## Hundreds come out for first annual Dodgeball Tournament

The Norwood Recreation Department held its first ever Dodgeball Tournament on Saturday, March 23, to the respective delight and wariness of hundreds.

Fifteen teams comprised of everyone from Norwood youth, Norwood Police Department Officers, Norwood teachers and even a former Norwood Finance Commissioner took each other on throughout the evening. One thing that may differ from everyone's recollection of playing dodgeball in their youth is the inclusion of an audience, which was

not immune from the careening rubber balls whizzing by.

"It's a nice feeling to have an audience," said player Victor Greene.

"It's really fun," said Fares Msallem.

Greene and Msallem played on a team with Connor Curran, Kristian Chisholm and Giacomo Serratore. They said they signed up after they heard about it in their Spanish class. Recreation Department Program Director Catherine Seastedt said they partnered with Impact Norwood the Norwood Public Schools.

## Selectmen approve expanding SRO, urge voter turnout

Tuesday's meeting of the Norwood Board Selectmen moved swift through the agenda, dispatching with routine items in just over one hour, while still including a public hearing and an appeal to citizens to vote in the April 1 election.

Mark Ryan, DPW Director/Town Engineer presented his monthly update highlighting a bridge grant that has just been awarded by the Massachusetts Department of Transportation (DOT) to the city of Norwood for \$500,000.

"We thank the efforts of John Roger's office and Mike Rush who put on a full court pressure, as they say, to get this through" said Ryan.

Ryan provided an overview of snow removal activities for the winter season which included seven plow operations, 21 salt operations, and two snow removal operations. Norwood received 44 inches of snow this winter, half of which fell in March. "I'm not going to say that's it, but I hope that's it."

Board Chair Thomas Maloney noted that this was an average year for snow fall. Next year's budget has been increased to \$675,000 for snow removal.

Ryan noted that there is great interest in composting food scraps.

"Twenty percent of our trash in recycling is food scraps. We're spending money to throw that away to the tune of over \$200,000 a year," he said.

The rest of the department is now focused on fixing any damage that was done due to snow removal. A project is starting which involves resurfacing six parking lots.

James Collins, Light Department Superintendent, submitted his monthly report

of department activities along with Darryl Hansen of Broadband. "A lot is going on behind the scenes that our customers don't know about," reported Hansen, noting software upgrades, and that premium cable channels are moving to another satellite which requires moving the dish receiver to pick up the signal.

Residential sales are slow for the winter, he said, and business sales are going very well, averaging \$4,000 a month for the first quarter.

The third agenda item was a public hearing involving a request to amend the Lodging House License at 12 Vernon Street to increase the number of Single Room Occupancy (SRO) units from 12 to 17. Jeff Morrill, the owner, indicated that he has obtained the proper paperwork and additional parking has been approved.

Selectman Alan Howard asked, "You are going to remodel the garage of this project. Is there a bathroom?" Morrill explained that each room will have a sepa-

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

# 84 Morse St. inching forward at Norwood ConCom

The Norwood Conservation Commission (NCC) voted unanimously last week to accept the revised plans for the proposed parking lots and storage shed at 84 Morse St.

The approval is not the final approval needed for the proposal, as the hearing the NCC held with the proponent, DCD Properties (Boch Automotive), generated several revisions to the plans that have to be made within what is called an Order of Conditions. This order is an agreement between the proponent and the NCC that must be upheld during and after the con-

struction process. Once that is accepted and finalized, the NCC can vote to deny or approve the project.

Once the Order of Conditions is created, DCD will appear once again at the NCC, currently scheduled on April 3 at 7:45 p.m. to potentially finalize the project.

This will include the final permits the project needs to start construction and, once that happens, the 18-month clock on the potential sale of the Saint Streets Property begins. During the Planning Board review of the proposal and before issuing its approval, DCD had proposed a much larger project with 863 vehicle storage spaces. Boch Automotive Vice President

Michael Clemmey then reduced that number down to 593 (with 23 employee parking spaces) and said he was willing to sell the remaining property, the Saint Streets Lot, to the Town should the plan move forward.

The agreement was that once the entire process for the 84 Morse St. parking lot and storage building was completed, Clemmey would then start negotiating with the Town for the property and, hopefully, an agreement would be met. That was in late summer of 2018.

DCD Representative Attorney David Hern said he hopes the next meeting with the NCC will be the last one with a final-

ized order of conditions that will allow them to put shovels in the ground.

"I'm hopeful we can finish with them on April 3 and move forward," he said. "In the end it's been a drawn out battle, but I think it will work to everybody's benefit when all is said and done. I hope people see it that way."

During this meeting it appeared that most of the problems had been sorted out. Norwood Conservation Agent Al Goetz started it wanting to go over a drainage issue he had with the 23 employee parking spots, which were previously slated to be on a gravel surface.

"Knowing that cars that are not brand new sometimes leak, we didn't like the idea of any

leaking oils or fluids going into a gravel stone parking area," he said, "especially since there's a catch basin with an oil/water separator device nearby."

Goetz said he communicated with the architect on the project, Jim Susi, and had the employee lot relocated to an area of paved space that would drain to one of those separating units.

Susi went into more detail, pointing to the north of the storage shed on the eastern side of 84 Morse St., where there is currently a loading bay for the site of the employee parking spots. He said the area already slopes to an existing catch basin.

"There's an existing catch basin that we're going to replace where they have a separator," he said.

Susi said there are two loading bays there, but because it's employee parking, he said they will have a "house rule" that the employee parking area next to the far loading bay (from the access road) would be used as little as possible. The loading bays would

be used to transfer parts from the building to delivery box trucks for Boch Auto's service stations.

"I really don't think you're going to see much truck traffic in and out of there because it's mainly storage. Parts would be shipped to the (store locations),"

he said.

Goetz also said that the peer review report, which is a required hurdle for most projects going through the NCC process, stated that the writers feel the project has met all requirements and should move forward.

## Maloney, Hajjar get the nod

There are three candidates for two seats on the Norwood Board of Selectmen. The endorsements of current Selectmen Chair Thomas Maloney and challenger David Hajjar is not meant as a resounding rebuke to Selectman Helen Abdallah Donohue. It is meant to be a resounding rebuke to the Board of Selectmen in general because, quite frankly, these last few years in Norwood have been about the worst this newspaper can remember. And though not all the bad news can be directly attributed to Selectmen, responsibility starts at the top and there really is a real need to shake things up in this Town. The only way to do it is to change leadership.

If, as a voter in Norwood you feel that everything is going just fine, than vote for both incumbents Maloney and Donohue. However, if issues such as the massive proliferation of multi-unit apartment complexes, some of which could have been avoided bother you, then you should support change. If it bothers you that leadership chose as part of its "strategy" to hold off even more apartment monoliths from being constructed was to purchase the Forbes Hill property, taking on a massive debt load without a plan in place for what to do with it, you should support change. If you are concerned that the Town's financial situation is about as bad as it has ever been, and as a taxpayer you are being asked to support raising your taxes significantly to bail out department operational expenses without a plan in place to address future infrastructure improvements like a new Middle School as just one example, you probably think change is a good idea. And if you are wondering with all the bad news of lawsuits coming out of the airport run by a fiefdom down there that does virtually whatever it wants without any apparent Selectmen oversight, then by all means support the status quo.

All of the above being written, not all is bad. Some good things have happened that are of note. First and foremost, the appointment by Selectmen of Town Manager Tony Mazzucco was brilliant. Norwood residents couldn't have hoped for a better manager than Mazzucco. He understands municipal government from both the technical and political perspectives, and has had an immediate impact here. His efforts to try and change the old school philosophies to a more dynamic 21st century way of doing things is commendable, because it would be just as easy for the new guy to sit back and say, "whatever you want bosses" to Selectmen. He appears versed in every subject Selectmen throw his way, and is not afraid to speak up when he thinks they are wrong.

Another positive is the attraction of the Boston Skating Club to Norwood. This didn't happen by accident and so kudos to Selectmen for getting this done. Some are still grouching about not getting one in South Norwood, but the new facility to be built on University Ave. will not only provide another rink with Norwood receiving preferential treatment to utilize, but there will be world class events coming here that will support the local economy and bring some excitement to these parts.

Finally, though the Town Moderator seat is uncontested this year, this newspaper has a growing concern relative to its current occupant, David Hern. Hern is a fantastic moderator, fair and even-handed and, though occasionally his patience runs a little thin, overall he has the proper temperament to handle a very difficult job. Hern is also, if his ever growing legal business is any indication, a great lawyer who is being hired more and more by developers wanting to do business here. Rarely does any significant building project go before any board without Hern representing it. It is certainly worth noting that should any of the business of his clients come before Town Meeting, even if there is just a hint of impropriety, Hern will immediately recuse himself. The question is whether or not that is good enough? We are concerned it may not be, because just the fact that he is the Town Moderator may have an undue influence on the members of the boards he stands in front of presenting the cases of his clients. Are we being unfair even asking the question? Maybe, but neighborhoods negatively impacted by some of the projects Hern represents are probably asking the same question, so we think it makes it fair game for us.

### WHY THE SCHOOLS ARE ALWAYS UNDERFUNDED

*To the Editor:*

In the March 21st edition of the Norwood record, Bert Forrester very articulately summarized the root cause of the School Budget problem, teachers are provided with an annual cost of living (Cola) adjustment of 2 1/2% and teachers are also provided with an annual step increase on top of their annual Cola increase across all Lanes.

It is important to note the significant increases to teachers in all Lanes for Steps 8, 9, and 10.

The increases at these steps provide annual increases from 4.8% to 8%.

As Bert points out, the Committee agrees to teacher compensation that they know they will not be able to afford year after year. Who thinks a one-time operational override will solve this problem? Not I. Let us not forget that the town of Norwood, acting through the Committee of 21, paid for and received an operational and efficiency evaluation of the Norwood Public Schools (School Department). Areas studied were Special Education – The overall goal of the SPED analysis is to identify potential cost savings or more efficient or effective service delivery within the School Department. This analysis resulted in 9 recommendations including Non Classroom Information Technology – The goal to identify potentially redundant operational and administrative service delivery within the School Department and like areas within the Town operations. 5 recommendations were offered. Revenues – In terms of school revenues, 13.2% of the school systems funding is from state and federal grants which was positive and stronger than the outside funding levels of the comparative school systems. Staffing and compensation – 55% of Norwood Teachers were in the top three steps of the pay plan. 53% of the paraprofessionals are at the top step of the pay plan. Facilities and Grounds – Again with the goal to identify redundancies or inefficient services. The report identified alternate delivery structures including potential organizational consolidations, streamlining or outsourcing. Business and Finance – The review presents a limited analysis of staffing and costs of the School Business Office. It is important to note, the evaluation was completed and presented to the Committee of 21 on May 5, 2015 by the "Abrahams Group – For Better Governments". That is correct approximately 4 years ago. In the same edition of the Norwood Record, the Chairman of the School Committee reviewed a summary of what the committee offered as solutions to balancing FY 2020 if a 5.9M op-

erational override fails to pass. None of the Abraham Reports Cost Saving recommendations are represented in the School Committee's offered solution to balancing FY 2020. It would seem we have had ample time to vet these recommendations and implement effectively. Finally, I would point out to the voters that since FY 2010, the School Spend per student has increased 36% from \$12,778. To \$17,482. While over the same period the SAT and Legacy MCAS Composite Performance Index (CPI) have remained at or below the state averages. I'm with Bert. At this point, I will vote against an override until these problems are addressed.

"In 2015, my cousin Kelly passed away from breast cancer, so I wanted to do something to honor her," he said. "I decided running for Dana Farber through the Boston Marathon would be

the best way to do it. I applied and I was one of the lucky people accepted."

Kreisberg said Patti was a very close relation, and he helped her fundraise during her fight with cancer and he has been working to keep her memory alive.

"She was an amazing person, she was a mother of two girls and she was a social worker," he said. "She was just a great person, always positive and happy and so it was really sad, she was only in her early 40s. She passed

away two years later after being diagnosed. The whole family was really upset."

Kreisberg said he and his family are coming together to put forth his marathon bid, but he said he's looking for

any help from the Norwood community.

"I miss her a lot, and we want to make sure she's not forgotten," he said. "Her husband and kids are doing well now, and we hope we

can raise money for future patients with cancer and to help Dana Farber find a cure."

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

“We started with Impact Norwood and the Recreation Department collaborating, and then we were able to get the schools and Spanish classes involved, so that’s really awesome,” she said.

“That’s one of the most rewarding aspects of this is that it’s truly the community coming together. You have schools, the Recreation Department, Impact Norwood and then you have teachers, police officers, firefighters, people from the DPW, the Light Department as well as local organizations and Churches.

Norwood High School teacher Michelle Kelley formed a team with her husband Michael and students Emily Mace, Brianna LeBlanc and Sarah Lacerda. She said it was part of their Social Action Project for their Spanish class.

“It’s to promote prevention of drugs and alcohol usage in Norwood,” Michelle Kelley said. “So Impact Norwood came and spoke to the students, as well as other organizations, and the kids had to come and decide which social issue they wanted to work on and they chose Impact Norwood. They wanted to focus on healthy choices they could make on weekends and the Dodgeball Tournament sounded like a good fit.”

Seasted said the Recreation Department took a page out of another Town they work with for the event.

“Actually, Waltham Recreation does this as a community builder, and we work with them a lot so we took their idea,” she said with a laugh.

Seasted said it was a lot of work getting everything together, despite the fact that dodgeball really only needs a

space to play and rubber balls.

“That’s what you would think, but it’s hard getting a community together,” she said. “There’s a lot going on for a lot of people on the weekend and you have to do logistics. Who’s going to run the front gate, who’s going to run concessions, who’s going to do the officiating, who’s going to run the bracket, who’s going to work overtime, who’s going to work, and then having people volunteer too.”

Residents Kate Burke and student Lauren Woody said they both saw it on Facebook and they thought throwing things at each other would be a great family activity.

“We’re a competitive family,” Woody said.

“So far so good,” said Burke.

Resident Liz Caruso said she really liked the idea of the event and would go again if they held it.

“It’s just such a positive message and it’s a great opportunity for the kids to do something good on a Saturday night,” she said.

Seasted said they might try to continue the program throughout the summer as something like an inter-mural league.

“We’re going to try to do other events in the summer too, so we’re hoping to start the Community Series soon,” she said. “We started it off with dodgeball because we knew people really like dodgeball, but for the summer we thought we might wind it down with a community kickball game.”

six marathons before, but this marathon has personal meaning. He said one of the differences that hit him while he was training was working with Dana Farber. He said they have workshops in which the runners on the team create banners for current cancer patients to let them know the teams are running for them.

“Every week we do these training runs and during every one they have banners with a different name of a person getting treatment at Dana Farber,” he said. “The teammates that come to the training sign the banner and Dana Farber gives them to one of the patients. It’s just an extra motivator for me, helping us see that we’re helping people going through treatment.”

Kreisberg said while they don’t actually go to the hospital to give the banners to

the patients, as they might present medical complications, he feels the connection nonetheless.

Kreisberg said he first started running at the New York City Marathon to help fundraise for breast cancer after Patti’s diagnosis.

“I was accepted through a lottery, but I raised money for a different breast cancer foundation,” he said. “I basically did all my training on my own, so it was a lot harder than it is now. What’s made training for the Boston Marathon so enjoyable is getting to run on the weekend with my Dana Farber teammates. It adds a lot more motivation. Dana Farber is just so high class, and they do a really, really good job working with the runners and the training runs on the weekends, and everyone who works for them is really supportive. They always come for water stops on training runs, give us food

The Norwood Record and organize everything. And they do pasta party night before the marathon. My wife is really looking forward to that.”

"We had a small family farm where we grew vegetables and had a roadside stand. All four kids were raised there, and she looks at that being the high point. She's lived in Albany, Brooklyn, Mansfield; she also lived in Woodstock Vermont for a long time and Clearwater Florida."

Bob Spencer said the family farm turned into a business selling gladiolus for flower shops and funeral homes.

"She and my father started a horticulture business with greenhouses and those greenhouses are still there," he said.

"My father used to take gladiolus into Boston every day," Griffith said. "They're like tall flowers you see at funerals. They're tall-stemmed, tube shaped flowers and we used to go to the flower market and he'd deliver them at 6 o'clock in the morning."

Bob Spencer added that she also helped raise three of her grandchildren while living in Woodstock Vermont.

"My sister Doreen and her husband, a contractor, were both very busy and my mother and father took care of her kids for some periods of time," he said.

Griffith said she comes as often as she can, and used to live with Spencer at her home in Norwood.

"I only live a mile away and I took care of her at my home for about five years, but now I work, so I just couldn't do it anymore," she said. "She was fairly independent until then."

"Half the family is coming tomorrow because she can't hear or see too well and it's a bit overwhelming to have everyone here at once," she said.

Nursing Director at Charlwell, Carol Matthews, said while centenarians are uncommon at the center, the parties for them are not.

"We don't get many, but we have had other parties for residents, we just don't invite the public or the press too often," she said. "We're having cake and ice cream and singing happy birthday, it's what the family wanted. Elinor and the family wanted to have a party, invite all the residents and have a huge cake and they brought a bunch of cupcakes too."

Matthews said Spencer has been at Charlwell for at least four years. She said the home offers a variety of programming and events for the seniors, including several musicians who come in every week to perform for the residents.

"We get all different kinds of music," she said. "The residents love them."

# Intensity on the rise at Norwood Senior Center

The Norwood Senior Center (NSC) has been expanding its programming in the last few years and, according to NSC Executive Director Kerri McCarthy, one thing residents are saying they want more of is intensity, at least in their workouts. According to McCarthy, currently the NSC's exercise programs are the most popular, and they've been getting requests from residents to kick it up a notch.

"They've been asking for more of the advanced type of exercise classes," she said. "Our problem originally was room and availability, but two slots just opened up."

McCarthy said they are now working to offer more intense workouts to the 50 to 60 residents who come for exercise at the NSC every day. She said they're working with their instructor to figure out the best option, as they already offer Zumba classes.

"It might be more like a Pilates or a yoga-type class," she said. "We want it to be geared towards people who might be a little more flexible."

McCarthy said the programming at the NSC has been going very strong in other areas too, and always having something going on means they get a lot of people coming in to see

what's up and see their friends.

"It's word of mouth, definitely. The staff here is amazing and the energy when you walk in, you just feel welcomed," she said. "It helps too that it's so active all the time, so people never walk in and say there's nothing going on here. There's something pretty much going on every day all the time. Everything is organized throughout the day, so as far as things like card games and classes those are scheduled and then we see a lot of socialization before and after the scheduled events. The cafe is always buzzing with people before and after what they're here for."

And McCarthy said that socialization is one of the goals of the NSC. Elder isolation can lead to negative health effects, so she said they want to keep people as involved as possible.

In a recent Norwood Board of Selectmen's meeting, she said the Learn to Play Mahjong classes are getting so popular they're going to move them to the main room in the center.

"We have a lot of multipurpose rooms and one very, very large room," she said. "The room they currently use has about seven to eight tables and the Mahjong classes are growing so fast that we're going to have to move it to the big room to accommodate everybody."

McCarthy said aside from the regular programming of the

NSC, they also offer special large events, usually around the holidays, but also throughout the year. She said they are hosting an end of the year cookout in June, for instance.

"At those events we typically have about 175 to 200 people," she said. "During the summer we also have Tuesday Night Suppers and the center stays open until 7 p.m. (usual closing time is 4 p.m.). We cook a meal and we have community people come and serve, it's like a surprise guest server each week. We do have to cap it off at 100 people however, but people definitely stay after supper and play games, like our Wii Bowling."

McCarthy said each month

they have educational and entertainment events, like the upcoming dental clinic for education and Singo for entertainment.

"It's like a musical bingo game," she said. "The DJ plays a song and if it's on your sheet you mark it off and so there's always a bunch of songs... We found out about it because one of our seniors was with her daughter at a bar and they had it there, and if they can do it so can we."

She said Singo is starting on Friday, April 5 at 1 p.m.

This Thursday, March 28, she said Norwood Police Chief William Brooks is coming at 1 p.m. to talk with residents about concerns they have in the

neighborhood. She said the main concern this time around is pedestrian safety, more so recently, as a pedestrian was struck and killed on March 23. According to the Norwood Police, a pickup truck struck a man on Washington Street in the vicinity of Day Street. The victim is described as being a 67-year-old man from West Roxbury by a Norwood resident suspected of operating while under the influence of alcohol.

# Norwood driver allegedly strikes pedestrian on Washington

On March 22, the Norwood Police Department (NPD) reported a pedestrian strike on Washington Street in the vicinity of Day Street.

The strike, which police state was called in by a witness at around 11:13 p.m., occurred when alleged driver and Norwood resident Peter J. Whalen apparently struck a 67-year-old West Roxbury man. The victim, according to NPD, was with his wife at the time. Police reported she was not injured at the time of the incident.

NPD reported they treated

the victim on the scene with the aid of Norwood Firefighters before being transported to Norwood Hospital. He was then moved to a Boston hospital where he has apparently undergone several surgeries. No other updates as to the victim's health have been released at the time of publication.

Whalen, age 35, was arraigned on Monday at Dedham District Court. The NPD is charging him with operation of a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol with a blood alcohol level higher than .08 percent, second offense, operation of a motor vehicle while

under the influence of alcohol with a blood alcohol level higher than .08 percent resulting in serious injury, operation of a motor vehicle with suspended registration, operation of a motor vehicle while uninsured and negligent operation of a motor vehicle.

The NPD is conducting a full investigation of the crash directed by Officer Adam Osowski. The NPD has reconstructed the particulars of the collision to further the department's investigation on Monday, March 25. No other details have been released as of the date of publication.

rate bathroom and that this is a key component for SROs. "Private baths lend themselves to tenants staying longer." Morrill emphasized that these are not transient buildings. "I want people to stay."

Selectman Helen Donohue asked, "Could please describe what the inside of the building would look like?" Morrill described each room as having a twin bed, nightstand, desk, closet, and a TV affixed to the wall. Each room is 144 square feet. "They have a dorm-type refrigerator and a microwave, a stand-up fiberglass shower, toilet and sink."

The property currently contains a kitchen, but the tenants don't use it, so Morrill plans to convert it into another room. "I have zero vacancies in all of my properties. For under a \$1,000, they get everything they need. The kitchen will make a beautiful room." Selectmen approved the plans unanimously, subject to permit approval.

Tony Mazzucco, General Manager, submitted a proposed list of 20 articles for Special Town Meeting together with projected costs. Among these was a petition for the Boston Skating Club and allowing an insert to be included in tax bills

to request donations to assist seniors in need and veterans. Selectmen approved the articles for inclusion in the special town meeting.

Mazzucco also encouraged citizens to participate in a fund raiser on Monday, April 15, Patriot's Day, to raise money for civics classes and programs. "Bring Home the Bacon for Civics" will offer a full breakfast selection at the Olde Colonial Café from 8:30 a.m. -11:30 a.m. for \$25 per person with all proceeds going to student civic organizations.

### 2019 Ford Raptor 4x4

The Raptor has been around a few years. It started its life with V/8 power and now that horsepower has increased to 450 from a 3.5 liter, twin-turbo V/6 with all the performance upgrades that Ford could put into it. This truck has been completely redesigned – the team at Ford Motorsport did not just add on decals and performance parts. Unlike its predecessor, the 2019 has excellent manners for everyday street use, including the semi-aggressive large tires and wheels. The interior is well-designed with all controls at the driver's fingertips. Both the heat and audio systems are now user-friendly, with a two-hour tour on how to operate them. The transmission is now a 10-speed automatic with multi-modes and paddle shift levers on the steering wheel. Heated leather seats are in both front and rear, with multiple power adjustments on the driver's seat. The use of side steps are a big help to enter and exit the truck. The truck suspension irons out all the bumps on the back roads and highway even though it's got super heavy-duty suspension with special off-road shocks. The exhaust has a deep throaty sound under hard acceleration and is very quiet under normal driving. There is sound insulation everywhere Ford could put it to make for a super quiet cabin. The high-output audio sounds great at all sound levels. The large touchscreen has multiple functions and is very clear.

I drove the truck for a week and found it very enjoyable in every way. The Raptor comes in two wheel bases: 133 and a long 145. Our test vehicle was the very popular 133 inch. Base price starts at \$52,885 (destination fee: \$1,495). EPA: 15 city, 18 highway MPG. Ford has a laundry list of optional equipment to personalize the truck. Buyers tend to keep their Raptors many years until major upgrades are done (like this 2019 model). Our test truck was painted in Ruby red that you could see your face in – it was deep and perfect, at a cost of \$395; 17-inch alloy wheels are \$1,895; just to mention two options. There is no question that Ford knows how to build a super-performance, multi-use pickup.



Subject to the concurrence of the FAA and Massachusetts Department of Transportation (Aeronautics), the Norwood Airport Commission will select a firm for the thirty-six month period under consideration, which, in the Commission's judgment, best serves both the Norwood Airport and the public interest.
