## Norfolk Asphalt's last chance

Developer Jim Lorusso and Attorney Ralph Macchi made their final case to the Zoning Board of Appeals on Tuesday night and faced another round of local backlash as they attempted to gain permission to reopen the Norfolk Asphalt Plant.

Macchi and Lorusso have made the case at the last three public hearings that they have the right to run the plant at an increased capacity, and were before the board to appeal Norwood Building Inspector Mark Chubet's declaration that the plant had been abandoned.

But local residents have fought back hard, and refused to be silenced by Macchi's hour long opening statements in which he attempted to answer some questions and clarify his client's intentions.

He addressed the possibility of Lorusso upgrading the equipment that is currently at the 601 Pleasant St. site, what he called the "subjective" nature of the term "fresh asphalt" as stated in

the town bylaws and questions on decreasing property values, increased traffic and the result of emission studies.

According to Lorusso's original proposal, if granted approval to reopen the plant, there would be an increased production load at the plant, a move Macchi said would not adversely affect the town.

"Is upgrading the equipment detrimental," he asked rhetorically. "We feel the answer is 'no.'"

Throughout the hearing, Macchi stressed the difference between "fresh asphalt" and "bituminous concrete." Norfolk Asphalt would be producing the latter, which Macchi claimed was quite different than the former.

"There is nothing indicating what it and what is not 'fresh asphalt,'" he said. "The principal use of the plant is the manufacturing of bituminous concrete."

Macchi also presented the ZBA with two appraisals he said he acquired from realtors regarding the possibility of decreased property values if the plant were

## Committee of 21 endorses model school program

The new Norwood High School may end up looking very similar to other Massachusetts high schools.

The School Facilities Task Force, or Committee of 21, unanimously voted to endorse the Massachusetts School Building Authority's model high school plan on Monday night, with the condition that they receive more detailed information from the authority on the model schools Norwood may be able to choose from.

In essence, the model plan will allow Norwood to select a design plan that has already been built, which could save the town millions of dollars and a significant amount of time.

"The idea is to look at schools that could be replicated," said task force chairman Tom McQuaid, who said preliminary estimates show a 5 to 10 percent savings in total costs, which trans-

lates to roughly 15 to 20 percent savings for Norwood. The MSBA is also offering bonus reimbursement points if the town chooses to accept the model program. "But the biggest savings will be in time," McQuaid added.

MSBA Executive Director Katherine Craven sent a letter to the Board of Selectmen on June 20 requesting the town's opinion on the model program, which is a new concept for the MSBA as well.

Chairman Mike Lyons and Town Manager John Carroll replied with a letter that has been criticized for being too negative and closed minded, an opinion that prevailed at Monday's meeting but was eventually quelled enough to prompt a unanimous vote of approval.

School Committee Vice Chairman Dick Kief said he thought the letter was "excellent."

"We would be negligent if we didn't

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# 'Catastrophic Failure'

## Compressor at police and fire station fails for 2nd time this year

Despite major renovations and repairs to the Norwood Police and Fire Station, Fire Chief Michael Howard recently reported another major malfunction at the station.

Howard reported that there was a "catastrophic failure" in the heating, ventilation and air conditioning system in June.

He added that this was the second compressor failure in the last year.

According to Howard, one of the rooftop compressor units broke down, leaving the Police side of the building without air conditioning for over a week. He said the compressor crashed during the heat wave in early June and the department operated with a portable unit to keep officers and employees cool.

"It took seven days to get the parts, and ten full days to fix it," he said, adding that the warranty on the compressor had expired.

Howard also said that the Board of Selectmen, in cooperation with the fire and police department and the permanent building construction committee should start making plans to restore or replace the compressor.

A brand new compressor would cost approximately \$4,000 plus the cost of labor.

"I hope we can sit down to discuss a game plan for the future," he said. "The compressor is going into its sixth year and the parts are getting harder to replace. The HVAC system is running and it's running good, but we need to have a long range plan in place to fix things in the future."

The Police and Fire Station is only six years old, and has been plagued with problems, including a cracked boiler that was

repaired recently. The boiler was under warranty, but the town had to pay labor costs.

Selectwoman Helen Donohue said she worried about the equipment, and wondered why they weren't holding up like they should.

"It seems like they would last longer," she said.

According to Fire Department spokesman George Morrice, all of the equipment was installed new when the building was constructed just

said.

Norian confirmed that the compressors were installed new, and that they had both exceeded their operating warranty.

"You get a new one and move on," he said.

But steps have been taken to address the compressor issue, Norian said, adding that a smaller unit had already been installed at the station and would run for less extended periods of time, possibly adding to the life expectancy of the unit.



over six years ago at a cost of \$16 million.

Engineer and Consultant Bruce Norian, President of Norian/Siani Engineering said he has been working with Chief Howard since last month to try and address some of the issues left behind by the original contractor, who went bankrupt.

"It became evident that the building's compressor did not do what it needed to do," he said.

Norian said he knew about the recent compressor failure, but said he was unaware that this was the second time it had happened this year.

"There's no reason for it other than wear and tear," he

"The changes we have made will substantially extend the life of the unit," he said.

Chief Howard said he plans to meet with Norian and the PBCC in the next few weeks to devise a plan to address other building problems at the Police and Fire station.

"I can understand how it would be disconcerting to the town to put more money into a brand new building," Norian said, "but it's not at all unusual."

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## Editorial

### One project should learn from the other

Let's face it, without placing blame, since doing so would accomplish nothing, the police and fire station building has been a nightmare from its inception. The latest issue in the headlines, the HVAC compressor, is just the most recent in a long line of operational and fiscal headaches for the town.

Replacing a compressor should not, in and of itself, be a big deal. However, when the building is only about five years old it is enough to make the average taxpayer shake his head and think, 'here we go again...'. Of course, it doesn't help when the engineering firm hired by the town takes a silly and callous approach to the replacement stating, "You get a new one and move on." Why not throw in a "Hey, get over it" to residents to make them feel just a little bit worse about the whole mess.

Another thing a Mr. Bruce Norian, President of Norian/Siani Engineering had to say was that the reason the compressor went was, "There's no reason for it other than normal wear and tear." Huh? The damn thing is five years old...even if the warranty expired a compressor's operational life surely exceeds six years. That's like saying you can expect to throw away your Honda Accord after three years since its warranty expired (notice I picked a Japanese model). The compressor in my HVAC system at home is going on 20 years old. True, regardless of the reason for the failure, since the contractor is bankrupt and the warranty on the unit expired there is little left to do other than to purchase a new one anyway. However, Mr. Norian should hold his comments relative to things like HVAC units to himself unless they are constructive and a little more sensitive to what has become an extremely sore spot for those living here.

The one good thing that may come out of the police/fire building mess is that those responsible for setting the course for the new high school are no doubt acutely aware of the town's sensitivities relative to construction projects and have recently endorsed the concept of "model" schools proposed by the state.

Without going into detail, the idea behind a town like Norwood agreeing to a model school is that the design and engineering plans they would use have already been used in other towns with reasonable success. The concept is that without having to start from scratch, Norwood may be able to save a significant amount of time and money following a tried and true plan, essentially avoiding many of the mistakes already made by others while designing their own unique blueprints.

Some may argue this is a cookie cutter approach to construction and Norwood can kiss away any ideas of adding their own uniqueness to the building. It may also preclude any plans the town may have been considering of utilizing or trying to copy the front façade of the existing high school to address concerns of those more supporting the rehabbing of the existing building. The existing face of Norwood High School means a lot to many of the town's residents and anything that can quell the hurt that will be felt by changing the "school on the hill" would have been appreciated.

However, the upside to the town in both getting kids into the new building quicker and at the same time saving millions in the process while cutting down on the pains associated with projects like the police/fire station building should be enough to garner residents' endorsements. Who knows, perhaps the money the town can save by taking this approach to the high school can be used to address obvious needs currently at the DPW location. Now, there's a facility in need of a little love...

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## Tax treaty revoked

### Former Home Quarters site still has no tenant

The Norwood Board of Selectmen have revoked a four-year-old property tax deal with a developer who planned to build a mall along Route 1.

The atrium style mall proposed by developer David Spiegel at 205 Carnegie Row was granted approval from town meeting in 2004 for an incremental tax break on the property in anticipation of the increased business a high end retail development would bring to the site.

But Selectmen voted unanimously to revoke the deal because Spiegel has not been able to secure a tenant for the site.

Norwood Town Planner and Economic Developer Steve Costello said the business conditions in Norwood now might not have been attractive to major retailers.

"The current climate and developments like Legacy Place and Westwood Station may have made it difficult for Spiegel to pull through," he said.

Costello added that Spiegel's original plan was to bring a major department store in to the development.

"Macy's and Filene's were

mentioned as potential anchor stores, but their merger may have affected things too," said Costello.

The tax increment finance (TIF) agreement approved at the March 8th, 2004 Town Meeting was contingent on Spiegel creating jobs and investing heavily in the project. According to Costello, Spiegel said he would invest \$30 million into the plaza, which would bring 200 full time jobs to Norwood.

The deal would have allowed Spiegel a series of tax breaks on anything above and beyond the initial base valuation of the property, which Costello said was at approximately \$11 million.

TIF agreements are part of the state's economic develop-

ment program, a plan that helps towns attract new jobs and businesses. Costello said that when the Carnegie Row development came to a standstill, the state took notice and recommended the TIF agreement be revoked.

"The purpose of revoking the license is to let the state know that this isn't an open, stagnant project," said Costello.

Members of the Board of Selectmen also agreed that since development has ceased at the site, it was only logical to revoke the license.

The selectmen would have had to approve the anchor store.

But the deal isn't totally dead, according to Costello.

If Spiegel is able to find an anchor store, he could approach town meeting again and ask for a new TIF agreement.



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# Working group defined

## New group will report to C21

In an attempt to streamline the increasingly complex creation of a new Norwood High School, the Committee of 21 has voted to create a 12 member-working group which they say will have the authority to make "day-to-day" decisions about the project.

The Committee of 21 was created by Town Meeting in 2004 to track and study the feasibility of building a new high school, but now that the state and the Massachusetts School Building Authority has approved new construction of Norwood High, members are looking for a way to efficiently manage the multiple tasks at hand.

According to Tom McQuaid, newly appointed chair of the committee, the MSBA requires the town to have a working group in place that must include Town Manager John Carroll, Town Accountant Bob Thornton, School Building and Grounds Director Joe McDonough, High School Principal George Usevich and Interim School Superintendent John Moretti. The School Committee and the Permanent Building Construction Committee may appoint or elect two members and the Board of Selectmen, Finance Committee and the Committee of 21 may appoint or elect one representative.

McQuaid said the working group would meet weekly and report back to the committee monthly.

Each member of the working

group will have full voting rights.

Committee member Peter McFarland said the existing working group met last weekend to determine how the new group should be organized and to determine how they could best serve the town and help move the project forward. He said the purpose of the group was twofold.

"The first purpose is to fulfill MSBA requirements," he said. "The second is to have day-to-day decision making authority on the operations of this project."

Project Manager Tim Bonfatti agreed that the working group needed to make decisions to be effective.

"In order for this to work, they

really need to have that level of authority to make key decisions," he said.

But school committee member Bill Plasko wanted a clearer definition from the committee of who was really in charge of the project, and if the 21 member task force was still really necessary.

"I'm a little frustrated with the process," he said. "Who's in charge here?"

"The Committee of 21 was authorized by Town Meeting, and our job is to be the final body that will present the project to Town Meeting," McQuaid said. "The Committee of 21 has a vital role in informing the public.

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

allowed to reopen.

According to the response he received, an unspecified realtor from Coldwell Banker concluded that the plant would have little effect on local property values.

"They said it would not have a significant impact based on a variety of factors, including the age of many of the buildings, the presence of a railroad, the fact that these homes are situated in a successful commercial area and that the average resident is over 40 years old," Macchi said, paraphrasing the report.

He added that the realtor said the difference between what a Norwood resident paid for their home and how much they sold it for would be the same if the plant opened as it would be if the property were not located in a commercial

area.

Macchi said the second report said essentially the same thing, but Zoning Board member John Perry took it a step further, and said he found both appraisal to be almost identical.

"It looks like one realtor gave his report to the other one. They are almost word-for-word," he said.

Board member Barbara Kinter also questioned the validity of the property appraisals, and asked Macchi to clarify his choice of agents.

"I notice both of these realtors are from out of town," she said. "Wouldn't it have made more sense to hire local realtors to properly assess the value of homes in this town?"

The crowd gathered in Memorial Hall let loose a few snickers and stifled laughs at Macchi's inability to answer

Kinter's question.

Before the board opened the floor to the public, long time ZBA member Henry Spence asked Macchi to elaborate on the traffic studies that had been conducted.

"Not one comment has been made about the S curve on Pleasant Street," he said.

"Neither consultant brought that up. Anyone who drives on that road knows that there's a blind spot there. That could be dangerous with an increase of 400 vehicles traveling down that road on top of the 11,000 vehicles traveling that road already."

"Our studies were in response to specific questions from Norwood's engineering department," Macchi responded. "If that had been brought up as a concern, we'd have addressed it."

bring these things up," he said. "It would be detrimental if we didn't bring them up until after everything is said and done."

McQuaid and Lyons both said they were in the process of trying to set up a meeting with the MSBA to get some questions answered, but agreed that the idea was intriguing.

"These are not insignificant numbers," McQuaid said.

Lyons said that the letter was simply a response to the MSBA citing their concerns, not a dismissal of the entire concept.

"They're looking at the best way to move forward with the whole concept," he said. "They don't have a stable model yet."

Lyons added that the MSBA was interested in Nowood's response to the idea of a model school because if it works, they could adopt that as their main method of school building in the future.

According to Lyons, the state specified that Whitman/Hanson high school was the model they had in mind to apply to Norwood, but McQuaid said he and the task force were considering using a school design that Symmes, Maini and McKee had already completed.

Symmes, Manni and McKee have been working with the town on the high school project for the past two years, and McQuaid and Town Manager John Carroll agreed that if they had a plan that could

apply to Norwood, the model plan might very well be the way to go. Carroll said the town did not have access to the plans for the model school the MSBA recommended, another factor that was addressed in the response letter to Craven.

But time is of the essence, and task force members agreed that the process needed to move along so the proper arrangements could be made, one way or the other.

"We were moving along through conventional phases until the model school bombshell dropped," said Project Manager Tim Bonfatti. "We need to proceed immediately with the model program. I'm hearing support for it, so we should actively look for answers from the state."

The parade was more than just marching bands, though. Many local politicians joined the festivities and walked along the parade route. Both State Senator Marian Walsh and Representative John Rogers were present, waving and talking to those who lined the streets.

antique and classic cars and several historic military reenactment units. These units ranged from World War II units to Operation Desert Storm units.

Before the parade and procession was the annual Norwood Firecracker 5K Road Race. A total of 163 participants signed up for this year's race, and these runners ran from the Town Common to Hawes Pool and back.

The top three finishers were Philip Gingras of Norwood, Pat Ryan of Westwood, and Steve Curley of Norwood. They finished with times of 15:56, 16:58, and 17:28, respectively.

The top female finisher was Kathryn Fobert of Norwood, with a time of 19:11. Second among female runners was Maureen Larkin of Walpole with a time of 19:42. Lorraine Mohan of Norton finished third with a time of 20:35.

While some were racing to win, others were racing for fun. Some were racing with their children, and several racers were pushing baby carriages.

Others, like Norwood resident Barry Rubenstein, have turned the 5k race into an an-

nual tradition. This marked Rubenstein's tenth year competing. He finished in 59th place with a time of 22:56, his fastest time yet.

"I never do this well," Rubenstein said. "It was a particularly good race for me."

The day's events started well before the race. Earlier in the day, the annual Children's Bicycle, Tricycle, Doll Carriage and Historic Character parade took place. Over 350 children ranging from ten months to over ten years old participated, covering their bikes and carriages with flags, ribbons, and a variety of other decorations.

"I think we had the biggest crowd ever," said Mary Cantaroy, co-coordinator of the children's parade. "We had a lot of kids this year."

All the children who participated received a t-shirt and participation ribbons, and five judges selected winners in each age group and gave them the option of riding in a float in the main parade.

The Children's Bicycle, Tricycle, Doll Carriage and Historic Character parade debuted about

15 years ago, co-coordinator Maria Henry said. Only 70 participated in the first year, but has since grown.

"It's a great event to do every year," Henry said.

Shortly after the children's parade was a carillon concert. Lee Leach of Norwood and Margaret Anglini of Wellesley performed at the Tilton Memorial Carillon in Town Hall, providing music for all those on and around the Town Common. After the performance, a tour was offered.

The Parade Committee received \$20,000 from the town to help pay for the event, though an additional \$25,000 to \$30,000 had to be raised to cover expenses. Several businesses, including the International House of Pancakes, Norwood Bank, Lustra Cleaners, and Roche Bros. all donated.

## Saulnier's two homers nix Norfolk

The Norwood Nationals are smacking the ball around like gangbusters and last week clinched first place in the in the first round of Pool 1 play in the District 11 Little League baseball tourney. At one point, Norwood had crushed eight home runs in just three games.

It was an amazing outing for the No. 3 hitter, who almost hit a third homer in the fifth inning when he drilled a double off the bottom of the centerfield fence on a 3-0 count. Makenna Lane's ensuing grounder up the middle proved to be the game winner.

Kenny Michael allowed only two hits in 5 2/3 innings, while Steve Chisholm and Makenna Lane both hit homers. The following is coverage of Norwood's spectacular tourney run. The next game is July 10, 5:30 p.m. at Kelley and Wall Field).*

Right now, the most feared team in the District 11 Little League tourney is the Norwood Nationals.

Folks, this team is on a bona fide roll, after clinching first place in Pool 1 play with a 3-1 win over Needham West last Thursday at Kelley Field.

The undefeated Nationals (5-0) are playing great ball among some of the state's toughest competition.

Keep in mind this is the same district from which Walpole advanced to the Williamsport Little League World Series tournament last year.

Needham West was no slouch, but Norwood got the best of the deal after Kenny Michael struck out 12 batters in just 4 2/3 innings.

"Kenny Michael pitched a great game, but wasn't able to

finish," said Plasko, who noted Michael was lifted after reaching the 85-pitch limit.

But it took Mark Saulnier only four batters to nail it down, including a masterful eight-pitch sixth inning in which he struck out two. He also fanned the No. 2 hitter in four pitches to end the fifth frame.

"He's been a workhorse for us this summer," said Plasko.

Saulnier has also been a major force, as has Michael, in Norwood's torrid offense. Heading into the game, Saulnier was 8-for-10 with three home runs, while Michael was 5-for-8 with two homers.

Meanwhile, the hot-hitting Brendan Walsh was moved up to the leadoff spot and responded by going 2-for-3, including a single to start the game.

It was the start of a key two-run rally. After Michael grounded into a fielder's choice, Saulnier singled to make it first and third.

Makenna Lane drove in the first run on a groundout, and Norwood made it 2-0 after Saulnier advanced to third on a passed ball and scored on a Jake Ryan fielder's choice.

Needham halved the deficit with a run in the first. Michael walked the leadoff batter, struck out the next two, and allowed an RBI double that rolled to the fence. It was the star hurler's

only blemish of the game.

crowds at Kelley and Wall Fields.

Against Norfolk, centerfielder Jack Sheehan caught a fly and threw out the runner tagging for third in the second inning. It ruined the rally for the visitors, who had runners at second and third with one out.

Then, in the fifth, speedy leftfielder Mike Doliner hustled to make another clutch play.

Norfolk had the bases loaded with two out. A hit to left tied the game at 2-2, but Doliner got to the ball quickly enough to hold the trailing runner.

"We knew they weren't going to give him anything to hit," Plasko said. "So I told him if they make a mistake, drive it, but don't be over anxious, because we got good hitters behind you, like Makenna Lane.

Sure enough, the first two

pitches sailed over Saulnier's head and the third toss was in the dirt.

Anticipating a walk, "the crowd was already yelling for (on-deck hitter) Makenna Lane to make them pay," Plasko said.

But, even with a 3-0 count, Saulnier "had the green light," said the coach, who watched his star deliver his third ball to center, this one just failing to do what the others did.

"The pitch was outside and he hit it off the bottom of the fence for a double," said Plasko of Saulnier's third hit of the night. "It jacked up our whole team. It was a ball he had no business hitting."

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

came to the final hearing armed with as much information and as many questions as the ZBA, but it was a report he submitted to the board that threw Macchi and Lorusso for a loop, prompting them to ask the board to delay their deliberations until they had a chance to review and respond to the new evidence.

Foley presented the board with a 20-page minority report written by various professors

and scientists from across the country regarding fugitive emissions from asphalt plants. These particular emissions, Foley said, usually originate from places other than industrial smokestacks.

"Asphalt plants make an array of emissions," he said. "The ones that have been presented all come from the stack, but there are others that are ambient, and they include some pretty dangerous stuff."

The Zoning Board agreed to close the hearing and grant Macchi and his associates two weeks to reply to the report in writing. Upon receipt of their response, which will be the last piece of new information that will be accepted in the case, the board will commence their deliberations. Chairman Patrick Mulvehill said the board would make a vote to determine the fate of Norfolk Asphalt in mid-August.
