Good Friday fire at Town Hall

A fire in Executive Secretary Debra Melcher's office caused significant damage to several rooms in Town Hall last Friday. Chief Mike Howard estimates there was \$200,000 worth of damage, including contents and expected expenses for cleaning of the office and surrounding floors.

"We had heavy damage in that room of origin," Howard said, adding there was also light to moderate smoke damage throughout Town Hall.

Town Manager John Carroll's and Assistant General Manager Bernie Cooper's offices, which are adjacent to Melcher's office, suffered smoke and water damage. The windows in these offices were destroyed, and small shards of glass fell to the Town Hall parking lot below. Veterans' Agent Teddy Mulvehill's office,

which was a floor below Melcher's office, also had water damage.

At 1:04 p.m., fire alarm master box 2111 went off, alerting the Fire Department about an issue at Town Hall. They arrived a minute later to find the fire, which originated in Melcher's office.

In an E-mail statement, George Morrice wrote, "Fortunately, the fire alarm system detected the smoke, which alerted the Norwood Fire Department, who were on scene within a minute and were able to quickly extinguish the fire, preventing greater damage to the Town Hall."

Howard stated, "The fire alarm system played a key role."

Because Town Hall closed at noon due to Good Friday, the only person in the building at the time of the fire was Mulvehill, who was in his office downstairs, and he exited

the building safely.

No one was injured, and firefighters were able to secure the building quickly.

"They did a fantastic job knocking the fire down and keeping it in that room," Howard said.

Norwood firefighters did not fight the flames alone. Fire crews from Westwood and Walpole were also on scene, while the Sharon Fire Department provided station coverage. The Norwood Police Department also assisted on site, helping with the investigation and redirecting traffic, as a portion of Central Street was closed during the incident.

"We had probably 24 or 25 people here," Howard said, adding that all of the town's fire apparatus, including Ambulance 2, were on the scene.

No immediate determination was made as to the cause

Airport suspends BAC privileges

The Norwood Airport Commission unanimously voted to suspend Boston Air Charter's (BAC) commercial license at their April 6 meeting. BAC is being punished for their March 17 actions, when two BAC planes took off of the closed runway 35.

As a result, BAC's commercial license has been suspended until June 30, 2010. After this date, BAC must wait three months before they can re-apply as an initial applicant. The charter company has ten days to cease operations, at which point all security badges associated with BAC will be deactivated. BAC will also be given notice as a tenant to leave the DC-3 ramp. The motion to do so was made by Thomas Wynne, and the commission unanimously supported him.

Norwood Airport Commission clerk Kevin Shaughnessy was not pleased with BAC's actions over the past weeks.

"I was extremely disappointed in the actions that took place," Shaughnessy said, adding BAC neither offered an

apology nor showed remorse for their actions.

"I thought we were entering a new phase in our relationship. I was very encouraged." Shaughnessy said, acknowledging the past problems between the commission and BAC.

Whether BAC had clearance to take off or not proved to be an issue at the meeting. Norwood Airport Commission members said BAC did not have necessary clearance, while BAC Counsel Matthew Watsky argued the opposite.

Norwood Airport Commission Chairman Mark Ryan said that the Air Traffic Control tower did not provide BAC with clearance, nor did the pilots consult with Airport Manager Russ Maguire before taking off, and they have grave concerns about this.

"Boston Air Charter and their pilots absolutely do not have the authority to take off from a closed runway," Ryan said.

Watsky said the BAC pilots contacted the tower, who in turn communicated with the pilots

Two TIFs for TM

The Board of Selectmen voted to place a pair of TIFs, or Tax Increment Financing agreements, on the warrant for the May 10 Special Town Meeting. Both the CertainTeed plant at 1077 Pleasant St. (formerly Bird & Son) and the Home Market Foods at 140 Morgan Dr. are looking to expand, and are looking for a TIF if they do so.

A TIF can provide a property tax exemption based on a percentage of value added through new construction or significant improvement done in a development area. It is not a discount on taxes, but a tax credit.

Wes Atamian, President of Home Market Foods, said they are looking to make a \$12 to

\$15 million dollar investment, and this expansion will add an additional processing line and add to their frozen storage area.

Home Market Foods is a frozen food manufacture that produces numerous frozen food products for private labels. They were established in 1957 and have operated out of Norwood since 2004. Currently, there are between 315 and 325 employees, and the expansion will add to that number.

"This project will create in excess of 100 new jobs by 2012," Atamian said, adding these jobs would have health and 401k benefits. About 25 percent of them would be salaried jobs, the rest hourly.

Selectman Helen Abdallah-Donohue was concerned with

Selectmen stay put, Badger wins school seat

Only 22.98 percent of Norwood voters went to the polls on Monday, Apr. 5, but those who did cast their votes re-elected the incumbents on the Board of Selectmen and voted for change on the School Committee.

The Board of Selectmen race was the closest on the ballot, with Selectman Michael Lyons topping the ticket with 2,205 votes. Selectmen Helen Abdallah-Donohue received 2,028 votes, putting her 98 votes ahead of challenger Allan Howard's 1,930 votes.

Both Lyons and Donohue thanked the voters for giving them three more years in the position.

"I just want to thank my wife for the work she's done during this campaign," Lyons said, adding, "I want to thank her for all her hard work and the voters for putting me back in."

Donohue said, "I appreciate the voters giving me the chance to serve the community for another three years," adding she hopes to continue to work for the town and make decisions to help its citizens.

She added the race was close because of the quality of the candidates.

"The three of us were qualified for the job, and the voters realized it," Donohue said. "It was tough not to take all three of us."

It was a tough loss for Howard, but one he accepted. He met with several supporters at the Norwood Sportsman's Club after the election, and thanked them for their work and acknowledged their efforts.

"I and my friends worked as hard as we could, and we gave it our best shot," Howard said. "Of course, I'm disappointed."

Howard added he had run for the Board of Selectmen twice in the past, and both times the results weren't close. This time, he

came within 100 votes of being a Selectman.

"I'm not sure if it's harder to miss by a little or by a lot," Howard said.

While the Board of Selectmen remained the same, voters opted for change on the School Committee. Challenger John Badger won seven out of the town's nine districts, and topped the ticket with 2,596 votes, over 250 more than second place finisher Courtney Rau. Rau won districts 3 and 6 and retained her seat on the committee with 2,345 votes. Incumbent Eleanor Travers was also re-elected, with 1,909 votes.

Badger said there were two reasons he was elected: "Hard work and all the people who helped on the campaign."

He specifically mentioned his wife, Maria Badger, for all her work and the hours she spent around town holding Badger

their proposed frozen storage addition, which would be a 120-foot tall building.

"We don't have anything in Norwood like that now," Donohue said, later adding, "This would change the whole nature of the town. We don't have any 10-story buildings in town."

The building would be in a limited manufacturing district, and the zoning bylaw allows for buildings up to 60 feet tall in that area, meaning a dimensional variance would be required for the project. The use of the property- frozen food storage- is allowed as of right.

Town Planner Stephen

Costello added that the area in question was zoned for structures up to 140 feet tall. The town allows for 140-foot tall cell phone towers in this area. This is one of the areas in town where a 120-foot structure would not negatively impact the airport and the flight paths of planes, meaning the expansion could be allowed, assuming it gets a variance and approval from the Zoning Board of Appeals and Planning Board.

Costello added that Home Market Foods is unable to expand horizontally, as they abut wetlands. Their ability to expand is limited, and going vertically is one of their only op-

tions.

The board voted 3-1 to place Home Market Foods' TIF on the May 10 TM, with Donohue opposed. She said she felt it would be better for the project to get approval from local boards before placing it on the TM warrant.

Costello and members of the Board of Selectmen pointed out the Campanelli property TIF agreement was placed on a TM ballot before the project had gone before groups like the ZBA and Planning Board. Donohue responded by saying the Campanelli project conformed to the town's bylaw, while this proposed expansion is twice the allowed height.

There was no such concern with the TIF agreement for the CertainTeed plant, which the board unanimously approved. The plant is planning a pair of expansions.

First, they plan on updating their roof machine to make metric shingles. The machine produces 12-by-36 inch shingles, and they wish to produce 13.25 by 39.375 inch shingles. These larger shingles are being manufactured by their competitors, are easier to install, and will allow them to enter the Canadian market. This will create 11 new jobs immediately.

The second expansion is at the granular plant, where they will add two new buildings, one of which is a small storage shed. CertainTeed has developed a solar reflective shingle product which will carry the EnergyStar label. A new shift will be added, creating five new jobs, and as shifts increase, so will this number.

Residents seek relief

Not enough screening of new High School

General Manager John Carroll, Owner's Project Manager Tim Bonfatti and others associated with the new Norwood High School construction project met with abutters on April 1, and they discussed the proposed landscape design at the site, and what issues nearby residents have with the project.

Abutters took issue with screening at the site, and several nearby residents argued that the proposed plantings at the site would not provide sufficient screening, so they want to see more done to block their view of the new building, which they say is adversely affecting their quality of life.

"We've got this three-story monstrosity we've got to live with," abutter John Marsoobian said.

Abutter Kim Brooks said the building seemed like an invasion, and one that will stay with abutters for years to come. She described the building as a depressing site, and just one more thing Bellevue Avenue residents have to deal with. In addition to the school, they live near Highland Cemetery and the water towers.

"We are sacrificing for this town," Brooks said.

One of the sacrifices they are making comes in the form of lower property values, Marsoobian said. He argued that the construction project is hurting their quality of life and lowering property values in the area.


"My [property value] is going down, as is everyone else's who abuts this building," Marsoobian said, adding, "The simple fact of the matter is my property values and my neighbors' property values are dropping."

He argued that the abutters were not kept in mind during the process, and they should have, at the very least, been offered a tax abatement. He also argued that more screening is needed at the site, saying that the proposed arborvitae and deciduous trees were not sufficient.

The proposed spruce trees at the site will grow between 14

and 20 feet over a ten-year period. Marsoobian does not feel this is tall enough. He asked if

project. She added, "It's hard during construction, because you're seeing the worst of it."

30-foot tall evergreens could be planted along the perimeter instead.

"That would do a lot to shield this building," Marsoobian said.

Carroll said that 30-foot tall trees would be a large expense to the town, and estimated each tree would cost \$10,000 individually.

Another concerned abutter was Peabody Road resident Peter Belanger. He argued that they did not listen to abutters during the design stages of the process.

"You guys didn't listen," Belanger said. "I'm very disgusted. You said you would listen, and obviously, you didn't. I'm not pleased with it."

Carroll and Bonfatti claimed this was not the case, and argued that abutters were considered during the project's design phase, and are still being considered today.

Kris Bradner, the landscape architect with Gates, Leighton and Associates, said abutter concerns were considered during the design phase.

"I understand the homeowner's view," she said, but a site plan can't address everyone's concern with a

Editorial

Just a couple thoughts...

This newspaper has no doubt that most readers were expecting a big splashy front page story and photo regarding the election results on Monday and, normally, that would be the case. However, after significant consideration we decided that when just one in five registered Norwood voters bothered to show up to cast a ballot, very few really care. So, we put the story on Page 2.

Given the perfect weather conditions and spirited campaigns by those seeking office, one would think at least a third of voters would make the effort. Nope. And even more discouraging than that is that even after we published the dismal attendance records of some Town Meeting members, including some who never bothered showing up once during the 17 meetings held, some of them were re-elected with significant vote totals.

One can only hope that the town meetings coming up garner reasonable attendance figures because, if not, it really may be time the town consider revising its form of government to include a mayor and town council. If its residents don't care enough to cast a voice now or show up at town meetings, with everything going on in Norwood Schools and continued conundrums in town finances, than how representative is this form of government?...

The Airport Commission came down with the hammer on Boston Air Charter at Tuesday's meeting, and we think the three-month suspension of their privileges at the airport is partly residually inspired by earlier spats with the BAC. The fact that they rendered their decision without the BAC's lawyer being able to present their case does seem a bit Draconian.

Whether or not the punishment fits the crime is really not this writer's place or expertise to render an opinion. However, I did find it curious that the lawyer representing BAC claimed the BAC had not been provided a copy of the transcript of the communication between the pilots and the tower. A little hard to believe considering this newspaper was listening to the live audiotape of the communications between the planes and the tower on liveatc.net shortly after the incident was first reported.

Should you listen, you will clearly hear the tower communicate to the pilots that the airport is closed and that takeoff is at their own risk. You will also clearly hear the pilots declare that they visually inspected the runway and determined it was suitable for use. At no time will you hear the tower tell the pilots they were not to take off.

None of what you will hear mitigates the facts that the BAC was told by the airport manager that the airport was closed, or that both the airport manager and the airport commission considered it dangerous to Norwood residents when BAC jets used the runways despite the conditions. Water, debris and birds inspired the decision to close the airport because any one of those conditions could have caused a catastrophic crash.

Some will argue that the BAC's decision to take off was heroic, given they were delivering an organ to a hospital for transplant, and who better than the pilots to determine the safety of a runway. However, the guess here is that virtually every pilot ever involved in a crash thought the conditions at the time were safe enough for flying, so that argument seems a little weak.

Does an act of heroism allow for the trumping of decisions made by authorities? This newspaper doesn't think so. We believe the BAC was wrong taking off on March 17, even with their noble intentions. Whether or not the punishment fits the crime, or even if the airport commission had the authority to levy it, will certainly be debated well into the future.

FLIGHT SERVICE DESERVES AN AWARD

To the Editor:

Seven years ago Mar. 19, our family received a phone call that my brother Mark Reagan, who had been in Newark Beth Israel Hospital since Nov. 11, was to receive a heart. He had been waiting for a heart transplant confined to the hospital for approximately 154 days.

When I answered the phone at 5 P.M. on the 19th, it was my brother. I will never forget the words he spoke—I GOT A HEART, DON'T HANG UP! Because I was shocked, I did hang up to get ready to head to N.J.. He called back to give us the information about when the transplant would take place. My entire family packed up and made a caravan to the hospital.

The four-hour ride was nothing compared to what he had experienced, being trapped in the hospital for 5 months. At that time he could only walk 12 feet and back once a day if he was lucky. We arrived about 10 p.m. and had a quick visit with Mark, his sons and future wife Helen. Then down the hall he went.

Hours went by and then the transplant team went to the emergency room to get into an ambulance. With a police escort they headed to Newark Airport to meet with the jet. The heart was flown up from Florida. They closed Newark Airport to let it land.

If it were not for the Gonzalez family loss, the pilots of the jet and the transplant team, Mark would not be here today. I hope the airport tower manager at Norwood Municipal Airport and his as-

sociates never have to go through what Mark went through. We applaud Boston Air Charter, Al and Valerie Bishop and their crew for doing the right thing. Al and Valerie are two of the most sincere people we have had the pleasure to know. Their pilots are aware of their duties and if it was not safe they would not have taken off. We don't believe the pilots who man these flights would have put themselves or anyone in danger. Saving lives is extremely important especially when it comes to organ donation, and, without BAC the person waiting to receive the organ may have died.

In closing, we think the Airport Commission should give them an award, not a fine. As of Apr. 1, it is National Organ Donation month. Be an organ donor—go to www.donatelifetoday.com and sign up your wishes, even if you already have it listed on your license. You never know when you or someone you love may need an organ and the assistance of Boston Air Charter.

Senior floor ready to go

Senior Center Executive Director Dorothy Vitale confirmed that construction at the Senior Center to remove the floating floor in the function room at the site would begin on Apr. 20, and that the work there would last approximately four weeks.

The existing floor will be removed and replaced with a 1/2-inch engineered wood plank floor for the 1,000 square foot dance floor and a commercial luxury vinyl plank flooring material with a wood-like appearance for the remaining 4,300 square feet of space.

Capital Carpet and Flooring, a Woburn based floor-covering contractor, won the bid, and is charging \$56,946 for the project. The project was approved for funding at last November's Special Town Meeting, when TM members voted to give \$52,000 toward the \$66,000 recommended by

the Finance Commission for the replacement of the floor. The remaining \$14,000 comes from leftover Permanent Building Construction Committee funds for the addition.

As a result of the construction, several offerings have been relocated. Vitale and the School Department reached a deal, and seniors can use the James R. Savage Educational Center gymnasium for their exercise classes during the construction. Also relocated was the Senior Center's lunch program. Lunches will be available in the Senior Center cafeteria, served buffet style.

Not everything could be relocated. Line dancing classes scheduled during the construction period have been cancelled, as has bingo. Bingo is typically held every Wednesday, beginning at 1 p.m.

"There is no other room in the building for bingo," Vitale said. "They way it looks right now, there'd be no bingo during those four weeks."

FinCom spars over study personnel

Members of the Finance Commission looked at the makeup of the committee that will oversee the proposed study of the Fire Department. The independent consultant study will look at policy and procedures of the Fire Department, particularly involving minimum staffing and substitution.

The proposed committee tasked with overseeing the study will consist of seven voting members. No one was named to the committee at the March 31 FinCom meeting,

with commission members stating only that it would consist of two members of the Board of Selectmen, two members of the FinCom and three members of the community. Members of the Board of Selectmen, the FinCom and the Town Moderator will select the other members.

The committee will also feature Fire Chief Michael Howard and a union representative in a non-voting capacity, though some members were uncomfortable with this decision.

the space available."

Bonfatti said they could examine the project's site plan further to see what can be done to address these concerns. Possible options to review include narrowing the road and traffic island to provide more space along the Bellevue Avenue property line, reassessing the parking layout at the site to see if it could be redesigned to allow for more planting spacing, and swapping evergreen plantings from other areas of the site with the plantings planned for Bellevue Avenue.

A follow-up meeting with abutters will be held in early May to discuss their findings and see what else can be done at the site to appease abutters.



of the fire, the investigation so far leads the Police and Fire Departments to believe it was caused by an electrical problem. The investigation involved several members of local departments and the state fire marshal.

"Norwood Fire Investigator Billy Turner, Norwood Police Officer Michael Benedetti and Norwood Electrical Inspector Tim Fruci have come to the conclusion that the fire at the Norwood Town Hall was due to an electrical problem," Fire Department Spokesman George Morrice wrote in an E-mail statement.

Morrice went on, "The investigation led inspectors to believe water seepage in a wall infiltrated some older line voltage wiring which caused the

wires to overheat and ignite a clock fixture on the wall. Subsequently, the burning wall clock fell onto some combustible material which spread the fire to adjacent combustibles."

Howard and the Fire Department worked with Carroll to have the building prepared for the town elections on April 5, which it was.

"We are working with the general manager to get the building cleaned up by Monday for the town election," Howard said on Apr. 3, adding, "The smell is the issue right now. The smell is terrible."

The investigation went on during the afternoon, and crews remained on the scene for over three hours. Firefighters cleared the Town Hall area at 4:11 p.m.

During that time several

Town Hall employees and officials were alerted, and appeared on the scene. One such employee was Computer Department Chair Mark Redlich, who was also called in to check the town's computer network and make sure there was no damage to it. He reported that they do not believe there is any damage to the main computer network.

Others appearing at the scene were Carroll and Cooper, numerous members of the Board of Selectmen and Town Engineer Mark Ryan.

In addition, a large crowd of onlookers of all ages gathered on Central Street and in the Town Hall parking lot to watch as firefighters worked at the scene.

and told the pilots that they could depart at their own risk.

"The Air Traffic Control tower gave exactly the clearance it was allowed to give under the law," Watsky said.

Shaughnessy said he read the tower's transcript of the incident, and he believed the tower operator stated the pilots were not cleared for take off. Watsky responded BAC had not been provided a copy of the transcript, and he was going with what the pilots had told him.

Watsky attempted to defend the actions of BAC, but found himself in a rough position. He asked to be recognized when Ryan was polling commission members for questions, only to be told he could not ask a question at the time.

After this, Ryan asked Watsky how many people were on the BAC aircrafts that took off on March 17, and Watsky said he would address this and other questions in his presentation, but the commission voted unanimously not to hear this presentation.

The question as to how many people were on the aircrafts went unanswered.

The inability to make a presentation, coupled with the commission's decision, concerned Watsky.

"I've been in practice as a lawyer dealing with administrative agencies since 1985, and what the Norwood Airport Commission did this afternoon was a first," Watsky said. "It was a bla-

tant disregarding of Boston Air Charter's due process rights to have a fair hearing."

At the meeting, Watsky argued that the Airport Commission didn't let BAC know what they were accused of. Ryan argued that he had made it quite clear, saying the pilots took off from a closed runway without clearance.

In addition, Watsky argued that the commission made a decision that oversteps their powers. He cited Section 25 of the Norwood Memorial Airport rules and regulations, which specifies the commission's authority to penalize someone for violating airport rules. The section cross references Chapter 90, Section 44 of Massachusetts's general laws, which states violators "shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten nor more than five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment for not less than one month nor more than six months, or both."

Because the airport commission does not have the power to arrest and imprison anyone, that leaves the fine, Watsky said.

"All that the Airport Commission has the authority to do, according to their own rules and regulations, is assess a fine between \$10 and \$500," Watsky said.

After the meeting, Watsky said, "It was very clear that they had made up their minds before they entered the door. They made it clear that they didn't want to hear all the facts," as they did not

give BAC a chance to present their side of the case, and their side of the case is drastically different than what was presented at the meeting.

During the meeting, Watsky pointed this out, saying, "We disagree with virtually every conclusion you reached," saying they disagreed about the condition of the runway, about the presence of water fowl, about whether they had clearance to take off and whether the airport was actually closed. The only conclusion they agreed with, Watsky said, was that the pilots backtaxied down the runway and took off.

Watsky argued that the airport was under an advisory closing, though the commission said the airport was closed by Maguire at 9:13 p.m. on March 15. In addition, Ryan stated that Maguire met with Federal Aviation Administration officials on March 17, who agreed that the airport should be closed to fix-wing aircraft due to water levels, debris and water fowl.

On March 17, two BAC aircraft took off from runway 35, which was closed at the time, to perform an organ delivery flight at the request of the New England Organ Bank.

Ryan recognized the need for the flight, but said that didn't excuse the action.

"While vital, it should be noted that this is a business service which other charters provide," Ryan said, adding that BAC had notice that the airport would close due to flood conditions.

Judith Langone said there was no need to have Fire Department representatives on the board in an official, non-voting position. She said the meetings would be open and they would be free to attend and voice their opinions, but did not feel they needed a non-voting position on the board. Including them in such a position could create the appearance of contamination, and Langone wants this to be an unbiased study.

"I don't want anyone to say we've been influenced by anyone," she said.

FinCom member John Hayes agreed with Langone's statements, saying that if they let Chief Howard and a Fire Department Union representative on the committee, it could create chaos.

"I do not think they should be part of the committee, period," Langone said, later adding, "I just don't want the meeting taken over. This gives them the avenue to do that."

FinCom Chairman Alan Slater said he wants them rep-

resented, as it is important to have input from the department.

"You do want input from the Chief and a union representative," Slater said, adding he wants the committee to be all-inclusive.

He said that the Fire Department representatives could comment, but would not be voting members.

"It's the other members of the committee who will make the decision," Slater said, adding, "We do want inclusion, but we control the meeting."

He agreed with Langone in that it is an open meeting, and people are allowed to show up and comment on the process. However, he argued that by having Chief Howard and a union representative at the table, they cannot claim to have been shut out of the process.

Town Clerk and Accountant Bob Thornton agreed with the seven-member committee concept and including the chief and union representative in a non-voting capacity. Thornton

added that four members of the committee would be from boards that have dealt with the fire department budget and substitution accounts for years.

The study will be featured at the April 8 Special Town Meeting. The FinCom is requesting \$40,000 for the study.

The FinCom also unanimously voted to approve the town's sixth and final pass of the Fiscal Year 2011 budget, as recommended by the town wide Budget Balancing Committee. The recommended budget is \$150,964,135.

The first pass budget came with an \$8 million deficit, though the Budget Balancing Committee, School Committee and general government departments were able to work together to balance the budget and reach their target.

This budget does not include capital projects. There is an additional \$5,990,469 worth of these projects, ranging from improving classroom lighting at several schools in town to purchasing new vehicles for the Department of Public Works.

The other races on the ballot were uncontested. David Hern Jr. remains the town moderator, Carolyn Riccardi was elected to the Board of Health, Susan Pipes and Cashman Kerr Prince were elected to the Library Board of Trustees, Mary Lou Fitzpatrick was re-elected to the Housing Authority and Constable James Perry was re-elected.

All together, just 3,856 of the town's 16,780 registered voters made it to the polls on Monday.

rules and regulations and seeing how our new special permitting powers work," he said.

As the only name on the ballot, current Finance Commission Chairman Alan Slater was re-elected to his position with 2,405 votes. Due to Howard's campaign for the Board of Selectmen, one FinCom seat remained open, and two candidates stepped forward with write-in campaigns. With 565 votes, Thomas Maloney was written-in as the newest member of the FinCom, beating challenger Michael Fiore's 355 votes.

Slater was pleased with the write-in campaign, saying, "There's over 900 write-in votes, which is good."

He described both Maloney and Fiore as qualified for the role, and said, "I think we'll get a good person for the Finance Commission."

Maloney was the first to step forward and formally announce his candidacy for the open seat. He has experience in both the financial world and town government, as he works as a Regional Lending Manager for the Bank of Canton and served as a Town Meeting member from 2002 to 2008.

Maloney learned about his victory at 9:30 a.m. on Tuesday, after all the write-in votes were counted and verified.

"I'm delighted," he said. "I really appreciate the help of so many people in town who held signs, passed out stickers and gave out flyers... It's great to be part of the civic festival called an election day, and it's even greater to win."

Maloney visited Town Hall and was sworn into his new position on April 6.

signs. While Maria was the only specific person named, he thanked everyone who stepped forward during his campaign, and said he had a "laundry list of people to thank."

"It's the people, and if you have good people connected to you to help you out, they'll take you miles," Badger said.

"Everyone jumped on board and was supportive," he added. "I'm overwhelmed right now."

Incumbent Joseph "Mitch" Pentowski brought in 1,280 votes, which was not enough to get him three more years on the committee.

Rau spoke highly of Pentowski, saying, "Mitch has given 37 years of service to Norwood, and he should be commended for that," and added that he will be missed on the committee, citing the sense of order he provides and his institutional memory.

Rau also thanked the people of Norwood for electing her to a three-year term.

"Thank you for letting me continue this work," she said, adding she is looking forward to next April just being a normal April, rather than another year she has to campaign.

In the other contested race, 35-year veteran of the Planning Board and its current chairman, Paul Donohue, held off challenger James Piatelli. Donohue's 1,845 votes gave him 57.95 percent of the vote, and 508 more votes than Piatelli's 1,337.

Donohue said he is not used to being challenged for his spot on the Planning Board, and that it was good to see interest in the position.

"I'm happy with the results, and I hope to keep on working with the board, updating the


