

## Planning Board prepares to approve rink

The Norwood Ice Arena took another step closer towards fruition on June 29, as the Planning Board closed the major site plan review hearing and began evaluating potential conditions of approval for the project.

The hearing was first opened on June 15, but was continued to allow for comments from department heads at Town Hall. Town Planner Paul Halkiotis said he did not receive any comments on the project, apart from an email from Robert Donnelly.

During the meeting, Assistant Town Engineer and Rink Committee member Andy Murphy addressed several areas of concern brought up by Planning Board members and residents during the first part of the hearing.

Murphy said the project would include revamping the intersection of Washington and Short streets, where the rink would also have its entrance.

The intersection would align the entrance with Short Street, adjust the crosswalks, and add traffic signals, which would include a pedestrian button. A traffic study by engineering firm VHB found that the current intersection provides the lowest level of service to users, Murphy said.

Planning Board member Debbie Holmwood asked if the traffic signalization project would be paid for from the rink's budget, and how it would be paid for if the budget did not support the project.

Murphy said the rink budget included funding for the traffic signalization project - which he said would run concurrently with the rink construction

- and that the Town had been looking into using Chapter 90 money from the state if the funding was not available in the budget.

Murphy also said the parking lot would include a cul-de-sac and be large enough at the rear to accommodate turning buses. The rink would run seasonally, from September to March, he said.

"We do not know what the Town may or may not want to do (with the building) off-season," Murphy said, suggesting the meeting room, concession stand, and bare concrete floor of the rink could be utilized by the Recreation Department.

Murphy mentioned that the Rink Committee was coordinating with the

## Local historian shares town lore through old homes

Bob Donahue expected somewhere between five and 15 people to show up on June 24, when his Vernon Street properties were scheduled to be on the Norwood Historical Society's walking tour.

It was the first time in several years that he would be opening his historical properties and his ever-growing collection of local history to the public.

"We got a little better than 40 people," Donahue said. "It was cha-

otic, but nice to see the turnout."

Donahue and his daughter Susan were delighted to see what they think is a renewed interest in local history.

"The interest is picking up. A lot of young people in town are getting interested in history," Susan said. "It was really cool to see."

For years, Donahue and his late partner, Bob Hansen, have owned historical properties in Norwood and run them as bed and breakfasts or lodging houses, among other uses.

Now, Donahue runs 12 Vernon St.,

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# 1.5 Task Force seeks to learn from Stoneham

The 1.5 Percent Task Force is looking to learn from the state Housing Appeals Committee's (HAC) decision regarding the Town of Stoneham's affordable housing position.

The Town of Stoneham believed it had reached the necessary requirements - 1.5 percent of developable land devoted to affordable housing or 10 percent of its housing stock - needed to earn permanent safe harbor from Chapter 40B housing developments. Chapter 40B laws allow developers to bypass certain local zoning restrictions in order to build affordable housing.

The HAC issued a preliminary decision, finding against the Town of Stoneham's position that it had reached the required threshold. According to 1.5 percent Task Force chairman David Hajjar, the HAC entered into executive session several weeks ago to formulate a final decision.

"I can't imagine it's going to change the decision, but maybe some of the words or rationale used in the defense of the issues ... will be changed," Hajjar said. "I think that there are probably a few things that we can learn from that decision."

John Hall identified several mistakes he felt Stoneham made in its case. First, he said that Stoneham had used water body acreage twice that was already excluded from the total. The task force's approach, he said, was "probably more solid."

Murphy agreed, saying that Stoneham "double counted."

Hall also said that Stoneham appeared to have the same struggles the task force did at first with the locations and sizes of the Department of Developmental Services (DDS) homes.

According to Hall, Stoneham's approach was to say that the HAC was obligated to reveal what the acreage of those homes were, while the HAC said they had no such obligation under the law, and the burden of proof was on the Town of Stoneham.

Hall felt that the "ad hoc" information the task force gleaned from private sources regarding the DDS homes was used to the extent that it could be.

"We've been defensibly conservative every step of the way," Hall said. He added that they would not present any "iron clad" calculations because there were none.

Bill Plasko agreed, saying he thought they had the "best methodology available" and had been following it consistently. He also said Stoneham did not appear to put forth much of a case, and Norwood would likely be the first case with the HAC on the affordable housing issue that would be putting out a significant defense.

Plasko did concede that Stoneham appeared to have grounds to win its case on appeal in court, but it "didn't offer anything" to the HAC.

"The burden of proof is on us," Assistant Town Engineer Andy Murphy said.

Murphy said he and Town

Planner Paul Halkiotis met with Applied Geographics and received a scope of services that the firm would be providing as it uses Geographic Information Systems (GIS) and data from the Assessors office to calculate roadways and water bodies eligible to be excluded from the count toward the safe harbor threshold in Norwood.

Murphy said the contract - signed by Town Counsel Karis North - totaled \$5,000, and included the calculations and production of a hard copy plan that shows the town-wide exclusion area and what was excluded according to the state regulations.

This would provide more certainty than just using the numbers from the housing production plan, he said.

According to Halkiotis, Town Counsel said the attorneys who would challenge Norwood's position "would likely review all of the video of all of our meetings."

"We have already showed a lot of cards and put them right on the table," Halkiotis said. "Now she's more concerned about continued open public discussions... and that coming back to haunt us later."

Halkiotis said the posture of the task force was changing, "where the cards need to be held closer to the vest." He said the aim was not to reveal any more of the task force's strategy, or any of its calculations, that could be used against the Town by attorneys for 40B developers.

## WALKHILL RD. RESIDENTS ASK FOR ASSISTANCE

To the Editor:

I don't believe I have ever written a letter to a newspaper publisher before but something just happened in the Town of Norwood that really bothers me.

I am respectfully asking you to consider printing this letter as I am asking for public support for the residents of Walkhill Road.

Walkhill Road is a very short narrow dead-end, private road. Although a lot of people may not know our street name, they know our house. We are right off Washington Street, outside the center of town. For the last 20 or so years we have had a large Halloween and Christmas decoration display outside. As people come by in October they start asking when the Christmas decorations will be put up. Complete strangers come up to us commenting on the effort we put into the projects, say thank you, we love the display, we come by every day, etc.

So what bothers me is how one company occupying this small private road can sub-

mit a petition to make the road a public way to John Carroll, General Town Manager and Mr. Carroll then brings forward that petition to the Board of Selectmen without the residents of Walkhill Road being aware of the request. Isn't there a process for the residents of Walkhill Road to be notified by the Town before any type of action was carried out for a matter that would have significant impact on them?

The residents of Walkhill Road are content with the road remaining a small, uneven, filled with potholes private road. # Revamped bocce courts a hit with seniors

Carol Quintiliani cheered on Jenny Caccia as she tossed a bocce ball down the gravel court.

"Looks good, Jenny," Quintiliani said. "She's got a good toss."

Each Tuesday and Thursday morning - weather permitting - the women's bocce players at the senior center gather for a casual game or two.

This week, the players welcomed the summer weather by breaking in the newly refurbished courts, located across the parking lot from the Norwood Senior Center entrance.

"We had some snow damage, so the bocce courts all had to be refurbished, as well as the horse-shoe pit," Senior Center director Kerry McCarthy said. The courts were built in 2010 by the Friends of the Council on Aging, and were able to be revitalized this year through a grant. The project cost around \$4,000.

There are around nine regulars, but new players are always welcome. This week, Arlene joined the group for the first time since the courts had first opened.

Quintiliani offered advice on how to toss her ball towards the pallino - the ultimate goal is to have your team's balls be closer to this

smaller ball than the opponent's balls.

"When I first started I first threw it like I was bowling but you can't, you have to do it easier. You almost have to drop it," Quintiliani said.

Though the women have been out to the courts already this season, they've largely been held back by weather.

"We've just started really. The weather's been lousy," Josie Silvestro said.

While the women's games are more informal and players cheer for both sides, they say the retired men's club - which plays on Wednesday mornings - is very competitive.

That's not to say there is no smack talk during the women's games.

Cries of, "This girl is pretty good, but not today," or "you troublemaker," quickly turned to words of encouragement.

"Good try," players said to one another after a toss, breathing a sigh of relief that their ball was not knocked out of the way.

Edna was supposed to be acting as an impartial judge, determining whose ball was closer, but could not resist getting in on the action.

"Which team should I cheer for," she said from a chair on the side of the court. When Edna or one of the other players could not

determine which team's balls were closer, a measuring tape was used.

For most of the players, including Joan Maider and Simon



# Kids concert series coming

The Town of Norwood and its various civic organizations put on concert series throughout the year. For the past 22 years, Norwood has been especially known for its summer Concerts on the Common series.

Now, younger families and children will be getting their own summer concert series, as the Norwood Junior Woman's Club unveils its First Annual Kids Summer Concert Series this year. Each concert will run from 7-8 p.m. on the Norwood Town Common, and pizza will be available for purchase at all events.

"All the concerts in town are wonderful concerts, but we really wanted something that would bring younger families closer together," Norwood Junior Woman's Club president Angela Popalo said. "So we thought we could maybe do a series. We did a bunch of the leg-work, reached out to the community and the Rec Center, and they loved the idea."

Popalo said the group received a small donation from the Norwood Moms and Tots Cooperative, which operates out of the Civic Center. At the end of each year, the group votes on how to donate its surplus money. When the Norwood Junior Woman's Club was chosen, its members felt they wanted to do something really special with the money to benefit those children and families.

"Our group is all women. It's a women's social group, but we

also do a lot of volunteer work to try to do some community improvement," Popalo said.

The concert series fit right into their mission.

The club organized a committee comprised of Popalo, Kathy Spillane, Kelli Conroy, Ally Pike, and Allison Weafer to take the lead on the project.

Popalo said they reached out to a number of local businesses for support. They received "gold"-level contributions from Papa John's and Dedham Savings, "silver"-level contributions from Village Mortgage and newly-opened Hair Cuttery, and "bronze"-level contributions from Charles River Running, Stack Velocity Sports Performance, and the Norwood Moms and Tots Cooperative.

"(The local businesses) seemed to be really excited about it, giving back to the community, promoting their business," Popalo said. "Feedback all around has been great. The Selectmen commended us for the work we've done so far and people chatting about it all around town."

Popalo said the group really began working on the project in February to recruit the sponsors, find the entertainers and organize the schedule.

"It's a night of free entertainment, the parents can enjoy themselves and just let the kids be kids, and enjoy the fact that the kids are having a great time," Popalo said.

The series will begin on July 14, with Norwood resident and kid-friendly DJ Sean Connolly. The series continues July 21 with award-winning children's performer Stacey Peasley. July 28 will feature a "bubble party" with The Bubble Music Man, which is an interactive program featuring music and bubbles. Rick Goldin, another New England-based interactive children's performer, and his singing animal puppets will put

on their show on Aug. 4. The series wraps up on Aug. 11 with the Parents' Choice Award-winning Wayne Potash Band, which plays a blend of bluegrass, country, rock, and folk.

The Norwood Junior Woman's Club hopes to continue the tradition for years to come.

"We would love to (do the series next year)," Popalo said. "I mean, it is obviously financing allowed, but something we'd like to continue. Many neighboring towns do a mix of concerts that include swing bands and mix in children's acts. We don't have any just for children, but hopefully it's something Norwood can offer now."

Popalo also had more personal reasons for helping to organize the kids' concert series.

"It's really important for me. I'm a mother of three and I want to raise my children in a place where they can learn a sense of community and get to know their neighbors and other connections," Popalo said. "A lot of people want the same things. We can foster those relationships for our children and have that sense of community for kids and the families (through the series)."

Popalo said the Norwood Junior Woman's Club is always welcoming new members and women who like the idea of the series, or the club's mission, are welcome to join the group's meetings on the third Monday of the month, from September to May. The club meets only casually and socially throughout the summer.

According to the group's website, the Norwood Junior Woman's Club was founded as a vehicle for local women to improve the community they live in through volunteer work and fundraising.

Edna said she first learned the game while in Florida, and has since spread her love of the game to her family.

On this day, the red team began a late rally, tying things up against the green team at 12 points each, before the green team scored the winning 16th point.

McCarthy urged residents over 60 years old to come down to the courts most days between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. to play bocce or horseshoes.

the former Verne Inn, as a lodging house and uses 15 Vernon St. - his former bed and breakfast, the Lyman Smith House - as home base.

On June 24, visitors perused the glass cases that line the first floors of the Lyman Smith House, which were filled with 20th century Norwood sports memorabilia - especially from Donahue's senior year in 1953 - bicycle license plates, local milk bottles, books from Plimpton Press and other elements of the town's old industrial base, and countless other mementos or artifacts from Norwood's past.

On the walls were class photos - including one from 1916, which includes a member of Donahue's family - a Norwood High School flag from 1928, and old issues of Norwood newspapers past, such as the Norwood Messenger and Smith's own Boston Daily Journal. There were military uniforms - including Donahue's and Hansen's - as well as an old Norwood Rec-ettes costume, just about every postcard featuring a Norwood landmark, and architectural salvage from prominent landmarks scattered throughout the three-room display.

Much of it comes from antique shops all over the country, as well as gifts from friends and donations from family members when an elderly relative passes on.

It is all part of Donahue's permanent private collection, set up museum-style in his office and rooms that served as

gift shops and other spaces when the Lyman Smith House was a bed and breakfast, on view by appointment or during the Historical Society's walking tours.

According to Donahue, Smith rose to prominence as a tanner in the 1800s, at one point owning one of the largest tanneries in the world. Smith moved into the house - designed by famed local architect Tyler Thayer - in the early 1850s, after it was built on Washington Street. Smith died in 1883, and when the town business district was redesigned in the 1900s, the home was moved back to Vernon Street to accommodate a bank.

Why is Donahue compelled to maintain his collection of Norwood history, even as he enters his 80th year?

"To keep Norwood in the forefront," he said. "If you forget the history ... you're really starting all over again. You have to have a history. You have to know where you came from."

Donahue - who was born and raised in Norwood - began collecting elements of Norwood history after he left his job working for Narragansett Beer in the late '60s and began working as an electrician and purchasing lodging properties with Hansen.

Donahue and Hansen began in Norwood with the Thayer House. But Donahue wasn't convinced when his partner first asked if he wanted to start operating a lodging house.

"All I could think of was Al Capone sitting in a room, bare bulb hanging down and a Tommy gun sitting in his lap," Donahue said. "But we said we wouldn't rent a room unless we would stay in it ourselves and that's the way we've gone about it."

Donahue said he grew to like the lodging house business because it was a way to put money into an old building and see returns on it

without tearing the building down.

Now, old maps of Norwood and photos of the town's many marching bands over the years line the hallways of 12 Vernon, which Donahue and his family still run as a lodging house. Tavern tables from the Verne Inn hold photographs and books in 15 Vernon St., while mirrors from the old Victoria Rest home adorn the interior of the lodging house at 12 Vernon St.

Susan, who was raised in and around these old, historic buildings, said her father has recruited the entire family, all of whom are now involved in some way, whether it be painting or some aspect of the renovations, or curating memorabilia and artifacts.

"I'm his sidekick," Susan said. "I'm in the background. He rubbed off on us. It's the whole family."

According to Susan, Donahue's love for Norwood history even rubbed off on the guests.

"When we had guests stay with us, they thought they were in the most famous town in the United States when he finished because he loves it," she said.

She said Donahue's love for collecting local history likely began around 50 years ago, with a single postcard.

Donahue's love of local history led to a 15-year stint with the Norwood Historical Society. In the '90s, Donahue even became president of the Historical Society.

"I really wanted to see the nuts and bolts of Norwood society saved," Donahue said.

For Donahue, Norwood's historical legacy is unique, in that a group of "real smart gentlemen" were able to foster a good mix of residential, industrial, and commercial interest in town, which allowed the town to develop.

Donahue said that model of growing a town is more difficult to do today, and he doesn't want to see little pieces of history disappear as a result.

"I hate to see (the old houses) torn down, which is why we're doing our little part," Donahue said.

## No rest for the champs Norwood baseball players prep for Legion season just days after state title



Days after their thrilling post-season run came to a close, a number of Norwood High School baseball players are already in the swing of their 2015 Legion season.

Norwood Post 70 evened its record at 5-5 thanks to Danny Sullivan's bases-clearing walk-off double in a 6-5 win over Westwood Post 320.

The come from behind win on Tuesday night was Norwood's second one-run victory over Westwood in three days, also downing their neighboring rivals 11-10 on Sunday.

"I was looking for anything in the strike zone, honestly," said Sullivan after the game. The two-out double was his lone hit of the game (1-for-4, three RBI), atoning for two

strikeouts earlier in the contest. "I knew I was due. I saw that ball perfectly and just drove it."

Johnny Ryan went 3-for-4 with two doubles and an RBI, driving the ball to straightaway centerfield over the head of the Westwood centerfielder his first two at-bats before the team adjusted for his power in his third at-bat, a fly out to center.

"It's weird going from pitching to hitting, but just being able to rake like that is awesome," said Johnny Ryan, who was part of Norwood's championship 1-2 punch in the rotation in the spring along with Sean Mellen.

Cam Ryan got the start for

Norwood, and pitched exceptionally well through five innings, helping his team to a 3-1 lead. He gave up a single run in the fifth, avoiding any major damage, but the wheels came off in the sixth, as Westwood's first four batters strung together three doubles and a single to chase him. All five runs were charged to Cam Ryan, who was relieved by Brian King after failing to record an out in the top of the sixth. Post 320 led 5-3 after five and a half innings.

Paul Galvin, batting leadoff, went 3-for-4 with three runs scored. He led the game off

## Mustangs look to forge new traditions

World War II raged on, the Red Sox were on a painfully long 25-year championship drought, and the Bay State Conference hadn't even been formed yet.

Times were different when Norwood last won a baseball championship in 1943. Maybe Walpole fans weren't serenading you with chants of "1943," similar to "1918" chants a certain other baseball team around here was once accustomed to, but 72 years is a long time.

Time enough for all sorts of changes. Norwood's population has nearly doubled since the '40s. Alaska and Hawaii weren't states yet. The New England Patriots wouldn't be around for another 17 years. Curly was still the third Stooge, roughly three years away from being replaced by Shemp.

Ray Martin was a member of that '43 Mustangs team that took home the prize. How did he spend his summer vacation? By pitching for the Boston Braves. Yes, the same Braves who now call Atlanta home. The 18-year-old pitched only 3 1/3 innings that summer, giving up three runs on three hits while walking one and striking out one. Casey Stengel was the bench boss for the Braves that summer, not quite yet the genius that guided the Yankees to five consecutive World Series titles from 1949-53, nor the abject failure who oversaw the expansion Mets to a league-record 120 losses in 1962.

The Red Sox were a disaster in '43, finishing 68-84 as they were ravaged by the departures of several players serving the United States in the war. Ted Williams, Dom DiMaggio and Johnny Pesky were among the names missing from the lineup. You may have heard of them. The rotation did have guys named "Tex," "Yank," and "Pinky," though.

Norwood's 10-10 regular season record this season doesn't jump off the page

when you read it and scream "juggernaut." Neither would its 11-9 record from the season before, when they made it all the way to the title game before losing to Leominster. That's a combined winning percentage of .525 (21-19). Respectable, but not otherworldly.

It's all about getting into the tournament, though, which the Mustangs have accomplished two years in a row. And once they get there, they own a nifty .917 winning percentage (11-1).

Getting back to a championship game the following year is extremely difficult in any sport, particularly for the losers. To get back there after a loss and win it? Now we're talking extremely rarified air.

It's happened a few times recently in the NBA, the most predictable league there is, with the 2014 San Antonio Spurs, 2012 Miami Heat and 2009 Los Angeles Lakers each overcoming losses the previous year to get back and win it all. The 2009 Pittsburgh Penguins were the last such NHL team to accomplish the feat. It happened back-to-back years in the NFL in the early-'70s, with the Dallas Cowboys and Miami Dolphins pulling it off, but no team has since. The Buffalo Bills had three chances in a row to atone for a Super Bowl loss the previous year, but blew it every time.

In baseball, it was the 1989 Oakland Athletics that most recently won a championship the year after falling in the World Series. The Braves, and more recently the

with a single, and scored all the way from first on Johnny Ryan's first double to give Post 70 a 1-0 lead. Norwood scored again in the bottom of the third inning, stringing together a Johnny Ryan double, a Jake O'Rourke infield single, and a Mike Flynn RBI single to make it a 2-0 game. Norwood had 10 hits altogether, all coming from the top five members of the batting order.

Leading 2-1 in the bottom of the fifth, Norwood scored what wound up being an important run later on in the game. Galvin led off the frame with a single, and was ready to take off for

second when Johnny Ryan smoked yet another ball to the outfield. This one was caught, forcing Galvin to stay on the bag. But when Westwood's centerfielder overthrew the cut-off man, Galvin was able to take second after all. Running on the pitch, he scored on Flynn's second RBI single of the evening to give Post 70 a 3-1 lead.

After the damage in the top of the sixth, Norwood went down quietly, 1-2-3, in the bottom half of the inning. But King held Westwood in the top of the seventh, keeping his team within striking distance, down two runs.

No. 9 hitter Mike Keady walked on a full count to begin the inning (the first and only walk of the night for a Norwood batter), followed by Galvin and Johnny Ryan singles to load the bases with nobody out. O'Rourke hit into a 5-2 fielder's choice, keeping the bases loaded with one out. Flynn struck out, leaving the game in the hands of Sullivan, who sent the first pitch he saw deep into centerfield at Balch Field for a walk-off 6-5 win.

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"It feels great," said Sullivan. "I definitely wanted to win this game. I wanted to drive in everyone, just prove I deserve to be in the lineup still."

"It's the best baseball I've seen played since I started coaching," said Norwood manager Paul Samargedlis after the game. "These guys want to win every day."

"That's one thing they won't do: they won't quit," Samargedlis

said of his team being able to come back after the disastrous top of the sixth inning. "They're a tough bunch of kids. These guys are going to play to the last out."

Both Samargedlis and Johnny Ryan agree the team is going to be even more dangerous after the Fourth of July break coming up, capitalizing on rest they haven't had all summer long.

"We're gonna get rested,

we're gonna get healthy," said Samargedlis.

"They give us this break, it's the worst mistake of their lives," said Johnny Ryan, ready to carry momentum into the second half of the season.

Norwood faced Walpole Post 104 last night, in an event held after The Record's deadline. They finish off their first half schedule with a game at Norfolk Post 335 tonight at 5:45 p.m.



Permanent Building Construction Committee (PBCC), which was put in charge of the Town's project to replace the Hawes Pool bathhouse, to ensure there was no conflict with the storm water management system placement on the site.

The PBCC does not yet have a design or exact parameters for the bathhouse, and the Norwood Ice Arena plans were drafted before the bathhouse project was approved by Town Meeting in May. If the increased bathhouse footprint - projected to be at least double its current size of 800 square feet - interferes with the rink's current storm water management plans, Murphy said they could move some of the entirely-underground system 50 feet or so towards Washington Street.

Planning Board member Paul Donohue asked about the project's lighting plans. Architect for the project Dan DiLullo said light poles would be placed in the parking lot islands and along the building at each exit. The plans called for industry standard "shoebox lights," on 20-foot with adjustable cut-offs to shield particular areas from glare.

Donohue said the board was treating the project the same as it would a business or any other applicant and inquired about the tree plantings to replace any trees removed during the

project. Holmwood also asked about the trees, and said that some of the trees to be removed were very old. She said the efforts of South Norwood residents to beautify the area in front of Hawes Pool took years before they were fully realized, and the replacement trees at the rink would need years to grow as well.

DiLullo said while they planned to remove around 12 or 13 trees, they would be replacing 10 trees and all would be six-inch caliber trees, as opposed to the minimum requirement of two-inch caliber trees. Murphy said the designs still attempt to "mute the view from Washington Street."

Resident Rick Morrison reiterated his concern that the plans did not call for a gate between the rink parking lot and the adjacent Coakley School lot at the staircase between the two, in order to discourage children from crossing through the busy parking lots.

Resident Susan Davis raised concerns about the project's effect on Dean Street and surrounding neighborhoods, which already struggle with traffic problems. Davis suggested using signs, much like the ones that encourage using Pleasant Street when coming off the highway, to direct traffic to and from the rink in order to avoid further burdening the nearby residential areas.

Murphy said the traffic study scope could not include Dean Street, and that the normal use of the rink would result in 86 vehicles per hour at most, dispersed equally in all directions. Rink Committee member Bill Naumann said the rink's website could include directions to the rink that would keep traffic on more major thoroughfares.

Halkiotis suggested five possible orders of conditions for the Planning Board to impose on the project. The first was to confirm when exactly the rink would be operational. He also suggested requiring that the traffic signalization project take place either six months prior to the rink opening, or within six months of the rink's opening.

Halkiotis said the order of conditions should include all of VHB's recommendations to improve the intersection, such as having a police detail help direct traffic during the anticipated 3-5 large events per year, allowing the police detail to have control of the lights, and for the rink staff to assist in overseeing parking in the lots during major events.

The third suggested condition of approval was to require the lighting in the parking lot to have shields.

Halkiotis said the gate between the lots could also be included as an order if the Board chose, but suggested requiring a meeting one year after the project opens between the police, school officials, the town engineer, and planning department to review all operations - including safety issues - at the facility instead.

Due to resident concerns, Halkiotis said it might be helpful to include an order requiring off-site signage to direct those coming to the rink from out of town away from neighborhoods, such as along Dean Street, that already have traffic issues.

The meeting was then adjourned, allowing members to send potential conditions of approval to Halkiotis, who would draft an order of conditions for the Board to either critique or approve at the next meeting.
