

NAC lease at odds with FAA

Norwood Memorial Airport has been mired in controversy since its Airport Commission and Boston Executive Helicopters have been engaged in a legal battle stemming from BEH's application to become a fixed base operator.

Legal documents from the litigation have revealed another possible controversy, this time regarding land use.

In 2007, the Airport leased a "crescent-shaped parcel of Town Land" totaling 47,775 square feet on the easterly side of Access Road - as shown on a plan developed by Town Engineer Mark Ryan - to Annex Realty Trust and David Spiegel with a lease term of 10 years with the option for five-year extensions.

However, because the land is part of the Airport, the FAA has insisted several times it be only for aeronautical use.

In fact, a Jan. 9, 2015 letter from FAA Airports Division Manager Mary Walsh to Airport Manager Russ Maguire said that the FAA did not agree with the Town in its request for release of the land for non-aeronautical use.

"The FAA is aware that this parcel of property is currently rented at non-aeronautical fair market value for vehicle parking," the letter reads. "The FAA also understands that there has been some interest in leasing this property for aeronautical development. Finally, during FAA land use inspection, the airport had been described by airport officials as having little or minimal available ramp space."

The original lease issued by the Airport stipulated that no structures could be built on the land other than a fence and the property was to be used for storage of new automobiles or to provide parking. The lease said the land could

Pump dispute leads ConCom to reiterate authority

The Conservation Commission decided not to fine a Leyton Road resident for installing a water pump it considered to be permanent without the Commission's knowledge, but appeared to use the matter to highlight the body's jurisdiction over waterways in Town.

In May, the Commission issued an enforcement order to Gerry Miller, Norwood's Recreation Director, requesting that he remove a water pump for a lawn irrigation system and the cinder blocks used to keep the pump in the water from Germany Brook, which runs behind Miller's house.

The matter was brought to the commission's attention after a complaint

that Miller had been using rocks and cement blocks to hold the pump in the water, creating a dam that had killed fish that were prevented from moving upstream. The Conservation Commission then investigated the matter and sent cease and desist notices before issuing the enforcement order.



Norwood luring Biotech company with TIF agreement

The Norwood Board of Selectmen agreed to a tax increment financing (TIF) agreement on July 26 that it hopes will lure a growing biotech company into town.

Earlier this year, Moderna - which uses messenger RNA to develop medical drugs - said it was considering Norwood as a possible new location for its facilities and asked for a meeting with Town officials.

Moderna was founded in 2011 and is currently headquartered in Cambridge. It currently employs 440 people and is partnered with leading biotech and health corporations, including Merck and AstraZeneca.

Senior vice president of clinical supply operations Steve Harbin said the company was "at the front of the leading edge" of the field.

Moderna identified the former Polaroid site on Upland Rd., now owned by Campanelli, as a site they were interested in occupying. Harbin said it would not be a factory with heavy machinery, but a high-tech facility with plenty of automation and laboratory space.

According to Harbin, if Moderna were to move to this site, it would lease and renovate the 200,431 square foot building and invest \$110 million into the project, including \$80 million in construction costs. Harbin also said permit fees could generate around \$400,000.

Harbin also said he conservatively estimated that Moderna and its employees spend around \$5 million annually in area businesses, including retail, restaurants, hotels and other services - which would benefit Norwood and the surrounding area if it chose the Norwood site.

Moderna estimates that

100 full-time jobs would be relocated from Cambridge, and 120 new full-time jobs would be created at all levels of the business.

Norwood officials, as well as Moderna representatives, noted that the move would mean significant tax revenue increases to the Town based on hotels, meals, and property taxes. Members of the Economic Development Committee noted that the former Polaroid site is currently the subject of tax abatements.

But the deal isn't a sure thing.

As the company's biggest project to date, Harbin said, "it isn't an easy decision to make."

Economic Development Committee chair Steve Costello said that neither side got all of what they wanted in negotiations, but felt it was fair. According to Costello, Moderna would have a 40 percent tax exemption for the first 10 years of its lease, with Norwood collecting the remaining 60 percent, amounting to around \$253,237. Beginning in year 11, Costello said, the figure would jump to around \$422,000.

Costello noted that Moderna had initially asked for more, and that other communities Moderna was interested in had offered more, but both parties appeared pleased with the results. He said the Town's offer represented similar deals offered to businesses, like Steel Art, in the past.

"We're matching that interest in attracting them," he said.

Costello reiterated that the jobs and economic benefits Moderna mentioned were real and if it didn't uphold its end of the agreement, the TIF would go away. He also said if Moderna left prematurely, the TIF would not continue at the property. Town Counsel

also reviewed the agreement.

"This is the type of thing we need here in Norwood," Selectman Helen Abdallah Donohue said. She also said that the Economic Development Committee represented some of the Town's best business minds.

"If they trust you, then I trust you too," she said to the Moderna representatives.

Selectman Bill Plasko, who is also part of the Economic Development Committee, referred to the company as rock stars in their industry, and both parties noted the significance of luring an up-and-coming biotech company south of I-90.

The deal attracted a great deal of attention among Town officials, and Town Planner Paul Halkiotis, several Finance Commissioners and Planning Board members were in attendance at the meeting. Town Clerk and Accountant Tom McQuaid, who used to work in the industry, also lauded the deal.

"This makes a significant marketing statement," Costello said. "What can we do to market Norwood, we know how great it is, how do we spread the word? This is one way to spread the word."

The Selectmen voted unanimously to approve the agreement. Before it can be enacted, the matter must also go before Town Meeting.

OPINION

True, it's not the most egregious of offenses

The Front Page of this week's newspaper will, no doubt, generate the usual criticisms about how we like to pick on town employees or sensationalize what many may consider a minor offense. And some of the criticisms over the years were probably warranted. However, if we were to stop and analyze the value of information we gather against whether or not it would be good for business before releasing said information, we would be doing Norwood residents a grave disservice.

The story this week relative to Norwood Recreation Director Gerry Miller's using water from Germany Brook to water his lawn isn't an earth shattering revelation, or to make him Public Enemy #1. In fact, if Mr. Miller wasn't a highly recognized Town official the issue would probably have never been brought to our attention. However, he is and it was so here we are.

This newspaper considers it relevant for a couple of reasons. First, water scarcity is becoming a bigger and bigger issue. All one has to do is look out the front window and see how burnt and dead looking the grass is as after only a few months of lower than average rainfall as an example. Water is more valuable than any precious metal or currency, and needs to be treated as such. It is imperative that organizations and commissions established to regulate, monitor and enforce water usage rules are recognized and respected for the work they do. No one makes friends sitting on a conservation commission and there are many out there who think these people are autocratic and take issues to ridiculous extremes and, quite frankly, sometimes they do. When the mating season of the Piping Plover can close busy roadways and beaches, it's difficult not to shake your head and think it's insane.

Gerry Miller, as the front page pictures illustrate, built a fairly elaborate system of extracting water from the brook. He even admitted he used an installation company to set the system up. He said he asked various Town officials whether it was okay to use the water and was told it was. However, the feeling here is that if he wasn't sure about the usage of the water, his first stop should have been the Conservation Commission. It is difficult to believe, knowing Mr. Miller's understanding of Norwood's infrastructure, that he didn't know he should have asked them. It strains credulity, to say the least. And when told extracting water from a brook was allowed as long as it was temporary, he inquired if drawing from the brook from April to November, coincidentally the period of time most people use an irrigation system, would be considered "temporary," it came across as mocking the process.

The second reason we consider the story relevant is that one Selectman might have thought it okay to get involved on Mr. Miller's behalf. Paul Bishop had no reason to be sticking his nose into a matter with no Selectman jurisdiction. One might presume, perhaps with good reason, that if our source is correct, Selectman Bishop was trying to use his position as an elected official to influence peddle. Through email correspondence he said he had no "information on the issue", whatever that means.

The Conservation Commission chose not to fine Mr. Miller for his transgressions. The fines, under the law, could have been substantial. We think it fair to question, though we don't believe it to be true, that Mr. Miller received preferential treatment either due to his position with the Town or pressure from a public official. That's why we published the story and, as usual, leave it to the reader to establish the significance of it.

Norwood man in plane crash succumbs to injuries

One of the men killed when a plane bound for Norwood Airport crashed in Westwood, a Norwood resident, passed away in the hospital last week after suffering serious injuries in the crash.

Hylie "Lee" Hutchens, 77, of Norwood, passed away on July 20. Norwood residents, especially younger ones, will remember Hutchens as a Norwood Public Schools substitute teacher and as a longtime umpire and referee for youth sports, particularly baseball and football.

Hutchens, a Navy veteran and former tire shop manager and insurance consultant, was born in Ohio, and moved to Norwood after his service in the Navy's submarine corps. Hutchens became an accomplished referee, working the sideline of New England Patriots football games and serving as an umpire for over 25 years.

NPATV Executive Director Jack Tolman said Hutchens became a well-liked substitute teacher at Norwood High School after meeting former

principal George Usevich -- who was on the PA mic at Patriots games. Tolman, who used to instant replay at the games, also got to know Hutchens well during that time.

"He was the type of sub that the kids knew, okay, they got to get their work done," Tolman said. "He knew when to give a little leeway. He took it real seriously, and had teachers' lesson plans. He was there for so long, kids respected him."

Tolman said he also knew Hutchens as a little league umpire and referred to him as "ref," and as a generous and charitable man who was a member of the Norwood Ma-

sons.

"He said to me, 'you can't stay still. You have to keep moving,'" Tolman said.

Hutchens, an aircraft pilot, was also very involved in goings-on at Norwood Airport, and served on the Norwood Airport Commission from 2014-2015.

Hutchens was a passenger in the small aircraft that crashed in the Pear Tree Drive area of Westwood on July 16, though the cause of the incident is still under investigation. Hutchens and the pilot were both flown to Boston Medical Center for treatment at the time.



Development at intersection delayed

A dormant corner of Nahatan and Lenox streets is slated to be redeveloped, but

perhaps not at any time in the immediate future.

Directly across from Norwood Plaza and next to Dunkin Donuts, the corner holds two plots: 143 Nahatan St. and 60 Lenox St. 143 Nahatan St. was once a Mobil gas station, which has since been razed and is now a vacant .68-acre lot, while the now-closed Concannon's Village function hall and pub sits at 60 Lenox St.

The Concannon's Village property is set to be sold to Canton-based developers KAM Construction Management, which seeks to replace the existing building with an 18-unit town home development project. The project - which originally called for 20 units, but has been scaled back to include a small park - received a variance and approval from the Zoning Board of Appeals in May, and will go before the Planning Board in August.

"We have it under agreement, subject to the approvals," John Marini of KAM Construction said. "I have to have it in before I close on the deal -

which expires, I think, Sept. 14 or 15. Once we close, we're going to start construction right away."

The Zoning Board approved a variance for the project that allowed six units more than are typically allowed on a commercial plot of land, per the town's zoning laws. During the public hearing with the Zoning Board, many nearby residents brought up concerns about the number of units on the property - the two units that were nixed would have been on an adjacent residential plot - and increased traffic on Lenox and Williams streets, but said they would be happy to see the site redeveloped into owned housing.

Marini and his team scaled back the project, reduced a two-way entrance on Williams Street to a one-way exit and assured residents that they would not affect a nearby swale on Town property that protects the Public Safety Building on Nahatan Street from flooding.

At the hearing, several residents from another nearby

Town Saves \$2.466 Million and receives \$1.743 Million Net bond Premium

Robert, Marsh, Town Treasurer, received competitive bids from bond underwriters on Tuesday, July 19 2016 for \$43,120,000, 20-year new money and refunding bond issue. Raymond James & Associates, Inc. was the winning bidder on the Bonds with an average interest rate of 1.96%. The Town received a total of 8 bids on the Bonds ranging from 1.96% to 2.12%. Bond proceeds will be used to finance various capital projects and to refinance portions of bonds originally issued in January and August of 2009, saving the town \$2.466 million in debt service costs over the remaining life of the bonds.

The issuance of the bonds by Mr. Marsh was strongly supported by the Board of Selectmen, Finance Commission, Thomas McQuaid, Town Clerk and Accountant and outside financial advisors.

Prior to the sale, Standard & Poor's Rating

Services, a municipal bond credit rating agency, assigned a rating of 'AA+' to the Bonds. The AA+ rating, which is equal to the rating on the federal governments bonds, is one notch below the highest rating attainable. The rating agency cited the Towns very strong economy, strong management with goods financial policies, strong budgetary flexibility, very strong liquidity and a very strong debt and contingent liabilities position as positive credit factors.

At closing on July 28, 2016, the Town will receive a net premium of \$1.743 million in addition to the \$21,715,200 principal for the new money projects.

The bids for the Bonds were accepted at the offices of the Town's Financial advisor, FirstSouthwest, a Division of Hilltop Securities, at 54 Canal street in Boston, Massachusetts.

Marini development - 51-unit Lenox Station - spoke in favor of the project and of the developer.

Zoning Board member Patrick Mulvehill said at the time that he was "absolutely in favor" of the project.

"I think that it is a valid reuse of that hot-top," he said of the property, at which Norwood resident Tom Concannon had run the function hall since 1974. "To see it go this route in another use is a good send-off. I think it's going to enhance the neighborhood as well."

In front of Concannon's Village, which fronts on Lenox Street, is the vacant 143 Nahatan St. site, now co-owned by TD Bank, which intends to build a bank branch there. The other owner, Paul C. Gay, also owns 141 Nahatan St., which is the Dunkin Donuts location.

"We removed the tanks and cleaned it up and I assume that we'll hear something soon from TD about what they want to do," John Stewart of Norwood-based Arista Development, LLC.

A representative from

project engineers Bohler Engineering went before the Conservation Commission on July 20 to request an extension of an existing three-year Determination of Applicability for the project, as he said TD Bank had other projects around the country prioritized ahead of this one and construction would not likely begin until 2017.

The Conservation Commission gave the project a one-year extension to match a similar extension from the Planning Board.



Miller said he had put the irrigation system in several years ago, and anchored it with small stones. Around two years ago, Miller said he noticed that the stones had been removed and the pump had floated downstream several times, leading him to use the cinder blocks, which is when he caught a neighbor removing the blocks.

According to Miller, the irrigation system installer, DPW superintendent Mark Ryan and Building Inspector Mark Chubet said he could draw water from the brook.

what structures if any are required to do that,” DiMaria said.

Conservation Agent Al Goetz said that residents are allowed to draw water from the brook, even if they are not residents - often times a truck will come and do it and bring it to the property in a matter of hours, he said. Goetz also noted that both sides of the brook are fully within Miller’s property and whoever had been removing the stones keeping the pump in place had been trespassing.

Miller asked if a system that

we were bypassed on that.”

A source close to the issue also said privately that the Conservation Commission was approached by a member of the Board of Selectmen, Paul Bishop, and asked why they were “picking on Gerry.”

Bishop, who is currently out of the country, responded to questions about his involvement via email.

“Sorry but I don’t have any information on the issue,” Bishop said.

Doyle said that if they allowed Miller to have the pump

Commissioner Joseph DiMaria said that state and local laws allow for citizens to draw as much water “as will not disturb the flow of water downstream if everyone downstream extracts the same amount of water.”


“We are not opposed to having people use the water that comes down the brook...however we are opposed to doing it without coming to the Commission and filing the notice of intent that you choose to do that, and exactly

went in last April and came out in November was considered temporary, but Commission chair Cheryl Doyle said that it was not, and that most people dropped a pump into water bodies for a few hours before removing it. Goetz said he was not aware of any requirements for pumps to be temporary.

“Any structure that stays in a water body for any amount of time passed a few hours, that’s permanent. That’s hardwired in, goes through hardwired system, other piping,” Doyle said, noting that she did not want similar apparatuses showing up in every brook in town.

Doyle said that because it was never filed with the Commission, they could have fined Miller up to \$300 a day. She appeared to take issue with the fact that Miller asked other officials about the pump, but not the Commission, because without a filing for that structure, anyone else could start doing similar things without notifying the proper channels.

“It was never filed with us. It was never mentioned to (Goetz) as the agent,” she said. “Anybody doing anything with any water bodies in this town is supposed to contact the agent or a member of this board and go through this board because the building department, planning department and the rest of them don’t have jurisdiction over the water bodies. This board has jurisdiction on the water bodies. So

and not follow the enforcement order, others could “snub their nose” at the Commission, which would lose its credibility and “ability to protect water bodies in this town.”

“We have people watching us that are waiting for us to do a misstep...we can’t do it. We don’t have a choice,” Doyle said. “Everybody (has to be treated) exactly the same.”

Miller said he was unaware that he had to file anything with the Conservation Commission - though Commissioners noted it was on the Town’s website - and that he wasn’t trying to circumvent anything.

The Commission ordered that the pump be detached - which Miller had already done - and that it be removed from the embankment of the brook, in case water levels rose and the pump became submerged underwater.

hold 160 automobiles.

In 2010, Spiegel subleased the property to Verizon New England Inc., which was approved by the Airport Commission, for the purpose of parking service and employee vehicles.

According to the Jan. 9 letter, the FAA expected the Town to "make every effort" to develop the property "for the benefit of civil aviation, to address the lack of available ramp space at Norwood Memorial Airport."

During the November 2015 Airport Commission meeting, the Commissioners discussed Spiegel's right to extend the lease for another five years. The matter was passed on to Town Counsel, though to this newspaper's knowledge, was not discussed again in open session.

During that meeting, Maguire said the land is not connected to the airport proper and was therefore not known to be airport land for years. When it was discovered, the Airport spent \$60,911 improving it for non-aviation use without state or federal participation and Maguire said it brings in almost \$40,000 a year.

According to FAA spokesman Jim Peters, the Jan. 9 letter represents the FAA's latest position on the matter.

"The letter outlines the actions that the airport should take," Peters said.

Maguire was hesitant to speculate what the FAA's actions would be if it did not authorize the release of the land.

When the property is mentioned in the legal Complaint BEH lodged against the Airport, it is said to be partially "within

the runway 10/28 Runway Protection Zone."

The Airport Master Plan recommended that the Town purchase all of the Runway 10's Runway Protection Zone land. The plan also mentions lack of parking at the end of the Airport where this land - used for parking - sits. Maguire said the current use of the land was not a threat to the airport operation.

In November, Maguire said they were still waiting on the approval of the formal process to have the land released from aeronautical use - a process which he said began around four years prior, after the land was leased out. He said the Airport Commission was unaware of the required formal process at the time.

According to the January 2015 letter from Walsh, the FAA received a request for releasing the land on March 8, 2012, and this letter was a follow up to a similar letter sent in March 2010.

The Airport Commission approved the sublease of the land on Aug. 6, 2010.

In that Ground Lessor's Consent, there is language that says the Airport Commission "consents to the improvements to the leased premises to be made in accordance with the Sublease ... to the extent applicable, by the Town of Norwood Planning Board in connection with the grant of various special permits to the Lessee."

In other words, Verizon appears to be able to make improvements or be granted special permits to develop the land for non-aeronautical uses that several years later, the FAA requested be maintained for aeronautical purposes.

When asked if the Airport was required to follow FAA's requirements, and what would happen if it did not, Peters declined to comment on the scenario.

"It would be premature to speculate on that," Peters said, again referring to the recommendations included in the Jan. 9 letter.

Reached earlier this month, Maguire said he had to check with Town Counsel to see whether Spiegel's lease extensions outlined in the lease could legally be granted, but noted in the application to release the land that he believed the lot's current use was bringing money into the airport to fund aeronautical activity.

Maguire later said environmental specialists examined the property -- a "virtual island," he called it -- and found that 5,000 square feet of wetlands would need to be filled in in order for the land to be used as ramp space. Doing so, Maguire said, would be against federal regulations. Maguire said the Airport was doing its due diligence to investigate the possibilities outlined in the FAA's recommendations.

Norwood Legion baseball's surprise tournament run comes to an end against Pittsfield

Midnight finally struck for Norwood Post 70, as their run through the Massachusetts Final Eight tournament ended with a 14-8 loss vs. Pittsfield Post 68 on Tuesday.

Falling behind 14-0 after the top of the sixth inning doomed Norwood, which saw Pittsfield - the defending state champions - build an insurmountable lead in increments: five runs in the second, five runs in the fourth and four more in the fifth.

Facing its second slaughter of the tournament heading into the last of the seventh, Norwood rallied to score five runs and get within single digits of Pittsfield and stave off the 10-run rule.

Post 70 tacked on one more in the eighth and two more in the ninth to make it respectable - if not interesting for a moment

- but couldn't complete what would have been a comeback heard round the world.

"We did it to ourselves," Norwood manager Paul Samargedlis said after the game. "We should've been playing defense."

In all, Norwood committed six errors, four behind starting pitcher Paul Galvin. It simply took the offense too long to get going against Pittsfield starter Ross Omelenchuck to compensate for the defense, as Norwood had only one hit - a Mike Flynn single - in the first four innings.

The offense awoke later in the game, with one noticeable contributor coming off the bench. Denny Drummey, playing in his final game for Norwood, went 3-for-3 after entering in the seventh inning, a line which featured a leadoff triple in the eighth.

Jake O'Rourke, also playing

in his final legion game, went out with a bang, driving in a pair on a single in the eighth - his last official at-bat - and drawing a walk and coming around to score the last run of Norwood's season in the ninth.

Danny Sullivan, who's bound for Worcester Polytechnic (WPI) in the fall, drove in O'Rourke with a double in the ninth to cap off an outstanding summer at the plate. He finished especially strong, batting .375 (3-for-8) over the final two games with three RBIs.

Post 70's season wraps up at 13-12, dodging the possibility of finishing with a losing record at the beginning of the Final Eight by going 2-2.

Norwood beats S. Attleboro 10-5

After Norwood fell to Walpole in last summer's District 6 postseason, Jake O'Rourke figured he'd take advantage of his final year of le-

gion eligibility in 2016.

The 2015 graduate of Norwood High School had to watch from afar this spring as the Mustangs fell short of repeating as state champions, and had his summer season interrupted by his commitment to the army through the ROTC program at The Citadel, where he attends college; O'Rourke played in just six regular season games for Post 70 before leaving for Fort Knox, Ky. in June.

On the heels of a stunning 10-0 loss vs. Shrewsbury Post 397, O'Rourke - along with several of his Norwood teammates - prepped for what could have been the final time they'd ever wear a Norwood uniform.

Instead, O'Rourke's go-ahead bases-clearing double in the bottom of the seventh ensured Post 70 would live to see another day, putting his team ahead 6-4 en route to a 10-

5 victory over South Attleboro Post 312 on Day 3 of the Final Eight.

And for O'Rourke, he proved he still had it despite a lengthy layoff, finishing 3-for-5 with three RBIs and two runs scored.

"I definitely felt good in the cages prior to the tournament, but once I got a few real game at-bats, see some live pitching under me...we're in the third game now so I definitely feel a lot more comfortable," O'Rourke said after the game. "I feel a lot better seeing a pitch out of the hand."

Mike Keady drew the start on the hill for Norwood, earning the nod literally minutes before the game began. Keady was solid on the mound for Norwood, lasting 4 2/3 innings while allowing four runs (only two earned) on six hits, no

Jr. Legion are District Champs

Call it a fashionably late arrival, but the Norwood Post 70 Jrs. managed to show up before the bouncer shut the doors for the evening.

Norwood spotted Franklin Post 75 a 5-0 lead after two innings of play in the District 6 championship game last Wednesday at Braintree High School, setting the stage for them to back in to the Final Eight tournament.

Instead, Norwood made a grand entrance into the statewide tournament in Greenfield by rallying for an 8-6 win over Franklin to capture the District 6 crown.

"I felt like we were a little lackluster, a low-energy," Norwood manager Dan Harrington said after his team completed the comeback. "They did have a relaxed attitude because they knew we were going out there. They're excited; they're still kids."

With the top two finishers in District 6 assured statewide tournament berths, Norwood had clinched a spot in Greenfield prior to the game.

Michael Dooley started on the mound for Norwood, escaping the first inning unscathed but watched Franklin jump on his fastball in the second to string together a five-run inning in which the team batted around.

Dooley departed the mound

after the third inning, but stayed in the game at third base for Norwood. It's once he got to the hot corner he truly made his mark on the game for Post 70.

Norwood had gotten two runs back in the third inning - the first of which came on a Dooley RBI double - but still trailed 5-2 in the fifth inning. Kyle Mackie relieved Dooley, successfully holding Franklin off the scoreboard in the fourth inning, and was pitching well in the fifth when a Franklin batter uncorked a lined shot towards third base.

Dooley dove to his left, leaving his feet to catch the ball bound for the gap in left-center field, and fired on to first base for an inning-ending double play. If you want to know why Norwood was able to complete its comeback, look no further than this play, according to Harrington.

"That was really where I feel like the momentum shifted towards us," he said. "Our bats were better, our approach was better; we had base runners all game, but we weren't coming up with clutch hits."

Norwood tacked on two in the bottom of the fifth to cut the deficit to a single run, 5-4, but gave one right back to Franklin in the top of the sixth.

Dooley again answered the call for Norwood, leading the inning off with a single to ignite a four-run frame that would put his team ahead.

Dooley scored on a Cam Flahive single to make it 6-5 in favor of Franklin, and it was Mackie's two-run double which propelled Norwood on top for good. Charlie Gover added an insurance run on an RBI groundout to give Post 70 the 8-6 edge.

Mackie worked a scoreless seventh to secure the win, giving Norwood its second win over Franklin of the postseason, following a 6-4 win in the winners' bracket semifinal.

"The plan from the get-go was to start Dooley, pitch him three or four innings and then go to Kyle Mackie, pitch him three or four innings just to stay fresh," Harrington said. "If we win out in Greenfield, those guys are going to have to pitch on the latter half of those days."

Dooley, Flahive and Mackie combined for seven of Norwood's eight hits; Tiago Gomes also had a double in the fourth inning.

Norwood lost each of its first two games in Greenfield over the weekend, eliminating themselves from the tournament in the process. They fell to host-Greenfield on Day 1, 4-3 in nine innings, before Franklin exacted revenge on them the following day. Franklin turned an early 3-0 deficit into a 13-3 runaway to send the Norwood Jrs. packing for the summer.

strikeouts and two walks. South Attleboro plated all four runs off Keady in the top of the second inning.

He left with Norwood trailing 4-1, Brian King scoring its only run from third base on a balk, replaced by Eddie Duggan in the top of the fifth. Duggan entered with two on and two out in the fifth, navigating one hurdle before creating one of his own in the sixth, ultimately escaping the inning unscathed with South Attleboro runners stranded on second and third.

Duggan worked a perfect seventh to set the stage for Norwood's rally, as Post 70 exploded behind O'Rourke's three-run double for six runs in the frame overall to take an 8-4 lead.

After the first three South Attleboro batters reached safely in the top of the eighth, trimming Post 70's lead to 8-5 in the process, Sean Mellen entered the game for Norwood. He looked much more like his vintage self this time around, keeping Post 312 off the scoreboard while allowing just one hit on five strikeouts in two

innings of work. Most importantly for Norwood - and Mellen himself - he walked only one batter, down from six against Lowell.

"That outing was like a tune-up...even though it was a Final Eight game," Mellen said after the game, his second appearance in three days after not pitching since June 12. "I could throw my fastball for a strike, unlike last game where I was throwing only a changeup as my primary pitch...the thing in relief, you're only going to see the hitters once so can really get ahead with one pitch."

Not lost on Mellen and several other members of Post 70 was the chance for an ever so slight modicum of revenge, as Post 312 is based in Attleboro. Thus, the composition of the South Attleboro roster included several Attleboro High School players - including Nate Tellier, the pitcher who led a stunning upset of Norwood in the first round of the Division 1 South tournament, 1-0 in nine innings.

"It was definitely nice to go up against a team that knocked us out of the [high school] tour-

nament," Mellen said. "That was a bitter defeat, not everyone on the team is totally over that. We felt like if we beat them, we would've been going back to the state championship - if not winning it again. So it was nice to get back a little bit."

Norwood topples Lowell 7-6

From not standing a chance, to cruising towards an upset, to a runaway train careening off the tracks, Norwood Post 70's opening game in the 2016 Massachusetts Final Eight legion tournament took on many forms.

One final shift in the narrative ensured Norwood a 7-6 victory over Lowell Post 87 in 10 innings at Balch School Field on Saturday night, with no shortage of heroes in the later innings for the team in blue and gold.

Paul Galvin's glove at short-stop provided some of the finishing touches on Lowell (17-2, District 5 champions). In the bottom of the ninth inning, he successfully turned a double play by fielding a ball to the left of the bag at second, stepping on the base before firing on to first to send the game to extra innings.

And with a similar situation

in the last of the 10th - runners on first and second, one out - Galvin stayed at home to field a ball off the bat of Chris Seidl, turning to his longtime double play partner Connor Flynn for one out at second base and watching Flynn connect with Jake O'Rourke at first base to clinch the game for Post 70.

"I've been playing with Connor for a number of years, so we've got it down pat," Galvin said. "It was good to turn [a double play] with him at the end of the game to finish it off."

The reason Galvin and Flynn were in a position to finish it off in the first place can be credited to Chris Petracca and Mike Keady's at-bats in the top of the 10th.

Petracca smoked a 2-0 pitch to deep right field to lead the inning off, landing safely at third base with a triple.

Keady, who had just entered the game as a pinch hitter, stood in.

"I was just trying to drive the ball and get Chris home from third," Keady recalled. "But there were no outs, so there wasn't a lot of pressure

on me."

Keady cashed in on his self-described low-leverage situation, sending a ball to left just deep enough to bring Petracca home and give Norwood its first lead since the seventh inning.

Brian King started the game for Norwood on the mound, turning in six-plus innings of four runs (three earned) on three hits while striking out eight and walking seven.

Sean Mellen made his return to the mound after six weeks of being shut down by Northeastern, where he's set to report at the end of the summer.

Mellen entered the game with a 6-2 lead and none out in the bottom of the seventh, but labored through the remainder of the frame. While three of the four runs he allowed were unearned, he didn't help himself out by walking four.

The 6-foot-3 left-hander settled in marvelously after the hiccup in the seventh, allowing only one additional hit while striking out six over four innings of work.


