# Wings of Freedom returns

The Wings of Freedom Tour traveling air show returned to Norwood Airport this weekend.

The tour, put on by the Collings Foundation, features authentic World War II aircraft for walk-through tours and flight experiences. According to

Norwood Airport Manager Russ Maguire, the tour has been coming to Norwood on and off for the past 20 years.

“We had a great turnout for the Wings of Freedom tour,” Maguire said. “The reason we enjoy hosting this event is that it gives the public a close-up look at aviation history.”

This year, the Tour brought a P-51

Mustang, a B-17 Flying Fortress, a B-24J Liberator, and a B-25 Mitchell to Norwood for families to explore, and several took advantage of the flight experience option and actually accompanied pilots for brief flights around the area in the vintage aircraft.

The B-24 was painted after “Witch-

# First 40B app post-safe harbor filed by Davis

The Town of Norwood received an application for a 300-unit 40B development just four days after the Town’s safe harbor status from such projects expired on Sept. 4.

On Sept. 8, the Davis Marcus Partners, on behalf of site owners Trumbull Center Limited Partnership and Fairfield Mortgage Limited Partnership, submitted a Comprehensive Permit Application to build its Forbes Hill project on a 21.02-acre site on Upland Road. A hearing with the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) has been scheduled for Oct. 6.

“The 300 apartment unit comprehensive permit application submitted by the Davis Marcus Group is the only 40B the Town has received since the Safe Harbor ended on Sept. 4,” Town Planner Paul Halkiotis said.

The project will include 12 residential buildings, which will all be three-story or four-story split structures, and a 7,000 square foot clubhouse/pool building. Parking will be split between 128 attached and detached garage spaces, and 439 surface spaces for a total of 567 parking spaces.

Under the state 40B laws, municipalities are considered to have local need for affordable housing - and must therefore accept 40B developments - unless 10 percent of its housing stock is affordable, or 1.5 percent of its total land area is dedicated towards af-

# BEH, Airport drama in court again

Norwood Airport and tenant Boston Executive Helicopters are again squaring off in court, this time over public information requests.

“We have been asking for the emails between the Airport Manager and the two Town Employees, Mark Ryan and Kevin Shaughnessy, that specifically mention me or BEH,” Boston Executive Helicopters (BEH) president Christopher Donovan said.

Donovan said BEH has been seeking this information from the Town for over nine months and the matter is now before the Norfolk Superior Court in Dedham.

During a status conference on Aug. 17, court documents show that the Court ordered defendants Francis Maguire, et al, to “produce all emails of Russ Maguire, Mark Ryan and Kevin Shaughnessy for the prior two years mentioning BEH or its president, Mr. Christopher Donovan” by Aug. 31.

BEH’s attorneys allege that the Airport officials did not begin a “prompt” and “immediate” review of the emails, nor did their attorney seek any extension of the Aug. 31 deadline. BEH attorneys also said they received requested documents via email an hour and 20 minutes prior to the hearing on Aug. 31. A thumb drive was also provided at the hearing.


“The production (of the documents) itself was wholly deficient,” a

motion from BEH's attorneys read subsequent to the deadline. "The defendants redacted entire emails, including sender and recipient information, and withheld from production documents clearly not privileged."

According to the Clerk's Notice dated Sept. 2, regarding the Aug. 31 hearing, Judge Raymond Brassard ordered the status conference continued to Sept. 14 and for the Town to produce the requested records "by noon on Sept. 10, 2015." BEH's attorneys said that this was done instead of holding a contempt hearing.

However, prior to the scheduled Sept. 14 hearing attorneys for the Town of Norwood requested that the testimony of Norwood Technology Department Director Mark Redlich be excused, due to his observance of Rosh Hashanah on the day of the Sept. 14 hearing.

Claiming that Redlich is a "material and necessary witness regarding the defendants' failure to comply" with the Aug. 17 order to produce certain documents, BEH attorneys said the request to excuse Redlich's testimony should be ignored and the en-

tire hearing should be continued to a time Redlich identified he was available, Sept. 24.

According to a document sent from BEH's attorneys to the Civil Clerk's Office at the Norfolk Superior Court on Sept. 15, the Town's attorneys had requested "relief in connection with inadvertently disclosed emails" in an emergency motion.

Some of the emails made available, the Town's Attorney contended, should not have been made available in order not to violate Attorney-Client Privilege, as they were "inadvertently produced 'without any fault' of the defendants."

BEH attorneys said the Town had failed to make a showing, which they said is required by legal precedent, that the privilege has not otherwise been waived.

"In light of the five-year delay from certain members of the Norwood Airport Commission and (the) Manager who are also Town employees, we asked for their public emails regarding me and BEH," Donovan said. "They refused outright. We have now spent over \$100,000 of our hard-earned money and prob-

ably just as much of the citizens' tax dollars to get public records."

Airport Manager Russ Maguire said he had no comment when asked about the current legal proceedings, and NAC Chairman Mark Ryan did not respond to a request for comment.

BEH, which operates a helicopter charter at Norwood Airport, has sought permission to operate as a Fixed Base Operator (FBO) at Norwood Airport, which would allow it to fuel other aircraft at the airport and provide other services to the tenants. Currently, the sole FBO at Norwood Airport is FlightLevel Aviation.

BEH and the Norwood Airport Commission have struggled to process the application for a number of reasons, including BEH's submission of required financial documents to the NAC, and Donovan has accused NAC of giving preferential treatment to FlightLevel at the airport.

A criminal investigation was also opened earlier in the year at the airport, when FlightLevel said BEH was illegally using FlightLevel-leased land and barriers it had erected were tipped over.



craft," an 8th Air Force bomber that flew 130 missions over Europe with the 467th Bomber Group. The B-17, made by Boeing, was painted as "Nine-O-Nine", an 8th Air Force, 91st Bomber Group aircraft. The P-

51 fighter plane, which was used as an escort for bombers during World War II to protect against enemy fighters, is nicknamed "Betty Jane."

Wings of Freedom staff were on hand to answer questions and Norwood Airport also had some of its staff and facilities available. For Maguire, hosting the event was a no-brainer.

"After all, it was aircraft like these that helped to secure the peace back in World War II.

Also, the Wings of Freedom tour gives the public a chance to see what a great facility we have here at the Norwood Airport," he said.

According to its website, The purpose of the Collings Foundation, which was founded in 1979 and based in Stow, Mass., is to "organize and support 'living history' events that enable Americans to learn more about their heritage through direct participation."

# Selectmen discuss roadway issues

The Board of Selectmen and a number of Town officials are taking steps to address rush hour traffic issues in the Codman Road area.

Prompted by complaints from two Codman Road-area residents, Paul Kohisaat and Barbara Riker, the officials held a conference call with MassDOT officials about making some traffic signal and lane shift changes.

Kohisaat submitted a video that showcased the increased traffic, which Selectman Helen Abdallah Donohue said was "very, very helpful" in illustrating the increase.

Chairman Paul Bishop said the traffic issues took place in the mornings and between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m. When traffic backs up along lower Washington Street, Bishop said cars travel down side roads at a "relatively high rate of speed" in order to cut ahead of the traffic at Washington and Everett Streets.

Selectman Allan Howard said the issue might stem from the traffic jams on I-95, which force cars to look for a better route along Route 1. And when Route 1 is backed up, the cars then go to alternate streets, such as Pleasant, Washington, and "even Prospect Street."

"All of them in the morn-

ing for several hours and the evening now are jammed up big time," Howard said. "I so support this to help these people."

According to Bishop, the problem is two-fold: the Town wants to try to move traffic along as best as possible in that particular area, and wants to avoid perilous situations for children walking along the street and waiting at bus stops. Howard said there were no sidewalks in the area either, making the situation especially dangerous.

During the conference call to address the issue - which included the Town Manager and Assistant Town Manager, the police and fire chiefs, the Norwood Police safety officer, two selectmen, and the Public Works superintendent - it was determined that changes would be made to the traffic patterns in the area in three to five weeks, with the help of the state Department of Transportation.

Bishop said he had met with the two complainants and announced that the Town would be placing signs at several intersections barring entrance of through-traffic from between 6:30 - 9:30 a.m., school buses excluded.

"It is a serious problem and it's been a problem for a while now," Bishop said.

Selectman Bill Plasko, in the interest of "leaving no

stone unturned," made a motion to approve the traffic changes and posting of signs, which the Board unanimously approved.

During his personal agenda, Howard also identified a problem with dumping of yard waste along a median on Westover Parkway. He said he saw a man dumping a barrel into the median where a stream is located. Much of this yard waste, Howard feared, might contain pesticides that could get into the stream.

As such, Howard spoke with Town Manager John Carroll and Town Engineer Mark Ryan about hand delivering letters to all residences that abut the road warning against putting such waste into the median. Howard said the issue has gone on for a long time and also suggested signage be put in saying "no dumping."

Donohue said the idea was good, but did not know about sending out letters "blaming everybody." Selectman Michael Lyons said it appeared to be a "generational habit for some people in that particular neighborhood," and said a simple heads up via letters was "not a bad idea."

The Board approved the proposal to send letters, but not post signs, 4-1 with

## DEMAND BETTER NORWOOD GOVERNMENT

To The Editor:

Well here we go - another 40B on Upland Road. If I lived on Bird Road or further down I would be livid. The Board of Selectmen (B)OS), Planning Board, and Zoning Board of Appeals are making one of the best family towns around into a way station for apartment dwellers to hang their hat for a few years and leave for places unknown. Norwood was knee-deep in large apartment complexes before the recent spate of building of 40B/40R apartment projects. I assume we will lose the court case on the most recent 40B - Davis/Thorndike on Upland Road - because our officials put in no effort.

Let's see, we will have 40 (units) at Regal with Mr. Duffy, who buffaloed Town Meeting with the number of parking spaces he had available. There is supposed to be one per apartment. Check the lot out - I think they will be lucky to get 20 spots there - even after the Planning Board gave him five bites of the apple. Town Counsel did a bang up job on this. Not.

Then we have Campanelli's mess at the Polaroid site. Bill Plasko said, unbelievably, amongst other things in the Norwood Record right before the election, that I was responsible for this fiasco. I was the one who fought so hard to protect our commercially-zoned lands by creating the Economic Development Committee and getting Quincy to allow us into their Economic Target Area. It seems like everyone in town hall fought me on this at first, but then we had UTI come in with substantial tax revenue. Campanelli then asked for an amended agreement in 2009 for an extension of time for commercial development. The Selectmen agreed, however, Mr. Carroll and Mr. Plasko neglected to have (the agreement) certified with the state EACC, which would have bound Campanelli to exclusive commercial development. Workhorses shuffle paper and count paperclips. Think quick: What has any member of the BOS proposed that was truly good and important for the Town of Norwood?

So, the BOS creates the 1.5% committee to prove we have met our 40B de minimus. The only ideas came from the

audience and the citizens on the Committee. Brian Hardiman even offered his house on Plimpton Ave to be restricted, and was summarily rejected. The head of the Norwood Housing Authority was asked to landscape some land that would have improved our percentage. I heard he said the neighbors might get upset. No dice.

I suggested we talk with owners of land in our FEMA flood plain area and do a sale/leaseback with them. It must be a bad idea if Drummey suggested it. I still don't know the outcome of the Advanced Geographics report. The last report on the Website is dated from February of this year labeled "HOT". That's a good one. Davis filed the day the safe harbor ran out on September 7th. Dave Hajjar, the Chairman did a good job to the extent he could, but an addition to the numerator proffered by him was rejected like Brian Hardiman's offer was. Dave was also told he was not needed for the legal defense team - if there will be a legal defense. I think he would be better than anyone, including our Town Counsel.

We are at something like 1.5002 % and ripe for a challenge. Our boards need to understand that 40B are referred to as "hostile". This means they run roughshod over our zoning by laws. Yet with Campanelli, our hard guy ZBA waives Norwood's stricter wetlands zoning by laws to allow them to use the state's laws - even though the Conservation Commission said not to. That really showed them. Am I naïve or stupid?

Now, keep in mind that the Avalon group wants to build hundreds of apartments at Plimpton Press. That is valuable commercially-zoned land and should be researched for service type economy jobs. They certainly cannot use the 40B cudgel. I guarantee we will hear that apartments would look nice there. The thing about these large apartment complexes is that people are transient, the owner's run it like a commercial business but pay the residential tax rate, and they bring lots of kids into the schools that cost about \$14,000 per year, per student right now. These folks have no particular interest in the town. I know because when I was running for selectman in 2002, there was

no need to knock on doors in Windsor Gardens, Norwest Woods, Norwood Gardens, and Olde Derby Village. Why? I had the prior year's voting list and nobody voted in town elections from these complexes.

So, let's assume the 1.5% fails and we allow Avalon to build at Plimpton, that would be around 800-900 new apartments in a town that had too many complexes to begin with. Let's be conservative and assume these generate 300 new students, this would be \$4.2 million dollars in new expense, plus a new school. Of course, you can have fiscal suicide or more overrides. What's the difference?

By the way, if the Community Preservation Act is brought up by our fearless leaders, it should have a wooden stake driven right through it. This is another stealth tax - theoretically used to preserve land. What land, you ask? That is a good question. All the apartments have it, or it is wetlands.

## WHO ARE TOWN OFFICIALS LOOKING OUT FOR?

To the Editor:

Norwood is no longer the bucolic town it once was. This rapid rate of change to become the "city in the suburbs" is astounding. The fact that so many out of town developers have come to Norwood to build their apartment complexes leads one to believe town officials approve the direction this town is taking. There already is an abundance of existing multi-family dwellings in practically every district. Adding more apartments with new construction will alter the dynamics of Norwood where the percentage of rentals surpasses that of home ownership. Just look at the numbers of projects we know about.

Avalon Bay - District 7. Norwood approved Avalon's request to hook up their housing development project in Sharon to Norwood's sewer

line. Now, Avalon has a purchase and sale agreement to buy Plimpton Press with intent to build 200 apartments.

Campanelli/Upland - District 1 behind the Oldham School. Two hundred sixty two apartments within seven (7) three and four story buildings, plus a parking garage and club house.

Comenitz - District 6 on Short Street in South Norwood across Washington Street from the proposed regional hockey rink. (Original plans were for 600-apartment units-nothing at present.)

Davis/Forbes - District 1 abuts Route 1A between the two bridges. Just presented to the Zoning Board is a 40B application for a 300-unit apartment complex. A public hearing is scheduled for Tuesday, Oct. 6, 7 p.m., Room 12, Town Hall. It is important for abutters and Town Meeting members to be there.

Endicott - District 5 off Walpole Street near Hannaford's. Under construction are 112 apartment units in eight buildings.

Regal - District 7 across from Plimpton Press. Forty units to be built. Regal's owner came to Town Meeting for a 40R saying he had leased adjacent MBTA property since 1975, so TM approved it. It was learned later he had not and purchased the property only in summer 2015. At present, the number of apartment units in the process of being constructed or being proposed total more than 900. The effect of all this new construction and the increase in population and traffic will have a tremendous impact and strain on Norwood's already overcrowded schools as well as on Norwood's other services including police and fire. It could cripple the town economically, particularly for seniors, who now number almost 25 percent of total population. The destruction of woodlands to make way for these projects will have a damaging effect on surrounding neighborhoods. Please

note the many homes on the market as residents are moving out of town. Town officials are supposed to be our town's guardians and caretakers, but do they believe economic development takes precedence over the quality of life of residents? Kudos to the writers of previous letters who brought this to our attention and who are very concerned for our town's future.

Add to the mix the proposed hockey rink, the Massachusetts Eastern Regional Ice Skating Rink and Recreation Center, coming to already dense South Norwood and a proposed building to house three sheets of ice for the Skating Club of Boston at the Campanelli/Upland site. Unless Norwood residents and voters oppose this onslaught of new construction, this once bucolic town of Norwood, Mass., will be no more.

Donohue opposed.

The Selectmen also received a letter of opposition to putting a proposed dog park behind the Ellis Nursing Home, in a playground and field area, from Ellis Avenue resident Margaret Fox. Bishop said he had spoken to some of the dog park advocates and they agreed to remove the site from the list of possible locations for the dog park.

The Selectmen also voted to increase some of the license fees for 2016. Plasko said that though it is difficult to raise fees, it was the Board's obligation to adjust fees periodically to "keep them up to date with costs" and "comparable with other communities."

"We haven't done it in a few years because of the economy," Plasko said. "I don't think we should do it in a big way."

Plasko proposed "modest increases," usually of around \$100, to things like Liquor Licenses, taxi and limo licenses, and renewals of said licenses, and other alcoholic beverage licenses. Many of the others, including inn holder and lodging house licenses, and various entertainment fees, were kept the same.

The Board approved the fee increases on a 3-2 vote, with Donohue and Bishop opposed. Donohue requested that the vote reflect her abstention in regards to on-premises liquor components.

# Saint Catherine's 125 years marked with celebration

Saint Catherine of Siena celebrated its 125th anniversary on Sept. 20 with a special mass and much fanfare.

The chapel was filled with parishioners, school alumni, and parish friends, as Bishop John A. Dooher of the Boston Archdiocese led the mass. A reception was held afterward in the Saint Catherine of Siena School cafeteria.

"The celebration went wonderfully," Saint Catherine's pastor Father Stephen Donohoe said. "I would say it was a great success and sincerely appreciated by all. It renewed and rekindled past memories and friendships. It provided a wonderful opportunity for people to share special memories with each other."

Donohoe said Catholicism

in Norwood dates back to 1678, but immigration in the 1840s really brought the community to the forefront. Eventually, a former Universalist church was purchased in 1868 to provide a permanent home for Catholics in Norwood.

The building was renovated and then dedicated to Saint Catherine of Siena on Aug. 3, 1868. Saint Catherine was a theologian and philosopher in 14th Century Italy who worked to reestablish the papacy of Gregory XI in Rome after it was removed from France and established peace among the Italian city-states. Saint Catherine is one of Italy's two patron saints, and was named one of the six patron saints of Europe

by Pope John Paul II.

Saint Catherine's was officially adopted as a Catholic parish in 1890 and a new church building, which stands today as the current home of Saint Catherine of Siena parish, was established and opened in 1910.

Father Donohoe noted the close link between the parish and the Norwood community throughout the years.

"The Town and parish share common influences of the industrial age and immigration which gave rise to their development," Donohoe said. "Saint Catherine Parish has nurtured and cared for family life and in

fordable housing.

When the applicants submitted a similar proposal in 2013, the Town was said to have around 5.7 percent. Today, the Town still has not reached the 10 percent, though it is believed Forbes Hill could add 2.41 percent to the total and would push the town over the threshold.

Town officials do believe Norwood has reached 1.5 percent of its developable land dedicated to affordable housing since it received safe harbor, and is poised to use this as a defense against this project.

During a Planning Board meeting in August, Halkiotis said the Town's calculations - done largely by the 1.5 Percent Task Force assembled by the Selectmen - put the total at just over 1.5 percent. Halkiotis could not say whether the Town, or specifically the ZBA, would be denying the project based on this figure.

"The ZBA is the body, and only body, that can invoke the 1.5," ZBA chairman Phil Riley said. "It is up to us to do it, or to not do it."

According to Riley, the ZBA is anticipating some

word from the Town, specifically the Board of Selectmen, before the Oct. 6 hearing as to whether it should invoke the 1.5 percent issue in denying Forbes Hill.

Riley said the decision has to take place within 15 days of the hearing, in which the developer has an additional 15 days to respond. From there, DHCD has 30 days to make a decision, and whichever party is aggrieved by the decision can appeal to the Housing Appeals Committee.

Riley said that no town has won a 1.5 percent appeal with the Housing Appeals Committee since its new regulations took effect. So far, nearby communities such as Stoneham, Milton, and Newton have all lost.

The ZBA was required to schedule a hearing within 30 days of the filing of the Comprehensive Permit Application, and Riley said typically, those hearings are just introductory. However, since this is a 40B application, the ZBA will be determining whether or not to use the 1.5 percent issue and claim that the Town has met its local need for affordable housing.

Some residents believe the Town's strategy for building a defense against 40B's was flawed, and the Forbes Hill project is imminent.

"I expect the ZBA to approve this 40B based on Town Counsel's advice," resident Kevin Pentowski, who has been critical of multi-family developments, said. "The 1.5 Percent Task Force was a

farce. The real numbers to defend our town from developers have not been used."

The Forbes Hill buildings will contain 161 one-bed units, 123 two-bed units, and 12 three-bed units. Per 40B regulations, 20 percent of the units - roughly 60 apartments - will be deemed affordable, in which applicants cannot earn more than 50 percent of the median family income. If the project is built, all 300 units will count towards the Town's subsidized housing inventory.

The developers have recruited engineers Vanasse Hangen Brustlin, Inc., Architect Cube 3 Studios, and 40B advisor Edward Marchant, a Brookline real estate expert, for the project.

"If this project is approved, that will make 720 new housing units with all the recent apartment projects to hit town, all placed in what was commercial property," Pentowski said. "We are destroying our tax base instead of expanding it. The long term effects will be a disaster."

According to the application, the project has no adjacent residential uses, except for single family housing on Bird Road, which is downhill, across from Route 1A and a set of train tracks from the site. The application also lists homes more than 600 feet from the site on Clapboardtree Street, and the four 10-story building 40B development under construction at One Upland, which will see over 260 residential units.



## Mustangs Football sinks Wayland 20-7

Make it two up, two down for Norwood football in 2015.

After pulling away from the Framingham Flyers on the road in Week 1, the Mustangs played their first game of the season at Norwood High School last Saturday afternoon and knocked out the Wayland Warriors, 20-7.

It was a well-rounded effort for Norwood, a program that's beginning to make last year's strong finish look like it was no fluke.

Quarterback Joe Leanos completed nine of 17 passes for 128 yards and two touchdowns, while running back Joe Mazzotta carried the ball 10 times for 112 yards to lead the team in rushing. Zac Pungitore had a touchdown on each side of the ball, a 21-yard receiving touchdown in the first quarter and a 37-yard interception return to ice the game in the fourth.

Leanos, who was No. 2 on the quarterback depth chart for much of 2014, has caught the eye of Mustangs head coach Jim Tighe through eight quarters in '15.

"He understands more this year, he gets the reps at practice," said Tighe. While Leanos

was technically the second-string QB a year ago, he did see a decent amount of playing time in certain packages throughout the season, and made the start on Thanksgiving Day vs. Dedham.

"He's starting to understand what Kevin [Igoe] wants him to do. He's got some work to do, but he's definitely doing a good job. He's got a great supporting cast."

The versatile Keith Stokes, who lined up at defensive end, fullback and tight end during the game, had another strong game on the defensive side of the ball. He had a sack, tackle for loss and a forced fumble in the contest.

"When he wants to, he can take a game over," said Tighe. "He goes through spurts where he just dominates. He's got all the skill in the world."

Norwood received the ball to begin the game, with each team failing to score on their first offensive series. The Mustangs forced a three-and-out for the Warriors on their first try with the ball, and got back to work at the Wayland 47-yard line to begin their second drive.

Leanos completed a 21-yard pass to Pungitore on third-and-4 to keep the drive alive, a wild catch by Pungitore, who was able to wrap the ball around a defender's helmet to secure the

completion. Two plays later, Leanos connected with Pungitore again for a 20-yard touchdown pass, putting the Mustangs on top, 6-0 (the extra point was no good).

Wayland received the ball at the 50 after a Norwood three-and-out near the end of the first quarter, and wasted no time getting down to the Mustangs 14 before the drive came undone thanks to an Adley Eugene interception in the end zone.

Eugene returned the pick to the 29 rather than kneeling it in the end zone, which would have given Norwood possession at its own 20. Whether the extra yards mattered or not, the Mustangs struck again, this time on a 36-yard pass from Leanos to Sean Mellen. It was a remarkable job by Leanos getting rid of the ball, as the Wayland pass rush was mere inches from bringing him down when he flung the ball loose to a wide-open Mellen. Norwood went for a two-point conversion and succeeded on a trick play, with Leanos pitching the ball back to Mellen, who threw to Mazzotta in the end zone for a 14-0 lead. The score stayed that way until halftime.

The Warriors received the ball to begin the second half, and gave truth to the old adage

## Field Hockey beats Braintree, falls to Natick

Norwood escaped Braintree with a 4-3 win in a contentious Bay State cross-division affair on Friday afternoon

In the first meeting between the teams since 2012, head coach Allison Doliner came away impressed with the improvements Braintree had made in the interim.

"They've obviously done a lot of work in that two years," said Doliner, who was still an assistant coach with the Mustangs at that time. Norwood held a 4-1 lead in the second half before Braintree chipped away, its rally ultimately falling short. The Mustangs were short-handed for five minutes in the second after a penalty against Casey MacDonald for "playing too rough," according to the officials. Doliner had her player's

that the best defense is a good offense. Keeping the hot Norwood offense on the sidelines, Wayland hogged the ball for 9 minutes, 51 seconds to begin the half, completing a 16-play, 80-yard drive with a 1-yard touchdown run by Wesley Jones to cut the deficit in half, 14-7.

While the lengthy Wayland drive gave the Warriors a brush of momentum, Tighe took it as an encouraging sign after the game in that it didn't rattle his team.

"They don't get down," said Tighe, noting the Mustangs held just a one-point lead at halftime vs. the Flyers last week and responded well. "They were confident today, even after that drive. Our kids hung in there, there's no doom or gloom."

## Jim Sweeney Patriot League 25th Anniversary Team

Norwood High School golf coach Jim Sweeney joined an elite group of players last month when he was named to the Patriot League's 25th Anniversary Baseball Team.

To commemorate its 25th anniversary, the Patriot League, a Division I league comprised of 10 colleges and universities in the northeastern United States, selected the 25 greatest players in the history of the league in the various sports it offers and rolled out the teams over the course of August.

Sweeney, who played at the College of the Holy Cross in Worcester, was one of three Crusaders players to make the list.

"I saw something at the beginning of August, that they were announcing teams, but I didn't really think much of it," said Sweeney, who played at Holy Cross for three seasons (1998-2000). "But then when they released it, and I was on there, it was obviously something that was nice."

Sweeney, who is already in the school's athletic hall of fame, was named the Patriot League Player of the Year for his sophomore year in 1999, when he hit .448, an average that still stands as the second-best for a single-season in league history. His career .375 on-base percentage (OBP) still

ranks fourth.

"The Patriot League, having been around now for 25 years, with a lot of good players that I played against, and played before me, and then after me...to be one of the 25 selected, it was pretty special," said Sweeney.

Making his hitting numbers even more remarkable is that Sweeney was ultimately

drafted as a pitcher by the Chicago White Sox after his junior season in the 14th round of the 2000 MLB draft. While at Holy Cross, the left-hander would perform designated hitter duties on days he wasn't pitching. He received All-Patriot League honors three times, twice as a hitter and once as a pitcher. He was third team All-America

in 1999.

"That year that I hit .448, it was fourth in the country for Division I. It was lightning in a bottle, I don't think they had the scouting report on me yet," Sweeney said, laughing.

Still, Sweeney is upbeat about his career with the Crusaders, and the accolades of

being named one of the 25 greatest players in league history.

"Between that, and being able to get in the [Holy Cross] hall of fame last year, to have this on top of it the next year, it's something I never really thought much about," said Sweeney. "But it's a pretty cool honor."
