## Planning gives Sunset until June

The Norwood Planning Board met on Monday, Dec. 17 and called a vote to extend the bond on the Sunset Avenue Project until June 1.

The vote had been originally leaning towards recalling the bond, taking the remaining \$65,000 left in the project's construction bonds (out of an original bond of about \$200,000) and ordering the Town to complete work that developer Mario Gomes has been, according to the Planning Board, remiss in doing.

The project was a small extension of Sunset Avenue to build new houses, which has been completed, but after three years of work some areas still

need attention from the developer

John Glossa spoke on behalf of Gomes, and said he asked Gomes not to come to the meeting. He acknowledged there had been problems with the site, the work for which has been mostly completed, but Town Planner Paul Halkiotis said there are several ongoing issues remaining.

First, a slope on the site is too steep and has to be reworked, and he said there are concerns that tree stumps and other organic material had been used as fill, which over time would decompose and affect the integrity of the slope. According to Halkiotis, test pits would have to be dug to assess the integrity of the site. Also, a shed on the property needs to be moved, as well as the finished landscaping plan and its implementation, all of

which Glossa agreed to.

"I certainly understand your frustration with (Gomes), I would just offer my services rather than using the resources, time and personnel of the Town," he said. "(Gomes) is going to pay me, and I have an agreement with him, so let me see if I can, to your satisfaction, get this done for you. I'm pretty sure I can."

The Board outlined their plan. Halkiotis agreed to setting up what he called a punch list, basically a checklist of things that needed to be done, and Glossa would agree and get estimates from local contractors on the cost of the work. Gomes would then put the estimated cost of the work into

# Forbes Hill preservation effort voted down by Selectmen

The Board of Selectmen voted 4-1 not to approve a petition signed by more than the required ten people that would have put a question on the Town Meeting ballot for the historical preservation of the William Cameron Forbes mansion.

The petition was submitted by Toni Eosco, a Town Meeting member from District 5, and Judith Howard, a Town Meeting Member from District 3. They decided to submit the petition because, they said, the process by which the 27-acre parcel was acquired was flawed.

“At Town Meeting I felt very unsure about voting to sell the land, especially after the results of the task force survey were in,” Eosco said. She talked about how almost 70 percent of the respondents wanted to keep some or all of the land in an interview after the meeting, and that nearly half wanted to keep the mansion.

“You can’t just obliterate a piece of the Town’s history,” Eosco said. “You can’t obliterate me.”

She noted that Forbes’s grandfather was Ralph Waldo Emerson. The site could be a tourist attraction for Norwood.

Forbes served as the U. S. Ambassador to Japan under President Herbert Hoover and Governor General of the Philippines from 1909 to 1913.

However, all of the Board members spoke to the fact that the matter had been voted upon at Town Meeting. The sale of the property had been approved then by a super majority.

Selectman Helen Abdallah

Donahue was the only board member who voted to allow the measure to go to the ballot.

“I voted for it because I wanted to see it put on the ballot,” she said. “I think that there needs to be a democratic process. They did present a petition.”

“I don’t think you can run a business or a community by a petition,” said Selectman William J. Plasko. “This issue was decisively decided already. This is nothing more than not representing the work of the Town.”

Selectman Paul Bishop added that the parcel is worth \$13.2 million and is a valuable financial resource to Norwood.

“The reason I voted against it is that the Town decided not to keep the property,” he said. “Also, it is the right of the Board to vote down a petition.”

“I don’t think we’re in a financial position to keep this parcel,” Bishop continued. “And a super-majority has voted it down.”

Bishop did, however, thank Eosco and Judith Howard for presenting the petition.

“I am not surprised by the vote at all,” Judith Howard said.

In an interview after the meeting, Eosco said she wished she had had a chance to present her views before the board, which was televised on cable, to make the public aware of the need to preserve cultural treasures over financial gains.

“It was really intimidating to stand up at Town Meeting before everyone to vote to support the parcel,” Eosco said. “There should be a democratic, secret ballot process.”

She feared that other historical properties might share

the same fate in the future. She pointed to Canton, where residents are working to preserve the Tilden House.

In other news, Superintendent James Collins of the Municipal Light Department presented his monthly report about transmission line replacement projects for the electric department. “As you know, we have been replacing our 115 KV transmission lines,” Collins said. He noted that there is ongoing environmental monitoring underway and inspections by an environmental consultant to make sure that the department is in compliance with all permits.

The department also has a number of ongoing projects underway, according to Collins. One of them is a shared savings project battery storage system at Moderna Therapeutics, Inc. at Upland Road.

“We are supposed to be online in January,” he said.

Another major project is collaboration with the MBTA on a solar system. Although he did not go into the details of the project, he said that “everything has been worked out.”

“The MBTA initially wanted a \$10,000 liability insurance policy,” he said. “It was a very unusual amount. But it has all been worked out.”

The MBTA will share its poles with the Town, and the Town will share its poles with the MBTA as a compromise.

There will be a public meeting on the demolition project of 136 Edgecroft Road

to address any questions or concerns residents may have. It will be held on Tuesday, January 8 at 10 a.m. at Town Hall in the Finance Committee Room.

Town Manager Tony Mazzucco announced that Comcast would like to terminate its public access portion of the cable contract with the Town early in order to move its office to Legacy Place.

“In exchange, Comcast would offer the Town high-definition service for the

public access channel and a technical grant of \$30,000,” he said.

He, Bishop and Cable Commission member Jane Jacobs worked out the deal with Comcast. Comcast would close the Norwood office in February. The vote was approved 5-0.

All of the Selectmen wished the Town a happy holiday season, as they will not meet again until the new year. The next meeting will be Tuesday, January 8 at 7 p.m. at Town Hall.

## PUT DOWN THE LAPTOP AND GO LOCAL

An interesting statistic emerged from recent online shopping ventures on Black Friday and Cyber Monday, two unofficial seasonal holidays that cater to those thinking \$5 off an item marked up by \$20 is somehow a deal.

Research commissioned by the National Retail Federation estimated that 165 million people made purchases either online or in stores over the Thanksgiving weekend, roughly 174 million fewer who did so during the same time frame last year.

But wait, isn't the economy chugging along brilliantly, so much so that the Federal Reserve is planning to continue hiking interest rates and inching us to higher inflation?

The shopping stats show that maybe times are not as good for average Americans compared to bonus-fueled Wall-Streeters. The unfortunate reality is that job security remains an ever-present uncertainty for most. Likewise, much-touted wage increases and tax reductions are a drop in the bucket for most households.

With all this in mind, and well-aware of the economic back-drop, we still feel compelled to suggest more shopping, not less. The key to the recommendation is not what to buy, but where to shop.

Oh sure, there are bargains to be had online and at big box retailers. But more good can be accomplished by shifting those holiday spending dollars to local businesses.

Recently, Norwood recognized Small Business Saturday which encourages residents to shop local this holiday season. And, by most accounts, local merchants did see an update in business.

Patronizing neighborhood businesses certainly can't be too much to ask. These are friends and neighbors who deserve to be thriving, not struggling, as they provide local jobs, municipal funding and, best of all, unique and high-quality gifts you might not find anywhere else.

Just one caveat: this shouldn't be a Christmas seasonal call to wallets. Food pantries and shelters need and rely upon food donations all year (not just on holidays), it would be nice to see local business support extend to the entire year.

For 2019, this newspaper would like to see more than lip service from public officials who are quick to point out how Norwood's shopping areas need help, but then nothing seems to happen. One Selectman years ago during his first campaign said it was going to be his mission to help transform the uptown area. Well, time to deliver on the promise.

an escrow account for that purpose, whatever the cost might be, and then if it was completed to the Town's satisfaction before June 1, would be able to take out his construction bond of \$65,000, as well as any remaining in the escrow account.

"I'm never in favor of the Town doing the work. I would favor having him do it with Glossa and not involving the Planner because then we're doing work for a contractor who has already made his money," said Planning Board member Deborah Holmwood. "But I still want to know that the \$65,000 stays somewhere. (Gomes) would have to front the money and we still hold the bond and then the work is done and we release it."

Planning Board member Alfred Porro said he only had one potential issue with that plan. He pointed out that the Town cannot get at that money in the construction bond unless it is for releasing it to Gomes or to complete the work on this specific project.

"Let's be realistic," Porro said. "This is going to be done going into June or July, and if he goes into bankruptcy, he's going to throw out that bond we're holding as an asset and now we're tied up in the bankruptcy court. That is an asset and shame on us if it got away."

Glossa said he doesn't know the exact financial situation of his client, but he believes the many properties he owns in Walpole are doing well and providing for him.

Planning Board Member Ernie Paciorkowski said despite the risk of bankruptcy, he feels this is the best option for the Town.

"If it wasn't somebody of your caliber John (Glossa) I wouldn't even entertain this," he said. "But let's say what needs to be done costs \$100,000 and Mario says okay, we're going to

do this. Mario is putting up another \$100,000 in an account to do the work, so if it ends up being \$110,000 and the work's not done, we still have the \$65,000 if we pull the bond. If Mario is out of the picture and we pull that bond now, we only have \$65,000 on the bond, and we're not getting another dime out of Mario."

The Board agreed with Glossa that they would allow Gomes until Jan. 28 to draw up a punch list and a cost estimate for all the work, but not everyone was happy with the decision.

"I'm disgusted," said resident Donna Titus. "He got away with it again. None of the contractors he knows will work with him anymore. He does not want to spend that money and he's hoping the Planning Board gets sick and tired of his business and gives up."

Holmwood pointed out that the bond would most likely not cover all the work needed for the project and that the Town's taxpayers would end up footing the bill.

"I don't think the Town should be on the hook for Mario's mess," she said.

The Board also voted for a continece regarding a drive-thru special permit at 958 Boston Providence Highway. The proponent, David Spiegel, wants a drive-thru there and came before the Board seeking approval, however he said he does not currently have a tenant in mind for the drive-thru.

"It's a chicken and egg situation," said attorney James Hilliard, representing Spiegel. "If we build it now there's a much better chance that someone will want a drive thru."

The main problem with the site is that the drive thru, though able to hold 13 vehicles, spills out into the parking lot beyond the property lines. While not a violation in itself, resident and

owner of the adjacent gas station, George Saba, said he felt that was dangerous, as parked vehicles attempting to exit the parking lot would be entering into the line of the drive thru. Norwood Engineering's Matt Smith said they did not feel that, regardless of the tenant, that more than 13 cars there would be a regular occurrence, despite the opening situation of the Wendy's recently down Route 1.

The Board voted to continue the hearing later before taking a vote.

The Board also voted to allow an extension of a car storage special permit at Carnegie Row around the Vanderbilt area for Spiegel. He said he's looking to develop that lot, which currently houses about 200 cars for the BMW Gallery. The Board approved the request, but Porro pointed out he doesn't see the car lot as an incentive to attract a tenant there. Hilliard pointed out that building there before a tenant expresses interest could limit the potential pool of candidates.

Holmwood said she felt there was a problem with the site, since the Board originally asked for trees in front of the parking lot about five years ago in the order of conditions for the original special permit, and they have just now been put in place.

"It did take this Board five years to get the trees planted in the front along the berm there," she said. "This is my Town and I want it to look nice and I think trees look good. Five years ago, I mean I didn't want to keep nagging him (Spiegel). I don't want to raise another teenager where I have to keep asking and asking and asking."

Hilliard pointed out that they could have made it a condition of approval.

"It was a condition!" Holmwood said.

# Boch, Norwood first responders donate hundreds of toys



# PBCC tables proposals for ongoing projects

The Permanent Building Construction Committee met last Thursday evening in room 12 of Town Hall and discussed updates with both the ongoing restoration project at St. Gabriel's Chapel and Town Hall renovations.

Mike Nee of Gienapp Design submitted three change

order proposals to the committee regarding the Chapel restoration. The first change order was a credit in the amount of \$494.38 for a sign that was determined not to be necessary for the project.

The second change order was in the amount of \$600 for additional brick work that was determined to be needed at the project site.

According to Nee, the work has already been com-

pleted and the cost of the work was based on unit PBCC

price. "We think that's a reasonable number for that amount of work based on the unit price," said Nee.

The third change order was for the re-pointing of the interior tracery at the Chapel for the amount of \$8,155.

"They had originally come to us with \$11,543 which I made a stink about and we were able to get them down to \$8,155," said Nee.

All three change orders were approved unanimously for a total of \$8,260.62.

The committee was also presented with roof proposals for additional work that was found to be needed at the Chapel.

"We had discovered that there were problems with the roof," explained Nee. "There are some active leaks around the low end, particularly over the two chantry windows and when they opened up the chantry roof along the underside they found a lot more rotting sheathing," he continued.

"We can't leave it with that situation so the only thing really to do is to take out the roof in that area to replace that sheathing and deal with the roof leak at the same time," said Nee.

Nee presented the proposals by P.J. Spillane Co, Inc. to the committee, but explained that he had received the pricing earlier the same day and did not have time to thoroughly go through each proposal himself. The pricing for the built up roof that was originally requested came back for \$83,000.

"I feel like that's a crazy high number," said Nee.

Another option, which seemed favored amongst the committee members, was for a flat-seamed copper roof with an ice and water shield underneath, for \$55,000.

"Since you just got his today, my recommendation is to continue with the due diligence on the two options and see what you come back with the next time," said committee member William O'Connor.


"I don't see any value to this project in agreeing to a number tonight. I don't hear any valid schedule complaints that necessitate us making a decision tonight," said committee member Chris Eberly.

The committee unanimously voted to table the decision for the roof until the next meeting.

Dale Gienapp, of Gienapp Design, also submit a proposal to the PBCC for window work in Town Hall on a design level for the amount of \$42,000.

The committee voted to approve the proposal but then later voted to table the proposal as concerns over the new scope of work for the windows would need to be advertised arose.

The next meeting of the Permanent Building Construction Committee will take place on December 27.



## Ask The Doctor

Junior Damato began servicing vehicles in 1969. He owns a 10-bay auto repair service center in Hyde Park and an 8-bay center in Middleboro. Junior is an ASE-certified Master Technician, ASE-certified L-1 and ASE-certified Natural Gas.

### What went wrong?

The old Big Three need to win back the U.S. buyer or they will become the Very Small Three. Let's go back to the 1960s when the Big Three sold big vehicles. The small imports were then knocking on our doorstep. Move into the 1970s and pollution controls and lower compression engines were a part of the vehicles. In 1975, the catalytic converter started showing up, as did fuel injection. This was when problems started growing for the Big Three. I started seeing both mechanical and body faults. The American car buyer would switch from Ford, GM or Chrysler when they were not happy with the brand they were driving. What happens when they were not satisfied with all three? There were oil leaks, both engine and transmission failures, and paint that peeled off, just to mention a few. It seemed that the car owner was always at fault, the manufacturers never admitted that it was a poor-quality car.

The imports started to gain popularity among unsatisfied car owners. After a few years of import ownership, the vehicle was handed down to a family member and a new car from the same manufacturer was purchased. The Big Three did not seem to care or even think about the invasion of the imports.

Here we are at the end of 2018 and GM just announced closings and layoffs. They say people are not buying their cars. Can you blame them? Why buy a car that does not fit or feel like the car you want? Why buy a car from a manufacturer that did not want to help you when there was a problem?

My question is: Why did the top white-collar executives not listen to the workers? Why didn't they listen to the buyers? Why did they not listen to auto writers like myself and organizations like NEPMA?

GM says they want to be a smaller, more profitable company. How about GM caring about the customer and building cars that are good quality and have a 10 year/100,000 mile warranty? How about a financial incentive for trading in an import?

Look at what KIA and Hyundai have done. Companies that had inferior cars years ago now produce some of the finest vehicles today. It would be great if GM could come back and build great vehicles that buyers want. To do this they need to look to everyday people, not the highly paid white-collar big shots that do not have a worry in the world.

But before any of that started, ZBA Chair Patrick Mulvehill said he wanted Hern to convey to the owners of the dealership his dissatisfaction with a practice many dealerships are taking part in, mainly the driving of car carriers on side streets.

Mulvehill said he knows this particular dealership is not abiding by the special conditions set by the original decision to allow this and other dealerships in Norwood, Special Conditions Number 12. He said he's personally seen car carriers on Pleasant Street, and has seen the Jaguar/Land Rover Dealership do this, as well as Boch Chevy and the BMW Gallery to name a few.

"They're not the only ones guilty of this, but if you could convey to the owner or the manager down there condition number 12 is not being adhered to, and they're going to get called on it," he said. "Residents don't want car carriers rumbling through their neighborhoods."

Hern said he would speak to the owners of the dealership, but said they have had problems with the delivery service companies, which are not owned by the dealerships.

Hern discussed the proposal on the table, which is a minor modification that includes the addition of two new bays at the dealership on the south side of the property, away from the resi-

dential buildings on the north side. Hern said the addition should not cause a problem to anyone, but the dealership wanted it so they could show off the features of the various vehicles to potential buyers in comfort.

Hern said right now, customers are required to sit outside while looking through their potential new vehicles, under the threat of rain, wind and snow. He said the owners of the dealership just want to allow customers to sit in comfort.

"Right now and for most dealerships it's (reviewing car details) just outside," Hern said. "We bought a car about a year and a half ago and we're sitting in the lot while the salesman is explaining how to do this and that and how your phone can talk to the car and all that... It's part of the experience of this type of brand. And they're (Jaguars) also so complicated, they want to be able to explain features comfortably."

The change is part of a modification to a special permit first issued in 2003 that allowed the dealership to operate. Hern said the dealership, like all auto sales companies in Norwood, needed a special permit to build and the special permit requires that any changes to the original plans require authorization from the ZBA.

"If it did not require special

permitting from the Town then we could pull a building permit for the addition to the building today," he said. "We're not changing the use, there's no new nonconformity and it's still going to be used for two car dealerships, but because we're dealing with a use allowed only by special permit and a decision of the board that granted relief for the opposite side of the building where the property abuts the residential zone, we can't really do anything without coming to this board to approve what really is a minor modification."

Hern said the addition will be about 1,600 square feet, but also discussed a change in the building where they want to remove two bump outs that currently hold the emblems of the dealership. He said the change comes from the car manufacturers themselves because they want to have more conformity and brand recognition. He said they do this every few years, but that the removal of those bump outs, he said, would result in the proposed addition only producing a net increase of about 1,200 square feet, as the bump outs are 400 square feet.

The ZBA also approved a variance in dimensional requirements for 212 Lenox St., a single-family home, for a new mudroom. The variance was allowed based mainly on the fact that the building was built more than 25 years before Norwood even introduced zoning and no neighbor expressed opposition to the project.

## 5- and 10-cent store

*It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas*

*Ev'rywhere you go;*

*Take a look in the five-and-ten, glistening once again*

*With candy canes and silver lanes aglow.*

The opening verse of Meredith Willson's 1951 Christmas carol contains math references with which many young 'uns are not familiar, specifically the third line.

Before probing this, let's take a step back. Originally entitled "It's Beginning to Look Like Christmas," the song had "a Lot" inserted after "Look." A popular belief in Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, holds that Willson wrote the song while staying in that city's Grand Hotel, as later verses reference a "tree in the Grand Hotel, one in the park as well..."; the park being Frost Park, directly across the street from the aforementioned Grand Hotel.


It is also possible that the "Grand Hotel" Wilson mentions in the song was inspired by the Historic Park Inn Hotel in his hometown of Mason City, Iowa, the basis for the River City (Iowa) locale of "The Music Man." This hotel overlooks a central park.

But back to the words that many in a younger generation may not recognize: "five-and-ten."

These types of stores proliferated in the 1940's and 50's. They were the precursors of Zayre's, Bradlees's, Dollar Store, Value Village, and so many others. 5 and 10 refers to cents, as in "five and ten cent stores" because so many of the products used to cost that much. Woolworth's, Kresge's, and Grant's assumed nationwide status as modern five-and-tens, even though inflation jeopardized the usage of those numbers.

Every neighborhood in Boston had a five and ten, including its lunch counter, just as it had a five cent savings bank: where else could you go to buy a sewing needle, spatula, and s-hook all in one store? They were so popular that the city installed for a number of years parking meters right outside many of them, to gobble up consumers' pennies and nickels.

Up until the 1970's I'm guessing, there was a Woolworth's at Downtown Crossing. There were many of us sad to see it go the way of Gilchrist's, R.H. Whites,

Raymond's, Kennedy's, Bond's, and other anchors of the downtown shopping district. (Okay, okay, Jordan Marsh and Filene's were the REAL anchors of the area near Winter and Summer Streets.)

And so, if you find yourself crooning this carol made famous by Perry Como and Bing Crosby, among others, it shouldn't be done so on Christmas Day because the song talks about how close Christmas is, not when Christmas actually arrives. But because anticipation is said to be nine-tenths of the pleasure, it's a great Xmas tune to be hummed and sung on the days leading up to the 25th.

## Paying Social Security Tax Doesn't Increase Benefit

**Dear Rusty:** If I started drawing Social Security benefits in May of 2007 at age 62 and continued to work and pay Social Security taxes to date, can I expect an adjustment in my benefits? Signed: Working Senior

**Dear Working Senior:** Not from simply paying the Social Security payroll tax, because paying your FICA taxes while you continue to work isn't what will cause an adjustment in your benefit amount. Everyone who works and earns (except certain public sector employees) must pay the Social Security payroll tax, even if you're collecting Social Security, and that has nothing to do with your personal Social Security benefit amount. Those Social Security FICA contributions you pay while you're working go into the Social Security Trust Fund, which is a special fund from which all Social Security benefits (and only Social Security benefits) are paid.

Your benefit amount at age 62 was based upon your lifetime work record at that time - specifically, the 35 inflation-adjusted years in which you had the highest earnings. If you con-

tinued to work after you claimed your Social Security benefits, and your earnings for any current year are more than in any of those 35 years used to originally compute your Social Security benefit, then you would get a small increase in your benefit amount. But remember that to determine if an increase is appropriate, your earlier years' earnings are adjusted for inflation. That means that your current earnings would need to be more than the inflation-adjusted earnings to cause a benefit increase.

Each year, Social Security looks at your earnings and determines whether your lifetime "average indexed monthly earnings" (AIME) number has changed, warranting a benefit increase. That annual review continues for as long as you are earning, and whenever you earn enough to replace one of those 35 years used to originally com-

pute your AIME you will see an increase. But if your current earnings aren't high enough to replace one of those earlier years, your benefit amount will stay the same. Except, of course, for any Cost of Living Adjustments (COLA) which may be granted annually (2018 COLA was 2% and 2019 COLA will be 2.8%).

# NVCC joins Energy Coalition

The Massachusetts Coalition for Sustainable Energy (MCSE) continues to add members. Recent votes by the Boards of Directors of the Neponset Valley Chamber of Commerce, the Cape Cod Canal Chamber of Commerce and the Sandwich Chamber of Commerce bring total MCSE membership to 17 representing business, employer and labor organizations throughout the Commonwealth, heading into the next Legislative Session as energy

policy is anticipated to emerge as a key issue.

“We felt it important to join with this very impressive coalition of Massachusetts organizations that are advocating for sound, sustainable and reasonable energy policies,” said Tom O’Rourke, President of the Neponset Valley Chamber of Commerce. “We believe our renewable portfolio needs to increase, but our members are very concerned that as electricity costs escalate sig-

nificantly, our economy becomes less competitive, and we aren’t even seeing emission reduction benefits anymore,” O’Rourke added. “This is the definition of unsustainable,” O’Rourke stated.

“Our business and employer communities endure some of the highest energy costs in Massachusetts,” Marie Oliva, President of the Cape Cod Canal Chamber of Commerce said. “We want to add our regional voice to

the MCSE’s efforts and make clear to policymakers that the cost of energy is a major problem for everyone, especially businesses on and around the Cape,” Oliva continued. “We are also very concerned that the region’s grid operator is clear that we are near the limits of our electricity capacity and a contingency away from the need to implement forced blackouts,” Oliva added. “That would be catastrophic for our economy,” Oliva stated.

Theresa Stanley, President of the Sandwich Chamber of Commerce said: “We have joined the MCSE because energy policy in Massachusetts could use some improvement.” Pointing to the recent increases in greenhouse gas emissions produced by large amounts of oil and coal usage during peak periods of electricity use, Stanley added: “No area of the Commonwealth is more affected by climate change than ours. The fact that our emissions progress has halted, and even reversed, while at the same time residents pay the highest rates is just galling. We aren’t reaching our potential.”
