Fire Dept. at it again Substitution way over budget

It's a little over two months into the new fiscal year, and the Fire Department's substitution account is already looking problematic. Through Sept. 1, \$170,461.64 has been spent on substitution, up from \$157,290.75 at this point last year, a \$13,170.89 increase.

This is a concern because \$486,000 has been budgeted for FY 2011, and while the year is just one-sixth of the way complete, over 35 percent of the substitution account has been spent. If this pace continues, the town will spend \$1,022,769.84 on substitution this year.

"Really, I'm concerned with these numbers," Selectman Bill Plasko said. "We're substantially out of control in substitution."

Fire Chief Michael Howard is look-

Planning Board not a Verizon obstacle

The Planning Board determined that Verizon's proposed changes to the 236 Access Rd. site were minor, and do not require an additional public hearing. Verizon is cutting back on the number of employees working at the site and the number of parking spaces needed, and the board felt this reduction was a positive change for the neighborhood and the nearby abutters.

"Verizon has seen a downturn in its business, and on a national basis, has reduced its workforce by 10,000 people," Attorney David Hern said, noting that some of these people would have been employees at the Access Road site.

Verizon will see approximately a 15

Lynch trounces D'Alessandro

It was a tough night for Macdonald "Mac" D'Alessandro. He lost the Democratic Primary for United States House of Representatives 9th District by a wide margin.

According to the unofficial results, incumbent U.S. Rep. Stephen Lynch took 65 percent of the vote to D'Alessandro's 35 percent.

Lynch will face Republican challenger Vernon Harrison, who took 63 percent of the vote against Keith Lepor's 37 percent.

The town-by-town results show that D'Alessandro took Needham and was close in Milton, but came up short in all other towns. In Norwood, he garnered only 789 votes to Lynch's 2,057.

In the race for the Suffolk and Norfolk District Senate seat vacated by state Senator Marian Walsh, Boston voters handed four-term state Rep. Michael Rush a primary win in the Democratic primary.

Rush's challenger, Westwood attorney Michael Walsh took all of the non-Boston precincts in Norwood, Dedham and Westwood.

Boston puts Rush ahead of Walsh

According to the unofficial vote count, Rush took 56 percent of the vote while Walsh came in with 44

percent.

Rush declared victory around 9:30 p.m. Tuesday night at the Corrib Pub

in West Roxbury. An energized Rush thanked his wife, family and supporters for sticking by him, but was careful to remind everyone that he still has to face Republican challenger and fellow West Roxbury resident Brad Williams in the November general election.

"We're going to work hard from now until November," Rush said. "We've just begun and we're up to the challenge. We're going to take charge of this election and I'm going to start to hit the bricks tomorrow getting out there and meeting voters."

Rush said he was very pleased with the results and that he never took his opponent lightly.

"I feel like I have the energy to win and I'm taking nothing for granted," he said. "People want accountable government and they want their elected officials to have common sense solutions and that's what I'm running on."

Rush called his primary win the first step in a two part process in taking the state Senate seat which has been held since 1993 by Marian Walsh (no relation to Michael Walsh).



Successful start for schools

Superintendent of Schools James Hayden reported that the 2010-2011 school year had a successful start last Tuesday.

"The opening of school was an outstanding event," Hayden said. "The district hit a home run," noting that parents were ready, teachers had the classrooms prepared and the buildings were in proper order for the Sept. 7 opening.

"I really compliment the community," Hayden said. "You have a great school sys-

tem, and I'm proud to be a part of it."

Hayden also discussed the enrollment and class sizes, specifically those at the elementary school level. There are 3,494 students enrolled in the district, 1,662 of them at the pre-school, kindergarten and elementary level.

"Most of our class sizes are in the low twenties and teens," Hayden said, and having small class sizes is beneficial, especially at the younger levels.

He described the point of contact between the teacher and student as one of the most im-

portant elements of education.

"In the earliest graders, especially grades one and two, you try to have the smallest class sizes possible," Hayden said, and they have accomplished this, with classes as small as 14 students.

The largest first grade class, Maura Belanger's class at the Prescott School, has just 21 students. The largest second grade class, Lindsey Bell's class, also at the Prescott, has just 22. In general, the class sizes are appropriate, though Hayden noted

percent reduction in employees at the site, and the parking lot has been changed accordingly. The number of spaces is being reduced from 278 to 163. In addition, a storage shed will be added to the site, which will be used to house various materi-

als needed by the service drivers. Hern argued this change was minor, because it reduces Verizon's impact on the neighborhood.

"It's a reduction, and we think most people who feel they would be affected by this would be happy with this," Hern said. "If you reduce the number of Verizon employees coming and going, you've reduced the effect on the neighborhood."

Several Planning Board members agreed with this assessment.

"On the surface, it looks very dramatic, but when you look at it, it lessens the impact on the neighbors," Planning Board member Thomas Wynne said, as fewer employees means fewer cars on the site, less noise, less traffic on Access Road and less maintenance work being done in the area.

Ernest Paciorkowski noted the improvements to the site, and said, "Where you're reducing the amount of Verizon employees, I can only think the neighbors would be happy about that."

He added that if Verizon needs additional space and wants to expand the size of the parking lot in the future, they will once again have to come to the Planning Board for approval.

The change has no bearing on the 14 conditions attached to the Planning Board's May 3 decision approving the project. The hours of operation and maximum number of employees allowed on the site will re-

main the same.

The shifts for field technicians will run from 7:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. on weekdays and 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. on weekends. Mechanics will be on the site from 3 to 11:30 p.m. on weeknights. These hours of operation were set by the union. The site is located in a manufacturing zone, allowing it to be open 24/7, though Verizon has agreed to limit themselves to the hours mentioned.

"There is going to be less activity, but the hours of activity will remain the same," Hern said.

The portion of the lot not used by Verizon will continue to be used as vehicle storage for various car dealerships located on Route 1. This use was authorized by a 1997 Zoning Board of Appeals decision. Town Planner Stephen Costello recommended Hern inform the ZBA of this decision and present the board with a revised plan of record for the parking lot.

The Planning Board voted 4-1 to accept this as a minor change to the project. The sole dissenting vote was Chairman E. William Bamber.

"I feel this is much more of a change than what we've allowed in the past," Bamber said, adding that the Public Hearings held regarding this site were well attended and abutters were very outspoken. "I just feel we're making a big change, and I feel the neighbors should have some say."

Schools appoint positions

Ann Marie Ellis was named the new Director of Finance and Operations for the Norwood public school system at last Wednesday's School Committee meeting. She will take over for Ralph Dumas, who tendered his resignation on July 13.

Ellis, a Plymouth resident and Curry College graduate, previously served as the Assistant Finance Director for the town of Barnstable. She faces a new role in Norwood, but is certain she will be up to the challenge.

Ellis was one of over 30 candidates to apply for the position, and Superintendent of Schools James Hayden said she was the best qualified for the role.

"We made sure we got the best that we could," Hayden said, noting that Ellis has had experience in both banking and town government, which will serve her well in her new role.

Ellis was selected by a six member screening committee, which included School Com-

mittee member Eleanor Travers and Dick Kief, Finance Commissioner Judy Langone, Town Clerk and Accountant Bob Thornton, Director of Buildings and Grounds Joseph McDonough and Balch Elementary School Principal John Condlin.

Hayden recommended Ellis for the position, and the School Committee unanimously accepted this recommendation. Several committee members took time to congratulate Ellis on her appointment.

"I'd like to congratulate Ann Marie," School Committee Chairman Mark Joseph said. "Welcome aboard. We are very proud to have you here."

School Committee member Bill Plasko Jr. said, "I think the Superintendent has made a terrific selection, and I wholeheartedly support your appointment."

Ellis joins the Norwood Public School system during a period of transition, as Hayden took over for Jeffrey Granatino as Superintendent of Schools in July, and Dr. Alexander Wyeth was named the Assistant Superintendent for Instruction, Curriculum and Assessment on

July 28.

School Committee member John Badger said, "Now that this administrative team is together, I hope I'm speaking for the entire committee, and I think I am when I say that I think our charge now, above all else, that we hold paramount is supporting you, Superintendent Hayden, Assistant Superintendent Wyeth and Ms. Ellis, in really bringing Norwood to be the best district it absolutely, positively can be, and I hope that you find your interactions and your relationship with us very, very supportive."

The School Committee also accepted the appointment of Detective Paul Ryan to the position of Attendance Officer. Ryan takes over for Detective Maureen Murphy-Payne, who retired on June 30.

As the new School Resource Officer and Attendance Officer, Ryan will provide coverage at the Coakley Middle School two days per week and coverage at the Norwood High School two days per week. He will also be on call, should he

there were a couple of concerns.

Hayden cited the Balch fifth grade classes, which feature 25 and 26 students, the Callahan's two 24-student third grade classes and the Oldham School's fourth grade classes, which contain 23 and 24 students. It is still early, and possible for these numbers to fluctuate, but Hayden and members of the administration are keeping their eyes on these numbers.

"Aside from a couple, we really have favorable class sizes compared to any one in the state," School Committee


member Paul Samargedlis said. "Across the board, we're pretty well off compared to other communities."

He noted that the smaller class sizes place students in a good position, and will allow for a strong education.

"We're off to a good start," Samargedlis said.

Of the 1,662 elementary age students, 390 attend the Willett Early Childhood Center for kindergarten and preschool. Most of the kindergarten classes have a size of 23 or 24 students, while the average preschool class has 22.75 students.

There are 792 students attending the Coakley Middle School, down from 802 last year, while the Norwood High School is home to 1,040 students.

Don't worry, he has it covered

Before Norwood Fire Chief Michael Howard even took his seat in front of Selectmen on Tuesday evening, most everyone watching suspected his discussion with the board would extend far beyond the usual pleasantries and obligatory question or two. Just two months into the new fiscal year and already Howard is proving he simply does not have the management skills to turn his beleaguered department around.

To be fair, though it is true the problems at the Norwood Fire Department appear particularly acute, many fire departments supporting the ridiculous work schedule adopted by Norwood are having similar problems. And this schedule was approved by Town Meeting long before Chief Howard came on board. For those not aware, Norwood firefighters work a schedule comprising of one 24-hour shift on, then a 24-hour shift off, then a 24-hour shift on and then five full days off. Not bad, huh? Of course, it is a pretty good bet that a third of each of these shifts is spent sleeping. Good to know that firefighters get a good night's sleep while on the job, given that many Norwood taxpayers toss and turn every night worrying about how they are going to pay their taxes and put food on the table.

And why are vacations so taxing on this department? Every firefighter gets five full days off every eight days. Hell, how much time off do they need? Wait, I forgot, they re-

ally aren't getting five full days off every eight days because the way the system is set up, during those five days off, they are really on the clock covering for others at time and a half. Keep in mind, every time a firefighter calls in sick, he isn't just calling in sick for an eight-hour shift, he is calling in for a 24-hour shift, in reality three regular shifts for the typical working stiff. So, they do need their regular vacation time to rest up from all the overtime they are raking in. What a mess.

Don't worry, though. Chief Howard has two new hires starting in less than two weeks after months and months of interviewing candidates, which should really help in all this substitution spending. Then again, when questioned, viewers learned he hasn't even extended job offers to these new hires yet, let alone run CORI checks on them. There is also a town policy requiring each department head to work with the Human Resources Department during the hiring process. Apparently, the policy is just a nuisance to the good Chief since he hasn't complied in the past, and isn't complying now.

For every day there are no new hires, there is most likely more overtime spending. But no cause for alarm, he has it covered by all his men with those five days off. So what's the rush?

It also appears Selectmen can't wait until a report is provided in November that will help them determine just how screwed up the fire department really is, and provide ways to fix it. One should question how helpful this report is really going to be when the core of its findings will be based on answers from other towns on questionnaires sent to them by Norwood consultants. First of all, Chief Howard sits on the committee who will review the findings and assisted in developing the questions. There has to be a red flag in there somewhere. Also, how truthful will responses be if said responses shed negative light on the departments being queried?

The generation of this report is a good idea, though more taxpayer money is being spent developing it. Taxpayers can only hope it will determine a course of action that will upright a very badly listing ship.

Airport permits top agenda

Three businesses look to open shops

Three businesses stopped by the Sept. 8 Norwood Airport Commission meeting to plead their case for a commercial permit, allowing them to open an office at the Norwood Memorial Airport. While no decisions were rendered at last Wednesday's meeting, all three businesses are being considered.

One business, the New England Helicopter Academy (NEHA), has been at the Norwood Memorial Airport in the past. Rick Smith's business was located there from 2005 to 2007, before relocating to a hangar in Plymouth. Now, he is looking to return and open a satellite office in Norwood.

NEHA was established in 2002, with the goal of offering the highest grade of helicopter training. While training remains their focus, the business is looking to expand.

"We are expecting to expand into the charter business," Smith said, but noted their main business is flight training.

The company has two helicopters, and is looking to bring one to Norwood. The other will remain at the Plymouth Airport. Smith said it would be possible to bring the second helicopter to Norwood once their business expands and customer demand requires it.

This requires an exemption from the Norwood Airport Commission, as the airport's minimum standards requires a company like NEHA to have two helicopters on site. They have granted exemptions in the past. In fact, when NEHA came before the board in 2005, they asked for this same exemption, and it was granted.

Assuming approval, NEHA will open a satellite office in Norwood. It will be open seven days a week, operating from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

"We're hoping to be up and running possibly by October," Smith said.

While NEHA is a returning business, the other two companies to come before the Norwood Airport Commission are new ventures. IMC Club and Wild Blue Flight Simulators are looking to establish offices at the Norwood Memorial Airport.

Wild Blue Flight Simulators

was founded by Steve Sullivan earlier this year.

"We're planning to install a Redbird Full Motion Flight Simulator," Sullivan said. "This is a Federal Aviation Administration approved advanced training product."

Sullivan noted there is nothing like this simulator in the area, as the closest Redbird Full Motion Flight Simulator is in Danbury, Connecticut. The primary focus of a product like this is to help increase pilot safety and maintain flying proficiency.

"Flight simulators allow you to do things you simply can't do in an airplane," Sullivan said, and as such, he feels this simulator will be a valuable tool for the numerous flight training companies at the airport.

Being a full motion simulator, the product provides kinetic feedback, in addition to visual and audio feedback. The typical desktop simulator provides the pilot with visual and audio feedback, so something like the Redbird simulator has an added layer of realism. The cost to use the product is less than taking to the skies for a training mission, and can be used when the weather is bad and planes are unavailable.

The main customer base for this operation would be the training companies located at the airport. There are a combined 33 flight instructors at East Coast Aero Club, Horizon Aviation and IMC Club that could use the machine. While no one has committed to using the machine for such purposes, Sullivan said numerous instructors have expressed interest in leasing the machine.

The IMC Club has expressed interest, and Club President Radek Wyrzykowski is looking to place the club's base of operations at the Norwood Memorial Airport. The Club is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit and entirely volunteer-run organization that focuses on proficiency training and increasing pilot safety.

"We're one of the fastest growing safety organizations right now," Wyrzykowski said, noting that since the business was founded in the fall of 2009, over 1,000 members have joined and 22 chapters, including one international chapter, have been formed.

The club was incorporated four weeks ago, and has docu-

ments on file with the state, allowing them to operate in Massachusetts. They want to locate their headquarters here in Norwood. The club is funded entirely by donations and industry sponsorships, and volunteers have stepped forward to operate the business, which they plan on having open five days a week, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Much like NEHA, they are asking for an exemption on the number of planes required at the site.

"We really, at this point, have no need for two airplanes," Wyrzykowski said. "Our primary activity is ground training and safety seminars."

He added they would use the Redbird Full Motion Flight Simulator in lieu of a second airplane.

There was a question as to whether IMC Club would compete with the existing training companies already on site. Wyrzykowski noted they intended to operate as a complement to those companies, not as competition.

"We don't train for any of the licenses," Wyrzykowski said. "We just provide safety workshops in the areas that are missing here."

Commission members were open to the idea of granting the IMC Club a commercial permit, and took the information under advisement at this time.

"I don't see any problem with it, I just want to digest it," Airport Commission Chairman Mark Ryan said.

Decisions regarding the commercial permits for NEHA, Wild Blue Flight Simulators and the IMC Club are pending, and could be revealed at the next Airport Commission meeting.





ing to bring this number under control, and noted that these high amounts were due in part to vacations and military leave.

"It's largely due to our July and August vacation schedule," Howard said. "I hope to have that back in line by our next meeting."

There are restrictions on vacation time implemented at the Fire Department. For any given shift, no more than two firefighters and one officer are allowed to take time off at any given time. This is down from three firefighters and two officers in years past.

Military leave is responsible

for \$13,660 of substitution spending. Four members of the department are active members of the military reserve, and three of them were called for training during the summer. They missed a combined 32 shifts, resulting in the need for substitutes.

While vacation and military leave play a role, a large portion of the substitution costs are due to injuries and vacancies due to retirement.

"In the first two months, we've required 163 shifts to be covered," Howard said, and these injuries and retirements are responsible for \$73,252.20, or 42.97 percent, of the year to

date substitution account expenditures.

Replacements for the two retired firefighters are expected to start the week of Sept. 27. Three of the six injured firefighters have since returned to work, and three remain out.

Plasko questioned the two potential new hires, noting that Howard did work with the Human Resources Department during the hiring and interview process. He said town bylaws require hiring authorities in town work with the HR Department and involve them in interviews, which Howard has not done. Plasko added they have discussed this with Howard in the past, who told them he would work closer with HR, but these promises have gone unfulfilled.

"If you disagree with us, tell us," Plasko said. "Don't yes us to death."

Howard questioned this assessment, saying "We do involve HR in the hiring process," as they are responsible for CORI checks and employee orientation. Human Resources is also invited to participate in interviews, if they are available.

"We are using them, but obviously not to the level you expect," Howard said.

Board of Selectmen Chairman Jerry Kelleher noted that Howard works under the Board of Selectmen, so it is expected that anything worked out with the board should be acted and followed up upon.

Another cost associated with the Fire Department ties into the medical service account, as the department has greatly exceeded the \$30,000 budgeted for FY 2011, which itself was a decrease from the \$46,000 budgeted last year.

Howard requested a Reserve Fund Transfer for \$90,000 to cover costs associated with the Medical Services Account with Fire Incidental Expenditures. Howard noted any and all medi-

cal bills related to on the job injuries are paid via this account.

"We've spent over \$91,000 in medical bills for on the job injuries that primarily occurred in FY 2010," Howard said, adding further expenses are coming, as there are other outstanding bills that need payment.

While the injuries occurred in the previous fiscal year, bills are paid when they are received. Howard noted there were four major injuries in April and May, and the bills for these injuries have started to come in. One injury alone cost over \$40,000.

No action was taken by the

board on this issue, as the board opted to table it for discussion at a future meeting.

Selectman Tom McQuaid was concerned with approving this as a reserve fund transfer.

"It doesn't seem appropriate to me to take \$90,000 out of a reserve fund when we only have approximately \$160,000 for the whole year," said McQuaid, adding he felt this was an issue for Town Meeting.

Plasko noted they could hold onto the bills and not process them at this time, but Howard said he was against the idea of not paying bills.

Radio Tower approved

However, extensive structural work would be needed for an antenna to be placed atop this tank, making it more cost effective to place it on an adjacent tower.

"It just seemed to us to make more sense to put it on top of the large radio tower," Carroll said.

This antenna is needed there because of the demolition of the Norwood Senior High School. The current public safety antenna is located in the school's clock tower, and once the building goes down, a new location will be needed. The antenna is vital to public safety, as it allows police and fire dispatchers to contact officers in the field regarding the various emergencies that arise in town.

"We cannot be without that site when school closes in June," Fire Chief Michael Howard said.

This tower could also be the home of a beacon required by the Federal Aviation Adminis-

be needed at a school.

Representatives from Norwood Nuggets Youth Hockey also appeared at the Sept. 8 School Committee meeting to discuss a possible donation to the youth hockey league.

"In early July, Charlie Donohue, who was owner of a facility known as Puckmaster on Lenox Street, called the Norwood Nuggets and said he would be shutting down his facility," Norwood Nuggets Vice President Mark Hoover said, noting that Donohue is looking to donate some materials to the group.

Donohue hopes to donate hockey boards, plexiglass and four hockey nets to the Norwood Nuggets, which the league can accept at no cost to the town. The problem is, the Nuggets have no place to store or keep this material, and turned to the School Committee for help.

"Working with [Town Engineer] Mark Ryan, [Norwood

Nuggets President] Bill Naumann went around town and looked at a number of different places," Hoover said. "The best place we came up with, working with Mr. Ryan, was the area behind the Coakley Middle School," specifically at the cinder track near Kelly Field.

At 75 by 100 feet, the proposed hockey rink would neither interfere with the cinder track nor cover the drain in that area. It fits in the spot, though some cement work would be necessary to lay the boards. Hoover said he believes they have some volunteers ready to step forward to lay the concrete and perform the necessary work at the site. Any costs associated with the project would be covered by the Nuggets, not the town.

"[The Norwood Nuggets] will be in charge of maintaining the site," Hoover said. "There would be no cost... I can't emphasize this enough: it's absolutely no cost to the citizens here

in Norwood."

Joseph said he thinks the complex is a wonderful idea, but in order to move forward, the Nuggets need approval from numerous groups and individuals, not just the School Committee. Hoover needs to get approval from General Manager John Carroll, Assistant General Manager Bernie Cooper, Police Chief Bartley King and Coakley Middle School Principal Zeffro Gianetti.

Plasko added, "Initially, it sounds great, but I do have a lot of concerns," including storage at the site, the need for a lease agreement, potential liability and the abutting conservation land. The site's proximity to conservation land means it also needs approval from the Conservation Commission.

The discussion regarding the donation on Sept. 8 was informational in nature, and it will be discussed further at a future School Committee meeting.

Norwood hosts Snow Plow Roadeo

The first annual Snow Plow Roadeo and Safety Training was held in Norwood on Sept. 9. Eleven teams from eight towns competed in a series of events designed to showcase teamwork, safety awareness and vehicle operating skills in a competitive, fun setting. The event is sponsored by the Norfolk, Bristol, Middlesex Highway Association and the Baystate Roads Program.

"We're all about training professionals," said Christopher Ahmadjian, program manager for the UMass Transportation Center, who served as the scorekeeper for the day's event.

The eight participating towns were Natick, Wellesley, Wrentham, Norwood, Belmont, Stoughton, Westwood and Burlington.

The teams participated in four events: a safety quiz, a pre-trip inspection, backing up the vehicle with a compressor and the plow slalom. In the plow slalom, drivers must navigate the snow plow through a variety of obstacles, including traffic cones, barriers and barrels. Team could earn a maximum score of 3,500 points. The plow slalom was worth 2,000, while the other three events were worth 500 points each.

The winning team, with an overall score of 2,895 points, was the Burlington team of Frank Anderson and Michael Giardina. The Westwood team of William Troiano and David Fairnery came in second with 2,840 points, and Natick's team of Mike Pons and Peter Slamin finished in third place with a score of 2,770. Norwood's team, which consisted of W. Chip Nickerson and Kevin McGowan, scored 1,950, finishing in the middle of the pack.

Thanks to their scores, the Burlington and Westwood teams will advance to the state finals, which will be held on Sept. 29 in Fitchburg, at the Massachusetts Highway Association Equipment Show. The top two teams at the state final will advance to a regional final, where they will face the best teams from Rhode Island, New Hampshire, Connecticut and Vermont. The finals take place on Oct. 3.

The hope is that events like the rodeo and plow slalom will help prepare drivers for some of the obstacles and hazards they will face during the winter season. While the event is meant to be fun, it serves as safety training for plow drivers across the state and region.

"It teaches the drivers that they don't just point the snow plow, they have to have the skills associated with that," Ahmadjian said, and these skills include navigating tight turns, backing up long distances, understanding proper vehicle maintenance and being aware of the surrounding environment.

It also allows drivers to meet and network with other snow plow drivers.

"It gets them to compare their skills to other towns," Ahmadjian said. "It reinforces a lot of safety."

While the event itself is new, the Snow Plow Roadeo and Safety Training event has a 16 year history.

"We started doing this 16 years ago with Plymouth County," Ahmadjian said, and it has since expanded to include the Norfolk, Middlesex, Berkshire and Worcester counties, among others.

In addition to the rodeo, formal snow and ice classroom training is provided. The plow slalom, which was introduced this year, is meant to provide this training in a fun fashion.

"It's good hands on experi-

ence," Ahmadjian said. "It's a different way of approaching the same training."



tration (FAA). At the current time, the FAA is requiring the town place two lights atop the new Norwood High School, due to its height. At 316 feet above sea level, the new building encroaches into the imaginary surface, the area used to determine if something could be considered an obstacle to an

airplane or helicopter's flight path.

The water tanks, and by extension, this radio tower, extend further into this area. Carroll is hoping the FAA will waive the requirement to place lights on the High School in favor of placing lights on this tower.

"We intend to have the FAA convinced," Carroll said. "We have every reason to believe they will not require a double beacon on both the high school and the tower."

Regardless of where it ends up, at least one FAA beacon will be required in the Bellevue Avenue area, whether it is at the new Norwood High School or at this radio tower.

Residents might have a concern with a beacon near their homes, but McAllister said the beacon should not be a distraction.

"The objective is to have the light

shine up and out," he said, as it serves as illumination for planes flying above the area. "The concern of strobing someone's window or keeping someone up at night is kind of a fallacy, the way the lights are designed these days."

The light in question would be a steady red light aimed upwards. It would feature a reflective base, meaning light would not shine down towards the street and abutters.

Selectman Helen Abdallah-Donohue questioned if this tower would be used for commercial purposes in the future. She wanted to make sure its use would remain for public safety, and not become the site of cell phone towers in the future.

McAllister said this tower would be exclusively used for the public safety antenna and FAA beacon.

"This is designed specifically for this

use, and this use only," he said, noting that the structure would not support the installation of additional antenna or satellite dishes.

The board voted 4-1 in favor of the tower, with Donohue opposed. Donohue said she felt it was a good idea, but felt residents should be involved in the process.

"They have suffered a lot," Donohue said. "They have put up with a lot of changes. I think we have to give them the courtesy."

Plasko noted that a public hearing on the public safety antenna was held earlier in the year, at their Feb. 2 meeting. This was similar to ideas discussed then, the only change being the beacon. Because this is mandated by the FAA, there isn't much the board can do about that, only work to make it as little a distraction to neighbors as possible.







Home Market a go

The Planning Board unanimously approved Home Market Foods plan to expand upon their site at 140 Morgan Dr., where they will be adding an approximately 130 foot tall, 23,000 square foot freezer.

A waiver for this freezer was approved at the Sept. 7 Zoning Board of Appeals meeting. The Planning Board's approval granted a waiver regarding the number of parking spaces required at the site. The town's current bylaw requires 347 parking spaces, plus an additional 105 spaces for future expansion. The Planning Board waived 68 spaces and the 105 reserve spaces, instead of signing off on a project that would install 279 parking spaces at the site.

If more parking spaces are needed in the future, Home Market Foods will have to appear before the Planning Board for site plan approval. There is very little space on the site for them to expand, so if further expansion is needed, a garage or deck would be needed at the site.

"I think there is adequate parking for what they're doing today," Costello said.

There were several conditions attached to the Planning Board's

approval. First, Home Market Foods is expected to be the only tenant located at the site, and they will not be allowed to renew the lease of the existing tenant there, or lease to other companies in the future.

"This tenant is leaving on Mar. 31, 2011," Costello said, and once they leave the site, the amount of truck traffic at the site will reduce by approximately 50 percent.

Another condition deals with odor emanating from the site. Home Market Foods is under a Department of Environmental Protection administrative order to reduce the food smell coming from the site. Until this administrative order is dealt with appropriately, Home Market Foods will not be allowed to hire additional production employees.

This has an affect on Home Market Foods' quest for tax increment financing (TIF). A TIF

can provide a property tax exemption based on a percentage of value added through new construction or significant improvement done in a development area. It is not a discount on taxes, but a tax credit. In order to qualify for this TIF, Home Market Foods needs to expand and add 100 new employees within the next five years, but they won't be able to add employees until the odor situation is handled.
