

## Planning Board approves hospital expansion

The Planning Board unanimously approved a site plan and major project special permit for expansion of the Norwood Hospital campus earlier this week.

The project, which still requires a separate approval for variances through the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA), includes a new 30,000-square-foot medical office building with underground parking, a three-story parking garage, a fourth-floor addition to the Lorusso building and expanded lobby space with a new main entrance and parking off Broadway.

Following a presentation by Stantec Consulting Services for Norwood Hospital, the Planning Board voted 5-0 to grant a special permit and site-plan approval for the project to move forward.

The expansion will allow Norwood Hospital, which is owned by Steward Health Care, to convert many three- and four-bed rooms in the Lorusso building to one- and two-bed rooms, giving patients more privacy, hospital officials have said. The new medical building will allow many Steward physicians currently working throughout the town to relocate and work on the hospital campus.

The total expansion involves 89,000 square feet of construction, including 55,000 square feet of new construction and additional rehabilitation work. Joseph Gallagher of Stantec Consulting said new signage will be added to designate the new



# A hockey rink square off

With Town Meeting less than three weeks away, a group of residents opposing the South Norwood hockey rink is preparing to make its case to the town.

At the same time, proponents of the rink are reaffirming their commitment to bring the facility to the Coakley Middle School site.

Last week, Patty Bailey of the South Norwood Citizens for Community Action submitted a petition with 141 signatures for inclusion on the Special Town Meeting warrant to “see if the town will vote to reject the Coakley Middle School site as the location to construct the proposed public indoor ice skating and hockey rink, or take any other action in the matter.”

Reached earlier this week, Bailey said her group is preparing to make a presentation to the Annual Town Meeting on Monday, May 13. They are preparing an informational packet that will be available to Town Meeting members, she said.

“We’re hoping that we can prove our case,” said Bailey. “We’ve always maintained that the rink project itself is not the issue for us. The bottom line is it’s just the wrong place.”

Bailey and others have continuously spoken out in opposition to having the rink at the Coakley Middle School, citing traffic, pedestrian safety and other concerns. Bailey said she has collected over 600 signatures from across town on a

separate petition opposing the site for the rink.

“It hasn’t been basically just a South Norwood issue. We’ve spoken to people throughout the town. We have some Town Meeting members and a few town officials [on the petition],” said Bailey, including Selectman Paul Bishop and members of the Finance Commission. “We hope we have a fighting chance at Town Meeting.”

On the other hand, others say the process to select a location for the hockey rink has been fair and transparent, and the support is overwhelming.

“We wanted an open process, which is what this was,” said Bill Naumann, president of the Norwood Nuggets Youth Hockey and member of the Recreation in Norwood Committee (RINC), which has been committed to bringing a rink to Norwood.

Naumann said the selection of the Coakley site represents years of research by RINC as well as a public review process by the Norwood Rink Site Selection Committee, a panel of town officials that studied several sites and recommended Coakley as the best one.

Counter to the notion that the rink project is being hurried through to benefit a small minority as some have suggested, Naumann said the strength of the town is that it provides a wide array of pub-

lic amenities that benefit different groups. For example, he said, the Civic Center gym is a public facility that recently received town funding for new equipment, but only a relatively small percentage of residents go there.

“That’s an amenity in the town that a group of people use. But that’s money well spent,” said Naumann. “If you’re looking for something that’s going to appeal to the entire mass of the town, you’re not going to have any amenities. RINC’s overall view has been that we don’t want to ram anything down anyone’s throat.”

Naumann added that town Rink Site Selection Committee has received expert opinion that the rink will be self-sustainable and will not burden the town taxpayers.

“I think that’s the misperception that most people have. From what we’ve been told from people that build rinks, this is not going to cost the town anything,” he said.

However, some have questioned whether the \$5.6 million in state funds will be enough to cover the construction and ongoing operation of the rink.

Judy Langone, chairwoman of the Norwood Finance Commission, said that she has

# Selectmen submit two rink articles for Town Meeting

With several questions still to be answered about the South Norwood hockey rink, the Selectmen agreed to scale down what they will ask Town Meeting to approve for the project next month.

At their meeting Tuesday night, the board voted to include an article on the May 13 Annual Town Meeting warrant seeking authorization to pursue the release of state funds for the rink at the Coakley Middle School site.

As part of the vote, the board agreed to eliminate language in the article that makes reference to relocating the tennis courts on the school property and installing a traffic signal in front of the school on Washington Street.

On a separate article to outright reject the Coakley site, the board took no position and merely voted to include the article on the warrant.

Selectman Mike Lyons, who made the motion to simplify the money article, said he felt the rest of the article was "too detailed" given the complexity of the project. Outside of seeking the funding, he felt that other aspects of the project - including a transfer of school-owned land for town use - should be left for a future Town Meeting to decide.

The Selectmen could have pursued the \$5.6 million in state funds for the rink on their own, said Lyons, but made the deci-

sion to first bring the discuss to Town Meeting.

"The idea of us bringing this to Town Meeting in the first place was to get a feel from Town Meeting on this proposal at this location," said Lyons. "To build the entire project in this article seemed excessive to me."

However, there is still a requirement for Town Meeting to approve the transfer of the land around the Coakley tennis courts to the town in order to place the rink there and move the courts somewhere else. Lyons noted that the School Committee has yet to see a detailed plan on how this process would work and where exactly the tennis courts would be rebuilt on the site.

While the School Committee voted recently to support the Selectmen in pursuing the state funds, they have yet to vote on transferring any school property for the project.

"We didn't think the transfer was ready to take place due to the fact that we don't even have a draft agreement with the governor to release the funds," said Assistant Town Manager Bernie Cooper. "We're probably not in the position to have all those questions answered. I think we would be back probably [to Town Meeting] for further action in September."

Selectmen Chairman Bill Plasko agreed that bringing the initial discussion to Town Meeting was the right way to go, agreeing as well that a more detailed plan will have to be brought back to the body.

Selectman Helen Abdallah Donohue, however, was skeptical of eliminating the language in the article dealing with the tennis courts and traffic lights, and the fact that the rink will be built at no cost to the town. She said building the facility at no cost to taxpayers and rebuilding the tennis courts was always part of the plan, and installing traffic lights was a recommendation of the traffic consultant.

"I don't think the rewording of this changes that agreement at all," said Lyons. "That's all part of the project scope that will be explained to Town Meeting."

Department of Public Works Director Mark Ryan noted that the full traffic and financial study reports will be presented to the Town Meeting, along with the site selection process of which he was a part. Asked about alternate sites, Ryan said Hennessey Field was ranked as the second-best site for the rink and the Savage Educational Center was third.

"Whatever neighborhood it's in, there are going to be concerns," said Ryan, adding that there was also much neighborhood opposition to the Willett Field when it was first proposed but that it has turned out to be a community asset.

Following the discussion, the Selectmen voted 4-1 to submit Lyons' modified version of the article for inclusion on the warrant. In a separate vote later in the meeting, the board was 3-2 in support of that article, with Donohue and Selectman Allan Howard in opposition.

*To the Editor:* I am writing to acknowledge the generous contribution of a Norwood business to the work a group of women at Emmanuel Lutheran Church have been engaged in during the past few years. When we took on the job of making quilts for Lutheran World Relief (LWR) in 2010, we had no idea that our efforts would

blossom to embrace a group of over 20 women who, in just the last 3 months, have made over 100 quilts. In mid-April, these quilts will be sent off to the LWR warehouse outside Baltimore, MD, for eventual shipment to people around the globe who are living in abject poverty and/or who are struggling to recover from earthquakes, floods, tsunamis, and other natural disasters. LWR hopes to ship 500,000 quilts overseas this year.

We would never have been able to reach our yearly quilt goals without the help of "Remarkable Cleanouts," a store that once operated out of a downtown location, but which has since moved to the Win Smith Mill area at 61 Endicott Street in Norwood. Over the years, the owner, Mark Waters, began by giving our quilters very generous discounts on fabric that we purchased at his store. (We are guessing that most of this fabric came from the enormous stash of someone who used to quilt because many of the pieces were color-coordinated and, quite often, still contained the original sales receipt from a well-known fabric store!) In 2012, when the business made the move to Endicott Street, the owner called Emmanuel Lutheran Church and graciously offered to donate the remaining fabric that he had on hand to our church. What a windfall for our quilting group! Each week, as we have come together to assemble our quilts, one or more of us will comment on seeing fabric that came from "Remarkable Cleanouts." At that point, we voice aloud our deep appreciation for the generosity of this "remarkable" business owner! We could not have accomplished all of our work without his help.

As the saying goes, "it takes a village." We just wanted to let the "village" of Norwood know that they have a business owner in town who is truly making a difference in this world by reaching out to share his bounty with others- and to make this thank you note a public one.

Our quilts were on display at Emmanuel Lutheran Church until April 14. signed the petition to reject the Coakley site. While the Finance Commission has made no formal recommendation on Bailey's petition because it does not involve town funds, Langone said she personally plans to speak to the article as a Town Meeting member.

"I agree with South Norwood. It's just my opinion that the neighborhood down there has been under siege for many years for a number of things," said Langone. "I am opposed to the rink being at the Coakley site. I just think it's the wrong site."

Langone also said he does

not believe the current funding for the rink is sufficient, saying, "You can rest assured there will be money requested by the town."

Despite Naumann and others who say the process is comprehensive and ongoing, Langone took issue with the Rink Site Selection Committee's review.

The committee came from the point of view of, 'Let's find out why [the other sites] aren't good.' I don't think things were fairly looked at from that respect," she said.

Department of Public Works Director Mark Ryan, who

served on the selection committee, said there will be a presentation to Town Meeting on the findings of that review process.

"The results of the site-selection process and the findings and recommendations of the traffic and financial feasibility studies will be presented to Town Meeting to support the siting of the skating rink at the Coakley Middle School," he said.

RINC has also presented a petition to the Selectmen with 1,500 signatures in support of the rink at the Coakley site.

main parking and entrance areas, however, in most cases the signs are not being moved from their current locations.

The main topic of debate at the hearing dealt with the underground parking and Planning Board member Debbie Holmwood's concern that the board would be setting a precedent by approving that type of parking in town. Holmwood said many other businesses have asked for and been denied underground parking, and allowing it for the hospital could be grounds for future litigation.

"We have a lot of developments that want to come in [to Norwood], and they don't have the requirements for parking [under the zoning]. We're going to have to give them underground parking," she said. "I'm really not trying to be difficult. I agree that it's a good plan for the hospital. But I'm genuinely concerned about opening it up."

Board Chairman Joseph

Sheehan said each case is different and Norwood Hospital is a unique case in that it has been a part of the neighborhood for so long.

"We only have so much space at the hospital and I think they're doing the best they can," said Sheehan. "I think we can differentiate all the different cases that come before us."

Phil Macchi, attorney for the hospital, said the board could include as part of its decision a rationalization for allowing the underground parking in this case, which would protect the town. The board voted this as a condition of its approval, requesting that Town Planner Steve Costello draft the decision.

The board also heard of an adequate access plan at 63 Cherrywood Dr., where the owners are seeking to extend the road 300 feet as part of a future subdivision development. Following some discus-

sion from the board and concern from neighbors, the hearing was continued to Monday, May 6.

# Norwood businesses unite in aiding Marathon victims

In the wake of the tragic events at the Boston Marathon, the Norwood business community came together last weekend to support the many victims of the bombings that shocked the city and the nation.

On Saturday, the Friends of Norwood Center held a special "Spending Saturday in Support" event to raise funds for The One Fund Boston, the charity established to help the victims of the April 15 terrorist bombings.

Many of the downtown businesses participated in donating a portion of Saturday's sales to The One Fund as part of the event, which was organized by Norwood Downtown Manager Kim Weineck.

After seeing the tragic events unfold on television, Norwood Theatre owner Susan Lewis said she made the decision to donate all proceeds from Saturday night's performance of the North Shore Acappella to help the victims. Well over 500 tickets were sold for the event, with the money going to the Richard Family Fund. Martin Richard, an eight-year-old Dorchester native, was the youngest victim of the bombings.

Lewis said the show was emotional, as many people were still talking about the events in Boston and the apprehension of a suspect on Friday.

Norwood's Jeff Mahoney, who was running the Marathon for the Hale Reservation of Westwood, spoke about his experience in trying to find his family after hearing about the explosions, which occurred before he could finish the race. They were fortunate in escaping injury, but Lewis said the close call still shook Mahoney.

"I think the emotion in the crowd was palpable. I think the people felt the energy from each other. It was a feeling of pride for being a part of Norwood and contributing in some way," said Lewis. "I'm just proud to live in a suburb of Boston. It's time to be proud to be in America, really. That's what we're all about."

Several items were also raffled off during the show, including a 15-person Mother's Day dinner at the Olde Colonial Café and a pair of Red Sox tickets, said Lewis.

Julie Vecchio, owner of Custom Art Framing on Central Street, said the level of support and compassion for the bombing victims has been amazing.

"I just think everybody wanted to do something to help," said Vecchio, who donated 26.2 percent of Saturday's sales to The One Fund. "I was trying to think of what to do. I was going to give a donation anyway, so this was a nice way to do it."

In addition to donating 26.2 percent of Saturday's sales,

Charles River Running owner Charlotte Walsh organized a three-mile run last Wednesday night to honor the Marathon victims and collect funds for the American Red Cross. Walsh crossed the finish line on Boylston Street just minutes before the bombs exploded.

Richard Nasr, owner of On Track Café at 25 East Hoyle St., said he received an email from the Friends of Norwood Center about making a donation and was happy to get involved.

"Anything for the community, I'm willing to help. It's just a nice thing to do," said Nasr, who donated 50 percent of Saturday's sales to The One Fund Boston.

Other Norwood businesses that donated a portion of their sales to the victims included Conrad's Restaurant, Envy Boutique, Women's Community Committee Thrift Shop, Thai Boo Restaurant and Olivadi Restaurant.

Making individual donations were King, McNamara & Moriarty LLC, Limey's Pub, Napper Tandy's and Saulnier Family Chiropractic. CrossFit Florian held a special "Workout of the Day" to honor the victims of the tragedy, with proceeds going to the Richard family.

# Norwood officers respond to Boston bombings

The terrorist bombings that shook the Boston Marathon last week drew a mass of law enforcement personnel to the city in a coordinated effort to fully mobilize an investigation and search for the suspects.

As part of that effort, the Norwood Police Department deployed two of its officers to the city as part of the regional Metropolitan Law Enforcement Council (MetroLEC) response team.

Norwood officers Anthony Lopes and Will Fundora are members of the MetroLEC SWAT team that was mobilized in the immediate aftermath of the April 15 bombings.

"They were called out when the bombings took place. They were taken off the streets here in Norwood and put into full-time duty in Boston," said Police Chief Bill Brooks. "They performed in support of the Boston Police Department."

The explosions that kept the city on edge for days resulted in a relentless police effort to track down the suspects, said Brooks. Lopes and Fundora worked alternating 12-hour shifts on the SWAT team throughout the entire ordeal, which ended with the death of 26-year-old Tamerlan Tsarnaev and the capture of his 19-year-old brother Dzhokhar in Watertown last Friday night.

"They essentially worked SWAT for 14 or 15 hours, went home and slept and then went back to work, from Monday through Friday," said Brooks. "They're incredibly brave. I'm incredibly proud of their courage and also their dedication."

Brooks said the Norwood officers assisted in performing house-to-house searches in Watertown after Thursday night's shootout when police left that town and others around it in lockdown.

"It's really laborious work. It requires a great deal of dedication, which our officers had," he said. "Both of these officers are excellent officers. They're both in phenomenal shape."

Other officers volunteered to respond to the scene without pay, said Brooks, noting that officers wanted to help in any way they could. However, the responsibility was to Norwood residents in maintaining the streets and tend-

ing to the everyday duties of the department.

"We had officers showing up and doing the day-to-day stuff like investigating car accidents. I really appreciate that. I appreciate it every day, but certainly more so in a situation like this when everyone would rather be in Watertown helping out," said Brooks.

As a part-time instructor at the Transit Police Academy, Brooks said he knew Sean Collier, the 27-year-old MIT police officer who was shot and killed by the Tsarnaev brothers. Collier graduated from the Academy in 2010, he said.

Brooks said he also knows injured MBTA officer Richard Donohue Jr. from his time at the Academy. Donohue, who was also shot, remains in the hospital but is in stable condition.

"The whole thing is tragic. The whole thing was just awful," said Brooks of the bombings.

# Help stamp out hunger

On Saturday, May 11, the 21st annual Letter Carriers' Food Drive will take place in Norwood and Westwood, and local volunteers are hoping everyone on their postal routes who is able to will participate.

"This is the largest one-day food drive in the country," says Jack Curran of Norwood, Vice-President of Local 742 of the National Association of Letter Carriers (AFL-CIO) and Food Drive Coordinator. "Last year, in Norwood and Westwood alone, letter carriers collected over 15,000 pounds of food to help the hundreds of families who are struggling with hunger right here in our hometowns. And this year, we're hoping to do even better."

Norwood and Westwood residents who wish to participate are asked to leave one or more bags of food by their mailbox on the appointed Saturday, marked for the Letter Carriers' Food Drive. The food will then be picked up as carriers go about their regular mail deliveries, taken to a central location for sorting and then delivered to both the Norwood and Westwood pantries.

"All types of non-perishable food - from peanut butter and jelly to fruit and vegetable juices - are welcome," says Bill Discepolo, Stock and Rotation Manager at the Norwood pantry. "But right now, we particularly need cereal, canned fruit, tuna and other canned meat, baked beans, canned pasta like SpaghettiOs and Chef Boyardee and boxed meals such as Tuna and Hamburger Helper and Pasta Roni."

"The only requirement is that all cans and boxes must be new and in good condition. Anything outdated or opened has to be thrown away for health reasons."

Norwood and Westwood are just two of the 10,000 cities and towns across America that are taking part in the Letter Carriers' Food Drive, which began in 1992. Over the past 20 years, the efforts of letter carriers represented by the National Association of Letter Carriers - with the help of rural letter carriers, other postal employees and numerous other volunteers and sponsoring organizations - has resulted in the delivery of over 1.2 billion pounds of donated food to re-

gional food banks and local food pantries, including 70.7 million in 2012.

"We're proud to be part of this powerful effort to help our neighbors in need," says Food Drive Coordinator Curran. "While the economy is looking up a bit, a lot of people are still having trouble making ends meet. One in every six Americans is not sure where their next meal is coming from - including 17 million children and three million seniors over 65. We see the need every day on our routes, and we feel this is a great way to lend a hand."

"The Letter Carriers' Drive is probably the single most important day for our pantry all year," adds Norwood Executive Director Taeger. "We depend on it to get through the lean summer months - when donations always dip because people are so busy or away on vacation - and into the fall."

"The people of Norwood and Westwood have always responded to the Letter Carriers' Drive with a huge outpouring of generosity. And we thank each and every one of you carriers and donors alike for caring and sharing."



From the opening faceoff, Cohasset asserted their dominance, scoring six unanswered goals in both the first and second quarter, leading to a 12-0 lead at the half.

The Mustangs were hesitant in the first half, and Cohasset took advantage, constantly attacking their weaker defensemen for quick shots on net and goals by the boatload.

Head coach Anthony Roman was heard on the bench imploring his team to stay aggressive.

"You're just standing around, no one wants to do anything," Roman said to his players.

During a timeout, Roman tried to light a fire under his team. "I wanna see fight and heart," Roman said.

In the second half, the players responded.

"Great patience, that was great," Roman told Roy after the goal.

Following Cohasset's next and last goal of the day, attackman Danny Ferrell, a sophomore, scored the final goal of the game, leading to a 14-4 defeat.

After the game, Roman explained what happened.

"We didn't do much in the first half, we didn't do much at all," but felt they were much better in the second half, Roman said. He was right. They outscored Cohasset 4-2 in the second half, something to build on for their next game.

Roman also explained that the team needs to be more aggressive throughout each game.

"We need to cut down on mental mistakes," Roman said. "We've got a lot of nice kids. We need more toughness, more grit."

Still, he felt there were some things that the team did

quite well. One positive Roman took from the game was their one-on-one defense despite giving up 14 goals.

"Team D is a big thing for us. We're pretty good one-on-one," Roman said.

# Carroll ready to return to work


Following major surgery last month, Town Manager John Carroll is getting ready to return to work at Town Hall.

Carroll, 85, who has been Norwood's town manager since 1978, has been out of work since undergoing open-heart surgery about five weeks ago.

During a scheduled heart catheterization, it was discovered there was a blockage of blood flow to his heart and surgery was necessary.

"They went through my leg into my heart, and my doctor said I had some blockages, and it needed to be operated on immediately. So in that sense it was an emergency," said Carroll in a phone interview from his home in Milton on Monday.

Following the operation at St. Elizabeth's Medical Center, Carroll spent around 10 days in

the hospital for recovery and rehabilitation before being released.

He said it has been tough being away from the town. Among other things, he has been taking walks and following the Boston Red Sox during his recovery.

"I'm doing well. I feel good. I'm getting stronger every day," said Carroll. "The doctors told me it would be about 12 weeks [to return to work]. I'm hoping it will be about six. Overall, they said my heart is like a 40-year-old's, because I've been running most of my life."

Carroll said he plans to return to work in "less than two weeks" but will not work full

time right away. In the meantime, he has continued to stay involved in town affairs, receiving regular updates on important business.

"People have been to the house. The chairman [of the Board of Selectmen] has been here, and [DPW Director] Mark Ryan has been here...not just to visit, but to discuss business," said Carroll.

In Carroll's absence, Assistant Town Manager Bernie Cooper has assumed the role of manager. Cooper, who has worked in the town manager's office since 1972, said he has also been in touch with Carroll and has been impressed by his quick recovery.

"He's doing extraordinarily well. He's been increasingly involved. I wouldn't be surprised to see him back in the office next week for a few hours," said Cooper. "I'm sure he's going to ease back in. He just had major surgery."

Carroll and Cooper both celebrated birthdays back in February, with Cooper turning 65. Addressing employees and friends during a special ceremony at Town Hall, Carroll said has no plans to retire any time soon, adding that he still loves working for the town of Norwood.

### Their secret weapon?

We'd love to say we told you so, but that would imply that we were privy to some inside information relative to the firefighter union's attempt to reinstate Strong Chief language back into the town's lexicon. In no way were we the only ones chuckling when a representative of the union stated that the gaggle of firefighters suddenly submitting papers to become Town Meeting members was coincidental to TM eliminating the Strong Chief law last fall.

Well, as stated in an earlier editorial, good luck to them. By stacking the deck in their favor they may have already secured the necessary block required to overturn last fall's vote. Or have they?

The vote last fall to overturn Strong Chief held a majority of less than 10 votes, so the newly elected firefighters should, on paper, be enough to change it back. However, it's not likely TMers will appreciate this obvious attempt by the union to thumb their noses at the will of the people. They are unlikely to forget that between last fall and now there hasn't been enough time to evaluate how the department is functioning with the Fire Chief reporting directly to the Town Manager as opposed to Selectmen, and wasn't that the purpose of the vote to begin with?

And an obvious difference between then and now is that there is a sitting Norwood Fire Chief, newly appointed Anthony Greeley. During last fall's vote the former fire chief was entangled with an employment struggle with Selectmen and eventually left the position, so the union had the luxury of stating their case without TM having the opportunity to hear directly from the Chief himself.

Should Chief Greeley stand before Town Meeting and be unequivocal in his support to reinstate Strong Chief than the vote will be a slam dunk. All he has to do is list off the issues he currently has with running the department and TMers will have no problem reinstating Strong Chief. By hearing from Norwood's Fire Chief directly, the union will have no need to parade the usual former chiefs and state figureheads extolling the virtues of Strong Chief to the gallery, ignoring the fact that towns across the Commonwealth have been eliminating Strong Chief language from their charters at every opportunity. Nope, all they need is for Chief Greeley to state his case. Turn out the lights, case closed. Except the bet here is that Chief Greeley invokes the Fifth and stays silent. And this should be enough for Town Meeting to reject the union's efforts.

It would be embarrassing for TM to overturn last fall's vote without Chief Greeley giving them good reason. It would reaffirm the notion by many that Town Meeting is no longer an appropriate form of government for Norwood because the forum is so easily manipulated. Norwood is better than that.

Chief Greeley will take no position for one of two reasons, both of them good enough to reject the union article. The first would be that he doesn't feel hindered by reporting to the Town Manager and everything is ok, which he can't say because he needs to work with the union. The second is that he doesn't feel enough time has passed for him to render an appropriate opinion, which is exactly why TM should stay the course of last fall's vote. The only guy qualified to state the case for Strong Chief is the Chief himself, and he simply doesn't have the ammo.

And for the conspiracy theorists out there who will argue that the Chief will stay silent because of repercussions from his boss, you aren't giving Greeley enough credit. If Norwood is confident that he has the backbone to make the tough calls during raging fires, he certainly has the guts to face down the politics that accompany the position.

The title "Strong Chief" is a misnomer. It has nothing to do with the safety of Norwood residents and TM should stay the course.


