to get this project done in a decent manner."

The latest snafu the PBCC had encountered on the concession stand project came when Forsberg said he would not give his approval to the project. Kinsman clarified last week that Forsberg had indicated he would not be comfortable doing so unless a variance was secured from the state Plumbing Board, given that food would be served at the site.

Last week, the PBCC considered whether or not to push forward with the project and seek the variance, with Committee member Francis "Jerry" Hopcroft suggesting that they not worry about the variance for now and simply begin seeking an architect to design the facility. Bonfatti cautioned that this could end up being a waste of money if the project could not be brought to completion, a risk Hopcroft said he understood.

Kinsman said that if a variance was sought for the project, it most likely would not be approved with just two pairs of toilets, as had previously been proposed. He noted that the state Plumbing Board had granted just eleven variances of this type in the recent past.

# Road work underway

The town is completing a round of road improvements for which it is receiving state funding, while plans are underway to make safety-related improvements to one intersection.

Town Manager John Carroll and Department of Public Works (DPW) Superintendent Mark Ryan said town workers were in the process of completing the last of several road improvements funded with Chapter 90 money. Meanwhile, the town continues planning for pending improvements to the intersection of Washington, Prospect and Fulton Streets.

Earlier this year, improvements were made to Azalea Drive, Autumn Street, Blossom Street and Irving Street, the latter three of which were accepted as town streets at a Special Town Meeting in November of last year. According to Carroll, the work performed on these streets included paving of roadways and the installation of bituminous concrete curbing.

The work was performed by Mario Susi and Sons, who will be performing work on Winter Street as the final part of this year's round of Chapter 90-funded work. The portion of the street to be worked on runs between Nichols Street and Washington Street.

"They're working on that project now," Carroll said. "I'd say it will be done in a couple of weeks."

Ryan gave an estimated completion date of September 6. He said the work had been put out to bid in March.

Carroll said the town set aside money for Chapter 90 projects every year, with the state reimbursing Norwood for the work after the fact. Ryan said the town had received roughly \$868,000 in Chapter 90 funding for its road projects this year. Carroll said about \$400,000 of that would be set aside for Nahatan Street, where National Grid has been conducting gas line-related work.

Meanwhile, the town is making preparations for a less routine road improvement project involving the intersection of Washington, Prospect and Fulton Streets. A transportation bond bill recently signed by Governor Deval Patrick set aside \$400,000 in funding for the project.

"We're trying to make it safer for drivers and pedestrians," Ryan said.

Ryan said the intersection had proven confusing and sometimes dangerous in the past. The project, which Ryan said could have a price tag of roughly \$3 million, entails a new layout and signaling scheme for the intersection, as well as accommodations for bicycles and pedestrians. Ryan added that the cost of the work would likely be covered via federal funds.

According to Ryan, designs for the intersection were being

discussed with the Massachusetts Department of Transportation (DOT), and had reached the 25 percent milestone. This means that the parties are close to reaching the final design stage of the process.


