## CPA supporters form nonprofit

A local organization seeking to urge Norwood voters to approve the Town joining the Community Preservation Act is preparing to get the word out before residents vote on the matter in November.

Nonprofit CPA4Norwood was founded after Town Meeting voted in favor of Norwood participating in the Community Preservation Act. The matter must also pass as a local ballot question.

The Community Preservation Act, established in 2000, creates a local surcharge on property taxes and sets aside local funding to be used for Open Space, Historic Preservation, Recreation and Housing purposes. So far, around 160 other communities, including nearby Canton and Sharon, have already adopted the Act.

Each year, the state Community Preservation Trust Fund, which is overseen by the Department of Revenue, administers reimbursements to cities and towns that have adopted the Community Preservation Act. The estimated reimbursement rate from the state will be about 19 percent of the Town's contribution.

"CPA4Norwood is operated by Norwood residents who believe a CPA will be a powerful tool for helping to create the future of Norwood based on the vision of its residents," the organization says in a mission statement.

In Norwood, the proposed surcharge



**NFD and NPD celebrate retirements**

The Norwood Police and Fire Departments said goodbye to a long-serving member in each of their ranks this month.

Norwood Fire announced the retirement of 38-year firefighter William "Billy" Turner. Turner, a second generation firefighter, joined the department in March 1978. He went on to serve as the Norwood Fire Investigator beginning in 1988. As Fire

Investigator, Turner has coordinated with law enforcement to determine the origin and cause of fires. He also acted as a liaison with the state's Fire Marshall office, and the Assistant District Attorney's office, according to a departmental description of the position.

"A testament to his character, Billy was universally liked and respected by all members of the Norwood Fire Department and Arson Investigators across the state," the Department said in a statement. "Though it will

be hard to replace the knowledge, professionalism and wisdom firefighter Turner always displayed, we wish he and his wife Janet the 'Best of Luck' in his retirement."

Fire Chief Tony Greeley further acknowledged that Turner is leaving big shoes to fill, but is confident that his assistance during the transition process is leaving the department in good standing moving forward.

"Things will look different from here," Greeley said.

# Selectmen approve biotech bid

The Norwood Board of Selectmen approved another motion that brings the Town one step closer to securing a contract with the biotech company Moderna.

After hearing testimony from Director of Planning and Economic Development Paul Halkiotis and the Economic Development Committee chair Steve Costello, the board approved to designate the site at 100 Tech Dr. - the location Moderna expressed interest in occupying - as an Economic Opportunity Area.

With the Board's July 26 approval of a tax incentive financing agreement and this week's approval of an EOA designation, the measures can be voted on at the next Special Town Meeting. If approved at Town Meeting, the application for the TIF agreement and EOA designation can be reviewed by the state's Economic Assistance Coordinating Council. If secured, the TIF and EOA programs would provide Moderna a series of tax breaks throughout its proposed \$110 million investment to improving the building and establishing new facilities.

According to Halkiotis, if the Town and then subsequently the state approve the TIF and EOA agreements, representatives from Moderna said they would sign the lease agreement.

Selectman Paul Bishop called the potential agreement with Moderna a "win-win" because a vacant building within the town gets refurbished and the company's employees would inject economic activity into the community. He said the new wave of employees help hotels and commerce, but could also lead to expansion in the population.

Moderna would import 100 full-time employees and create 125 new full-time jobs if the contract is secured.

The board also approved a contract proposal to National Grid offered by Town Manager John Carroll. The company plans to replace portions of a gas line and do a number roadwork projects on Washington Street in

coming months.

The contract would allow the company to pay the Town \$18 to 20,000 in donations in lieu of providing permanent pavement to the affected areas after the projects are completed. Carroll said the Department of Public Works estimated the amount would cover about 25 percent of the cost to permanently pave the roadways.

"That is a pathetic, disgracefully small sum," Selectman Helen Abdallah Donohue said.

Selectman Paul Bishop said the Board should communicate to the company that they've received multiple complaints about road conditions following previous National Grid projects and should seek a way to guarantee the condition of the roadways would. Carroll clarified that the company would provide temporary paving and the act of restoring the roads would come from the Town, aided by the financial donation.

Ultimately, the Board approved of the contract because of concerns for safety and the need to act quickly on deteriorating steel gas lines that run throughout the state, according to multiple Selectmen members.

The Board also discussed the walking area near Ryan Drive that's been used as an impromptu access point to the Windsor Gardens MBTA station. The Board previously expressed concern about the safety risks of people passing through an area that had been closed off by the MBTA. Board of Selectmen Chair Allan Howard suggested a motion to reach out to the MBTA to explore options for an official pathway. The Board ultimately decided to keep their hands off the issue until another party or the MBTA approaches the Board.

The chiefs of Norwood's Fire and Police Departments also presented their monthly reports. Chief William Brooks brought along two new officers to introduce to the Board and provided an update on personnel movement. Chief Brooks said that the high number of promotions and hiring of new recruits is caused by an unusual number of retirements that have occurred this summer. He also outlined the ways the department will incorporate their new

recruits into the community.

Chief Brooks also updated the Board on a new online reporting program available through the Department's website that allows citizens to file reports of minor offenses. The new system offers 12 types of offenses that can be filed online. Chief Brooks said the system generates the same quality of reports as officers. He said the new system frees up officers' time and is a great way to make better use of resources.

At the conclusion of his report, Selectman Bishop asked Chief Brooks about the number of overdoses Norwood experienced during the time of his report and whether that indicated an increase over last year. Chief Brooks explained that trends have been stable and outlined the approaches his officers use when it comes to addiction. He emphasized a rehabilitation first mentality.

At the conclusion of official matters, Selectman Bishop used his opportunity for public statement to address a news article and accompanying editorial published by the Norwood Record he took issue with. Bishop did not identify the Record by name, but highlighted an article last week that alleged Bishop may have used his position on the Board to assist Miller who faced a fine for a water pump he'd been using in the Germany Brook.

The article quoted an unnamed source who claimed Bishop asked the Commission to "stop picking on Gerry." Bishop denied ever making those statements, and criticized the reporter articles as examples of "yellow journalism."

## WAGE WAR

There is a lot of talk these days about paychecks. For a change of pace, those conversations are not just about how far they need to stretch for working families.

This week, Gov. Charlie Baker signed into law a bill that requires businesses to pay men and women equally for comparable work. It allows employees to freely discuss their salaries with coworkers without fear of reprisal, prohibits employers from requiring applicants to provide a salary history before receiving a formal job offer, and authorizes the attorney general to issue regulations interpreting and applying the expanded law.

The statute of limitations laid out currently under the Equal Pay statute will be expanded from one to three years and employees will no longer be required to pursue a general claim of intentional discrimination at the Massachusetts Commission against Discrimination before filing a separate equal pay claim in court.

The new law takes effect July 1, 2018.

"I am pleased to sign bipartisan legislation to create a more level playing field in the Commonwealth and ensure that everyone has the opportunity to earn a competitive salary for comparable work," Baker said in a statement.

Let's be very clear, we fully support pay equality. Nevertheless, there are concerns.

Letting employees discuss their salaries is a fool's errand. On paper, it seems a great way to gauge pay inequality. In reality, what you or I earn is no one else's concern. A co-worker is free to ask what you make, but it is really none of their business. We suspect this could inflame workplace tensions when the inevitable workplace social justice warrior makes the rounds to compile salary data, is rebuffed, and sees a conspiracy where there is none.

A more pressing concern is the question of what defines "comparable" work. In a per-

fect world, these judgments are easy enough to make. There are personality issues and nuances to job duties that make such a determination very difficult, however, and that becomes a problem once matters become codified as law. It is very difficult to separate office politics from the letter of the law.

A simple scenario: a female Chief Financial Officer learns that she earns less than a lower-level golfing buddy of the CEO.

A muddier scenario: comparing two employees with the same job description and, in essence similar performance, but one goes an extra mile to take on new initiatives and work late as needed.

A disastrous scenario: two employees have the same job description, the duties are not performed equally, but the underperforming party is convinced they pull their weight equally.

The law, to its credit, tries to address the issue of comparability. Employers are allowed to take certain attributes of an employee or applicant into account when determining variation in pay, including education and work experience, and performance metrics (sales, revenue, or otherwise). We fear, however, that the new law would still foster dissent in otherwise fairly-run workplaces.

If one is in favor of true pay equality and fairness, the new law should have included any and all pay disputes, adding religion, sexual preference, gender identity, and political affiliation to the mix. Then, we wonder, where would it all end?

Again, we reiterate, women deserve to be compensated the same as men for comparable work. Bosses who intentionally pay men more and promote them more often than women should rightfully face accusations of discriminations. It would be caveman logic to argue otherwise. Our concern is whether this law will accomplish that goal without collateral damage.

### PUMP STORY INACCURATE

**RE:** 'Pump dispute leads ConCom to reiterate authority'

*To the Editor:*

This is in response to the story printed on July 27, 2016. The Commission was surprised to see this article in the paper, because short of responding to a brief request for photos the Commission has yet to be contacted for a comment. I would like to take this opportunity to shed some light on the matter.

In the absence of seeking comment or clarification the reporter has produced a sensationalized article with inaccuracies and misleading information provided by a "source close to the issue," when in truth the matter is being administered in a routine fashion. There were no cease and desist orders issued on this matter, the Enforcement Order was issued June 2, 2016, not May, which requested the property owner to "remove concrete blocks from Germany Brook and leave the bed of the brook free of obstructions to the passage of fish...and disconnect any discharger piping in to the brook. No pool backwash or discharge is permitted" and to contact the agent to work on resolving this matter. The Commission has not been contacted by any other departments or "approached by a member of the Board of Selectmen" seeking to influence the Commission's process or inquire as to why we were "picking on Gerry." The Commission is a transparent body that welcomes the public to attend our meetings and be an invaluable ally when it comes to protecting Norwood's conservation properties and water resources. However we do not allow any outside influences to control how we enforce the local bylaw and state regulations.

As to why the property owner was not fined, the bylaw gives the Commission the ability to levy fines up to \$300 a day, and as far back as I and the agent can recall we have yet to do so on any enforcement matter because we have yet to find a property owners' transgressions so egregious or an owner unwilling to work with us in finding a resolution to the issues which had led to an Enforcement Order - hence warranting such a substantial fine. However, we reserve the right to fine as needed on a case by case basis.

While this matter is still in process, I hope this gives some clarity as to what is going on and to let the public know we are not "picking on Gerry," nor are we favoring him. As I said at our last meeting, "everyone (has to be treated) exactly the same."

# Facing a fine, resident removes pump

Norwood's Recreation Director Gerry Miller heeded to the Conservation Commission's order to remove a water pump drawing from The Germany Brook for his lawn's irrigation system after the Commission threat-

posed to doing it without coming to the Commission and filing the notice of intent that you choose to do that, and exactly what structures if any are required to do that," DiMaria said.

Miller said the commission warned if he did not remove the pump by Tuesday that they'd act on their previous enforcement order and begin issuing a fine of \$300 a day until he complied.

Miller added he hasn't used the pump since October and previously responded to the commission's request to move the system away from the embankment as water levels changed.

Goetz said when the Commission first contacted Miller he believed the members expected him to completely remove the pump and "start from scratch", not to just reposition the pump.

Goetz said residents have a right to access water from ponds and streams as long as "it's done properly."

"It's a legal right that dates back to colonial times but now there are restrictions that govern usage. The law is pretty clear, if you want to do anything within a wetland or a stream or river, you must file a notice of intent."

Conservation Agent Al Goetz confirmed that Miller removed the pump as the Commission instructed as of Tuesday afternoon. Goetz did not say whether Miller would face fines because he does not vote on those matters.

In May, Miller received an enforcement order to remove a water pump and cinder blocks used to keep the fixture



the long-running Zip Trips."

The trip to Norwood was a return for anchor Gene Lavanchy, who was born at Norwood Hospital, along with his wife and children. Lavanchy was raised in nearby Walpole, a town he described as an arch rival, but said he has "mad respect" for Norwood and credited the community for helping him get to where he is today.

"The Town of Norwood has a lot going for it, it really is a wonderful place to raise a family," Lavanchy said. "And families here stick around for generations."

Lavanchy noted that Norwood has a reputation for its high school sweethearts getting married and staying put in the town. would be 1 percent on annual property taxes beginning in fiscal 2018, with several categories of exemptions for different types of residents. Specifically, low-income residents and the majority of senior citizens living on fixed incomes would not be subjected to the one percent increase on property taxes. The first \$100,000 of a home's value isn't considered under the tax and the additional charge would amount to around \$33 to the average homeowner's bill.

"Like any pow-

erful and effective tool, the CPA can be mismanaged and misused, but the CPA requires the approval of Town Meeting for every project approved and dollar spent," the group says, noting that it will engage in a dedicated public relations and advocacy campaign leading up to the November decision.

John Mahoney, a realtor with Streetcar Realty and supporter of CPA4Norwood, said the organization is trying to educate

residents of the benefits a membership in the CPA would produce for the community. Mahoney said he understood the apprehension that accompanies any proposed tax increase among residents, but believes once people learn about what other towns accomplished with CPA funds, the average uptick of \$33 dollars would not be an issue. Mahoney said that since Massachusetts residents already contribute to the CPA Trust Fund through general taxes, it

would be a waste for Norwood to not take advantage of the program.

"[The program] would have a positive impact on the quality of life in Norwood," Mahoney said. "Hopefully, people will figure out it's in their benefit. If they don't, then that's the decision, but we should at least vote on it."

The push for Norwood adopting the Community Preservation Act began with mem-

bers of the Planning Board discussing the option with Town Planner Paul Halkiotis. However, once the issue is taken up by the Town through a vote, no officials are allowed to promote adopting the act from their position.

Planning Board chair, Town Meeting member and local businesswoman Debbie Holmwood, who made several public presentations on the Act before the Town Meeting vote, was chosen as CPA4Norwood president. Mary Gallagher was named treasurer and Richard Shay was named Secretary.

The initial organizing meeting in May was also attended by John Hall, Michal Bergeron, Carol MacLeay, Patricia Sterritt, Debra Pentowski and Helen Gallagher.

The group plans to make several more presentations to groups like the Norwood League of Women Voters and the Senior Center, and table at events like Norwood Day.

Mahoney reiterated that a major selling point is drawing attention to what other towns have accomplished with assistance from the CPA Trust Fund. The organization's website draws attention to the number of historical sites in Norwood that can't be properly attended to under the Historic Commission's budget.

"Some important projects get passed over year after year. These funds would help get those projects done," Mahoney said.



thing within a wetland or a stream or river, you must file a notice of intent."

Miller said when he installed the pump eight years ago he was unaware of any required application or applicable restrictions. He said since other town officials he personally consulted said he wasn't breaking any rules he didn't think to check if there was a formal process to follow.

In the past, Commission Chair Cheryl Doyle took issue with the fact that Miller asked other officials about the pump, but not the Commission, because without a filing for that structure, anyone else could start doing similar things without notifying the proper channels.

"It was never filed with us. It was never mentioned to (Goetz) as the agent," she said. "Anybody doing anything with any water bodies in this town is supposed to contact the agent or a member of this board and go through this

board because the building department, planning department and the rest of them don't have jurisdiction over the water bodies. This board has jurisdiction on the water bodies. So we were bypassed on that."

He'd used the pump without issue for many years until he witnessed another resident removing the cinder blocks. Miller said he believed the same resident, who he did not name, brought the pump to the Commission's attention.

He also said he believed he acted with conservation in mind when using the brook to feed his irrigation system.

"I'm taking the water from brook, putting it into my lawn and then the water permeates back down to the brook. I think that's better than using a hose which draws from a reservoir," Miller said.

But Miller has now complied with the Commission's order and said he was eager to be done with the matter. Miller has the option to go before the board and seek approval for a pump that meets their standards.

Miller said he's not sure if he'll take the time to install another pump but said if he does, he'll make sure to consult the Commission beforehand.

## Local filmmakers announce release date for Mass. hockey movie

Local filmmakers Jerry Kelleher and Brendan King finally have an official release date for their latest endeavor, *Banner Years: The Golden Era of Hockey in Massachusetts*.

King appeared on the Fox 25

Morning News Zip Trip to Norwood last week and announced the premier, which will take place at the Norwood Theater on Saturday, Dec. 10.

*Banner Years* will delve into the popularity of hockey in Massachusetts in the late-1960s into the '70s, taking a look at prominent high school rivalries of the

time and also examine the impact of the Bobby Orr-led Bruins, which won a pair of Stanley Cups in 1970 and 1972.

Originally, the film was slated to be simply about the Norwood vs. Arlington rivalry of the time, centered on the 1972 Eastern Mass. Championship game. But as production for the movie

started to take shape, Kelleher and King realized there was so much more to this hockey story than just one game.

"It went from a local story to really a regional story about the whole region being on fire for hockey," Kelleher said. "So I have guys from Norwood, of course, and Arlington, but then it spread."

I found out the best teams of that era, so it's really kind of a Greater Boston story now."

It's the second project Kelleher and King have partnered for, following September 2014's *Norwood Arena...The Movie*, which told the story of the old

## Norwood Stingrays showing nothing but improvements at season's end

It's been a summer of improvement for the Norwood Stingrays swimming program, both in terms of the current season and year-to-year progress.

Look no further than Norwood's performance at the B-Regionals in Newton last Saturday, where the Stingrays finished in fourth place out of the 12 participating teams. That's a three-spot increase over last summer, according to head coach Jimmy Locke, when Norwood came in sev-

enth at the meet.

"We didn't bring a huge group, either," Locke said of this year's B-cut meet. "But everybody swam really well. Everybody contributed; they raced the races they needed to race. It was a big accomplishment for us and it was a good team effort."

In addition to Norwood, the other 11 participating teams at B-Regionals consisted of Canton, Dedham, Framingham, Medfield, Millis, Natick, Needham, Newton, Sherborn, Walpole and Westwood. The same 12 teams will battle it out

at the A-Regionals this Saturday, also in Newton.

Among the individual highlights for Norwood at the B-Regionals was the performance of Caeleigh Brown, who participated in the 11 and 12-year-old division this summer. She won her heat in the 50-meter backstroke.

What really stood out for Locke, in terms of the team as a whole, was the Stingrays improvement in placement despite having fewer swimmers than the previous season at the B-

stock car racing track in town.

Each filmmaker grew up in Norwood, save for a three-year stint in California for King in the early '70s. Kelleher attended the Norwood-Arlington game at the old Boston Garden in '72, and though King was out west at the time, he still had a significant interest in the game: his cousin, Eddie King, scored the game-winning goal for the Mustangs.

"It falls in line with the other movie [Norwood Arena]," King said. "We both love the history of the town, we both like sports and we work pretty well together."

Norwood defeated the Arlington Spy Ponders, 3-2, en route to its first – and to date only – state championship in boys ice hockey, finishing the season at 23-0-0. Arlington had gotten the best of Norwood twice previously in the EMass final, in both 1968 and 1971.

Several prominent Bruins players from the era make an appearance in the film, including Derek Sanderson and Eddie Johnston. Needham-native/former Bruins coach Robbie Ftorek appears, as does Norwood's own Richie Hebner, who enjoyed an 18-year career as a professional baseball player, including 11 years with the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Recently-retired Norwood High coach Bill Clifford is also in the film – both as an interview subject and in archival footage, as he was a member of the 1972 champion Mustangs.

Even more star power is in store for the film, as former New England Patriots play-by-play voice Gil Santos will provide the narration.

King and Kelleher felt the need to include the Bruins in the film because of their impact on hockey from the youth level up in Massachusetts at the time.

"It seemed to me when we were growing up that every guy played," King recalled, having

had a brief high school hockey career himself at Catholic Memorial before a collarbone injury shortened it in his freshman year. "Probably from '66 until...I could take you to 1980 with the Olympics. Everybody played. That was just the thing to do."

"Bruins fever at the time coincided with all this," Kelleher said. "All the rinks being built."

The movie will contain content of several recent events, including the 2011 Stanley Cup championship for the Bruins, as well as Norwood High alum Matt Brown's injury in a game in 2010.

"It was important for us to connect the Bruins," King said. "So the Bruins and modern day hockey is going to include Matt Brown, what happened to him and what the Bruins did [for him]. And also when they lost the Canton [Metropolis] rink and what the Bruins did there. So it kind of gets contemporary, because it's really important to acknowledge that."

Kelleher said the success of Norwood Arena...The Movie helped make this project possible, but added that the popularity of hockey as compared to stock car racing locally could make the film even more of a hit.

## Norwood's Meghan Reen shoots Shots For Life despite injury

Not even a sprained ankle could keep Norwood High basketball star Meghan Reen from attending the fourth-annual "A Shot For Life" competition last weekend.

Though she was unable to participate in the event after suffering the ankle injury during an AAU game in Washington, D.C. earlier this summer – leaving her in a walking boot for two weeks – Reen still made the trek to the University Sports Complex in Hanover to help out event organizer Mike Slonina.

"A Shot For Life" is a fundraising event founded by Slonina, which raises money for brain cancer research through a variety of shooting competitions. Funds raised by the challenge benefit the Dr. Curry Research Laboratory at Massachusetts General Hospital, as well as Children's Hospital.

"I'm honored to be a part of this charity organization," Reen said. "It's been a great time being able to give back like this."

Reen, who begins her senior year at Norwood next month, was one of 29 players (15 boys, 14 girls) from across Massachusetts selected to participate in the event when rosters were announced back in June. It was her second straight selection to the challenge; last year, she shot 64 percent on an array of free throws, jump shots and three-pointers.

"Since I was unable to shoot, I walked around and helped out with whatever Mike [Slonina] needed," Reen said. "I stayed throughout the day and for the boys competition and helped with them as well. 
Reen is committed to As-


