FinCom approves over \$65K in municipal transfers

Fiscal year 2010 came to a close last Wednesday, and the Finance Commission approved a number of Municipal Relief Act transfers, moving \$65,806 between department budgets.

The Municipal Relief Act allows for money to be moved within department budgets during the last two months of the fiscal year. Of the \$65,000 transferred at the June 30 FinCom meeting, \$43,000 was transferred within the Fire Department budget.

The Board of Selectmen approved this request to transfer funds at their June 29 meeting, and the FinCom finalized the transfer with a unanimous vote the following day.

Fire Chief Michael Howard acknowledged that this was a large amount to transfer, but had positive news for the commission regarding the funds.

"We are 99.9 percent sure that this is everything," Howard said. "The good news is that if this is approved, we will leave no outstanding bills. The second good news is we are not asking for a reserve fund transfer."

FinCom member Joseph Greeley agreed with the sec-

ond point, saying, "It's very positive that we have no reserve fund transfers to discuss."

Of the \$43,000 transfers, \$23,000 is going to the police/fire building electricity account. This amount will cover the electric bills for June and the second half of May. The \$23,000 comes from three sources: \$10,000 was transferred from fire salaries, \$7,000 was transferred from fire holiday pay and \$6,000 was transferred from fire overtime.

When asked why this money wasn't requested at Town Meeting, Howard said, "We were doing fine with the electric account... we didn't know in April that this would be a problem," meaning by the time May's \$16,422 electric bill arrived, it was too late to place on a Town Meeting warrant. "We did not expect it to be at this level."

The FinCom also transferred \$12,000 to the fire department's incidentals-medical account. The funding comes from two sources—\$5,000 from fire salaries and \$7,000 from fire EMT Pay. In addition, \$8,000 was transferred to the fire dispatchers account. The reason for this transfer is due to a classification error. Back in 1981, dispatchers went from

firefighters to civilian dispatchers, though the town's payroll was not updated to reflect this change. It has since been fixed.

"The formula will be correct as of July 1," Howard said. "We won't have this problem in the next fiscal year."

Several other general government departments requested reserve fund transfers, and were approved. A few of these transfers were small, as \$300 was transferred from human resources incidentals to animal control salaries and \$600 was transferred from AFSCME tuition reimbursement to animal control incidentals, an account used to pay for everything from electrical expenses to dog food.

In addition, \$1,000 was transferred from selectmen incidentals to general government incidentals.

"General government is one of those accounts used for several things," Assistant General Manager Bernie Cooper said, as it has been used to pay for everything from police details at Special Town Meetings to postage.

Two reserve fund transfer requests were discussed, but

School Committee approves handbook change

The School Committee accepted a proposed change to the Norwood High School student handbook, which would bar most students who don't attend Norwood High School from participating in the school's extra curricular programs.

The approved language states, "students who participate in extra-curricular clubs and activities must be registered in the Norwood Public Schools or be in a home school program approved by the superintendent of schools."

The School Committee approved this language with a grandfather clause, which would allow all Norwood students through the Class of 2015 to participate in extra curricular activities, even if they attend a different school, like Xaverian Brothers High School or Blue Hills Regional Technical School.

The School Committee voted 4-2 to approve this change, with Dick Kief, John Badger, Bill Plasko Jr. and Chairman Mark Joseph in favor, Paul Samargedlis and Eleanor Travers against.

"I would be opposed to the revision as it's written," Samargedlis said. "I would be in favor of no action at all in the handbook," as he felt the change was unnecessary.

He added, "I think we're creating an alarm where there is no need too."

Plasko noted that while there hasn't been an issue with this in years past, the wording was meant to be preventative, not reactionary, and is meant to be in the best interests of students. He also mentioned that the Norwood High School Council approved the wording.

"I don't believe they would alter policy without careful consideration," Plasko said.

The new wording was approved by both building principal George Usevich and the Norwood High School Council on April 26. Several School Committee members took this into

Balch proposal not the only community garden

Green thumbs toil on Brookview Circle

Several residents of Kevin F. Maguire Housing have come together for a third season planting and growing vegetables in the community garden located behind the housing complex.

The plot of land was set aside by the Norwood Housing Authority, and now six gardeners make use of the site to grow everything from tomatoes to swiss chard to lettuce. The most abundant crops on the site are tomatoes and beans. They are on their third picking of beans this season, and they continue to grow, while tomatoes won't be ready for picking for another few weeks.

"This is our third year," gardener Fred Carroll said, "Last year was a poor year, but this year, there is an abundance. It's really in good shape this year."

A reason for the success is the effort put in by the six gardeners.

"We got about six active people who will come down and look at their crops and pick

it," Carroll said, adding there was a team effort to a community garden because a lot of work goes into creating and maintaining the site. This work includes preparing the soil, watering the plants and pulling weeds.

They also have to do battle with animals that might want to snack on the crops in their garden.

"We have rabbits, but this year, they haven't gotten into the garden because we double fenced it," Carroll said. A five-foot tall fence surrounds the garden, and a chicken wire fence provides extra protection against hungry wildlife.

Carroll said there were three key things gardeners had to do to maintain a successful, healthy garden: proper watering, maintaining the soil and pulling out weeds.

"If you don't water daily, your stuff is going to wilt," Carroll said. Due to the recent hot weather, he has increased watering to twice a day, as the soil dries quickly.

"You've got to prepare the soil properly," Carroll said. "You got to turn it over real nice and keep plenty of com-

post in the ground."

Carroll uses a composted woodchip mulch at the community garden because they found it helps keep the dust and mud down at the site.

The community garden at the Kevin F. Maguire Housing has an advantage over other gardens because there is a greenhouse on site. The greenhouse allows them to plant earlier in the season, and once the weather is appropriate, plants can be moved from the greenhouse out into the garden.

"You get a little head start when you have a greenhouse, because you can get seeds growing inside," Carroll said.

The town is considering a community garden of their own. The recently approved Open Space and Recreation Master Plan called for one such garden, and town committees are already looking to turn that plan into a reality. The Board of Selectmen approved the creation of a five-member study committee to examine the creation of a Norwood Community Garden. One possible location, proposed by Town Planner Steve Costello, is the old skateboard park located behind the Balch School.

The skateboard park is the appropriate size for a community garden, as it is about half-acre in size, approximately 20,000 square feet. This site would provide gardeners with the space needed to grow plants in an otherwise crowded area of town.

Norwood Bank comes through again

\$50K donation will ease school budget burdens

Norwood Bank stepped forward and donated \$50,000 to the school department, which will be used to supplement programs and purchase new items for the classroom.

"We'd given out \$50,000 to ten graduating seniors in the class of 2009, and this year, we thought we'd do something different," Norwood Bank President and CEO Chris Dixon said. "We're trying to get as many students to get the benefit, instead of just 10."

Instead of going to 10 graduating high school students, the donation is going to all Norwood public schools, meaning it will benefit thousands of local students. Recently, Dixon met with then Superintendent of Schools Jeffrey Granatino and building principals to determine what each school needed.

"These are things that were requested," Dixon said. "We're just hopefully trying to supplement the things principals got cut out of their budget."

The elementary schools each received approximately \$5,000, while the Coakley Middle School and Norwood High School each received \$7,500. In addition, \$5,000 was donated to help fund a bullying-prevention training program.

The School Committee accepted the \$50,000 donation at their June 30 meeting, and they thanked Dixon and Norwood Bank for their generous donation.

"This donation is not only extremely generous, but very timely," School Committee member Bill Plasko Jr. said, as numerous items the donation will fund had to be cut during

the School Committee's budget balancing process.

Now, thanks to this donation, some of these cuts can be funded. Each school will be impacted in a different manner.

The Willett Early Childhood Center received \$4,950 to replace the fencing around the playground. The \$7,500 donated to the Coakley Middle School will fund eight Summer School scholarships, 80 sessions of "Homework Help" and pay for three Elmo Projectors, while the \$7,500 at the Norwood High School will fund online course registration, textbooks for the new Film Studies course, pay for Robotics kits and purchase snowshoes for the Physical Education classes.

At the elementary level, Balch, Prescott and Callahan Schools will all use the funds to purchase two SMART Boards and two USB audio systems. The Prescott is also using the funding to purchase a document camera. At the Oldham School, the funding will purchase a SMART Board with speakers and three Elmo Projectors. The

Cleveland School went a different route, and will use their funding to purchase mobile bookcases, an activity horse table for the art room, pay for the Wechsler Individual Achievement Test and work in their Copernicus Regal Reading/Writing Centers.

All these items were requested by building principals, Dixon said.

"We felt that we could step in and help them out," he said, adding that the bank always donates to the community.

This \$50,000 donation is the latest in a long string of donations. Dixon said the bank has donated approximately \$1 million to groups and events in Norwood over the past 20 years. Donations from the bank have gone to the Circle of Hope, the Fourth of July Celebration, Norwood Day and many more activities and groups around Town.

"We like to give the dividends back to the community we serve," Dixon said.

Editorial

What a waste of time

One would think that with massive budget issues facing Norwood schools, a newly named superintendent who hasn't even started his job yet and an assistant superintendent position still to be filled, the Norwood School Committee would choose to spend their time on items that actually need their attention instead of on nonsense such as the latest student handbook change.

Apparently because some parents felt threatened that their little Johnny and Suzie may not land the lead in the high school play because of "ringers" brought in from private schools, they approached high school principal George Usevich crying foul. Instead of telling these parents that life is all about competition and that their children better get used to others challenging them in their school, business and personal lives, Usevich felt the need to raise the issue to the School Committee, citing "administrative" concerns. Last this writer checked, the school department is being compensated to deal with administrative concerns. And don't forget the all encompassing "liability" issues any manager will throw out when lacking substantial reasoning to make their case.

At this point, the School Committee should have quickly determined that the proposed change was nothing more than a solution in search of a problem and inform their high school principal that they have more pressing concerns. But this is the Norwood School Committee, and they have proven time and again that there isn't a form of silliness they aren't prepared to spend quality time on.

Just to rehash the specifics, the approved change would bar most students who do not attend Norwood Schools from extra-curricular activities. Therefore, any tax paying Norwood parent who makes an informed decision that their child would be better served in a technical, vocational school or other private school is immediately cutting their children off from benefits they pay for like everyone else.

Now, keep in mind that it isn't as if throngs of private school kids are rushing the gates at 2:30 to threaten little Johnny and Suzie's dramatic and music careers. A few years ago there were a couple of Xaverian kids in Norwood's school play and this year there was one Blue Hills kid marching in the band. Oh My!

Here's the best part. Even if you are of the mindset that private school kids should not be allowed to take part in these activities, don't sit back and light up the victory stogie just yet. Oh no, nothing the School Committee does is that simple. You see, there is a caveat, a grandfather clause if you will in the new change that allows for these private school kids to take part in these activities through the Class of 2015.

The question one should now be asking is if it is a problem worth addressing in 2010, why wait until 2015 to enact the change? Is it supposed to be an advanced warning to parents that if they dare to determine that Norwood schools are not the best fit for their children they will be penalized by taking away these school benefits? If this is the case, will there also be a provision that parents who choose not to burden the Norwood schools with their children will be issued a tax refund?

School Committee member Dick Kief, after voting to support the change, said they review the handbook every year and if they determine the need they could always either just change the handbook wording again or just make exceptions for kids so they can take part in the activities. Which is another way of saying the change they just voted to support really doesn't mean anything and if we like some kid in the future we will just open the gate and let him in.

Wow, talk about ground breaking advancement in school policy. Little wonder there is any time left during their meetings to discuss trivial issues such as how to pay for reading, writing and arithmetic...

consideration while discussing the change.

"I do feel the principal of the school and the council has done due diligence on this," Kief said. "I think the wise thing to do is get it done. We still have the option to change it."

Kief said they review the handbook each year, and can revise it in the future, if they need to, and grant exceptions to students to allow them to participate in Norwood High School extra curricular activities.

Travers disagreed with the change, saying, "While I respect Mr. Usevich and the school council, I think I respect the taxpayers more."

She also felt the council was raising undue alarms over this.

Concern over the change came from the family of John

Campbell, a Blue Hills Regional Technical School student who is member of the Norwood High School marching band. He performed with them during his freshman year, and has received sheet music for sophomore year. Had the handbook been approved without the grandfather clause, he would no longer be allowed to participate in the marching band, as that is an extra curricular activity, not a class.

A letter written to the School Committee by Usevich and the Norwood High School Council said this change affects all extra curricular activities.

"Quite frankly, there are administrative concerns having Norwood residents, who are not students at the high school, participate in extra curricular activities. It's not just drama or music programs: the semi-formal,

prom, chess club, French club, all after school clubs and activities," Usevich wrote. "The school council and the building principal feel that in order to maintain administrative control, not get involved in legal issues, we need to revisit the proposed revision and incorporate it as part of the 2011 handbook."

This proposed change was first discussed three years ago, when several Xaverian students were participating in Norwood High School drama performances, meaning they were taking roles away from Norwood High School students. However, no change was made to the handbook at that time, as those students were promised by authority figures that they could participate in the drama program, even if they went to Xaverian.

no decision was made. A \$4,000 Reserve Fund Transfer was requested for the selectmen collective bargaining account, and \$48,000 was re-

quested for the Town Counsel litigation account. The FinCom decided to wait until their next meeting to make sure they have the funds avail-

able before they approve the transfer.

The next FinCom meeting is tentatively scheduled for July 14 at 5:30 p.m.

Walking path proposal approved

School Committee has concerns over transferring control

As part of the Norwood's Open Space and Recreation Master Plan, the town is looking to install a 2,800-foot long walking path that would connect the Father Mac's area to the Willett Early Childhood Education Center.

A portion of this proposed path crosses through school department property. In order to install the path and receive a grant from the state's Division of Conservation Services, this land would need to be turned over into the care, custody and control of the Recreation Department.

This would not be the first time such a land transfer occurred. The School Department transferred both the Ivatts Tennis Courts at the Coakley Middle School and the Willett Field into the care, custody and control of the Recreation Department.

The School Committee had some questions for Town Engineer Mark Ryan, who was on hand presenting information regarding the walking path. School Committee member Bill Plasko Jr. asked why a walking path would need to be 14-foot wide. Ryan responded by saying the walking path itself was six-foot wide, but featured four-foot gravel shoulders on each side.

These shoulders are needed because Department of Public Works, Light Department and Norwood Police Department vehicles require access to the site. The DPW and Light Department vehicles travel down the path at the current time, as there are power lines and a sewer manhole in the area. Regardless of whether the walking path is approved, these

trucks will continue to need access to the site.

The plan is that if the walking path is approved, only DPW, Light Department and police vehicles will have access to the site, and there will be signage reflecting that. Signage will also be present reflecting the path's hours, dawn to dusk.

School Committee Chairman Mark Joseph made it clear that the path should not be lit, saying, "we would not be entertaining a lighted path there."

Joseph also stressed the need to make the path handicapped accessible. He does not want to see large boulders at the entrance and exit, but a rope gate of some sort. The path needs to be open to all residents.

Dick Kief said that the walking path must come at no cost to the Norwood public schools, now or ever. He does not want the walking path to be the responsibility of the schools. If they transfer the land to the Recreation Department, they will have to bear the costs associated with the site, not the School Committee.

After listing their concerns and conditions, the School Committee voted 4-1 to give Ryan permission to apply for the grant, with the understand that if the grant is approved and the project receives funding from Town Meeting, the School Department would have to transfer 0.6 acres of land to the Recreation Department.

Member Eleanor Travers voted against this, saying, "I don't think in this economic time, where we've just taken a considerable amount of money out of our school and town budgets, that we can take \$120,000 for walking paths."

Plasko noted that this approval by the School Commit-

tee only allows them to go forward in the grant process, and does not mean the School Committee has backed the project. Plasko said members could still speak out in opposition at Town Meeting, if they decide they oppose the walking path.

"I'm all for giving approval





Transfare program's success leads to deficit

Norwood's Transfare Program, which is a taxi fare financial assistance program offered to elderly and handicapped residents, ran a deficit this year, and a \$9,506 reserve fund transfer was needed from the Finance Commission to balance the books.

The Transfare Program is a joint program between the Town of Norwood and the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority offered to residents over the age of 60 or those with disabilities. A book of five tickets is sold to residents for \$5. These tickets cost \$3 individually, giving the book a \$15 value.

"We subsidize \$2 per ticket," Contracts Administrator Catherine Carney said.

Those using the tickets present them to the taxi company, who in turn brings the ticket to Town Hall for reimbursement.

"The taxi company got the

bills to us," Carney said. "We got them by the end of April," meaning it was too late to place a request for funding on the May Special Town Meeting warrant.

The program has been a success this year.

"The number of rides has increased by 55 percent," Assistant General Manager Bernie Cooper said. Over 9,000 taxi rides were taken as part of the Transfare Program during the first 11 months of Fiscal Year 2010. The numbers for June were not available.

The \$9,506 transferred to the Elderly/Handicapped Transportation budget comes from two sources, as \$4,506 was transferred from Parking Ticket incidentals and \$5,000 was transferred from the Permanent Building Construction Committee Steno account. The FinCom unanimously approved this transfer.

The Transfare Program was discussed at the Board of Selectmen's June 29 meeting. General Manager John Carroll

said this was a unique occurrence, as this had never happened before. He noted the problem was on the Town's end, not the taxi companies' end, as they sent the invoices to Town in a timely fashion; Town just hadn't paid them yet. The Selectmen unanimously approved the request for a reserve fund transfer.

"Obviously, this is to help seniors get discount fares, and I'm in favor of it," Selectman Tom McQuaid said.

The Transfare Program is overseen by the Office of Veteran Services, which handles the pre-registration of applicants and assists the elderly and handicapped with their transportation tickets.

Check your \$20s Counterfeit bills passed at Town Hall

Last Wednesday, Town Hall officials learned that someone passed two \$20 bills for a payment during June. The bills passed through Town Hall, and it wasn't until they arrived at the Bank of Canton that they were determined to be counterfeit.

"Unbeknownst to Town Hall, they had received in a payment two bills that were false," Officer Kevin Grasso said.

The bank informed Town Hall about the bills, who in turn called the Norwood Police Department. The police contacted the Secret Service, who are investigating the case, Grasso said.

"It's an ongoing investigation," Grasso said. "Similar bills have been passed in the area."

According to the Secret Service, bills with the same serial

number were used in the city of Boston [last month]."

It is unknown what payment these counterfeit bills were used with, as by the time they were noticed, the money had already been turned over to the Bank of Canton. While no specific payment is associated with this money, the police department has a list of people who made cash payments at the Town Hall during June, and are working through that list to see if one of them passed the questionable bills, and if they did so knowingly, Grasso said. It remains possible the person who gave the bills to Town Hall were unaware they were counterfeit.

Grasso said he had not seen the counterfeit bills, so he could not speak to their quality, but suggested they must have been well done to get past Town Hall and passed onto the bank.
