State delegation joins fight to keep towers

State representatives in Washington are joining the fight to keep local air-traffic control towers from being closed under a proposal announced by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) last month in response to the federal budget sequester.

In a letter sent to FAA Administrator Michael Huerta last week, the state's two senators and nine congressmen pleaded with the FAA to reconsider its decision to close six airport towers in the state, including the tower at Norwood Memorial Airport, under a larger plan to close over 100 contract towers nationwide.


The FAA said it is at-

tempting to reduce its expenditures by \$600 million for the remainder of fiscal year 2013 as part of the \$85 million in forced spending cuts contained in the sequester that took effect in March. Airport towers are due to begin closing next month, although it is not without opposition from many different entities.

"These regional airports and their ATC towers are key elements in the national air-transportation system and critical to our national security," said the letter from the Massachusetts delegation. "Closing the towers will jeopardize the safety of the flying public as well as that of residents within a certain proximity to these airports,

Tax override for DPW project? Ballot question would seek \$15.4 M

A debt-exclusion tax override is being discussed as a possible funding source for the Norwood Department of Public Works (DPW) project, however it is still possible town officials will decide to present it as a long-term borrowing plan to the fall Town Meeting.

"There is probably going to need to be an override for this," Tim Bonfatti, president of the firm Compass Project Management that is consulting the town on the project, told the Permanent Building Construction Committee (PBCC) last Thursday night.

However, reached by phone the day after the meeting, DPW Director Mark Ryan was not as certain the project would require an override, saying the town is still considering both options.

"That's one of the possibilities at this point," Ryan said of the override, which would involve putting a ballot question to town voters to raise taxes above Proposition 2 1/2 to serve the project debt. "We're still trying to figure out 'Is there a way to do this with the existing revenues that are available to us by borrowing funds?'"

Part of the issue is whether or not the new DPW storage facility planned for Lenox Street will be part of the project. Working within the proposed \$14 million project

budget, Compass had previously proposed designating the Lenox Street facility as a "bid alternate," where it may or may not be included in the total bid package depending on the final cost estimate.

Compass has been meeting with town officials and members of the PBCC in working group sessions concerning the project, and Bonfatti said the sentiment among town leaders seems to be leaning toward pursuing the entire project as a whole.

"Our position is you've got to go for the whole project. You



Low turnout predicted for Monday's election

It may be a slow election cycle this year, but there will at least be some action in terms of Town

Meeting seats up for grabs and one other contested race on Election Day this Monday.

In the lone town-wide contest, Brian Graziano is mounting a bid

to unseat James Perry from his position as constable, a three-year term.

Like most small towns, politics often drives the electoral turnout, noted Town Clerk Bob Thornton.

He said Norwood voters are quick to turn out for highly contested races and when controversial issues or presidential elections are at stake, but that just isn't the case this year.

"In terms of turnout, it will be a low percentage, just because of the fact that major offices don't have a lot of races. That's usually what draws out a large crowd," said Thornton. "Norwood has a history that people do get involved. We have had upwards of 80 to 90 percent turnout for presidential races. [But] when there's no controversy on the ballot, people don't really come out, although you hope they do."

Joseph Montesano has filed to fill out the remaining two years of Susan McQuaid's term on the School Committee, after McQuaid

announced her resignation due to personal commitments earlier this year. The School Committee is being reduced to a five-member board as a result of Town Meeting's vote back in 2011.

As far as Town Meeting seats, there is a fair amount of competition this year, as incumbents in five of the town's nine voting districts are being challenged, and two candidates are vying for a one-year vacancy in District 2.

There are nine candidates running for eight seats (three years) District 1: Incumbents Bryan E. Burns, Katherine M. Kalliel, Colleen M. Reynolds, Darrin B. Reynolds, Richard M. Shay, and new candidates Christopher M. Campilio, Amy Carr, Michael G. Chrisholm and Christopher Flanagan.

There are two candidates running for one seat (one year) District 2: Gerard P. Canelli, Sr. and J. Rodger Griffin.

There are nine candidates running for eight seats (three years)

District 4: Incumbents Catherine V. Burgess, Charles D. Burgess, Richard J. Erickson, David E. Hajjar, Willard Krasnow, James M. Nolan, Robert A. Silk, Peter R. Strano and new candidate Scott K. St. Cyr.

There are 14 candidates running for 10 seats (three years) District 6: Incumbents Susan A. Davis, John Raymond Hall, Jr., Barbara E. Martin, Sheryl Nikolassy, Anthony D. Petracca, Betty L. Reilly, William E. Reilly, III, Gregory P. Ryan, Karen P. Waitekus, and new candidates Donna F. Breen, Richard A. Breen, Dale M. Day, Madeline F. Eysie and Brian J. Graziano.

There are 12 candidates running for nine seats (three years) District 7: Incumbents Christian J. Dauphinee, Richard T. King, David P. Mueller, Shaela T. Welch, and new candidates George Bent, Linda Marie Bent, Jeffery Eugene Caille, John D. Farrell, Stacy Lynn Farrell, Joseph Girard, Jennifer L. Gover and Stephen F. Lydon, Jr.

Selectmen plan to bring rink plan to Town Meeting

The Selectmen are preparing to bring more than one article to the Town Meeting in May involving the construction of a hockey rink at the Coakley Middle School site.

At their meeting Tuesday night, the board discussed two possible articles for a Special Town Meeting that would occur on the same night as the Annual Town Meeting, Monday, May 13.

One article involves the transfer of school-owned property at the site of the rink, and another deals with the funding for the project.

Department of Public Works Director Mark Ryan, who is a member of the Rink Site Selection Committee, said the School Committee and Town Meeting must approve the transfer of the land with the school's tennis courts to the town for recreational use. The plan is to build the 34,000-square-foot hockey rink at the tennis-court site, and then relocate the courts behind the school.

Ryan said his committee plans to present financial and traffic reports to the Selectmen and School Committee next week, and will also propose the land-transfer plan, which will go to Town Meeting for approval.

He said another Town Meeting article would seek authorization for the town to request that Gov. Deval Patrick release the \$5.569 million in state funding for the project

that was secured last summer.

Back in January, the Rink Site Selection Committee recommended the Coakley site as the best location for the rink after considering a list of over 20 properties in town, although it was not without opposition from many South Norwood residents.

Another Town Meeting article could authorize the Permanent Building Construction Committee to proceed into design and construction once the funds are released. However,

the Selectmen did not vote on any of these articles.

Also at the meeting, Selectman Bill Plasko notified residents that the board is looking to make appointments to several town boards and committee and is looking for volunteers. They include the Norwood Airport Commission, Board of Appeals, Board of Assessors, Board of Registrars, and Council on Aging. There is also a vacancy on the Permanent Building Construction Committee and Town

Manager John Carroll is looking to fill a vacancy on the Conservation Commission following the resignation of Janice Sloan Riolo.

Selectman Paul Bishop also expressed concern with a recent rise in residential break-ins in Norwood, and urged residents to be on the lookout for suspicious activity in their neighborhoods.

"There are only a limited number of resources in the Police Department. I don't like

to tell people to be nosy neighbors. But what I'm asking for is for you to please call the Police Department if you see anything out of the ordinary so we can put an end to this," said Bishop.

Chairman Michael Lyons also mentioned that Carroll recently had open-heart surgery and will be out of work for a short time. Meanwhile, Assistant Manager Bernie Cooper will be filling in.

Marijuana moratorium recommended

The neighboring towns of Sharon and Walpole are seeking a temporary moratorium on medical marijuana, and the Norwood Planning Board is now recommending the town do the same.

At its meeting Monday night, the board voted unanimously to support an article for the Annual Town Meeting to impose a one-year moratorium on medical-marijuana dispensaries in Norwood.

As a result of the vote, the article will be submitted to the Board of Selectmen for possible inclusion on the Town Meeting warrant. If the Selectmen approve it, the article will return to the Planning Board for a public hearing prior to Town Meeting.

In supporting a moratorium, Planning Board members said there are still many unanswered questions over how the state Department of Public Health (DPH) will choose to regulate the operation of medical-marijuana treatment facilities throughout the state. The DPH has been working to develop guidelines for a May 1 deadline.

"It does seem like the way to for me," said board member Joe Sheehan of the moratorium. "I think the guidelines from the state will help us."

Sheehan noted that the attorney general's office recently approved the town of Burlington's

moratorium on medical marijuana, and felt that this bodes well for Norwood in the event that someone were to threaten litigation for being denied an application to open in the town during a similar moratorium. This was confirmed in a letter from town counsel, he said. The attorney general's office also recently denied the town of Wakefield's proposal to ban medical marijuana outright, ruling that towns can regulate but not ban the use.

The Planning Board had previously voted to recommend an article to zone marijuana dispensaries in a highway district, but voted last week to withdraw that article and instead go with the moratorium.

Chairman Ernie Paciorkowski noted that the Selectmen, Board of Health, and police chief have all expressed support for a moratorium, which he said would prohibit medical marijuana in Norwood until July 30 of next year.

"It's not that we're not going to have them, it's just that we're basically delaying it a year. There are so many questions. That's why to me a moratorium works," he said. "A year from now, you're going to know a lot more."

One question relates to the fact that medical-marijuana dispensaries will be non-profit entities, which brings up issues of how surplus revenues will get distributed, noted board member Al Porro.

"They don't have to pay taxes

as a non-profit entity. That's what people voted at the polls," he said. "I guarantee you there wasn't one percent of people supporting this that knew what they were voting for."

While ultimately supporting the moratorium, board member Debbie Holmwood felt it was just "prolonging the inevitable" given that it is now state law and 56 percent of Norwood voters supported it.

Another option the Planning Board had considered was to create an overlay zoning district that would allow medical marijuana in an area around Norwood Hospital and the Guild Medical Center. Paciorkowski said the ideal option would be to have the drug distributed through the town's existing pharmacies by a doctor's prescription, however it is still unclear whether this would be possible under the scope of the ballot initiative and what the DPH comes out with.

The last superintendent who participated in SEPAC (Special Education Parents Advisory Committee) meeting was Mr. Morretti. Although he listened to parents concerns, his main reason for participation was to advertise his idea of having NPS taking over transportation of children with special needs. As far as I know, (I hope I am mistaken) since that time, neither superintendent nor a member of School Committee at-

tended any other SEPAC meeting. As I understand it, the purpose of the Superintendent's visit is to determine how to search for and how to choose from possible candidates the future Director of Student Services.

I wish that before the search goes on, the School Committee members and many administrators became familiar with many complex aspects of special education. Any future Director of Student Services would do nothing less or more than what the members of School Committee and Administrators let her or him do. There are many misunderstanding of what special education is and what it is supposed to do for many varied subgroups of students with very different needs.

Although I can list many severe problems resulting from that lack of understanding, at this point I would suggest only that the School Committee designate a person to be a liaison between the Committee and SEPAC. That would allow the members of the School Committee to understand the complexity of needs viewed through existing special education federal and state laws.

I would also ask parents to attend SEPAC meetings in greater numbers. I understand, more than anybody else, what little time we all have, how much of our time is spent caring for our children and how exhausted we are. Our children are very different. Some have only mild learning disabilities and go on to college and some are easily prepared for work provided good transition programs are in place. Even we, the parents, don't understand needs of children who differ from ours. That is one more reason why we all should attend SEAPC meetings. And that is why members of the School Committee should work much more closely with SEPAC, utilizing experiences and knowledge of VARIOUS group of parents of students with special needs.

Fenway to host Brown Gala

Matt Brown's philosophy is a simple one: "Never quit."

Those are the two words that stand out in large print at the top of Brown's website, www.mattbrownnumber3.org. It is a part of who he is.

His family and friends have seen it first hand, and can account for the fact that Brown has overcome some serious obstacles and continues to do so.

"Despite his accident and physical limitations, he's decided to go on and live his life," said Matt O'Neil, Brown's uncle and chairman of the Matt Brown Gala Committee.

The third and final Matt Brown Gala is being held on Saturday, April 6, from 7 to 11 p.m. at Fenway Park. After having gone to Gillette Stadium and the TD Garden for the first two galas, O'Neil said it was only fitting to have the last one at the most storied of all Boston sports venues.

"It's just going to be a fabulous event. Clearly the venue itself, just looking out over the field is spectacular," he said.

On Jan. 23, 2010, Brown sustained a catastrophic spinal injury while playing as a sophomore for Norwood High School's hockey

team in a game against Weymouth. Brown broke his fourth and fifth cervical vertebrae when he was bumped into the plexiglass while fighting for a loose puck, an injury that left him paralyzed from the chest down. The Matt Brown Rehab and Recovery Fund was established to support Brown's ongoing medical treatment.

Three years removed from his injury, Brown remains confined to a bed or his sip-and-puff wheelchair and in need of 24-hour care. But quit is not a word that appears in the Matt Brown dictionary.

This past fall, the Norwood High graduate went off to school at Stonehill College in Easton, where he is pursuing a degree in business. His aunt Trisha Brown coaches the women's basketball team on campus. Brown has also begun to speak publicly about his experience, said O'Neil.

"He's doing great," he said. "He's living it just like any other college freshman. He's having a ball."

Brown competed last year in the Boston Marathon in the wheelchair division, and plans to do so again at this year, said O'Neil. At the gala, Brown will also make a special announcement about his future, his uncle said.

"The theme is a celebration

of life," said O'Neil of the gala. "We'd love to see as many people as we can."

Tickets for the event are limited, and 500 of the 700 available tickets have already been sold. Remaining tickets can be purchased for \$75 on the Matt Brown website or by calling event organizer Mary Conley 781-771-4409.

The gala, which is being held at Fenway Park's State Street Pavilion and EMC Club, will feature food, music, prizes, raffles, and special guests including Ray Bourque and Mike Eruzione. Music will be by Dave Hickey and Mark Morris and the Catunes. Attendees will also get to view the two Boston Red Sox World Series trophies.

Additionally, Brown will present a special Matt Brown #3 Never Quit Award to Norwood's Craig Brady, who lost part of his leg in an explosion while serving in Afghanistan. Brady is now a member of the US National Sled Hockey Team that will be competing for the world championship in Korea next month.

Additional Never Quit Awards will go to a youth hockey player and volunteer coach, said O'Neil.

Other special guests include the Norwood Military Family Support Group, Paralyzed Veterans of America and Prove People Wrong, an organization dedicating to supporting underdogs and those less fortunate in partnership with the Tim Thomas Foundation.

"Really, the intention is to bring people together," said O'Neil. "Those that have come before know the type of party we throw."

have to have Lenox Street. You really need it all to make it work," said Ryan.

At the PBCC meeting, Compass project manager Bryan Jarvis gave an updated cost estimate based on 50 percent completion of design documents. Compared to the previous schematic design estimate back in November, the project is "on the right track" within the \$14 million budget, said Jarvis, although that number does not include Lenox Street. With everything included, the project would cost around \$15.4 million, he said.

The debate over going for an override rather than borrowing amounts to how much the town is willing to borrow on this particular project and how it could impact future capital needs of the town, said Ryan.

"Right now it looks like the debt service on the project might limit what else we can do in town for other projects, so we have to look at that closely," said Ryan, adding that the DPW project would amount to 30 years of borrowing at \$800,000 a year.

Meanwhile, another ongoing

issue with the project relates to excavation work on the Lyman Place property line on the embankment that runs along the MBTA railroad tracks. Project engineer consultant Weston & Sampson wants to conduct a soil survey from the embankment to the railroad tracks before proceeding with any other excavation work on the site, and it requires cooperation from the T to work on their land.

Jarvis said last week that there has been "positive response" from the T on a plan to re-grade the embankment during the excavation work rather than having to pursue a more costly shoring procedure.

"It's an ongoing conversation right now. But the positive spin is that they're open to the option," he said.

The DPW project involves complete removal of the current facilities on Lyman Place and construction of three new buildings, including modern vehicle and salt storage facilities, mechanics and wash bays and administrative offices. It includes additional storage space at the Winter Street composting site.

have a negative impact on regional economies and threaten our military readiness.”

Combined, the six towers in Massachusetts manage hundreds of thousands of operations annually, said state representatives, accommodating a significant mix of commercial, medical, private and military aircraft and flight services and providing critical flight-training programs.

“The FAA and the National Transportation Safety Board place high importance on implementing Safety Management Systems (SMS). We believe that cutting the federal contract tower program and closing these ATC towers is contrary to a safety-first approach,” the letter said. “We agree on the need to identify means through which to improve our current fiscal situation. But any such effort should not jeopardize the safety, security and economic well being of our citizens.”

The letter also points out that the contract tower program - in which the federal towers are staffed with contractors rather than FAA employees - has been one of the agencies most cost-effective initiatives over the years, and closing them “appears to make neither fiscal nor operational sense.”

“The federal contract tower program’s cost effectiveness and flight-safety enhancements are a proven success. At the very least, a safety-risk assessment should be conducted at each individual facility prior to any final decision regarding ATC tower closings. We strongly urge you to carefully consider the critical importance of the federal contract tower program before taking final action on closing any air traffic control towers,” the letter said.

As for Norwood Airport, which saw an immediate savings of \$300,000 a year back in 1997 when it converted to a contract tower, is now a wait-and-see situation as they see if the FAA will indeed reconsider its decision or go ahead with its plan to begin shutting down towers next month.

“We’re going to hear one way or another,” said Airport Commissioner Mark Ryan.

Norwood Airport Manager Russ Maguire previously sent a letter to U.S. Representative Stephen Lynch, Norwood’s representative in Congress, expressing his opposition to the tower being shut down, calling it “a very poorly conceived idea, with incalculable negative impacts.”

The work ethic is there, the chemistry is there, the experience is there, although perhaps not at the level that Roman would like it to be.

All in all, the table is set for the Norwood lacrosse program to make some noise this season.

"Our guys have been putting in the extra time in the off-

season and we hope this is the year we can beat the likes of Wellesley, Needham and Walpole," added Roman.

With that next step, there is also the fact that baby steps must be taken at other levels in order to properly encourage the growth of the program. Norwood, like many other teams around the state, have come up with a clever fundraiser in order to try and support the program's hopeful rise to new heights.


