

BEH awarded permit to self-fuel

The Board of Selectmen granted Boston Executive Helicopters (BEH) a new commercial permit for self-fueling, but the charter operator is still not allowed to fuel other aircraft as it pursues a Fixed Base Operator (FBO) license.

The Selectmen approved the license on May 19, though without recommended language requested by Attorney Brandon Moss, Town Counsel for the Norwood Airport Commission (NAC).

According to the application, "The whole of this license

is not permitted to engage in or perform commercial fueling activities included storage, sale, and distribution of fuel to or for third parties."

BEH had two applications before the NAC at the time the self-fueling license was awarded. The other license, to become an FBO, would allow BEH to fuel and service other aircraft, including "transient" aircraft not based at Norwood Airport.

The only current and operational FBO at Norwood Airport is Flight Level Aviation.

NAC Chairman Mark Ryan said the Norwood Airport Commission had no opposition to

approving BEH's self-fueling permit, but there were still more requirements to be met for the FBO application.

"We fully support that operation," he said.

Lt. Paul Butters of the Norwood Fire Department sent correspondence to the Town saying that BEH's fuel storage facility at the airport was inspected on May 14. Butters said the facility was completed and had been granted final approval by Chief Tony Greeley and himself. Ryan said the NAC had been waiting on BEH to get the inspection for at least a year.

the grass.

"We have four thousand flags out there right now," said Ted Mulvihill, director of Veterans' Services. "The winter decimated most of them so we had to replace them. It's the most we have ever had out at one time."

Following a rendition of Taps, flowers were placed as memorials to the veterans of Norwood. The names of those veterans were included on the Roll of Honor at the back of the Memorial Day Committee's program.

Mulvihill reminded those in attendance of the origins behind Memorial Day.

"There was a small rural community in South Carolina, wives and daughters decorated the graves of confederate sol-

diers, in the graveyard there was a plot for Union Soldiers," he said. "Upon seeing the graves so far from their families, they decided to decorate the graves of their enemies as well. This act of kindness along with General Logan's orders grew into what is today Memorial Day, for that I am extremely grateful."

The Orient Lodge of Masons was also in attendance. The lodge donated \$1,000 to the Wounded Warriors Fund. "Memorial Day was not established as the unofficial first day of summer or a day off from work," said Glenn Kubick, Grand master of the Orient Lodge. "Memorial Day is an opportunity for our country to pay tribute to those who served

in the armed forces."

The keynote speaker that morning, chemical operations specialist for the U.S Army, Daniel Adjemian, called for the audience to remember that while Memorial Day is a day of barbeques and a day off from work for many people, it is "because of the fallen soldiers who died protecting this country and its values that the day exists."

Specialist Adjemian also called upon people to "honor and remember the families of the fallen who often go unnoticed."

In addition to honoring all veterans, this year's observances were commemorated in memory of George K. Bird Post 169 and U.S. Army 1st Lt. John T. Moynihan of the Boston Police Department.

Southside Pub nearing sale of liquor license

The owners of the now-closed Southside Pub and Grille - formerly known as the Krayzee Horse - now appear to have reached a deal to sell their full liquor license.

During a show cause hearing on May 26 with the Board of Selectmen to determine whether the liquor license should be "suspended, limited, or revoked" for failing to provide the public with the services described in the license, Southside Pub and Grille owner Donna Grant said the license was in the process of being sold to Bamboo Cafe.

The hearing was held because Southside Pub and Grille - which had been located at 1112 Washington Street - has had having trouble finding a buyer throughout 2014 for the license. It was granted a six-

month extension on November 18, which recently expired.

Chairman Paul Bishop asked Grant for an update regarding when the license would be transferred. Otherwise, the Selectmen could vote to revoke the license.

Grant said she had provided a letter to the Selectmen, notifying them that there was a signed agreement with Bamboo Cafe for the sale of the license, which she said should be considered a legal, binding document.

In the meantime, she said, a purchase and sale agreement had been drawn up the day before and had been sent to Bamboo Cafe. Emily Xu of Bamboo Cafe - located at 663 Washington Street - said they had not yet received anything from Southside Pub and Grille, but confirmed that both parties had agreed on a transfer.

"Everything is on its way to

being closed," Grant said.

Bishop insinuated that more was needed in order to secure the transfer.

"There are certain criteria that have to be accomplished when you transfer a license, and the very first thing is a letter of good standing from the DOR (Department of Revenue)," Bishop said.

Grant said the Department of Revenue had been closed for several days, but she claimed she had spoken to an individual who was working on the letter, who confirmed that it should be on the way soon. Grant also said she had a letter of good standing from the Secretary of State's office.

Selectman Bill Plasko said the next step was receiving an application for the license from Bamboo Cafe.

Selectman Helen Abdallah Donohue asked if Flight Level had any restrictions on its license and about the timeline for BEH's license applications.

"It has been brought to my attention another license that's in existence doesn't have any restrictions on it," Donohue said. Ryan said this was likely the case.

Ryan also said that the Norwood Airport Commission and BEH were working towards the FBO approval. The last major obstacle to awarding the FBO permit needed to sell fuel to other operators on the airport was that BEH had not submitted certain financial documents required with the

application.

Donohue asked if Flight Level had also been asked to submit financial documents. Ryan said they had because the request was a "standard of the industry."

"Like any other good landlord we want to see their financial background," Ryan said.

The Selectmen approved the self-fueling license unanimously.

"I just want this to be an even playing field and a just playing field, that's a real concern," Donohue said.

BEH president Christopher Donovan said BEH was gracious for the approval, but still had concerns.

"BEH is willing to provide

the documents to Mr. Ryan at any time and place of his choosing," Donovan said. "BEH does not believe that the financial records requests, which include personal credit reports and bank statements, and which the NAC only recently, finally, and definitively stated would become public records, are appropriate or proper, but only desires to move the process along so that it be allowed to compete against Flight Level at the Norwood Memorial Airport."

Her reaction, and we paraphrase, "Duh." She took offense that the intro felt the need to even explain that. Our counter, as we have said many times, is that the reminder is very much needed. People forget.

This year, we take a different approach and offer a simple note of thanks. The men and women who serve this country, of course, have our praise, respect, and appreciation. Those soldiers who paid for our freedom with their lives are in our hearts. Let's also give our thanks to an under-appreciated, often unknown group of folks who volunteer their time and energy to ensure remembrance. If you were on Boston Common this past weekend, you no doubt saw the impressive display of 37,000 flags laid out to honor the fallen, an effort each year by the group MA Military Heroes.

Highland Cemetery, thanks to many volunteers, also ensures that the gravesites of departed soldiers are similarly decorated with our nation's flag.

As we reflect back on the day that was, we all owe these folks our praise and appreciation. For many it was the first day of unofficial summer, but for these folks it was a busy weekend of hard work in service to a noble cause. We may take these efforts for granted, but we shouldn't. Their simple acts of patriotism and memorializing deserve heartfelt thanks. We hesitate to draw too much attention away from the intention behind Memorial Day, even as we look back on this year's observances, but we must also reflect on a moment on the paramedics and EMTs who are often first responders to tragedy.

This past weekend, first responders from around the nation were at Faneuil Hall to honor their brethren who died in the line of duty and advance the cause of a National EMS Memorial. There may be fewer on-the-job fatalities for these folks than police and firefighters suffer, but the sacrifices are no less important or heartbreaking. There is no higher calling than to put your life on the line to serve others and we salute them.

HOW SAD WE'VE BECOME

To the Editor:

The Sports Complex in the Coakley/Hawes area of South Norwood will now include the Eastern Massachusetts Regional Ice Skating and Recreation Center that so far will cost \$12,455,000. Originally estimated at \$5.6 million from the "state" (read: taxpayers), an additional \$3.5 million has been requested. Town Meeting Members just voted in the affirmative to finance an \$800,000 bath house that is three times the size as the present one, purposely allowed to deteriorate, and \$280,000 for lights at Field No. 3. On the agenda is \$1.5 million for "artificial" turf for the rectangular field, \$700,000 to reconfigure and repave the parking lots for 120 spaces, and another \$75,000 for a new tot lot.

Proponents for the hockey rink do not live in South Norwood, and will not be around to face all the traffic and vandalism problems incurred in this tight-knit, dense neighborhood by cars, trucks and buses of hockey players and the 538 spectators not only from Norwood, but also from surrounding towns.

Who has thought of the more than 1,000 children attending the Balch and Coakley schools? Does the safety of these children matter? Guess not, as the Norwood School Committee voted to give away more than four acres of Coakley School land to make this project possible.

South Norwood residents have had to endure all the problems from people who don't live in the neighborhood: the skateboard park at the Balch, the Krazee Horse nightclub, the asphalt plant, over 30 years of liquor establishments, now the hockey rink and bath house, and coming soon are plans by

an out-of-town developer who wants Norwood to change its zoning to "mixed use" for a large multi-apartment and retail complex. Where? Why, on Morse and Short streets, right down the street from the hockey rink and bathhouse. Residents of South Norwood never asked for any of these things; they just want to be left alone. They want the respect and "fair play" they deserve from State and Town Officials and from those living in the other districts in town.

The only thing businesses and residents of South Norwood asked for was underground wiring on Washington Street for the betterment and beautification of their South Norwood neighborhood. Town Officials have rejected their requests.

It is quite evident this town values sports over education. Education here is not top priority. If so, why would they allow teachers to be laid off, programs to be cut, larger class sizes, schools intentionally not maintained, and allow "portable modular classrooms" at the Coakley that have been unheated and cold or too hot with no air conditioning. Yes, these things have happened here. Town Officials, hand in hand with out-of-town developers, and now, proponents for this gigantic sports complex have created and promoted this monster called "Economic Development" all to the detriment of town residents. How very sad our once bucolic beautiful Town of Norwood has become the "City in the Suburbs."

Bishop said the information for a transfer of an "all-alcoholic beverages" license was available on the Alcoholic Beverages Control Commission's (ABCC) website. The two parties would have to agree on the particular criteria for the transfer, and then fill out the required paperwork.

Grant said the purchase and sale agreement, as well as the letter from the Department of Revenue, should be in hand by the end of the week.

Plasko said they would also need to receive Bamboo Cafe's application, at which point they

would have 30 days to act on it. This, he suggested, warranted an extension longer than a week.

"I can see the two parties here, I see an earnest effort being made to put the deal together, and we can give a little bit of reasonable time to do that," Plasko said. "But if I didn't see that happening, I'd be revoking the license."

Plasko made a motion to continue - instead of close - the hearing for several weeks.

Selectman Helen Abdallah Donohue asked whether Bamboo Cafe had in fact agreed to a

price, to which Xu said they had. Donohue suggested that it would be "most fair" to continue the hearing for a month to allow time for the parties to work through the legalities.

Plasko agreed, and a deadline of July 7 was put forth. He said the parties did not have to wait until that deadline to get the deal done. Plasko's motion to continue the hearing passed 4-1, with Michael Lyons opposed.

Lyons reminded the board that the Bamboo Cafe already has a Beer and Wine License for the uptown business district that must be turned back in to the Town.

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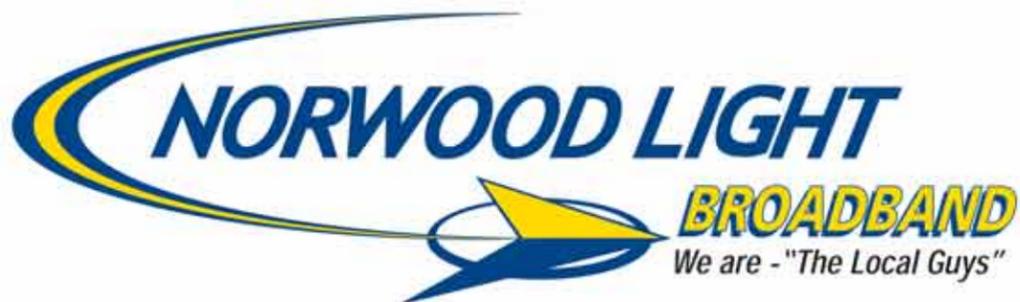
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TM ok's Schools and other budgets

Town Meeting approved Norwood Public Schools' budget for the upcoming fiscal year of \$39,648,830 on May 21.

Superintendent of Schools James Hayden began with a presentation describing the situation with the School Department as being a glass "half full."

He then broke down the budget, of which 80 percent - or around \$31,390,834 - was made up by salaries. Hayden also broke down revenue projections, of which 84 percent - or \$32,622,247 - was accounted for through the Town's net revenues.

In all, the budget request for 2016 showed a 2.6 percent increase over fiscal year 2015, though Hayden said the Schools were falling just short of being able to present a level services budget.

Hayden thanked the Town Meeting body for their support in allowing the general government and schools to come up with an additional \$370,000 and potentially allowing the schools to take \$165,000 - or 55 percent - of \$300,000 that was identified from medical coverage savings just before the first An-

nual Town Meeting date. This would allow the Schools to address several gaps and cuts, including a Willett Developmental Learning Center teacher amounting to \$52,820 and two elementary school positions needed to reduce high class sizes. These included a Balch School second grade teacher and a Prescott School third grade teacher.

Hayden said the Schools still needed to address three more elementary school teacher cuts and add help for struggling middle school learners, technology, and high school Italian foreign language classes and discipline support.

"Our students need to get beyond the pencil and have technology in hand," Hayden said of the technology efforts.

District 5 member Toni Eosco proposed a motion to add \$55,000 from free cash - though Selectman Bill Plasko and later Town Counsel believed that the motion should direct the funds be appropriated from taxation - in order to restore the Italian program at the high school.

Eosco said Italian was added seven years ago after surveying the students and funding for the program came from around the community, including the Italian Social Club. Principal George Usevich was also proactive in requesting the program.

Cutting foreign language options, she said, was dangerous for Norwood High Students seeking to attend competitive colleges, which often require two years at a minimum of the same language, but prefer four years.

District 1 member Mike

Reilly asked if the School Committee would heed Eosco's suggestion if Town Meeting approved the motion, since Town Meeting could not direct the Schools to do so.

Hayden said they would take the suggestion into consideration and it was up for debate by the School Committee, which also needed to take the aforementioned remaining priorities into consideration.

John Hall of District 6 said Town Meeting would just be voting for the Schools to have an additional \$55,000 added to their bottom line. He also said Italian was not among the more spoken languages and might not rank as beneficial as French or Spanish.

Eosco's motion to add \$55,000 to the School's budget for the Italian program failed. Hayden said 51 students who had signed up would be affected, though certain students who would be continuing Italian would be able to do so through the year.

David Hajjar of District 4 asked if the Schools had considered charging tuition for kindergarten, citing other towns in the area that already do so, including those which receive kindergarten grant money from the state.

Hayden said Norwood was no longer receiving \$150,000 in kindergarten grant money from the state and said that if Norwood charged tuition for full day kindergarten, it would also have to add tuition-free half day offerings, which would require staffing and transportation costs. Hayden said half day costs are not reimbursed by the state.

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Department heads take issue with schools' consultant report

The Norwood School Committee has begun seeking responses from department heads to the report released by the Abrahams Group.

The Abrahams Group was commissioned by the Town's Committee of 21 in charge of examining school financing and the budget process in order to study the operations and efficiency of the school system.

"What the report was all about was looking at options ... are there ways that we could save money, and ultimately, how do we achieve our priorities as a school system to plan an education for the future?" asked Superintendent of Schools James Hayden.

The Committee of 21 asked

the Abrahams Group to evaluate six key areas: special education, non-classroom information technology, revenues, staffing and compensation, facilities and grounds, and business and finance.

On May 20, the School Committee heard reactions to the report from Special Education Director Paula Alexander and Director of Buildings and Grounds Paul Riccardi.

Alexander said she wanted to address several inaccuracies related to staffing in the special education chapter of the report.

The report mentioned possible overstaffing with regards to instructional aides in some special education classrooms, though it admits that individual education plans should be consulted first.

In particular, the preschool

programs were found to be particularly overstaffed, with particular attention paid to the half-day program, which has "1.55 students to each staff member working in the program."

"This is highly overstaffed and should be reduced," the report read. "Having three licensed teachers in the program does not require six aides to assist."

Alexander contended that the school referenced by the report that did not have a substantially separate program had a vital "resource room" staffed by 1.5 teachers and a paraprofessional. She said the class roster was "not a stable number," as students in need of extra support through the resource room were "identified throughout the

Hajjar said the average tuition charged was around \$3,166 and Norwood could charge around \$2,000 and would probably garner around \$500,000. Milton, he said, charged \$2,500 and received grant money, while Dedham and Walpole charged tuition and received no grant money.

Hayden said he was wary of the 28.7 percent poverty rate and the potential for a third of the population not being able to pay the tuition costs to enroll in kindergarten.

After discussing possibili-

ties to lower out of district special education costs, Town Meeting approved the School Department's budget request.

During the session, which went into the 11 p.m. hour, the Town Meeting body also approved the Police Department's \$7,183,769, which included additional funds for the purchase of several police cruisers.

Ed Ferris of District 8 asked about the Department's overtime shift replacement costs and whether it was more beneficial to just hire another

officer.

Chief Brooks said the budget already reflected his desire to increase the department size by two officers for a total of 60. He also said that the overtime figures factored in the certain number of officers required for each shift.

Town Meeting also approved other large budgets, such as the Fire Department's \$6,549,019 request and budgets for the Public Works Department and the Recreation Department. Town Meeting continues on May 28.

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

Alexander said the staffing levels in the early childhood education center at the Willett School were “in keeping with regulations” for safety and education.

Many of the students, she said, had speech issues or were nonverbal, were English language learners, required toilet training or other physical assistance, or needed to be bottle fed.

Many of the services once covered by medical insurance were now falling into the school system’s responsibilities, she said, and doctors often requested a one-to-one ratio of aides to students - something the department tries to avoid in order to rotate paraprofessionals wher-

ever they are needed.

Alexander said that given the local model, they were “not staffing in excess of what our neighboring communities are,” and suggested that Norwood was often at the same rate or below.

Acting chair for the meeting James Gormley and Patrick McDonough expressed concern that the consultants did not spend any time in the special education classrooms.

Hayden said that the Abrahams audit was “mainly a paper audit” that would still be looked at for areas to improve, but did not involve the level of depth that the coordinated program review earlier in the year did.

“We really want to get into the action phase and out of the ‘let me tell you all about ourselves phase,’” Hayden said. “We’ve had enough audits and it’s time for lots of action.”

The School Committee then heard Riccardi’s responses to the Buildings and Grounds chapter of the report.

The consultants found that, while the district should work towards consolidation, it should maintain separate facilities management operations between the Town and Schools. The consultants also recommended reducing staff by .5 custodians at each school aside from the high school.

The report found that Norwood was the highest in its comparative group in terms of total operation and maintenance costs, and second highest in terms of custodial costs.

Riccardi said that his department was responsible for nine

buildings comprised of 720,000 square feet of building space and 72 acres of outdoor spaces, minus non-high school fields.

The department consists of 35.5 staff: 27.5 custodians, an electrician, a maintenance carpenter and locksmith, a lunch truck driver, three grounds keepers, Riccardi, and his assistant.

Riccardi said he was interviewed for “a couple hours” but was disappointed that the consultants did not make a field visit. The report recommended he eliminate 3.5 full time custodial employees at the elementary school level.

“The issue for me is not the amount of custodians, it’s the amount of buildings,” Riccardi said, noting the 42-100 year old age range of the schools other than the high school.

The daytime custodian, he said, is too busy to clean the school. Cutting the night staff would also mean after school programs could be at risk, as schools would have to be secured by 5:30 p.m.

This, Riccardi said, would be a detriment to the “community aspect of our neighborhood schools.”

Riccardi was also opposed to contracting out cleaning help because the part time employees would see higher turnover, would likely lack health insurance, and may present security concerns.

Riccardi said such a choice would be a “value statement for the community” if it chose to employ part time contractors who work for less and without benefits.

Riccardi also took a stance against consolidation of the town and school facilities management operations, since both already collaborate on snow removal.

“We got a very superficial look based on paper, not based on day-to-day reality,” Riccardi said.

Hayden commented on the overall cleanliness of the schools and how Norwood had only five snow days this year, while Braintree had over 10.

Mustangs end season with nail-biting loss to Brookline Danny Farrell finishes illustrious career with 304 points

Danny Farrell joined an elite group of Massachusetts high school lacrosse players in Norwood's 10-9 season-ending loss to the Brookline Warriors last Friday.

Farrell had seven points (five goals, two assists) to surpass 300 for his career, becoming the 48th such player in the state's history to achieve the milestone. Entering the game with 297 points, he leaves Norwood High School with 304 career points, and sits alone in 45th place on the Massachusetts all-time scoring list.

"He was a good kid to have around, very easy to coach," said head coach Anthony Roman after the game. The Mustangs finish the season at 3-15, a five-game drop-off from last season's 8-10 mark. "Great guy for the young kids to follow."

Farrell entered his senior

The Xaverian Hawks spoiled senior day for the Mustangs, sweeping the season series in the process with a 4-1 win on Saturday afternoon in Norwood.

Since locking up a tournament berth on May 18 with a 5-0 win over Natick, the Mustangs have dropped three consecutive games to Walpole, Xaverian and Brookline to fall to 10-9. Manager Kevin Igoe described his team's chances of hosting a post-season game as "slim."

"Mentally, we're weak at this point," said Igoe. "Their mind is on stuff other than baseball. You're going to lose when you play good teams."

Right fielder Declan O'Brien, who went 2-for-3 with a walk, scored the lone run of the game for Norwood out of the leadoff spot in the bottom of the first inning. He walked on a full count, stole second,

and advanced to third on a Johnny Ryan flyout to right field. He'd come in to score on a Jake O'Rourke sac fly to right, giving the Mustangs a 1-0 lead at the time.

Ryan got the start on the mound for Norwood as well, going the distance while allowing four runs (two earned) on six hits, striking out two and walking two.

He allowed only two hits after the top of the second inning, both in the top of the seventh. But a bases-clearing double by second baseman Troy Sheperd, coming on the heels of a Sean Mellen error in centerfield, gave the Hawks a 4-1 lead they wouldn't relinquish.

"They're not going to panic, they're a good team" said Igoe of Xaverian allowing the first run of the game. "I knew they'd get three or four [runs], we knew we had to have some semblance of offense."

The Mustangs had one ex-

Mustangs top Dedham in another overtime thriller

The only time Dedham's scoreboard displayed a Norwood lead was after Kacie Smith's overtime goal last Wednesday, which earned the Mustangs a decisive 7-6 victory.

Norwood overcame a two-goal deficit on three separate occasions, including a 6-4 hole with 12:15 to go in the second half. It was their second-straight overtime thriller, coming on the heels of last Monday's 17-16 double-overtime victory over Canton.

"I think it's great that we've been able to have these close, fun games," said head coach Caitlin Harrington following the win over the Marauders. Including Friday afternoon's 17-10 win over Brookline, the Mustangs are now 11-6, and have won four of their past five

games following a four-game losing streak. "I hear them [the girls] saying how much fun they are. And I think that's really important for them, especially going into the tournament, where you're going to face teams that are very similar, and you're going to face teams that are a lot better."

Dedham, playing for pride at this point of the season, scored the first goal of the game just 46 seconds in, and held a 4-3 lead at halftime. Val Quinlan, Sammy Hayes and Smith had the Norwood goals in the first half.

It was a relatively quiet night for Smith (by her standards) with just three goals, but her lone goal in the second half tied the game at 4-4, coming nearly 10 minutes into the period after Dedham held the ball in the Mustang offensive end for the first seven or so minutes.

"She's just so patient, and

nothing really riles her up," said Harrington of Smith, the top-scorer in Norwood girl's lacrosse history. "She has this quiet confidence about her, and so in the game you might think that she's quiet, but she's actually looking to make plays. Even though she has 281 goals in her career, she honestly is not selfish. She looks to make plays, and if those plays aren't there, she's just a sniper."

The Marauders retook the lead at 12:01 of the second half, 5-4, bouncing the ball between the legs of Mustangs goalie Alex Dimitriou. Forty-four seconds later, they increased their lead to two, but it would be the last time a ball got past Dimitriou on the evening.

With time ticking away, Hayes netted her second goal of the night at 21:20 of the second half, taking a feed from Smith in transition and beating Dedham goalie Julia

McElhinney.

Still trailing 6-5, Norwood was the beneficiary of an off-sides call against the Marauders with 1:11 remaining in regulation. Smith passed to Quinlan off the whistle, but the ball fell incomplete, and was scooped up by Dedham.

But another call against the Marauders, this time for a block, gave Norwood control again. They wouldn't botch the second lifeline, with Hayes exploding through space and finding Shannon Gillis for a goal with 29 seconds to go in regulation.

"Huge for us," said Harrington of the opportunities. "I kept telling my girls, 'I'm still not worried, I'm still not worried. I know you guys have what it takes, I know you have the drive.

We just need to connect more.' And I think those two penalties, putting the ball in our possession, were a very, very big advantage."

Playing under a sudden-death overtime format used by the Bay State Conference, rather than the two-three minute overtime periods used in other leagues, draw control is everything to begin the extra period. And after Quinlan succeeded in just that, Smith's tally 52 seconds into overtime gave the Mustangs a clean escape from Dedham with a 7-6 win.

Yesterday, Norwood finished their regular season schedule with a game at Natick, in an event held after The Record's deadline. They now await their tournament matchup, with pairings expected to be released at some point on Friday.

cellent opportunity to get back into the game in the bottom of the fifth, with back-to-back-to-back singles from O'Brien, Ryan and O'Rourke to begin the inning. With the bases loaded and nobody out, catcher Kevin Hines stepped to the plate and hit a bullet right at Hawks first baseman Bryan Hart, who made the catch and stepped on first base, doubling off O'Rourke. season needing 22 points to break the Norwood career scoring record of 238 points, a feat he achieved in the Mustangs' fourth game of the season, an 11-9 loss to the Braintree Wamps on April 10. Bound for Assumption College in Worcester in the fall, he finished his senior season with 88 points.

"It was a really good day today on the face-offs, just practicing all season for this, and in the last game it all came

together," said O'Donnell, also a varsity wrestler for the Mustangs. He credited both Roman and Norwood wrestling coach Phil Mastro with his grappling abilities.

Farrell's 300th point was a goal at 5:55 of the second quarter, which also gave his team a 4-1 lead. At halftime, the Mustangs were on top 5-2.

Brookline scored two goals in the third, holding Norwood scoreless in the process, and tied the game at 5-5 just 30 seconds into the fourth. Dimitri Thaxter answered the call 43 seconds later, putting the Mustangs back on top.

Leading 9-7 with 7:54 to go, Norwood's offense went cold at the worst possible time, all while the Warriors heated up. They'd score three unanswered goals in the remainder of the quarter, their tie-breaking 10th goal giving them their first lead since 1-0 with 2:12 remaining. The 10-9 score would hold for the final.

School Committee approves three reinstatements, strikes down school choice

The Norwood School Committee opted not to participate in the School Choice program during the 2015-2016 school year.

Though chairman John Badger and Courtney Rau Rogers were absent from the meeting, the remaining committee members voted unanimously on Superintendent James Hayden's recommendation not to participate.

Hayden said the district is required to hold a public meeting by June 1 on the issue each year to determine "whether we will allow non-resident students to participate in a school choice program in the Norwood Public Schools."

Hayden reasoned that enrollments were increasing in certain areas at certain schools, and school choice enrollments could cause further overcrowding if the students opted into those classrooms.

"You do not get to choose the school choice students who come in, they choose you," Hayden said. "If they go into an area where we have overcrowding...that's going to

provide a problem for us."

Hayden also mentioned that Norwood is fully responsible for any school choice students once they enroll until they graduate or turn 22 if they are special education students. The income stream for these students, he said, is on a "declining scale." The reimbursements per pupil are actually less than the cost of what it takes to educate a child and "the reimbursement from the state does not match the expense," which is around \$5,000.

Lisa Igoe asked if the district had ever participated in the school choice program, to which Hayden answered that it had not.

"We have never been a part of this, the reimbursement is declining," acting chairman James Gormley said. "We would run the risk of taking on a long-term special education agreement for a new student, and if that student did not come with a special education plan, that student could ask for an evaluation and then we would be responsible for the cost of that education."

The School Committee also took a preemptive vote to reinstate three teaching positions

into the fiscal year 2016 budget if money that was saved from health insurance enrollments was allocated at Town Meeting.

Hayden said that employees changing their health insurance plans amounted to savings higher than the original estimates, which resulted in an additional \$300,000 available to the Town.

According to Hayden, the Selectmen, some members of the Finance Commission, and the School Committee decided to split the money according to the same percentages used to split the Town's overall budget between the schools and general government.

If this were the case, the school department would receive 55 percent, or \$155,000, while general government would receive 45 percent, or \$135,000.

"The budget is a living document for all of us, what do we still need to fix in our budget that would help our students?" Hayden said.

Hayden identified the district's needs across all grade levels. At the kindergarten level, it was important to restore a lost Developmental Learning Center teacher, at

the elementary level, class rosters were still in the high 20's, there was still a need to help struggling learners at the middle school, and high school foreign language had taken a hit in the budget reductions.

Hayden said he would prefer to focus on finding ways to assist early learners with the money. This way, problems could be addressed earlier in the students' learning careers rather than down the road, which could add to the cost of the education.

As such, Hayden proposed restoring the developmental learning center teacher, adding a third grade teacher to the Prescott School, where classes were between 27 and 28 students, and adding a teacher to the Balch second grade level.

Hayden said third grade was where students finish their understanding of learning how to read and would have problems throughout their education if their needs were not attended to. The Balch School, he said, needed small class sizes because of the number of second language learners and students on individual education plans.

Hayden said the deadline to make the decision was June 1 since staff members could not wait to see if they had jobs and could leave for other placements. He said he'd already laid off seven people and found "ways for some of them to land."

Gormley said he was in favor of "trying to address problems earlier rather than later."

"Getting a sound basis earlier helps all learners," he said.
