## Mark Joseph resigns

### Investigation ongoing into missing equipment

Amid allegations of theft of equipment from Norwood High School, former School Committee Chairman Mark Joseph tendered his resignation to School Committee Vice Chairman Bill Plasko Jr. on Monday, June 27.

In a statement released by Superintendent of Schools Jim Hayden, he wrote, "On Friday, June 24th recycled furniture including kitchen equipment, desks, chairs and tables from Norwood High School was being moved to the middle school and various elementary schools for possible use in those buildings. Concerned staff members noticed that some high school kitchen equip-

## Cadillac site looks to expand

Representatives from Cadillac Village of Norwood met with the Planning Board on Monday night to discuss a proposed expansion on their property. This expansion is similar to the one planned by Clay Chevrolet, in that it is mandated by the car company. If Cadillac Village does not go forward with the expansion, it would be in violation of their franchising agreement with Cadillac.

"Much of what is proposed is dictated by the manufacturer," said Attorney David Hern, who was acting as counsel for Cadillac Village. "Cadillac Village is under direction from the manufacturer, Cadillac Motor Company,

to replace the round showroom, which was the big thing in the 1960s."

Hern noted that the site, 700 Boston-Providence Highway, has been used as a Cadillac dealership for over 40 years, and back then, the round showroom was the standard. Times have changed since then, and now Cadillac is mandating that Cadillac Village update their site and create a more modern facility.

These changes involve adding approximately 7,000 square feet to the building, reducing the paved area by 10,500 square feet and increasing the landscaped area by 3,600 square feet. All of this work will be done on the interior portion of the property; the perimeter of the site will remain un-

changed.

"The effect on the neighbors is not likely to be great at all," Hern said, as it is the middle portion of the site that will be changed, not the exterior.

In addition, they are reducing the number of cars that will be on site. In years past, they have had up to 300 new cars and 100 used cars available for purchase. Going forward, they will have approximately 150 new cars and 100 used cars available, a reduction of approximately 37.5 percent.

When asked why they were coming before the Planning Board for a special permit, Matt Smith of Norwood Engi-

## Citizens ask school committee to reconsider cuts

A student, teacher and former School Committee member appeared before the School Committee on Wednesday to request they reconsider some of their Fiscal Year 2012 cuts relating to personnel.

In order to reach their FY 2012 budget of \$34,345,233, the school department cut 16 teachers across all grade levels. These cuts include five elementary school teachers; a science teacher; a foreign language teacher and a computer lab aide at Norwood High School; and two English/Language Arts support

teachers, a librarian, a guidance counselor, a technology teacher, a physical education teacher and a foreign language teacher at the Coakley Middle School. These cuts will affect students and the curriculum during the 2011-2012 school year, and once again, concerned community members spoke out during the public forum at the June 22 School Committee meeting.

Norwood High School sophomore Brigid Sandstrum was one such person. She requested the committee re-examine the foreign language teacher cut at the high school, as it affects numerous students, including those who have signed up for Italian 3 next year.

Sandstrum is one of those students who signed up for that course, which might not be offered due to the budget cuts.

"I was so psyched to learn in eighth grade that I could take Italian at Norwood High School, and I did," Sandstrum said, and she has completed the first two years of the program. This allowed her to go on a trip to Italy, where she was able to understand the language, see the sights and converse with locals.

Norwood High School requires two years of a language to graduate, but many colleges require a student take three years of the same language. If Italian 3 is cut, people like Sandstrum and other Italian 2 will be unable to do that

during their Norwood High School tenure.

"It is unfair to the Italian 2 students who hope to attend a good college," Sandstrum said.

This concern was shared by Toni Eosco, a former School Committee member and member of the Norwood Sons of Italy Chapter 1235.

"Three years of a language is much more desired in the college application process," Eosco said, so cutting Italian 3 adversely impacts the students who have invested two years studying the

# School Committee notes: budget to high school rentals

Superintendent of Schools Jim Hayden estimates that the school department will finish Fiscal Year 2011 with a \$251,642 surplus. This money can legally be used to prepay special education tuitions during FY 2012.

Of this \$251,642, approximately \$147,000 is the excess estimated for FY 2011. This surplus is largely due to a budget freeze enacted by the school department during the second half of the fiscal year.

"I hope what we've done in FY 2011 will help us in FY 2012," Hayden said.

However, these funds are not guaranteed - Hayden noted that bills are still coming in - but should things go as planned,

it will be available for use next year.

The remaining \$104,642 is the fourth quarter circuit breaker payment from the state. Since the school department has already paid for the SPED tuitions and transportation costs for FY 2011, this money is available. Circuit Breaker is a law reimbursing Special Education costs, as the state reimburses a portion of the tuition costs for SPED students. The reimbursement is issued to cities and towns quarterly.

The School Committee voted to give Hayden the authority to move this excess money to the FY 2012 budget at the end of the fiscal year if all bills are paid. School Committee member Bill Plasko Jr., who made this motion, noted this is the only legal way FY 2011 funds can be used in the FY 2012 budget.

"Prepaying SPED tuitions is something we've done in the past, and it moves the funds to Fiscal Year 2012," Plasko said. Hayden hopes that this excess money, which will be used to offset SPED costs, frees up some other funds in the budget, which could be used to restore some of the cut positions. He wants to undo some of the cuts the committee made in order to reach their bottom line budget of \$34,345,233 for FY 2012.

"We still have 13 teachers out there we are looking to bring back," Hayden said. "Our people are very important to us."

While this is a noble cause, School Committee member Dick Kief questioned if they had the ability to do so. He noted they need to be very cautious going forward, as there

are still a lot of unknowns with the budget. For example, the circuit breaker reimbursement rate has not been finalized, nor has the state aid appropriation.

"We've got major problems," Kief said. "We need to look at everything, the overall, and I'm not comfortable with the unknowns you've talked about."

The School Committee also discussed the rental policy of the new Norwood High School. It will be possible for groups and organizations to rent the building, which will open to students in September, just not yet. The committee voted to temporarily suspend Class 2 and Class 3 rentals for Norwood High School. They will revisit this after the building has been open for one month. This month-long rental-free period gives them time to get the building open successfully and allows staff members to train and learn how to use the new equipment and technology present within. It also does not affect existing programs, such as sports teams or school music groups from using the site, as they are considered Class 1.

"All of the school teams will be able to use the facility fully from day one," Hayden said.

The School Committee also approved the creation of auditorium and technology house managers. These people would be on site when the building is rented out to show how technology is used and ensure the new building is treated properly. The unions signed off on the house manager positions and the related salaries, and the School Committee approved the job description.

# New FF&E, tech purchased

Due to budget surpluses associated with the new Norwood High School construction project, the Permanent Building Construction Committee (PBCC) voted to purchase nearly \$240,000 in new furniture, fixtures, equipment and technology for the school.

The surplus money came from two main sources: the Furniture, Fixtures and Equipment account (FF&E) and the Other Furnishings and Equipment (Library Books) account. Steve Theran of Compass Project Management noted they allotted \$1,820,000 in the FF&E, but only spent \$1.7 million and change, leaving a balance of \$119,014.25. In addition, he noted that just \$105,000 of the \$250,000 Other Furnishings and Equipment budget would be used for library related purchases, leav-

ing the remainder available for other potential uses.

The PBCC voted unanimously to spend \$213,445.85 of this \$250,000 line item on a wide range of products, including the \$105,000 in new library equipment. This library equipment includes a \$65,000 Follett book collection, through which students will have access to a wide variety of non-fiction titles, such as "The Election of Barack Obama: Race and Politics in America," "An Enemy Within: Overcoming Cancer and Other Life-Threatening Diseases," and "How to Get Money for College."

The purchase also included 60 new laptops; 24 all-in-one computers for the science labs; 24 wireless keyboards; 19 TVs, which will be placed in the School Resource Officer's office, the cafeteria, main lobby and other public areas for announcement and surveillance; and three sets of e-Clickers.

This purchase came at the recommendation of Superintendent of Schools Jim Hayden, who feels these items will be beneficial to the students and teachers who utilize the new building.

"What we're looking at is what will make instruction better," Hayden said.

Hayden said his ideal goal is to get a technological device into each student's hands. He stressed the importance of technology is today's world, and said they need to make sure students have access to the tools used in the industry today.

While this purchase doesn't meet that ideal, it is a step in the right direction according to members of the committee.



neering noted that they are modifying a structure that does not comply with the Norwood Zoning Bylaws, and the new structure will continue to be in noncompliance.

“We’re asking because we don’t conform right now,” Smith said.

The plan complies with some portions of the bylaw, such as parking spaces. They are required to have 113 parking spaces, and the plan calls for 114. These 114 spaces would be used by customers and employees - there is a separate area on site to store the vehicles for sale. However, there are several areas where they do not comply, such as signage. The current sign on the site is 35 feet tall and takes up 338 square feet. The new sign takes up 245 square feet and is 37 feet tall.

Molly Martins noted that this internally lit sign was one

of three options presented to them by Cadillac. The others were 42 and 47 feet tall, so they went with the smallest potential sign provided. She added that they intended to have this sign lit 24/7, but Town Planner Steve Costello noted that the sign should be shut off between 11 p.m. and 5 a.m., as the site abuts a residential district.

Several of these abutters were in attendance and had concerns with the lighting on the site.

“When the leaves fall, and the trees have gotten bigger, it’s like Fenway Park out there at 4 or 5 p.m.,” said abutter Brenda Bolender. “The light does spill over into the neighborhood, particularly in the winter.”

She said the lights that come from the site shine onto her property, a concern shared by Margery Callahan, who noted the lights from the site light up her front yard.

Callahan also questioned if this expansion was actually mandated by Cadillac. She said she called Cadillac and was told that the expansion was not set in stone, and when she called other Cadillac dealerships in the state, the notion was laughed at.

However, Hern and the Cadillac Village representatives

said this expansion is part of the Village Automotive Group’s franchise agreement with Cadillac. If they do not go forward with it, they will not get cars to sell and lose the franchise.

“Our client’s agreement with Cadillac is that this has to be done,” Hern said.

Because only three Planning Board members were present, no vote was taken on the matter, as it requires four votes. The public hearing will be continued on July 11 at 7:30 p.m.

# Farmers' Market is back

The Farmers' Market has returned to Norwood for its 16th season in town. On Tuesday, June 21, the farmers, bread makers and seafood sellers returned to the Cottage Street municipal lot to sell their wares.

Every Tuesday, from 1 to 6 p.m., these vendors will return to the municipal lot to sell a wide variety of foods ranging from strawberries to ears of corn to cookies to lobsters.

"We have five vendors," said Market Coordinator Shirley Robbins of Paradise Hill Farm and Greenhouse. "They're the same farmers that we've had [in years past]."

In addition to the Paradise Hill Farm and Greenhouse, this year's vendors include E.L. Silvia Farms of Dighton, Jordan Bros. Seafood, Sunshine Farm of Sherborn and the Great Harvest Bread Company of Newtonville.

Robbins noted that their return to Norwood was a success, and many familiar faces returned to purchase farm fresh greens, such as the escarole, bok choy, kohlrabi and the cilantro she was selling.

One big seller was the strawberries being sold by Sunshine Farm. Robbins recommends arriving early if you want to purchase fresh strawberries - late arrivals to the market might find they are sold out.

Katie Geoghegan was on hand selling the strawberries and other goods offered by Sunshine Farms. She noted they have been involved with the Norwood Farmers' Market for numerous years, and it always proves to be a success.

"The first day has been a lot of regulars, and it only gets busier throughout the year," Geoghegan said.

Also happy to return to Norwood was Jim Cellucci of the Great Harvest Bread Company. He estimates they have been coming to the Norwood Farmers' Market for at least five years.

"We do very well here, and the community seems to enjoy the product," Cellucci said.

He sells scones, cookies and breads, and his top seller continues to be his cinnamon chip swirl bread.

"People use it to make French toast," Cellucci said. "It's our biggest seller."

While it's still early in the season, the vendors have a wide variety of foods available, and this selection will grow as summer continues on. Robbins expects they will have fresh blueberries in a couple weeks, and estimates that they will start selling ears of corn in mid-July.

The changing season even affects seafood offerings. Pat Jordan of Jordan Bros. Seafood was selling numerous items, including haddock, scallops and salmon, but won't be selling lobster until later in the summer.

The Farmers' Market is located at the Municipal Lot on Cottage Street, behind the Apollo Function Facility. The market is open, rain or shine, every Tuesday from 1 to 6 p.m. The last day of the 2011 Farmers' Market will be Tuesday, Oct. 25.

# SPED Director resigns

On June 3, the Norwood Public School Department posted a job opening: they were looking for a Director of Transportation, the position that oversees that town's Special Education transportation service. Current Director of Transportation Sean Danaher, who is still working for the school department, resigned in early June.

Since as recently as July 2009, three different people have held this position. The first Director of Transportation was Joseph White, hired by then-Superintendent John Moretti. There was some controversy when White was hired, as he is the brother-in-law of School Committee member Bill Plasko Jr. White was replaced by Kristen Correia, who was in the position by the end of 2009, and Danaher served as the Direc-

tor of Transportation during Fiscal Year 2011. Danaher has been praised by the School Committee on numerous occasions for turning around the department and running an excellent, efficient program with strong leadership.

"Sean has really been the architect of the department, getting the benefits in place we thought we'd have," School Committee member Paul Samargedlis said. "It's critical what he did."

Samargedlis feels they are in a good position, and whoever comes in as the new Director of Transportation will be able to continue moving the department forward.

"The institutional knowledge of running the department still resides in the Norwood schools, and Sean Danaher left us in a very good position for a manager to come in and pick up where he left off," Samargedlis said.

He added that Marie

Shaughnessy, who has been with the department since its inception, would remain. Shaughnessy and Danaher were instrumental in making the department a success during FY 2011.

Superintendent of Schools Jim Hayden was quick to begin the transition for a new Director of Transportation, first advertising the position on Friday, June 3, shortly after Danaher announced his resignation.

Danaher remains with the Norwood School Department at the current time, and will be part of the transition activities as Norwood hires a new Director of Transportation.

"He is going to help me transition to the new person," Superintendent of Schools Jim Hayden said, meaning there won't be a gap where there is no Director of Transportation

# Selectmen notes: ERI, green energy

The town's Early Retirement Incentive (ERI) program, which was used to help balance the general government's budget for Fiscal Year 2012, has been finalized. At the June 28 Board of Selectmen meeting, Town Manager John Carroll announced he would be retiring four people, three short of the initial plan to retire seven people through the program.

"I am retiring four people—three from the Fire Department and one from the Police Department," Carroll said, and these four employees were the only people eligible for the ERI program that took the offer. Their last day of employment with the town will be July 15.

The original idea was to have two firefighters, two police officers, two Department of Public Works employees and one library employee retire through the ERI program. Carroll did not get this anticipated response, and instead is retiring the aforementioned four positions.

These positions are not gone for good. It was noted that during the first year of the ERI program the town can hire back 30 percent of the cut employees. Because of this allowance, and the recognition that cutting three firefighters will have adverse affects on their budget in other areas, such as the substitution account, Selectmen approved allowing Fire Chief Michael Howard to fill one firefighter position that will be vacant due to this program.

The Selectmen also received an update from Light Department Superintendent Malcolm McDonald regarding the Spruce

Mountain Wind project. Though it is approximately a 3.5 hour drive from Norwood, the plant is connected to the town. Norwood entered into a 15-year contract with the Quincy based Patriot Renewables, and this allows them to receive power from the Spruce Mountain Wind farm located in Woodstock, Maine, once it goes online.

The Spruce Mountain Wind facility features 10 Gamesa G8X, two-Megawatt turbines, meaning it has a capacity for 20 Megawatts of power. Spruce mountain Wind will produce more than 60 million kilowatt-hours of clean, emission-free, renewable energy per year, enough to power approximately 9,600 homes.

"We have 17 percent of that, which is representative of 10 million kilowatt hours per year," McDonald said.

The town will soon receive this power, as construction on the Spruce Mountain Wind farm began last Wednesday.

"They started construction on June 22, and they expect the first turbine to be online in October, all the turbines online in November and commercial in December," McDonald said.

Once online, the energy provided by Spruce Mountain Wind will cover approximately three percent of the town's usage.

Selectman Allan Howard asked if they had considered a wind turbine in Norwood, and McDonald confirmed they had, but said it would not be feasible here.

"You need a lot of land and a lot of wind, and Norwood doesn't have either," McDonald said. "In order to power Norwood, you'd need to wipe out everything, and even then,

you wouldn't have enough wind."

The board also heard from Director of Public Works Mark Ryan, who provided updates on numerous town projects, including the Route 1 and Walnut Avenue water main project and the South Norwood street and sidewalk project.

"They replaced the 14-inch water main on Route 1 that broke in November," Ryan said, noting construction there began on June 27. Work on the Walnut Avenue water main is scheduled to begin on July 5.

The board had numerous positive comments about the department, particularly in regards to the South Norwood street and sidewalk project.

"We appreciate it so much. That will be a huge improvement," Selectman Helen Abdallah-Donohue said. "This will be a wonderful thing for the neighbors," many of whom have lived in South Norwood for over 50 years.

Selectman Paul Bishop added, "It's an excellent project. I love it, and it's going to look great down there."



in town.

In their job posting, which had an application deadline of June 7, the school department said they were looking for someone "to perform all management, administrative and coordination tasks associated with Regular Bus Transportation, as well Special Education (SPED) Transportation," and be responsible for developing, implementing and monitoring systems, procedures and policies required to support these functions.

To fill this full-time position, the school department was looking for someone with at least two years of relevant experience, a Massachusetts Class D driver's license and an Associates or Bachelors Degree, the Asso-

ciates Degree preferred. In addition, they wanted candidates to possess considerable knowledge of state, local and federal rules pertaining to pupil safety and transportation, as well as knowledge of modern school bus operations, routing and scheduling procedures.

A total of 14 candidates applied for the position, and Hayden is now going through the hiring process.

"I'm interviewing candidates as we speak," Hayden said, and he will have an announcement regarding the position in the weeks ahead.

On this search, Samargedlis said, "I'm looking forward to this year, and I'm sure we'll get a strong manager."

ment instead of being delivered to another school was delivered to a local business in Norwood. Staff members notified school officials about this unauthorized transfer. When the Superintendent found out about this situation, he ordered all inappropriately delivered school property to be promptly returned to the school department."

The business in question was the currently closed The Take Out restaurant on Chapel Street in Norwood, which Joseph is in the process of purchasing.

"This activity, allegedly organized by Mark Joseph, the then-chairman of the School Committee has been reported to the Norwood Police," Hayden said in his statement. "The School Committee will hold a meeting on Thursday, June 30, 2011 at 4:00 p.m. to discuss this matter and consider legal action."

Police Officer Kevin Grasso confirmed that the Norwood Police Department was contacted about this matter and conducted their own investigation, but had no formal comment or

report on the issue.

"There is an investigation ongoing, but there will be no comment from the Police Department," Grasso said.

Grasso added that the investigation is now in the hands of the school department.

When initially contacted, Joseph said the reason for his resignation was the Take Out purchase.

"I'm buying the Take Out, and we're passing papers," Joseph said. "I can't do business and be on the School Committee... I can't be closing Wednesday nights and really giving up income."

He added, "It was my time, and it was time to pass the torch."

Though he has not returned calls to address the statement issued by Hayden, Joseph initially dismissed the notion of having items delivered to The Take Out as a rumor.

"That would be a rumor," Joseph said. "I earmarked some stuff for the Food Pantry, but for the Take Out, nothing."

This came as a surprise to Hayden and Ecumenical

Food Pantry Executive Director Ruth Taeger.

"We haven't had any formal request from the Food Pantry," Hayden said.

Taeger said she had not heard of any items or equipment from the High School

being earmarked for them.

"I have not been told," Taeger said. "I can't imagine what it would be... I guess we'll assume sooner or later, someone will call me, because they'll need to get them out of there."

## PBCC

"The items that are being presented here are a pretty reasonable attempt at looking forward," said PBCC Chairman Ted Callahan.

PBCC member Dick Kief noted it was a forward step that came in below the \$250,000 budget.

"It's all within budget, we're not going beyond the budget," Kief said. "I'm satisfied, as a Building Committee member, that these are all legitimate requests... these are all part of properly outfitting the high school from an educational perspective."

PBCC member Bill Kinsman noted that though they had the money available, they were

not obligated to spend it. Any expense approved by the PBCC is one that will ultimately be paid by the taxpayer.

"Just because we have money left doesn't mean we have to spend it," Kinsman said, adding, "We, as taxpayers, have to pay for this. We may be under budget, but we have to borrow this [money]."

Though he voted in favor of this item, he did not vote in favor of purchasing three new vehicles for field maintenance: a John Deere utility vehicle with turf tires, enclosure and plow blade, a Greens Groomer synthetic grooming brush with spring tine rake and a Greens Groomer Litter Kat with mag-

netic strip. Combined, this vehicles and attachments cost \$26,316.50, which will come from the FF&E surplus.

Kinsman's main concern was the purchase of a plow blade for the John Deere utility vehicle. He noted that the use of a plow blade causes a lot of wear and tear on a machine, and did not feel it would be an appropriate for that piece of equipment.

The items were approved with a 4-1 vote. Hayden spoke in favor of the purchase, noting the importance of maintaining the new turf field.

"You have a carpet out there," Hayden said. "It's a beautiful field, and it needs to be maintained."

Hayden noted that the turf field at Rocky Marciano Stadium at Brockton High School needed to be replaced after approximately nine years of use, as it wasn't properly maintained, and he doesn't want to see a similar thing happen in Norwood.

PBCC members agreed, and approved the vehicle purchase.

"We bought a new turf field, and we have to maintain it," Ed McKenna said. "If you don't maintain it, it was stupid to put money into it."

**HOME COMPOSTING BINS**

Earth Machine compost bins are available at the Norwood Health Department for \$20. Residents can reduce waste and gain supply of free compost. The organic portion of the waste stream contains yard waste and kitchen waste, each representing 25 percent of total waste generated (with geographic fluctuations). The average waste generated per household in North America is approximately 2,000 lbs. per year and it is estimated that about 50 percent of the total waste stream could be composted. On average, residents who compost at home can divert a minimum of 650 pounds per year from the solid waste stream. The Earth Machine is made of tough high-density polyethylene with UV stabilizers for all season strength and weatherability. It is made of high-density injection-molded polyethylene with a minimum of 50% post-consumer recycled materials. Unit dimensions when assembled are 33" diameter by 33" high, and weights 15 lbs with a volume of 10.5 cubic feet. # Norwood bookmarks library renovation's 10th anniversary

The Morrill Memorial Library's history includes another chapter following the celebration of the 10th anniversary of the building's renovations Sunday.

"This is such an incredible gem in Norwood," Library Director Charlotte Canelli said. "Such an incredible gift was given to the town 113 years ago, and it's a great gift still today."

At least 250 people booked a trip to the festivities featuring live music, children's crafts and complimentary library tours.

Norwood ink manufacturer George Morrill erected the library in 1898 as a tribute to his daughter, Sara Bond Morrill, following her death.

The library became a landmark in Norwood, but was vacated in 1999 for renovations. The building re-opened its doors in June 2001 following a series of improvements.

"It's a fun place to work," staff member Francis Dalton said. "Some people think it's a dull place, but it's not."

But Sunday was anything but a typical afternoon at the library.

Norwood musician Sarah Gardner entertained children as she rocked the Children's Department with her acous-

tic guitar hits. The Swing Fever duo of pianist and vocalist Steve Rudolph and drummer Ben Clark jazzed up the Reading Room with Broadway classics and popular tunes.

Canelli noted the event has been in the planning stages for six months. The Friends of the Morrill Memorial Library, a nonprofit group committed to sharing and supporting the building's programs and services, joined Canelli to promote the event.

"It doesn't cost a penny for us to exist," Friends of the Library President Dan Corzilius said. "We exist to draw money in and to make the library better."

The Friends of the Library has raised library funds while offering events and services to promote library awareness. The group has attracted speakers including investigative reporter Hank Phillippi Ryan and sports writer Dan Shaughnessy to offer their insights to library patrons.

Norwood Selectman Allan Howard emphasized the library offers a one-stop shop for people of all ages.

"Times are tough, but these are free resources for people," Norwood Selectman Allan Howard said. "There are so many things that the average person is

not aware of that the library has.”

Howard, an invited guest, emphasized the building’s importance to the town. The library offers resources such as DVDs and e-books, none of which would be possible if the renovations were not completed this year.

The library has seen growth in other areas as well. Children’s Library Director Kelly Unsworth acknowledged at least 300 children are enrolled in the library’s summer reading program.

Howard acknowledges the last decade’s library renovations altered the town’s future.

“Doing the renovation now would probably be double the cost,” Howard said, “and we wouldn’t be able to afford it.”

language.

She added that the local Italian community was disappointed to hear the third year of Italian was being cut. She noted that the Italian Lodge and Social Club provided the school system with \$2,300 to purchase materials and textbooks for the program just a few years ago, and to see the program cut is distressing, as they strongly supported it.

“It is a great program, and you have an incredible instructor in Justin Evans,” Eosco said. “I encourage you to use him to his full potential.”

Superintendent of Schools Jim Hayden said he and his staff are continuing to look at student enrollments and the budget, and he hopes to restore some of these

16 cut teachers. While he does not anticipate being able to hire back all 16, he has already reinstated two teaching positions. It’s possible more will be reinstated in the months ahead, but even now the budget continues to change, and nothing can be guaranteed.

Also speaking out regarding cuts was Willett Early Childhood Center teacher and parent of two Oldham School students Laura Tolman. She questioned the two cuts at that school, Grade 1 teacher Janice El Bach and librarian Jessica Lodge.

“By letting these two professionals go, we are going to have a huge hole in our school next year,” Tolman said.

She noted that neither of her

children had El Bach as a teacher, but her passion for teaching makes her an important part of the Oldham School.

“There are certain people just born to be teachers, and Mrs. El Bach is one of them,” Tolman said. “Her passion for teaching should be bottled up and given to prospective teachers.”

She noted that Lodge, the librarian, goes above and beyond her job requirements, gets the students interested in reading and assists them in create research projects on everything from Ancient Greece to historical figures.

“Students love her, her colleagues respect and admire her, and parents appreciate her,” Tolman said. “I see her as a vital part of a child’s well rounded education.”
