## School Committee focuses on space at Willett

One resident used the School Committee's public forum agenda on June 8 to voice concerns about space at the Willett Early Childhood Center.

Julie Barbour-Issa - who is on the Willett School Council, the PTO and is a Town Meeting member - said she has two children at the Willett, one of whom has special needs. And now that an additional preschool class has been added, Barbour-Issa said the Developmental Learning Center, which allows special educators to work with children one-on-one or in small groups, is losing valuable space.

"Both as a parent and a member of the community, I am concerned about the space issue at the Willett," she said.

Barbour-Issa said the Developmental Learning Center needs its own space and cannot share with a classroom because many of the students who utilize the Center are highly sensitive to sound, have behavioral issues that require work apart from the mainstream

class or are easily distracted.

The Developmental Learning Center will have to share space with an extended day preschool class, she said, and the Willett cafeteria already hosts different types of therapy sessions, and reading and ELL help is held in a modular unit.

Barbour-Issa said there are already 29 kindergarteners on individual education plans for next year who will all require time in the Developmental Learning Center.

"I'm concerned that compromising the needs of these students might mean more cost for schools down the road," Barbour-Issa said, mentioning the threat of special education lawsuits down the road.

Barbour-Issa said she was aware of the long-range building study that was funded by Town Meeting and said it was a good idea, but also emphasized the need for more immediate and permanent solution.

"My son only gets one chance at Willett

## 83 Morse seeking retail

The owners of 83 Morse St., Boston-based Cathartes, are seeking a special permit from the Zoning Board of Appeals for retail space within their manufacturing-zoned property.

During a June 7 meeting, attorney for the developers David Hern, Jr. said

that the owners of the property - who have spent around \$4 million in renovations for the industrial buildings - have had interest from tenants representing a mix of commercial uses, including retail and some light manufacturing.

These uses include a fitness center, self storage, a brewery, coffee roasting

# BOS grant beer and wine license to Minas, talk weed

The Board of Selectmen voted 4-1 to grant Minas Café one of the special Wine and Malt Beverage licenses for the South Norwood general business district during its June 14 meeting.

Up to four such licenses – meant for restaurants, to allow table service of beer and wine only – were requested by Town Meeting members in November 2014 by an almost 2:1 ratio, attorney for the applicants David Hern, Jr. said, and three were later allocated by the state.

“My clients and their family have operated Minas Café at 1241 Washington St. ... for 12 or more years and last year they expanded into space that’s referred to as 1243 Washington St.,” Hern said.

Hern noted that a restaurant has been an authorized business at the site for around 40 years and that common victuallers (CV) licenses have been granted continuously by the Selectmen there since.

According to Hern, the owners believe they could better sustain their business as a destination in South Norwood with beer and wine services. Hern said the business would simply like to have some of the same advantages as businesses in the central business district that have similar licenses.

Town Planner Paul Halkiotis also submitted a letter supporting the granting of the license, saying it would be helpful to bolster the economy in South Norwood.

Hern said the owners and staff were T.I.P.S. certified and the owners had worked in other locations with alcohol service in the past.

“My clients are experienced, they are eager, they put their hearts and souls into this business over the last dozen-plus years and they expect to for a long time to come,” Hern said.

Selectman Helen Abdallah Donohue – who was the opposition vote – raised legal questions regarding the zoning of the site where the restaurant is located, as it is partially in a business zone and partially in a residential area.

Noting that the Town of Norwood does not grant use variances, Donohue suggested referring the matter to Town Counsel, to determine whether a restaurant in a residential area could serve alcohol, seeing as the zoning bylaw did not usually allow restaurants in residential zones. The motion did

not receive a second.

Hern contested, based on correspondence from the building inspector, that the restaurant qualified as a pre-existing, non-conforming use and the zoning bylaw was silent on the matter of differentiating between businesses that serve alcohol and those that don’t. He also said it was not a zoning matter either way, and that the Selectmen, which have repeatedly granted CV licenses at the site, are to make the determination, not the zoning bylaws.

Selectman Paul Bishop agreed, saying Minas Café had “every right to step forward and request” a license. He also said the Selectmen were in the business of economic development and this would be an opportunity to do so.

A number of business and residential neighbors – including abutters and the owner of the laundromat next door to Minas Café – spoke in favor of the business receiving the beer and wine license.

Madeline Eysie cited the record of professionalism and quality of the owner-operated, owner-run business.

“This is how the Town got started,” she said.

Abutter Michael Saad was opposed to the business receiving the license because of the possible effects on quality of life for neighbors.

“We’ve cleaned up South Norwood, we want to keep it the way it is,” he said.

Ultimately, the Selectmen and Minas Café agreed that Minas would remove its counter seats – because the license specifies table service and does not allow for bar service – and replace them with tables, and the business would be able to operate with beer and wine until 9 p.m. during the week and until 10 p.m. on Friday and Saturday.

“What sits before us is the American dream,” Bishop said.

### Medical Marijuana

The Board of Selectmen, by a vote of 3-2 to sign a refined Community Host Agreement with Middlesex Integrative Medicine (MIM), which seeks to operate a medical marijuana dispensary on Astor Drive in the Town of Norwood, and to offer a letter of non-opposition.

The move comes after the Selectmen had voted to enter into an agreement with MIM, and after Selectman Bill Plasko had negotiated with the company. According to Plasko, some changes to the agreement were made, including increasing the minimum annual contribution to the Town each year

and language around MIM’s obligation to establish a charitable nonprofit in the Town. There were also increased security measures and assurance against operating a recreational distribution site, should the state legalize recreational use.

## One right, one wrong

Selectmen got one decision right and one decision wrong at their Tuesday night meeting. The right decision was to ignore what was an attempt by Selectman Helen Donohue to block Mina's Cafe from obtaining a beer and wine license under the guise of "legal concerns." Whatever her real reasons were for trying to throw Mina's Cafe under the bus, following the letter of the law was the last thing on her mind, and her actions were painful to watch.

"I represent all of South Norwood, and I am expressing the concerns of all of the abutting residents who aren't here tonight", said Donohue. Really? Well, if they're so concerned why didn't they show up? Where were all the emails and letters sent to selectmen in opposition of the license from these "concerned abutters?" To try and win an argument by utilizing the old phantom constituents trick should really be upsetting to every TM member who voted in support of the licenses sought specifically for the South Norwood neighborhood to help vitalize the business area of Washington St. If Selectman Donohue was really concerned about all of South Norwood, she should have kept that TM vote in mind unless, of course, she believes she knows better than everyone else what's good for her neighborhood.

Are there a few in South Norwood who probably don't like the idea of a beer and wine serving license in that strip mall? Definitely, as evidenced by all around good guy Mike Saad, someone who contributes a great deal to South Norwood. But the NIMBY attitudes of a few, and they really are just a few, pale in comparison to the benefits of having more businesses like Mina's Cafe decide to open up shop in South Norwood.

Given the fact her family owns bountiful real estate in the neighborhood as well as a liquor store, it would be fair to wonder if perhaps Mrs. Donohue was far less concerned about the well being of "her constituents," and much more focused on her personal agendas. And for those of you who think that would be an unfair assumption, where was this champion of the neighborhood when the threat of a rink was causing many to lose sleep at night?

The wrong decision made by Selectmen was to vote to approve the money contract between the Town and one of the medical marijuana dispensaries wanting to come here. It was nice to see Selectman Howard have the fortitude to admit his original decision to support these pot shops was wrong and change his vote. Those in favor, Selectmen Plasko, Mahoney and Bishop, think the few bucks these businesses will bring to Town is worth all of the risks Police Chief Bill Brooks brought to their attention at a prior meeting. It's blood money and if Norwood officials did everything in their power to keep these dispensaries from doing business here and if something awful was to happen, like a marijuana-impaired driver killing someone on Norwood roads, at least everyone here could sleep at night knowing they did everything they could to prevent it from happening.

The argument that alcohol kills people every day yet we still sell it doesn't mitigate the Chief's concerns. And to suggest that the Town should contract for the money because they may not be able to stop these companies from coming to Town anyway is sheepish. Norwood is better than that. And finally, a Sharon, Walpole, Medfield, Dedham, Canton or Westwood dispensary can just as easily service those residents of Norwood who really need medical marijuana, so the whole, "where is your compassion?" argument is silly. Just Google social service agencies in Norwood and you'll get an idea of how compassionate Norwood has been in the past and continues to be. And though many of these agencies do remarkably good work, the reality is there are needles found on the streets and vagrants and homeless needing attention, at least a percentage of which can be attributed to them. There are also the continuous notations in the police logs of these agencies needing assistance. Norwood does more than its fair share; you can be sure about that. One letter writer recently wrote that this should be an issue for Town Meeting to decide. Perhaps he's right...



WHY I STAND AT THE  
WALL...** by NPD, Lt. Brian Murphy, Ret.

Lt. Murphy is the first to be highlighted in the magazine, "REFLECTIONS, FROM THE WALL." Brian donates his time at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. "I have long admired the contribution of the park service volunteers at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. The reverence they show to the 58,307 named on The Wall, and The Wall itself as a Memorial, is a testament to the adage that 'we must never forget their sacrifice.' As a Gold Star 'little brother,' the volunteers treated me with great respect when I answered the call of VVMF for people to come to The Wall to participate in the Reading of the Names in 2007 and 2012. I was too young to have served in Vietnam, but I was old enough at 11 years old to immediately understand the devastating loss my family suffered when my brother, Richard B. Murphy (Panel 57W Line 29) was killed in 1968. I have now reached many of the milestones he sacrificed; marriage, children, career, and most recently, retirement from my career as a police officer. I now have time to go to The Wall (six visits in my first year as a volunteer, each time for three or four days). I am drawn there to Protect and Serve, to protect the memorial as hallowed ground and to serve the family, comrades, friends, and curious who come to pay their respects. I feel we owe it to the men and women to help tell their stories."

and electronics repurposing. Many of these businesses interests would like to have a small retail component to their location, Hern said.

As such, Cathartes is seeking a permit to allow use of up to 20,000 square feet of the property's 300,000 or so square feet for retail purposes.

Cathartes Development Manager David Depree said the facilities are not suited to large industrial uses anymore and the company wants to lease out to smaller businesses and tradesmen.

Cathartes, which bought the property in January, is seeking up to 20,000 square feet to be divided up among all the tenants because individual tenants would otherwise have to wait several months or longer for special permits just for their space. Hern pointed out that many prospective tenants might not want to wait that long and would pass on leasing there.

Hern said the renovation of

the property and its expanded use could create local jobs, attract more businesses and people to do business in Town, and it could be valuable from a tax perspective.

"Over the past several years, the property has been the subject of tax abatement procedures, it wasn't being rented," Hern said.

Hern said the Planning Board supports the application and had been in discussion with the applicant about the creation of an overlay district that would allow retail in certain manufacturing areas by right, but no such article made it in time for the May Town Meeting.

"It's no longer an industrial park, it's more of a commerce center with a mixed use of industrial and commercial uses," Depree said.

Board of Appeals member Patrick Mulvehill said he was in favor of the idea "in theory," citing the success at the old in-

dustrial property at 61 Endicott St., but expressed concerns about traffic, which were echoed by members of the public.

"Short to Washington is a yeoman's work sometimes, there's a lot of accidents down there," Mulvehill said.

Patty Bailey of St. John Avenue said she was impressed with the project, as it is an otherwise "blighted area," but said she was concerned about the narrow bridge running over Morse Street with the potential increase in traffic to the area.

Michael Novesco of Short Street said he supports the developer fixing up the area, but said the traffic on the road is already so bad that he sometimes can't get out of his own driveway.

Members of the Zoning Board also expressed their concern over retaining some control over what sort of businesses go into the property, considering the blanket approval of up to 20,000 square feet of retail space.

The hearing was continued to June 21.

# Chase leads to fatal crash

Norwood Police Department, along with county and state officials, is investigating a fatal one-car crash that took place late on Wednesday night.

Norwood Police Officer James Payne reported that he had tried to stop a speeding car on Route 1 at the intersection of Route 1 and Dean Street - he had signaled the driver - but the

driver sped down Dean Street westbound instead.

As the officer tried to catch up, the short chase ended when the vehicle ran through the Dean and Washington streets intersection in South Norwood, and crashed into a stone wall near Dominos Pizza.

The driver, 38-year-old Benjamin Stimer, was killed instantly, Norwood Police said.

Norwood Police Spokesman Kevin Grasso said the man

was a Norwood native who had been living out of state until May. There were three warrants out for the man's arrest and his driver's license had been revoked.

The investigation is still ongoing, and involves the Norfolk County District Attorney's Office and the State Police Collision Analysis and Reconstruction Section. Grasso said the

no easy task.

"(Her citizenship) was received with mixed emotions. They're very patriotic and proud of their small country," Ed Page said. "There was a lot of sentiment about why did they need an American on their team."

Page said Danielle was paired with a Serbian player who spoke English, and Danielle immediately asked her teammate to help her learn the Serbian national anthem.

"When the European champion tournament began last spring, the camera came on the team during the national anthem and there's Danielle singing away," Ed Page said. "That little gesture had tremendous effect not only on her teammates, but on the whole Serbian population that was watching."

Page said Danielle was last in Norwood around a year and a half ago, but said she is very familiar with the Town, having been coming here since she was young for holidays. Her father, a former Norwood High basketball team captain, often took her to shoot hoops at various locations around town.

Page said Danielle began as a soccer player, but was told when she tried out for the high school team as a freshman that no freshmen would make the varsity team. Page said Danielle knew she was

as good - or better - than many of those who did make the team, so she decided to go out for basketball instead.

That started a remarkable career in Colorado, where she was selected to state all-star teams, and a record-breaking career at the University of Nebraska. Since then, Danielle has played in Connecticut - until an injury forced her overseas - Israel, Bulgaria, Poland and France.

Page is hoping that Danielle will not only have her family cheering for her, but also the Town of Norwood.

"To think you can look at this young woman whose playing out there and say, 'oh, I know her grandparents,' we're proud of it and maybe a lot of other people in Norwood will join us in feeling proud and happy for our granddaughter," Page said.

And for the Page family who will be attending the Olympic Games this summer, they're packing two sets of colors: American and Serbian.

"We're just crossing our fingers and wondering if they what happens if they end up playing the US," Ed Page said. "It's going to be a real challenge for us to put our loyalties out there."

Serbia is scheduled to play the American team on Aug. 10.

kindergarten," she said. "The Willett not only serves as families' first impression of Norwood Public Schools, but it also has the responsibility of serving all kindergarteners in town by identifying needs that are not yet diagnosed and supporting these students."

Superintendent of Schools James Hayden said he and his administration team were aware of the space problem at the Willett and were conducting student research and reading the reports on the matter. Hayden likened the matter to a house and that they would be "arranging the furniture in the house," to best accommodate

the students.

School Committee member Lisa Igoe asked if there was room for preschool classes at any of the elementary schools. Hayden said it was not a good idea to isolate the preschool classes, and the elementary students would have to sacrifice a computer lab or have their art classes come to the main classroom on a cart.

School Committee member Patrick McDonough said he was concerned that there were classes being taught on the stage at the Willett.

"I find it so unacceptable that we're teaching classrooms on a stage," he said.

Hayden said a reading teacher was working with small groups on the stage, but no other school was using stages for academic classes. Hayden also said the stage was not a homeroom or regular classroom, but a space for reading teachers to pull students from their classes to work with them in small groups.

Also during public forum, Norwood Teachers Association president Jodie Smith reported that Norwood teachers attended the Norfolk County Teachers Association banquet and honored two of their own with nominations for awards.

Carol Poirier received an award for her involvement in school-community partnerships. Poirier was instrumental in creating "successful learning opportunities for children and families," including the Village Center free preschool and tutoring program, Smith said.

The Norwood contingent also nominated high school

foreign language teacher Cindy Derrane for the NCTA Honor Award, in part for her work leading "one of the strongest foreign language programs in the state," Smith said.

"Cindy Derrane celebrates the world and her students love her for it," Smith said.

During the meeting, elementary math coordinator Jill Milton discussed the elementary summer math program in Norwood.

The voluntary program is in its second year and Milton made a point of showing how many different ways students can fulfill the requirements.

In addition to online math games websites, including Sumdog.com, Envision 2.0, Greg Tang math, Milton noted mobile apps like Sushi Monster, as well as board games and flash cards. Milton even said students could use "real world math" by helping with grocery shopping or meal preparation.

According to Milton, practicing math for 10 minutes a day, five days a week "makes a huge difference when [the students] come back to school."

Milton said each school recognizes those who participate in the summer math program in different ways, including via extra recess or reading the students names over the morning announcements.

Assistant Superintendent Alec Wyeth said the program, while not compulsory, is a good way "to have [the students] ready to jump right into some fresh new learning at the next grade level."

investigation could yield more information about the incident.

"We do not have the speed of the vehicle when it crashed into the wall," Grasso said. "We do not know if drugs or alcohol were a factor or why the operator did not stop."

After the crash, Norwood Fire Department was notified, and an engine company and ambulance arrived on scene shortly after 11:21 p.m.

Lt. George Bent of Norwood Fire requested more assistance from the Department's other ambulance and Ladder Company, as access to the vehicle was limited by fencing, trees and the stone wall debris. The process to retrieve the driver took around an hour to complete.

"Firefighters were able to cut and remove the fence and trees so engine company members could pull a hand line to extinguish the engine compartment which was on fire," Norwood Fire Spokesman George Morrice said. "Ladder Company members used rescue jacks to stabilize the car and the Jaws of Life was used to remove the Mini Cooper's roof so paramedics could access the patient."

Paramedics, upon seeing an absence of vital signs, declared the driver dead on scene. Fire Department personnel cleared the scene at 12:45 a.m.

Selectman Helen Abdallah Donohue's family owns the property where the vehicle crashed through the wall.

"We told the insurance company about it when it happened," she said. "I do not know who will pay for it yet."

## Post 70 Baseball off to 1-3 start

It's been somewhat of a slow start for the Norwood Post 70 American Legion baseball team, but manager Paul Samargedlis isn't too concerned yet.

Chuck Allen has been hired as head coach of the Norwood boys hockey team, per a release from athletic director Jon Longley.

Allen, 54, replaces Bill Clifford, who retired in February following a 27-year run with the program - the last 15 as head coach.

Allen joins Norwood after a brief stint at Bishop Fenwick High School in Peabody, where he spent the last one-and-a-half seasons as varsity head coach. After taking over on an interim basis during the 2014-15 season, Allen led the Crusaders to their first postseason appearance as a Division 1 team in program history in his lone full year behind the bench, going 9-9-2 before falling to Chelmsford in the first

Allen also has stops at Medford and Somerville High Schools as a head coach in his career. He led Medford to back-to-back Super 8 appearances in 2004-05 and 2005-06, including an undefeated regular season (17-0-4) in the latter. Medford advanced to the crossover round that season, falling to eventual state champion BC High.

He'll inherit a Norwood team that reached the postseason in 11 of Clifford's 15 years as head coach, including as recently as the 2013-14 school year. But the last two winters have been rough for the Mustangs, who went 3-

12-5 in 2014-15 before failing to win a game this past season, posting an 0-19-1 mark. Norwood also lost to its soon-to-be-former Bay State Conference rival Dedham this winter for the first time since 1988.

The coaching change won't be the only difference for Norwood this coming season, as nonleague opponents Hingham, Pope Francis and Duxbury have been dropped from the schedule, according to Longley. Hingham and Pope Francis were each Super 8 teams a season ago, while Duxbury was a Division 1 tournament team.

Longley said the Mustangs were looking into keeping Brockton on the schedule as a non-league opponent; Norwood has tied the Boxers in each of the last two seasons, with this season's 2-2 result on Feb. 17 providing Norwood its only point of the season.

# Sox infielder Shaw visits Norwood

Norwood received a special visitor for a great cause on Tuesday, as Red Sox third baseman Travis Shaw paid a visit to town for Stop & Shop's "Help Cure Childhood Cancer" program.

Shaw came to the Stop & Shop location at 1415 Providence Boston Highway for an event in a partnership with the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute as part of Stop & Shop's annual fundraiser across New England locations in support of pediatric cancer research and treatment, having raised over \$60 million over the last 25 years.

While there, Shaw signed autographs and took pictures with Maddie, a pediatric cancer patient from Canton who is the ambassador for Stop & Shop's current campaign, which launched on June 10. Maddie was celebrating her 8th birthday on Tuesday, and was serenaded by a chorus of Stop & Shop staffers singing "Happy Birthday."

Over the course of the month-long fundraiser, customers at Stop & Shop are encouraged to contribute to the program by donating at checkout, with 100 percent of donations going directly to

Dana-Farber and the Jimmy Fund.

"It means a lot, the Red Sox do a lot with the Jimmy Fund and it's for a great cause," Shaw, who's in his first full major league season, said of attending the event in Norwood. "Anything that we can do to brighten somebody's day – I know I enjoy coming out to these type of events – it kind of puts everything into perspective, that there's a lot more important issues than just baseball."

Shaw said that he's been lucky in that he hasn't been seriously affected by cancer on a personal level, and that he considers himself quite fortunate in that regard. But that doesn't deter his enthusiasm for helping out those who haven't been as lucky.

"It's fun meeting these kids, doing whatever I can to help," he said.

Phil Tracey, who works in the front office of Stop & Shop's New England division, appreciated Shaw making an appearance on the same day the Red Sox opened an important 10-game home stand with the Baltimore Orioles.

"Travis was so kind to donate his time and meet Maddie, so it's been incredible," Tracey said. "We're just thankful Travis took the time out of his busy schedule, came

Shaw, a native of Washington Court House, Ohio, wore a shirt with the caption "Cleveland Is The City" inscribed across the front. While his hometown is roughly three hours from Cleveland, Shaw professed himself to be a big fan of the Cavaliers, who currently trail the Golden State Warriors, 3-2, in the best-of-seven NBA Championship.

"They won [Game 5]," Shaw said. "I think they'll win in Cleveland, then Game 7 who knows. But it'll get to Game 7 I think."

# Norwood-based MMA fighter dealt first pro loss

In March, Matt Tullos of Norwood's Connors Martial Arts cruised to victory in his professional MMA debut at CES 33, when he forced his opponent into a first round submission.

Things didn't go quite according to plan for Tullos in his second pro bout last week, as the 23-year-old featherweight suffered his first pro defeat at the hands of Merab Dvalishvili in a unanimous decision at CES 36 at Twin River Casino in Lincoln, R.I.

But if you were expecting Tullos to be feeling sorry for himself after the loss, guess again.

"He was able to implement his game plan better than I could implement mine," Tullos said after his career record evened out at 1-1. "I think this loss gave me a lesson, stuff to work on."

Tullos, who's 5-foot-10, weighed in at 146 pounds for the fight. Dvalishvili, who's 5-foot-6, weighed in at 145.

A Brazilian jiu-jitsu specialist, Tullos had trouble with Dvalishvili's judo and wrestling techniques over the course of the fight that lasted all three rounds. Dvalishvili, a New York native, improved his pro record to 3-2.

"They're all grappling parts so it wasn't very different, but he was very good at a few techniques and he was able to hit them," Tullos said of the contrast in styles between the fighters. "I just had trouble stopping him."

"He didn't do a whole lot, but he did enough to win. That was my fault, I should have been able to do a little bit more."

Despite the loss, Tullos suffered minimal damage from a physical standpoint other than a cut above his eye. Still, that differs from his first fight, from which he escaped completely unscathed. Tullos won his debut 3 minutes, 46 seconds into the first round on a "rear naked choke," in defeating Shan Bachok of Fairfield, N.J. on March 11.

While he didn't say that he


would've fought the next day, as he did after his debut, Tullos insisted that he still felt fine.

He also thinks the loss may not have been the worst thing in the world for him long-term, as it will alleviate the pressures of carrying an undefeated record into subsequent bouts.

"I think there's a huge benefit in losing now," he said. "It's almost like in the movie 'Raging Bull,' there's a scene where Joe Pesci is talking to [Robert] DeNiro and he says 'if you win you win, if you lose you win.'"

"It took the pressure off of me and it's going to make people want to fight me a little bit more. It's going to be easier to get fights because guys think they'll be able to [win]. Once I make those improvements I think I'll be all right. I don't see anybody doing that to me anytime soon."

Tullos said he's unlikely to fight at any point this summer, and will focus on fixing what he did wrong vs. Dvalishvili back

The changes were handled by Town Counsel Brandon Moss, who worked on the Town's Medical Marijuana bylaws.

Chairman Allan Howard said he made a mistake in his previous support of medical marijuana in the Town and was against entering into the agreement because of recent opinions from law enforcement and accidents possibly related to the medical marijuana.

Plasko, who said he still had concerns about medical marijuana and was opposed to recreational marijuana, said such matters were usually related to enforcement, and that Norwood

and the state have established robust regulations to maintain control over the issue. He also said that many of these things were going to happen, even if Norwood does not get a dispensary.

Selectman Tom Maloney said entering into the agreement would be a wise move because it is preemptive – especially in the event Norwood gets a dispensary without Town blessing or an agreement – and proactive in that the Town is choosing who its potential business partners are and the terms of how business is done.

Howard and Donohue represented the two opposition votes.

at Connors.

"I'm not sure right now," Tullos said of exactly when he'd next step into the octagon, setting a tentative timetable of September or October. "I'm just going to focus on making some improvements – stuff that I learned that I should have been doing better in this fight. And then once I feel like I've made

some improvements I'll start looking to grab another fight. But most likely once this summer's over."

Tullos sent out a tweet the morning following his fight which further demonstrated his resolve: "I'll be back. I'll prove to be the baddest man in the division."

Ever aware of his surroundings, Tullos acknowl-

edges he's fortunate to have the opportunity to be a professional fighter at all, whether he wins or loses – especially in light of the tragedy in Orlando, Fla. early Sunday morning.

"I'm not too worried, there are bigger problems in the world – as we've seen over the last weekend," he said. "Life could be worse."
