## NNO a success, though Fire Department cuts in

While there was some talk of the Norwood Fire Department (NFD) stealing some thunder from the Norwood Police Department's (NPD) National Night Out (NNO) event on Tuesday night, both departments said they consider the night a great success.

Hundreds of residents came out to meet the police and get to know the officers, and then watched the NFD go into action after a fire broke out at the Bubbles Up Laundromat at 50 Central St.

NFD Firefighter and Public Information Officer Joe O'Malley said the building was a washer and dryer laundry mat, not a dry-cleaners, so there was no added danger from any potentially hazardous chemicals coming from the fire.

"There was no real dry-cleaning that went on there," he said. "It was a laundry mat with washers and dryers and so no real concerns with hazardous materials." Both NPD and NFD personnel kept residents far from the fire, as no smoke is really very good for you.

O'Malley said the fire went to three alarms, mostly because of the construction of the building. He said the structure was first used as a car dealership and had been renovated many times over the years.

"It was just a tough, stubborn fire," he said. "During each renovation owners left a lot of void spaces for the fire to hide in and extend into. It extended into the roof line and there were several layers of roof the guys had to cut into to get to the fire, so it was a just very labor-intensive fire and that was the reason for the second

and third alarms."

NPD Deputy Chief Chris Padden said the police considered the night a huge success.

"We had so many people come up and talk to us, just kind of get to know the guys and girls on the department. It was just an opportunity to interact in a causal atmosphere," he said. "One of the guys brought his corn-hole board and we had guys running the dunk tank working with the kids and also the bouncy house. It was a great opportunity where the kids could come out and talk to the officers."

Padden said in the current climate, officers all over the country have to now try to remind residents that they are people too behind the uniform, not just the uni-

## Big Y will be opening soon

Big Y Supermarket on Route 1A has been closed since 2021 for renovations, but District Director David Murphy said opening day is coming shortly, though no date has been finalized.

"The opening date still hasn't been nailed down for two main reasons really," he said. "The first is equipment delivery issues. We've got some equipment we're still waiting on. And second, the hiring process is still going on."

Murphy said they are looking to open fairly soon.

"We're hoping to have it open in late August or early September," he said. "We're thrilled to be able to bring a brand new supermarket to the Town. What the old Norwood location had was a supermarket of the past. If you've ever been in there, it truly was a representation of what supermarkets were years and years ago, but this is going to be a supermarket of the future."

However, Murphy did say they will not be using cleaning robots, like some other supermarket chains.

"We concentrate on food, not gimmicks," he said. "We really stress a lot of local partnerships, local produce, and local vendors we do business with. There will be fresh sushi, a sandwich bar, fish and chips fresh to order, and so it's a real food-centric type of approach to supermarkets."

Murphy added they're always looking for local vendors and food producers, and asked any interested vendors to reach out. The new store will feature 55,000 square feet, up from the store's original 42,598 square feet. The new store will reportedly be able to offer fresh pizza, prepared meals, organic options and more.

According to Big Y's website, the new building will need an additional 100 part-time and full-time positions

# Committee focuses on TM participation

On July 25, the Town Meeting Size Study Committee gathered at Town Hall for the first of what will be a limited number of sessions. In February, the Board of Selectmen (BOS) approved its formation, granting it the broad charge of looking at the number of Town Meeting seats, the total number of which has increased because of the results of the 2020 U.S. Census and because of the Town By-Law automatically triggering the change.

The seven-person, unchaired committee is comprised of five Town Meeting members (David Hern, Elizabeth Hestad, Amy Sobchuk, Jean Ferrara Taylor, and Brianna Whelan) and two BOS members (Amanda Grow and William Plasko), with Town Manager Tony Mazzucco and Town Clerk Mary Lou Folan serving as advisors. All nine participated freely in the roundtable discussion as they began working out their committee's objectives and addressing issues with Town Meeting as it is presently constituted.

Everything discussed during the nearly hour-and-a-quarter meeting revolved around two points: the bylaw requiring the number of Town Meeting seats to equal 1.5 percent of Norwood's registered voters, and the consistently low Town Meeting attendance (averaging about 165 of approximately 250 members) over the last 10 years.

Added to this is its required expansion due to Norwood's growth in population (28,602 to 31,611) and registered voters

(16,821 to 20,549) between the national decennial censuses of 2010 and 2020. Because of this, Town Meeting is now approximately 60 members short of its full 308-seat complement, with approximately 50 new seats having gone unfilled in the May election. Currently, there are vacancies in each of the Town's nine districts.

The consensus was to reduce the seat total, with comments focusing on the benefits of more competitive races; the potential difficulty of reaching a quorum with the combination of low attendance and the governing body's inflated size; and Mazzucco questioning the point of having available seats that nobody is interested in filling.

"It sort of assaults Town Meeting as an institution when we can't perpetually get 20 percent of people to show up," he said of the consequences of the 1.5 percent requirement.

"I think it looks bad, too," Hern added before raising a couple of questions about how, exactly, to change it. "Should it be registered voters, or should it be the population of the Town? Should it be a set number of people, or should it be a percentage?"

Mazzucco explained that basing Town Meeting's size on Norwood's population – rather than its registered voters – would require a special act that would have to go through the state legislature, but that changing the actual 1.5 percentage could be independently implemented by the Town. Responding to Hern's second question, he noted that towns commonly go with set numbers of town meeting members, rather than percentages alone.

In subsequent discussion, various reductions from the 1.5-percent figure were floated for further consideration, with the possibility raised that – depending on how large the recommended percentage reduction will be – all incumbent Town Meeting members may have to stand for re-election in more competitive races for a limited amount of seats.

Committee members also touched on increasing participation in other ways. Addressing comments and complaints regarding single-digit vote total write-in Town Meeting members' frequent lack of attendance, Hern suggested adding a bylaw requiring a minimum number of votes – both for write-in and declared candidates – to get elected.

The committee also spoke of different ways to try to make Town Meeting more accessible to residents who may, for whatever reason, stay away. Some of these talking points included the change to three Town Meetings per year, with limits on how many hours and how many nights each one lasts; earlier start times; the possibility of hybrid meetings; and ride sharing for those who would otherwise be unable to attend in person.

Outreach to a diversifying population was also acknowledged, with a general emphasis on trying to somehow make Town Meeting more reflective of the community at large.

The meeting was adjourned with plans to analyze different percentage reduction figures and options. This will happen at the next Size Study Committee meeting, which is scheduled for 7 p.m. on Aug. 8 at Room 24 in Town Hall.

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
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# Carillons brings sense of history

The cheerful chiming of Norwood's historic carillon provided the perfect complement to a sunny summer Sunday as the concert series continued its 37th year of entertaining audiences on the Town Common.

The series was able to continue this summer after a hiatus last year for extensive renovations to the instrument performed by a specialist in Virginia. Funding was provided by the Community Preservation Committee because of the historic nature of the project. The carillon came to Norwood in 1928.

Lee B. Leach, a master carillonneur and current organizer of the series, shared the history of Norwood's Tilton Memorial Carillon, which is housed in the Town Hall tower. It is one of only 166 such instruments in the United States, according to the Guild of Carillonneurs of North America. He said he became intrigued by the carillon after moving to Norwood in the mid-1990s and was instrumental in seeing it preserved and utilized for the Town's enjoyment.

"I worked at Polaroid at the time, which is what brought me here," he explained. "During the summer after we moved here, we saw the ads for this series. I came to a concert, took a tour of the carillon afterwards, and I was really enthralled by what I saw here."

Sally Slade Warner, one of the nation's premiere carillonneurs at that time, was a guest performer. Leach asked who in Town had the ability to play the carillon. The answer was no one.

He originally met with Assistant Town Manager Bernie Cooper, who was one of the strongest advocates for the series along with Slade Warner. Cooper died in January 2021 after serving Norwood for almost half a century, and this year's concert series is dedicated in his honor. Leach said that, without Cooper's support for 35 years, the series would not have continued, along with the recent restoration of the carillon.

Leach, a self-taught piano player who studied musical composition in college, began taking lessons with Slade Warner on his lunch hour at Polaroid. He also traveled to Cohasset to train.

"I hate to see musical instru-

ments just languish and not be appreciated," he explained. "The bells are so beautiful."

He added that carillons are unique in that they must be played by a person rather than transmit prerecorded music.

The instrument has three components: the bells, the keyboard and the transmission. A carillon is defined by having at least 23 bells that are arranged and suspended in chromatic order of pitch. Norwood's carillon has 50 bells.

By the 1980s, the carillon had been neglected, according to Leach. Cooper brought in a bellfounder from England who specializes in carillons to fix problems with the instrument and launch the concert series.

While his initial goal was to play holiday music during December, Leach became passionate about the instrument and its history. He noted that the carillon came to Norwood in 1928 and was dedicated on Nov. 11, which was then known as Armistice Day. This was also the year Town Hall was built.

"This was during the evolution of carillon art and installations in the United States," he said, adding that they are mainly found in Europe. There was a competition between two bellfounders at that time. Gillett and Johnston Bellfounders made Norwood's carillon, while John Taylor Foundry was the rival company.

The precision needed to tune the bells and provide correct over-

tones was overwhelming considering that the electronic assistance available today did not exist.

The repairs to the carillon and the replacement of worn parts were made last year in Virginia at Ben Sunderlin Foundry. One of the key actions was to replace the bells' clappers, which were worn after 92 years.

"The bells are mainly the same as they were in 1928," Leach said. "But they had to have some components replaced. The new clappers made the instrument warmer and more alive."

"Ben is younger, so he should be around for a long time," he added. "There are not many good bellfounders because it's a very specialized business."

Carillons can be found mainly

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# CPC closes Morse House feasibility project

The Norwood Community Preservation Committee (CPC) met on July 27 in a hybrid format and discussed the merits of the Community Preservation Coalition.

According to CPC Chair Patricia Griffin Starr, the Coalition is a state organization that shepherds CPC organizations across the Commonwealth.

"They have a lot of references and information that we might benefit from and we wanted to throw it out there if anyone has any ideas of something you would like them to bring to us," she said.

Member Joseph Greeley said the CPC pays the Coalition \$3,000 for its services, and Community Preservation Coordinator Kristen Phelps said they send out periodic emails with ideas for projects. Greeley said the Norwood CPC could capitalize on that.

"We had also mentioned the possibility of us doing more outreach to the community to try to foster new applications for the next round," he said. "The Coalition is expanding and adding to its website frequently, and one thing we could certainly cull out of that is a sort of, 'Did you Know?' section where projects X, Y and Z are eligible and here's an example from Town that has already gone through it. There have also been instances in Town where we've said, 'Wouldn't it be great if we had X?' and I was able to in the past find similar projects that would give people answers and give them ideas on how a town has successfully done their application and project."

Greeley said he felt this would be a great "how-to" manual for residents looking to perhaps use the Community Preservation Act (CPA) funds.

"They have a great library of literally thousands of projects from over the years that have been managed,

implemented and completed by other towns," he said. "Those are the kinds of things I think, whether we do it on our own or ask the Coalition to help create, could really help us."

Greeley pointed out that the Coalition's Executive Director, Stuart Saginor, already presented to the CPC in 2018 when it was still getting its feet on the ground. He thinks having that presentation handy – as it had a good amount of examples to go by – would be very helpful. He said they should try to get Saginor to the CPC for an updated discussion on possible projects as well.

"At the very least it would be beneficial to maybe carve out some time – this might be a good winter or late fall meeting – to ask Stuart to join us in person or virtually," he said.

The CPC voted unanimously to pay the \$3,000 annual fee and members intimated they would be open to having Saginor come back and update them and the community on project examples.

In other news, the Morse House Feasibility Study, which was originally approved for \$50,000, was voted closed out and completed by Gienapp Associates Architects. Phelps said they received the final bill from the company of \$2,500 for the final report, which they were not expecting.

"Instead of having \$4,500 coming back we'll have \$2,000 coming back," she said, as the CPC originally planned on having the full \$4,500 remainder from the project going back into the CPA general fund. "So I just need you all to take a vote to close it and return the \$2,000 to the accounts."

Phelps did say that Gienapp was budgeted for that \$2,500 and there was nothing out of line in that final bill.

The Committee voted unanimously to close the project.

## Disability Commission finalizes goals

The Norwood Commission on Disability (COD) met recently and unanimously voted to approve its goals for this year.

The COD also discussed the local UPC Program and an up-

coming Massachusetts Office on Disability Seminar on Oct. 27.

COD Vice Chair Sarah Quinn said the group formulated its mission goals after collecting and analyzing the results of the recent Norwood Disability Commission Survey given out to residents. From

that, the COD stated that they formed three goals, which are centered around accessibility/mobility, communications and socialization.

For communications, the first action item Commissioners discussed centered around

in the Northeast and the Midwest. There are guilds at Yale University and Wellesley College where the carillon is taught.

Currently, there are only about 500 carillons in the world, Leach noted.

The concert on July 31 was performed by John Whiteside, a carillonneur from St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in Cohasset who took over after

the death of Slade Warner in 2009. Musical selections ranged from songs from Sesame Street classics like "Rubber Duckie" to "Summertime" by George and Ira Gershwin.

"We have a lot on interest in the carillon," Leach noted. "I am blown away every season when people come up to me and ask who is playing and how much they

enjoy the music." Leach had the honor of playing "The 1812 Overture" by Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky at the recent Norwood concert with the Boston Pops.

"That was magical," he said.

The Carillon Concerts on the Common series are held each Sunday from 2-3 p.m. through Aug. 28.

form, and he said this event was a great way to do that.

"There's a lot of negative press about something happening someplace in the country concerning the police. People start saying, 'All police are that way,'" he said. "It's not really a fair assumption to make, and so we do our part to meet people and overcome people's preconceived notions around what the police are all about. But I think in Norwood especially – and I grew up here and lived here almost my whole life – It's been a long, ongoing process and I think it's been effective. I think that's been reflected in the turnout last night."

Last year, NPD Chief William Brooks said they kept track of attendance through counting how many hot dogs they went through. Padden said while they didn't have a hot dog count at the time of publication, they did however have a pizza count, which was way up from last year.

"What I can say is we went through all of our food last night in a flash," he said. "Last year I think we had 30 pizzas and this year we had 80 and they were all gone this time. Maybe this year will be the pizza count rather than the hot dog count. If you looked at the food line, it got wiped out as fast as we could make it. So many people donated items and many of the staff here donated their time to help cook and that

was great."

Resident Wole Awoyiola said he didn't know about the event, but when he and his daughter were driving through the flashing lights and the dunk tank made them stop to check it out.

"I work remotely, and I was picking up my daughter from daycare and we see all these bouncy houses, lights, kids at play and all the games and so I thought this is an opportunity for my daughter," he said. "It's so nice here, she doesn't want to go home. We've been here for almost two hours. I don't even know how to tell her we have to leave."

Resident Burke Dignam said he was also a surprise guest. He said it was definitely good for the kids to get out and see their friends.

"The kids saw the commotion on the Common and wanted to get some food and what was up for the kids," he said. "This is my first time. It's great for the kids with a lot of activities and lots of friends they know and they can run around with, so it's great."

Resident Harriet Simons and Brenda Mitchell said they came out to play with their grandchildren.

"We were here at the last one too, and we enjoyed it," Simons said. "It's really fun."

"It's nice for this Town to do

this kind of thing for the residents," Mitchell said.

Simons said she especially enjoys seeing the kids collecting NPD Officer Collector's Cards, which each officer generally has on their person for the kids.

"I see the kids running up to the officers saying, 'I need yours, I don't have yours,'" she said. "It's so cool. And I've noticed in Norwood, especially in the middle school, the police and the Norwood youth tend to like each other. In years gone by that wasn't necessarily the case."

Resident Miguel Malena said he came out to connect with the community.

"And meet some police officers," he said. "We just wanted to check it out and see what it was about. I think it's pretty nice. It's refreshing to see police officers out here interacting with people and the kids enjoying all the toys."

Residents Sophia Fitopoulos and Colleen Grace said they came out because their kids really, really wanted to come check out the police vehicles.

"My son is just obsessed with police officers," Fitopoulos said. "It's definitely impressive. They've got food for people and all the activities you can think of so it's really great."

"And it's a great way to support the men and women in blue too," Grace added.

reaching out to the Norwood School Department and other Town resources to ensure that families of students with disabilities are aware of local offerings and resources. Member Marcy Rossi said the COD will be meeting Norwood Public Schools (NPS) Director of Student Services Lori Cimenovillani to discuss how resources are being distributed to students and their families. Rossi said they would like to specifically discuss a printed resource brochure for parents of students entering into the Individualized Education Plan (IEP) system, as the introduction process can sometimes be overwhelming.

“There may be too much to take in at your first IEP meeting, and just having it be able to be given out at every IEP meeting I feel is really important,” Rossi said. “Lori was totally on board with that and gave us a couple of other things we should include in it when I was talking to her, and she thought it was a great idea and will join us soon.”

For accessibility and mobility, the group discussed partnering with local media outlets for increased access to programming for accessibility specifically. The COD agreed to reach out to Norwood Community Media (NCM) to make sure subtitles and/or closed captioning is available. Assistant

Town Manager Michael Rosen said he reached out to Norwood Broadband about closed captioning, and he said that the producers of content generate closed captioning or subtitles.

“With live TV, the broadcasters actually have stenographers who type the captions during the program,” he said. “So if it’s the public access channels we’re looking at for closed captioning, we’re going to have to speak with Jack Tolman at NCM to see what options are available.”

Rosen said they will discuss how they could best provide closed captions with NCM for Town programming.

In terms of sidewalk accessibility, Quinn said they will meet with DPW Director Mark Ryan to see if they could get an update on recent work on the sidewalks on Prospect Street and ongoing work on Washington Street.

For mobility, member Peter McFarland said they should explore regional public transportation services similar to the Greater Attleboro and Taunton Regional Transit Authority (GATRA) and publicly-based rideshare services (something GATRA also provides).

For socialization, the Commission talked with United Cerebral Palsy of MetroBoston (UCP) representative Kara Madden. Mad-

den said the program focuses around day trips and activities for its members. Member Keith Peters said, for example, his favorite activity is sailing in Boston through Community Boating.

“It started about 10 years ago. We always kept going from Watertown (UCP’s location) to sail and we also learn about ships and other stuff,” he said. “They always need lots of funding, so Norwood could help with that.”

Madden said the Community Boating Program operates out of a marina on the Charles River off of Soldiers Field Road in the West End, and is run completely on donations.

“Membership is still \$1 for people for the year,” she said. “And you can bring up to six people,” she said.

“And they do it until October,” Peters said.

In other news, Rosen said the Massachusetts Office of Disability will be hosting a summit called Accessibility in a Digital World in a hybrid format on Thursday, Oct. 27, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. For more information on how to join or for its location, go to <https://bit.ly/3OP10DE>.

The Norwood COD will also be presenting more on its upcoming goals for this year at the next Norwood Board of Selectmen meeting on Tuesday, Aug. 9.

to accommodate the new larger space. Murphy said they originally had a trailer at the Walpole Big Y at 1111 Providence Hwy. to facilitate interviews, but they have since moved it to the Norwood site. Murphy added that they were able to retain many of the workers from the Norwood location by rehiring them at other locations, and that many are being hired back to Norwood.

“So they’ll be returning to the building, but the total number of people that we need to operate is right around 150,” he said. “We’re still hiring and we’ve got a lot of job opportunities for all hours of the day. I don’t know if these are colloquial terms now, but we’ve got mother’s hours, senior’s hours, and student’s hours too. We operate in two states, and we’ve had students in the past who, if they go away for school, can continue their employment at another location.”

Murphy said that aside from equipment procurement issues, the construction of the new space has gone pretty much according to plan.

“We demolished the old building and expanded it into the Salvation Army space and another empty building, so we’re really starting from a clean slate,” he said. “Construction conditions over the winter – aside from a couple of

storms – were pretty good. We’ve been on pace. But again, the equipment issues have delayed what we had hoped for as an opening. But the process itself has gone according to plan, just the equipment has been kind of a nagging issue.”

During the planning process and approval phase of the project, several residents said they have had issues in the past with trucks idling in the neighborhood south of the complex before going to

deliver to the stores in the plaza. While trucks were idling from all business entities in the plaza, Murphy said they are well aware that the Town dictated delivery times for the whole plaza.

“It’s a hard start at 7 a.m. and a hard stop at 7 p.m. according to the Town,” he said.

## GOOD GRIEF: HOW TO GRIEVE THE LOSS OF A PET WITH E.B. BARTELS

Good Grief: On Loving Pets, Here and Hereafter is an unexpected, poignant, and personal account of loving and losing pets, exploring the singular bonds we have with our companion animals, and how to grieve them once they've passed. E.B. Bartels has had a lot of pets—dogs, birds, fish, tortoises. As varied a bunch as they are, they've taught her one universal truth: To own a pet is to love a pet, and to own a pet is also—with rare exception—to lose that pet in time. But while we have codified traditions to mark the passing of our fellow humans, most cultures don't have the same for pets. 


