## End of an era at Board of Selectmen Donohue defeated by Hajjar

After 18 years of service to the Town of Norwood on the Board of Selectmen, Helen Abdallah-Donohue will be leaving her seat.

Former Finance Commission Member David Hajjar beat out Donohue for the second place spot during the April 1 election held on Monday. Current Board Chair Thomas Maloney topped the ticket with 2,187 votes, followed by Hajjar with 1,857 and then Donohue with 1,572.

Despite the loss, Donohue said she will definitely continue to serve the Town in whatever capacity she can.

"I love the Town of Norwood and it's a wonderful place to live and I ap-

preciate all the people who voted for me so much," she said. "It's been a wonderful 18 years."

Hajjar came within 50 votes of the win at the last 2016 election and will now serve for at least three years, until the next election.

"I would also like to pay tribute to Helen, she's an excellent campaigner, she made it tough," Hajjar said. "Her dedication to this Town, I appreciate it very much and I want to congratulate her on her 18 years of service."

Maloney said he has no doubt Abdallah-Donohue will continue to be a great asset to the Town.

I absolutely insist that she do so," he said. "There is no end of the tributes we could pay to Helen Donohue and what she's given to this Town over the

course of her life. There is no one in this Town more meshed into this Town's life or cares more about the Town than Helen Donohue."

Hajjar said getting involved in the Finance Commission really helped him to get noticed by residents and get his opinions out there. He said it was also gratifying to win this time when he came within 50 votes three years ago.

"It was 56 votes, I believe, three years ago," he said. "I think the last two years I've been on the Finance Commission exposed the residents to the things that I did successfully, and so when I got involved I could get into many of the issues and people took that

## CPC maps out 2020 budget

Norwood's Community Preservation Committee met at Norwood Town Hall on Wednesday, March 27 to discuss account balances and appropriations with regards to the preservation fund.

A sample document for fiscal year 2020 funds estimated \$1,555,546 total funds with project proposals at \$492,441. Broken down, the sample came to \$183,523 for housing, \$129,023 available for historical funds with \$66,864 project proposals requested, \$183,523 for recreational land funds with \$157,965 project proposals requested, and \$1,059,477 for general unallocated funds with \$119,476 project proposals requested. A rough estimate for FY20 revenue is \$621,594.

Chairman Joseph Greeley, vice chairman John Hall, recording secretary Cheryl Doyle, John J. Aprea III, Patricia Griffin Starr, Debbie Holmwood of the planning board, and Peter McFarland were joined by director of community and economic development Paul Halkiotis and assistant planner Patrick Deschenes.

"We really have several values in play, some of them are signaling to people the importance of all of these areas and some of them are signaling that we are holding each area to the kind of captive division by the percentages," Hall said. "What we've es-

## St. Gabriel's almost done

The Permanent Building Construction Committee (PBCC) met on Thursday, March 28 to receive an update on the St. Gabriel's Restoration Project.

"The work is about 95 percent complete," John Racine, the Overall Project Manager from RGB Architects, told the committee. "Most of the clemstone and the copper have been installed."

The major work, including the copper roof, staging and the stained glass has been done, according to Racine.

The main topic, and the crowning achievement of the

project, was discussion of the lantern adorning the roof.

"They left the bottom of the legs basically original," Racine said, noting that the contractors tried to straighten them "as much as they could."

He explained that there will be a sealant at the base plates to prevent moisture seepage. The legs are stabilized with large bolts.

Racine then drew a picture to clarify what the legs would look like to show members.

"It's not really flashing," Racine said, noting a waterproofing term used in construction. "It's just at the termination of the

as a positive, and I think that's what they wanted in a Selectman."

Hajjar said he's looking forward to new challenges on the Board of Selectmen, as he said he feels working with the budgets and numbers of the Finance Commission to be more cut and dry. He said Selectmen work more on policy and have to make judgment calls instead of the black and white balance sheets of the FinCom.

"There are more diverse issues to deal with," he said. "FinCom gave me the opportunity, but it's more numbers-based and there are fewer gray areas. I mean, there's only so much you can do with the numbers in front of you, but with Selectmen it's about the policy, it's about licenses, it's about planning and so it's a much more rigorous playing field with regards to the issues they have to deal with. I'm ready to dig in."

Hajjar added he believes his replacement on the Finance Commission, Kellie Noumi, will definitely be a good fit.

"She's definitely ready, she's a very good numbers person, she's got some good ideas that she's expressed during this budget season and I think she'll be a great attribute to the Town," he said.

Noumi, for her part, said she's been following the FinCom and the Budget Bal-

ancing Commission closely. She said she's been a Town Meeting member for a year now, but that this is her first position on a public board she has ever held.

"It's an interesting time to be in politics in the Town of Norwood," she said. "I'm just hopeful I can use my experience to help push things forward."

"I support the override, I think we have benefited for a very long time with our large commercial tax base," she said. "We've been able to drive down the individual taxpayers rates and I think that's been going on a long time and we now have to make a decision on what kind of Town we want to live in. That's going to involve significantly cutting services or figuring out how to raise revenue and it's a hard conversation because nobody wants their taxes to go up, but at the end of the day you can't have it both ways. You can't have world-class services with low taxes."

Maloney said he's happy to have seen such a great turnout for his campaign, and is also looking forward to working with Hajjar.

"I'm pleased and honored that the people of this Town chose to ratify their decision from three years ago with me," he said. "I went against

two excellent candidates in David Hajjar and Helen Donohue and beating them took every ounce of effort from me, but I'm very happy for the Town. We had a great election, and I welcome David to the Board of Selectmen and I think he's going to do a good job."

For the other contested elections, Jennifer Polito won the open seat at the Norwood Housing Authority with 1,799 votes against William Breen with 630 and Lisa Dufresne with 339. Leah O'Leary and Donna Montgomery won out for the two open seats at the Trustees of Morrill Memorial Library election with 1,799 and 1,512 votes respectively, beating out Tina Taylor, who had 1,154 votes.

Voter turnout was lower than in the last election. Out of a total of 18,504 registered voters, 3,389 cast their votes, making the turnout percentage 18.31 percent. That's actually down from the 20 percent voter turnout three years ago, which had a total of 3,578 total votes cast.

For the uncontested seats, Alan Slater and Noumi won the open FinCom seats, David Hern took the Town Moderator seat, Myev Bodenhofer and Joan Giblin took the open School Committee seats, Carolyn Riccardi stayed on the Board of Health and James Perry kept his Constable position as well.

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# With a new chairman and Board member, Selectmen tackle heavy agenda

At their April 2 meeting, Selectmen voted unanimously to elect Paul Bishop as their new chairman and welcomed David Hajjar. they then quickly turned their attention to an unusually heavy agenda which lasted more than two hours.

Chief William G. Brooks III, Norwood Police Department, submitted his monthly report which included highlights of the department's activities. Citizen Police Academy is half way through its program being held at Norwood High School with the latest session covering crime scene examination. Brooks recently met with the Brazilian community to discuss the role of the police in the Norwood where he emphasized polices services. "Their safety is our paramount concern," he said and reassured the group that the police do not get involved in enforcing immigration issues. The department has also offered a Rape Aggression Defense course to women with 10-25 attendees for 12 contact hours of class work.

Chief George Morrice, Norwood Fire Department, also reported on the activities of his department. "We are well into burning season," he said referring to controlled fires that are allowed by permit. Permits are available from the Fire Department. Morrice noted that April can produce a substantial number of brush fires despite its reputation for showers.

Newly elected Selectman Hajjar directed a number of questions to Morrice regarding his written report. He asked if

Morrice can add additional expense notations in the future to explain overtime costs month-to-month so these can be viewed in context. "Can you show numbers of people trained and hours?" Tony Mazzucco said they can look at another way to show the number of hours for training which satisfied Hajjar.

A presentation by Seth Pickering and Nick Connors of the Massachusetts Department of Energy Resources (DOER) Green Communities Division provided an overview of the MA Green Communities Program. The program makes available up to \$20 million per year for energy efficiency contracts/grants. Over \$105 million has been given to date to Massachusetts towns. For Norwood to be eligible, the town needs to complete five steps. Pickering estimated that the town could qualify for a \$190,000 with future grants of up to \$250,000. "It's not a one-time thing," said Pickering.

Norwood has completed the first two steps in the process. The town needs to create an energy reduction plan to reduce energy use by 20 percent in five years and adopt a fuel-efficient vehicle purchase plan. Fire vehicles and 8,500-pound vehicles are exempt from the efficiency requirement. Mazzucco feels there would not be a problem meeting the standard as most of the town vehicles are exempt and that Norwood can get these final steps done during the summer. The issue is already on the special town meeting agenda.

A number of articles discussed that are to be added to

the town meeting warrant involved Paul Halkiotis, Director of Community Planning & Economic Development. Halkiotis was present at the meeting to support the Green Communities initiative. An unexpectedly lengthy discussion ensued between Halkiotis and the Selectmen regarding open car storage

## Election Spoke Volumes

How much can be read into the defeat of Helen Abdallah Donohue by newcomer David Hajjar? Quite frankly, the end result was fairly predictable given what has been happening across the country. What was a little surprising is how resoundingly Hajjar took the second spot; his percentage of victory over Donohue was large, though the absolute numbers of votes cast remains disappointing. Figures show that less than 20% of registered voters in Norwood bothered to show up and cast a vote, which one would assume would bode well for a long tenured incumbent like Donohue. However, what is abundantly clear now is that the “old guard” voting bloc that long time incumbents like Donohue could rely on are finally giving way to a younger generation demanding results through creative and proactive actions instead of simply maintaining the status quo.

Hajjar defeating Donohue is akin to the recently elected Ayanna Pressley defeating decades-long incumbent United States Representative Michael Capuano and, in New York, Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez defeating incumbent, Democratic Caucus Chair Joe Crowley, in what has been described as the biggest upset victory in the 2018 midterm-elections. The newcomers’ defeats of Capuano and Crowley were not because they expounded on groundbreaking new ways of doing things. In some respects, their victories can be attributed to the simple fact that they weren’t older white guys who always towed the party line, rarely expressing anything remotely new or innovative. The same is true here in Norwood. Hajjar didn’t offer anything significantly different than what Donohue had been providing for years. He just won because, well, he’s not Donohue. And the rest of the Selectmen in this Town should sit up and take notice.

What Donohue did do in recent weeks was to express she didn’t support the current override proposal on the table to be voted on in a June 3 special election. Donohue thought the amount sought by those in support was too much, and that there are other ways to balance the budget, perhaps utilizing an override seeking less money. It’s ironic in that her willingness to buck the trend in this case and not just go along with the many other vocal supporters of the override may have cost her the election. This newspaper is still undecided as to whether or not this is the right time for the proposed override, and we give Donohue credit for speaking up and representing some in Town who, though less likely to speak out, aren’t enthusiastic about their taxes significantly going up.

The proposed override has galvanized what appears to be a younger generation of residents who currently have children in Norwood’s schools and don’t like the prognosticated draconian cuts the schools have been warning of should an override fail. However, many residents who have lived here over the years have become inured to the seemingly endless cries of poverty from the school board because, historically, money has magically appeared at the last minute avoiding all the extra curriculars and teachers from ending up on the cutting room floor. Whether there are no more bunnies to be pulled out of the hat remains to be determined, perhaps after June 3rd.

Donohue’s loss in this election in no way diminishes her contributions to the Town of Norwood. She continued a long standing tradition of Abdallahs and Donohues being involved in this Town and making it a better place to live for everyone. Ms. Donohue has promised to continue contributing to the Town she loves moving forward, and everyone should hope she does just that.

### TOWN’S COMMITMENT TO EDUCATION IS LACKING

*To the Editor:*

Ten years ago my husband, my 2 year old, and I chose Norwood to be our hometown. We did not make this choice hastily or without research. First, Norwood was the perfect distance between my job teaching in Newton and his job teaching in Bellingham. Second, it was affordable with low taxes, and houses we could afford. Third, it had amazing recreation programs, parks, and a library for children and for townspeople. It was clear to us that the people, who live in Norwood, love Norwood. We were sold.

Fast forward ten years, and we could not be happier with our decision to claim Norwood as our own. My husband and I are both public school teachers with

a strong commitment to public education and serving community. In addition, I have recently become a town meeting member.

As our children have grown and entered the school system (our girls are currently in grade 3 and grade 5 at the Oldham), we have been impressed with the dedication of the teachers and the community at large. It was important to us to have our children educated in their hometown, even though I could have had my children attend the public school system where I teach, a system that spends a fair bit more on its pupils, teachers, and school buildings. Although the students in my district deserve a great education, the children of Norwood are no less deserving.

However, each year we’ve lived here I’ve watched and listened as Selectmen and the School Committee have had to make hard choices to balance the budget on both the town and the school side. Cut after cut has been made. I no longer feel that my children are getting the best Norwood can give them. I have not been impressed with is the town’s financial commitment to educating the future of Norwood. It is clear Norwood loves its schools, and has great pride in the town, but we have not been able to keep pace with the growing cost of education state-wide.

With the lowest property taxes in the area, Norwood can give so much more and still have a low tax rate. For the past 5-6 years, I have been asking myself and any parents who would listen, “Why hasn’t there been an override?” The answer has always been, “They’ll find some money. It’ll all work out.” This misinformation is still out there, as if something magical might happen that can erase rising costs and years of not funding the town adequately! That time has passed.

Our dedicated town manager and tireless superintendent of schools have made it very clear that an override is needed. It has been needed since I moved to Norwood 10 years ago. Our taxes will increase, this is true, but what we will get back will far outweigh the increase in taxes. Even with an override, our taxes will still be lower than

most towns in our area. Our houses will be worth more, your children’s education will be worth more, and our town will be worth more. There is ONLY one reasonable way to solve this deficit: an override.

Our children -the future of Norwood-deserve after school activities and sports, classrooms and schools that are not over capacity a wonderful early education center that shows a commitment to education for our youngest students, safe roads to drive on in any kind of weather, a safe town with the current amount of police and fire personnel, and fully funded public and school libraries.

Norwood should be a town where people want to raise a family, feel good about their schools, and feel proud to call their home. I urge you to vote for the override on June 3rd.

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# ZBA talks Sky, Winsmith

The Norwood Zoning Board of Appeals heard from representatives of Sky Restaurant on Tuesday, April 2, and the group's plan to turn the property into 39 condominiums.

The plan is to build a new building on the site right behind the existing Furlong's Candy Shop. The proposed structure would be four stories and would include a first floor restaurant with 200 seats and the 39 condos above it. The new construction would have a total of 188 parking spaces.

The details of the project include two entrances and exits; one coming in from Route 1 and one going out through the back of an existing gravel driveway to Sumner Street.

Several Sumner Street residents expressed concern that this would create more traffic on their street and impose unnecessary hardship for them. One resident also expressed concern that the Town is creating too much multifamily housing.

Residents William Vail and Antonio Pinheiro also voiced concern that this egress would violate an agreement established in two cases dating to 1994 and 1996 concerning the property. At that time, as ZBA member Philip Riley explained, CAT Realty Trust and Star Restaurant Corporation originally wanted to put an egress on Sumner Street.

Riley said that the case was to allow a special permit for parking in a residential area. The property is actually two parcels, with about one third of the property in a highway business zone and two thirds of it in general residence. The original case wanted a special permit to allow parking in the gen-

eral residential zone, and one of the agreements in the case was that the restaurant would not pave or use the gravel road to Sumner.

Development attorney James Hilliard said the case did not apply to the current applicant for several reasons. One, it was a restaurant proposal and this is a residential proposal. Two, it expired years ago and, finally, it is not a requirement of the permit or approval process.

"I would suggest that the issue before us was a voluntary statement, and I'm proposing to the board it wasn't a requirement or condition and that this is a new request for a venture of residential and not having a restaurant business in and out all the time," Hilliard said.

Hilliard said that while there would still be a restaurant there, they would gate the egress at Sumner so that only residents could open or close it and there would not be cut through traffic from patrons of the restaurant.

Vail brought in a letter he said directly refuted the voluntary gift nature of the previous agreement, and that it was in the records of the Town. Riley said he had not had a chance to "delve" too deeply into the Town's records from the time so they would have to confirm the letter's authenticity, but it basically read that Pinheiro had an agreement with Cat Realty through his own personal lawyer that they would not build out the Sumner egress.

Vail further pointed out that the egress would be a benefit and not a requirement for the condos, as there would be another egress onto Route 1.

"In my assertion the only reason for the Sumner Entrance is that it's an enhancement to the property, but is that enhancement a detriment to the

neighborhood?" he asked.

Vail estimated that if each condo had two people and they each had two cars that would be a totality of hundreds of excess trips on Sumner St. a week. While Riley said they would have to go through the records of the case, he felt that the Board's original decision, though perhaps not legally binding through requirements or orders of conditions, was based heavily in the removal of

Sumner Street as an egress.

"It does seem to me that the Board is required to balance the beneficial effects and adverse effects of a proposal and it looks to me in the decision that that's exactly what they were doing," he said.

Riley added he felt the biggest adverse effect at that time would have been the entrance on Sumner, and he felt the Board only voted to approve the permit because of the closure

of that entrance. Board Member Thomas Brady said he felt that though the Board should consider the opinions of the neighbors of the property, they also have a duty to be fair to the developer.

"I think the Board has always had the residents and the Townspeople as their number one priority, but it has been pointed out in the past that we

lots in the town. No additional tax revenue is collected on these lots that are estimated to use 40 acres of Norwood land. Neighbors have been concerned about some of these lots.

Halkiotis believes more time is needed to study these lots and that eventually the Town will vote for parking garages along the Auto Mile to house these cars. "There are clear benefits to the auto dealers," said Halkiotis saying that it would not be necessary to clear snow off vehicles in garages. Hajjar voiced support for putting this topic on the agenda for discussion in the future for the fee generation. "Open lot storage is not acceptable in certain parts of town," he said.

Halkiotis also discussed zoning changes in the downtown area to attract new businesses

and residential apartments. He noted that 41 dwelling units in one acre is not an overly crowded standard. Revitalizing downtown would be the goal. There are 300 residential units downtown which no one hears very much about. "We want to avoid those larger complexes," added Mazzucco.

Selectmen voted on allowing a number of events including "Town Meeting 101" for April 10 at Norwood High School Auditorium, the Third Annual Zero K Road Race to be held Sunday, April 28, and the Annual Little League Parade on Saturday, April 20.

The Selectmen paid tribute to former Board member Helen Donohue for her service to the city. All again welcomed Hajjar. "It is an honor to be part of this Board," Hajjar said.

essentially done is try to find a compromise and hope that it gives people who are particularly concerned about one of these values enough of what they were expecting and hoping to see, and doing that for every other person who may have different values."

Article A centered around sums of money the Town will vote to reserve for later spending on open space, historic resources, community housing, administrative and operating expenses, and a budgeted reserve account, while article B focused on what sum of money the Town will vote to transfer and appropriate from the preservation fund. Doyle made a point to keep fiscal balance a priority.

"Because so much of the money came out of the unreserved pot, I think any money left over should go back into the unreserved pot to keep it even," Doyle said.

Article C regarded what sums of money the Town will vote to transfer and appropriate for restoration and construction projects. Those projects include construction of Eliot Field "Lower Balch" Playground, improvements to Bond Street Playground, construction of an outdoor pavilion shade near the "Lower Pond" at Alevizos Park off Endicott and Walpole Streets, and restoration of the Memorial Carillon in the Norwood Memorial Municipal building.

Articles A, B, and C were unanimously accepted by the committee to move forward with. Article D was not approved.

Article D raised the issue of what sum or sums of money the Town will vote to transfer and appropriate from the community preservation fund, or borrow for acquisition of a parcel of vacant land for open space or conservation purposes. The 6.07 acres in question are at 84 Morse Street. The new realtors responsible for the property - DCD Automotive Holdings - aren't prepared to sell yet. Deschenes and Halkiotis both confirmed that representatives affirmed their commitment to sell to the

town but would prefer to defer until the fall.

"The indication that I received from a representative is that the appraised value is at a reasonable price to them," Halkiotis said. "And they want to work with us to sell the property but I think for a number of different reasons, it's not the right timing to bring that to the town in April."

Halkiotis went on to warn that DCD may not have acquired the title from the previous owner, Round Path, LLC in time for next month's meeting, and Greeley mentioned the difference between the local 20-day appeal period for the Town and the one for the state department of environmental protection.

"And as you know, there's a 60-day [MassDEP] appeal period for one of the permits that would bring them into June," Greeley said. "I don't know why they are saying they don't want to sell it right now."

The committee will have two more chances to come to a conclusion on Article D when they meet again on the 10th and 24th of April.

base of the lantern. It's just where the legs meet the base itself."

There will be a place for moisture to drain down, he added, with the collection boxes and piping.

There was concern about ventilation because of the moisture in the building. However, the chapel has a vent and a door.

"There appeared to be a vent up there the other day," said vice chair Bill Kinsman, who chaired the meeting in the absence of chair Bob Silk. "The mason's assistant was sitting on it, so it appears to be pretty strong."

Callahan told Racine he wanted to make sure that the building had proper air circulation.

Racine said that there will be

a list of conditions that the Town will need to follow in order to maintain the building, such as keeping the temperature at 50 degrees and cleaning the leaves from the gutters.

Kinsman said he went to the site and talked with one of the workers, who said he was excited to be restoring a historic building.

"I don't know how many times they get to work on a neogothic lantern," he said.

"I don't know how many times he would get me to say, 'Quoth the raven, nevermore,'" Callahan commented, referencing the dark poem by Edgar Allan Poe, which spoke of a lamplighter.

also have to show fairness to the applicant," he said. "In the brief time I've had to review this issue the applicant, in my personal opinion, has bent over backwards to make accommodations for the residents."

The Board voted to continue the issue to a later date.

In other business, a recent application for a new Crossfit facility at Winsmith has brought forth some more general issues regarding traffic safety, parking and pedestrian access at the shops at 62 Endicott. Representative Diane Geraghty Hall went through a rough plan to make the area safer, which included the installation of one-ways throughout the property. The one-ways would create a counter clockwise circle around the central pond of the property starting at the Endicott Street entrance to Winsmith. There would be two-way access at the east section of the property for parking and access to the pond from the lot, and then one-way clockwise directed traffic circling back west around the rear of the property.

Riley said he was concerned about pedestrian safety and the Board agreed, since the area used to be a mill manufacturing area and was not designed for pedestrians. The Board suggested that they put in Jersey Barrier sidewalks, at least temporarily, to improve safety in the area.

"The way things are situated now, I think it's flat out dangerous for folks to walk around," Riley said.

Winsmith representative Sheryl Elliott said they would continue to work on the plan.

Cathy Carney said that some of the benches were re-varnished, and that the detailing was "very ornate."

Racine said there was still a remainder of \$53,000 that could be spent on the project, set aside as a contingency fee. The total project cost so far has been \$1.58 million.

The rededication ceremony is scheduled to be held on May 18, when there will be an installation of a plaque.

Carney suggested putting together a video presentation with pictures showing the history of the project. The pictures could then be displayed on the PBCC Town webpage.

"It will be the first time we will be able to show the start to finish of a project electronically," she said. "It's important for the PBCC to get credit. It was a ten-month project. It's important for people to see what you guys are doing."

## CONTEXT PROVIDED FOR LAST WEEK'S LETTER

To the Editor:

A letter in the March 28th edition of this newspaper makes some claims regarding teacher salaries. The facts mentioned were not inaccurate, but I would like to offer some context.

First, it is true that the teachers received a Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) of 2.5% for this current fiscal year. However, the COLA for FY18 was 2.0% and for FY17 was 1.25%. The contract does not call for 2.5% increases every year.

Teachers do earn more money as they gain more experience. This is not unique to Norwood. All teacher contracts in Massachusetts are structured this way. When teachers are considering what district they would like to work for, they consider not just starting salary, but the salary progression over time. On August 27, 2018, the School Committee presented an analysis of teacher salaries to the Budget Balancing Committee. This analysis was based on data collected by the state from all districts. In comparison to local districts, Norwood teacher salaries are slightly lower than average and year to year increases for each teacher are similar to those in neighboring districts.

Norwood does have a number of teachers at or near the top step of the salary scale. This simply reflects the fact that we have many veteran teachers. In fact, if the average teacher has a 30 year career, we would expect that roughly one third of teachers would be on steps 1-10, one third of teachers would be in years 11-20 of their careers (meaning steps 11-13, the top 3 steps of the pay scale), and one third of teachers would be in years 21-30 of their careers (at step 13, the top step.)

It should be noted that once teachers reach the top step of the salary scale, the only increase in salary they receive is the COLA. This means the more teachers there are at the top step of the scale, the smaller the annual increase in the total salary budget. As part of the 5-year projections completed by the Budget Balancing Committee, the School Department projected annual salary increases based on current staffing. This analysis shows that each year, the percentage increase is expected to drop slightly as more teachers reach the top step of the salary scale.

The projections show that if the override passes and additional staff is added for FY20, the expected year to year increases in the school budget would be: 3.5% for FY21, 3.4% for FY22, 3.3% for FY23, and 3.2% for FY24. Although this increase is more than the 2.5% increase allowed under Proposition 2 1/2 for existing properties, when new growth is factored in, this is a sustainable year to year increase.
