

Let the school year begin!

The 2010-2011 school year begins on Tuesday, Sept. 7, and Norwood school and Town officials are working to make the opening as smooth as possible. Extra precautions are being taken at Norwood High School due to ongoing construction in the area.

Norwood Police Department Safety Officer Richard Giacoppo spoke about additional safety measures being taken at Norwood High School to ensure a successful opening. There will be two police cruisers and three officers, including Giacoppo, on site during the first week of school. Cruisers will be located near the Nichols Street/Peabody Road intersection and at the rotary near the high school.

Cruisers will be present at the high school year round, with added security for the first week to help parents and students adjust to the start of a new school year.

"Each day there is a cruiser up there in the morning and for dismissal," Giacoppo said, adding that the presence of three

officers during these times will most likely last until Friday, Sept. 10.

Giacoppo is hoping to match last year's successful school opening.


"Last year, it went fairly smoothly," he said. "Hopefully, we'll get that same type of good luck this year."

In order to help facilitate a successful opening, contractors on the site are working to avoid having equipment and materials delivered there on Sept. 7. Workers will be present on the first day of school, and some will be in the south parking lot to help with the traffic situation there. Giacoppo will be present in the faculty parking lot, ensuring that only faculty members are using the site.

Michael Moisé, Executive Manager for Agostini Construction, confirmed this parking lot would be turned over to the school for use by teachers during the 2010-2011 school year. Paving, which was originally scheduled for Aug. 24, began on Aug. 27. The delay was due to the rainy weather the Town experienced last week.

Young and old should save the date

The School Committee unanimously approved the June 11, 2011 date for The Last Hurrah: Come Say Goodbye to Old Norwood High, an event being hosted by the Norwood High School Alumni Association to recognize the closing of the school on the hill.

"The objective is to celebrate the closing of one era, and the opening of another," said Norwood High School Alumni Association member Ernest Paciorkowski.

The Last Hurrah will be held on the first Saturday after the Norwood High School Class of 2011 graduates. A pair of events are planned: an open house and walk-through during the day and a gala during the evening. The gala will be confined to four areas of the school: the gymnasium, the caf-

eteria, the auditorium and the courtyard. Hallway access will also be available.

The date was chosen to avoid conflict with Compass and Agostini Construction, who want access to the building as soon as the 2010-2011 school year comes to a close, to help ensure they can demolish the building and have the access road ready for the opening of the new Norwood High School in Sept. 2011.

"We really don't want any conflict with the construction people," Paciorkowski said.

School Committee member Dick Kief said he was all in favor of the event and the June 11 date, he just wants them to keep communication open and remain coordinated with the Permanent Building Construction Committee and contractors on site.

"We don't want to delay the contractor or increase costs and delay the opening of the school," Kief said.

While specific details on the event are not yet available, the Alumni Association has some ideas in mind. Ideas include a graffiti wall, selling of bricks and locker doors, and allowing guests to take a whack at a secluded portion of the building with a sledgehammer. These are all just ideas at this point, and nothing has been finalized.

"We're planning a party, and we're going to have a great time," Alumni Association President Jerry Miller said.

There are also plans to get a one-day liquor license for the gala. The Alumni Association will meet with the Board of Selectmen to see if this is possible. They have also contacted Town Counsel to see if there are

any legal issues with having alcohol at the site during the school year.

So far, the Alumni Association has received nothing but positive responses regarding their formation and the planned Last Hurrah, Miller said. He noted they have over 620 members on their Facebook site, <http://www.facebook.com/pages/Norwood-MA/Norwood-High-School-Alumni-Association/121313974571635>, and over 50 volunteers helping plan the Last Hurrah.

"The response has been phenomenal so far," Paciorkowski said, adding that the group has received state recognition as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization.

Several School Committee members had positive comments regarding the association

and their plans.

"It's a big endeavor," School Committee member Paul Samargedlis said. "I'm not worried at all, but it's a big endeavor. Having people involved is critical... when this comes to fruition, there is going to be a lot of hard work behind it, and it's well worth it."

School Committee Chairman Mark Joseph described the association as a very active committee, and he said he is sure their efforts will lead to a wonderful event.

Charlie stops by Norwood

Republican gubernatorial candidate Charlie Baker stopped by Norwood for a Meet and Greet with area republicans. The event, sponsored by the Norwood Republican Town Committee, was held at the home of Debbie Holmwood, and featured speeches by numerous candidates for office.

Baker is going head-to-head with incumbent first-term Democratic Governor Deval Patrick. Also running are Jill Stein, physician and co-chairperson of the Green-Rainbow party, and Independent Tim Cahill, State Treasurer and Receiver-General.

Baker was a cabinet official under two Massachusetts governors, serving as Undersecretary of Health and Human Services under Governor William Weld and Secretary of Administration and Finance under Weld and Paul Cellucci. Baker also served as CEO of Harvard Pilgrim Health

Care for 10 years, a position he stepped down from in July 2009, giving him time to pursue the Republican nomination for Governor of Massachusetts.

Baker has spent 13 months on the campaign trail, and has stopped at locations all across the state. He hopes this campaigning will lead to a successful election day, as he wants to send a strong message to Bea-

con Hill.

"We have a tremendous opportunity to do something great here in Massachusetts," Baker said. "This is our opportunity to send a message: we think Beacon Hill needs to work for the people of Massachusetts, and not the other way around."

Baker is running on a plat-

Instron beautifies Balch

About a dozen Instron employees spent Aug. 19 digging, planting and beautifying the Balch School. The work at the Balch School was done as part of Instron's 3C program, Community Care Connections.

Leslie Dixon of Instron said

this was the latest in a series of volunteer efforts done by the company. Most of their efforts focus on helping Norwood, but their work can reach into other communities and countries. For example, they volunteer at the Abundant Table once per month, where they purchase and prepare the food. They have also been involved in the United Way backpack program and the recent Drive for Haiti.

"We like to give back to the community," Dixon said.

Instron worked with Al Ebeling of the United Way on this project. The United Way has an annual campaign with Instron, and this year, they focused their efforts on cleaning up an area at the Balch School. Ebeling contacted Balch School Principal John Condlin to see if there was anything they could do to assist the school, and this led to Instron's volunteer efforts at the school.

"We landed on this project because of its specific needs, its

proximity to Instron and it was one everyone was excited about doing," Ebeling said.

The company visited the Balch twice, first in June to clear out the area and install temporary plantings, then on Aug. 19 to install the permanent plantings, which included several trees, shrubs and flowers.

"It came along really, really nicely," Ebeling said.

In total, 12 Instron workers appeared at the Balch School, alongside Ebeling, to complete this project. Also present was Condlin, Superintendent of Schools James Hayden and Assistant Superintendent for Instruction, Curriculum and Assessment Dr. Alec Wyeth.

Instron manufactures and services materials testing instruments, systems and accessories. They have been located at 825 University Ave. in Norwood since 2005. Prior to this, they were located in Canton.

Norwood Day set

The eighth annual Norwood Day will be held on Sunday, Sept. 19, and the schedule for the day's activities has been set.

The festivities begin at 12:30 p.m., and will run until 5:30 p.m. The entire center of town, from Guild Square to the Town Common, will be blocked off and filled with booths representing over 130 groups, businesses and organizations. Many of these groups have been at Norwood Day in years past, though some, including the Norwood Bicycle Club and the Norwood High School Alumni Association, are making their Norwood Day debuts.

The entertainment begins at 1:30 p.m. on the entertainment stage with the singing of the National Anthem. Throughout the day, numerous groups will take to the stage to perform for the thousands in attendance. This year's entertainment includes a zumba demonstration and performances by Julie Sweeney, the Norwood Recreation School of Dance, the

Norwood Civic Center Guitar Band, the Norwood Dance Academy and Band Gig.

"It's entertainment that anyone can enjoy," said Recreation Director Jerry Miller.

Groups performing on the main stage were selected via an application process. Miller and other volunteers worked to make sure the acts were sufficiently different and appropriate for a family function.

Returning this year is DJ Paul Chamberlain.

"He's been there since day one," Miller said, adding Chamberlain always volunteers his time to assist the town during the annual Norwood Day celebration. He will spin tunes and make announcements in between events at the Entertainment Stage.

Returning this year is the always-popular Taste of Norwood Food Court. Several Norwood restaurants will offer samples of their food to Norwood Day attendees who have a 2010 Norwood Day button. These buttons will be available at the Civic Center for \$3 in advance, and can be purchased the day of the event for \$4. Restaurants involved in this

year's Taste of Norwood are Sky, Bon Caldo, Joe & Maria's, Giorgio's, Bistro 712, Olivadi's and Lewis's.

Norwood Day Buttons will also be required for access to the kiddie rides, the pony rides and Norwood Day trolley. The trolley will provide transportation from Norwood Center to numerous areas in town, including the Police & Fire Station, Norwood Memorial Airport and the new Norwood High School site.

Other popular returning events include Big Daddy's Racing and the Rock Climbing Wall. New this year is the carpenter's shop, organized by the Local 535 Carpenter's Union. Children will have the chance to visit the shop and build a small toolbox using nails and pre-cut pieces of wood.

Norwood Day wouldn't be possible without the generous sponsors who step forward to help make the event a reality each year. This year's event is sponsored by Norwood Bank, Lustra Cleaners, Comcast, Chestnut Hill Realty, the

form of fiscal conservatism, with the goal of reducing spending and creating new jobs. He noted that state revenue is down, but spending is up.

"Now, the bill is coming due, and it's time to reform state government," Baker said, and cited his 'Baker's Dozen,' a list of 13 reforms to save taxpayers over \$1 billion. These reforms include lowering health care costs for cities and towns, implementing pension reform and requiring proof of legal residency for state benefits, including public housing, unemployment benefits, workers compensation and welfare.

Party primaries will be held

on Sept. 14, and the 2010 gubernatorial election will be held on Nov. 2.

Norwood Republican Town Committee Pat Sterritt presented Baker with a check at the meet and greet. Checks were presented to numerous candidates in attendance to help assist them with their campaigns.

All candidates in attendance were given a chance to speak. Other candidates in attendance included Keith Lepor, who is running for a seat in the 9th Congressional District against incumbent Stephen Lynch, Attorney General candidates James McKenna and Guy Carbone, Norfolk County Sheriff candidate Bill Farretta, Sec-

retary of State candidate Bill Campbell and State Auditor candidates Kamal Jain and Mary Z. Connaughton. Also present were Jim Stanton, who is challenging John Rogers State Representative in the 12th Norfolk district, and Brad Williams, one of three candidates for Marian Walsh's state senate seat.

Novelty law bans novelty lighters

One of the bills Governor Deval Patrick signed into law earlier this month will ban novelty lighters that look like toys.

The intent of the law is to prevent children from mistaking the lighters for toys. According to the press release from the state's Department of Fire Services, toy-like or novelty lighters have been responsible for injuries, deaths and accidents across the nation. Children are attracted to novelty lighters because they look like toys.

The state claims that last year children caused 158 fires and two civilian injuries. In 2008 child-set fires caused four deaths. However, nobody at the department could say how many of those fires were started by children playing with the so-called novelty lighters.

"I suspect not many," spokesperson Jennifer Mieth said.

While no one is arguing that kids should be allowed to start fires and that there shouldn't be education available to parents about how to prevent your child from playing with fire, it does seem that banning these lighters will do little to address the problem.

When you look at some of the items that have been made into lighters, cartoon frogs, footballs, baseballs, cars, cameras, guns, guitars — pretty much anything you think of, the first thing that comes to mind isn't danger, it's, "Wow that's tacky." Only a consumerist society like ours would create a lighter in the shape of a sneaker and call it collectable.

Of course these lighters — like all lighters — should never be sold to children. Starting at a young age, parents, schools and fire departments need to educate children about the dangers of fire by keeping matches and lighters out of sight and making sure that the lighters they use are child-proof. Teach them that they are not a toy.

That's the common sense thing to do, and many parents, schools and fire departments do that already, but this novelty law isn't about common sense. Are we to ban ALL objects that look harmless but have been known to start fires. Christmas lights have probably caused more fires than novelty lighters ever have. No, no one is suggesting Christmas lights be banned, but this law is just as silly.

The fact of the matter is that people collect these trashy trinkets. People collect everything. If you don't believe it think of the most unusual item you can imagine and Google it. There are probably at least a dozen Websites devoted to connoisseurs of that passion.

Obviously there are some low-brow, kitsch-loving collectors out there who feel like they deserve to have a lighter in the shape of a naked woman's torso in order to complete their collection, and legislators on Beacon Hill, or any of the other 13 states that have banned novelty lighters, shouldn't be allowed to tell them no — no matter how silly these lighters are.

Of course there are some amateur Glenn Beck fans out there trying to make the novelty lighter ban something akin to a vast conspiracy. You see them mostly hiding in the anonymity of the online comment section on stories about this subject, or in blogs. They've got their Glenn Beck-style chalk boards up and they're illustrating how the banning of novelty lighters is only the first step towards the Third Reich.

"When novelty lighters are outlawed, only outlaws will own novelty lighters."

"I'll give you my novelty lighter when you take it from my cold, dead hands!"

These two extremes are the level of argument these days, but let's be honest. This novelty law about novelty lighters is just silly and will do little to prevent kids from playing with fire, and that's where the focus should be.

Site visit a success, but rains reveal leaks

On Tuesday, Aug. 24, Peter Fowkes, Project Manager for the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) visited the new Norwood High School construction site, and this visit proved to be a successful one.

"This project, in the MSBA's eyes, is one of the best," said Owner's Project Manager Tim Bonfatti at the Aug. 26 Permanent Building Construction Committee (PBCC) meeting.

Bonfatti spoke of this visit at both last week's PBCC and Board of Selectmen meetings. Bonfatti and a representative from the PBCC appear before the Selectmen each month to provide an update on the status of the project.

Bonfatti said a representative from the MSBA visits the site every few months. Fowkes stopped by last Tuesday to walk around the site and see the status of the project.

"Norwood's project is one of the ones they're very happy with," Bonfatti said, adding that the walk around went very well.

The project itself is approximately 65 percent complete, putting it nearly a month ahead of schedule.

"It's great to see it coming all together, and it seems so quickly," PBCC member Bill Kinsman said.

One ongoing cost associated with the project has been test-

ing at the site, which is handled by Universal Testing Service (UTS). At the Aug. 26 PBCC meeting, the committee voted to encumber \$40,000 to the UTS account for future testing at the site.

The need for this money was noted by PBCC member Ed McKenna.

"The UTS account has under \$1,000 left," he said, as they had budgeted \$80,000 for testing, and spent over \$79,000.

Bonfatti recommended adding \$40,000 to the account, but noted this might be an excessive amount.

"I don't think it will be that much," he said. "I think \$40,000 is more than enough."

UTS remains on the site doing work, such as testing the compaction of the roadways and sidewalks being installed. They are not bound to spend \$40,000 on future tests, though the money is available should it be necessary.

"If we don't spend it all, we get it back," McKenna said.

The committee unanimously approved this \$40,000 boost to the UTS testing account. Bonfatti noted this money will not be coming out of contingency funding, as they have money available in other accounts that can be used here. As it stands, the project's contingency fund is still in good shape. Through Aug. 26, \$2,035,209 remains in the contingency fund, which started the

project at \$2,300,000. This means while the project is 65 percent complete, only 11.5 percent of the contingency fund has been spent.

In total, \$1,173,689 worth of Change Orders have been approved. However, the \$432,280 change order for the difference in electric bid results and the \$476,618 change order for the photovoltaic system were built into the project's budget, meaning the PBCC did not have to dip into the contingency fund to cover these costs.

The recent rain proved to be beneficial to the project. In addition to helping with the ongoing dust issue at the site, the rainfall revealed a few areas affected by leaks.

"The rains from the last few weeks have shown some small leaks in the building," Bonfatti said, and contractors on site are working on the issue.

Bonfatti noted that there were leaks in the cafeteria, but not at the skylight present there. He added that there were slight leaks in the academic wings, partly because not all mechanical equipment has been installed yet.

Any leaks revealed after the rainfall were isolated, and crews worked to keep them as discrete as possible, though PBCC Chairman Ted Callahan noted, "There is no such thing as a discrete leak."

While most of the events take place on the 19th, the Norwood Day festivities begin on Saturday, Sept. 11 with the annual Caritas Norwood Hospital 4K Road Race at 9 a.m. Fireworks are also returning to Norwood Day with a special presentation being held at 8 p.m. at the Coakley Middle School on Sept. 11. The fireworks are sponsored by T.G.I. Friday's.

The celebration doesn't end on Sunday, as the 6th annual Police-Fire Softball game will be held at the Joe Purpura Softball Field at 6 p.m. on Monday, Sept. 20.

Traditionally, Norwood Day is held on a Saturday, but after last year's conflict with Rosh Hashanah, the Norwood Day Committee worked to avoid such a conflict this year. Saturday, Sept. 18 would have conflicted with Yom Kippur, the holiest day on the Jewish calendar. Because of this conflict, the committee moved Norwood Day to Sunday, Sept. 19.

What's in a name?

Norwood Senior High School makes change

With a new building comes a new name. When it opens in Fall 2011, the new Norwood High School will be named just that, Norwood High School, dropping the word "Senior" from its name.

The currently building has been called the Norwood Senior High School since it was built in 1926, but the name has fallen out of common use. While not actually the building's name, the phrase "Norwood High School" is used on the school's website, the school's mission statement and in the most recent New England Association of Schools and Colleges report on the building.

The current building was called the Norwood Senior High School as a way to differentiate it from the Norwood Junior High School. However, in 2004, the Norwood Junior High School was renamed as the Dr. Philip O. Coakley Middle School, making the term senior unnecessary.

"Since the Norwood Junior High School is now the Coakley Middle School, the school on the hill should be Norwood High School," Principal George Usevich said.

The School Committee unanimously approved the new name.

Usevich and Norwood High School Assistant Principal Sean Kane also spoke about i-Parent, a web based system designed to provide for parental access to student information. This program will be piloted at the Norwood High School for ninth grade students during the 2010-2011 school year. The system will give parents access to four elements of their student's schooling: attendance records, progress reports, class schedule

and term grades. It will not allow access to day-to-day test grades or a student's grade-point average at this time.

"It's not going to take the place of a dean or a counselor or a teacher calling the parents," Usevich said, nor will it take the place of parent-teacher conferences or communication with parents via email. Rather, it is meant to help increase the overall communication between the school and parents.

"We plan to take our first step with grade nine this fall to see how this system goes," Usevich said, and if it works well, they will implement it at other grade levels.

Parents will be able to register for the program at the Norwood High School website, www.norwood.k12.ma.us/nhs/. Security measures will be in place to ensure that only a student's custodial parent or legal guardian has access to the data. Those registering will have to provide the student's identification number and match student information with what the school has on file.

Kane noted that this program is in place at numerous other schools.

"It's not the future, it's the present," Kane said, and now Norwood High School will make use of this technology to give parents up to date information on students.

The hope is that i-Parent will bring increased communication between parents and the school system, bringing them closer together.

"This is exciting. This is something we really want to do," Usevich said. "It's a great program for the parents of the community."

When asked about the cost of the program, Usevich said it is budget neutral and does not represent an added cost to the

Fiscal Year 2011 budget.

The budget received a boost thanks to a pair of grants from the Education Job Funding Bill. Massachusetts has received \$204 million in federal funding, and Norwood has access to \$357,914 in funding. The town will apply for this money when the application to do so is released by the state.

"We need to look at this prudently," Superintendent of Schools James Hayden said. "This is going to be very helpful for us, and we're going to use it wisely."

The main intent of money from the Education Job Funding Bill is to create new teaching jobs or retain teachers who might otherwise leave due to funding issues.

"This can be used for compensation and benefits and other expenses, such as support services necessary to retain existing employees, recall or rehire employees or to hire new employees in order to provide early childhood, elementary or secondary education services," Hayden said.

The \$357,914 can be used over the next two years. Some can be used during Fiscal Year 2011, while some can be held over to help balance the FY 2012 budget.

The town also has access to \$25,678 in state fiscal stabilization funds.

"This is used to help essential services in the kindergarten to grade 12 area," Hayden said.

The funding was described as like a rabbit pulled out of a hat, and School Committee member Paul Samargedlis said it could make a real difference.

"It's one percent of our overall budget, but we all know the overall impact that one percent can have," Samargedlis said.

Bomb threats and stabbing

The Residence Inn by Marriott, located at 275 Norwood Park South, was the location of a bomb threat on Saturday morning. At about 2:16 a.m. on Aug. 28, the desk clerk at the hotel called the Norwood Police to report an active bomb threat.

The threat was determined to be a hoax, and the building remains in one piece, but the scary situation almost forced the evacuation of the hotel. While there are no suspects at this time, Police Spokesman Kevin Grasso said the situation remains under investigation, and they hope to find the instigator soon.

"It's under active investigation right now," Grasso said. "We're trying to get a subpoena for telephone records," which they hope to use to find out what phone number was used to call the hotel last Saturday.

When the desk clerk called the police, he reported he was on the line with a party that stated he was going to come into the hotel and blow it up. The unnamed suspect stated he was in the bushes outside of the building, ready to strike, prompting a quick response by members of the Norwood Police and Fire Department.

"Police and fire did respond," Grasso said. "They

checked the area, but they found nothing suspicious and nothing out of the ordinary."

The only clue found at the site was a still cold beverage can outside the building. These cans are being checked for fingerprints, as it is possible the would-be bomber was drinking prior to making the call.

A representative of the Residence Inn by Marriott had no comment on the situation.

Less than 24 hours later, the police responded to a report of a fight early Sunday morning, resulting in the arrest of Pedro Carlos Martins, 26, of 10 Hartford St., Norwood. Martins was charged with assault and battery with a dangerous weapon (a knife), and mayhem.

"It is believed there was a fight at an apartment on Hartford Street [on Aug. 29]," Grasso said. "It is alleged that Pedro Martins went after the victim and stabbed him numerous times."

The victim's name was not revealed, though Grasso confirmed the victim knew Martins, as they lived in the same apartment.

Due to his wounds, the Norwood Fire Department transported the victim to Caritas Norwood Hospital, where he was treated.

"Nothing appeared to be life threatening," Grasso said, though the victim was covered in blood and had a wound on

his ear.

"It is alleged [Martins] bit the victim's ear, and caused some tearing," Grasso said, hence they mayhem charge. Such a charge is given when an attacker actually tries to maim and disfigure their victim, going beyond assault and battery.

After the fight, the victim left the area and made his way towards Washington Street with his girlfriend, at which point he contacted the police department. The police responded, with assistance from Language Line to help them overcome a language barrier, as both the victim and Martins spoke Portuguese. They would arrest Martins at his Hartford Street home later.

NHS performing Sweeney Todd this fall

Sweeney Todd has been on Broadway and on the big-screen, and in September, the barber will stop by the Savage Center for Norwood High School's fall theater performance, Sweeney Todd: The Demon Barber of Fleet Street.

Norwood takes steps to adhere to new law

Open Meeting postings now in Town Hall Rotunda

On July 1, the new Open Meeting Law went into affect, and it changes how meetings are held across the commonwealth and here in Norwood. The goal of the law is to make meetings held by government bodies more accessible to the general public.

Several aspects of the new Open Meeting Law involve the distribution of meeting agendas. Boards are required to place their agendas in a public place 48 hours prior to the meeting. Weekends are not considered as part of this time period, so a board meeting on a Tuesday night would have to have their agenda posted by Friday, not Sunday.

Most boards in town make their agendas available at the Clerk's Office, Room 32 of the Town Hall. Upcoming meetings for all boards in town, whether they are the Permanent Building Construction Committee, the Downtown Steering Committee or Board of Selectmen, are posted here. These postings include the date, time and location of the meetings.

In addition to posting agendas at Town Hall, several boards are placing their agendas online, at the town's website, <http://www.norwoodma.gov/>. The Planning Board, Board of Selectmen, Zoning Board of Ap-

peals and Downtown Steering Committee have also posted agendas on the website since the new open meeting law went into effect July 1.

The Board of Selectmen has gotten into the habit of posting a pair of agendas. First, two days prior to their meeting, an agenda is posted showing appointments, new business and other items scheduled to come before the board. Then, the day of the meeting, a late agenda is posted, showing last minute items to be discussed by the board.

An exception to this was the School Committee, who has neither posted their agenda online nor made it available at Town Hall in the past. However, this is to change for upcoming meetings.

"The agendas are going to the Town Clerk's office, and they will be posted there," Superintendent of Schools James Hayden said.

Previously, the agendas could be picked up at the Superintendent's office in the Savage Center. Now, they will be in the same place as all the other boards, allowing for one-stop agenda shopping. Hayden also confirmed that the School Committee agendas will be posted online, at the school's website, <http://www.norwood.k12.ma.us/>. In the past, the School Committee posted meeting times and minutes online, though agendas

will soon follow.

Another exception is the Council on Aging, which meets the first Thursday of the month at 1 p.m. While the meetings are posted at Town Hall, agendas are not available there. Senior Center Executive Director Dorothy Vitale said agendas are available before their monthly meeting, and can be picked up at the Senior Center by those interested.

The new Open Meeting Law also requires agendas be posted in a way that they can be seen by the public 24 hours a day. Due to the building's hours of operations, simply posting them in the Town Clerk's office does not accomplish this. As a result, an enclosed bulletin board will be placed on the outside rotunda

man Jerry Kelleher reads a statement along the lines of, "Tonight's meeting will be recorded and archived in accordance with the Open Meeting Law," or "The meeting is being recorded in the public record." This is meant to let the public know that a proper record is being kept and will be available for review in the future.

The newly paved parking area will feature granite curbing and temporary striping for approximately 60 spaces. In total, there will be 135 parking spaces on site for faculty members.

Another ongoing element of the new construction project is the proposed Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) beacon. The new Norwood High School stands at 316 feet above sea level and encroaches into the imaginary surface - the area used to determine if something could be considered an obstacle to an airplane or helicopter's flight path. The clock tower extends 13 feet into this area, meaning a beacon is necessary

at the site.

However, the Town is working with the FAA to see if the beacon can be placed on the nearby water towers, which stand taller than the new school. The elevated water tank is 82 feet tall, placing the top 336 feet above sea level. The free standing tank is slightly taller at 87 feet tall, 341 feet above sea level.

"We're making a filing on the water tanks, because we have a public safety antenna that will go there," Town Engineer Mark Ryan said, and the hope is this beacon will be enough.

He said there is a good chance that the FAA will not

require a beacon on both the new Norwood High School and the water tanks, and the water tank would be a better fit for such a beacon.

"The two structures are so close together, but the public safety antenna will be taller," Assistant General Manager Bernie Cooper said.

However, contractors at the site are preparing for the worst. Owner's Project Manager Tim Bonfatti confirmed they have conduit running up to the top of the building that can be used should the FAA require a beacon on the clock tower.

"We have preparations, but we'd rather not do it," Bonfatti said. "It's not going to be a pleasant addition to the school, wherever it goes."

The project as a whole re-

mains approximately four weeks ahead of schedule, and the building should be ready to turn over to the Town on May 15, 2011, Moisé said. It is possible that next year's annual Town Meeting will be held in the auditorium there.

"[General Manager] John [Carroll] asked me about the possibility of holding our an-

nual Town Meeting there next May," Cooper said.

The annual Town Meeting is tentatively scheduled for May 9, 2011, the second Monday of the month, though this has not been finalized.

"It's something we can keep our mind on," Bonfatti said. "If progress continues this way, it should be ready."


