## Asphalt reps feel widening road unnecessary

Representatives from the Norfolk Asphalt Plant at 601 Pleasant St. met with the town on Monday afternoon, and once again argued that traffic mitigation at the Dean Street/Pleasant Street intersection would be unnecessary.

Both Town Planner Steve Costello and Town Engineer Mark Ryan believe the town and the asphalt plant should enter into an agreement and share the cost associated with widening this intersection. In a June 6 letter, Ryan wrote, "Currently, motorists traveling northbound on Pleasant Street at Dean Street form two lanes of traffic that allow right turns onto Dean Street. When an occasional large vehicle is present, the informal right hand turn lane disappears. The large volume of trucks expected to be

generated by the Norfolk Asphalt project would make this a more frequent occurrence, thereby increasing delays at the intersection. The project proponent should be required to mitigate this by fully constructing a right-hand turn lane or to enter into a partnership with the Town of Norwood to perform this mitigation."

At Monday's meeting, Ryan added, "My biggest issue is traffic on Pleasant Street. Once you start introducing a large number of trucks there, that informal right hand turn lane disappears."

He estimated it would cost between \$80,000 and \$90,000 to widen the intersection, and the town has \$37,000 available.

Plant owner Gerry Lorusso disagrees with this assessment, mainly based on the site's history. Though it hasn't been used as an asphalt plant in approxi-

mately 20 years, the site housed Basic Rental and Supplies, and the number of trucks utilizing Basic Rental is higher than the expected volume that will utilize the Norfolk Asphalt Plant.

"The volume of traffic is going to be less than it was with Basic," Lorusso said, and since delays at the intersection weren't a problem in the past, they won't be a problem with a site that generates less traffic.

A traffic report from Pare Corporation generated in 2007 and updated in 2011 estimates that the "total daily trips are projected to be in the vicinity of 85-90 per day," with a roadway peak hour volume of less than 10 trips. This is significantly less than Basic Rental's use of the site.

"Basic Rental and Supply generated a peak weekday fig-

As Selectman Michael Lyons said, the Downtown Steering Committee is continuing their efforts to make themselves relevant. They are in the early phases of creating an independent, non-profit 501(c)3 merchant's organization which will support, promote and organize events for Norwood Center.

Town Planner Steve Costello noted the Downtown Steering Committee could legally start the 501(c)3 process, even if the group will be separate from them.

"Legally, all we need is a few really strong people to agree to put their names on

some legal paperwork," Costello said. "I think finding these people would be a way to legally get started... all you really need is a real strong group of four people, at least."

He noted that the Dedham Square Circle organizations started with just three people, and grew into the success it is today because of the efforts of people like Peter Reynolds, who is cited as the group's "Chief Visionary."

"I think you need to get some people who are movers and shakers," said Downtown Steering Committee member Ed McKenna. "There has got to be people who can contact other people and get them in-

# Demolition preparation starting to gear up

## Asbestos abatement underway

Construction crews are preparing for the demolition of the original school on the hill. On June 18, crews began erecting temporary partitions in the West

Wing, marking the beginnings of asbestos abatement. Once asbestos abatement is complete, demolition of the building will begin.

“Starting on Monday, [June 20], we’re going to start building the containment on the north side of the West Wing. That is

for the asbestos abatement,” said Kathleen Labouliere, Executive Manager for Agostini Construction, who added that the containment is meant to keep the asbestos and other particles from escaping that area of the building.

This work was set to take place while high school was still in session. The last day of school is June 23, meaning there will be an overlap between the construction and school hours. As a way to mitigate this, construction crews will be working during a different shift. On Monday, they worked the first and second shift, but on Tuesday and Wednesday, they worked the second and third shift.

“That way, there will be no

## Editorial

# Does Norwood miss the beat?

Having the duty each week of scrutinizing the police logs and reducing/editing them to a manageable size to fit into this newspaper, I have an opportunity to note trends in what types of calls police are responding to, in what neighborhoods they are more often than not called to, and what kinds of crimes and other activities are on the rise.

Also, a large part of my weekly time is spent in Norwood Center, particularly the Washington, Central and Broadway blocks. What I can't help but notice is a lack of police visibility. Having spent almost the last 20 years with at least one office on Washington Street between the downtown area and the ward, I used to see cops on motorcycles, bicycles and on foot all the time. We would receive notices on our office doors that the police had been by just to check that everything was in order. Community policing wasn't just a sound bite, but an actual visible movement on the streets where we lived and worked.

What is becoming more and more alarming are the number of reports of syringes and other paraphernalia found in the neighborhoods, of drunks and druggies needing to be removed from public ways and of people asking for money openly and without reservation on the streets, particularly near retail and other congested areas. Twice I have been personally asked for money by what appear to be men in their late teens to early twenties in the parking lot on Central Street at the corner of Day Street, both times being told they needed a dollar to afford a train to get back home.

Because of these observations, I directed our reporter to find out about the lack of police visibility and how and why the department has changed its modus operandi. The result is the article on Page 5 of this week's newspaper. No surprise, the Norwood Police Department, like many of us today, is being asked to do more with less.

Even though the numbers of service and 911 calls are increasing, the personnel of the department is not keeping up, and, in fact, will be reduced soon as two cops will take advantage of the early retirement incentive program currently being offered, and their positions are not scheduled for replacement.

It would be naïve to think things will miraculously get better. Even though this newspaper has taken some serious hits in the past for suggesting one reason for the increase in crime is the ever increasing number of rental properties being built wherever there is a swatch of undeveloped land, we still contend that the growing population of transient residents lends itself to a higher rate of crime.

Even with taking all of the above into consideration, this newspaper still thinks Chief King should find a way to get a cop or two on their feet, so to speak, walking a beat in Norwood Center and South Norwood. We don't question his point that police cruisers strategically positioned around town act as deterrents to crime, but we do question the seeming lack of recognition that people take comfort when they have a chance to stop and say hello to a cop on the beat, and that one of these chance meetings may positively impact someone considering a criminal act.

Times are tough and this column should not be construed as an indictment of the Norwood Police Department. We just miss the more visible police force of years past and hope someone can figure out a way to put a face to a cop's name on the streets of Norwood.

### MRS. SCOTT SAVED MY SON

To the Editor:

After five years of working for Norwood Public Schools, Mrs. Ann Scott is retiring. For these five years, with an exception of a few months, she has been working as a teacher's aid directly with my son. It seems simple and not worth mentioning if not for very special cir-

cumstances. In June of 2006 my son who has autism, severe speech delay and obsessive-compulsive disorder was thrown away from his Collaborative Program. It was suggested to me that he should go to a very expensive (in excess of \$100,000 a year) residential program. No school wanted him. No, Norwood Public Schools didn't want him either. It took four months and mediation with the Bureau of Special Education Appeals before he was admitted, just for two and a half hours a day, to a PACS classroom in Norwood High School with Mrs. Scott as his one on one aid. That was a surprising choice since everybody stated before that my son needed a STRONG, YOUNG MALE as an aid. Yet Mrs. Scott was a woman with a frail body but a healthy mind who, although young at heart, was approaching retirement age. She came from Vermont, the state that prides itself on 100 percent inclusion, so she didn't see anything wrong with my son attending Norwood High School. Because she treated my son with both respect and compassion, always trying to see the world from his perspective, she helped my son avoid residential placement. The miracles she has been delivering almost daily in quiet, unassuming ways saved my son.

He happily attends Lead program for the full day now. He is learning job skills on a few different job sites, he learns to cook, clean, shop, and manage his bank account. He even tries to talk with his peers, although that is extremely hard for him. This year at LEAD was his best school year ever and that includes 10 years in a private school and two years in a collaborative program.

Yes, Mrs. Scott saved my

son. We, Robert and his family, thank her from the bottoms of our hearts. But she also saved the Town of Norwood and/or Commonwealth of Massachusetts at least \$500,000 dollars. And I wish that was a reason for words of appreciation from the schools' and town's administrations.

noise while the kids are in school," Labouliere said, and the noise impact on the neighbors will be minimal, as the asbestos abatement is indoors.

Building Inspector Mark Chubet expressed some concern over the work, and wanted to ensure that this abatement in the West Wing wouldn't block stu-

dent egress, should an emergency arise during the last few days of school. It was confirmed that an egress plan is in place, and students would safely be able to leave the building.

There is a cost related to the night work, as the construction crews must be paid a night differential. The Permanent Building Construction Committee voted to allow their chairman, Ted Callahan, to authorize a construction change directive of up to \$15,000 to pay the costs associated with this differential.

There will be some selective demolition during the asbestos abatement, but the majority of the demolition work won't begin until July.

"Right now, it's tentatively scheduled that the demolition is going to start on July 12 for the West Wing," Labouliere said, and the entire Norwood Senior High School building will be down by the time students start

the 2011-2012 school year.

"All the demolition is scheduled to be done by Sept. 4," Labouliere said.

J.R. Vinagro Corporation was selected as the demolition contractor, and they will be tasked with demolishing the building and controlling the dust and noise levels at the site as they do so.

"There is a lot of anxiety about the demolition, and we've got to be sure that when you start, you've got it under control [as it relates] to dust and noise," General Manager John Carroll said.

There will be water trucks and fire hoses on site, and these will be used as crews attempt to keep the dust level at a minimum. It's understood that the demolition is occurring during the hot summer months, so there will noise and dust coming from the site, but crews will work to keep it under control.

# Still on the beat, just not on foot

You might not see them walking down Norwood Center or in South Norwood, but the police department still patrols the streets of town. They just don't do it on foot anymore.

"They do patrol the downtown area, but they're not as visible as they once were," said Police spokesman Kevin Grasso, as there is one cruiser assigned to South Norwood and one assigned to Norwood Center.

When he joined the Norwood Police Department 25 years ago, Grasso noted they had two beat cops who patrolled and walked around Norwood Center and South Norwood. Though this was the norm for several years, the South Norwood beat cop was given a cruiser, and the Norwood Center beat cop received one shortly afterwards.

"As the years have gone on, we're basically in our cruisers at all times... we're called in all sorts of directions," Grasso said, noting that the cops that patrol the downtown and South Norwood areas will respond to calls in other parts of town if necessary.

Both Grasso and former Police Officer and current Selectman Paul Bishop noted one reason for this change is an increased number of calls. Norwood has its own dedicated 911 service, and the Norwood Police Department responds to all 911 calls, whether the calls are due to an accident on Route 1, a young child playing with the phone, a dead animal in the roadway, shoplifting at the

Nahatan Plaza stores or a misdialled attempt at 411.

In addition to an increased number of 911 calls, the department deals with a high number of calls for service. In May alone, the department responded to 2,537 such calls, which in addition to 911 calls, includes disturbance calls, domestic dispute calls, well-being checks, motor vehicle stops, community service calls, alarm calls and E-911 calls.

"The number of calls keeps escalating," Police Chief Bartley King said. "It increases every year."

While the number of calls keeps increasing, the number of police officers is not. In fact, it's the opposite, as some members of the department are expected to retire as part of Early Retirement Incentive program used to balance the town's Fiscal Year 2012 budget.

"Over the years, we're doing more at the Police Department with less," Bishop said. "We're taking more calls with less personnel."

Bishop noted that before he took an administrative job in the department, he was one of these beat cops, and he feels they have a valuable role in the community.

"I firmly believe, if we have the manpower, that someone should be assigned to South Norwood and to Norwood Center on the walking beat," Bishop said. "They should be out there, they should be speaking with the people and they should be talking with the merchants."

Bishop noted the old beat cops had several assigned routes in town, including down Washington Street, to Guild Square

and on Central Street, from the Norwood Light Department to the Post Office. They can still cover these routes - and many more - with officers in police cruisers, but something is lost when officers aren't out walking the streets. Having a walking cop makes it easier for people to meet the officers who protect the town, and it might make people more comfortable or willing to speak to the police about any problems or concerns that arise in town.

"If people know their police officer and know their fireman, they feel more of a personal connection," Bishop said. "It's good for the police officers, and it's good for the community."

While the beat officers aren't walking the streets, they are still present, mainly patrolling in their cruiser. King believes this increases police visibility in town.

"You might not see a police officer, but you can't hide a cruiser," King said, and the presence of cruisers at key areas around town acts as a deterrent. "It deters people from doing things they might ordinarily do if they don't see a police car there."

King noted that the beat cops

and area cops are expected to meet with the merchants and introduce themselves to people in the area. One way they do this is with the Adopt-A-Cop program, a service done at all the elementary schools in town, including St. Catherine's. Once a month, the area cop is expected to stop by the school and mingle with the students, often during the lunch hour, so they do not interrupt classroom time.

"This way, the kids get to know the cop assigned to their area," King said.

In addition to the two beat

cops, there are four area cops who patrol the town, a radar car, a roving vehicle that covers the town as a whole and goes where it is needed and a patrol sergeant. There are usually nine vehicles out at any given time. The other seven vehicles will be called to a scene before the beat cops are taken off their patrol, King said. If they are not out patrolling the town, they are often doing working at the station.

"They never stop working," King said. "When they're not out there doing something, they're here writing a report."

# Fourth of July theme, grand marshal announced

The annual Fourth of July parade is always a huge success in Norwood, as thousands of people line Washington Street to watch as the antique cars, fire trucks, bands, military units and community groups make their way down the parade route. The town and the Fourth of July Committee hope to have another successful celebration early next month.

The Fourth of July committee recently announced the theme and grand marshal for the annual parade. Serving as this year's grand marshal is former Superintendent of Schools and namesake of the James R. Savage Educational Center, James Savage.

"We are proud to announce that the Grand Marshal for this year is James Savage," said Fourth of July Committee member Maria Henry, adding that they have also invited the members of the School Committee and current Superintendent of Schools Jim Hayden to participate in the parade as well.

This all ties in to the 2011 Fourth of July theme, which deals with education.

"This year, our theme for the Fourth of July, in honor of the new high school, is 'education is the foundation of a nation,'" Henry said, and the Norwood High School logo will be prominently displayed on this year's Fourth of July t-shirts.

Fourth of July Committee member Martha Colamaria noted the parade, in addition to celebrating the birth of our nation, would celebrate the opening of a new Norwood High School. She noted that the new school is the latest in a long line of Norwood schools, the first of which was built circa 1788. The first high school in town was built in 1890, and this new school will open to students in September.

"Our forefathers established institutes of learning to form the future leaders of our country," Colamaria said, and it is important to celebrate and recognize the role the school plays in everyone's life.

Selectman Bill Plasko noted, "Going with this theme, you couldn't have picked a better person to be grand marshal."

Though the event is the Fourth of July Spectacular, activities begin on Sunday, July 3. The Bridgewater Antiphonal Society will perform numerous

show tunes and patriotic songs during their concert, which is part of the 2011 Norwood Concerts on the Common series. The show is free of charge, and runs from 7 to 9 p.m.

The Fourth of July activities begin at 1 p.m. with the Children's Bicycle, Tricycle, Doll Carriage and Historic Character parade. For just \$1, children can participate in this event, which involves them riding their decorated bike or walking their decorated carriages from the First Congregational Church to the Town Common.

"It's a site to see," Henry said. "The entirety of Washington Street is filled with children, bicycles and doll carriages having a ball."

The next portion of the celebration involves a carillon concert, coupled with a tour of the Tilton Memorial Carillon. This year's Fourth of July Carillon Concert features Adrian Gebruers of Cobh, Ireland.

Another annual event is the Firecracker 5K Road Race, which starts at 5 p.m. The race,

which typically attracts 200 runners, starts at Washington Street near the Town Common, goes to Hawes Brook in South Norwood, and back. Racers are sure to be cheered when they cross the finish line.

People can register the day of the event, or can pre-register by filling out a form at the Civic Center. It costs \$15 in advance or \$20 the day of, or \$10 for seniors and students. There will be prizes in numerous age groups, and cash prizes for the top three male and female finishers overall.

The race is followed by Norwood's Fourth of July Parade Spectacular. The parade will feature numerous classic cars, a World War II and Korean War Military re-enactment procession, several fire trucks and numerous floats, bands, military units and community groups.

The parade - particularly the fire trucks - can be very loud, so to accommodate people who want a quieter Fourth of July experience, they have established a quiet zone near the Norwood Hospital.

"It's not noise free, but it is quiet," Henry said.

While they have high hopes for the event, Henry and other members of the committee need financial support to help ensure its success.

"It's a wonderful day. It's a bit of old town USA - but we need funding and volunteers," Henry said.

Assistant Manager Bernie Cooper noted they have been hard at work fundraising, and have received support from groups like Lustra Cleaners, Roche Bros. and Norwood Bank, but they need more funds to help cover the costs of the event, such as paying the many non-profit groups who march in the parade. Cooper noted that many of the non-profit groups rely on the parade for their annual budget.

"Virtually all of the groups that are paid to participate in the parade are themselves non-profit groups," Cooper said.

## Youth step up for Fernando

The residents of Norwood continue to support Fernando Morales, a 16-year-old Norwood High School sophomore and soccer star who is battling Ewing's Sarcoma. The Father Mac's Field was filled with hundreds of soccer players, all passing, kicking and shooting as they raised funds for the Morales family.

First, residents came together for Fernando's Fight at the Olde Colonial Café in early May. Now, in addition to their annual picnic, Norwood Youth Soccer partnered with Fernando's Fight and held a 3 vs. 3 soccer tournament on Saturday, June 18. All funds raised by the tournament went to the Fernando's Fight Fund at Norwood Band, and will assist the family as Fernando continues his battle with the disease.

"When the board heard Fernando had come down with cancer, we started talking about what we could do to help," said event organizer Jake Ryan. "A soccer tournament was a no-brainer for us. We've never done this before, but we ended up with over 50 teams."

Ewing's Sarcoma is a malignant round-cell tumor, and is a rare disease in which cancer

cells are found in the bone or soft tissue. The disease occurs most frequently in male teenagers. Treatment often involves multi-drug chemotherapy as well as local disease control with surgery and radiation. Morales started his chemotherapy treatment on Monday, April 4, and continues to undergo intense chemotherapy every two weeks. Once this chemo regiment is complete, he will be re-evaluated for the next treatment step, which could include radiation and possible surgery.

The tournament provided non-result oriented play, and each team had three scheduled games. Age groups featured were Under 8/9, Under 10, Under 12, Under 14, High School and Adult. A maximum of six players were allowed on a U8/9 team, and a maximum of five players at U10 and above. Dozens of teams signed up, and soccer was played from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Participants from Norwood, Douglas, Medfield, Milton, Dedham, Foxboro and Westwood were all represented at the event. Over 50 teams, including Fernando's Little Kickers, The Corner Kicks, The Golden Knights, Chicks that Kick, the Soccer Studs and three different Sharks, participated in the event. In addition to playing

in three games, each participating team received a Fernando's Fight t-shirt and patch.

With a \$100 per team participation fee, \$5,100 was raised for Fernando's Fight from registration fees alone. Additional money was raised from raffles, t-shirt sales and food sales.

"It's a very worthy cause," said Norwood Youth Soccer president Dick Penta. "All the donations raised here today go to Fernando's Fight."

# Relay raises thousands for ACS

Hundreds of Norwood residents came out for the 14th annual Relay for Life of Greater Norwood. The Relay for Life is a long-standing American Cancer Society fundraiser that supports the group in their ongoing effort to research and find cures for cancer, and this year, the 49 participating teams raised over \$91,585 for the organization.

"The Relay For Life is a community driven, [24-hour] walk for cancer, aimed to celebrate people who have battled cancer, remember loved ones lost, and provide participants with an opportunity to fight back against the disease," said volunteer and event Co-Chair Jay Colamaria. "It is run by the American Cancer Society, and takes place annually in our local community. The Relay For Life of Greater Norwood encompasses the towns of Canton, Stoughton, Norwood, Sharon and Walpole, as well as other surrounding communities."

The event kicked off at 4 p.m. on Friday, June 17, though the Open Ceremonies weren't held until 6 p.m. Per tradition, the event started with the Survivor Lap, where cancer survivors walk the first lap around the track. Then, the Caregiver Lap and the Team Theme Lap filled the Walpole High School track with hundreds of walkers supporting the American Cancer Society and the numerous

cancer survivors.

This series of inspirational laps was immediately followed by Survivor Dinner, and all cancer survivors were presented with a piece of birthday cake and heard a rendition of "Happy Birthday!" sung by all the children present.

The Survivor Lap isn't the evening's only themed lap. Throughout the event, themes included a Luau Party Lap, a Costume Party Lap, a Pool Party Lap, a Pajama Party Lap, a Rock & Roll Birthday Lap and a Birthday Party lap. The fact that these laps are all party themed is no coincidence: the theme for the 2011 was birthdays.

"The American Cancer Society is the official sponsor of birthdays, and aims to create a world with more birthdays celebrated, where cancer won't claim another life," Colamaria said.

Another inspirational part of the event was the evening's Luminaria Ceremony. At 9 p.m., the hundreds of luminaries lining the track were lit up, providing a light in the darkness for those walking. The luminaries bear the name of someone who battled cancer, and represent someone special who has been profoundly affected by cancer and the family and friends who continue to fight back in their honor.

The top team of this year's Relay was The Jollycats, led by captain Kathleen Smith. Together, members of the team raised over \$8,365. Other lead-

ers were the RFL Quarterbacks, who raised \$6,045 and Corners United, who raised \$5,749.

These three teams were just a few of the 49 participating teams, and Colamaria noted participants came from many different backgrounds and walks of life.

"Families, friends, co-workers, business and community leaders, children, grandparents and neighbors are all here for the same reason: to end cancer," Colamaria said. "While each of us have a different reason for being here, we all want to make a difference in the fight against cancer."

The Relay for Life dates back to May 1985, when Dr. Gordon Klatta, a colorectal surgeon from Tacoma, Washington, ran and walked around a track for 24 hours, raising \$27,000 for the American Cancer Society. This marked the beginnings of the event, though the first formal Relay for Life was held in 1986, and featured 220 people spread across 19 teams. The Relay for Life entered Norwood in 1998, and through 2009, was held at the Norwood High School. Due to the construction of a new school, the event has taken place at the Walpole High School for the past two years. volved."

Norwood needs to find its own Chief Visionary to help move the process along, but in order to do that, they need to let people know such an organization exists. The committee's plan is to hold a special meeting for local businesses, landowners and Town Meeting members to outline the plan and try to stir up some excitement about the center.

"I would like to try to get a room full of people and see if there are pockets of enthusiasm and people who want to get more involved," Lyons said.

The committee is planning on hosting such a meeting at the Olde Colonial Café some time in July. The Friends of Norwood Center kickoff dinner will be held on July 18 at 7 p.m. They plan on having representatives from the Dedham Square Circle speak at this meeting, so the final time is contingent upon their schedule.

The plan is to invite the approximately 280 businesses and 100 property owners to the kickoff dinner, though the committee recognizes they might only see a 10 percent response. However, it is important to let all the groups know about the kickoff event and extend personal invitations to key players in the downtown area.

"There are some influencers out there you want to bring into the core group,"

Lyons said.

The influencers are important because creating this organization goes beyond talking, planning and enthusiasm. They need someone who can be a strong fundraiser and dedicate time to this group. Fundraising will play a key role, as they expect this separate organization will hire a Downtown Manager.

Hiring a Downtown Manager was a recommendation featured in the new, recently completed Downtown Master Plan. A Downtown Manager will be tasked with promoting the downtown, organizing events and fundraisers for the area and attempting to increase awareness and excitement about the area.

The committee discussed potential names for the group. Though nothing is finalized, the group agreed that it was important to incorporate "Norwood Center" into the name, and names like Historic Norwood Center, Norwood Center Co-Op, Norwood Center Partnership and Norwood Center Business Association were all considered, before the group opted to use "Friends of Norwood Center" as a potential name. Committee member Julie Vecchio has been tasked with creating a logo for the group.

"Friends of Norwood Center - it sounds good," said General Manager John Carroll.

ure of 82 vehicles per hour, while the proposed batch concrete facility on the adjacent lot is projected to generate less than 10 vehicles during its peak hour," the report states. "Given that the Norfolk Asphalt trip generation remains constant and the 88 percent decrease in traffic from the closure of Basic Rental and Supply, the impact on the abutting streets is an improvement..."

Lorusso added, "During the 10 years when Basic operated, there were more trucks. We apparently operated okay the whole time Basic operated, and we'll have significantly less volume now."

Another one of Ryan's concerns was the potential of trucks queuing on Pleasant Street as they wait to access the site. In his letter, he noted, "From experience and discussion with truck drivers that frequent the Hyde Park plant, there are days when trucks are parked on Hyde Park Avenue waiting to enter the facility. This must not be allowed to occur on Pleasant Street."

Lorusso said he was aware of the issues of Hyde Park, and these issues should not be present in Norwood. The site has a different design, and there should be ample room in the parking lot for trucks to queue.

"I think there is more parking here available," Lorusso said, noting additional spaces designated for trucks.

"We know that long term, we can't have trucks out there," Lorusso said. "While we don't anticipate a problem, we can't

anticipate everything," and they would be willing to address the issue should it occur on a regular basis.

Tim Higgins, Vice President of Development for Edgewood Development, noted there is already parking for 10 trucks at the site, but they could fit approximately 10 more if needed.

"The site has changed since 2007 for the better for the storing of vehicles," Higgins said.

They are also willing to work with the town's requests to minimize dust, odor and noise emanating from the site. One of the town's requests is to make sure all trucks transporting raw matters or asphalt are covered to minimize the generation of fugitive emissions. Lorusso noted that this is a state law and Department of Environment Protection requirement, and they would have signage on the site indicating this.

"We will have signage," Lorusso said. "We can't force people to comply with state law, but we assume they will comply with the statute... if people consistently do what they are not supposed to do, they will not come back."

Higgins added that they watch the site like a hawk. He expects they will get people calling to complain, as there has been neighborhood opposition to the plan, as seen by Stop Norfolk Asphalt Plant. Higgins said they are working with Director of Health, Sigalle Reiss, to create a form and written protocol for what to do when complaints of dust, odor or noise is reported.

With the development plan review meetings now complete, Lorusso anticipates that he will apply for a building permit within a few weeks.

## Boys' lacrosse celebrates seniors' success

The Norwood boys' lacrosse team featured four seniors, a first-year head coach and postseason aspirations entering this season. The Mustangs reached the playoffs in each of the last three campaigns, and its upperclassmen brought skills and leadership to help its younger players thrive.

The Mustangs fell short of the postseason, but developed a team identity through experiences they will carry into next season.

"Despite the record, we definitely had a successful season this year," Norwood head coach Anthony Roman said. "Through all the growing pains of that process, the players worked their tails off and continued to improve."

Inconsistency plagued the Mustangs at the start of the season. Norwood opened its campaign with consecutive road losses to Scituate and Newton North, allowing 26 total goals in the two contests.

The Mustangs defense struggled in the early going, but showed its speed and work ethic in the squad's first win of the season. Norwood outworked Milton, controlling the ball throughout the contest and earning a 15-6 victory.

The win showed Norwood's defensive potential. The Mustangs limited opponents to a combined 23 goals in the squad's six victories this season, and they will use their defensive talent to compete next year.

Norwood defenseman Kyle Postler led the team's defensive efforts, earning a spot on the Bay State Conference All-Stars Second Team. Postler, one of four seniors on this year's squad, displayed aggressiveness and quickness as he set an example for younger players.

Norwood senior captain Brian Rossman led the Mustangs' offensive attack. The Mustangs attacker recorded 76 points, but earned team MVP honors for his work on and off the field.

Roman acknowledged the team's seniors played an important role in the squad's growth. In addition, the upperclassmen provided assistance for a first-year coach in the Bay State Conference.

"It's going to be tough replacing Rossman and Postler," Roman said, "but we have a solid core of juniors returning next year."

Norwood struggled following its victory against Milton, losing four of its next five contests. But the team showed im-

## Norwood Post 70 wins fifth consecutive game

The Norwood Post 70 American Legion baseball team has frustrated opposing pitching staffs with its offensive output this season. But the squad has shown it possesses the pitching necessary to compete as well.

Norwood defeated Medfield 12-7 in seven innings Sunday as it moved into second place in the District 6 West standings.

Norwood earned its fifth straight victory behind a consistent offensive attack. The team fell behind Medfield 4-1 in the second inning, but chipped away at the lead as the game progressed.

Norwood's Sean O'Neill and Anthony Perriello sparked the team's offense in the third.

"I'm happy with those guys," Norwood head coach Paul Samargedlis said. "They're a good hitting team."

But the Norwood offense was far from done as the team completed its second, five-run inning in the sixth, taking a 12-4 lead. Medfield head coach James Lagos earned an ejection in the inning after two Norwood players scored on a passed ball.

Medfield made things interesting in the seventh as Perriello relieved O'Neill on the mound. Medfield scored three runs in the frame, but the deficit proved to be too great to overcome as Norwood earned a 12-7 victory.



season was only just beginning.

The average waste generated per household in North America is approximately 2,000 lbs. per year and it is estimated that about 50 percent of the total waste stream could be composted. On average, residents who compost at home can divert a minimum of 650 pounds per year from the solid waste stream. The Earth Machine is made of tough high-density polyethylene with UV stabilizers for all season strength and weatherability. It is made of high-density injection-molded polyethylene with a minimum of 50% post-consumer recycled materials. Unit dimensions when assembled are 33" diameter by 33" high, and weights 15 lbs with a volume of 10.5 cubic feet. ## EARLY MORNING AEROSOL (ULV) APPLICATIONS

Please be advised that the Norfolk County Mosquito Control Project will begin the 2011 early morning ULV aerosol applications on or about May 31, weather permitting. This program will be a continuation of the procedure, which has been used in past years: May 31, through September 30 - Adulticide aerosol (ULV) applications. (2:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m. (sunrise), Monday through Friday.)

If any resident wishes to know when the spray program may be conducted in their area, they should go to the Projects website at <http://www.massnrc.org/ncmcp>, or contact their local Board of Health. If an individual would like to see a map and/or street listing of the areas to be treated, they should click on the following link, and then click on their town. Current early morning aerosol application schedule and maps <http://massnrc.org/ncmcp/ULVSchedule/ULVSchedule.htm>

Please note that the ULV map and/or street listings will be posted on or about 3:30 p.m. the day before the sched-

uled application day. Residents may also contact the following number 617-582-6216 after 3:30 p.m. the day before the scheduled treatment to receive information detailing the streets/areas to be treated in the town.

The purpose of the adulticide application is to control nuisance and/or virus carrying adult mosquitoes. The control product being used is DUET (EPA Reg.# 1021-1795-8329) applied in ultra-low volume (ULV) sprayers at a rate of approximately one half ounce per acre of finished spray.
