The WCSOD includes all the lands in the LM Limited Manufacturing District that abut Vanderbilt Avenue, River Ridge Drive, Morgan Drive, Astor Avenue, Morse Street Extension and Carnegie Row.

Badger runs for School Committee

John Badger, a lifelong Norwood resident, is running against Mitch Pentowski, Eleanor Travers and Courtney Rau for one of the three contested seats on the School Committee.

While he has no political experience, Badger calls on his 22 years of experience in education. He has worked in school systems since his graduation from UMass Amherst in 1987. He currently is the Vice Principal at the Pierce School in Brookline, a position he has held for two years. Prior to that, he worked as the Assistant Principal for Student Services at the Bigelow Middle School in Newton, a position now held by Rau. He is also a licensed SPED administrator.

If elected to the position, Badger has two main goals he would like to accomplish. First, he wants to augment student programs at every level, and second, he wants to make Norwood a destination district for teachers. He added that the first should be a goal for every school district.

"We need to augment programs for all out students, and that includes special education students, English language learners (ELL) and talented and

gifted," Badger said, stressing that they need to educate all students who come before them.

"We educate those brought to us, and we educate them to their individual needs," he said.

The individual needs of a student are important, especially considering the diverse population of Norwood. He notes the town has a transient population, a SPED population, an ELL population, a gifted population and a mainstream population, and the school department needs to utilize programs that affect all students.

"For me, you have to address every student," Badger said. "There are systems in place that can do that."

Keeping teachers in the district would be beneficial, he said. He notes that while Norwood's class sizes are in line with similar districts, he feels the turnover rate in town is a little higher than it should be. If teachers remain in town, it would allow them to stabilize programs that help students.

Badger feels he would be a good addition to the School Committee, which he watches weekly either on NPA-TV or on their Web site. He said there are many things that make a good School Committee member, including experience in education and commitment to the town, and he has both.

"I think I have a lot to offer," Badger said, adding he feels he could contribute to the direction the town is going in right now.

He also knows he can be accountable for his decisions, due to his family. He and his wife, Maria, have two children, Cameron, age five, and Zachary, age four. Cameron will begin his education at the Willett Early Childhood Center in the fall.

"As a School Committee member, every decision I make for Norwood, I'll be making for my own children," Badger said. "I don't think there is a higher level of accountability than that."

During his initial campaigning, where he gathered the 50 necessary signatures to get featured on the ballot, he found that the town voters liked seeing a fourth candidate in the running.

"People were so receptive," Badger said. "They were so thrilled to have another person running. The people in Norwood are really committed to their school system, and it'll be good they have a choice come Apr. 3."

Badger said he considered a run for the School Committee in the past few years, but the timing never seemed right. Now that his children are moving into the school system, he feels he will have the time needed to commit himself to the group.

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Emergency Town Meeting Set

Fire budget, Reserve Fund almost out of money

The town does not have enough money to fund the Fire Department's substitution account for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2010. Fire Chief Michael Howard received \$20,000 from the Finance Commission via a reserve fund transfer on Feb. 23, and this amount will be used to cover costs until the recently announced April 8 Special Town Meeting.

This Special TM will serve two main purposes: addressing lack of money in the Fire Department's substitution budget and the town's Reserve Fund. These two issues prompted the Board of Selectmen to set a Special TM as soon as possible.

The Fire Department's substitution budget has been the subject of recent selectmen meetings, and at the board's Feb. 23 meeting, Selectmen Chairman Bill Plasko was blunt about the issue, saying, "We do not have the money to get through the year."

What they have is hopefully enough to last the Fire Department until the Special TM.

While \$20,000 isn't quite the \$100,000 Chief Howard initially requested, it is money he previously did not have.

"I'm hopeful that that action will take us through to what hopefully is the Special TM," Howard said.

At the FinCom meeting, Chief Howard noted that there is a danger with operating with such a small substitution budget, and that some actions that could be required could affect public safety.

"I'm going to be forced to put vehicles out of service, and there will be less fire protection and emergency service in town," Howard said, adding that this could occur as soon as Feb. 24.

He went on to add, "I'm very concerned about moving forward. I'm very concerned about the safety of our citizens. These next couple months are going to be hard."

Plasko added that while Chief Howard doesn't recommend removing apparatuses from the streets, the budget might require they do so.

Steps are being taken and internal studies are being done to try to curb substitution costs. Plasko noted they are review-

ing shift schedules, minimum manning and staffing requirements and more.

"We're doing all those studies now," Plasko said.

Members of the FinCom were gravely concerned with the status of the substitution budget, and several members noted that this has been an ongoing problem. Armed with the FY 2010 budget projections, members said something had to be done to keep this budget in control.

FinCom Chairman Alan Slater noted that initially, \$486,000 was allotted for the Fire Department's substitution budget, and the department is projected to spend \$750,644 in that area this year, \$264,644 more than budgeted.

"The [projected] budget is over 50 percent of what the original amount was," Slater said.

Chief Howard responded, saying that the projection was high, and he expects they will spend approximately \$600,000

Just a couple thoughts...

Has anyone given any consideration to moving the DPW yard to the former Home Quarters site? The space has been vacant for almost a decade now. The owner has sought and received special consideration from TM to make it easier to lease, yet still no takers. Perhaps now is the time to act.

Though some modification would be necessary to the building, it is certainly large enough so that every piece of DPW equipment could be stored inside, and there are no resident abutters in the area to issue the obligatory "Not In My Backyard" argument.

Granted, it is not in the center of town, but DPW yards for other towns have been located on the outskirts of residential neighborhoods without any problems. Check out Walpole and Westwood to name a couple.

Owner David Spiegel has worked closely with the town in the past and, unless he has a buyer/lessee about to swallow the hook, perhaps something could be worked out, even if it is just a long-term lease. Something to consider if not already been looked at...

Is it coincidence that almost immediately after Town Manager John Carroll and his consultant team presented their ideas for cell towers up in the area of the water towers and not receiving an enthusiastic response, legal notices have been posted by cell companies looking for variances to erect towers on private properties? Selectmen have yet to render their decision, though based on their own schedule it was due at Tuesday night's meeting. Yet, the subject was never broached.

It appears odd that so quickly after the presentation was made to selectmen these cell companies already had commercial spaces lined up and ready to go. It would be reasonable for the conspiracy theorist to think that perhaps these companies are using the threat of building these towers in other locations to force the hands of selectmen. The two companies to post legal notices are proposing them on commercial real estate, each bordering residential neighborhoods. No doubt the hue and cry from residents will be no different there than up in the Highland Cemetery area.

And for those who think the threat is minimal to these other neighborhoods since the town would never grant the variances, think again. True, per the town's new Zoning Bylaw, which was adopted at last year's Nov. 2 Special Town meeting, such wireless structures can only be installed in the Wireless Communications Overlay District (WCSOD), the Telecommunications Act of 1996 specifically exempts local authorities from denying wireless companies access to a town. Consequently, regardless of decisions made by the ZBA, companies could file suit and have them overturned.

For whatever reason, cell companies have zeroed in on Norwood as a preferred site for cell tower placement, and this really is a double-edged sword. The revenue potential from these towers is significant, so a majority of residents may see this as a positive. However, should you live in one of the neighborhoods targeted for expansion, your health and property value considerations would most certainly trump any perceived town benefits and would consider these towers a threat to your quality of life.

Sooner or later selectmen will need to render a decision regarding the water tower expansion of cell towers. And even should they allow this expansion to happen, there is no guarantee that the migration of these towers to other parts of town will still not occur.

The price of progress can be costly...

on substitution this year, though this number was also negatively looked upon by the commission.

Six hundred thousand is nothing to write home about," FinCom member Joseph Greeley said. "It's nothing to be proud of."

Greeley went on to describe the substitution budget as broken, and something must be done to fix it. FinCom had numbers going back to FY 1989 to support this claim. In 1989, the town spent \$1,745,854 on base fire fighter salaries and \$110,422 in substitution. These numbers have steadily increased over the years, due to factors like salary and workforce increases, bringing the department to a projected

\$3,438,695 in base salaries and a projected \$750,644 in substitution for FY 2010.

The numerical increase isn't the main concern, but the fact the increases are not proportional. The substitution account represented six percent of the base salary in FY 1989, today the substitution account is projected to be 22 percent of the base salary, and Slater described this increase as significant.

Chief Howard defended this expense at the meeting, saying that as much as they were spending, it was still thousands below other communities in the area.

"We're not spending what people think we're spending," he said.

He noted that some of this increase is due to additional vacation time accrued over the years. The average firefighter has eight 24-hour tours of vacation time, with some having as many as 12 tours off. In total, there are over 500 24-hour vacation tours for fire fighters during FY 2010, and this is a contractual obligation.

"When people earn additional vacation time or other leave time, there will be an additional cost," Chief Howard said.

The amount of money the Fire Department will request has not been determined yet. Chief Howard said he should

have a number for the Board of Selectmen at their next meeting.

The Special TM will also address the status of the Town's Reserve Fund. Prior to the FinCom's Feb. 23 meeting, the account held \$70,000, and the Board of Selectmen had asked them to consider \$72,000 worth of Reserve Fund transfers: \$40,000 to the Fire Department's substitution budget, and \$32,000 for Veterans' Benefits. After the transfer of \$20,000 to the substitution budget, only \$50,000 remains for the remainder of the fiscal year.

"Finance Commission members have expressed concern about the town's ability to provide consideration for other legitimate requests for transfers out of the Reserve Fund for the remaining four months in the fiscal year if we deplete this account at this early date," Slater wrote in a letter to Plasko regarding the Special TM.

Plasko expressed a similar sentiment during the Selectmen meeting, saying, "They don't have much to give out."

Because of these two budget issues, the Special TM was deemed necessary and set for Thursday, April 8. The board also considered March 29 as a potential date, but determined that would not be an appropriate night to hold a Special TM, as that is the first night of Pass-over.

School Committee is still not making the cut

The fifth pass budget for the town has been revealed, and there is \$62,542,067 to split among the school department and general government departments. Due to a 55/45 percent split, the school department's Fiscal Year 2011 maximum budget is \$34,398,137, while general government has a maximum of \$28,143,930.

General government is close to this target amount. At the Feb. 17 Budget Balancing Committee meeting, General Manager John Carroll said, "We're within \$25,000 of our goal."

The same cannot be said of the school department, and School Committee Chairman Paul Samargedlis acknowledged this saying, "We're not within \$25,000."

Rather, the school department is approximately \$908,784 over their target amount, but there are options to make up that amount. Samargedlis said they would be able to do it, they just needed a bit more time.

Finance Commission member Judith Langone was frustrated that the department hadn't reached their FY 2011 budget goal yet, saying that the school department has a 3.6 percent budget increase as a target, which represents about \$1.2 million more than the FY 2010 budget of \$33.2 million.

"The programs are all wonderful, but this is all we have," she said, adding, "Everything has merit, but the bottom line is this is what we have to work with."

She added that at School Committee meetings, there was talk about taking money out of stabilization to help balance the budget.

"That isn't going to happen," Langone said.

Board of Selectmen member Michael Lyons said that he wouldn't place too much emphasis on comments made re-

garding stabilization by the School Committee, as a lot gets discussed during their open sessions, and many ideas are thrown out. Samargedlis added that while the committee mentioned it as an idea, no vote was made on the matter, and the committee will make the tough decisions to find a way to reduce their budget an additional \$908,000.

Samargedlis mentioned several other areas the committee was looking at. One area was a \$28,595 cut in athletic salaries, which represents a freshman coach and weight room supervisor. If such a cut is made, the committee also has to look at cutting the freshman sports program as a whole, which would be a less than ideal situation.

"We've never not had freshman sports up there, as long as I can remember," Samargedlis said.

The committee is also looking at reducing the amount set aside for collective bargaining. This budget item started at approximately \$700,000, and it has since been cut to \$487,000, and further cuts could be made.

"That's an area we're going to take a serious look at in our next meeting," Samargedlis said.

He also mentioned the potential of cutting four new elementary school teachers, specifically two at the Balch School, one at the Oldham School and one at the Cleveland School, though the decision to cut this area would adversely affect class sizes.

"Those four could all come out, but then our class sizes go to 27, 28 [students]," Samargedlis said.

Class sizes are a concern, and the committee has been working to avoid cutting new teachers, though that might prove necessary.

"We're trying to protect class sizes," Samargedlis said. "We're trying to reduce SPED turnover. We're hoping to get our kids reading better."

One potential cut is a new

0.6 full time equivalent reading teacher at the Coakley Middle School. Samargedlis described the eighth grade reading scores as abysmal, but due to the budget concerns, this position might be lost.

He acknowledged the needs for the cuts, and that the committee will work to reduce their budget, and said, "We're going to try to get it down, but we want to keep the integrity of the programs."

As tough as making these cuts will be, it is a necessary process. FinCom Chairman Alan Slater said, "Revenues have been maxed out. What's there is what's there."

Revenues are essentially flat for FY 2011. While there is a \$1,767,738 increase in the tax levy and a \$664,026 increase in surplus, there was a \$2.05 million dollar reduction in departmental receipts due to the loss of N-Star mitigation funds. These funds will resume for FY 2012. State aid funding remains flat at \$9,508,501.

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
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Town mulls leaf bag change

Town Engineer and Director of Public Works Mark Ryan presented a proposal to the Board of Selectmen regarding leaf bag pickup at their Feb. 23 meeting. Ryan suggested removing the monthly leaf bag pickup during the summer, which could save the town approximately \$28,000.

Currently, leaf bags are picked up weekly by the town in April, May, October and

November. Residents can also drop off leaf bags at the Winter Street Composting Facility, which is open every Saturday.

From June to September, the town contracts out to Waste Management, who picks up the bags during the last full week of each month. The town is charged \$32,000 for this service. During this time, the Winter Street Composting Facility is open every other Saturday.

Ryan's proposal would remove the monthly leaf bag pickup during these months, but

would open the Winter Street Composting Facility every Saturday and Sunday during this time. It would cost the DPW \$3,700 in overtime costs to keep the facility open these additional hours, but that still leaves that town with \$28,300 in savings.

In addition to the monetary savings, there is an aesthetic benefit, as people have left leaf bags out for weeks during the summer months.

"They begin to rot and decompose," Ryan said. "Basi-

cally, it's unsightly."

Selectman Michael Lyons agreed with this statement, saying, "I've seen the deterioration of bags after it's rained a few times. It is unsightly," but despite this, he was not sure he could support the removal of the monthly leaf bag pickup.

Board of Selectmen Chairman Bill Plasko noted that this was a similar proposal Ryan

made last year, which the board rejected. The sole difference between the two proposals is keeping the Winter Street Composting Facility open on Sunday, in addition to Saturday.

No decision was made regarding Ryan's proposal, which will be discussed further at the March 2 Board of Selectmen meeting.

Evening School slashed

A portion of the \$461,003 cut at the Feb. 16 School Committee meeting was the seed money for the Norwood High School Evening School. The school department called for \$21,000 in seed money, and the loss of these funds will prevent the start-up of an evening school program.

The evening school was the brainchild of Guidance Department Chair Beth Sylvia, and it has been in the works since last spring. Sylvia and other Norwood High School staff members felt the program would help curb the town's high school dropout rates.

The most recent available dropout rates come from the 2007-2008 school year, and Norwood's dropout rate for that period was 1.8 percent of students. This is below the statewide 3.4 percent average dropout rate. While below the state average, school officials would like to see it decrease further.

"Any dropout- even if it's just one person- is too many," said Interim Superintendent of Schools Jeffrey Granatino, adding that if this program could help that one student graduate, it would be worth it.

However, due to a lack of funds, the program will not be in place for next year, but the school department will continue to look at implementing it, Granatino said. The idea is that once the program is implemented, it would help cover its costs via tuition fees.

"We eventually hope it would be self-sustaining," Norwood High School Principal George Usevich said.

However, with a limited amount of funding available for Fiscal Year 2011, there simply isn't money available to start the program.

"You can't just start with zero [dollars] in there," Granatino said, as they have to pay for supplies, staffing and the set-up of the program.

Though the program won't happen this year, it isn't off the table for future years. Both Granatino and Usevich believe the program will be beneficial to at risk students or students who might otherwise consider dropping out.

Once implemented, the program aims to help students who, for whatever reason, are struggling in the day program. If a student is at risk or needs help, this could be looked at as an alternative to daytime classes.

"The goal is to have this be an accredited program," Granatino said.

The overall goal is to allow students who take the evening program the opportunity to graduate with a high school diploma, not a GED (General Education Diploma). Usevich described it as a curriculum-based program for students contemplating dropping out. The students involved in the program would have to satisfy the Norwood High School graduation requirements, take the MCAS and learn the same subjects as those educated during the day. The program would cover the same scope, it would just take place later in the day.

"It's going to be an alternative program for getting a high school diploma outside of the day school," Usevich said, later describing it as another safety net for students.

This system has seen success in others school district. In fact, both Granatino and Sylvia come from the Bridgewater-Raynham Regional High School, where a similar evening program is in place. The evening program there, called Excel: Learning for Life, meets from 5:30 to 8:00 p.m. three nights a week. Students there can take English, mathematics, social studies, science, physical education and electives, and those who complete the program and pass the MCAS test earn a high school diploma.

from the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA), the proposed wireless communications tower would not be allowed at that location. Traditionally, a use variance would be required for this installation. A use variance does just that: modify the rules to allow a nonconforming use in a given district, but the town's Zon-

ing Bylaw does not allow such variances.

"We don't grant use variances," Building Inspector Mark Chubet said.

While the town does not grant use variances, the federal Telecommunications Act of 1996 may supercede local laws. According to the Federal Communication Commission's

(FCC's) Web site, the act's goal is "to let anyone enter any communications business — to let any communications business compete in any market against any other," and it accomplishes this by removing regulatory barriers for entry.

The 29-year-old Donald E. Thomas of 110 Jefferson Dr., Norwood, was arrested on Feb. 17 on multiple charges: obscene matter to minor, indecent exposure, indecent assault and battery on a child under 14 and three counts of rape of child with force.

Due to the sensitive nature of the case, which involves two young children, Norwood Police Officer Kevin Grasso was not able to go into great detail regarding the incident, which was investigated by members of the Norwood Police Department, the Norfolk County District Attorney's Office and the State Police after they received a call from one of the victims' parents last week.

"The parent indicated her daughter was a victim of sexual assault," Grasso said.

After beginning their investigation, detectives on the case determined there were two victims, Grasso said. The second victim was over the age of 14. They conducted interviews with the children in a safe environment, and this led them to suspect Thomas, and gave them probable cause to arrest him.

The investigators also applied for and were issued a warrant to search Thomas's house, where they removed a pair of laptops. These laptops have not been searched or scanned by the forensics teams yet, but they are in the process of requesting a warrant to do so and will search them at a later date.

Thomas and the two victims knew each other in some capacity.

"The victims and suspect were known to each other," Grasso said, saying they knew each other for about a year. He did not go into further detail,

exposed himself in the store's candy aisle.

A pair of women called the police, and due to the store being busy at the time of the call, it took responding officers a few minutes to find the complainants, but once they were located, they were questioned outside the store.

"They were mortified and concerned about their three young children," Grasso said, adding that the suspect did not approach them or touch himself while in the store.

During this questioning, Falcone left the store, and upon doing so, he was stopped by police and arrested.

In addition, Patrick Nikas,

regarding the relationship between the suspect and the two victims, only that there was one.

Thomas pled not guilty to all charges leveled against him, David Traub, Press Officer for the Norfolk District Attorney's office. A combined \$11,000 in bail was posted, \$10,000 for the first case and \$1,000 for the second.

He returns to the Dedham District Court for a pretrial conference on March 17.

Some restrictions are placed against Thomas for the time until them. With the exception of his children, Thomas is not allowed to have unsupervised contact and interaction with any child under the age of 18. He cannot contact the victims, and he is forced to wear a GPS device to monitor his location. According to Traub, the office requested Thomas be barred from computer use, but the judge did not grant this request.

Other Police Notes:

The police also dealt with larceny and lewdness last week, and several others were placed under arrest.

The 42-year-old Chad James Falcone of 289 Dean St. was arrested for open and gross lewdness last Friday. The incident took place at 11:40 p.m. at the CVS Pharmacy on Nahatan Street, where Falcone, who was wearing a black jacket with see-through mesh shorts, allegedly

"Generally, it'll be the job of the ZBA to review these applications to determine the applicability of local and federal requirements on these proposals," Town Counsel David DeLuca said. "In certain instances, local regulations can be pre-empted by federal regulations."

DeLuca said the Telecommunications Act of 1996 specifically exempts local authorities from denying wireless companies access to a town.

Because of this, should Global Tower be able to show a need for a tower, such as a gap in coverage, at the 1080 Pleasant St. location, the tower could be allowed in a Manufacturing District, rather than the WCSOD.

There is a significant difference between manufacturing and limited manufacturing zones said Chairman of the Planning Board Paul Donohue. There are several smaller manufacturing areas around town, and they can be near general residential zones. There are fewer area requirements, and usually multiple structures can be built on them.

Meanwhile, a limited manufacturing zone is set up in large areas that have not been developed. In addition, they have much larger area requirements: 250 feet of roadway and three

acres of land is required before a structure can be installed in such a zone. University Avenue was one of the first streets in town zoned in such a fashion.

"They tend to lend themselves to office buildings," Donohue said.

T-Mobile finds themselves in a similar situation. The wireless company is looking to install a 100 foot-tall flagpole with two internal antenna at 433 Walpole St. The site is located next to Ellis Pond and is across the street from Hannaford's Plaza.

The flagpole's two internal antenna will be located 90 and 100 feet above ground level. The wires and ground equipment associated with these internal antenna and flagpole will be located on site, in a fenced-in area.

The site in question is located in the town's GB- General Business District, not the WCSOD. T-Mobile's application cites the Telecommunications Act of 1996, and representatives from the company will appear at the March 16 ZBA meeting to discuss their request for a dimensional variance at the site. This public hearing takes place at 7:30 p.m.

The term "wireless communication link," as defined by the town's bylaw, consists "exclu-

sively of fixtures and equipment used by a public utility or FCC-licensed commercial entity for the wireless transmission and reception of radio signals, including reception and transmission equipment and fixtures such as antennae, communication dishes and similar devices, structures that are erected and used primarily to support such reception and transmission equipment, including, without limitation, monopoles and lattice towers, and any accessory mechanical, electronic, or telephonic equipment, fixtures, wiring and protective covering, customary and necessary to operation such wireless communications equipment."

The bylaw also notes that a wireless communication link is a transmission and reception substation, not a principal facility for conducting a communications business, and that this definition does not apply to television and radio station transmission antenna.

The initial notice sent is in regards to concerns over historic properties that could be adversely affected by the installation of a cell tower. The notice allows people to contact Amy Gholson at the Trileaf Corporation at 314-997-6111 if they have such a concern. Gholson indicated such calls are rare, but these notices are always put out when such construction occurs.

"We rarely, rarely, rarely get legitimate historical significance comments," Gholson said, but when they do get a complaint of that nature, they will investigate.

Gholson added she gets approximately one call per week, and it's usually from people who want to install such a tower on their lawn or contractors and site designs looking to work on a project.

BERO

Dr. George L., M.D., of Westwood, Feb. 18. Dr. Bero began his medical training during his army service in World War II, studying first as a pre-medical student at Johns Hopkins University and then graduating from Columbia College of Physicians and Surgeons in 1949. He completed an internship at Bellevue Hospital, New York in June, 1950. Dr. Bero left Bellevue to serve his country as a Captain in the 8076th MASH Unit during the Korean Conflict, for which service Dr. Bero received the Bronze Star Medal and other awards and commendations. Dr. Bero completed his residency in 1955 at the Veterans Hospital, West Roxbury, Massachusetts and became board certified in internal medicine in 1957. A dedicated physician, Dr. Bero maintained a Norwood-based, private practice in internal medicine and cardiology from 1955 through 1990. He served on the staff of Norwood Hospital from 1955 until his retirement in 1993. During his career, Dr. Bero served as the Hospital's Director of Quality Assurance, Chief of Medicine and President of the Medical Staff. From 1972 through 1993, he was Director of Norwood Hospital's Medical Intensive Care Unit and its Department of Electrocardiography. Dr. Bero also was a driving force behind the construction in 1965 of a medical office building specifically designed for group specialty medical practices, and he was a founding member in 1970 of the Associates in Internal Medicine, one of the first group specialty medical practices in the area. Dr. Bero promoted innovation in the Norwood medical community, leading and supporting changes that moved the hospital from a small, cottage hospital to a technologically based institution delivering quality, state of the art care for patients. He led the transition in the delivery of medical care from home based, solo practice offices to group specialty care provided in a medical office setting. Throughout his career, Dr. Bero was committed to bringing modern technology and medical practices to Norwood Hospital, the Norwood medical community and patients. He was honored for these contributions upon his retirement in 1993 with the dedication of the Norwood Hospital Intensive Care Unit in his name. Dr. Bero was a member of the Board of Directors of the Pilgrim Foundation from 1975 to 1990, Treasurer and Assistant Medical Director for Pilgrim IPA from 1981 to 1987 and a Councilor of the Massachusetts Medical Society from 1965 through 1990. Dr. Bero also was a member of the Massachusetts Medical Society, American Heart Association, American Society of Internal Medicine and was a Fellow in the American College of Physicians and Associate in the American College of Cardiology. Dr. Bero's passion and commitment to his profession was balanced by a penchant for golf. A longtime member of Woodland Golf Club, Dr. Bero not only enjoyed the respite of his many rounds of golf there, but also the society and good company of valued friends. He will be missed. fice on Nahatan Street. Please call DPW at 781-762-1413 for more information.


