settlement is enforceable, or place the matter back on the trial list.

The BEH motion argues that the Dec. 13 terms were never agreed to by the parties, citing its own objections to that draft and both legal

counsels' communications from Dec. 20 through Jan. 3 as evidence of ongoing negotiations after that version's draft date.

The motion also calls into dispute the details of meetings held on Dec. 18 and

Dec. 19 between BEH President Christopher Donovan, Town Manager Tony Mazucco, and Assistant Town Manager Bernie Cooper, without legal counsel for either side present.

According to an earlier affidavit filed by Mazucco, he had been asked by the Board

of Selectmen to represent it and meet with Donovan, per his Dec. 17 written request to meet with it or "any designated member to update the Board on recent events."

His affidavit also states that, during these two meetings, both the FAA corrective action plan and the easement were successfully addressed and that, at the conclusion of the Dec. 19 meeting "no outstanding issues remained regarding the terms and provisions of the General Release and Settlement Agreement. I understood the parties had reached a deal."

Donovan's affidavit – filed with the March 1 motion – presents a very different account.

In it, Donovan states that he sought to update the Town Manager and the Selectmen by providing them "an unfiltered look at the actions of Town employees [NAC Chair Mark] Ryan, [NAC member Kevin] Shaughnessy, and

[Airport Manager Russ] Maguire. I also wanted to show them unfiltered communication by the MHTL [Murphy, Hesse, Toomey & Lehane, LLP] attorneys acting on behalf of the Town of Norwood and the collusion."

Over the next 24 numbered paragraphs of his affidavit, Donovan goes into detail regarding these claims and also denies – in paragraph 85 – negotiating or agreeing to a settlement with the Town Manager. "Mazucco is not authorized to negotiate any settlement by town charter. I had no intention of discussing any settlement with him."

BEH's motion to reconsider hinges on its legal argument that "a trial court should not summarily enforce a settlement agreement when there is a genuine dispute as to the terms of that agreement," but rather that a hearing should be held to resolve the contested issue.

The motion is still pending.

Selectmen debate Town department budget requests

The Board of Selectmen heard the final round of Town department requests at a sometimes heated meeting Tuesday night at Town Hall over the course of three hours. But before the meeting began, the board asked to pay respects to Timothy Fruci, an electrical inspector who died suddenly on Monday.

"I want to offer my heartfelt condolences," Selectman Paul Bishop said. "It's a sad loss and a great loss for the Town.

Town Auditor Thomas McQuaid presented a summary of the budget, noting that the general government budget is balanced right now at \$36,391,346.

The general government receives 45 percent of the total budget, while the schools receive 55 percent.

Healthcare costs were a major factor for employees in the Town budget because of insurance costs.

"Unicare is not being reduced, but Harvard Pilgrim went up by eight percent," McQuaid said. "Harvard Pilgrim is 30 percent higher."

He added that the services are virtually the same, so he expects employees to migrate to Unicare.

The good news for the Town is that Norwood has "a lot more borrowing capacity" because of its good rating in a recent audit.

"There was a side letter on six or seven things we could improve," McQuaid said. "But the department heads will meet

as a group and discuss them."

While some were happy that the budget was balanced, Selectman William Plasko expressed a different take on the situation.

"I don't look on it as cheerily," he said. "It can be that we might be able to cut corners, or might not provide services we need, or use free cash, or have to borrow. Or also it may be that we are not choosing to do things, planning to move forward, progressing with things that we need to do."

"Then the question is, 'What programs are we losing?'" asked Selectman Helen Abdallah Donahue.

She suggested giving more money to the school budget if it could be found.

"How are you going to do that?" asked Plasko. "Are you going to give up the Police Department?"

Recreation, Police and Fire were the main topics of the budget discussion.

Recreation Director Travis Farley explained that the salary budget went up about \$50,000 to employ 130 to 140 seasonal workers such as pool attendants and summer camp counselors.

There was also a \$10,000 increase in the water budget for the pools and park irrigation.

Playground maintenance was up because of the wear and tear on the old equipment and bleachers.

"What would you do if you had to cut 100,000?" Plasko asked.

"I guess I would take out the play camp," Farley said. "But I would be sad to see it go."

He added that it generates revenue for the Town and is a resource.

The maintenance of the Civic Center was a hot topic because of patchwork repairs over the years.

"The Civic Center is an aging building that requires maintenance," Town Manager Tony Mazzucco said. "Keep in the back of your mind the not so sexy items like a new elevator and the masonry."

Police Chief William G. Brooks III explained that four cars out of the 20-car fleet need to be replaced, at a cost of \$194,000.

Uniform expenses, which were usually put in a different part of the budget, are now put in as an expense for employees because of the way the budget is structured, Brooks explained.

On the Fire Department side, Chief George T. Morrice said that the first big change the Fin Com would notice is in the salary between himself and his predecessor.

"I will say that the first line for my salary looks like there is a dramatic increase from FY 19," he said. "That's because Chief Greeley's salary was structured in a different way."

He explained that, in the past, Greeley had separate budget numbers for a salary, education pay, and longevity pay.

The next item was for the

Same meeting, two disturbing issues

As written on Page 1 of this week's issue, the ConCom met with representatives of DCD Realty recently, including David Hern, the attorney representing DCD and also Norwood's elected Town Meeting Moderator.

Antagonism between developers and representatives of city and town elected and appointed boards are typically par for the course. In fact, antagonism between any conservation commission and anyone coming before them seeking relief from conservation rules, including residents, isn't unusual. Why? Because a good percentage of the population thinks much of what ConComs try and enforce is bureaucratic tree-hugging nonsense causing undue work and aggravation. And we think a bit of that is true. We also think some conservation members take this power bestowed upon them to silly extremes.

That being written, ConComs have a tough job being responsible for protecting the land, water, and biological resources of their

communities. They are volunteers who need to spend vast amounts of their free time visiting sites, examining submitted project plans and then, oftentimes, facing verbal abuse from those before them who take offense at enforcement obstacles placed in their way by those just trying to enforce the laws.

In the case of DCD Realty before Norwood's ConCom last week, member Joe DiMaria's words and actions were not only deconstructive, but borderline silly.

It's understandable that most residents would appreciate DiMaria's actions to make the lives of DCD Realty representatives as miserable as possible, given few find any value in DCD's proposed 84 Morse St. parking lot proposal. The plan to shoe horn a parking lot for automobile dealers' cars in a residential neighborhood stinks and many, including this newspaper, think officials negotiating this deal got taken to the cleaners yet again.

That being written, Norwood's boards relative to

the matter, including ConCom are expected to act in a professional manner and, clearly in DiMaria's case, he did not.

Just before the start of the meeting, DiMaria handed over a long list of questions he needed answered, essentially sandbagging the applicant. Not only had DCD not seen the questions prior to the meeting, neither had the Chair of the ConCom, John Gear, which speaks to the dysfunction internally of the ConCom which has been detailed on these pages before.

In the verbal interactions between other ConCom members and DiMaria, as can be read in the Page 1 article, it

was obvious DiMaria had the backing of no one. His self defense comments were borderline childish and time wasting. It's okay to hold DCD to the letter of the law, but at least be professional and fair about it.

The second issue that came out of this meeting was attorney Hern's comments at the end. "We have now submitted everything. LEC has submitted everything. If this is going to get on the Town Meeting warrant for the spring – the possibility of this property, the Saints Lot adjacent to this, being purchased – we have to have a permit. Otherwise, it does not get of-

ferred for sale. Our agreement is we offer it for sale once we have all our permits, so time is crucial for a lot of people."

This newspaper pointed out that the deal struck with DCD "maybe" selling the Saint Streets lot left the Town with no leverage and now our prognostication is coming true. DCD is holding that part of the deal hostage to get their permits quickly and the Town can do nothing about it. It was another example of poor decision making on the part of those duly-elected to represent the people. The best interests of the people of South Norwood were once again left in the mud.

firefighters' salaries, including the new deputy chief position.

"It really is absolutely essential for Norwood Fire for us going into the future," Morrice said. "We have to change the way the organization is structured."

The police have a captain, deputies, sergeants, and officers, while the fire department has the chief, a deputy and firefighters, he said.

The new deputy chief will be a training officer and relieve Morrice of some of the administrative duties he cur-

rently performs. Also, the deputy chief will evaluate blueprints for new buildings to ensure everything is up to code.

Safety training for the department teams as a whole is essential, he added.

Plasko asked each department head what programs would be cut if \$100,000 had to be slashed.

"We're pretty lean," was Morrice's response, which was characteristic of every head. "I don't want to give up the new deputy chief."

Another point of contention

was when Mazzucco discussed the 78-page capital outlay portion of the budget. Donahue objected, because the committee hadn't reviewed it yet. She is a committee member.

She was also outvoted 4-1 when she asked that the School Department get the chance to appear before the Selectmen to discuss their budget "because of all of the problems this year."

"I don't want to hear from them," said Chair Thomas Maloney. "That's never been done before."

review the questions. Susi spent nearly the next 25 minutes answering questions – almost all of which had to do with the labeling and marking of the plan’s various sheets – from Commissioner Joe DiMaria.

Though civil, there was an increasing tension as the questioning went on, and Gear asked for a motion to continue after DiMaria informed him that he had four pages of them.

Following this request, Hern put forward a question alluding to this frustration. “Can I ask, Mr. Chairman, that we not have four pages of questions dumped on us at 7:30 the night of the hearing for plans that have been in everybody’s possession for two weeks?”

“Well, sorry,” DiMaria shot back. “The idea is that we’re supposed to meet at a public meeting, and we’re not supposed to be meeting outside the public meeting... And so this is the only time that I get to talk to other members of the Conservation Commission about things that are here.”

Commissioner Peter Bamber then stepped in. “In fairness, Joe, I have to say that everybody knew that they were supposed to submit things a little ahead of time, so he has

the perfect right to be frustrated.”

DiMaria went on to cite the fact that he only had weekends available to go over plans and that he had spent over three hours looking at these during the second weekend after he had been unable to (he stated that he had been very ill) during the first weekend.

The motion made, Gear admonished the Commission to get their questions in to Conservation Agent Al Goetz with enough time to properly go through channels.

“There’s no way that I can get any review of this until over the weekend,” DiMaria replied.

“The point is, Joe, we don’t want to come back on the 20th and you have another list of questions... Or anybody else, for that matter,” Gear came back.

“Well, I don’t know,” DiMaria continued. “I think that I have the right to do this at my leisure before our next meeting. I don’t see any reason...”

Gear cut him off. “It’s not productive and it’s not fair for everybody else.”

“Well, it’s not fair for me,” DiMaria finished. “How am I going to spend my time?”

The 84 Morse St. parcel of

land – bordered by Morse Street (at the school bus yard), the dead ends of the “Saints” streets (which are entered from Washington Street), the athletic fields behind the Balch Elementary, and Hawes Brook (the Neponset River also splits the property) – had been the topic of controversy and debate through 2018.

This was due to the fact that Boch Automotive had entered into a purchase agreement for the property with the intention of converting the largely undeveloped parcel (there’s also an empty building on the East side of the Neponset) to an open air auto storage lot.

As a condition of its approval by the Planning Board, the applicant offered the Town a limited time option to purchase the undeveloped “Saints Lot” portion of the property.

Hern addressed this in his concluding remarks:

“We have now submitted everything. LEC has submitted everything. If this is going to get on the Town Meeting warrant for the spring – the possibility of this property, the Saints Lot adjacent to this, being purchased – we have to have a permit. Otherwise, it does not get offered for sale. Our agreement is we offer it for sale once we have all our permits, so time is crucial for a lot of people.”

The hearing was continued until March 20 at 7:30 p.m.

Norwood Foundation hosting fundraiser

The Norwood Scholarship Foundation (NSF) is hosting a fundraiser on March 22 at the Norwood Elks to raise funds for Norwood students

heading to or already in college.

The program dates back to the mid 1980s and, according to volunteer Patty Starr, has raised over \$1 million for Norwood youth.

“Every student receives a minimum of a \$1,000 scholarship and last year we gave out 62 scholarships,” she said.

Starr said some of the scholarships are specialized, in that some families start their own to honor someone they knew or were close to.

“A lot of those are named for former teachers,” she said. “We have one scholarship for students who play golf for instance, and there are scholarships for studying

medicine or education, so the scholarships come with some details themselves.”

The foundation itself is completely volunteer-run, and Starr said a lot of the volunteers are former educators.

“George Usevich, the former Norwood High School Principal, is on the board as well as Bob Griffin, the Callahan School principal and Tim McDonough, the former Selectman,” she said. “It’s a lot of parents too whose kids have received the scholarships in the past.”

In fact, Starr said that’s why she got started. She said her daughter wanted to enter the medical field and the scholarship was very helpful for them.

“I mean colleges are so expensive now, and she graduated in 2007, so I’m not sure what the prices are now but everything goes up,” she said. “I’m sure any amount of money we can give families to try to offset the crazy cost of college is a benefit. It was tremendous for us... And we have several folks like us who



The Norwood Trails Advisory Committee gathered in room 24 of Town Hall on Tuesday evening and discussed the various activities coming up for the committee members.

Before diving into the agenda talking points of the evening, Chairman Joseph Greeley quickly walked through the goals of the committee.

“Our main purpose so far is to work with all the departments of town government and coordinate efforts, give recommendations and create relationships with other entities,” said Greeley.

“The three Es of our mission statement would be to explore new relationships, encourage the community to utilize the trails and educate the public on current and future trails and open space opportunities here in town,” Greeley stated.

The group began the meeting by sharing any recently completed walks of town trails.

Committee members Lee Leach and Vic Babel shared that they had participated in a snowshoe walk in the Ellis playground area.

“There was probably six to

12 inches of snow. It was a nice afternoon, beautiful for snowshoeing,” said Leach.

The committee continued on to schedule the next group trail walk for Sunday, March 17, which happens to be St. Patrick’s Day.

“Wear your green,” chuckled Greeley, “I’m not sure if we’ll find any four-leaf clovers out there though”.

The group plans to meet at the Willett Early Childhood Center at 10 a.m. and the public is encouraged to participate in the scheduled two hour walk.

Craig Austin suggested that the committee members bring along trash bags for their walk on Sunday, that way should they stumble upon any garbage during their venture they would be equipped to clean up the trail.

Greeley advised that anyone interested in joining the walk should dress appropriately as the trail is expected to be wet and has a considerable amount of briars that could snag clothing.

“It’s going to be mushy,” noted Austin.

In addition to the St. Patrick’s Day walk, the committee is looking forward to par-



have been fortunate enough to receive scholarships and decided to give back."

Starr said they not only offer scholarships to current Norwood students at NHS (and all Norwood students, regardless of which school they go to), but also to Norwood students already going through their undergraduate studies.

"You can apply after your freshman year to get another scholarship, as long as you're processing the same amount of paperwork that's required, you can continue all four years of undergraduate," she said.

Starr said the scholarship applicants are judged based on a variety of qualifications ranging from financial need, academic performance or which field they want to enter (based on those specialized scholarships mentioned previously).

"The student only has to live in Norwood, they can go

to any school," she said. "The application is judged on a points system... We don't just give the scholarships to the top five students of every class, so there's a lot of variety."

Starr said her daughter was helped by the amount of volunteering she did back in high school, which is another big criteria.

"That's one thing we're looking for, on how they're giving back to the community," she said. "It could be participating in Challenger Sports or if they do athletics or hold down part-time jobs while they're going to school, all those are factors we look at."

The Foundation is hosting medium Cathy Ripley Greene at the Elks for \$40 in advance and \$45 at the door. Starr said this is the third year for this particular fundraiser, and added when it first started she was skeptical as to the ability of Greene, to say the least.

"I thought that was a bunch of baloney, but she completely convinced me," she said. "She made a connection with me that nobody would have ever known, I mean there was just no way and it gave me chills. She's from Walpole and she walks around the room and gets like vibrations or a sense of being able to connect with people. Sometimes it's with people who are dead or she might have a feeling about something going on in someone's life right now that they might need help with... It's really fascinating to watch."

The Norwood Elks are also donating the space for the event, charging a small fee for cleanup and taking the sales from a cash bar. Starr said they are a huge help in getting funds to the group.
