

## Town Meeting approves NSTAR deal

### Authorizes town to borrow \$24 million

Two years of discussions, deliberations and contract negotiations came to a head last night as Town Meeting members overwhelmingly voted to approve a multi-million dollar agreement with NSTAR.

The terms of the contract as approved by the Board of Selectmen and the Finance Commission sets the town up to receive \$36 million over the next 20 years, with an initial payment of \$2 million expected as early as this Monday.

Town meeting members voted to allow the selectmen to borrow \$24 million, as was outlined in the contract, to build additional equipment to allow NSTAR to service its customers in Westwood.

"NSTAR is committed to paying full costs (associated with borrowing)," Town Manager John Carroll said. "Should it exceed \$24 million, we would come back to town meeting and request to borrow more, but NSTAR will pay for it."

Fin Com Chair Judy Langone said the group met in emergency session with Carroll and members of the Board of Selectmen last Saturday for over two hours discussing the conditions of the contract, and said they came to approve and recommend the contract as written.

"We're convinced this is a good deal," she said.

But some town meeting members were not convinced, and brought their concerns to the floor.

Bob Capasso of District 4 took issue with various details in the contract, and said certain terms threw up a red flag when he read through the agreement.

"Norwood is responsible for providing A-1 service to NSTAR in order to collect our rent," he said, equating the agreement as a tenant/landlord arrangement between the town and the energy company.

"All landlord/tenant contracts have provisions that the landlord has to take care of the tenant," Chairman Mike Lyons said. "That's what we're doing."

Lyons said that Norwood's reputation was what attracted NSTAR to approach the town with the deal.

"We don't need to step up our ser-

# Town could net millions

## DOR estimates \$30 million in taxable property

Norwood could be sitting on a hefty amount of tax revenue, according to an assessment released by the Massachusetts Department of Revenue last week.

According to a memo sent from the DOR, Norwood could be entitled to revenue on \$30 million in taxable property.

In March, the Massachusetts legislature ruled that municipalities could tax major telecommunications companies for utility poles and wires that are on public property.

On June 10, Marilyn Browne, Chief of the Bureau of Local Assessment issued a letter and an assessment that valued Verizon's taxable property in Norwood alone at \$16 million.

But the money's not in the bank yet.

According to Paul Wanecek, Chairman of the Norwood Board of Assessors, the money will be immediately placed in an overlay account in anticipation of a potentially lengthy appeal by Verizon.

"The money's coming in, we just can't spend it," he said.

The DOR warned municipalities that the major communications companies, including Verizon, would appeal the ruling, a process that could go on for years.

Philip Santoro, a spokesman for Verizon confirmed that the company would appeal.

"We will appeal the ruling on whether poles and wires on public ways are taxable," he said in an e-mail. "In addition, we have already filed separate

appeals on the value of the property set by the DOR. These appeals could take years to resolve."

Before the Supreme Court issued their ruling on March 3rd, communications companies were only required to pay the commercial tax rate on their property that occupied private land. Verizon's tax bill from Norwood for 2008 was \$182,162.

If the ruling is overturned, and communications companies are not required to pay taxes, the money they have already paid must be returned.

"It's extra money, but there's also an extreme liability if the decision is overturned," said Wanecek.

If the ruling is upheld, towns will be

# Cops to keep a closer eye on gazebo

Now that summer is officially here and the Concerts on the Common have made their grand debut, the town of Norwood has a few more months to enjoy the newly renovated Walter Dempsey Memorial Bandstand.

Town Building Inspector Mark Chubet and a group of

volunteers recently completed the restorations, which included a new paint job and a new sound system, as well as new balusters that had been damaged due to vandalism, a problem that Chubet said was a main factor in the bandstand's relatively rapid deterioration.

"Vandalism was absolutely a problem," he said. "We probably replaced three to four hundred balusters."

Chubet added that the total cost of restoring the gazebo was about \$15,000, most of which came from donations from the Norwood Elks Club and the Norwood Bank. He said that graffiti wasn't the main problem, but actual destruction to the physical structure that made it necessary to consider renovating the 16-year-old bandstand.

Norwood Police Chief Bartley King said officers patrol the town commons on a 24 hour basis, but that sometimes an officer gets called away, and crowds start congregating around the gazebo.

"That's usually when those kinds of things happen," he said, "but we're constantly monitoring the place and try to break kids up if they're gathering around there."

Police Department spokesman Paul Bishop said one of the challenges in keeping the gazebo safe from vandals is the fact that it is public property.

"We can't just show up there and tell everyone to leave," he said, "but it's absolutely something we'll be keeping a closer eye on since the restorations."

Bishop said it appeared that local kids were kicking out the

balusters or busting them with skateboards. Chubet agreed that skateboarding on the gazebo may have caused much of the damage his crew tried to repair, and said they tried to replace the broken balusters with more durable materials.

"We did a lot of research into the most 'vandalism-proof' materials we could find," he said. The new railings are made of a combination of PVC and fiberglass that Chubet said would hold up well under pressure.

But Chubet and the Norwood Police agree that the renovation alone should help

fend off future attempts to tarnish the bandstand's new shine.

"Usually when a place is in good shape, there's less tendency to vandalize it, but when it already looks bad, the tendency is to keep going," King said.

If that's the case, the combined efforts of Chubet's volunteers and the Norwood Police should keep the gazebo in prime condition far into the future.

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
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# CASEY'S 5K

As we are all are painfully aware, life takes twists and turns in unexpected ways, and often leaves us with circumstances we never could have imagined.

Right here in Norwood, just during the last 9 months or so, and certainly in many times prior, so many sad and tragic events have occurred in several families' lives. Sad and tragic, and frightening, yes. Yet, at least in Norwood anyway, so much good comes out of so much sorrow, thanks to the wonderfully kind and compassionate members of our community who consistently extend themselves to help others in their time of need, and often accomplish heroic deeds.

Our family has been one of those many who have experienced a tragic event that we never saw coming. Our daughter, Casey, age 21 at the time, suffered a seizure, fall and traumatic brain injury on September 24, 2007, that has left her significantly cognitively and physically handicapped. She has been in several hospitals since then. We will happily be bringing her home in July.

Who is Casey Marsh, and why is a 5K Road Race being held in her honor, and to raise funds on her behalf? The answer to the first part of the question is that Casey is our middle daughter of three girls. "Our" is Bob and Betty Marsh. Casey has an older sister, Meredith, and a younger sister, Blair. Casey was a 2004 Graduate of Norwood High School. At NHS she was active in activities and sports, and was President of the Art Honor Society in her Senior Year. She attended Merrimack College for

a year, then transferred to Framingham State where she was going to major in Visual Communications. At the time of her accident, she was employed by Cavanaugh Insurance Agency as a secretary, planning to return to Framingham State to finish her degree.


The answer to the second part of the question "...why is a 5K Road Race being held in her honor, and to raise funds on her behalf" is this: as mentioned above, thanks to the generous and kind-hearted spirit of the Norwood Community, friends, family members, neighbors, and often strangers, choose to bring good out of sorrow by reaching out of themselves to help others. Casey is incredibly blessed to be the recipient of such good-hearted and generous folks. Kevin and Brenda Sweeney, Jim Henry, and many others, have taken it upon themselves to organize this road race, calling it "Casey's 5K", in an effort to bring joy out of our family's sorrow, and to assist Casey with whatever needs she may have to help accommodate her disabilities.

On the morning of September 24, 2007, Casey suffered a serious seizure, which caused her to fall and hit her head on a hard surface. It was not immediately known upon arrival at Caritas Norwood Hospital that she had suffered a blood clot to the brain from the fall, and it was not until she experienced a second seizure that a CT Scan revealed a massive blood clot. Doctors at Caritas Norwood Hospital operated immediately upon discovering the blood clot ("epidural hematoma"), and Casey was subsequently med-flighted to Brigham & Women's Hospital ICU, where she remained for one month. She was transferred to

Braintree Rehab Hospital for six and a half months, and she is now at a facility in Middleboro. The Middleboro facility is one of only two in the State of Massachusetts that accepts brain injured patients. The average age of the patients there ranges from 16 to 45.

Casey had begun having seizures in August of 2007. She had one in August, and then a couple in September prior to Sept. 24. It is unclear what the cause of her seizures were, and why she had only begun to experience them in early adulthood. Apparently, seizures, epilepsy, and other neurological disorders often do not appear until late adolescence or early adulthood. In Casey's case, the cause of her seizures could have been a result of a serious childhood illness, a couple of hard knocks to the head as a child while playing with others, or a combination of alcohol and prescription anti-depressants. We will never know for sure. What we do know for certain, however, is that God spared Casey's life and returned her to us. And for that, we will be eternally grateful.

Casey is not in a coma, nor has she ever been. The blood clot to her brain caused her to suffer significant and irreversible damage to her brain stem and other parts of the brain, leaving her, for the time being at least, physically handicapped and not yet fully cognizant. She breathes on her own, smiles,

frowns, cries, groans, is aware of her surroundings and changes to them, and freely expresses pleasure or displeasure. She is quite attentive to familiar faces and voices (especially her Dad's). More and more, she responds to commands asked of her, and it is apparent how hard she works to accomplish these tasks. Casey's soul and determined spirit are still very much alive and well. She has endured six surgeries since September, and fought hard to persevere during each recovery. We tell her every day that she is a "super duper trooper". And she is.

Casey may or may not make a full recovery. Only God

knows that. However, when it became apparent to me back in the Fall after Casey's accident that she was not going to die, I couldn't help but think that she had perhaps been given a choice by God to either die, or to remain here and assist Him in His work.

The thought crossed my mind that maybe, just maybe, she had been asked by God to redeem Terry Schiavo's life and dignity, and tragic death. You will recall that Terry Schiavo's life was taken from her by a Florida judge and ex-husband

# Town Common needs protecting

Back in the early 1990s, right around the time we started publishing in Norwood, a group of volunteers, both town employees and Norwood residents took up the cause of designing and building the Town Gazebo. Local businesses stepped up to the plate with necessary funds for materials and men and women worked side by side to build what was, and is, one of Norwood's most useful and treasured centerpieces. Dedicated to the late Selectman, Walter Dempsey, it is enjoyed by virtually everyone who has ever attended a concert or parade or just taken a walk through the Common with an ice cream cone.

Now, after 16 years, the Gazebo needed work and again residents and officials and businesses stepped up to the plate. Thanks to The Norwood Bank, Norwood Elks and others, volunteers had the materials they needed to make the improvements, many of the repairs necessitated due to congregating teenagers.


It is inevitable that when teens gather, damage happens. It was true when we were kids and will be true when our teens have kids. Given the accessibility of the Gazebo over the years since it was built, damage and vandalism was inevitable.

Though not easily quantifiable, many would argue that today's teens have less respect for authority and other peoples' belongings than in the past, though I have little doubt that any Gazebo, during any era, in any town would have suffered the same fate given the free access to it Norwood has always allowed, and this is where the change should occur.

First, public property should not always mean public access. Yes, one granola munching, ACLU inspired, bleeding heart liberal parent of one of these teens may complain if a simple, small chain with a sign stating "No Admittance" or something to that effect is tastefully hung across each of the Gazebo entrances, but that is as far as it would go. The sign would make it clear to our future leaders wanting to hang there that their rights to a Free Assembly are not being violated, they just can't do it on one of Norwood's treasures. And it would certainly make it clear that skateboarding off of the steps and down the railings will not be tolerated.

It would also not be too Big Brother should electronic monitoring of the Town Common be considered. Equipment nowadays is cheap and by utilizing the Internet would be real-time and in living color. And should a patrolling officer be called away for another reason, the area could still be under electronic surveillance to monitor all the goings on, both day and night.

Chains? Electronic surveillance? Isn't this just a tad Draconian? Maybe. But, few would argue that problems occur in the Center of Town. Maybe a little corporal law isn't such a bad thing.

allowed to collect revenues from as far back as 2003.

"We're willing to do our fair share to generate state and local tax revenues," Santoro said. "In fact, our industry already generates nearly half a billion dollars a year in state and local taxes in Massachusetts alone."

The 2008 commercial tax rate was \$16.12 per thousand, and will likely rise in FY09.

John Robertson of the Massachusetts Municipal Association said he calculated Norwood's revenue from wire

and utility pole taxes in FY08 at approximately \$312,000. If the town were able to collect back taxes, there is a potential gain of about \$1.5 million.

Robertson said the Massachusetts Municipal Authority was attempting to pass legislation that would allow cities and towns to use the money in FY09 instead of funneling it all into overlay accounts.

Town Manager John Carroll said that while the tax rate has not been set yet he estimated the additional taxable revenue

could be in the millions.

"But this could be in court for ten years," he said. "It's a lot of money, and they aren't going to give it up easily."

"We're not against a rational discussion about taxation of our industry," Santoro said, "but it's all got to be on the table."

who determined that she had no "quality of life" because she was, allegedly, terminally physically and cognitively handicapped.

Hopefully, you will also recall how Terry's parents, family and friends fought hard for her life, maintaining all along that Terry was fully aware of their presence in her life, and that she responded to them in many ways, even though she was unable to fully communicate.

Casey is essentially in the same position as Terry Schiavo presently. She responds, is aware of the presence of others, and it is a loving and joyful pleasure to be with her. Yet, if we removed her feeding tube, which she still has since she is currently unable to be fed by mouth, she would likely be dead

within two weeks, just as Terry tragically was upon the removal of her feeding tube. The quality of one's life is not measured by how much someone can or cannot do. It is measured by love; the love of life, the will to live, the love of family and friends, and the lessons that can be taught to others. Although Casey is cognitively and physically disabled, she is very much loved by her family, and so many others, and her courageous spirit inspires us on a daily basis.

Fortunately for Casey, and for us, we had each of our daughters sign a Health Care Proxy a couple of years ago appointing us as Agent in the event that they were unable to make their own health care decisions. If Terry's parents had had one for Terry, she would likely still be alive today.

We are presently undergoing

renovations to our home in order to bring Casey home. The renovations are moving along quite nicely, thanks to the great work of Don A. Baker Construction (Foxboro), and his terrific team. A portion of the proceeds from Casey's 5K will be donated to assist other brain injured persons, and the remainder will be put towards the purchase of a vehicle to transport Casey.

We would like to thank not only Kevin, Brenda, Jim, family, friends, and neighbors, but the multitude of others who have offered Casey and our family so much support and so many prayers over these last nine months. May God bless each of you and your loved ones!

# Morse, Pleasant St. intersection improvements planned

## Mass Highway steps in to assist Norwood solve safety issues

After years of endless accidents and failed attempts at improvements, the intersection of Morse St. and Pleasant St. may finally be in line for a major upgrade.

The Massachusetts Highway Department has heard Norwood's cry for help with the dangerous intersection, and has devised a plan that could drastically reduce traffic hazards.

Norwood Town Engineer Mark Ryan said the proposed project was part of the state-wide Transportation Improvement Plan.

"This is a very important project, and we've been working on finding some solution to this problem for years," he said.

According to Ryan, the town has tried to implement a four way stop at the crowded intersection, a plan he said "failed miserably."

Representatives from Mass. Highway held a public hearing last week to offer residents a forum to voice any concerns or ideas they had about their proposed plan.

While the meeting was sparsely attended, representatives from Mass Highway did lay out a detailed plan to alleviate the congestion and confusion at the intersection.

Traffic Director Donald

Cooke said that safety was the prime objective of the plan, which will call for installation of timed traffic signals and creation of exclusive right turn lanes. "This location warrants signalization," Cooke said. "There is a high traffic volume, and the crash rating of 1.23 is double the state average."

Cooke also added that there would be an exclusive pedestrian stop to accommodate foot traffic to and from Rte.1.

"There are no pedestrian amenities out there," Ryan added. "At peak hours it's absolute chaos out there." Cooke said there would also be construction to reduce the width of the corners, which he said would help reduce speeding.

"The corners are really wide at that intersection, which tends to encourage turns at high rates of speed. We'll be pulling in the corner radii and taking out the center island to tighten up the intersection," he said.

Bob Wheeler of Mass Highway said the project, which they estimate at a total cost of \$600,000, would be 80 percent federally funded, with Mass Highway contributing the remaining 20 percent.

Norwood, however, will be responsible for costs associated with obtaining rights of way and temporary easement permits.

He added that six temporary

construction units would be necessary, and that construction could not begin until all rights of way were acquired.

Ryan said the town had already spent a significant amount of money to try and fix the intersection, and were still willing to do what it will take to get it done.

"The Selectmen are totally in support of this, and the town is committed," he said. Mass Highway's proposal projects

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Each artist can display up to five pieces of their work. The NAA encourages all members, whether they are just starting out or seasoned art veterans, to share their work.

"It's not only for professional artists," NAA member Fran Palmieri said. "We invite new artists."

Palmieri will be displaying some watercolor paintings at the festival, including paintings of a barn, flowers and a sailboat.

Artists have the option to sell their work. Last year, about \$2,500 worth of art was sold, Reardon said. However, the event isn't just about the sale of artwork. It exposes local artists to the public, letting them show off their works.

"In the last few years, we have gained a wonderful following," Reardon said. "It's a cultural asset to the town. It brings people out to see what local artists are doing, and we have very talented artists here."

The art on display will be judged and eligible for awards in numerous categories, including acrylics, oils, pastels, watercolors, mixed media, drawing and photography. There are also awards for best in show and a popular prize voted on by members of the public. The judge will be Diane Hampey of Walpole.

One artist at the festival will be recent Norwood High School graduate Amanda Hrabowski. Hrabowski won the NAA's \$500 scholarship, which is awarded to a student who plans on majoring in art in college. This marks Hrabowski's first year participating in Art in the Park.

"I'm a little nervous, but kind of proud," she said.

While she hasn't decided what pictures she will be displaying, she plans on showing four or five charcoal drawings at the festival.

One artist who has participated in Art in the Park before is Bernice Winer. Winer has been a member of the NAA for about ten years, and is currently the group's secretary. In the past, she has held the positions of president, vice president, and secretary.

"It's a really lovely chance for people to hang their paintings, have them judged, share them with others, and possibly sell them," Winer said.

Winer works with watercolor paints, oils, and acrylics and will be displaying five pieces at the event.

"It's a fun thing to go to, and I hope that everyone will come there, stroll around, and look at the paintings," she said.

Art in the Park, which runs from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on June 28, is free and open to the public. In the event of inclement weather, the rain date is June 29.

that work will not commence until 2012, but Ryan urged them to put the project on the fast track.

"2012 wont cut it," he said. "We need to find a way to get this started as soon as we can, and we're willing to do what we can to make it happen."

Project Manager Victoria Sheehan said the purpose of the public hearing was to gather information to bring back to

Mass Highway so the project could enter the next phase and could be submitted to the state for review, which could take a substantial amount of time. "It's a very lengthy and involved process," Ryan agreed, "but we intend to pursue every avenue to get this done."

vice," he said. "They approached us because they admire our high level of service."

Capasso also worried that certain phrases in the contract would allow NSTAR to walk away from their obligations if there were to suddenly declare bankruptcy or choose not to subsidize Norwood's contract.

"There's the possibility that if Westwood Station is moving slowly, NSTAR can form a subsidy and we can't do anything about it," he said, and requested that Town Meeting members consider amending the contract to include language that would ensure NSTAR would meet their debt obligations to the town.

After clarifying that the NSTAR arrangement is not contingent on the development of Westwood Station, Selectman Chairman Mike Lyons turned the discussion over to Town Counsel Mike Lehane, who said that amending the contract could be a total deal breaker for the town.

"Town meeting is at liberty to support or not support this, but to amend the contract is tantamount to disapproval of the entire transaction," he said.

Capasso's motion to amend the contract was defeated, and Town Meeting members voted to approve the contract as-is and authorized the board to borrow the required funds to get the project off the ground by a margin of 117 to 14.

"This sort of revenue is the envy of other towns," said Selectman Jerry Kelleher, who

has been the town's liaison with NSTAR since the deal was in its infancy. "This is the opportunity of a lifetime. We feel strongly that this is a great deal for Norwood. This is a very important moment for us."

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
## Diamond Club Scholarships

If you ask Athletics' head coach Steve Cline, Chamberlain's clutch two-run double that put the A's up for good against the Rockies in Saturday's battle of playoff undefeateds was just another day at the office for the right fielder.

Nevertheless, Chamberlain's opposite field hit with the bases loaded was worth more than just water cooler chat, after the second-place A's rallied from a three-run deficit with seven runs in the sixth inning to defeat the top dog Rockies, 11-7, in the Norwood Babe Ruth League Division 2 double elimination tourney at Balch Field.

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
