Deal struck for 198 units at Plimpton Press

Scarcely a week after the Zoning Board of Appeals voted to approve a comprehensive permit for the Forbes Hill 40B development, the Norwood Record has learned of another 40B project comprehensive permit that – as of going to press – has not yet been announced publicly.

The 21 page ZBA document corner marked DECISION – Case # 15-33 was unsigned and undated. The background and details of Avalon Norwood's application – and ultimate approval – for a comprehensive permit for its development to be located at 150-158 and 165 Lenox St. are detailed.

This came about as the result of the December 8, 2016 Massachusetts Housing Appeals Committee ruling that the Town's acreage for eligible units fell below the safe harbor threshold of 1.5 percent in the Davis Marcus

decision. Subsequently, the ZBA and Avalon Norwood agreed keep their own HAC proceedings on hold while they attempted to negotiate some sort of a resolution.

At some point after that (no date was specified), the Board approved a 198 unit rental apartment project for the approximately 8.65 acre site, with 58 one bedrooms, 120 two bedrooms, and 20 three bedrooms spread over one four storey building and eight townhouse buildings (maximum building height: 65 ft), with all of them remaining rental "in perpetuity unless the Board agrees to a change pursuant to the applicable Chapter 40B regulations."

Of the 198 units, 25 percent of them (50 units) will be reserved for low or moderate-income households, with the units "reasonably dispersed" over the total number of apartments. Avalon

Robin's Breast Friends: having fun with purpose

It's the Thursday afternoon before Norwood Day and Robin DiFlaminies and Kathy Morrison are sitting in Perks Coffee Shop, joking, laughing, and finishing each other's sentences.

"Let's talk about something that's fun," DiFlaminies said, changing the topic from the recent fatal traffic accidents in Town.

"I mean, that we're going to have fun at," before qualifying her last remark. "Breast cancer is not fun, I can tell you that."

DiFlaminies knows this from hard experience, having been twice diagnosed and successfully treated for the disease, first in 2008 and then again in 2015. But – as chatting with her for even a short time makes clear – she also knows how to have fun.

It's this combination of fun and determination in the face of hardship that forms the essence of "Robin's Breast Friends," DiFlaminies' team for the American Cancer Society's (ACS) annual Making Strides Against Breast Cancer walk which will take place in Boston on Sunday, Oct. 1.

Walking and raising money for the ACS since 2010 – her first team consisted of her husband, sister, brother, and sister-in-law – DiFlaminies knew that she wanted to do something a little bigger.

"I started asking around, and people were, like, 'Yeah, I want to do that. Yeah, I'll do it with you,'" she said.

By 2012, the team had grown to 16 members and, by 2013, it had ballooned to 30 and raised over \$5,000

in donations. But by 2015 – with DiFlaminies' cancer having returned and a list of other misfortunes cropping up in her life – the momentum had slowed.

"That's where I came onboard last year," Morrison said, despite not having known DiFlaminies for very long before getting involved. "It was only, like, a week or so beforehand. I didn't even know about it (Making Strides). We had just met."

She suggested that DiFlaminies try something big this year and offered to help. Together, they've been visiting every business in Town asking for donations of goods and services for that something big that they've been planning: a fundraiser scheduled for Sept. 23 at the VFW Post in Walpole.

The goods and services collected from local businesses will be raffled off with all of the proceeds donated to ACS – Making Strides Against Breast Cancer – Boston.

Some of the raffles that will be offered range from gift certificates, wine and food, to higher end prizes including dinner for four, theater tickets and an all-expense paid "Night on Norwood."

Other, more eclectic prizes will be offered, too: an inflat-

able Bud Light couch, as well as a four-foot high limited edition Jon Gruden bobble head, donated by Bay State Liquors. Gruden is a former NFL head coach who won Super Bowl XXXVII with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and is now an analyst on Monday Night Football broadcasts.

Morrison can barely contain herself over the Gruden bobble head.

"When she got the bobble head into her car, she seat belted him in!" she said.

But she's still nervous – more nervous than DiFlaminies lets on – about the first-time fundraiser.

"She (DiFlaminies) is like, 'Don't worry about it,'" Morrison said. "But my biggest fear – we've collected over \$2,000 in monetary value in raffles – what's the use of having all these raffles if no one comes?"

Some of this nervousness was calmed last Saturday, Norwood Day. As part of going big, the plan was to have a "Robin's Breast Friends" booth but, unable to qualify for one this year, it looked like they were out of luck until Tracey Bills – owner of Studio T. Bills at 510 Washington St. – volunteered to let them use hers.

Standing by the pink and white booth with her grand-

son, Bills watched DiFlaminies and Morrison hand out pink rubber bracelets, chat with visitors, and collect donations, as DiFlaminies' granddaughter Lainey poured glasses of pink lemonade. She shared some of the motivations behind her generosity.

"I had a scare myself a couple of years ago and it's a scary situation," Bills said. "Thankfully, I didn't... I'm fine. But just going through those couple of months of not knowing and wondering and not being able to tell my family because I wasn't ready to yet... These women, they go through a lot."

By the end of Norwood Day, "Robin's Breast Friends" has pulled in around \$400 and bought out all of Shaw's pink lemonade.

The "Robin's Breast Friends" Fundraiser will be held on Saturday, Sept. 23 from 7:30 p.m. - 11:30 p.m. at VFW Post 5188, 33 Robbins Rd. in Walpole. The requested donation is \$20 per person and \$30 per couple. Tables of 10 can also be reserved.

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
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Selectmen talk Town Manager salary, Old Parish

The Board of Selectmen – in a return to weekly meetings after following a bi-weekly schedule over the summer – met on Tuesday evening, Sept. 12, in Room 34 of Town Hall. Two of the three scheduled appointments were of note.

The 7 p.m. appointment had Patricia Fanning of the Norwood Historical Society before the Board seeking approval to start a new 501(c)(3) to be called the Old Parish Preservation Volunteers.

This group’s purpose would be to preserve the beauty of the Old Parish. As part of this, members would – with expert guidance – learn how to clean, repair, remount and reset some of the gravestones that have fallen into disrepair. They would also offer tours and lectures pertaining to cemeteries and cemetery art.

In conjunction with the Historical Society, it will be conducting a tour on Oct. 28 focusing on the early wars (Colonial, Revolutionary, War of 1812) and plans to continue with similar activities from there.

The motion was approved unanimously by the Board.

The 7:30 p.m. appointment had representatives of Supreme Gas (145 Broadway) seeking approval to transfer a beer and wine license from Hurley’s Beer and Wine (36 Vanderbilt Ave.) to their establishment. The business – currently operating as a gas station and convenience store with a small Dunkin’ Donuts – is also seeking to expand its footprint while keeping those operations ongoing.

Board member Paul Bishop, referencing the business’ proximity to the commuter rail, commented:

“You get the best of both

worlds, so to speak. You go in for a cup of coffee in the morning and, after a hard day of work, you get off the train, buy a bottle of wine, and go home for dinner.”

The Board approved the transfer 4-0, with Helen Donohue abstaining.

In new business of note, there were several updates on the search for a new General Manager. A consultant has been hired and on Thursday, Sept. 14 will be at a public forum in the Willett Room of the Civic Center during which members of the public can ask questions and make comments about the process, as well as suggestions as to the qualities sought for whichever candidate is eventually hired.

There was also some Board discussion regarding an appropriate target salary for the position. Based on a Human Resources survey of comparable towns, Chairman Plasko put the amount of \$185,000 forward, with some resistance from Helen Donohue, who listed off the General Manager salaries of a handful of neighboring towns, the highest of which (Milton) topped out at \$180,000.

Alan Howard recommended a salary of \$179,000:

“I think that’s a reasonable salary to start with. 185 is a little too much at this time.”

Mr. Maloney noted that – of the nine towns surveyed – \$185,000 was the median salary for General Manager.

Paul Bishop came down on the other side:

“I want to attract the best, most qualified, intellectual people that I can, and I may not do that with a lower number. I’d rather come up with that 185.”

Following the recommendation of Human Resources, the motion was approved by a vote of 4-1, with Donohue

voting in opposition to advertise the position at \$185,000.

John Carroll announced that there will be a public meeting on Wednesday, Oct. 4 at 7 p.m. in the Willett Room of the Civic Center to address the Rock Street traffic situation.

At the conclusion of the meeting, the Board went into executive session regarding 40B litigations.

The next Board of Selectmen’s Meeting will be next Tuesday, Sept. 19 at 7 p.m.

Norwood has struck out

Brian Hardiman, Kevin Pentowski, Denis Drummey, Judith Howard, and Conor Kenney, among others, have been warning residents of this Town for more than four years that Norwood's tactics for handling the 40B crisis were flawed. And even though they spent countless hours of their own time, thousands of dollars of their own money – particularly in Mr. Hardiman's case – and offered their own services and those of professionals willing to work for pennies on the dollar to thwart the challenge of outside developers determined to build more housing than Norwood can possibly absorb, they received little more than lip service – often times not even that – from a Board of Selectmen thinking they had all the bases covered. They were wrong and Norwood residents will be paying the price for decades to come.

As detailed on Page 1 of this week's issue, The Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) has struck a deal, unbeknownst to the public, to grant a comprehensive permit to the Avalon Norwood developers for the construction of 198 apartment rental units at the former Plimpton Press. Including the already-constructed Upland Woods apartment units, and adding the recently approved construction of 275 units at Forbes Hill, Norwood will soon have over 700 rental units to deal with. This is a disaster. There is no other way to couch it.

A real disappointment in all of this, beyond the obvious of all the new rental units, is that public officials have gone out of their way to stress that they have been open and honest with the public during all of their machinations. They have not. ZBA Chairman Philip Riley, when announcing in a somber tone that they were granting the comprehensive permit to Davis Marcus, thought it necessary to state, "I think this is important for the public to realize that these sources of negotiations are not underhanded. They're not sinister in any fashion," which we thought odd considering few ever considered anything was sinister or underhanded; flawed perhaps, but not underhanded. However, what no one knew then was that 198 units were already agreed to at the Plimpton Press site. Didn't Mr. Riley think it was pertinent that the public be aware or have the right to know, if not weeks or months before when the deal with Avalon Norwood was agreed to, then at least during the last meeting when announcing the Forbes Hill decision? Is that being up front and honest with the public?

There are other bothersome ZBA issues. Board member Barbara Kinter's son works for Avalon Bay and, as was appropriate, she abstained from all votes relative to their application. However, that really wasn't good enough because the Forbes Hill and Plimpton Press proposals were so closely intertwined. For example, more than a year ago Denis Drummey wrote a letter to this newspaper detailing why the Town should approve the 40B permit for Forbes Hill because in doing so it would have closed the door on Avalon Bay and its 198 units. In retrospect it was a brilliant idea, but ignored by everyone in authority: the guys who had all the answers. Kinter shouldn't have been involved at all in Forbes Hill because a vote by the ZBA to grant the permit to it would have been detrimental to her son's company. The ZBA did not grant the permit to Forbes Hill in time - when it would have been beneficial to the Town - only doing so after Avalon Norwood had filed their application and couldn't be shut out of the process. Chairman Riley should have been cognizant of the potential for conflict with Forbes Hill and, if he was, he opted to do nothing.

And finally there are the Selectmen, particularly Bill Plasko. Our focus is on Chairman Plasko because, quite frankly, we're not convinced any of the others really bothered to grasp the complexities of the 40B monsters, relying on Plasko to shoulder the heavy load. And Plasko deserves credit for his knowledge and willingness to dig deep into the intricacies of Massachusetts housing law. The man worked extremely hard for his constituency, perhaps too hard, and perhaps in too hardheaded a manner, in not being more open to the offers of help from concerned residents. He and the esteemed counsel of Murphy Hesse, Toomey and Lehane, represented by attorney Karis North, seemingly had all the answers, except their answers were proven to be misguided if not flat out wrong. And during all of the time after the deal with Avalon Norwood was struck, not once did Plasko make the public aware of it.

It is entirely possible that had the Selectmen and the ZBA accepted all of the help offered by residents, including utilizing the expertise of Mr. Hardiman's lawyers and consultants, the end

SCHOOL COMMITTEE SHOULD WITHDRAW APPLICATION

To the Editor:

Back on June 21, the School Committee (SC), by a vote of 3-2, approved Norwood High School Athletic Director Jon Longley to submit the application for the Tri-Valley League. Those SC members who voted in favor stated, "we need to trust the professionals." I do agree in that we need to trust the professionals, but it is our job as citizens to challenge those professionals and to confirm that the information being shared and that the SC is ultimately basing its vote is accurate.

When a SC member inquired about freshmen soccer the response given was we have offered it in the past when we have had the number of players to support it. There was no mention of the 2016 fall soccer season when there were enough players for a freshmen team but no coach. The result was a merger between the JV and freshmen teams, leading to a 40+ player JV roster. When questioned about the availability of gymnastics in the TVL the response given was "there are seven or eight schools that offer it, but it represents five teams due to co-op programs." Fact: there is one gymnastics team in the TVL. That team is comprised of students from Medfield, Ashland and Dover-Sherborn, known as MADS. The fifth school that offers gymnastics is Westwood, but they co-op with Brookline and compete in the Bay State League. But let's trust the professionals.

Those advocating the move to the Tri-Valley League state that the No. 1 factor in a competitive and winning athletic program is student enrollment. If that is true, why does Framingham, with an enrollment of 2,074 – largest in Bay State League (BSL) – have a winning percentage of .379 and Weymouth, with an enrollment of 1,996 – third in BSL – a winning percentage of .308, which is lower than Norwood's .312? On the flip side, Walpole's and its enrollment of 1,143, which was the fourth lowest in the BSL and only 186 more than Norwood, had a winning percentage of .664 – which was the third best in the entire BSL during the 2016-17 school year. How is that possible? What are they doing in Walpole that

Norwood will, in no event, be required to provide more than 15 one bedroom affordable units, 30 two bedroom affordable units, and 5 three bedroom affordable units.

Originally, the application had called for 218 rental units in more buildings but, by agreement between the ZBA and Avalon Norwood, the total was reduced to the current number. Additionally, at least 315 parking spots – a combi-

nation of enclosed garages and open spaces – will be provided on site.

The site – the former Plimpton Printing Press – currently has three industrial/warehouse buildings ranging from one to four stories. Back in 2014, it had been subject to a 40R proposal from another developer, but did not meet the two-thirds vote required for passage at Town Meeting (it received 60 percent approval).

Forum on next Town Manager

The Town of Norwood Board of Selectmen is pleased to announce it has scheduled a community forum on Sept. 14 to give citizens the opportunity to share their thoughts on the qualifications and characteristics they believe the Town's next General Manager should possess.

The forum will be held at 7 p.m. at the Norwood Recreation Department (165 Nahatan St.) in the Willett Room.

"We are interested in hearing citizens' recommendations regarding the expertise and qualifications they would like to see in their next General Manager," said William Plasko, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen. "It is important that Norwood's citizens are an integral part of the General Manager selection process."

Current General Manager John Carroll announced that he would be retiring in December of this year. Carroll has served as Norwood's General Manager since 1978. The Board of Selectmen plans to have a new General Manager selected within approximately 12 weeks.

According to the Applicant's Proposal section of the Decision, the existing industrial and warehouse buildings will be demolished, with the new design providing "a more gradual transition between the neighborhoods and the industrial character found along the railway corridor."

The four storey building would be located closest to the rail lines, providing a noise buffer for the neighborhood. Lenox St. would also be connected – north/south – between Nahatan St. and Plimpton Ave. East of Lenox St., the site would transition to townhouses, with a 50 foot buffer of trees and plantings between them and the neighborhoods to the south and east.

The Board voted 4-1 to

grant the comprehensive permit, with Thomas Brady in opposition.

A major question that arises from this negotiation and resolution deals with why the public was not made aware of what was going on.

An effort was made to reach members of the ZBA whose names were on the decision. Upon being contacted this past Tuesday, Patrick Mulvehill referred all questions regarding the matter to Chairman Philip Riley, who called the Record later that afternoon. Rather than answering public awareness questions, Chairman Riley made this statement:

"There will be a public press release crafted by the Board of Selectmen that will

address the Avalon status, where it stands, and what's being done with it."

He added that this public statement might, perhaps, be a joint one issued with the ZBA. He also offered that he anticipated the release to be issued sometime soon. Beyond that, he did not comment further.

On Wednesday morning, Board of Selectmen Chairman William Plasko commented – in a phone conversation – on Mr. Riley's statement:

"We plan to have a meeting with counsel next week to review the 40B proposals (Forbes Hill and Avalon Norwood) before the Town. It's likely that the Board will issue a statement shortly thereafter."

Mr. Plasko was unable to confirm whether the statement would be a joint one.

When asked if he could confirm the approval of the Avalon Norwood decision, he neither verified it nor denied it, saying instead that nothing would be finalized until the Board of Selectmen issued its statement.

"I saw it and I pushed for it," he said. "It wouldn't stay up. I still hear about that one."

The roller coaster riders are still up there, reaching for the sky, as a mom and daughter walk up looking for a button, which Paciorkowski produces – with a subtle flair – in the palm of his hand.

All sorts of booths line the street and web the Common: a funeral home with model hearses on the table and a coffin paperweight holding down Red Sox chances, a real estate agency with Roger Goodell wearing a clown nose, a boxing gym with a small ring set up, a physical therapist/chiropractor and a fitness club a block away from each other, challenging people to do chin ups. The carpenter union helps kids to hammer wooden toolboxes together. A bank spins a wheel of fortune.

And then there's the NHS

Latin Club, with a whipped cream splattered, poncho wearing student sitting in a chair under a sign reading "Pie Your Friend." For \$2, anyone can plant a tin foil pie pan of whipped cream into the targeted face of a Latin student and help to finance the club's spring trip to Italy.

Jennifer Bradley, NHS Librarian and trip chaperone stands out of firing range, the table in front of her littered with a handful of very dented, whipped cream splotted pans. A small group of students – some of them looking a little shell shocked – stand behind her. She's enthusiastic but bemused.

"Still going strong," she said.

And looking back from the empty kiddie rides area toward Walpole Street at 3 o'clock, it still is.



keeps them competitive?

Advocates also claim that the student enrollment numbers of Norwood High School (NHS) are not likely to increase. Really? Have they been watching what has been transpiring within the community over the last few years? While not less than three 40B developments are in different phases of planning and/or construction, one of the major concerns is that our schools will be flooded with more students. The Willett Early Education center is bursting at the seams but the enrollment numbers at NHS aren't likely to change? Maybe not in the next two years, but it certainly will be changing.

Why do towns with similar populations to Norwood have more students attending their high schools? Needham, for instance, has a population of approx. 300 more people but 700 more students. Walpole has 4,600 less residents but 186 more students. How many Norwood residents attend private schools compared to towns of similar population? Why are they not staying in the Norwood school system? My sense is that Norwood has a high senior population and as those senior residents move out of town or pass away that housing stock gets turned over and more than likely to a young family which will have increasing effect on student enrollment. Have the advo-

cates for the change considered or researched these questions?

The second factor advocates make is that the socioeconomics have drastically changed in Norwood over the last 10 years and kids just aren't participating in sports. If that is true how is it possible that the Norwood Youth Hockey (NYH) program recently received the Excellence in Growth Award from Mass Hockey? This award is given annually to the program that displays the largest growth over a five-year period. From 2012 thru 2017 NYH grew its program by 160 players, more than any youth hockey program in the state. Hockey is one of, if not the most, expensive sports for kids to participate and there is no rink inside the town borders, which means whether it is a practice or a game parents continually get players to and from where they need to be and incur that cost on top of the tuition. Does this sound like the socioeconomics of Norwood have drastically changed?

Since the SC vote on June 21 I have spoken with and received emails from many residents who oppose Norwood leaving the BSL. All expressed a concern over the process used to make this decision and for the SC's lack of overall knowledge pertaining to the athletic program. How could they make this decision without all the facts? It took Dedham eight years to make this decision and now Norwood is just going to follow them. What if it doesn't work? The most telling email I received was from a parent whose daughter is a NHS cheerleader. The parent's concern is the lack of support given the cheerleaders by the administration and pointed to information shared with the cheerleaders by the coach. When the coach met with all those interested in cheering this season she handed out a packet that outlined tryout,

practice and other team information. Within the information was the following:

*** No Nationals this year per the athletic director and the principal due to the following concerns:

1. We went last year 2. We have a new coach 3. There are multiple school programs traveling this year 4. We are focusing on performing at our best at the Regional and State level and Nationals is something extra and not something we will attend annually.

I certainly was floored when I received this information and the first thought that went through my mind was why in the name of all that is holy would anyone want to take a goal like qualifying for Nationals off the table for a group of student athletes? I am the first to admit I know absolutely nothing about cheering and the intricacies about what makes one team better than another, but I do know that one of the main goals for all high school cheering teams is to qualify for Nationals. With budget restraints it is understandable to assume that if they were to qualify they would have to foot the bill on their own, which I believe they did last season, but to insist that they cannot attend? Is this the message we want to send to our student athletes?

When the two major advocates, the athletic director and principal, proposing a switch from BSL to TVL are taking goals off the table for the student athletes it doesn't matter what your enrollment is, how much money the parents have in the bank, or what league you participate in; the winning percentage is bound to be at the bottom of the league. I know that this information was presented at the SC meeting on Aug. 16. I would hope that the SC would motion to withdraw Norwood's application into the TVL and to assemble a committee to perform a complete review of the athletic department, the BSL, the TVL, middle school sports programs, and synergy with the youth programs. No league affiliation changes should even be considered until the review is complete.

Doliner was still able to take away plenty of positives from the loss to the Raiders, a team which played the Walpole Porkers to a scoreless tie in the opening week. It may not have shown on the scoreboard, but Norwood already looks to be playing as a cohesive unit, Doliner said.

"The girls are really gelling a lot quicker overall than I think

they did the last couple of seasons," Doliner said after the game. "I think that's huge. Younger players don't always step up right away, especially in big roles, but they're stepping up right away and making it easier for the whole unit to come together, which is really good."

The Mustangs and Raiders were engaged in a scoreless tie of their own through the first half of play at Sprague Elementary School in Wellesley on Monday before the Raiders broke through to deal Norwood its first loss of the season. Goaltender Ally Naumann made five saves on the afternoon.

Norwood High couldn't recover from a disastrous first quarter in Friday night's 22-0 season opening loss on the road to the Framingham Flyers.

Answers were nowhere to be found for the connection between Framingham quarterback Jack Beverly and wide receiver Jon Jon Lanzo, who connected for scores on each of the first two possessions of the game for the Flyers at Bowditch Field.

"We got in a hole early and once we settled down, we played better," Mustangs head coach Jim Tighe said after the game. "We still have a lot of things to work on and we're still trying to sort some things out with personnel."

Framingham received the opening kickoff and went 70 yards in seven plays, the drive culminating in a 20-yard completion from Beverly to Lanzo to give the Flyers all the offense it

would need. Cam Haugabrook added the two-point conversion on the ground to make it 8-0 Framingham.

The Mustangs went three-and-out on their first offensive series, gaining no yards in the process. Lanzo demonstrated his value again with a 35-yard punt return to the Norwood 21, from where Beverly later dialed him up again on third-and-11 on a quick slant for another score. The pair connected yet again on the two-point conversion for a 16-0 lead.

The Flyers effectively finished the Mustangs off courtesy of a turnover. On third-and-11 from the Norwood 29, quarterback Marc Murphy was forced from the pocket and scrambled forward for a 3-yard gain. But the ball came loose on his way down and was scooped up by Reece LaChance, who trotted in from 32 yards out. The two-point conversion failed, but

Ask The Doctor

Junior Damato began servicing vehicles in 1969. He owns a 10-bay auto repair service center in Hyde Park and an 8-bay center in Middleboro. Junior is an ASE-certified Master Technician, ASE-certified L-1 and ASE-certified Natural Gas.

To the Doctor: I own a 2001 Corvette and it has a fault in the steering column. The engine will start and run, but as soon as I attempt to move the car, the engine shuts off and I have to wait a few minutes before it will restart. I called the dealer and explained the problem. They ran the VIN# and said the recall for this problem had been done in 2006 and that the cost of the repair (anywhere from \$500 to \$900) would be on me. I know you work on these cars at your shop. Do you have any suggestions for an alternative fix?

From the Doctor: The steering column lock module has been an ongoing problem on Corvettes. A failing module shuts the fuel off at 2.5 miles per hour. To fix it with the factory GM parts is expensive. The steering wheel often has to be removed and the base of the steering wheel, where the puller is attached, can sometimes crack. However, I do have a solution that works perfectly. The bypass module cost is less than \$60 (with shipping), is made in America, and is an easy installation. The electronic part is called Steering Lock Module Part #LMC5. It fits Corvettes from 1997 through 2004. This module simulates a properly functioning column lock. The bypass module is installed in the right side footwell kick panel. The installation takes 15 minutes and comes with directions - there is even a YouTube video. The company, located in Malibu, CA, is called Compliance Parts, LLC. They also have tech support, if needed.
