

Asphalt applicants to appeal

At last week's meeting of the Zoning Board of Appeals, Jim Lorusso's request to reopen the Norfolk Asphalt Plant was denied. The board declared the plant discontinued, citing the fact that asphalt hasn't been produced there since 1987, and unanimously voted to deny both of Lorusso's requests.

According to Tim Higgins of Norfolk Asphalt Plant, they will be appealing the board's decision.

"We're very disappointed with the Board's decision," Higgins said. "We felt that the board didn't act solely on the facts we presented."

The board was provided with numerous documents and studies. These include analysis showing the impact the plant would have on air quality, noise, and traffic in the area. These studies showed that the plant would meet or exceed all health and safety requirements. They also filed with the Massachusetts Environmental Policy Act office, which is not required.

"I feel we will have more luck with an appeal," Higgins said. Higgins acknowledged that the proposal to reopen the Norfolk Asphalt Plant caused a great emotional response, but he believes the board should look at all the factual information provided by them.

While Higgins and others at the Norfolk Asphalt Plant are disappointed with the board's decision, some are quite pleased.

"It was terrific," said Town Meeting and Stop Norfolk Asphalt Plant (SNAP) member Lou Santoro. "We applaud their decision."

SNAP expected the Norfolk Asphalt Plant to appeal the decision.

Carroll, Plasko take Personnel Board to task

The Personnel Board had a pair of public hearings at their August 20 meeting, and both met with disagreement from Board of Selectmen member Bill Plasko and Town Manager John Carroll.

One public hearing dealt with the update to the town's hiring policy.

The current hiring policy was

adopted on March 17, 2004 and updated on July 16, 2008. The first area of disagreement came in section 4.3 of the document, which states, "It is the policy of the town to post and/or advertise all vacant positions."

This policy has been in place since 2004, though it caused some controversy at the meeting.

"I emphatically disagree with that," Carroll said.

Carroll said that while he would

post 99 percent of all job openings, it should not be mandatory. If there is someone in the office with the experience necessary for an open job, he feels he should be able to hire that person on the spot.

"I'm not going to play an artificial game if I'm positive a person deserves a job," he said.

Plasko agreed with Carroll, calling such a posting a "waste of time and money."

Michelle Pizzi, the town's Human Resources Director, agreed that internal promotions could be an exception to the policy, but that posting an advertisement was vital because it shows the town is offering equal opportunity to all those interested in the job.

Board Vice Chairman Anne Haley went one step further, saying, "If you

Selectmen endorse high school site

Donohue lone dissenter on designating existing location for new school

The Norwood Board of Selectmen voted 4-1 to designate the current site of Norwood High School as the site for the new high school, with Helen Donohue voting against it.

The Board of Selectmen is just the latest to approve the current high school site as the location. The School Facilities Task Force and High School Working Group approved the site at a joint meeting held last week, as did the Committee of 21. Town Manager John Carroll also recommended the site, saying that there was "no other appropriate site in Town."

Donohue disagreed with this assessment and suggested a different site for the new high school.

"Another idea is to use the Willett School," Donohue said.

The Willett School is on a 22-acre lot, much like the current high school. There would be enough room for a six-acre building and nine acres of ball fields and parking, Donohue said. If built on the Willett site, which the Town already owns and is set for school use, the current high school building would not have to be demolished.

However, the other members of the Board took Carroll's recommendation and voted to endorse the existing site as the best location for a new school.

"This has been voted and voted and voted," Selectman Tom McQuaid said. "Let's designate the site and get going."

Chairman Michael Lyons also spoke in favor of placing the new high school on the current site.

"All major boards voted for the new high school option, as did Town Meeting," Lyons said, adding that the Town's voting to approve the override affirmed this decision.

"To ignore that is an insult to the voters of Norwood," Lyons said.

Even though she was opposed to naming the current site an appropriate place for a new

high school, Donohue spoke out in favor of the model school program.

"If renovation is not feasible, I think this concept of a model school is an excellent plan," Donohue said. She described the Whitman-Hanson Regional High School as beautiful and as a building that could potentially work for Norwood.

Later in the meeting, Donohue asked about the legality of placing a question on the ballot in November regarding the demolition of the high school, and Lyons responded that she would need a petition, and even this would be non-binding.

Board sets plan in place for Norwood Day

Norwood Day, which will be held on Sept. 13, was a major topic of discussion by the Board of Selectmen at their Tuesday, Aug. 26 meeting.

Recreation Department Superintendent Gerald Miller spoke before the Board, and one of his focuses was on the annual event. In order to help promote the event, Miller requested that the Board allow him to place a banner above Washington Street, which the Board unanimously approved.

The other approval made by the Board regarding Norwood Day involved the third annual Shayne M. Cabino Motorcycle Run. The board voted 4-1, with Selectman Tom McQuaid against, for the race to be held on Norwood Day. The run is a fundraiser for a scholarship named after Shayne M. Cabino of Franklin, MA, who was killed in action in Iraq on October 6, 2005.

The Board expressed some concern of safety issues posed by the run, which will run from Neponset St. to Nahatan St. to Rte. 109 in Westwood.

"We will fight as hard for that as we did initially," Santoro said. "We had assumed they would appeal the case."

This is one of the longest running zoning board cases in town history. There have been four hearings over the past six months, and this appeal will likely make the whole affair last even longer.

If the appeal succeeds and Lorusso is allowed to reopen the Norfolk Asphalt Plant, Santoro said that SNAP would have the town appeal that decision.

"We will rebut any other hearing as strongly as we did this one," Santoro said.

Editorial

A little of this, a little of that

Apparently, Mr. Lorusso and company will give area residents surrounding his Pleasant Street asphalt site little time to celebrate as his company has already made it clear they will be appealing the decision by the ZBA to deny their application. This one is going to get ugly and costly...

Regarding Town Manager John Carroll's and Selectman Bill Plasko's feelings to the contrary, and at risk of sounding self-serving, their position against needing to advertise all town employment positions prior to hiring someone is off base. This newspaper has reported recently of employee/manager clashes that have ended up in the courts. The Town of Norwood is a business, a large business based on revenues and number of employees, and as a large business it should adopt and adhere to sound business practices. There is little doubt John Carroll would hire anyone other than the most qualified, and needing to advertise open positions could in many instances amount to a waste of time and money (can't believe I just wrote that). However, employees need to feel they always have a chance at upward mobility based solely on performance and not necessarily who they know or are related to, as some may interpret when a position is filled without properly putting said position out in the public for review and response. That being written, they are absolutely correct when they state that the Personnel Board should not have final decision-making when it comes to new hires above the Step 3 grade. They are not qualified to make such determinations...

The bean counters owning the *Norwood Bulletin* have decided that now is a good time to raise the price of the newspaper to a buck. The newspaper business in general is in shambles, their own corporation is in the process of being de-listed on the stock market, new competition from the free *Norwood Record* and poor news reporting and editorial decision making on their own part has reduced their circulation numbers to all-time lows, and now they figure is a good time to raise the price? A buck doesn't buy much nowadays, but it should certainly buy more than what those guys spit out every week...

The Common Sense Committee is still against construction of a new high school and is hoping that the vote in April of next year by Town Meeting will put the kibosh on the project. Admittedly, there are still major questions regarding how the new model school program will work, how it will sit on the existing site of the high school and what the total costs will ultimately be to the taxpayers of Norwood. However, what the CSC needs to understand is that unless they come up with a viable alternative to new construction with facts and figures at least as tangible as what Town Meeting currently has to work with based on the Committee of 21 and state findings, TM will not be changing their vote. Few in town want to start from ground zero in 2009 when 2+ years of work and deliberation have them on the verge of actually breaking ground. If you are going to tell the kids of Norwood they will have to wait another 6-10 years before they are likely to have a competitive school building, you damn well better bring more to the discussion in April than the rehashing of the same old arguments. They are just not going to fly.

It appears the Little Red Schoolhouse may avoid the wrecking ball after all. According to the latest reports, the Historical Commission is making headway with Selectmen to at least consider moving it to the Morse House site in South Norwood. Kudos to the commission for fighting the fight, though one has to wonder if all the time, effort and money is worth it...

Pooley video extols recycling

A 28-minute long video called "Reduce, Reuse, Recycle" is currently airing on NPA TV.

The video was created by John Pooley III, the 12-year-old son of Joan and John Pooley Jr., as part of his Eagle Scout Leadership Service Project and started airing on Aug. 15.

Pooley produced and directed the video, which is being presented by the Norwood Recycling Committee. He has worked on the video since May 3, 2008, and spent 193 hours planning and preparing the film, which includes interviews with town officials on the upcoming changes to the recycling program, footage of the changes, and instructions on how to recycle. The film also includes a short music video, which Pooley describes as "just for fun."

The idea for the video came during a meeting of the Board

of Selectmen in January. Pooley attended the meeting while working on one of his meriting badges.

"Doris Burtman, the town's Recycling Coordinator, was speaking about ways to educate the town on recycling, and I thought I can do that!" Pooley said.

He has since worked with numerous town officials, including Burtman and Assistant General Manager Bernie Cooper, creating a video to help educate the public about the upcoming changes to the program.

The video is part of Pooley's Eagle Scout Leadership Service Project. Pooley, who is currently a Life Scout, first joined in first grade as a Tiger Cub. In order to advance to the rank of Eagle Scout, one needs to work on a project to benefit a non-profit organization or local community, have a leadership role in his troop, and earn 21 merit badges. Of these 21 merit badges, 12 are required, nine are up to the

individual's choosing.

Pooley received help on his project from other scouts in Troop 42, his friends, family members and town officials.

Brian P. Palmateer, who has mentored Pooley on his journey to become an Eagle Scout, had many positive things to say about the video. He describes it as an "entertaining and informative public service video" that will help people "be informed about what is happening in Norwood."

Pooley invites anyone who wants to learn more about the upcoming changes to the Town's recycling program to watch the movie.

"Reduce, Reuse, Recycle" will air on the NPA Town Channel on Friday, Aug. 29 at 3:30 and 9:30 pm, on Saturday, Aug. 30 at 7:30 pm, and on Sunday, Aug. 31 at 4:30 pm.

The video is also available on DVD at the Morrill Memorial Library and the Senior Center.

IT'S NOT OVER YET

To the Editor:

The saga of Norwood High continues.

In May the MSBA recommended that Norwood go forward with design plans for a brand new high school with an estimated price tag of \$80 million.

A month later, after learning that the cost of a new high school might be closer to \$100 million, MSBA told the town to select a stock plan based on several high schools recently designed and built in Massachusetts. They believed that a prototype-built high school facility —like the Whitman-Hanson High School —would save millions on architectural plans, and cost less than \$75 million. (Unfortunately, the towns of Whitman and Hanson had to cut 82 school staff to fund their \$9 million share of that project). But Norwood officials and many residents at

the two neighborhood meetings in June want a bigger gym, bigger auditorium, more space and room for NPA Cable TV — all at a bigger price tag.

All these modifications will cost more money. And now the MSBA is having funding troubles because sales tax receipts are down and is demanding that communities scale back similar new school projects.

Remember, there are other possible options. The fact remains that the debate is far from over yet — and it won't be over until next April 2009 when voters in town express their own personal preference on a ballot question. Until then, it is too soon to ask all residents to come together and support a final solution — whatever that unknown solution and price tag will be.

Flight Level Aviation snookered

Flight Level Aviation reported \$80,000 worth of fraud, allegedly by Best Electronics, a business in Curitiba, Parana, Brazil.

According to a police report, Best Electronics allegedly purchased 107 GPS units worth over \$80,000 with stolen credit cards.

The sale was made through Shell Aviation. Eight transactions were made between April 8 and June 2, 2008, and each transaction used a different credit card. All of these credit cards were authorized by Banco ITAU in Brazil. The total cost for the eight transactions was

\$116,702.40.

On Aug. 5, George Towne of Flight Level Aviation learned that the units were purchased with stolen credit cards. He reported it to the police the next day.

"I want to report these to other agencies so there is a record of it being stolen, but I had to do a police report first," Towne said.

The sales went through the proper processes, said Towne. Since then, two of these have been charge backed, while two others are in the process of being charge backed. A charge back is a reversal of a credit-card transaction.

"We got authorization from the bank, so we don't understand why this is happening," Towne said.

In addition to authorization from the bank, Towne has the necessary paperwork for the transaction, including the request for the products from the Brazilian company, a faxed copy of the credit cards, and a faxed copy of the cardholder's information.

According to a police report by Kevin Grasso, Flight Level Aviation has tried to contact both the purchasing parties and Visa, but have been unsuccessful. They have spoken with the Banco ITAU that authorized the cards, but the bank has failed to cooperate.

All of the 107 GPS units purchased were made by Garmin. Grasso's report indicates that Garmin may be able to discontinue service to the units.

According to Town Manager John Carroll, the run should be completed before large crowds appear in Norwood Center for Norwood Day.

The installation of a sewer line that would extend to 390 Lenox Street caused some controversy at the meeting.

A shallow sewer line will cost \$7,500 installed, which will allow the business there to connect to the sewer line. Businesses located at the building have received a water and sewer bill since 1980, but the building is not actually connected to the sewer.

The current business has been charged \$1,200 since January 2007 for the use of a sewer which it has not had access to.

Town Manager John Carroll recommended the Board approve the building of the sewer line and abating all previous sewer charges. Selectman Jerry Kelleher agreed, stating that the town has been billing tenants of the building for a service that was not provided.

However, the Board voted 3-2 to install the sewer line but

use the previously received payments as a contribution to help pay for the \$7,500 installation. Kelleher and Chairman Michael Lyons voted against this, which was proposed by Tom McQuaid.

The fate of the little red schoolhouse was further discussed.

"We did find a location for that at the Morse House site," Carroll said.

"It seems as though the Morse site is an acceptable site," Kelleher added.

However, moving the little red schoolhouse there would require the approval of the Board of Appeals. Also, the current mover would be unable to move the schoolhouse there until the middle of October.

The Board unanimously approved a request for a Veteran's Memorial Plaque in honor of Staff Sergeant John R. Kilkus, who died on October 8, 1990 during Operation Desert Shield. He was one of eight marines killed when two helicopters collided during practice maneuvers.

The Board also voted for a plaque in honor of Senior Firefighter Kevin Welch, who retired after over 29 years of service on August 11. The Board felt it appropriate to thank Welch for his years of

service to the Town. They also voted to allow Fire Chief Michael J. Howard to hire a new firefighter to fill the vacancy left after Welch's retirement.

The Board approved a one-day AAB (All Alcohol and Beer) licenses and dance permits for the Norwood Knights of Columbus for events being held on September 5, 6, and 27. They also granted Diane Carroll's request for a block party on September 20, which will close off Adams Street from Grant to Garfield Avenue.

A copy of the suit Armour vs. the Light Department and Light Commissioners and Superintendent of the Light Department was accepted for examination and reading by the Board.

The Board once again denied Hoa Tran's request for one additional taxi to run in Norwood. Tran is the owner of Family Taxi. His request was previously denied at the July 15 meeting by the Board. Tran had been asked to provide a record of his calls and fares for the past 90 days to the hearing, but he failed to do so, only bringing a record for the previous ten days.

Until he can provide these logs to show how often Family Taxi runs in Norwood, the Board will not approve the request.

The goal is more goals

The Norwood field hockey team has high hopes of getting back into state tourney play after just missing last season with a 7-9-2 ledger.

The Mustangs appear to have more strength this fall in the offensive zone, which is a good thing considering goals were hard to come by last year.

"I want our team to be both fundamentally sound in both the offensive and defensive ends, but with most of the experience coming on offense, I am looking for our team to score more goals this year," said head coach Allison Parks. "Scoring is an area we need to improve from last year. We often had many opportunities, but were unable to capitalize."

First, the Mustangs hope to offset the loss of graduating senior captain Christine McKay, who led the team in points last year with five goals

Greeley, a midfielder, was also a BSC Second Team All-Star. Said Parks, "(She's) one of the most skilled and hardworking players on the team, a great overall athlete."

Clougher returns as one of only two of the team's four-year varsity players. The forward contributed four goals and two helpers last year. The coach praised her as "one of the most experienced players on the team. (She) has a great sense of the game, and is one of the most consistent players on the team," said the head mentor.

Norwood is fortunate it can add to its offensive arsenal with the crafty maneuvering of senior forward Kristen Walsh and the tenacity of her fellow forward sister Jillian, a junior, who

also plays midfield.

Kristen, who tied for the team lead with six goals last season, is the other returning fourth year member.

"She has strong stick skills, and is one of the players we will be looking to, to contribute offensively," said Parks.

Jillian, meanwhile, is one of the more aggressive players on the field. She was brought up from junior varsity for the last few games last season.

"She goes after every ball and she creates many scoring opportunities," the coach said.

Senior forward Michelle Nolan is also a big part of the mix. She tied Walsh with six strikes last fall.

"I am hoping that Michelle plays a big part in our offensive production this year," said Parks. "She seemed to score in spurts last year. I am hoping that this year her scoring is more

Girls' soccer squad thinks big

After last year's smashing success, there's plenty to look forward to for the Norwood girls' soccer team this fall. The Mustangs won their first ever tourney game amid their best campaign in program history last year. Finishing 13-4-3, including 9-4-2 in the Bay State Conference, Norwood made a complete turnaround in just one season. In 2006, Jay Dupuis' first round as head coach, the Mustangs closed at 4-13-3.

"Big turnaround!" exclaimed Dupuis, who is eyeing even bigger things this season. "(Now) our first goal is to win our first ever Herget (Division) championship."

But that's certainly not where expectations end for the

2008 Mustangs, whose previous highest win total was six.

"I've set a goal of winning the [Division 1] South section," said Dupuis. "We tied last year's winner, Weymouth, 1-1."

Hopes are high, but with a veteran squad that includes eight returning starters and a few strong newcomers, the Mustangs are ready to take the wheel.

Norwood's defense allowed only one goal a game last year, and its offense proved to be highly explosive.

"We have a couple of leading scorers in the [conference] returning," said Dupuis of Herget Division MVP Sam Vilaboa and fellow BSC First Team All-Star Cory Ryan.

Girls' swim team is in rebuilding mode

Put all the adversity aside. Norwood first-year swimming coach Kim Goodwin says, "We will be ready to take on rival Dedham on Sept. 9."

But with nine seniors, including two Bay State Conference All-Stars, gone to graduation, Goodwin isn't expecting miracles from her troops this fall.

"I guess this is what will be called a rebuilding and restructuring year," the coach said. "We only have three freshmen coming up for a total of about 25 swimmers. We are working toward building a strong connection with the younger swim programs so numbers will be going up, we hope."

The Mustangs have also recently found out that their indoor practice facility, the Blue Hills Pool in Canton, will be closed for several weeks, "so we are scrambling to find pool time at Westwood or Dedham at least until mid-September," Goodwin said.

For now, the team will be practicing at the outdoor Hawes Pool in Norwood, "until we hopefully move indoors on

Sept. 2," the coach added.

The one thing the Mustangs have going for them is that their head mentor is quite familiar with the squad. Goodwin has helped lead in Norwood's youth swim program with the Stingrays.

"Yes, I am a first-year Norwood High School coach, but I have coached most of these girls since they were seven or eight years old, so I do know them very well and am looking forward to coaching them at the high school level," said Goodwin. "Both my assistant, Colleen Foley, and I have strong swimming backgrounds ourselves."

Last year, the Mustangs won only three dual meets, but they placed highest out of all BSC teams at the sectional and state meets, finishing sixth and seventh respectively, out of some 20 teams. Graduates, Captain Olivia Metta and Kara Loo, and junior Emily Metta led the way in scoring during those postseason events. This fall, the Mustangs will look to Emily Metta to continue her strong performances in the 100 breaststroke and 200 individual

Returning as a senior forward and tri-captain, Vilaboa, struck for 20 goals and seven assists last fall.

"She is a threat to score from anywhere on the field," lauded Dupuis.

Vilaboa will be supported by Ryan, a sophomore sensation who plays center midfield. As a freshman, Ryan earned First Team BSC All-Star honors, after garnering 14 goals and 10 assists.

"I believe Cory will be one of the best players in the state this year," the coach said.

Defensively, Norwood senior tri-captain Jenn Canniff returns as a BSC Second Team All-Star.

"Jenn is one of our field leaders," praised Dupuis. "She really understands how to play the game."

So does junior defender Susan Orlando, who, along with Canniff helps "make our defense one of the best in the (conference)," said the head mentor.

Norwood's third leader, Kelsey Roberson played outside midfield last year. Touted as a workhorse, "she plays hard day in and day out," Dupuis said.

The Mustangs are also banking on a couple of freshmen impact players, Nicole Quintiliani and Danielle Ringler.

"I expect (both) to make our team and play big minutes," said the coach. "Both Nicole and Danielle will play midfield and forward for us this year."

Norwood defeated North Attleboro in the first round of tourney play last season, before falling to Bishop Feehan in the second round.

As for the in-house competition, Dupuis is expecting the BSC to be as tough as usual.

"We don't have any pushovers in our (conference)," he said. "On the Herget side, the strongest competition will come from Dedham. (From) the Carey (division), Weymouth, which lost in the state championship game in overtime, Framingham and Needham will be three of the stronger teams. All four of these teams made the tourney last year...We play in the most competitive (conference) in the state."

consistent over the entire season.”

Defensively, Pam Devaney is one of two returning starters. Parks lauded Devaney as a “smart player who comes to play every day.”

The other returning starter on defense is sweeper Katie Lang, who split time last season with a non-returning player. Expected to play more minutes this season, Lang will be looked upon more in her defensive role.

“We look for her to step up in the defensive role and be even more of a leader in her defensive play,” said Parks.

Perhaps the most intriguing situation for the Mustangs is their goaltending. Junior Emily Whitney will be competing for the starting position with Heather Flaherty. The duo split time on junior varsity last season, while graduating senior Liz Millen held the fort on the higher squad.

Whitney brings an aggressive style around the Mustang goal.

“She is extremely aggressive and is a leader in the de-

fensive circle,” said Parks.

The coach said Flaherty brings strength in clearing the ball out of the defensive zone, and is “starting to become more vocal...”

While the competition is expected to be fierce as usual in the Bay State Conference, Norwood is looking to make its mark in a big way.

“We’re hoping to finish in the top three of the [BSC] Herget Division,” said Parks.

“Last year we had a few early-season [losses or ties] that were deflating,” she added, referring to a 3-2 loss to Milton and 1-1 ties to Brookline and Natick, teams that the Mustangs usually fare well against.

Defending Herget Division champion Walpole claimed South Sectional and Eastern Mass. titles before bowing to Action Boxborough in the Division 1 state final last year.

“Walpole will probably be our toughest competition followed by Dedham and Wellesley,” said Parks. “[But] with our core kids coming back and some of the younger kids, we should be strong.”

The Mustangs begin and end the regular season with meets against their biggest rivals — Dedham in the opener and Walpole on Oct. 28.


But Norwood also has an eye on Natick, another Herget Division foe.

PBCC reviews projects

The continuing work on the Norwood Senior Center was a main topic of discussion for the Permanent Building Construction Committee at their August 21 meeting.

"A lot of work has been done at the Senior Center," said committee chairman Ted Callahan.

The gas solenoid valve and Vulcan 301-m carbon dioxide sensor have been installed and approved by town Building Inspector Mark Chubet. Paving for the parking and sidewalk areas outside of the center has been completed. In addition, the concrete wheel bumpers in the parking lot have been installed. Even so, a few issues need to be addressed. One of these involves the sinks in building.

The Health Department has several requirements for sink use, and one of these is the posting of signs reminding people to wash their hands. Such signs, which are required by law, aren't currently posted in the Senior Center, though they are on their way.

The issue with the doors at

the Senior Center is being fixed. Several of the doors do not comply with specification, as they feature incompatible graining configurations. Six new doors were delivered to the site and a seventh is being relocated from the storage building's storage room, and are being installed.

The high school continues to be a topic of discussion for the Permanent Building Construction Committee. The Massachusetts School Building Authority recently approved Norwood's participation in their model school program. The Committee of 21 decided that the 234,000 square foot Whitman Hanson High School was a better choice than the 202,000 square foot Ashland High School. By using a model school program, Norwood will receive five additional points that increase the percentage of reimbursement the town will receive for participating in the program.

The committee had some positive comments about the Whitman/Hanson School. Good elements of the school include a walking track and a large gym, cafeteria, and auditorium. The Whitman/Hanson school cost

\$41.9 million to build, and that included the cost of demolishing the previous building on the site.

"One of the perks of the model school program is that you're getting a really nice facility," Callahan said.

The committee was convinced that the Ashland High School would not work for Norwood.

The Ashland High School has a capacity of 850, while the new Norwood High School will have to house 1,100 students. In addition, the cafeteria is smaller than needed and there are fewer classrooms.

The MSBA is working on a contract that will be reviewed by the PBCC. The committee expects to see the contract within two to three weeks.

The committee also discussed the renovations to Town Hall. The main project is complete, all that remains is the work to design and install window hold open devices. Town Manager John Carroll has given them the go ahead to proceed with this, and Bill Kinsman expects that they will be installed before cold weather sets in.

post it, you might find someone better." Haley also added that someday John Carroll will not be the Town Manager, and the policy is meant to apply to future town managers as well.

The second area of contention involved section 5.5.d, which states, "approval to hire above Step 3 of the classification and compensation plan must be approved by the Personnel Board."

Previously, approval from the Personnel Board was required to hire above step 5. The Town uses a step system to determine an employee's pay rate, the highest step being step eight.

"The purpose of this is to create a fair and level playing field," Chairman David Hajjar said, adding that the board is concerned by a lack of consistency in the pay of new employees hired by various departments.

Plasko strongly disagrees with this policy, saying that the Personnel Board has no authority when it comes to hiring people.

"It is absolutely inappropriate for the Personnel Board to be involved in those decisions," Plasko said.

When Plasko asked the board to name other towns that had a similar policy, the only one that could be named

was Needham. While he agrees that the Human Resource department can be involved with new hires, the final decision should not belong to the Personnel Board. Haley stated that the Board is more than willing to go back and rework the document.

The other public hearing involved the Equal Employment Opportunity Policy. This policy followed the recommendations of the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination (MCAD). It applies to discrimination based on age, criminal record, gender, race, sexual orientation, and religion, among other things.

The concern involved section five of the document, which is entitled Discrimination Investigation. The area of concern reads, "When we have completed our investigation, we will, to the extent appropriate, inform the person filing the complaint and the person who is alleged to have committed the conduct of the results of that investigation. If it is determined that inappropriate conduct has occurred, we will act promptly to eliminate the offending conduct, and where appropriate, we will impose disciplinary action."

Plasko had a problem with the use of the word "we" as it isn't clear who that represents.

"I just think this needs to be a whole lot clearer," Plasko said.

The board agreed with this assessment.

"We" refers to the two investigation officers, Pizzi and Carroll. In future drafts, this will be made clear.

The other area of concern was the phrase "we will impose disciplinary action."

According to Plasko, the investigation officers will not have the authority to discipline, only to make recommendations for discipline. He recommended that the board remove the phrase from the document, as it makes them liable if discipline is not imposed.

According to the Personnel Board, the phrase does not require discipline be taken, it only allows it.

Willard Krasnow suggested that, if removed, the power to discipline employees for violating the policy would not be present.

"The absence of it would speak volumes," Hajjar added.

The Personnel Board hopes that the remaining issues can be resolved.

"We're trying to meet everyone's needs and trying to be fair to everyone," Hajjar said.
