

## Definition dispute crux of appeal

### Lorusso looking to open another plant in Plainville

Earlier in the month, the Board of Selectmen decided to Appeal the Massachusetts Land Court's Dec. 7 decision in favor of Norfolk Asphalt Company.

The decision, made by Justice Charles W. Trombly, Jr., annulled the decision of the

town's Zoning Board of Appeals, declared that the manufacture of bituminous concrete at 601 Pleasant St. is allowed as of right now, and that the previous Zoning Bylaws do not apply to the manufacture of bituminous concrete.

In his decision, Trombly argued that despite the colloquial use that dictates asphalt and concrete are one in the same, this is not the case. Trombly defined asphalt as "a naturally-occurring, black, viscous liquid, often found in crude petroleum," while bituminous concrete is "a compositive material manufactured in a process, which combines sand, aggregates, and bitumen or asphalt or liquid asphalt," and that there was no evidence suggesting bituminous concrete be considered a toxic or hazardous material under the old bylaw.

## Selectmen seek to change bylaw

### Lyons officially announces run for re-election

Selectmen at Tuesday night's meeting discussed a possible change to the town's bylaw relative to how the town deals with businesses that purchase and sell used goods. Under the town's current bylaws, these operations are required to keep extensive records of all their sales activities. They must record when they purchase an item, who they purchase it from, how much they pay for it, when they sell it, how much they sell it for, who they sell it to and where the new buyer lives. This information is presented to the Norwood Police Department, and is meant to help should a thief at-


tempt to make some quick cash by selling a stolen item.

Selectman Michael Lyons referred to this as a strict, onerous bylaw that acts as a catchall, and it generally applies to pawn brokers. Currently, the bylaw does not allow the Board of Selectmen to waive this requirement, which concerns Savers, a for-profit chain thrift store that offers secondhand shopping. Savers is looking to open a 30,000 square foot location at The Shoppes at Elmway Farms in Norwood.

Attorney David Manoogian brought this to the attention of the board, and he wants to see if the town can adopt an amendment to

## Norwood hockey player injured

### Thousands support Matt Brown and his family

Saturday's incident might have been a freak accident, but this freak accident sent 15-year-old Norwood High School sophomore and varsity boys hockey player Matt Brown to South Shore Hospital. He has since been transferred to Children's Hospital Boston, and is in the Intensive Care Unit.

Brown broke his third and fourth vertebrae during an unfortunate play behind the net. He was battling for the puck when play-

ers from both Norwood and Weymouth bumped him, causing Brown to lose his balance. As he fell, Brown banged his head off the plexiglass surrounding the ice at the Pilgrim Arena in Hingham. He was transported from the arena to the South Shore Hospital via ambulance. As of 10:30 a.m. on Jan. 27, Norwood High School Athletic Director Brian McDonough said Brown was scheduled for surgery today (Wednesday).

The Browns- parents Susan and Michael and sister Kelley- have kept friends, family mem-

bers and Brown's teammates abreast of the situation by updating both a Facebook fan page called Pray For Matt Brown #3, [www.facebook.com/pages/PRAY-FOR-MATT-BROWN-3/286037576868?v=wall](http://www.facebook.com/pages/PRAY-FOR-MATT-BROWN-3/286037576868?v=wall), and a Care Page, located at [www.carepages.com/carepages/WeLoveNumber3](http://www.carepages.com/carepages/WeLoveNumber3).

## Planning Board rejects Verizon's plan for Access Road

### Applicants vow immediate appeal

The Planning Board unanimously voted 4-0 to reject David Spiegel and Verizon's request to turn 236 Access Rd. into a service lot for the large telecommunications company at their Jan. 25 meeting. Residents in attendance applauded the decision, and many stepped forward to thank Planning Board members.

Though neighbors approved, the decision did not sit well with the Verizon representatives at the meeting,

who have confirmed that as soon as they receive formal notification from the board, they will appeal the decision.

Even with 13 conditions attached, board members had several concerns, a key one being hours of operation. Had the approval gone through, mechanics would have stayed on the site performing work until 11:30 p.m. on weeknights. Their shift would run from 3 to 11:30 p.m., and board members were not comfortable with this.

"I can't live with the hours of operation of the mechan-

ics," said Planning Board member Ernest Paciorkowski, citing the concerns and needs of the residents in the area.

"The 11:30 a.m. hour goes beyond what I consider basic commercial hours," he said. "I think it's unfair. These people aren't going to get away from it."

Fellow Planning Board member Marco Brancato agreed with Paciorkowski's assessment of the project saying, "I still have a problem with the 11:30 [p.m. time on] Monday to Friday."

# Barbarians at the gate?

## Neighbor files suit over Boch expansion

Glenn and Elise Arrigo of 4 Plymouth Dr. are alleging that Ernie and Kristen Boch are not good neighbors, and are taking them to court, claiming invasion of privacy, harassment, coercion, breach of contract, trespass, nuisance and a decrease in the value of their home. The Arrigos are represented by

appears to be closest in proximity to the Boch main home. Multiple ancillary buildings also make up the estate.

The construction has caused the Arrigos to level seven counts against the Bochs: federal and state civil rights violations, trespass, private nuisance, negligent selection of an independent contractor, intentional infliction of emotional distress, negligent infliction of emotional distress and

punish the offending party, in this case, the Bochs, to the extent that they will not repeat the offending action.

Goguen and the Arrigos have accused the Bochs of three civil rights violations: threats, intimidation and coercion.

“We believe he’s trying to drive them out for a cheap price,” Goguen said.

Ernie Boch Jr. responded, saying “I don’t even remember

The Arrigo's house directly abuts the Bochs' property, at 190 Sumner St., where construction has occurred for the past seven years, according to the suit. The Boch's 85,377 square foot lot has a value of \$1,276,200, according to the 2010 Property Valuations issued by the town's Assessor's Office. Though other properties also abut the Boch estate, the Arrigo's home

As a result, the Arrigos are seeking compensatory and punitive damages, damages for conscious pain and suffering, and attorney's fees, costs and expenses. Compensatory damages would cover the out-of-pocket expenses paid by the Arrigos over the years on things like doctor and therapist visits that resulted from the construction. Punitive damages are paid on top of this, and are meant to

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# Ambulances make money, but how much?

The Norwood Fire Department provides ambulance services to residents, and to all who are aware of the revenue details; the program is a cash cow. However, questions regarding the expenses relative to running the program are much more difficult to get answers to, with multiple departments pointing fingers in other directions. Many other towns have determined that outsourcing the services makes more fiscal sense. Determining if Norwood providing ambulance services directly through the fire department is actually profitable remains unanswered by everyone asked.

During Fiscal Year 2009, the Fire Department raised \$1,047,364 for the town via ambulance fees. They are on pace to exceed this number for FY 2010, and if they maintain their average of approximately \$90,097 per month, they will finish the FY with \$1,081,173.

"It's a substantial amount of money," Fire Chief Michael Howard said. "We are considered a major revenue source [for

the town]," adding that they've been able to increase the revenue earned from ambulance fees each year.

"We've been very fortunate to increase the revenue every year," he said. "We're doing very, very good here."

The money raised goes into the town's general fund, into an account set aside for ambulance revenues. The money raised is unencumbered and used to pay for a variety of the town's costs, Town Treasurer Bob Maguire said.

"It's a general revenue source that helps fund many things," Maguire said, adding a portion of the money is used to help offset the costs of the ambulance program, including training, maintenance and billing. However, costs associated with running the program were not outlined.

Billing is done by an outside company, Coastal Billing.

"They do billing, the collection and the third party administration," Maguire said, adding that a lot of this work deals with private insurance companies and Medicare, and it takes a special kind of knowledge and ability to do these collections.

The town went out to bid on this contract, and Coastal Billing works on a commission basis. Four percent of collection goes to Coastal Billing to cover the cost of their service to the town.

Town Clerk and Accountant Bob Thornton added that the money is not specifically earmarked for the Fire Department, and is helped use to balance the budget. The \$1,047,364 raised in FY 2009 is going toward the town's FY 2011 budget.

"It's always a year behind," Chief Howard said, meaning that the money raised during FY 2010 will go towards the FY 2012 budget.

The Fire Department budget is part of the general government budget. The second pass FY 2011 budget allocates \$27,502,790 to general government departments. The Fire Department budget is split into numerous portions, most of which are up from FY 2010. Requested increases can be seen in the fire salaries budget (\$4,061,416, up from \$3,850,625), fire incidentals (\$334,500, up from \$289,395) and substitution pay

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## Editorial

### Income and expenses A simple matter

As a business owner, one of the easier, and perhaps more enjoyable (if things are going well) accounting tasks is to add up your money. Keeping track of it is pretty simple; count up how much comes in from all of the different sources your business has, and have a line item on your accounting statements to keep a running total. At any given time you should be able to report what your business, or in the case of a town, what your department brings in as "income".

Unfortunately, many businesses and some town departments fail to realize that income and "profit" are two very different things. The profit figure is derived after totaling up all of your income and then subtracting all of your expenses. It is the act of keeping track all of the expenses that is usually more difficult, because expenses come in many different shapes and forms and it takes strong management to have a solid grasp of them. Unfortunately, it appears that the Norwood Fire Department does not have strong management because, despite this newspaper's best efforts, no one at the fire department or even in town wide accounting management appears to have a clue when it comes to tracking expenses of the NFD Ambulance Services.

What is made clear in this week's Page 3 story is that the town's practice of providing ambulance services to its residents brings in a lot of money. No one at any department level had a problem detailing what each service bills out at and no problem touting that the income figure annually is over a million dollars. However, when questioned if ambulance services actually make money, Chief Michael Howard either has no idea or doesn't want anyone to know the actual figure, because he hid behind the "I'll get back to you" when a reporter finally got him on the phone. And guess what? We're still waiting for him to get back to us.

The guess here is that he, and everyone else in town, has no idea. All of the income brought in by ambulances goes into the town's "General" fund. As described by Town Treasurer Bob Maguire, the money brought in is "unencumbered", which means none of it is earmarked to reimburse specific expenses relative to the generation of the money. He went on to add that some of the money is used to offset the cost of the ambulance services. However, when asked what those expenses actually were, he, like everyone else, had no idea and pointed the figure at Chief Howard for the information. And as mentioned earlier, we are still waiting for him to get back to us.

Running an ambulance service is an expensive proposition. Besides the obvious of purchasing ambulances on a regular basis at a cost of at least \$200k a pop, and then outfitting them with updated equipment regularly and maintaining them to high standards and insuring and fueling them, there are the much larger personnel expenses. There is regular pay and overtime and differential pay for firemen specifically trained as emergency response personnel to man the vehicles, along with health insurance and other benefit costs and matching taxes that need to be tracked. There are dispatching costs, training and billing costs and general overhead costs. And let's not forget the costs of lost money from the billing of services that are never paid, either through bankruptcies, billing errors or under or non-reimbursed insurance agency payments.

It is too bad that when Chief Howard goes before selectmen looking for more money after overspending his budget, as he usually does, that he isn't armed with the financial data that would make him look more competent. If he could state that if he were properly reimbursed for the expenses relative to running the cash cow known as ambulance services he wouldn't need the extra money, his argument would be so much stronger. Unfortunately, he has no idea what those expenses are, and neither does anyone else.

Many towns, like Dedham for example, farm out ambulance services through a bid process to a third party and rid themselves of all of the headaches relative to running a sophisticated program like ambulances. And perhaps it is something Norwood should consider again, if it doesn't even have the resources or management to accurately track expenses relative to income.

the bylaw which would grant the Board of Selectmen the power to waive these requirements for good reason, provided the applicant is not a pawn broker. The hope is that the board would waive these requirements for Savers, as the business is looking to make a significant investment in town, but wants clarification on the town bylaw before they do.

"An operation like [Savers] would need another store just to store their records," Lyons said.

This proposed addition is just that- an amendment to the bylaw that allows Selectmen to waive the requirements. Lyons stressed that this was neither changing nor removing the current requirements.

"It doesn't really change anything, it just gives petitioners the right to come before the Board of Selectmen," Lyons said, adding, "We're not changing the bylaw we have written in the town."

Selectman Helen Abdallah-

Donohue questioned why this amendment would be needed, citing other stores in town, such as the Salvation Army store and the Norwood Thrift Shop. Board of Selectmen Chairman Bill Plasko said that technically, these stores might be in violation of the town's bylaw. Should this amendment pass, they would be allowed to come before the board and request the requirements be waived. Donohue complained about that, but Plasko said it would be easier for them to do that than face the police knocking on their door and requesting their records.

The board voted 3-2 to add this proposed change to a future Town Meeting warrant. Selectmen Donohue and Jerry Kelleher were against it.

Also, in a statement released on Jan. 26, Selectman Lyons officially announced he is running for re-election. There are three candidates vying for two seats, as

Donohue is also seeking re-election, and Finance Commission member Allan Howard is looking for a seat on the board.

In his statement, Lyons wrote, "During my successful run for this seat four years ago, I spoke of my desire to contribute to the management of our town. At that time, I felt that my work on numerous committees and boards town-wide, including the Downtown Steering Committee, the Norwood Day Committee, the Committee of 21, Town Meeting member and others, gave me the perspective and experience to contribute immediately. My time on the board has been eventful: it is a good board, and we have accomplished much."

Lyons added that he is proud of the board's accomplishments, and hopes to continue as a member so he can "continue to help keep Norwood great and strive to make it better."

# Mileage concerns FinCom

The Health Department's proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2011 caused some concern at the Jan. 21 meeting of the Finance Commission (FinCom), especially in regards to the travel allowance for Health Department Assistant Director Stacey Lane. The proposed budget is approximately a \$3,000 increase, most of which would go to this travel allowance.

Lane's travel allowance would be the third in the department. Director Sigalle Reiss and Sanitarian Carl Bruno already have a travel allowance. Reiss argued that a travel allowance would be appropriate for Lane, given the nature of her job. If approved, Lane will receive a \$2,200 stipend for her travel, and this will reimburse her for costs related to her job, including gas and vehicle wear and tear. Reiss and Bruno also receive a \$2,200 stipend.

"A large portion of the position is travel," Reiss said, as Lane travels to numerous meetings and inspections in town.

Lane uses her own vehicles and the miles add up quickly. Reiss and members of the Health Department have kept track of the miles Lane has traveled since April. Reiss estimates that the average amount traveled is between 100 and 250 miles per month, though on a few occasions, Lane has exceeded that amount, driving 300 miles for work.

"It does vary," Reiss said.

FinCom member Joe Greeley took a moment to crunch the numbers, and determined that Lane drives approximately 15 miles per day.

"It's a lot of back and forth, with multiple trips," Reiss said.

The high amount of mileage concerned FinCom member Judith Langone, who described it as ridiculous.

"I just think that's outrageous," Langone said. "Ten or 15 miles a day, when you're supposed to work in the office?"

Reiss argued that a large portion of the job is out of the

office, and this is mentioned in the Assistant Director's job description. Lane said that the job is to enforce the state's sanitary code, which brings her all over town, checking everything

incidental. The department's FY 2010 total incremental budget was \$13,212, and was level funded since FY 2007. For FY 2011, the department is requesting \$16,200 in incidentals, and

from tanning facilities to hotels. She often joins the building inspector and plumbing inspector on inspections across the town. In addition, Lane is a registered nurse, and her job takes her to schools and other areas in town for clinics, such as the recent seasonal flu and H1N1 flu clinics.

Despite this high amount of travel and mileage, the Health Department did not put in for a travel stipend initially.

The mileage came up throughout the meeting, as FinCom learned about mileage on other vehicles in town. Officer Henry Cerqueira, Norwood's Animal Control Officer, has put about 24,000 miles on his 2007 vehicle. There was also the case of the Department of Public Work's five-ton sander and plow, which has about 31,000 miles on it, and has been in use since 1998. The DPW is looking to replace this vehicle.

Aside from the travel allowance request, the Health Department's FY 2011 budget was similar to last year. Reiss described the other increases as

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# So, who is going to buy the computers?

Multiple departments in town have budgeted for the same thing: the replacement of work stations in the Fire Department. Both the Fire Department and Computer and Information Services Department have budgeted for this work, and there is a discrepancy in the amount needed. The Fire Department requests \$90,000 for the upgrade, while the Computer and Information Services Department recommends using \$19,000 for the upgrade.

According to Fire Chief Michael Howard, the department's goal is to replace the entire workstation. This involves buying new computers, keyboards, monitors and workstations for the department, and they are requesting 20 units be replaced. These units can be found throughout the Fire Station, in the dispatch area, the roll call room, administrative offices and the shift commander office.

"The \$19,000 will not replace the material we have entirely," Howard said.

This budget discrepancy has proven to be frustrating for Computer Director Mark Redlich. At the Jan. 21 Finance Commission meeting, he rightfully pointed out that 21 years ago, it was voted that all computer related budget requests come through the Computer and Information Services Department.

"It's gone good, but I can't say that about the Fire Department this year," Redlich said.

He agrees that the Fire Department needs new computers, but not the \$90,000 they are requesting for the upgrade. The Fire Department has seven-year-old computers, and Redlich acknowledged that they crash almost every day.

"It's OK to upgrade," Redlich said. "We have to upgrade, but we don't need to buy things just to buy them," adding that other departments need to remember this.

"We don't need to buy everyone new equipment all the time, but the Police and Fire Departments need new equipment," he said, and that it is appropriate for the Computer and Information Services Department to cover those costs, as they do for all town departments.

Redlich believes that it will cost approximately \$950 to replace the workstations, coming in at a total of \$19,000 for the whole computer replacement project.

"As of right now, unless they convince me, I recommend [\$19,000 for] 20 computers and incidentals," he said.

town's main area of concern.

"The main thing from a layman's view, that the judge seemed to hang his hat on, was the definition of asphalt," Board of Selectmen Chairman Bill Plasko said, adding, "We don't necessarily agree with this definition."

Plasko suggests that once the judge made this decision, other arguments were moot and went unconsidered.

"Once he looked at that factor, he didn't even look at other factors, from what I understand," Plasko said.

Town Counsel David DeLuca went into more detail regarding the appeal.

"It's the central issue of the appeal: whether or not the court was correct in making this determination," DeLuca said, adding they are also questioning whether making this decision was within the court's authority.

"We think the judge made a legal determination that asphalt and bituminous concrete are not, in fact, the same product," DeLuca said. "That is a fact issue, rather than a legal distinction."

DeLuca said the town is arguing the opposite, that liquid asphalt and bituminous concrete are one in the same, and subject to the same regulation under the old Zoning Bylaw.

DeLuca estimates it will take several weeks or even months before the appeal can be resolved with the Massachusetts Appeals Court.

Vice President of Develop-

ment for Edgewood Development Timothy Higgins said they are waiting to receive the official appeal from the town.

"We obviously hope we will prevail, we'll just wait and see," Higgins said.

As they wait of judgment regarding the town's appeal, The Lorusso Corporation, the parent company of Edgewood Development and owner of the Norfolk Asphalt Plant, is battling to open a separate plant in Plainville.

Plainville Materials Corporation, a sister company of Edgewood Development, is

looking to open an asphalt plant at 3 Belcher St. The company had a plant in Plainville until 2003, and has maintained their permits to store both hazardous and non-hazardous materials on the site since then. Despite the close proximity of the two asphalt plants, they would be about 12 miles apart from one another, Higgins said it would be necessary to open both. The Plainville and Norwood asphalt plants would service two different markets.

"We plan on opening both plants," Higgins said.

have been working with the town since summer 2009.

The five outsourced routes in question take students everywhere from Lanchester to Attleboro.

"They're widespread, so unfortunately, we can't combine them," said the Norwood Public Schools Director of Transportation Kristen Correia.

As it stands, if the current busing situation continues, the school department will spend \$71,000 on outsourcing. While Chapter 30B of the Massachusetts General Laws requires "competitive sealed bids or proposals for contracts in the amount of \$25,000 or more," the school department is not required to go out to bid for SPED transportation said Contracts Administrator Catherine Carney.

"Special Education is not subject to the procurement laws," Carney said, later adding "[The school department] is not required to go out to bid on that," and that the department can negotiate with whichever vendor they want.

Correia described the \$71,000 as "the worst case scenario, if outsourcing continues. We're looking to reduce that."

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as the program is currently running at a deficit of \$123,000. At the Jan. 13 School Committee meeting, Director of Finance and Operations Ralph Dumas told the committee that they spent approximately \$385,000 of the \$402,000 allotted for the program, citing summer transportation as a reason for this deficit.

One way to reduce that is to get more vans and buses on the road. As more vans get back on the road, more routes will return to their in-house program, meaning fewer routes will be outsourced to TLC, saving the department money.

"We are waiting for a couple vans being worked on," Correia said. "We should be getting back two by the end of the week."

In addition, the department is looking to purchase used vehicles to add to their fleet. Dumas has contacted towns like Franklin, Wakefield, Middleboro and Wellesley to see if buses or vans are available for purchase. Purchasing additional vehicles would allow the town to bring more routes in house, perhaps allowing them to eliminate the need for outsourcing all together. The current fleet could handle all but two routes.

"At this point, there are not enough vehicles to accommodate all [students]," Correia said, adding that the two routes that would be outsourced would transport two students to two different locations.

TLC has been instrumental to the program thus far, Correia said.

"TLC was very helpful to the start of this program," Correia said, stressing that they weren't prepared to transport SPED students last summer.

"They've been very agreeable and helpful, and done everything we've asked," she said. "They've been key to us."

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The Norwood Youth Soccer Board of Directors honored three involved with the town's soccer program at their Awards Night held on Jan. 23 at the Norwood Elks. Coaches Kevin Fogg and John Goncalves were recognized, as was board member Jerry Cole.

Fogg and Goncalves were recognized for their coaching success, as both brought a youth soccer team to the State Championship. Fogg took his Division 2 under-twelve girls' team to the championship in spring 2005, while Goncalves' Division 2 under-fourteen boys' team became State Champions in spring 2009.

"Kevin's was the first Norwood team to make it to the states, and John's was the first to win the state championship," said Jake Ryan, Boys' Travel Coordinator for the Norwood Youth Soccer Board of Directors said.

Fogg's U12 girls had a successful run, but lost to Melrose in the state championship.

"They lost 1-0, and that was the only goal scored against them all season," Ryan said.

trees would remain up. In addition, the Arrigos and Boch signed an agreement in August 2006, and part of this agreement stated that mature pines would remain. However, the trees were removed in September 2008.

The Arrigos were given one-day's notice of this action, Goguen said, meaning they did not have time to get to the court and file a restraining order. He argued that Boch just came in wholesale and ripped the trees up because the root system was damaged. According to Goguen, an outside expert attested that the roots were damaged, but only because of Boch's construction.

The white pine trees were replaced, but the Arrigos feel the

new trees are too small and do not provide them with proper privacy from the cameras and lights at the Boch's property.

"Boch's mansion just looks down on these people," Goguen said.

The family is not disputing Boch's right to live there and add to his house, just his behavior during this time. Goguen said Boch's actions have made the Arrigos very upset, and that Glenn has gone to therapy as a result of these actions.

"If he wants to live in the neighborhood, then he should be a good neighbor," Goguen said.

Neighbors in the area have had a mixed response to the construction work at the Boch's mansion. Joanne Folan of 20

Hampden Dr. hasn't had major problems with noise or dust, but has had issue with a few other elements of the construction.

"It's been more annoyances than anything," Folan said, adding that because she lives across the street from, not directly next to, the Boch's property, some of her concerns were different than those of the Arrigos.

One such concern involved the Boch's German Shepard, who got loose a few times during the construction and, as Folan put it, would take a poop on her front lawn, though after alerting the family, this subsided. The other issue involved damage to her property.

"Some truck backed into [our] basketball hoop," Folan said.

She alerted the project manager about this, who required the time, date and license plate number of the truck in question, which Folan did not have. Without this detailed information, the project manager would not pay to fix or replace the \$300 hoop.

Nadia Touma, a neighbor who lives at 15 Hampden Dr., has no been affected by the construction.

"I have no complaints about Boch," she said, later adding, "He is a very nice man."

He added that he didn't have a "warm and fuzzy feeling" about Verizon's plans.

Paciorkowski acknowledged that the project had its positives, but these positives did not outweigh his concern about the project. He said Verizon's presentation of the project was solid, and that the lighting and landscaping plans would certainly clean up the area.

Had the project been approved, Verizon would have faced 13 conditions. First and foremost, they would donate \$25,000 to the town for traffic mitigation on Access Road and the Access Road/Neponset Street intersection. This money could be used as needed, and the idea of activating the light at the intersection was discussed. It would cost \$5,000 to run a test, and an additional \$18,000 to activate the system.

"The developer is willing to donate that to the town without any restrictions," Town Planner Stephen Costello said.

The street lights fall under the jurisdiction of the Board of Selectmen, who briefly discussed these lights at their Jan. 5 meeting. The issue was brought up by Selectman Jerry Kelleher, who pointed out, "it's been blinking for about eight years."

The potential activation of the lights concerned Town Manager John Carroll, and he stressed that a 30-day trial period would be necessary before the full activation of those lights.

"If those lights turn red, there will be queues of great length on Neponset Street," Carroll said.

Another way to mitigate traffic on the road was addressed by another condition, which required Verizon to have a "No Left Turn" sign in their parking lot, and this would be enforced from 4 to 6 p.m., the peak hours of the intersection. The town would be able to add this to their traffic bylaws, meaning it could be enforced by the Norwood Police Department, and any Verizon employee who broke this rule could face a ticket.

Ken Cram of Traffic Solutions suggested both this sign and the lights at the intersection as possible ways to reduce traffic on Access Road at the Dec. 14 Planning Board meeting. Cram spent time measuring speeds on Access Road and delays at the intersection.

Regarding speed, he measured that cars traveling north on Access Road average 36 mph, those traveling south averaged 33 mph. He determined the 85 percentile, which represents the speed 85 percent of vehicles are traveling at or below. For northbound cars, the 85 percentile was 45 mph, while southbound cars had an 85 percentile of 43 mph. All of these speeds fall above the road's 30 mph speed limit.

He found that between 7 to 9 a.m., drivers saw an average delay of 14 seconds at the intersection, with a maximum delay of 79 seconds the day Cram compiled this information. During evening hours, or 4 to 6 p.m., there was an average delay of 20 seconds, with a maximum of 102 seconds.

Several of the conditions addressed concerns of abutters. For example, after 9:30 p.m., all but five security lights in the parking lot would be shut off. In addition, Verizon vehicles would be restricted to Access Road. Drivers would not be allowed on side streets like Ridgewood or Azalea Drive.

"Verizon has agreed to use Access Road and not the site streets, unless they are servicing a customer [there]." Costello said.

The number of employees at the site would be restricted to 114. Costello stressed that this is an exact amount, not an approximation. Those working would be restricted to the sites hours of operation: 7 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. on weekdays, 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. on weekends. Mechanics would be on site from 3 p.m. to 11:30 p.m. on weeknights.

Mechanics would have been required to work inside with the doors closed, and Costello suggested that this would mitigate the noise so it would not be a problem, though Paciorkowski said it was the nature of this work that made him uncomfortable with approving the plan.

Attorney Diane Geraghty-Hall, who represented Verizon and Spiegel during this process, initially hoped for the Planning Board to vote on this subject at their Jan. 11 meeting. The board decided against this, as members wanted to see the written list of conditions to be sure just what they were voting on.

Planning Board member Thomas Wynne removed himself from the discussion and the vote, as he is an elected member of the Planning Board and an appointed member of the Norwood Airport Commission, and does not feel it appropriate to be involved in this discussion because of this.

(\$511,000, up from \$486,000). The overtime and recall account remains at \$80,000.

The Fire Department has come under some criticism in recent weeks, especially when it came to their FY 2010 overtime account for dispatchers. They needed additional money to cover costs, part of which came from unanticipated overtime work during the summer months. There were a pair of vacancies in the Fire Department's Emergency Medical Services unit, and they needed to pay \$41,000 in overtime pay. They were given \$20,000 at the Dec. 28 Finance Commission meeting via a reserve fund transfer.

While this has proven to be a problem- FinCom member Joseph Greeley pointed out the Fire Department has come to the commission for reserve fund transfers for the past several years, the income generated by ambulance fees has earned a positive response from some FinCom members.

"They do a tremendous job in that area," FinCom member Allan Howard said. "We can criticize them [because of] excessive overtime and stuff like that, but when it comes to the ambulances, you have to give them their dues. They do a heck of a job."

The ambulance fees vary from trip to trip, and are dependent on a variety of factors. An

ALS (advanced life support) run has a higher base fee than a BLS (basic life support) run. The fee also takes into account mileage, equipment and materials used on the trip and additional emergency medical technician charges.

The BLS base rate is \$580, while the base ALS rate can be either \$680 or \$880, depending on the service administered. Specific services have their own cost. Use of an epi-pen costs \$90, it costs \$75 to administer oxygen and cardiac defibrillation costs \$150. The rates are set by the Fire Department and approved by the Board of Selectmen.

Allan Howard estimated the Fire Department brings in between \$900 and \$1,000 per trip, adding that it all depends on what is administered to the patient.

Dedham has a different approach to ambulance fees. The service went out to bid, and the town pays \$18,000, with a cost of living adjustment, to the Quincy-based Fallon Ambulance. The town does not bring any money in, as all of the fees are collected by Fallon.

"It's no cost other than the limited cost proposal to us," Dedham Town Administration William Keegan said, adding that it has been this way for the last 30 years.

not charged as an accomplice, and is believed to have been at the site to stop at the Stop & Shop Supermarket.

Kieseling was initially detained by store security, and Donohue was waiting for him at the front end of the store, near the entrance. The Home Depot's Loss Prevention Officer noticed Kieseling place plumbing supplies under his jacket. When confronted by store security, Kieseling went to the back voluntarily, rather than attempt to flee from the

scene.

"[He had] about \$150 worth of supplies concealed under his jacket," Officer Kevin Grasso said.

The police arrived on the scene, and, as a safety precaution, searched him for weapons, which they did not find. Rather, they found several drugs on Kieseling: Klonopin, Xanax and Suboxone. Suboxone is a Class B drug, Klonopin is a Class C drug and Xanax is a Class E drug.

All three are available with

a prescription, though Xanax and Suboxone have also been used recreationally.

"He just possessed them without having a prescription to possess," Grasso said.

Klonopin is prescribed to combat numerous conditions, including epilepsy, anxiety disorders and panic disorders. Xanax is primarily used to treat moderate and severe panic attacks and anxiety disorders, while Suboxone is used to treat chronic pain.

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# Outside HS work stopped

The winter weather has put outside work at the new Norwood High School construction site on hold, though work on the inside of the building continues along smoothly.

"The frost on the ground was too much," said Michael Moisé of Agostini Construction. "The outside work was put on hold."

Outside work has been on hold for the past few weeks, though Moisé expects it will resume within the next two weeks. In the meantime, the focus has been on the new school's interior. They were

able to close up two portions of the building, Building A and Building B. This portion of the building is heated and work continues along.

"Inside the building, we've got a lot of work going on," Moisé said.

This work includes masonry, dry wall installation, stud work, work on the stairs and mechanical and plumbing work. There is some exterior masonry going on as well, as a mason is now working in the courtyard area.

Stair construction continues, and the ornamental stair case, called "Stair One" at this point in the project, is almost complete. Moisé said they are just fine tuning it. Work on

Stair Two has begun, and they are preparing to build the shaft for Stair Three.

They are also storing windows on the site. At an earlier meeting this month, Moisé confirmed the windows would arrive in late January or early February, and they have since been delivered to the site. He reconfirmed that the installation of the windows would not be immediate.

"They won't go in right away," Moisé said, estimating that the first windows might go into the building in mid or late February, and in the meantime, a temporary, protective material is present where the windows will be installed.

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

In addition to the scholarship, the Hanfs hope to teach others about ovarian cancer, the disease that took Carol.

"We want to bring awareness to ovarian cancer as a whole," Alyson said.

One way they did this was with a golf tournament held at the Wentworth Hills Golf and Country Club in Plainville on Sept. 18, 2009. Proceeds from the tournament were donated to Ovarians for the Cure of Ovarian Cancer. According to the groups web site, <http://www.ovariansforthecure.org/>, they "invest in the power of hope" by supporting "research objectives, groundbreaking treatment programs, public education awareness efforts and even patient information and morale-boosting initiatives." Patricia Flaherty, a nine-year survivor of ovarian cancer, founded the group in 2006.

The event proved to be a huge success, raising over \$15,000 for Ovarians for the Cure.

"Even Ovarians for the Cure was thoroughly impressed that it was our first golf tournament," Alyson said, adding that a second golf tournament will be held on Sept. 17, 2010.


The family is holding another event to raise awareness of ovarian cancer. On Apr. 3, the Norwood Sports Center will be packed with 23 teams participating in a bowling tournament. Proceeds from the event will be donated to Ovarians for the Cure.
