CPC concludes two, seeks more from residents

The Norwood Community Preservation Committee (CPC) met on June 29 and closed the Morse House Feasibility Study and the Old Parish Preservation Master Plan.

However, during the meeting the point was raised that residents are not really participating in generating funding ideas. Newly-reappointed member Joseph Greeley said while he felt it was good that this year saw the highest number of project applications since the Town adopted the Community Preservation Act (CPA) – in fact, so many they had to delay worthy submissions, few if any of those projects came from residents.

“The piece that seems to be lagging behind is projects from the community. So I’m just wondering if there’s something we can do from an outreach and marketing standpoint – can we write a couple of letters to the editor, articles in the paper, something like that, but maybe there is something we can do to let people know the application process is starting again.”

The committee tossed around ideas ranging from utilizing press releases to posting on Snapchat. Community Preservation Coordinator Kristen Phelps said they had just hired an intern and they may be able to start a social media campaign to raise awareness.

Member Julie Barbour-Issa said they should also include examples of projects in picture form so residents can get idea as to what can be submitted and how. “I’d love to see pictures of projects we’ve done so people get a feel for it, that could be shared through the Town’s Facebook page,” she said.

The types of projects allowed under CPA guidelines are divided into three categories: affordable housing, open

Resident Kerri LaBrie said this was her family’s first parade. “We wanted to come out because of our daughter,” she said. “We wanted to involve her in community events. It’s very fun. She’s having a ball!”

Resident and Robin’s Breast

Friends founder Robin DiFlaminies came out with her friend Patricia Chick. They said they were excited to be out for the show. “It’s great, everything’s open again and things seem back to normal,” DiFlaminies said.

“The crowd’s definitely bigger than last year already!” Chick said.

“We used to go down to South Norwood at the beginning but, little by little, we’ve come closer and closer to Norwood

Norwood Rec hosting community block parties this summer

While they're not the traditional, closed-street block parties of summers past, the Norwood Recreation Department is hosting two block parties this summer to bring out the community and build relationships among neighbors.

The department will be hosting the first Block Party at the Bond Street Tot Lot on July 12 from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. and at the Balch Elementary School Parking Lot on Aug. 4 also from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m.

The exact details of the days' events are still not finalized, but Assistant Director at the Norwood Recreation Department Katie Seasted said the idea is to reinforce community after the separation anxiety juggernaut that was the last two years of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"It's going to be a lot of different things to try to help get a family vibe going," she said. "We're going to have some games, different activities; we'll have food – which is why it's going to be important to pre-register because we're only going to have food

for people who register – and we're going to have music and other fun stuff to create a fun summer atmosphere."

Seasted said each night will be a little different.

"Right now we have more people registered for the Balch night, and so we're going to try to make it a bigger party," she said. "It depends on what else we can add. It's not definite right now, but we're looking at things like face painting artists for example, and other things like that to promote the summer spirit and give families an op-

portunity to hang out in their neighborhoods and meet other families."

Seasted said they got the idea while at the National Recreation Park Association annual conference. "After we attended the national conference and hearing them talk about bringing programming to neighborhoods, we thought it would be a good idea for Norwood and so we're going to try it out here," she said.

She said the staff are really excited about the parties and

Center," DiFlaminies said. "We're in the Senior Section now!"

Nashville resident (by way of Westwood) Tom Cirillo ran the Firecracker 5K and said that while this wasn't the most challenging course he's run, the hill going underneath the rail bridge

on the border of South Norwood was a real piece of work.

"That hill was pretty tough," he said. "It was a pretty difficult course for just an out-and-about 5K."

Resident Mike Fitzgerald came out to run the 5K as well, with his wife Kathleen there to cheer him on. He said while it was no Heartbreak Hill, having the hill on the latter half of the course was a real pain.

"I was talking to a runner from our running club, the guy came in second place, and he said it was a really flat course!" he said. "I said, 'I don't know what course you were running but the one I ran wasn't flat.' The hills were tough! I've run Heartbreak Hill too, but it was definitely tough coming back. It's awesome though."

Fitzgerald said he and Kathleen had been talking about

how struck they were with the number of young people at the parade. "We're just struck by how many young families there are out here. Our kids are older, about 27 and 25, and we remember the time they were little kids and reminiscing, and it's just exciting for the Town to see everybody so happy and enjoying each other."

"We're really impressed by the dedication of the residents of this Town to keep traditions like this going, to put forward new ideas, things like the 150th Committee for example," she said. Norwood Farmers Market returns

The Norwood Farmers Market is making its triumphant return this year after shutting down in 2020 due to the pandemic.

The Norwood

Sustainability Commission has taken over the reins from the Friends of Norwood Center, which is hosting dozens of local farms and organizations every week on Tuesdays from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m.

Organizer Peter McFarland explained that the

market is being orchestrated by the Norwood Sustainability Commission's Public Health Subcommittee, of which he is the chair, with six members and Market Manager Michelle Taranto.

are working hard to make them happen. She said hopefully they will be able to expand programming like this if these two nights are successful.

"So this is something we're going to try to be doing more often, going into our neighborhoods," she said. "But also potentially partnering with local apartment complexes and bringing pop up events to them as well. Hopefully, the first two are our soft openings because we're looking to do more pop up events in the fall. It's a whole series; while these are the block parties, it's kind of a spinoff of our Pop Up and Plays events."

While Block Parties are generally a kind of organic thing where the whole neighborhood gets together and, at least in the past, is able to shut down the street, Seasted said

they had to take a more public-minded approach.

"We didn't want to have to shut down streets," she said. "We hope to get to that point, but because we've done Norwood Day and stuff like that, when we have to shut down a street it costs a lot. So that's why we're trying to keep it confined to an area. With the Balch you have the parking lot areas. For Bond you have the grassy areas, you have a playground and other stuff already built in. We have the new futsal and basketball courts at the Balch. We'll have a basketball contest and a futsal demonstration going on so people can learn about the game."

Futsal is a relatively new game designed for smaller play areas and includes five-member teams.

"It's soccer but it's called futsal because it's a shorter

field," she said.

Food will be limited to support the number of folks who register for the event (which is free), and so interested residents are strongly encouraged to register beforehand. Residents can do so through the Myrec.com website at <https://bit.ly/3OYvcg0>.

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Unwelcome at state archives

Not really aware of what all makes New York City tick, I view Brooklyn as a melting pot of so many things New York. And, similarly, I view Dorchester as Boston's equivalent of The Big Apple's Brooklyn. So it's surprising, isn't it, that a title of any written piece could reference 02121, 02122, 02124, and 02125 as being unwelcoming.


But it is. And it's not Dorchester's residents who are being unwelcoming. Rather, it's the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, specifically the Massachusetts Archives, which does not want any of us citizens parking in their parking lot after hours or on weekends.

A little history is called for. Years ago Secretary of State Paul Guzzi was instrumental in convincing the legislature that the state archives needed more space than the rooms in the State House complex were providing. Columbia Point, behind BC High and abutting UMASS and the JFK Museum, was to be the site of the new archives building.

And so a wonderful edifice was constructed to house and show off various state documents, some of them dating back to 1776. Lest any UMass students avoid the parking fees imposed by that institution, the archives parking lot would be only for those interested in the Commonwealth's history: the college—now university—wanted to make sure that day-hops would stoke its coffers with parking fees, if they did not trudge over from the Red Line stop or catch a shuttle bus from the stop there.

Now a little geography: the Archives building is only two hundred feet from Dorchester Bay, around which a beautiful walking/bicycling path exists. Another hundred feet away down the path are the picnic tables and benches maintained by the National Park Service in its fealty to the John F. Kennedy Presidential Museum.

People wanting to sit, read, and sometimes munch on a sandwich while overlooking the gentle waters of Dorchester Bay used to park at the very

nearby Archives building parking lot after its 4:30 PM closing or on weekends. This year the parking lot is cordoned off by chains to prevent residents of Dorchester and other communities from accessing the nautical views after hours or on weekends and holidays.

Responding to an email to Secretary of State William Galvin (who oversees the Archives) asking why this new policy, someone in his office replied: "We are sorry for the inconvenience [of cordoning off the parking lot after hours and on weekends], but unfortunately because of a number of incidents taking place in the Archives parking lot after closing hours at night and over the weekend, we had to block access to prevent any further problems from occurring."

Responding to a second email asking if police from the state police barracks, less than a mile away, could routinely patrol the area and thwart such "incidents," his office offered a second reply: "The incidents were reported to the police but unfortunately they cannot patrol the area nonstop throughout the evening and weekends because of their responsibilities to other areas." Go figure.

But the good news is that several hundred yards away is the Ted Kennedy Library, which offers free and unchained parking to the common man and woman—at least until now.

Galeota's 1812 Overture column misguided

Born and raised in Norwood, I've had the good fortune of living in this town for most of my life. I've witnessed some outstanding Norwood performances over the years: on football and baseball fields, hockey rinks, basketball courts, and at high school auditoriums where, over the years, aspiring young artists, actors and musicians revealed significant and impressive talents. I've seen live performances at Norwood Theater, outstanding Summerfest concerts on the Common, a lifetime of excellent 4th of July parades, several outstanding Norwood Day events as well. The throng of concert attendees was fully energized, and in a festive mood, despite the high heat that day. sicians, whose lives span multiple generations. Each of those performers collaborated to deliver one of the finest community events in the 150 year history of Norwood. And, of course, there was the Boston Pops themselves, as well as the local talent performing with the Pops that day. For me, the largest contingent of indispensable people connected to this Pops in Norwood concert was the 130+ group of volunteers who, with smiles on their faces, simply rolled up their sleeves, and did everything that was asked of them to assure the success of this extraordinary community event. Those many volunteers are so emblematic of the community in which they live. In my view, the Pops in Norwood concert was an event that mirrors Norwood 150's mission statement, which is "...To embrace the rich memories and capture the dreams of a bright future for Norwood's citizenry...yesterday, today and tomorrow. To engage our families, schools, and businesses in a collaboration of demonstrated and enduring civic pride. To celebrate as one unified community Norwood's rich cultural diversity, unparalleled work ethic, and extraordinary 150-year history as The Crown Jewel of the Commonwealth..." Mission accomplished. space and recreation and historic preservation. However, there are many more stipulations that need to be followed before funds are granted. For instance, no project application can require annual maintenance or staff and they have to be one-time paid projects unless a Town department agrees to pick up the bill. The point is these applications can be tricky, but Phelps is available to help if

you've got an idea for a project. Go to <https://bit.ly/2PyHr55> for more information.

In other news, the CPC voted unanimously to close two projects, and reported a total of \$7,000 left over, cumulatively, from both. Phelps said the first was the Old Parish Preservation Volunteers Cemetery Master Plan that came in under budget.

"The balance of that project came back at \$2,550 and some

change, and that will be coming back to the Community Preservation Fund," she said. "It was a 50/50 split between Historic funds and undesignated."

The next was the Morse House Feasibility Study Master Plan. Phelps said the bills are paid and the plan is done and the Town Morse House Subcommittee is meeting to discuss next steps. She also said Town Manager Tony Mazzucco will be coming by the CPC to "give you an overview of how the study went and what's being contemplated through this subcommittee during one of your summer meetings," she said.

Phelps added that there was \$4,500 left over from that project.

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NepRWA hosting Cooper Park cleanup

The Neponset River Watershed Association (NepRWA) is hosting a cleanup at the Bernie Cooper Memorial Waterfront Park (formerly the Saints Street Lot) on Saturday, July 9 from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m.

Organizers will be meeting at the corner of St. Paul and St. Joseph Avenues before 10. Volunteers are encouraged to wear long pants and closed-toed shoes for terrain and poison ivy. Gloves, tools, bug spray and a first aid kit will all be available from NepRWA during the cleanup.

NepRWA Environmental Scientist Declan Devine said the impetus for the cleanup is not really litter, as the park has now been the target of two previous cleanups, but rather for the removal of invasive plant species.

“We’ve done a couple of litter cleanups to take care of some really old trash that was around the site, so we’re switching gears here,” he said. “We want to take a closer look at the ecology of the park so we’re going to be focusing primarily on oriental bittersweet, which is a non-native vine that grows very quickly and out-com-

petes a lot of other plants and covers the canopy of trees.”

Devine said not to underestimate the plant just because it’s a small vine. “It can actually kill full-grown mature trees even though it’s just a vine,” he said. “That’s going to be the main focus.”

Devine said there will be an introduction during the cleanup so volunteers can familiarize themselves with

bittersweet. “We’ll do some outreach explaining why we’re focusing on that plant, the impacts it has and then we’ll try to do our best to remove some of it from the park,” he said.

He said dealing with the plant is not really too strenuous or dangerous, but the area is known to have poison ivy so residents should take

steps to protect themselves. “Usually I just wear gloves and long pants,” he said. “Bittersweet isn’t really dangerous. You can’t get a rash from it and it usually doesn’t have thorns, but I would imagine there’s poison ivy on the site and so it would definitely be nice to have your legs covered.”

The work will include vine cutting and gathering, using pruners, saws and tarps. He said the work can benefit people personally.

“Most people find it mentally satisfying, in my experience, because you see the visual impact,” he said. “You see there was bittersweet all over this tree and now it’s gone. Most people find that very satisfying, and even if you’re not someone who is inclined towards physical tasks, there are other roles like taking photos, helping to document the amount of plants we’re removing, so there’s a place for everyone. Most people feel pretty good after the event. They enjoy

getting outside, meeting their neighbors and having an immediate impact.”

“That way we know how much equipment to bring,” he said. “If people do show up the day of, that’s wonderful too.”

“As part of the Sustainability Commission, we wanted to get the market going again,” he said. “We’ve been doing fundraising and there are sponsors like the Norwood Space Center, Dedham Savings, Commonwealth Fireplace, Norwood Bank, Members Plus Credit Union, Rockland Trust and more. That’s how we got our money to hire a manager and do all the things we have to do.”

Taranto said they’ve had great success so far since the market’s start in June. “It was everything I thought it would be and is incredibly well-organized,” she said. “I saw a lot of people walking around including mothers with their kids and other groups, not just individuals, which I thought was really nice. It was a lot of fun.

“It’s great to work with the vendors and help them out, both local and not so local,” she said. “There are a lot of local vendors so it was great to be able to reconnect and work with them again. By 2 p.m., people were lining up to purchase produce. This was really something Norwood needed to bring back. People

missed the market and it was really apparent, even in our first week, how much people really value our local farmers.”

Taranto added she has been buying fantastic items from the market, most recently a loaf of artisan bread. “I’m sure I’ll be buying things every week,” she said with a laugh. “I loved seeing people on the Common, not only just shopping but milling about and talking to others they may not have seen for awhile. I’m involved with a few other committees, a local networking group in Town, and I do Norwood Day so I’m very used to all that but I love being in the middle of everything.”

Taranto said residents should stop by as often as they can.

“We’re going to have new vendors, probably every week,” she said. “We were looking for vendors and now vendors are coming to us, which is great. I envision us adding different vendors throughout the summer. We’re going to get bigger as we go.”

McFarland said the market serves many functions aside from providing local foodstuffs.

“One of the things is promoting people eating healthy and eating local to help reduce our carbon footprint

and emissions. “We want people to come out and engage with the farmers, but also other nonprofits and businesses. We’ve got a great response from nonprofits and they’re coming about once a month.”

McFarland added that since February, the committee has been working to get farmers.

“It’s been good, some of the farmers we recruited include Oakdale Farms, Hearth Artisan Breads, Jordan’s Seafoods and we’re working on a couple other farmers and other businesses,” he said. “Norwood’s Emerald City Plant Shop is on and so is La Baguette North ... We’re excited that groups like that want to put themselves out to help build community. The Norwood Trails Advisory Committee was out there recently and there was a lot of interest around them too. There’s always a lot of interest because they bring maps and everybody is surprised, which is always a good thing.”



Norwood awarded \$50,000 grant for Cooper Riverfront Park

General Manager Tony Mazzucco, Planning and Economic Development Director Paul Halkiotis and Conservation Agent & Environmental Planner Holly Jones are pleased to announce that the Town of Norwood is a recipient of a 2022 MassTrails grant.

Norwood was awarded \$50,000 to help fund a full engineering design of the Bernie Cooper Riverfront Park in South Norwood. Norwood's 2022 Special Town Meeting allocated the funds for engineering and construction of the park from Community Preservation Act (CPA) funds as well as general funds. This grant will reimburse a portion of the allocated funds.

The Bernie Cooper Riverfront Park, sometimes formerly referred to as the "Saints Lot" for its location behind Saint John Avenue, Saint Joseph Avenue and Saint Paul Avenue, was purchased by the town in 2020 using CPA funds for Conservation and Recreation.

The nearly 7-acre lot lies next to Eliot Field and the Balch Elementary School and is bordered by the Neponset River and Hawes Brook. It is also less than a half-mile from the Coakley Middle School, Hawes Pool and Endean Park

and is served by a bus route on Washington Street.

A community design process in the summer of 2021 resulted in a conceptual design and construction budget for the park. Residents overwhelmingly favored a wheelchair-accessible and natural trail design that would help visitors feel immersed in nature. The design also features green stormwater designs, river overlooks, and a nature play area and outdoor classroom on the side closest to the Balch School.

"We are thankful to residents for supporting the creation of the Bernie Cooper Riverfront Park at this year's Town Meeting and look forward to putting this grant toward the planning and construction of the park," Jones said. "We are grateful to the Baker-Polito Administration and the MassTrails program for this funding, and are ex-

cited for the Norwood community to be able to enjoy all this park will have to offer in the future."

The Bernie Cooper Riverfront Park is one of 81 trail improvement projects across the state to receive part of \$11.4 million in funding. The MassTrails Grant Program supports projects that build public-private partner-

ships to maintain and improve existing trails and construct new ones across the state. This year's projects will help communities develop new multi-use trails, expand accessibility, create connections between towns and existing trails, support the construction of boardwalks and bridges, design and install new signage, and acquire new

land for trails.

The town may also receive up to \$717,000 in funding reimbursement for the construction of the park from the Land and Water Conservation Fund. The state has recommended this project for funding to the Department of the Interior where it is being reviewed as part of the federal funding process.


