## Peabody/Nichols intersection a go

Following a mandate set by Town Meeting, the Permanent Building Construction Committee (PBCC) approved a pending change order (PCO) to begin work on the reconstruction of the Nichols Street/Peabody Road intersection.

On May 9, Town Meeting members approved expanding the scope of the Norwood High School project to include this intersection, and on May 26, the PBCC approved a \$33,168.20 PCO to allow Agostini Construction to begin work there.

This \$33,168.20 amount is not the

full cost of the intersection redesign and construction project; the figure represents the fee being charged for Agostini Construction's share of the work. The town has also hired Susi and Sons for \$54,600. Agostini Construction will work within the existing scope of the Norwood High School project, while Susi and Sons will work on the expanded scope within the work area.

The current intersection features two-way traffic on both sides of the island. With the new design, which is a more traditional t-intersection, all traffic will remain on the right side of the island, reducing the number of conflict

## Flowers planted all throughout town

It might be easy to overlook, but every year new flowers crop up throughout Norwood. Marigolds, impatiens, daffodils and tulips turn up at rotaries, parks and traffic islands all around town, and this is largely due to the efforts of the Norwood Flower Committee.

The Norwood Flower Committee is a group of volunteers from both the private and business sectors who understand that the beautification of Norwood is vital in maintaining the concept that an attractive community is inviting to residents, businesses and visitors. They

started as the Norwood Beautification Committee, and have been planting flowers around town for the past 23 years, continued to do so this year. John Shalbey Jr. and his crew from Rojo's planted flowers at 25 sites across town on May 20 and 21, including at Town Hall, at the World War II Memorial in the center of town, at the traffic island near St. Timothy's Church and near Penderghast Circle.

# Donald Taylor honored

The late Private Donald Howard Taylor was honored with a Memorial Corner Dedication on Memorial Day. His Memorial Corner sign is located at the Pleasant Street/Neponset Street intersection, and will stand tall to honor the late 23-year-old Norwood soldier who gave his life in Korea.

"[Private Donald Taylor] shed his blood so we can enjoy the freedoms we have today,"

Veterans' Agent Ted Mulvehill said at the dedication ceremony.

Taylor and his family lived at 428 Neponset Street, and the Memorial Corner sign was placed near this location. Numerous members of his family, including those currently living in Florida and New Hampshire, attended Monday's ceremony, and a flag was presented to his brother and sister, Earle Taylor and Marge Babcock.

"We couldn't be happier and more proud to have members of the Taylor family here with us today," Mulvehill said.

On Nov. 14, 1952, Taylor was drafted into the United States Army. He left Norwood for overseas duty on April 1, 1953, and arrived in Korea on May 19. It is believed he served



# Remembering the fallen

Hundreds of Norwood residents turned out on Memorial Day to watch the annual parade or listen to the solemn ceremony at Highland Cemetery. The town cares about its veterans - both those who perished in battle and those who survived - and this was illustrated by the many people who came out to remember on Monday.

"Another Memorial Day has dawned upon us with its sacred memories," said Veterans Agent Ted Mulvehill. "Today we deposit wreaths and flowers on the graves of our departed heroes of all our nation's wars. They fought and sacrificed nobly so that we might enjoy independence, union and democracy as a people. The veterans, with their allied orders, express their love and gratitude to those men; however, they belong to us all, as their country and flag is ours. Let us then, as a Norwood community, interest ourselves in these Memorial Day exercises by attending them, and thus prove to the world we are all Americans."

There were actually two ceremonies on Monday morning. The first took place at the Old Parish Cemetery, located near the intersection of Railroad Avenue and Central Street. This cemetery is the burial ground for many of the town's earliest residents, heroes and veterans, including Aaron Guild. This cemetery, established circa 1740, is dedicated to the veterans of the colonial wars (the Revolutionary War, the War of 1812 and the Civil War) buried within.

A short ceremony, which included a raising the flag to half-mast, was held here, after which numerous veterans organizations marched from this cemetery to Highland Cemetery as part of the annual Memorial Day parade. The parade featured the Colonial Boys, the Norwood High School Marching Band, the Colonial Pipers, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Cub Scouts and Brownies, elected officials, the Police and Fire Honor Guard, the Veterans of Foreign Wars Honor Guard and numerous Norwood veterans. They trekked down Washington

Street and up Winter Street, making their way past a crowd of hundreds applauding.

The ceremony at Highland Cemetery featured prayers from chaplains of the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Marine Corps League and the Disabled American Veterans and musical performances by the Colonial Boys and Colonial Pipers.

Keynote speaker at this ceremony was Sergeant Andrew Michael Amendola of the United States Army, a member of the Norwood High School Class of 2002. He spoke very highly of all veterans who gave their lives for this country, including Private Donald Howard Taylor, who was honored with a Memorial Corner dedication later that afternoon.

"If not for them, we would not be able to enjoy the simplest freedoms in our country," Amendola said. "Our nation is free because of brave Americans like these."

This ceremony also featured the annual reading of Lincoln's Address at Gettysburg. This is a Norwood tradition that goes back to the days just following the Civil War, and reading the speech this year was graduating Norwood High School senior Casey Dzuiba.

Those in attendance also heard remarks from Selectman Paul Bishop and State Senator Mike Rush. Bishop noted that soldiers make huge sacrifices when they defend the country, and people must take time to remember them.

"Never forget those who have given so much to allow us to enjoy days like today," Bishop said. "It is our solemn responsibility never to forget our fallen brethren."

Senator Rush was not in attendance, as he is currently serving with the United States Navy in Baghdad. However, his Chief of Staff John Regan read a letter from him to those present.

"We collectively stand together to recognize that this day serves both as a tribute to those who have fallen and an opportunity for us to reaffirm our commitment to the values they died defending," Rush wrote. "For the love of our country, it is incumbent on us to keep their memories alive and to never forget why we have the free-

doms we so often seem to take for granted."

Of course, not all ceremonies were at cemeteries. The day started with a memorial mass at St. Catherine's of Siena Church, in what was one of Monsignor Cornelius M. McCrae's last official acts in Norwood. McCrae also spoke at Highland Cemetery, reflecting on the importance of the day and leading those in attendance in prayer.

"In Norwood, this day is much more than another long holiday weekend. It's an opportunity for us to join together in the spirit of this occasion," McCrae said, noting that while some might overlook the purpose of the day, it is very important to remember those who sacrificed their lives to make it possible.

"We are here so we may never forget the names and sacrifices of those who enable us to enjoy a day of this sort," McCrae said.

The mass at St. Catherine's was followed by a ceremony on the Town Common, where the flag was raised to half-mast. This event, much to the surprise of his family, also served as the dedication of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Square flagpole to George "Tiger" Thomas. Thomas, the town's Veterans Agent from 1972 to 2000, was a veteran himself, serving with the United States Army during World War II as a member of Company B, the 440th Signal Heavy Construction Battalion. Thomas was also a member of the American Legion Post 70 and Veterans of Foreign Wars Norwood Post 2452.

## Editorial

# Town Meeting no longer hallowed

In 1854, American author, poet and political thinker Henry David Thoreau said, in a speech entitled "Slavery in Massachusetts":

*"When, in some obscure country town, the farmers come together to a special town-meeting, to express their opinion on some subject which is vexing the land, that, I think, is the true Congress, and the most respectable one that is ever assembled in the United States."*

How many times have Norwood residents heard, or even expressed themselves, a variation of what Thoreau wrote above over 150 years ago? In fact, one more than one occasion I have expressed the exact same opinion on these pages. And it's true, in most cases, just not in Norwood.

As we have done often in the past, on this very page you will find the latest attendance figures for Town Meeting since the first Special was held on April 25 of this year. We publish the figures in the hopes of shaming those individuals who seek TM positions through the ballot box and then thumb their noses at the institution whenever they get the opportunity by not bothering to show up. A few on the list have, no doubt, very good reasons for missing the meetings. The vast majority, however, are just lazy. The most disturbing thing about continually publishing the list is that voters don't really seem to care because they keep reelecting the layouts at every opportunity, and even though many run unopposed, it shouldn't matter. TM members who bothered to attend could have successfully challenged the quorum on more than one occasion since there were far too many empty seats in that auditorium at any given time to reasonably think that the town's best interests were being represented.

And this is why the Town of Norwood should seriously consider changing its form of government. Norwood is becoming more of a city and less of a town daily. Its demographics are shifting as more and more multiple unit rental properties spring up and the percentage of homeowners, as compared to Norwood's total population, continually declines. The number of registered voters in Norwood isn't an accurate barometer of public involvement, as the town struggles most of the time to even hit the 20 percent mark during any given election.

Arguably, the last set of Town Meeting decisions were anything but representative of the population as a whole. For example, TM's decision to maintain a "Strong" Fire Chief was the result of many TM members either working directly for the Fire Department or having family members who have a vested interest in keeping the status quo. There is nothing illegal about the TM members who mobilized to defeat the attempt to change who the Chief reports to, in fact it is allowed under Norwood's Town Charter. However, the Charter, like the town meeting Thoreau references above, was written in a different time. Back "in the day" better attendance would have made it that much more difficult for small groups to "corrupt" a vote.

When Town Meeting no longer continues to truly represent a town's best interests in the long run, it should be time to at least consider a change. There is little that distinguishes a city from a town in Massachusetts; size is usually the predominant factor. And it is true that most towns the size of Norwood have a town meeting form of government, but not all. Forming a city council is one option to consider, as is an open town meeting format, as opposed to the representative town meeting Norwood currently has.

In an open town meeting, all registered voters are allowed to not only be heard on the floor of the meeting, but also actually get to influence decisions by voting. Historically, towns opting for open town meetings are smaller than Norwood, but again, times are changing. At one time, the fear was that too many people would show up, and keeping the meeting organized and productive would have been problematic. Given current TM and election attendance, what are the chances of that happening?

At a minimum, Norwood needs to toughen up its requirements for getting on the ballot for election and reelection to Town Meeting. Obviously, not enough TM members are taking their responsibilities seriously. If they actually had to make an effort to maintain their seats, most of them would drop out. Perhaps more vacant TM positions would stir more interest from people who want to step up and make a difference. It certainly can't hurt...

points and making the intersection safer for drivers and pedestrians. The project is scheduled to go forward during the summer, and will be completed before the new school year begins.

"The sidewalk, on Sept. 1, will be done and accessible for use," said Steve Theran, Compass Project Manager.

Theran noted that Agostini Construction is scheduled to start their grading, curbing and sidewalk work related to this project on June 27.

"The town of Norwood will start their work relating to this intersection in mid-July, and Mark [Ryan] expects they will be done in a few weeks," Theran said, meaning the town should be done with their share of the project in mid-August.

The PCO passed by a vote of 6-1, with Ed McKenna opposed.

"It's \$88,000 and change to construct this intersection, which is ridiculous, because it doesn't need to be changed," McKenna said.

Though this intersection project will be funded with money from the new Norwood High School construction contingency budget, the cost will not be shared by the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA).

The issue of the MSBA reimbursing the town for change order costs was also addressed at the latest PBCC meeting. Though the MSBA will be reimbursing the town for change

orders one and four, most of the other change orders will not be reimbursed. The reason they are funding these two change orders is because both were built into the contract: change order one is a \$432,280 item due to a difference in the electrical bid, while change order four is the \$476,618 photovoltaic system.

"Of the \$588,000 in remaining change orders, they are paying \$163,612," said Owner's Project Manager Tim Bonfatti of Compass Project Management. "Anything seen as an owner scope adjustment, even though they're improving the model, they aren't paying.

The MSBA also isn't paying most of the expenses related to unsuitable materials found on site, nor are they paying for changes mandated by inspectors, which were deemed "new scope directives added by a third party."

"You'd like to see why they're not reimbursing things. We're going to ask why," Bonfatti said, noting it wasn't made clear why some changes are being reimbursed but others aren't.

"It almost doesn't make sense," he said, as all projects have a contingency budget and see change orders. Not all of the work necessary for a project is predictable beforehand, and the contingency budget is set aside for these unforeseen conditions and scope changes.

Bonfatti said he will be

meeting with representatives from the MSBA to get further detail on their change order reimbursement policy, but for now, they will reimburse \$163,612 of the change orders thus far.

with the 40th Infantry Division. Just four days later, on May 23, Taylor was killed in action. He received four medals for his service to the country: the Purple Heart, the National Defense Service Medal, the Korean Service Medal and the United Nations Korean Service Medal. Now, with this Memorial Corner, his name will live on so future generations can remember the sacrifice he and his family made for the country.

"He earned the right to be remembered in this manner," Mulvehill said, as have all 101 Norwood soldiers who have died in action since World War II. The goal is to honor each fallen soldier with a Memorial Corner, and Taylor's corner is the 55th one to be installed in town.

The Memorial Corner dedication began and ended with a prayer by James D'Espinoza, Chaplain for American Legion Post #70, who said, "May this memorial be, for those who see it, a source of joy and pride."

Also speaking at the ceremony were Selectmen Helen Abdallah-Donohue and Paul

Bishop, who spoke on the importance of remembering our fallen soldiers.

"We should never forget those who gave so much," Bishop said. "We should never forget our fallen heroes."

Donohue extended thanks and congratulations to the Taylor family on this day of remembrance, and noted that though Taylor died at 23, he will be remembered forever.

"I bless his memory, I thank him for his valor, I thank him for his courage and I thank him for his willingness to serve," Donohue said.

Donohue also noted that one of the people in attendance was Tom Collins. The Memorial Corner program is the brainchild of Collins, and his efforts and research helped jumpstart the program.

"Every single memorial corner in this town is the result of his work," Donohue said, noting that Collins spent hours researching Norwood's fallen heroes.

Mulvehill added that members of the Board of Selectmen were also instrumental in this program, as they support him

whenever he comes forward with a new Memorial Corner request. After he was approached by Ed Kelliher, a childhood-friend of Taylor, regarding such a sign, the Board of Selectmen once again supported the effort.

"The Board of Selectmen has been unwavering in their support of this program," Mulvehill said.

These Memorial Corners dedications, which are usually held on Veterans Day, come about when someone - usually a relative of the deceased soldier - approaches or sends a letter to Mulvehill and requests one. Such a letter should include who died, where and when they served, when they died and what area of town they grew up in. Mulvehill takes this request to the Board of Selectmen, who in turn approve it and allow for the ceremony. Though it is usually initiated by a family member, it does not have to be. This corner was requested by a friend, while the Corporal John Francis Concannon Memorial Corner was requested by the Norwood Elks, as Concannon served as an Elk.

# Town takes ownership of new high school

The town of Norwood now owns the new Norwood High School and its contents, and with each passing day, the building looks more and more like a school, both inside and out. Though the building is substantially complete and has a temporary Certificate of Occupancy, a lot of work continues at the site to ensure it will be ready for a September opening.

"It looks like a school inside," said Project Manager Bryan Jarvis of Compass Project Management said. "The furniture is being delivered, and it looks great."

Jarvis estimates that approximately 40 percent of the furniture being used at the school has been delivered and is installed on site. This includes the students' desks, teachers' desks, custodial equipment and the weight room equipment.

"The weight room is completely done," Jarvis said. "That looks great."

Some items, such as the library bookshelves and the cafeteria tables, still need to be delivered. The cafeteria tables will be the last pieces of furniture installed, as the cafeteria is being used as a staging area, and furniture is being placed there before being installed in its proper room. Jarvis expects the furniture delivery and installation will wrap up by the end of June.

The furniture delivery and installation began on Monday, May 16. They could not begin delivering and installing furniture at the site until the building was deemed substantially complete and they were in possession of a temporary Certificate of Occupancy. They have this certificate, and will apply for an updated temporary Certificate of Occupancy in late July or early August. Currently, the building cannot be used for

educational or assembly purposes, but once the furniture and technology is installed, they hope to receive a certificate to allow such a use. They will apply for a final Certificate of Occupancy once all work related to the project is complete.

Related to furniture, fixtures and equipment (FF&E) installation is the technology installation. Jarvis confirmed that the internet network is up and running throughout the new school. Computers will be installed in the building once the FF&E installation is complete.

Work also continues outside the building. The new track and field continues to look more and more like an athletic facility.

"Aggregate was here this week, and they paved the track," Jarvis said, noting that the initial layer and binding for the track has been poured. This

low this program to continue. To donate, residents can send or deliver a check, payable to the Town of Norwood Flower Planting Committee, to the General Manager's office at the Norwood Town Hall, 566 Washington St.

The program, which involves planting flowers at highly visible locations throughout Norwood in May and watering them throughout the summer, was the brainchild of the late John Shalbey, Sr., and his son remains an instrumental part of the program.

"It was John Shalbey Sr.'s idea, many years ago, to plant all the flower beds in Norwood," Flower Committee member Olga Abdallah said. "We were really one of the first towns around to start planting in general areas and do so as a volunteer program," and since then, numerous other towns have followed suit.

"This is all to make Norwood look very nice and cheerful all summer long," Abdallah said.

Shalbey Jr. said that in the late 1980s, his father was driving around town and noticed how dull it was in certain areas. In an attempt to brighten the town, said Shalbey Jr., "He decided one year to buy a bunch of flowers, get the guys from the car wash, and plant them." The flower-planting program started with just a handful of locations in 1989, but now can be seen at 25 locations.

Though Shalbey Sr. died in 2008, his flower-planting legacy lives on.

"I decided to continue that tradition," Shalbey Jr. said, and each year, on the weekend before Memorial Day, he and others spend a couple days planting these flowers.

They start the project, and the Department of Public Works (DPW) continues it. Throughout the summer, the DPW stops by these 25 locations to water the flowers and ensure they live the entire season.

"I keep planting as long as they keep watering them," Shalbey Jr. said.

The Norwood Flower Committee also receives assistance from the Norwood Evening Garden Club, whose members plant and maintain perennials at Guild Square and throughout the center of town.

Related to this flower-planting program is the spring plantings barrel program. Business owners along Washington Street were given the chance to purchase a flower barrel to place in front of their store. The town provides them with the barrel, soil, loam and crushed stone, though the business will be responsible for planting the

flowers and watering them throughout the season. First time businesses could purchase a barrel for the season for \$25, returning businesses paid a reduced rate of \$15 per barrel. A letter went out to businesses regarding the spring planting barrels in May, and they had until May 31 to purchase one.

"It is unbelievable how beautiful it is," Abdallah said. "People really take care of their barrels, and Norwood looks so beautiful during the summer with all the flowers."

John Carroll described the granite steps as amazing and beautiful.

They are also preparing for final paving. Jarvis said they plan on having the back parking lots paved by July 1, so they can be used by Norwood High School Principal George Usevich and his staff when they start working out of that building in late July.

Second baseman Sarah Eckhardt, shortstop Makenna Lane and first baseman Jess Gorman have provided consistent defense behind Maloof and Duggan this season.

But a freshman has made her mark on the team as well.

The Mustangs entered the season with catching concerns, but Emily Kelly has answered the call behind the plate. Kelly has dished out strong play offensively and defensively and has earned the respect of her head coach.

"We were looking to solidify our catching situ-

ation at the beginning of the season," Savino said, "and [Emily Kelly] has really stepped up."

Kelly has proven herself a capable backstop, catching two of the top pitchers in the Bay State Conference consistently. The freshman has shown she can manage fastballs over 60 mph.

But Kelly has provided a spark to the Norwood offense as well. Savino anticipated the team would rely on speed and defense to be successful entering the season, and Kelly has contributed with clutch at-bats.

"She has risen to the occasion this season," Savino said. "She has had big hits for us and has taken an active role behind the plate."

Norwood will enter the postseason riding a 42-game winning streak against Bay State Conference challengers. But its toughest opponent could come from a Hockomock League opponent.

King Philip Academy, last year's state champion, has earned the top seed in the tournament. The Warriors enter the postseason with a 20-0 record, thanks in part to its stellar pitching staff.

King Philip pitchers inflicted royal pain to opposing offenses, allowing a total of three runs this season.

The Mustangs boast a strong pitching staff of their own, but recognize anything can happen in the postseason. Norwood fell 4-2 to Bishop Feehan in the semifinals last year, and will look to avenge the defeat in this year's tournament.

"We're trying to get ready for the tournament," Savino said. "We need to prepare to face better pitching."

Norwood senior Stephanie Fogg followed up O'Day's goal with one of her own, and the Mustangs pulled ahead 2-0.



The Norwood boys' lacrosse team snapped a six-game losing streak last Wednesday, ending its season with a 15-5 home victory over Tewksbury. The Mustangs finished their 2011 campaign 6-12 overall, but displayed their potential in the season finale.

The Mustangs played loose, pressuring the Redmen on offense and defense while capitalizing on Tewksbury miscues. Norwood fell behind 2-1 in the first quarter, but scored two goals following Redmen turnovers to take a 3-2 lead into the second.

Norwood pulled away before halftime, outscoring Tewksbury 4-1 in the second quarter. Norwood head coach Anthony Roman recognizes the Mustangs improved as the game progressed.

"A first year coach couldn't ask for a better performance from these guys," Roman said. "Each senior played to the best of his abilities."

The halftime ceremony fired up Norwood as the squad stepped up its efforts in the

third quarter. The Mustangs won every third-quarter face-off, dominating time of possession while shutting out the Redmen in the frame.

Rossman led the Mustangs' effort, scoring two of his five goals in the third quarter. The senior captain displayed strength and speed, fighting his way through Tewksbury defenders while keeping his teammates involved in the action.

"Everything we did went through him," Roman said. "They didn't have an answer to [Rossman]."

Rossman, a Bay State Conference First-Team All-Star, finished the year with 76 points. But the senior's contributions went beyond the stat sheet as Rossman helped his teammates on and off the field.

"His performance has been the shining light for the team this season," Roman said.

Norwood finished off Tewksbury in the fourth quarter, refusing to let the Redmen fight back. Rossman scored the team's final goal of the season, and the team ended its year with a 15-5 victory.

The Mustangs received contributions from a variety of players. Andrew Alty scored three goals in the winning effort, while goalkeeper Nick Nardelli withstood the Redmen attack.

Norwood missed the postseason for the first time in four seasons, but the squad anticipates things will improve next year.

"This season was a learning experience," Roman said. "Next year, we'll look to take the next step. We're a young team, and we need to bring it every game."
