



Sex offender bylaw approved

Town Meeting Members (TMM) voted to approve the sex offender registry bylaw on May 10. This bylaw bars Level 2 or Level 3 sex offenders from living within 500 feet of any school, Town library, day care center, park, elderly housing facility or place of worship, or loitering within 300 feet of any Town park.

"It is impossible to make your community 100 percent off limits to Level 2 and 3 sex offenders," Board of Selectmen Chairman Jerry Kelleher, but the bylaw would provide an additional measure of safety for residents of Norwood and their children.

Upon their first violation of the residency portion of the bylaw, a sex offender is given notice that he or she has 30 days to move. After this 30-day pe-

BAC steps up again for Matt

Air Charter company volunteers to transport teen from Georgia

After spending nearly three months at the Shepherd Center, a spinal cord and brain injury hospital in Atlanta Matt Brown has returned home.

Brown returned to Norwood on May 5, when he was flown into the Norwood Memorial Airport by Boston Air Charter (BAC). He returned to a large crowd of friends and family members, all cheering and applauding as the plane landed.

"It was quite moving, seeing all his friends and family come out to support him," said BAC President Al Bishop, who was one of the many visitors at the airport waiting to greet Brown as he returned to Norwood.

Bishop was not on the flight, though two BAC pilots, Lou Marden and Mary Baker, were involved in Brown's two and a half hour flight home.

Bishop and BAC volunteered their service to the Brown family, much like they did when they transported Matt to Atlanta in February. Transportation of this nature would normally cost between \$45,000 and \$50,000 per trip, though the service was offered by the Bishops to

the Brown family.

"We actually volunteered it," Bishop said.

Friends and family continued to show their support as the Norwood Fire Department escorted him out of the airport. The Fire Department stayed with him during the return, and drove Brown back to his Westview Drive home in one of their ambulances.

"It was amazing," Bishop said.

While his rehabilitation at the Shepherd Center is complete, Brown's rehabilitation is far from over. In an updated posted on Matt Brown's website, www.mattbrownnumber3.org/, the family thanked the staff at the center, and wrote, "They have given Matt a great start on his recovery, and we are forever grateful to them for their amazing care of our son. He is ready for the next phase of this journey, and we will continue to keep everyone updated as to his progress."

"It has been an incredible 11 weeks here, and Matt continues to work hard on his recovery," the family wrote. "He will continue to work on his rehabilitation once he gets home and we look forward to many visitors!"

Blue Hills not pleased with FinCom comments

Representatives from Blue Hills Regional Technical School were not pleased with the statements made and action taken by the Finance Commission on May 3.

On May 3, the FinCom unanimously voted to fund a 3.6 percent increase to Blue Hills's Fiscal Year 2011 operating budget. Norwood's portion of the FY 11 budget comes in at \$979,698, up from \$884,091 in FY 10. The FinCom voted to support a \$915,918 budget. In addition, the FinCom voted to send a Freedom of Information letter to Blue Hills, requesting further detail regarding the budget.

"The letter requesting Freedom of Information was sent to them at the end of last week," FinCom Chairman Alan Slater said, and as of May 10, they have not received a response.

Joseph Ciccolo, Superintendent of Blue Hills Regional Technical School for the past four years, said he was disappointed with some things said by FinCom members at last Monday's

meeting.

"We have a process with all nine towns we try to follow," Ciccolo said.

The nine towns in question are Norwood, Randolph, Canton, Westwood, Milton, Braintree, Avon, Holbrook and Dedham, and each are responsible for a portion of the Blue Hills operating budget. According to Ciccolo, the process done this year, and in years past, involves sending a budget summary sheet to towns ahead of time, scheduling a meeting with the Finance Commission, and discussing the budget in further detail at that time. This process is done with all other towns, and has been done with Norwood for the past three years, Ciccolo said.

At last Monday's meeting, Norwood's FinCom expressed concern over the lack of cooperation received from Blue Hills. FinCom member Joseph Greeley said they requested more detailed budget information on at least three occasions, and Blue Hills refused to provide the Commission this infor-





Timing on superintendent search a concern

The search for a new permanent Superintendent of Schools continues, and the School Committee received dozens of applications. As of May 5, 34 people had applied for the job, though that number was projected to increase to 40 by the time applications closed on May 10.

The School Committee hired the New England School Development Council (NESDEC) to conduct the search, and Arthur Bettencourt, the Assistant Executive Director of NESDEC, is working with the committee to bring the best candidates to town. Their searches typically attracted 22 to 27 candidates, a number Norwood has already exceeded.

"Quoting [Bettencourt's] words, we have some very strong candidates," School Committee Chairman Paul Samargedlis said, adding that Bettencourt believes they will be very happy with some of the candidates who have stepped forward.

While the applicant pool is large, the committee remains concerned about the timing of the Superintendent search. If all goes according to schedule, a new Superintendent of Schools could be named by their Wednesday, June 23, just seven days before Interim Superintendent of Schools Jeffrey Granatino leaves for Canton.

School Committee member Eleanor Travers was concerned by this staling, "That's just seven days prior to us having no super," meaning if anything causes a delay they might start the next year without a Superintendent. Negotiations can take time, and this added time could be problematic.

"It could take that extra week, and we could be sitting here on July 1 with no Superintendent," Travers said, and this concern was shared by several other School Committee members.

In addition, some schools require administrative staff give 30 to 90 days notice before they leave the district, which could further delay a person coming to Norwood.

Samargedlis acknowledged they were on a tight schedule, saying, "As far as timing goes, we have no room for error."

An aggressive schedule has been set for the Screening Committee, a 13-member group tasked with vetting candidates and ranking the resumes. The first meeting of the Screening Committee takes place on May 19, at which point members will receive the resumes for review. The committee has a week to rank the resumes, and will return for a second meeting on May 26. The third Screening Committee meeting would take place on June 6.

"This is super-aggressive, in [Bettencourt's] terms,"

Samargedlis.

Even with the aggressive nature of the search, it is entirely possible that no new Superintendent will be in place when July 1 rolls around. Jack Aherne, the town's Special Liason to the Superintendent, said having a Superintendent in place by this date would be important, as the district needs someone in that position to make final decisions. Even if no permanent Superintendent of Schools is named at that time, someone must fill that role.

School Committee member Mark Joseph said, "You might have to look at making a very temporary interim [Superintendent]."

If this proves to be the case, Aherne said they could look at placing an existing staff member in that role or hiring a retired Superintendent to hold the position temporarily.

At this point, all the School Committee can do is continue forward with the search. They have identified this as a potential problem and one they can plan for. If Samargedlis's blue-sky scenario works out, the new Superintendent of Schools will be selected on June 23 and ready to go on July 1, but timing might not be on the committee's side.

Editorial

You don't want to make the list

No doubt some will think this newspaper has declared war on town meeting members, and this is simply not the case. What this newspaper has decided to do is print the names of all TM members who fail to show up at any meeting after each meeting, so as to make the public aware of it. Only the names of those not attending will be listed, our version of Norwood's Hall of Shame. Please see Page 6 of this week's newspaper for the no shows of last Monday's meeting.

Next week we will be printing the names of those who failed to show up tonight on one list and another list for those not showing up next Monday. Quite simply, if you fail to fulfill your obligations to your constituents by attending meetings, they are going to be made aware of it in the following issue after any town meeting.

The last thing anyone should do is look at absentee TM members of any given meeting and determine they are shirking their obligations. There are a myriad of legitimate reasons why one would miss a meeting or two. However, what our lists should provide for those interested is a way to track from meeting to meeting who is making the effort of attending and who isn't. And, as is every resident's right, should you notice a pattern of absenteeism of any TM members, making a phone call to your representative(s) as to inquire why would be reasonable.

Eighty TM members missed last Monday's meeting. That is about a third of the total member population. How ridiculous is that? The weather was good, so we can rule that out as a reason. There has been resurgence in interest in the Boston Bruins and they did have a playoff game that night, perhaps the Black and Gold in high definition trumped how your government was going to be spending hundreds of thousands of your tax dollars. Whatever the reason, the people of the districts you represent have a right to know you weren't there.

Should any TM member feel the obligation to provide a public answer as to why they are missing meetings, this newspaper will be more than happy to provide space. Simply forward your reasons to us and we will make sure your response is available for all to view.

Looking ahead, and in an attempt to keep Town Meeting a relevant form of representation in Norwood, perhaps a bylaw change is possible that upon a certain number of missed meetings by any TM members in a given election period, said members could be replaced by the Town Moderator at his discretion from a list of volunteers from each district willing to step in and help out. If this is too drastic, perhaps any TM members missing a certain number of meetings should be required when their terms expire to meet the same qualifying steps as all new candidates for TM. Incumbents should be required to do more than file a letter stating they want to be on the ballot. The betting here is that if these scofflaws are too lazy to attend meetings, there is little chance they will bother gathering signatures.

Chronic absenteeism by any Town Meeting members is a slap in the face to all residents of Norwood, particularly to other TM members who make the effort to show up and take their responsibilities seriously. All residents who take the time to head to the ballot box on Election Day and punch the ticket of a TM candidate are deserving of the representation they assume they are getting. Norwood needs to step up and hold non-voting members of Town Meeting accountable. The printing of their names in the newspaper is our way of trying to help.

riod is up, the offender faces a \$300 fine per day. Those caught loitering near a town park will face enforcement by criminal complaint and a fine of \$300.

According to the Massachusetts's Executive Office of Public Safety and Security (EOPSS), there are 33 Level 2 sex offenders and two Level 3 sex offenders living in town. Any of these offenders who already live within this 500-foot buffer zone are granted an exception from the new bylaw.

"We cannot remove someone who may already live within 500 feet at the moment," Kelleher said, although this could be used to prevent sex offenders from moving into these locations in the future. It's a preventative measure that provided additional protection moving forward.

"I'm just seeking some level of protection that's enforceable," Kelleher said.

District 2 TMM Eugene Doherty asked how enforceable this new bylaw would be, and Police Chief Bartley King

ROGERS ISN'T WAITING

To The Editor:

Re: "November is Coming Quickly"

Since I have been residing in Norwood for only 15 years, I am still an outsider to the town's politics. So I am mostly unaware of everything Representative Rogers did on behalf of Norwood and its citizens. Moreover, since in the past his opinion on special education laws differed from mine, I haven't voted for him in the past elections. But I will vote for him now. I believe that his past year of experiences uncovered a different, better, and in a way more powerful side of a politician in him. I cannot forget a reassuring phone call from Representative Rogers I received after I had sent him a letter expressing my worries about the future of my disabled son. Moreover, I

don't think he has been weakened politically although he has a much smaller office and his staff has been decimated. In the past year, his assistant, Jean Hogan, helped me three times when I experienced Kafkaesque difficulties while contacting three state's governments. I called each of them many times but the phones were busy, I was put on never-ending hold, or I learned that I should call different numbers. So I called Representative's Rogers office instead. I don't know what Jean Hogan did but I didn't have to call any more. Each agency kept CALLING ME now trying actively to solve the issues I had.

Yes, Representative's Rogers office is smaller than the previous one and it has fewer employees. Yet, in this voter's opinion, much bigger people reside in it than those who once occupied the spacious office of the House Majority Leader.

Maria Hrabowski

addressed this.

"Most of it is very much enforceable," King said, as when a sex offender comes to town, whether it is to live or work, they are required to register with the Police Department. Those who try to move into a location within 500 feet of one of the aforementioned areas will be informed of the bylaw.

Enforcing the loitering aspect of the bylaw would be a bit harder. He had some concerns that they would have to ID those suspected of being a sex offender in those areas, regardless of level. Officers will be required to identify the offender, get their name, address and telephone number and confirm they are a sex offender convicted of an offense involving a child before they can inform the offender they are in violation of the bylaw.

In the case of this bylaw, "park" means any public land owned or controlled by the local government within the town of Norwood and designated as an area for children's recreation. These areas include, but are not limited to,

the swimming pools, playgrounds and the soccer and baseball fields. The newly approved bylaw specifically restricts any sex offender who has been convicted of a sex offense involving a child loitering within 300 feet of a town park.

District 1 TMM Richard Shay was in favor of the bylaw. "It makes perfect sense to me," he said., but wanted to make sure the town was approving a law could stand up to an appeal.

Kelleher stated the proposed bylaw is based on similar ones in other towns, such as Dedham and Plymouth, and Town Counsel has reviewed it.

The newly approved bylaw has not been reviewed by the Attorney General's office, though Town Counsel Michael Lehane noted in the case of new bylaws, these reviews don't take place until after approval by TM. He feels the drafted bylaw would pass Attorney General review.

The bylaw itself only applies to Level 2 and 3 sex offenders. Level 1 sex offenders can live within the buffer zone. There are three levels of sex offenders, Level 1, Level 2 and Level 3. The names of Level 1 offenders are not released to the public, and will not be affected by this proposed bylaw. The EOPSS considers Level 1 offenders a "low risk" offender, while Level 2 offenders post a "moderate risk," and Level 3 represents a "high risk."

Town Meeting approves TIFs for Certain Teed and Home Market Foods

On May 10, Town Meeting Members voted to provide both CertainTeed and Home Market Foods with a tax increment financing (TIF) agreement for their proposed expansion projects in town.

A TIF can provide a property tax exemption based on a percentage of value added through new construction or significant improvement done in a development area. It is not a discount on taxes, but a tax credit. Prior to Monday's TM, Norwood had entered into four TIF agreements, with Mystic Scenic Studios, UTI, Hampden Inn and Instron/LTX.

"It's been very productive for the town and the area," Selectman Bill Plasko said, noting that TIFs have helped increase the amount of property tax and jobs in Norwood.

The four previously approved TIFs have led to \$89,820.01 in new growth property tax, of which \$11,252.11 has been forgiven, meaning the town has collected \$78,567.90 in new growth taxes. In addition, the companies have spent \$329,362 in building permit fees and brought 241 jobs to Norwood.

Plasko said TIFs were typically offered to attract businesses, retain businesses or encourage the expansion of a business. Both CertainTeed and Home Market Foods are planning an expansion in town, and the TIF serves as a small incentive for them that will help them remain competitive in their industries.

CertainTeed, also known as Bird & Son, is looking to perform multiple expansions at its Pleasant Street plant. First, they plan on updating their roof machine to make metric roofing shingles, which are 13.25 by 39.375 inches. The machine currently produces 12-by-36 inch imperial shingles.

"It is important that we do that for the future of the plant," Tom McShea, Manufacturing Manager for CertainTeed said, adding that almost all of their

competition offers metric shingles, and without shingles of this size, they will be unable to compete and enter the Canadian shingle market.

The second expansion is at the granular plant, which is the oldest in the nation. They will add two new buildings at the site, one of which is a small storage shed. CertainTeed has developed a solar reflective shingle product which will carry the EnergyStar label. A new shift will be added, creating five new jobs, and as shifts increase, so will this number.

TM members spoke in favor of providing CertainTeed with a TIF. District 4 TM member Susan McQuaid described CertainTeed as a positive corporate partner to the community, and one who has been with the Neponset Valley Chamber of Commerce for 116 years.

"It's my pleasure to support the request by CertainTeed for this TIF," she said, later adding, "It's a win-win situation for CertainTeed and the town of Norwood."

Unlike CertainTeed, Home Market Food's proposed expansion concerned several TM members.

Wes Atamian, President of Home Market Foods, said they are looking to make a \$12 to \$15 million dollar investment at the site.

"We've been growing at a pretty good rate here, and we're looking to continue our growth," Atamian said.

Home Market Foods, located at 140 Morgan Drive, is looking to modify their existing building to add additional manufacturing capacity, improve the existing roads and infrastructure at the site and at a 120-foot tall building for frozen storage at the site. The expansion would create over 100 new Norwood jobs by 2012.

This 120-foot tall freezer is the area of concern, as it would be one of the largest structures in town, though not the first to reach that height. To draw a comparison, the tower atop Town Hall is 120 feet tall.

"We need to utilize the height in order to accommodate

our growth," Atamian said, as the building abuts wetlands, and they are unable to expand horizontally.

Plasko stated that approval of a TIF by TM members would not allow Home Market Foods to start their expansion. Before adding this freezer, the company will still need to meet with other boards in town, including the Conservation Commission and Zoning Board of Appeal (ZBA), to get the necessary permits for the expansion.

They would need a dimensional variance from the ZBA for the freezer, as the building would be in a limited manufacturing district, and the zoning bylaw allows for buildings up to 60 feet tall in that area. Plasko noted that the area does allow for cell phone towers up to 140 feet tall, meaning the zoning bylaw would allow for a 120 foot structure in the site. The proposed use is allowed as of right.

However, the issuing of these permits is not the purview of TM.

"The only matter before the Town Meeting tonight is if the TIF is allowed," District 3 TM member Paul Eysie said, adding, "I strongly support this, and I'd hate to see them off to a bad start."

Though there were a few "no's" in the crowd, TM members ultimately voted to support Home Market Foods' request for a TIF agreement.



mation.

Ciccolo said the school is willing to meet with the commission to provide this detailed information. He said they send the budget assessment and summary out in advance, and then meet to review it and discuss it in further detail. The FinCom has a budget summary and charts regarding the school's Fiscal Year 2011 budget. Ciccolo added he has offered the FinCom three different nights for him to come in to discuss the budget, but that they wouldn't allow him in unless the detailed budget is sent in advance.

Slater confirmed that Blue Hills representatives have offered to meet with the Commission, but he felt it would be a waste of time to meet without first reviewing their budget.

"We asked them for the information because we thought it would be a better use of our time to meet with them [having reviewed the budget]," Slater said, but they would not send the material, and he feels this puts them at an impasse.

Slater added this is what the Commission does with Town departments - they request detailed information, review it and

meet with them to discuss the budget further. Slater is confident that the FinCom can review Blue Hills' budget in a similar fashion, noting the group has over 50 years of budget review experience combined.

Slater isn't the only member who wants to see the budget in advance. At the May 3 meeting, FinCom member Judy Langone said, "We're not happy with just summary information and not getting the information to us in advance, giving us time to digest it."

The commission needs to digest a \$95,607 budget increase, a 10.8 percent increase over the school's FY 2010 budget for Norwood. Ciccolo said this increase was due in part to the state's Chapter 70 funding formula, which establishes minimum spending requirements for each school district and minimum requirements for each municipality's share of school costs.

Norwood's minimum contribution for FY 2011 is \$743,185, up from \$644,261 in FY 2010, a \$98,924 increase.

"The state made a decision - almost \$100,000," Ciccolo said. "These are not the costs set by

Blue Hills. They are a set by the state."

Norwood's 10.8 percent increase is the largest any town faces this year. Not all towns see a budget increase, in fact, Avon sees an 18.9 percent Blue Hills' budget decrease, while Milton sees a 9.08 percent decrease.

Ciccolo said the discrepancy was for two reasons. First, student enrollment from both Avon and Milton decreased. Second, and more importantly, the minimum contribution amount set by the state for those two towns decreased. Avon's minimum contribution amount fell from \$533,921 to \$448,808, while Milton's minimum contribution amount decreased from \$509,942 to \$477,630. These decreases led to these towns facing a smaller Blue Hills FY 2011 budget, while Norwood's increased enrollment and minimum contribution amount led to a higher FY 2011 budget.

While Norwood faces a 10.8 percent budget increase, the overall Blue Hills Regional Technical School budget increased by 1.46 percent. Their proposed FY 2011 budget is \$17,210,904.

Senior floor moving slowly

Unruly seniors will miss some Bingo

Construction of the new floor at the Senior Center began on April 22, and construction will continue until late May.

"We're not expecting the construction to be completed by May 19 or 20," Senior Center Executive Director Dorothy Vitale said, adding she informed the contractor they expect the work to be done by the May 19 date.

However, the status of the work was an area of concern for Council on Aging (COA) Chairman Tony Mastandrea, who has visited the site on multiple occasions, said what he saw was disappointing. He found that on some days just one employee was working on the site, while on other days no one was present.

"I thought the contractor would kind of expeditiously work on the floor," Mastandrea said.

"I'm very disappointed," he added. "The floor is not being done as quickly as we thought it would."

The contractor in question is Capital Carpet and Flooring, a Woburn based floor-covering contractor that is charging \$56,946 for the project. The project involves removing the existing floating floor and replacing it with a 1/2 inch engineered wood

plank floor for the 1,000 square-foot dance floor and a commercial luxury vinyl plank flooring material with a wood-like appearance for the remaining 4,300 square feet of space.

Vitale reported they were busy with the hardwood floor, saying, "The hardwood floor on the dance area is being installed as we speak," at the May 6 COA meeting.

Due to the construction, the large function room cannot be used. This has affected numerous offerings, including the ever-popular bingo games, which are typically held every Wednesday at 1 p.m.

It looked like bingo was to be cancelled during the construction period, but the Knights of Columbus stepped forward and offered use of their hall. Vitale said those with the Knights were very generous, having provided seniors with use of the hall, bingo equipment, coffee machines and more. The sole condition was that the Knights of Columbus caller would officiate the game, which Vitale agreed to.

However, after the actions of several seniors at last week's game, who yelled at the caller and left the Knights of Columbus Hall a mess, the games scheduled for May 12 and 19 were cancelled.

"The behavior of many se-

niors during last week's bingo game was unacceptable," Vitale said. "I'm still getting reports of how horrible it was."

While the Knights of Columbus offered to let the seniors use the hall further, Vitale decided against it, saying, "I'm the person that cancelled the games, and I have no qualms about it. People went crazy."

Vitale described the behavior of some of the seniors as "embarrassing" and "outrageous," a sentiment Mastandrea agreed with.

"They left the place an absolute disgrace," Mastandrea said.

When bingo games resume at the Senior Center's function room, Vitale will address the behavior further.

Bad behavior of a few seniors will not ruin entertainment at the Senior Center for others. At the April COA meeting, Stanley Wasil asked about the possibility of acquiring a Ping-Pong table, something Vitale and the COA have considered a fold-away Ping-Pong table on wheels and place it in the function room for use on Thursday and Friday afternoons.

"We are looking into that," Vitale said. "We have the money for it."

Town Meeting notes

Town Meeting members (TM) were busy Monday night, getting through all 29 articles on the Special Town Meeting warrant. As a result, TM members approved funding for everything from sewer system relining in the Meadowbrook area to Civic Center security improvements.

The initial motion by the Finance Commission was to indefinitely postpone the \$45,000 for security-related improvements at the Civic Center. FinCom Chairman Alan Slater said the board wasn't against improving security at the site, they just felt the plan had not been properly vetted through other town agencies. Slater noted the Budget Balancing Committee or the Capital Outlay Committee had not discussed these plans.

"It's something we didn't feel received enough discussion prior to the vote," Slater said.

However, the Board of Selectmen and TM members voted to appropriate the \$45,000 from free cash for the improvements.

"This is intended to tighten up security and protect the integrity of the entrance of the civic," Board of Selectmen Chairman Jerry Kelleher said. "The Selectmen feel its valuable to get this moving now."

District 1 TM member Richard Shay questioned if the improvements would be necessary, saying, "When you spend money on security, you're supposed to save money or limit risk in a substantial way."

Selectman and District 8 TM member Michael Lyons said they have a collection of incidents at the Civic Center, coupled with threats of serious harm to the employees. These modifications to the entrance would improve security at the site.

"The Civic Center has had the problem of just having no idea who's in the building at any given time," Lyons said, which would improve access control.

Selectman Bill Plasko had a similar comment, saying, "This is, in our opinion, a risk man-

agement [issue]. There have been issues at the Civic Center we are concerned about."

The newly approved \$45,000 will help address some of these concerns. The work will involve pushing the front wall of the office forward, toward the Civic Center entrance, and setting up a counter window directly on the corridor to serve the public entering the building. At the current time, because of the layout, it is difficult for someone sitting at the secretary desk to monitor the building's entrance.

The University Avenue project was discussed by TM members, who voted to authorize the taking of a 9,000 square-foot strip of land on University Avenue via eminent domain. Eminent domain is the power of the state to seize citizen's property with due monetary compensation, but without the owner's consent. The property in question, a 15-foot wide strip, has an assessed value of \$105,000. The \$105,000 will be taken out of the Public Works Economic Development Grant, a \$1,554,146 state grant used to fund the project.

Taking it will allow for the widening of the section of Route 1 up to the Analog entrance, which will be used to create an additional lane of traffic. The land in question is owned by the Everett Street Trust, and the trustees are dispersed all across the country, meaning it is near impossible to get them allow together to agree to granting the town the land. General Manager John Carroll has spoken with representatives from the Everett Street Trust, who agreed it makes sense to take the land via eminent domain.

"They don't object to the taking," Carroll said, later adding, "They know we're going to take it via eminent domain."

Carroll added that the Everett Street Trust has neither stated a figure they are looking for nor done an appraisal of the land on their own.

"We've given them every opportunity to do so, and they didn't," Carroll said. He feels the town's \$105,000 appraisal is fair, and if they appeal that amount, the town is prepared to defend it in court.

Not everyone agreed with the assessment. Selectman and District 6 TM member Helen Abdallah-Donohue fear that by taking the land, the town might find itself is a lengthy legal battle.

Of the \$105,000 appraisal, Donohue said, "I don't think we could defend that in court."

She was also concerned that this could end up similar to the Route 1/Dean Street intersection project, which proved to be problematic due to light sequencing and timing issues.

Plasko said comparing these intersections was like comparing apples to oranges. The num-

ber and timing of lights on University Avenue is not the issue here - it is the backed-up traffic that already exists at the site, especially during rush hour.

"We're trying to deal with traffic that already exists at the intersection today," Plasko said.

Though there were a few no's, the firm majority of TM members voted to authorize the land taking.

TM members also voted to authorize Treasurer Robert Maguire to borrow \$1.6 million from the Massachusetts Water Pollution Abatement Trust to perform sewer rehabilitation in the Meadowbrook area. The 20 year loan hold a two percent or less interest rate, meaning it will cost at least \$80,000 per year.

"This project is going to be funded out of water and sewer rates," Carroll said.

Carroll stressed that the town had to do this project. Both the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and Department of Environmental Protection have classified this project as a high priority. In addition, the EPA has issued an administrative order to the town of Norwood mandating the implementation of corrective action in the Meadowbrook area.

The corrective action in question is the installation of cured-in-place lining on the existing main line. Lining the sewer pipes would eliminate the high e. coli counts in the area. A test program of this lining system was done at 1,000 feet of pipe in the Guild Street area. Prior to the lining, the e. coli count was as high as 50,000 parts per million. After the lining, this number dropped to zero.

The Meadowbrook project was not the only sewer related project approved at TM. Members voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow \$500,000 from the Massachusetts Water Resource Authority, which will allow the town to clean and line several water mains in town. The loan in question would be a no interest loan, and TM members unanimously supported the borrowing for both these sewer projects.

TM members also appropriate money to address issues that arose from the March flooding. Members gave \$12,000 to offset flood-related expenses at the Norwood Memorial Airport and \$43,850 for the Department of Public Works to cover overtime, repairs, tree removal and other miscellaneous costs associated with flooding. Up to 75 percent of these funds will be reimbursed by Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

When asked why FEMA would only fund 75 percent of these costs, Assistant General Manager Bernie Cooper said, "It's 75 percent because that's what the feds say it is," and any money they do receive will go into the town's General Fund.

PBCC satisfied with pace HS on budget and ahead of schedule

As of April 30, about 44 percent of the funds associated with the new Norwood High School construction project have been expended, and the project remains both on budget and ahead of schedule.

As of April 30, the town has spent \$27,751,010 on the project, and is about 44 percent project is complete. The project remains ahead of schedule, which can be seen by comparing the cash flow to that of the Whitman-Hanson project.

At this point, Whitman-Hanson had spent \$25,767,817, meaning Norwood has spent approximately 7.7 percent more than them. The Whitman-Hanson Regional High School project is being used as the model for the Norwood High School project, so comparing the amount spent between the two projects can show about how far ahead of schedule Norwood is.

"I'm satisfied with where we are," Permanent Building Construction Committee Chairman Ted Callahan said at their May 6 meeting.

Of this \$27,751,010, a total of \$24,764,904 has been submitted to the Massachusetts State Building Authority (MSBA) for reimbursement. The MSBA has reimbursed \$14,464,763, or 58.54 percent, of the amount sub-

mitted thus far. The MSBA is set to fund \$38,110,505, about 55.5 percent, of the project's overall \$68,655,476 price tag.

While the project is approximately 44 percent done, the contingency does not reflect this. At the beginning of the work, a \$2.3 million contingency budget was set aside, and as of May 6, \$2,162,197 remains in this budget, meaning only \$137,808 of this budget has been set.

This represents about 5.99 percent of the contingency budget, meaning the while the project is nearly halfway done, over 94 percent of contingency funding remains.

Contingency funds are used for unforeseen occurrences or scope changes in the project. So far, funds have been used for a variety of things, including removing organics in the western parking lot, adding access control at the front entrance and improving the egress at the gymnasium after its demolition.

These change orders are handled by the PBCC, who approved a \$15,841.81 change order at their May 6 meeting. These funds were used to cover several elements of the project, the most expensive of which was a \$5,388 amount for a roof and roof drain. The drain needed to be relocated, as it was in conflict with the duct work at the site.

The PBCC also approved giving Ai3 \$2,800 to work on re-

designing the landscaping at the Peabody Road side of the school. The planned changes are due to input received from abutters from the Peabody Road and Bellevue Avenue at a meeting held on April 1. Several nearby residents argued that the proposed plantings at the site, specifically the evergreen Arbor vitae trees, would not provide them with sufficient screening.

The trees in question could grow between 14 and 20 feet over a ten-year period, and abutters are concerned that won't be tall enough. PBCC member Paul Meyer agreed that added screening at the site would be beneficial.

"If you got back in that corner, the school looks really large," he said, and additional or taller trees at the site could help create a buffer between the school and the neighborhood.

The new design will feature tweak the access road to the new Norwood High School, allowing for them to plant larger trees at the site. This new design will be presented to abutters at an evening meeting to be held at a later date. This new option will be based entirely on neighborhood input received at that April 1 meeting, and it will attempt to address some of the abutter concerns.

Fire Department gets funding Chief still concerned about substitution spending

The Finance Commission unanimously voted to approve a \$30,000 transfer under the Municipal Relief Act, allowing the Fire Department to handle their dwindling substitution account for the remainder of the fiscal year.

This \$30,000 transfer increases the substitution account to \$88,891.32, bringing it to \$636,000 for fiscal year 2010. This increase should allow them to maintain minimum staffing at the department, Fire Department Chief Michael Howard said.

"While continuing to try and manage within the current funds available to the Substitution Account, it is necessary for these additional funds to be transferred under the Municipal Relief Act to the Substitution Account, in order to maintain safe staffing levels and protection for the citizens of Norwood as we move forward," Howard wrote in a letter to the FinCom, adding that without additional funding, he has found himself operating with 11 firefighters, putting him below the recommended minimum staffing amount, "which has an impact on safety and

coverage, and, at times, requires apparatus to be placed out of service depending on the type of emergency call received."

FinCom member Judy Langone asked if they have to worry about any signs being placed on out-of-use apparatus, much like a cardboard sign declaring "OUT OF SERVICE DUE TO LACK OF FUNDING" was placed on Ambulance 2 in March. Howard stated that issue was dealt with, and confirmed it would not happen again.

The \$30,000 addition is on top of \$80,000 in substitution funding received at April's Special Town Meeting and \$40,000 received via reserve fund transfers. Howard hoped the \$80,000 increase would last through the remainder of Fiscal Year 2010, but due to four injuries since the April 12 TM, the substitution account was exhausted quicker than anticipated.

As of April 30, just \$58,891.32 remained in the substitution account, though the \$30,000 Municipal Relief Act transfer boosts this to \$88,891.32. The Municipal Relief Act allows for money to be moved within department budgets during the last two months

of the fiscal year.

According to Howard, the department identified approximately \$57,000 in the current budget that could be transferred, but he did not want to use this entire amount for substitution at this time, should another need arise during the remainder of the fiscal year. The \$30,000 amount should get the department through June.

"It will allow me to keep everything in service and keep minimum staffing," Howard said.

Much like he did at last week's Board of Selectmen meeting, Howard expressed concern about the FY11 substitution account. The Fire Department received a \$486,000 appropriation to work with for FY11, much like it did for FY10. Since he will start the fiscal year with at least three injuries, Howard is concerned the department will burn through the substitution account budget very quickly.

"I'm very concerned about that," Howard said, noting that July and August were typically the department's biggest months, and that the amount spent on substitution during those months could cost over \$160,000.
