

## Board backs \$4.5 million transformer replacement

The Board of Selectmen on Tuesday night gave their support to a \$4.5 million project by Norwood Light and Broadband to replace aging power transformers on Dean Street.

The department is seeking the funds to purchase three new transformers to replace units that have been in place for the past 40 years, according to Assistant Superintendent Jim Collins. Each unit is expected to cost \$1.5 million and part of the project cost will be covered by money already in the department's depreciation fund.

"We're fortunate that we were able to load them pretty evenly, because they last a long time anyway," Collins said. "That's not to say that we should keep pressing out luck. It is time to replace them."

The units are still in working order, which has led the department to hold off on the project for a number of years. However, Collins says that he would like to replace the units now, before they fail.

"As long as the units don't fail, we are in control," Collins said. "If we have a problem with these old units, then what we have to do kind of dictates the way we do it and when we do it. The costs could move quickly out of our hands, as to whatever we need to do to keep the power going."

Selectmen gave their unanimous support for the project, but the Light Department will still need to go before Town Meeting in order to approve the funding.

Additionally, Selectmen gave their support to an additional \$750,000 for the Light Department's budget to improve broadband service and equipment in the coming years. The funding will go to improving service in the town by adding more channels and providing digital simulcasts of analog stations in preparation for the DTV crossover.

"As you know, the market here in Norwood is very competitive," Light Department Supt. Malcolm McDonald said. "Most of the items that we're looking at for capital improvement are to make us remain viable in this market."

Some of those improvements include \$44,500 budgeted for converter boxes to provide DTV and DVR service, as

## HQ site could go recreational

Developer David Spiegel will present a warrant article at May's Special Town Meeting which seeks to amend zoning laws to allow the recreational use of properties zoned as limited manufacturing by special permit. A public hearing on the matter will be held before the Norwood Planning Board on April 27.

The article, as drafted by Spiegel and his attorney, would allow recreational purposes such as gyms, swimming pools, bowling alleys or movie theaters.

"In the past number of years, we've had people come to us about [the property], but we don't have the flexibility to allow them," Spiegel said. "There are many different things that I think the intent of the law would allow, but that technically aren't legal."

Spiegel owns the former Home Quarters building on Route 1, a property that has been vacant for more than a decade. His attorney, Jim Hilliard, said this special amendment will make the property more viable, as they have not found a manufacturing tenant to take over the space.

"We're asking the town to approve it," Hilliard said. "You can put limited manufacturing anywhere, but Route 1 property is very visible and accessible."

Under the current restrictions for areas zoned as limited manufacturing, indoor commercial or recreation use is prohibited, but large retail businesses, like Home Quarters, are allowed. If the amendment passes, Spiegel, or any other developer with land under limited manufacturing zoning, would be able to apply for a permit from the ZBA to allow such uses.

"This is not a declaration that you can do recreation as a matter of right," Hilliard said.

Norwood currently has approximately 500 acres of limited manufacturing zoning, according to Town Planner Stephen Costello. One similar plot is the area along University Avenue, where the town had previously considered building a YMCA recreation center.

According to Hilliard, the YMCA, as a recreational facility, was allowed under zoning because it served a charitable or educational purpose, although the group was ultimately unable to



# Industrial park will not change Owner will not seek housing conversion

The Norwood Industrial Park will continue to house warehouses and manufacturing offices and will not, as previously speculated, be converted for other uses, property owner Bruce Comenitz said at Thursday night's meeting of the South Norwood Steering Committee.

Comenitz said that he had looked at converting the property, which lies along the Neponset River on Morse Street, into a residential development, but economic factors over the past two years had put a stop to any such plans. Instead, he will continue to rent spaces to businesses and other tenants.

"We explored some options on how to redevelop the property in the past 18 months," Comenitz said. "We were looking at housing as an alternative that might lend itself to working with the site. We didn't get very far, because then the economy suffered and everything has come to a screeching halt."

Although the 18-acre parcel was a very viable site for manufacturing plants in the past, recent changes in the industry have significantly decreased the buildings' value to tenants.

"We're in the year 2009, and the buildings have become somewhat obsolete," Comenitz said. "They were built for a very specific purpose, low ceilings, multiple columns. They just don't lend themselves very easily for manufacturing. So now, it's warehousing because people don't make things anymore, for the most part."

Members of the Committee were not pleased with the prospect of additional housing in the area, as some felt the area was already full enough. Indeed, many committee members felt that the best course of action was for the town to buy the land so that it could be converted to passive recreation.

"We don't want things that are detrimental to the neighborhood, that's the bottom line," said Committee Member Patty Bailey, who submitted a petition asking the town to buy the land. "Not speaking up is a mistake."

However, any plans for redeveloping the property for another purpose are off the table, Comenitz said. While he may examine it again under a better economic climate, he does not expect any progress to be made soon.

Even though many of the members were adamantly opposed to the development of the property, they were happy to work with Comenitz in the future, as he has a long history of helping the community. Most recently, he has allowed school buses to park on his property for free.

"You have been an asset to the town," Committee Chairman and Selectwoman Helen Donahue said. "You have managed the property, you have kept tenants there, and the tenants have not bothered anybody around town. You've survived under difficult conditions, a small rickety bridge, a lousy railroad bridge, and you've been able to hold on."

# SECRET BALLOT HAS A PLACE

After writing a couple of weeks ago that I thought there was a place for a secret ballot at Town Meeting, I received quite a number of calls and e-mails explaining to me the error of my logic. Some suggested supporting a measure to eliminate the secret ballot option entirely.

Admittedly, I did not take into account that Norwood's Town Meeting is, in fact, an elected body, voted into place by registered residents of the town. And yes, Town Meeting members should, in theory, be considered no different and under the same obligations as any other elected official, that is to be accountable to those voting he or she into office. And after taking all of this under further consideration and review, I still think a secret ballot has a place at Town Meeting. And my opinion shouldn't be considered heretic since authors of the Norwood Town Charter must have felt the same way or a provision for a secret ballot would never have been made available in the first place.

Unlike your state or national representatives, Town Meeting members receive no compensation; have no staff and garner no perks associated with most positions of authority. And today's realities are such that if most current town meeting members chose not to seek election to their seats, said seats would go unfilled. Voter apathy is rampant, not just in Norwood but everywhere. This fact alone throws into question the very viability of a town meeting form of government in the future. Why exacerbate the problem by removing provisions that may lessen the burden of TM members?

With no compensation and perks to speak of, I believe most town meeting members choose to run because they want to individually influence the direction of the town, and what's wrong with that? How many Town Meeting members do you know who pledge publicly to represent the majority of their district neighbors? How many forums are held to discuss views and opinions of town meeting candidates so that voters can make an educated decision to fill TM seats? Here's one better. How many registered voters can even name their town meeting representatives?

Reality is a sobering thing. Today's reality is that should towns like Norwood continue to operate under an elected town meeting form of government, options such as a secret ballot should remain available if a majority of members vote to institute it in a given situation. No one is advocating they become the de facto standard used every time a vote is required. However, if a majority of members would feel more comfortable casting their votes secretly, I just don't see the harm in it.

When the call for a roll call vote was made at the last TM concerning the high school, the majority in favor of a new school was so overwhelming that there was no chance for a secret ballot, and that is ok. But, what if in a given vote the opinion was more evenly divided and a call for a secret vote carried? Would that have been so disastrous?

Other potential forms of government, though I advocate for none of them, include an open town meeting such as in Westwood, where every registered voter is a Town Meeting member, or have no TM at all and govern with a mayor and city council where it is easy for registered voters to determine if their best interests are always being represented by their elected officials.

I reiterate it would be naive for anyone to think that some residents didn't change their vote at the most recent TM regarding the high school due to peer pressure. I am also not stating here that it should have been voted on by secret ballot. I am just refuting the notion that there is no place for one and that town meeting members should be held to the same standard as other elected officials. In a perfect world, maybe, but the imperfections of today suggest that there will be more and more empty seats at future Town Meetings.

No one thinks a secret ballot would have made any difference in the outcome of the high school vote. This last Norwood Town Meeting was a wonderful example of how TM works, but most are not. Most Town Meetings struggle to garner a forum, just like most elections struggle to entice 20 percent of registered voters to bother to show up. Suggesting ideas such as eliminating the secret ballot option is a bit Draconian in this writer's way of thinking.

I am writing in response to your April 9, 2009 editorial. You stated, in connection with the vote at the Town Meeting for the new high school, that "precluding a secret ballot seems a little unfair."

This position fundamentally misunderstands the nature of Norwood Town Meeting. Norwood Town Meeting members are elected Town Meeting representatives. Each member represents a particular district and is elected to the position of Town Meeting member by the vote of citizens of that district. A voter has a right to know what position their elected representative takes on important issues. An elected representative does not have a right to keep his or her opinion secret from those who elected him or her to the position. It is not "unfair" to ask an elected representative to publicly state their position.

Secondly, I hope you are

incorrect when you suggest the Town Meeting members may vote the opposite of their true opinion because they fear disapproval by their neighbors. Town Meeting members are elected so they can apply their wisdom and judgment to the issues before the Town Meeting. If an elected Town Meeting member is truly afraid to vote based on their best judgment and opinion because of fear of public disapproval, they are not able to properly carry out the duties of a Town Meeting member. They should resign so they can be replaced by individuals who will vote based on their honest opinion about the issues and not based on concerns about what people will think.

# Morse Street Bridge slated for replacement

## Other street repairs will be made possible through state funding

Morse Street in South Norwood will be getting a major facelift over the next two years, with the state funding two major construction projects intended to improve traffic flow and safety.

Town Engineer Mark Ryan presented plans for the replacement of the Morse Street Bridge, and for the construction of a traffic light at the intersection of Morse and Pleasant streets, at a joint meeting of the South Norwood Committee and the South Norwood Steering Committee last Thursday night.

Both projects would be funded by money from the Commonwealth's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).

"The town could have taken the project and funded it itself, but we decided to go through

the TIP process, in which the state identifies worthwhile projects and eventually agrees to fund them," Ryan said.

The bridge plans primarily address safety and structural concerns about the existing bridge over the Neponset River. However, as part of the redesign, the roadway will be widened from 19 to 22 feet to improve traffic flow, and a five-foot-wide sidewalk will be added to allow easier pedestrian access, Ryan said.

MassHighway designated the Morse Street Bridge, which is owned by the town, for repair in 1999, and provided completed plans for a redesign in 2004. But it was not until the state began the Accelerated Bridge Program in August of 2008 that the project was fast tracked for completion, Ryan said. Under the TIP initiative, the cost of the entire project will be funded by the state.

"This thing started out as a \$500,000 project, and now we're at \$1.2 million," Ryan said. "The state has agreed to 100 percent fund the construction, which is a great asset to Norwood because now we do not have to pay for it, they will do the construction, they will fund it, and then it will be transferred over to the Town of Norwood."

During the construction period, a temporary bridge, open only to trucks entering the area, will be put in place alongside the build site.

"[The temporary bridge] is going to be a narrow bridge, it is not going to be a two-way bridge," Ryan said. "So we don't want traffic going back and forth on it. We want to keep away as much traffic as possible."

Just up the road, at the intersection with Pleasant Street, the town will install a traffic signal to improve traffic flow

Norwood.”

Originally from England, the Grazado family moved to West Roxbury when Bill was just seven years old. He met his wife when they were both children. The pair eventually married in the summer of 1939 and moved to her hometown of Norwood in 1942.

During his time here, Grazado played with a number of local organizations aside from the Senior Center. He donated his time to the Glee Club, the Sons of Italy and the Elk's lodge, along with many other organizations and private events.

“He liked to be called Mr. Volunteer,” said Doug Ross, who previously sang with the AARP Irregulars and served as Master of Ceremonies on Thursday. “So, Mr. Volunteer, we salute you.”

Bill's son Bob took a moment to praise both his father and mother for all the hard work they did over the years, noting that the two will celebrate their

70th anniversary in the summer.

“Music was his life,” he said. “If he didn't have that piano, it'd be tough to see him bored silly without anything to do.”

Among the speakers was Selectwoman Helen Abdullah-Donahue, whose mother sang in the AARP Irregulars with Bill.

“I'm really here as my mother's daughter,” Donahue said. She read a poem she wrote for the Grazados, which ended with the line “So, Bill and Bea Grazado, wherever you go, always remember you are loved.”

Members of the Council on Aging, and Friends of the Council on Aging, were also on hand to pay their respects to the piano player. Bill McCoy, a member of the Friends who first met Grazado in the 1950s, spoke of his talent.

“Everybody knows Ray Charles,” McCoy said. “If they were together, Bill could do the same thing blindfolded that Ray could.”

Many shared their personal

stories about Bill, including Betty Mastandrea, a member of the Sons of Italy Lodge in Norwood.

A number of years back, the Sons of Italy had planned to hold a special Mass for deceased members of the lodge, Mastandrea said. But after extensive preparations, they realized that they hadn't lined up any music. Two days later, she saw Bill, a longtime member of the Sons of Italy, playing with the Irregulars at an AARP meeting, and he agreed to provide music for the service on short notice.

“He said to me, ‘If you have the music, sure I'll play,’” Mastandrea said. “It was wonderful that Bill had this God-given talent that he didn't hide in the other room. He shared it with everybody.”

She also said that when she met Bill at Thursday's tribute, he brought along pictures from the Sons of Italy for her, and the two exchanged some tearful hugs on the stage.

“I remember thinking, ‘Why do we wait so long to recognize people who do so much in the community?’” Mastandrea said.

After receiving a plaque for his service, the piano man took his rightful place behind the keys as he and some of the other old Irregulars came together to put on a show for everyone in attendance. Forgoing their usual opening theatrics, the group jumped right into it with the song “We are Smiling.”

“I don't remember when I first met Bill, but I'm sure it's a very good memory,” said Frank Mckeown. “He's one of the finest human beings I've ever met. If there is a life hereafter, and I hope there is, I hope our paths cross again.”

well as \$363,000 to provide 68 more HD channels.

## BOARD BACKS FIRE DEPT. BUDGET MOVE

Fire Chief Michael Howard was also granted the support of the Selectmen as he seeks an additional \$15,000 in reserve funds from the Finance Commission to help cover payroll costs until May 1, when other funds within the department can be reallocated under the Municipal Relief Act.

As previously reported in the Record, the Fire Department has overspent its budget for this point in the year, and has already received \$20,000 in reserve funding to keep its payroll and equipment on track. Howard said that he has been analyzing his budget and trying

to cut costs, but so far has been unable to do so without potentially compromising service and safety for the town.

"We are in a severe situation," Howard said. "I know that this is happening throughout the Commonwealth."

Without the \$15,000, which will cover payroll for two weeks, the department could be forced to reduce the number of on-duty firefighters, and possibly take their backup ambulance and second engine out of service. Already, the department has suspended vacations and personal days to reduce costs associated with replacement staffing.

"It continues to be unfair to my personnel, the actions I have taken" Howard said. "But short of taking the actions that I have,

the only other alternative at this point is to start placing apparatus out of service."

While those moves would essentially return the department to its capabilities before 2006, Howard warned that the town's needs have continued to rise in the time since. Specifically, he cited a fire on Bahama Drive Monday that required the full capabilities of his department and additional help from neighboring departments.

"In light of the fire we just had yesterday, the work that those crews did, and the availability of the apparatus for that incident, it potentially could cause not only severe safety issues for our personnel, but potential severe safety issues for the public that we serve," Howard said.

and safety concerns. At present, Morse Street has only a stop sign on each side for traffic control.

"If anyone has driven through that intersection, especially during rush hour, you're taking your life in your hands," Ryan said. "It is a very confusing intersection. It is a dangerous intersection. It's twice the state crash rate there, so the numbers pan out that it is something that needs to be fixed."

The town conducted a traffic study using funds donated by FM Global, and determined that neither a rotary nor four-way-stop would be able to properly control traffic, Ryan said.

The plans for the new intersection feature more lanes in every direction, with dedi-

cated turn lanes on both sides of Morse.

"Some of the big plusses here, when you're talking about lights, it's good for the vehicles, and we're talking pedestrian activated controls, so now pedestrians-and you do see quite a bit of them out there-will be able to safely cross the street," Ryan said.

Like the bridge, the intersection project should take just over a year to finish, and will likely also be funded by the state through TIP. Ryan is hopeful that both projects will begin in 2010, though likely not at the same time.

"We know the bridge project's coming first, and we're hopeful we'll get the funding for [the intersection]," Ryan said. "But there's going to be an overlap, absolutely."

While members of both committees were supportive of the construction projects, they were still concerned about the railroad bridge over the street, which lies between the two projects, and even passed a motion to ask the town to examine the area for future construction.

There have been drainage problems reported in the area during rains, and there have been numerous cases in the past where rented trucks or other oversized vehicles have hit the underside of the bridge, members said.

April 27, from 7 p.m. to midnight.

Just don't tell Webber that though.

"I didn't really want the party, but the guitar player [in my band] said 'You know, you did the Toys for Tots for 20 years, it's time you get some too,'" he said.

You'd be hard pressed to find anyone in Norwood who hasn't felt Webber's impact in some way. The longtime motorcycle enthusiast and oil burner technician has been donating his time and his talents to any and every charity group that he can help. In what's become his regular gig, he's strapped on his bass and taken the stage with the band Tumbling Dice to play for the Annual Toys For Tots event for the past twenty years.

"One time, some girl asked me, like 20 years ago, if I'd be interested in doing Toys for Tots, and I'd always felt bad for kids, so I said sure," Webber said. "If somebody came to me and said, 'hey, can you play a benefit for the kids?' I always did it."

Praised as a musical prodigy as a child, Webber got started on the piano before moving on to guitar, bass and, just for good measure, the accordion. He had several years of formal education, but found that he was better off learning and playing by ear. Today he says he'll play "anything from the 50s to the 80s," but The Beatles are still the greatest, as far as he's concerned.

He picked up his charitable side from his father, who used to dress up as Santa Claus and visit the elementary schools when Webber was a child. After watching and learning from him, Richie says that any time there's

any way he can help kids, he'll do it. That philosophy has seen him work with the Genesis Fund, which benefits children born with genetic diseases, and programs for Multiple Sclerosis.

"[My father] used to dress up as Santa and go to all the schools in Norwood, to go see the little kids," Webber said. "I always felt bad when I knew the kids were sick. They don't know why, so that's why I did the charity."

His father was also responsible for the now famous backyard barbecues held every Fourth of July for the last 30 years. What began as a simple gathering of 8 people has blossomed into a major event that draws hundreds of friends, and leaves the better part of Nahatan Street blocked off by motorcycles.

In fact, the event was such a major occasion that when Webber's father died days beforehand in 2005, they still kept the party on.

"He was buried on the second, and you still had the party on the fourth," said Kathy Morrison, Webber's girlfriend. "He would have wanted it that way though."

On Jan. 18 of this year, Webber suffered a stroke that left him fully paralyzed on the right side of his body. In the three months since, he's regained some of the movement in his arm, hand, and foot, but he still requires a cane and leg brace to walk around. It's also kept his guitar out of his hands.

"I'm kind of bummed out that I can't play it anymore," Webber said.

Doctors said that the stroke was caused by a combination of diabetes, high blood pressure

and high cholesterol. He says that it was lifestyle choices he'd made that lead to the condition, and that he's already started taking better care of himself in anticipation of his recovery, which he says could take anywhere from six months to two years.

He's also been going through intensive physical therapy at the Spaulding Rehabilitation Hospital in Boston.

"I need to eat healthier," he said. "I need to keep up with myself. When I get good enough, I told the doctors at the Spaulding Hospital I was going to go back and talk."

He also requires care throughout the day, with his daughter Rachael helping out in the morning, his mother Florence taking over through lunch, and his girlfriend Kathy Morrison keeping an eye on him at night.

"We check his sugars now four times a day," Morrison said. "Rachael's really good about making sure he's eating the right foods and stuff. It's a great family."

The money raised at Saturday's party will be going to help cover both his medical expenses and his living expenses while he's out of work. But as far as he's concerned, it is about seeing everyone get together and have a good time.

Even while discussing the stroke and everything else that's happened to him, Webber's spirits remain high. He's excited about the party this weekend, because it will give everyone a chance to have some fun, and he loves bringing that out in people.

"It's going to be a good party," he said. "That's what I want, for people to get together. I hope it's a good turnout. I just want everyone to have fun."

Doesn't matter how many wins you have around here. Until you beat Walpole, you're not considered the best.

Well, under that premise, folks, consider it done. Dominating every aspect of the game — offense, defense, and pitching — the high-flying first-place Norwood softball team ran its record to 6-0, thanks to a riveting 12-1 thrashing of Walpole in a huge Bay State Conference Herget Division match-up at sunny Balch Field last Friday.

Perhaps above all else was the outstanding performance of junior first baseman Emily Whitney, who slammed a three-run homer over the left fielder's head and made a pair of terrific clutch plays at first base in the third inning, among other defensive exploits that pretty much ruined the Rebels' day. In truth, it was the kind of individual outing that you never forget. Whitney's three-run blast in the bottom of the third extended Norwood's slim 3-0 lead to 6-0. But just a half inning before, she kept her team's 1-0 advantage intact with back-to-back sensational plays with the bases loaded. On both occasions, Whitney, playing in on the grass, came up roses with hard one-hop grounders and threw to the plate to get the lead runner.

"It was good to play for my grandfather and dedicate it to him, cause he would be so proud of me, so I was really excited to play well for him," said Whitney, who played on junior varsity last year. "I'm playing with such good players, so I feel good I'm playing as well as I can."

And so, it seems, are the rest of the Mustangs. Even the cautiously optimistic Smelstor had to admit the outpouring of runs

scored by her team was quite incredible.

"No," she laughed when asked if it can get any better than Friday's 16-hit attack. "But this is what we have been doing. I just don't want it to stop. They're feeding off of each other. They're doing very, very well. They're challenging each other at the plate. And they're making the right choices up at the plate, so, no it can't [get better than this]. I mean I'm sure it can, but when you hit as well as we have been. ... We hit the ball very, very well."

The Rebels (2-3), meanwhile, entered the game on a high, winning their previous game, 8-7, after rallying from a 7-2 deficit against Newton North.

"Hey, they did knock on our door and they came from behind to beat Newton North, and trust me, even when it was 10-0, I was not sitting back waiting to say this is gonna be an easy win," said Smelstor. "[In past years], I lost a game one time being up 10-0, and I lost 11-10, so my guard's always up, cause you never know what [the other team's] gonna do."

Walpole head coach Jim Duffy, meanwhile, expected better things from his team, but acknowledged the talent of the Mustangs, especially the pitching of Norwood sophomore Lauren Duggan.

"We expected to win," said Duffy. "I know they had beaten a lot of teams by 10-12 runs, but we expected to win. [We're] a little bit immature as a team right now [and Norwood] is a very seasoned team. They're well coached, and they can hit the ball and [Duggan] pitched a gem of a game. [She's] gonna be someone to be reckoned with for the next three years. She's going to be an outstanding pitcher."

Duggan was masterful in going the distance, winning her third straight outing. She allowed only four hits, while striking out seven. The only run she allowed came in the seventh when Hannah Feeley doubled to right and later scored on a groundout.

"Lauren pitched great, and as long as we can keep supporting both our pitchers, we should be okay," said Smelstor.

Walpole's Sam Cametti also was pretty smooth through the first two innings, though the Mustangs got to her for a run in the first, when Katie Lang slammed a triple into the right field corner and scored on the ensuing wild pitch.

Then, in the bottom of the third, Brittany Calarese led off with a single to center, and Ali Maloof followed with a nice sacrifice that advanced Calarese to second. Calarese moved to third on a wild pitch, and after Duggan walked, Natalie Metta singled in both runners to give the Mustangs a 3-0 lead. After Whitney's rocket made it 6-0, Walpole got out of the inning on a super play by shortstop Michaela Crosby, who fielded a deflected ball from third and fired to first.

But, Norwood exploded for four more runs in the fourth. Again, Calarese got things started with a single to center. Maloof again intended to sacrifice, but beat out the bunt for a hit to make it first and second. After Lang moved the runners over on a ground out, Duggan ripped a two-run single to center, Metta followed with her third RBI of the afternoon, and an error allowed the Mustangs to lead, 10-0.

In the sixth, Crosby made an outstanding leaping catch for Walpole to rob Whitney of her third hit. Then, before Norwood wrapped up the scoring on a Calarese sacrifice fly — after Kelly Millin singled and Kelly McCabe doubled — Alex Dukas, usually a spray hitter, provided some unexpected power with a home run on a sharp sailing liner to left.

"She timed that beautifully, and she was relaxed, and that thing took right off," said Smelstor.

In a town full of champions, we can chalk up another. The Bantam 'A' team in the Norwood Nuggets youth hockey program recently was crowned playoff champion of the South Shore Conference. And with the Pee wee 'A' and 'B 1' squads also winning postseason titles, Norwood youth hockey is hanging banners among its rafters at the rate of the Celtics in the 60s.

Last season, the Bantam 'A' group won the regular season title with the best record, but came up short in hoisting the championship flag. This year, the Nuggets finished a strong fourth in the standings out of 19 teams, but proved even stronger in its title run.

"It is who is ready to peak at the right time, and we did," said longtime Nuggets coach Russ Tobin, whose team closed the regular season at 20-6-5 and finished 23-6-5 overall. "I got to give the kids credit. They worked hard, they practiced hard, and they listen. And they're very talented. And, believe me, it makes it easy to coach when you have the talent."

The Nuggets, a contingent of seventh, eighth, and ninth graders, were led by their three captains, Andrew Alty, Michael Murray, and Kyle Dolan, all of whom played varsity hockey for Norwood High as freshmen this past winter. Standout goalie Patrick Clifford also played for the Mustangs in his first year at the high school, while serving as a strong cog in the Nuggets' remarkable 4-0 win over state powerhouse Milton for the SSC title. "He made a lot of great saves," said Tobin. "A great goalie and defense make a great team."

Alty, Murray, and Dolan all had a hand in Norwood's strong defense this season, while Alty also starred as a forward with leading scorer Jack O'Hear. O'Hear, an eighth-grader, led the Nuggets with some 25 goals and two against Milton in the championship game. "He had an absolutely terrific year," said Tobin of his top goal scorer. Murray and eighth-grader Matt Brown, meanwhile, also tallied in the title joust.

Norwood's magnificent cast also included solid forwards Greg Gillis, Connor Mahon, Jake Rinalli, Steve Deforge, Anthony Delmonaco, Tom

Duggan, and Jack Santisi; defensemen Brian Alighieri, Mark Maggio, and Dan Wiseman; and goalie Jordan Davis.

Tobin also lauded his co-coaches Steve Mahon and Jim Rinalli. "I've been lucky [to have them]," he said.

To get to the title game, the Nuggets, who got a bye in the postseason first round for ranking as one of the top four teams, bested fifth-place squad Hingham, 3-1, in the quarterfinals, and regular season champion Duxbury, 2-1, in the semis. The title win was particularly stunning considering Milton was crowned District 3 state champions in an unrelated tournament in which it defeated Norwood among its opponents earlier in the year. During the regular season in the SSC, the teams split a pair with both teams taking 3-1 victories.

"All the coaches were very proud of them, not just for the games, but the way they handled themselves with class," said Tobin of his troops. "And the parents should be proud. They work hard, they give everything they have all the time, and it's quite an accomplishment."

# Rallies not enough for Norwood nine

In a game of catch-me-if-you-can, the Norwood and Walpole baseball teams went back-and-forth for eight innings, before Walpole escaped with a 6-5 victory over the visiting Mustangs in a big Bay State Conference Herget Division battle at Bird Middle School last Friday.

Norwood (3-2) battled back twice to either tie or take the lead, but in the end the Mustangs suffered their second consecutive one run loss after they dropped a tough 4-3 decision to host Milton earlier in the week.

"We had a tough week of losing two games by one run, and we had the opportunities but couldn't capitalize when we had to," said Norwood head coach Tony Fruci. "When that happens, good teams tend to bite you at the end of the game."

Fruci cited an instance against Milton when his team had runners at second and third with nobody out, but couldn't get a run in.

Against Walpole, it was more of a defensive letdown and a series of walks that had the Mustangs reeling, though Norwood starter Mike Goodwin tossed 6 2/3 innings of solid ball, allowing only six hits and three unearned runs, and reliever Mike DeCosta got a clutch out in the late innings.

Norwood actually out-hit the Rebels by a 10-8 count, but five runs weren't enough, after Mustang hurlers totaled eight base-on balls and Norwood allowed several runs to score via mistakes in the field. The Rebels scored the winning tally after loading the bases in the ninth and benefiting on an ensuing wild pitch that took an unfortunate bounce to the backstop.

But Walpole was almost just as giving at the plate in walking seven Norwood batters, and the Mustangs took advantage at some key times.

"Basically, both teams were taking advantage of mistakes and walks," said Fruci.

The Mustangs, though, showed their offensive capabilities in rallying from 2-0 and 5-4 deficits. With Norwood trailing 2-0 in the fourth, senior captain Brian Williams (2-for-4) made it 2-1 with an RBI single, after Sean Keady walked and Nico Rodrigues (2-for-5) ripped a line-shot double to left.

Then, in the seventh, the Mustangs took a 4-2 lead on an RBI double to right center by Brandon Davis (2-for-5) and a two-out, two-run single to left by Mike Goodwin. The inning started with a one-out single to Williams and a walk to Jesse Shaughnessy.

The Rebels tied it in their half on a bases-loaded walk and

an ensuing wild pitch, and then took the lead on an RBI double in the eighth.

But the Mustangs rallied again. Shaughnessy was hit by a pitch to lead off the ninth. Davis followed with a single, and, after a pair of outs, the second of which advanced the runners on a fielder's choice, A.J. Silletti (2-for-4) knocked a hard-hit single up the middle to tie the game at 5-5.

"Both games we were down and came back," said Fruci of the games against Walpole and Milton. "We fought back. ... We just have to continue to work on the little things. But as far as character and heart, this team has it. Multiple times we were down and came back. Even in our wins, we came back and won. It is what it is and we got to build on it. We know what we have to do. We have to go further and improve."


