Judge dismisses 11 of 12 BEH claims against town

Justice Richard Stearns granted Norwood Airport officials' requests to dismiss 11 of 12 counts brought against them in a US District Court civil suit by Boston Executive Helicopters, a July 6 decision said.

The only count that remained was Count VII, constitutional retaliation, which appears to be one of the more substantial claims in the original suit.

In the suit, BEH accuses current and former Airport Commissioners and staff of having conspired with fellow defendant FlightLevel Norwood - the Airport's lone fuel provider - in order to maintain FlightLevel's monopoly on fuel sales. This, BEH alleged in the complaint, violated BEH's civil and contractual rights, as well as antitrust laws. BEH has been attempting to become a fixed base operator in order to sell fuel at the airport.

In his decision, Stearns notes that it is fairly typical of small airports to have only one fuel provider - FlightLevel leases around 85 percent of the airport's ramp space - onsite.

In order for a complaint to survive a motion to dismiss, Stearns writes, it must "state a claim to relief that is plausible on its face." For all but one of the 12 counts BEH brought forward, Stearns did not find the claims to be plausible.

Stearns sided with the defendants, who said they were immune from antitrust liability under "state action doctrine." He also sided with the defendants on the counts dealing with contract breaches. For example, when it came to the land lease BEH had engaged in as subleasee, Stearns notes that in Massachusetts, "no privacy of contract (or estate) exists between a landowner and a subtenant."

2016 Boch Fund recipients thankful for help

The Selectmen announced the recipients of the 2016 Andrew and Ernest Boch Memorial Fund last week.

Each year, the Boch family donates \$30,500 to the Town, for which local nonprofits and town programs apply for a share.

"It's been somewhat of a tradition...and I would like to continue to do it," Ernie Boch Jr. said during the Selectmen's meeting on June 14, when he presented the check to the Board.

According to Selectman Helen Abdallah Donohue, Ernest Boch made the promise to establish this fund in 1997.

"It goes to many nonprofit organizations that really need it," chairman Allan Howard said. "The difficult part of it is there's so many orgs that need money these days, so it's up to the board to disperse that money."

This year, the money was split 35 ways, with the smallest shares being \$250 and the largest, \$3,000, going to the

Health Department.

According to Health Department Director Sigalle Reiss, the \$3,000 will go towards an autoclave and ultrasonic cleaner - two machines that clean and sanitize dental instruments - for the town's dental clinic. Reiss said that the town's autoclave had broken beyond repair right at the end of this school year.


The Ecumenical Food Pantry received \$1,000 from the Boch Fund. Assistant Executive Directors Nancy Maier and Claudia Mackey thanked the fund on behalf of the organization, and noted that the \$1,000 would be going towards "needs of the Foot Pantry, including vitally-needed staples and equipment."

During the June 14 meeting, Donohue said that the George H. Morse House would certainly be applying for some of the Fund, as its volunteers wanted to replace garage doors at the building. The Morse House received \$2,500 from this year's Fund.

School Committee discusses staffing, fiscal responsibility

The Norwood School Committee met on July 13 to discuss the budget, staff retention and to amend wording to policies related to the education of student substance use and tobacco use on school property.

The longest discussion of the night focused on staff departures from Norwood's schools, which prompted committee member Patrick McDonough to propose an inquiry that would examine how much of their staff is promoted internally. McDonough suggested the committee needed to figure out why so many individuals seem to seek positions in other towns.

"There's a general perception around town that we are not doing enough to promote in-house" McDonough said.

McDonough suggested an examination of staff records to determine how many positions are filled by "outside" candidates versus employees already within the school system. He expressed concern that Norwood schools weren't doing enough to retain talented teachers and administrators.

While Superintendent James Hayden, Chairman James Gormley and member Myev Bodenhofer acknowledged the importance of retaining the most qualified candidates, they agreed that the reasons for individuals to seek employment outside of

Norwood occur on a case-to-case basis.

Ultimately, they decided not to commission an internal study of employment records.

The committee also reviewed a list of the employees who are not returning in the fall. The topic of personnel departures led to a number of considerations about whether a serious problem exists.

Member Michele Eysie Mullen, who has over two decades of teaching experience, wondered if salaries were a factor for teachers and staff leaving. Lisa Igoe, on a similar note, said she hoped the system looked at prospects beyond fiscal responsibility. She said passing over talented applicants because it doesn't fit budget would be a dangerous practice

Superintendent Hayden assured the committee members that each staff member is hired based on their fit for the job, that competitive salaries are not an issue and that there is no problem in the system's culture that is driving talented staff away.

Budget

The committee then reviewed the FY 2106 budget.

"This is the sixth year where we've been allowed to finish in the black. That is a major accomplishment," Hayden said "(Business Manager Ann Marie Ellis) helps us keep honest and efficient throughout the year."

Hayden then warned of some potential budget shortfalls for FY 2017 caused by

decisions at the state level regarding a grant that would've provided funding for the salaries of four paraprofessionals.

The state originally promised a grant of over \$114,000 which Governor Charlie Baker subsequently vetoed. Hayden called this bad news but quickly offered some "good news." He explained how he and Gormley wrote a letter to the Norwood Town Government asking for additional funding from a surplus local aid.

The committee then discussed other potential shortfalls in the realm of the state Circuit Breaker reimbursement. Circuit Breaker refers to the cost Norwood accrues in transporting students with special needs to other districts to receive the services they require.

CONFEDERATE FLAG MISUNDERSTOOD

To the Editor:

I was saddened to see Ms. Fingerson's letter to the editor regarding the Confederate Flag in Norwood.

I must have missed Ms. Fingerson's previous letter to the editor relaying her outrage that the British flag flies today in downtown Norwood, in front of the British Ale House, despite British atrocities committed against fellow Americans in two wars. I must have missed her letter to the editor expressing her disgust at the Irish flag hanging outside of The Shamrock Pub, though that nation remained neutral in The Good War, in essence aiding Axis Powers. I must have missed her letter to the editor damning the flying of the Japanese flag outside the United Nations in New York, despite that country's murder of literally millions in World War II. Yes, it was the battle flag of the Confederate States of America, which advocated slavery. But the flag of the United States of America also flew over soldiers who committed the Sand Creek and Wounded Knee massacres of Native Americans, as well as Mai Lei, and a host of other tragic events. Yet no one is taken seriously if advocating the banishment of that symbol.

I think that anyone so disturbed by the mere sight of a Confederate flag, honored and cherished by literally millions of fellow citizens for reasons cited above, that they advocate alerting authorities to "hate groups in our community," in that ultimate vernacular of absurdity, "need to get out more." America is about tolerance, and respect. Our values are codified in law. When someone suggests in print that that law be used

Robert E. Lee's birthday will be coming around. I suggest Ms. Fingerson open her heart and mind and, instead of her normal breakfast that day, try Virginia ham and grits. For dinner, with either NASCAR or a bass fishing tournament on in the background, she should try chicken fried steak, okra, and black-eyed peas. It would be an admirable first step toward displaying a true embrace of fellow citizens just as deserving of their heritage, as she is of her own. Just one last piece of advice: don't salt the ham.

Stearns dismissed BEH's constitutional claims of undue process, a Fourteenth Amendment violation, as well, but ordered a proposal for a joint discovery process to further explore the retaliation claim made by BEH.

"While to this point BEH's constitutional claims fail to gain traction, there is more heft to the assertion that defendants retaliated against BEH to punish it for the exercise of its First Amendment rights," Stearns wrote. "With respect to this claim, BEH has alleged

facts that, if proven true, plausibly suggest that the NAC took adverse action against it in response to the exercise of three distinct, constitutionally protected activities. The defendants' motion to dismiss Count VII will therefore be denied."

BEH President Christopher Donovan could not be reached for comment, but members of the Norwood Airport Commission reacted positively to the decision during the July Airport Commission meeting.

Two men injured in Westwood plane crash

A plane attempting to land at Norwood Memorial Airport on July 16 crashed in Westwood, sending the pilot and passenger to the hospital with serious injuries.

The plane, a 1979 Piper single-engine Comanche aircraft, crashed into a wooded site near Pear Tree Drive. Police responded to the scene shortly after 3:30 p.m.

The crash occurred roughly three miles north of Norwood Memorial Airport, the FAA said.

The pilot, a 65-year-old Newton man and his passenger, a 77-year-old Norwood man, were both flown to Boston Medical Center with serious injuries, though one man was first sent to Norwood Hospital.

According to registration records, the plane is co-owned and the primary name listed is William Walker of Norfolk. Another listing shows Philip G. Apley of Maynard as a trustee.

Recordings from the Air

Traffic Control Tower in Norwood reveal how the aircraft seemed to disappear from view.

At one point, a voice - presumably from the aircraft - is heard saying on the radio amidst feedback that they were "losing power."

The rest of the recording reveals a conversation between the Tower and a helicopter in the air that had made visual contact with the aircraft prior to it crashing. Both parties try to locate the plane after losing sight of it.

"I lost contact with him, when he was on the right base as you did and now he's not answering," an air traffic controller said.

"He was very low, let me go over by the (UNKNOWN) and see if he's on the

ground," the pilot in the air said. "Yes, he was right here but he was a lot lower than I am right now."

The pilot said he did not see any smoke or crowds running around on the ground.

The cause of the crash is still being investigated by air and law enforcement officials, but Dedham Fire Department said it was extricating the victims of the crash at 40 Pear Tree Drive. The Westwood Police Department Twitter account said the department was treating the area of Pear Tree Drive as an active crime scene.

In all, members of the Westwood, Norwood, Dedham, Canton and Walpole fire departments responded to the scene of the crash.

received \$1,000 from the fund this year, plus an additional \$1,000 for the Farmer's Market.

"The Friends of Norwood Center are very grateful to the Boch Fund for their generous gift of \$1,000, as well as a second \$1,000 gift to our sister organization, the Farmers Market," Friends of Norwood Center President John Hall said. "The Friends of Norwood Center will use our gift to support our programs, including updating and reprinting of our very popular walking and shopping map of Norwood Center, which has already helped many residents and visitors to discover the many treasures in downtown Norwood."

Hall also noted that the organization will be soliciting further donations for its first major fundraising event - a comedy night at Norwood Theater this fall.

The Norwood Sportsmen Association received \$1,000 as well, which Louis Santoro said the organization would use for the repair and maintenance of the dam at Guild Pond.

Norwood Art Association received \$500 from this year's Boch Fund, for which the organization was very thankful. During the June 14 Selectmen's meeting, Selectman Paul Bishop noted that many of the organizations only needed a few hundred dollars or so to keep going and were often able to stretch that money to help sustain them over the course of the year.

"The Art Association expresses its appreciation to the Boch Fund for their very helpful gift of \$500, which will be applied toward the purchase of a banner, which will hang over Washington Street to promote our highly successful Art in the Park show and sale, which will celebrate its 40th year of great local artwork in 2017," Jean Hall of the Norwood Art Association said.

Several local sports organizations - including the Challenger League, Norwood Babe Ruth Baseball, Norwood Basketball Association, and others - also received money from this year's Boch Fund, though it was the Norwood American Legion Post 70 Baseball program that received the most out of all the sports organizations.

The senior team received \$1,500, the junior team received \$1,000 and the organization itself also received \$2,000 to host the American Legion State Tournament for the second time in four years. According to senior team coach Paul Samargedlis, the funds would largely be going towards hosting the tournament, including paying for umpires and power.

NPD arrest suspected drug dealer

Norwood Detectives and officers, alongside NORPAC counterparts arrested an alleged heroin and cocaine dealer on July 12.

Tomas Forty, 44, of Boston was arrested after officers observed a drug transaction in

Norwood. Forty had attempted to elude the police, but was shortly arrested without incident. Police found heroin, cocaine, and presumed drug-related money on Forty's person.

According to a statement, Norwood Police said the investigation into Forty was led by Officer Geoffrey Baguma.

The Norfolk County Police Anti-Crime Task Force (NORPAC) was established in 1987 in order to handle multi-jurisdictional issues, such as serial and violent crimes, crimes committed by traveling criminals and the apprehension of fugitives across the Task Force's 15 member towns.



bility and effectiveness," Norwood Police said in a statement.

Chief Bill Brooks said the new position allows for the four remaining lieutenants to command a division in the department, while the chief and deputy chief can oversee that. He said it is also helpful to have a second-in-command who is outside of the union.

"When I first returned to the department as chief in 2012, I mentioned that I thought the department would function better with a deputy chief," Brooks said. "I held off on that idea until the department left civil service, because the process would be more streamlined. Hayden explained that the funds set aside in the FY 2017 budget are based on enrollment forecasts, but the requirement could change based on the actual number of students who are present come September. He advised the members to prepare for any potential readjustments in the budget that may surface based on enrollment levels. Hayden explained that with budget shortfalls occurring statewide, the school system should prepare to absorb some Circuit Breaker costs.

Policy Changes

The committee began the meeting by unanimously approving language changes for four policies that deal with a drug-free workplace, the education of alcohol and tobacco use by students, tobacco use on school property, as well as the responsibilities of personnel whenever a staff member has to physically intervene or restrain a student.

They decided to alter the language of the IHAMB policy, one that dictates the steps to educate students about substance use. The previous lan-

guage stated the purpose was to delay and reduce use among kids or youth. Igoe said it should never be okay to condone any form of use among youth and all agreed that the policy be changed to prevent use, not delay or reduce.

The next policy change referred to JICH, which deals with the sale and use of alcohol and tobacco on school grounds. The committee decided to alter the language to include restrictions on the use of E-cigarettes on school grounds.

Chairman Gormley also commented that the language should be more specific regarding prescription drug use, acknowledging the rising rates of pill abuse in the state as a concern.

The committee voted to change the language in the restraint policy to reflect new developments in state law. Superintendent Hayden said student to student violence is not an issue in Norwood, but felt that the guidelines should reflect the most updated policies to avoid any case of confusion.

Jr. Legion opens playoffs with win

Norwood Post 70 Jr. manager Dan Harrington has harped on his team to play seven full innings all season long, succeeding in the effort more often than not.

In Friday night's postseason opener vs. Newton Post 440, Harrington was provided with just 5 2/3 innings of effort from his team. Which is hardly a cause for concern, given Norwood's 10-0 win by way of the slaughter rule in the bottom of the sixth inning.

"One of the things that we've said all year is to play seven innings," Harrington said after the win, which came at Barnes Memorial Park in Dedham. "We played six full, and if we played seven we would have played that one hard, too. I was really proud of the way the guys came out tonight."

Norwood, which drew the No. 3 seed in the District 6 field, also defeated Franklin on Saturday, 6-4, and Braintree on Sunday, 2-1, to earn a spot in the District 6 final - which doesn't take place until Wednesday night, in an event held after the Record's deadline.

Regardless of the result there, Norwood has punched its ticket to the Jr. Legion state tournament, however, as one of District 6's two automatic bids to the final eight. The Jr. Legion Final Eight begins this Saturday in Greenfield, Mass.

Everything was clicking for

Norwood in Friday night's win over Newton, with starter Mat Rice pitching an abbreviated complete game shutout on three hits, five strikeouts and one walk.

"He's our ace," Harrington said of Rice. "He throws a heavy ball - it's not like he has this unbelievable breaking ball, but he knows how to pitch, he knows how to locate. He's smart out there, and he made two outstanding plays to help himself out as well. He's very athletic."

The game was never really in doubt for Norwood, which led 4-0 after the first inning. Post 70 tacked on another run in the fourth, three more in the fifth, and two more in the sixth to push it to the 10-run threshold.

Cam Flahive finished 2 for 3 with a pair of two-run doubles, playing a role in Norwood's big first inning and really putting the game away with his second extra base knock in the fifth.

"Cam's on fire right now," Harrington said. "He put one into the screen the other night, two doubles here...he's a gamer."

Flahive, who will be a senior at Norwood High next season, is enjoying a breakout summer for Post 70. He saw a limited amount playing time with the varsity for the Mustangs this past spring, but he's been able to put it all together this summer while emerging as a leader on the Jr. Legion team, Harrington said.

"I asked the guys a couple of weeks ago, who was going to

emerge as a leader, because that was one thing that we didn't really have," Harrington recalls. "It's not like high school where you have a lot of seniors or captains. Cam's definitely been a leader."

The win over Newton gave Norwood a 3-2 edge in the season series, after the teams split their four regular season meetings. Harrington said that the team met at Balch School Field to take batting practice prior to the game, which didn't start un-

til 7:30 p.m.

"We went over a couple of infield things," he said of the meeting at Balch. "Everyone was pretty much all business and ready to start the playoffs. These guys were excited."

Norwood advanced in the tournament vs. Franklin behind a complete game effort from Mike James, who struck out seven Franklin hitters. James was able to help himself out with a two-run home run in the top of the first to ensure he'd never trail.

Post 70's win over Braintree was of the come-from-behind variety. Flahive started for Norwood, going 6 1/3 innings before Timmy Denehy came in to get the final two outs for the save.

Trailing 1-0 in the bottom of the fourth, Flahive drove in a run on a Braintree error to tie the game. Norwood took the lead in the sixth, after Michael Dooley led off with a double and came home on Sean Munro's two-bagger a batter later.

NHS Softball players feature on Mass Drifters team

Several members of the Norwood High School softball team have hardly left the diamond since the Mustangs' season came to an end, opting in for a summer full of softball.

Among these players are Siobhan Reen, Janelle Kelleher and Bryn Garczynski, who are playing for teams under Norwood softball head coach Carol Savino's Mass Drifters Softball program. The girls have played in a variety of tournaments and showcases following their postseason loss at King Philip on June 4, putting the game in the rearview mirror with an eye towards the future.

The trio performed well at last weekend's Cape Cod College Showcase in Swansea, Mass., with Kelleher and Garczynski playing for a U-18 team coached by Casey Butler and Reen playing for a U-18 team coached by Tierney Marceau. Kelleher and Garczynski's team finished second in its six-team bracket, posting a 5-1 record while outscoring opponents 42-8 over the six games.

"It's great to flow right from the spring into the summer so there's no break," Kelleher said of playing for the Drifters. She and Garczynski's team combined to strikeout just 13 times over the six games in Swansea. "You're still loose and everything keeps going."

Kelleher is in her first year playing for the Drifters, while Garczynski and Reen have each been at it for the past several summers. Garczynski said that she's used to the level of competition by now, whereas Kelleher is still making note of the added intensity in the games.

"There's a lot of competition, everyone is the top player(s) from their high school teams, so you can see it," Kelleher said. The junior-to-be is hitting .332 for the summer, with a paltry six strikeouts in 48 at-bats. "Especially in the pitching, they're always accurate; a lot of strikes and you don't get too many walks. Not a lot of walks."

Garczynski felt as though she was in a bit of a slump heading into the weekend in Swansea, although her stat line would beg to differ. She's hitting .495 for the summer, stealing bases at a 94 percent clip (17 for 18) and has 17 RBIs for Butler's team.

"She's a great offensive threat as she can bunt for a hit or swing for power," Butler said of Garczynski, who she called her "set up girl," as she's spent the majority of the summer hitting second in the lineup. "Fielders have a hard time defending her because of her versatility."

Garczynski played almost exclusively as a catcher for the Mustangs in the spring - despite the disadvantage of being a left-handed thrower - and has been getting significant run in center

field this summer.

"It's 50-50," Garczynski said, in terms of her preference of playing behind the plate or as far away from home as possible. "I like them both."

She's made only two errors in center this summer, while throwing out a pair of runners at first from center field - which goes down in the scorebook as a rare 8-3 putout.

Kelleher has also shifted positions this summer, moving across the diamond from third base with the Mustangs to first base with the Drifters, in addition to some time in the outfield.

"There's a little transition being on the different side, but

it's still stopping the ball, so it's fun," she said.

Butler lauds Kelleher's focus in all aspects of the game, which she believes ranks as the highest on her team.

"Janelle made a few over-the-shoulder catches and tracked balls that I never thought she'd have a shot at, everyone was really impressed," Butler said. "She's probably the one kid on my squad that I can assuredly say is 100 percent focused and in the zone at all times."

Reen, who's been playing second base for Norwood the last several springs, continues to play it for Marceau's team this summer. But Savino thinks

Reen, who'll be a senior in the fall, could be her opening day shortstop come next spring.

"She's always been a player, Siobhan has talent," Savino said. The opening at shortstop comes on the heels of Alyssa Chamberlain's graduation, as the three-year starter for Norwood will look to continue her softball career at Bentley University.

Two more weekends of tournaments and showcases remain for the Drifters, with the Dudley Showcase beginning today in East Hartford, Conn., and the NE Finest Showcase taking place next weekend in Plainville.

Norwood hosting Final Eight on Saturday

It's not the manner in which Norwood expected to be here - not by a long shot.

But here Norwood is nonetheless - here being the 2016 Massachusetts Final Eight American Legion baseball tournament, which begins this Saturday at Balch School Field.

Since the announcement that Norwood would be hosting this year's double-elimination state tournament, it's been predetermined that Post 70 would lay claim to one of the eight bids, regardless of its performance during the regular season.

Norwood lost three of its first four games this summer, followed by a stretch which saw them go 9-4, bookended by three more losses in its fi-

nal four games to finish the season a pedestrian 11-10 and on the outside looking in of the District 6 playoffs.

"We're going to be the underdog going into the tournament," Norwood manager Paul Samargedlis said on Monday. "Not only record wise, but I look across the state, and there are teams that are loaded - several towns combined into one [team]."

Norwood finished the regular season with a run differential of plus-3 (133-130) through 21 games, numbers significantly inflated over its final two contests: a 20-16 loss vs. Needham Post 14 on July 11, and a 17-7 loss vs. Foxboro Post 93 the following night to eliminate Norwood from districts.

"I look at the last two games and I don't really count those as far as our over-

all performance," he said. "We knew even if we rolled out a guy who had pitched, we were tired. We played uncharacteristically sloppy; that might have been the best thing for us, to have some time off."

Norwood beat out bids from Milford, Quincy and Sudbury to host this year's tournament, bringing it back to Balch for the second time in the last four seasons. The format was entirely different in 2013, however, as Massachusetts sent a team to the National Bound Tournament based off records at the halfway point of the summer; the Final Eight at Balch was more like "hosting an invitational," according to Samargedlis, as the winner's season came to an end after the tournament.

The tournament begins on

Saturday at 9:30 a.m., with the first of four games on the day's bill. Games will also be played at 12:30 p.m. and 4:30 p.m., and after the opening ceremonies are held at approximately 7:30 p.m., Norwood will take the field vs. an opponent yet to be determined.

"We hope to get a lot of fans out there in support of us and that will fuel us, too," Samargedlis said. "The kids not only recognize that they're playing for their town, but they're playing for the veterans that made it possible for them to play baseball. They're also playing for the people who watch the games, and for the previous players who kept this program strong. You don't get to host the state tournament like this unless you've got a history of good baseball in your community."
