Scores pack Common for celebration

For the 35th year, Norwood's residents came out to enjoy the festivities of the annual Holiday Extravaganza, which culminated with the illumination of approximately 4,000 lights draped over 12 trees on the Town Common.

Board of Selectmen Chairman Allan Howard said this year's event reminded him of a scene from a Norman Rockwell painting.

"It was an over-the-top celebration, it was really fun," he said. "I look forward to it every year."

Howard said the Holiday Extravaganza kicked off at 1:30 p.m. on Nov. 27 with a

Health Board to stand with police to stop pot sales

The Board of Health has vowed to stand with the Police Department in a valiant attempt to prevent recreational marijuana establishments from opening in Norwood.

"That's what we need to do as the Board of Health," said Member Carolyn Riccardi during the board's Nov. 22 meeting. "We should band together and make that known that we're not for it, we as a town should band together."

Health Director Sigalle Reiss reminded board members that although Question Four was voted down in Norwood, 53 percent to 46.9 percent, it did pass on the state level, with 53.6 percent of voters saying yes and 46.4 percent saying no.

She also said that Question Four was a 24-page document, whereas most ballot questions are no more than two pages.

"This was about commercializing an industry that's poised to make a lot of money," she said.

Therefore, Reiss said the town would need its own bal-

lot question in the April Election, asking voters whether or not to repeal the sale of recreational marijuana in Norwood.

Unless there is a ballot question, Reiss said municipalities will be bound by the state's affirmative vote.

"Everyone is in unless you opt out," she said. "We do have the authority, if the voters vote for it, to ban recreational stores."

Given the recent election results on the town level, Reiss said she is optimistic about the outcome of a spring ballot question.

"Fifty-three percent of Norwood residents voted against it, that gives us pretty good odds," she said.

Should the ballot question fail, Reiss said there would be designated zones for recreational marijuana sales; however, they would be smaller than the zones currently established for medical marijuana dispensaries.

In other news, Reiss also said she and Town Sanitarian Angelo De Luca recently met with the owner of Mak's Roast Beef & Pizza regarding recent violations. They agreed

to give the restaurant two weeks "to get things cleaned up and get pest control." Reiss said that in addition to removing debris from the basement, staff retraining will be needed as well.

Reiss said that going forward restaurant owners cannot rely exclusively on pest control companies and need to conduct regular inspections of their own.

"It still requires that management," she said.

De Luca also recognized pest control as a recurring problem.

"A lot of times they just pay the employees, they don't even read the reports," he said.

In addition, Jacobs said the town has run out of the flu vaccine after administering 610 doses.

"We haven't seen much flu around," she said, adding that four cases have been reported thus far.

She also called attention to the importance of the Shingles vaccine, particularly for anyone over the age of 60.

"It's not a fun thing to get," she said of the virus, adding that one case has been reported.

Selectmen challenge role of town-wide Facilities Committee

Two weeks before the town-wide Facilities Committee was scheduled to hold its first meeting, the Board of Selectmen raised serious concerns targeting the committee's authority and intentions.

According to the board's minutes from its meeting on Feb. 2, the selectmen voted unanimously to have a committee to "discuss maintenance, energy and long-term capital needs and report annually to Town Meeting."

However, during the Nov. 29 meeting, Selectman William Plasko referred to a letter from Town Manager John Carroll, which appeared to give the five-member committee authorization to make budgetary decisions.

"This is not what we set this committee up for," said Plasko, adding that the board should reconsider the re-formation of the committee. "This is talking about capital needs and capital budgets and presenting them to the Capital Outlay Committee. The capital needs for the town's facilities rests with this board."

Plasko was also concerned that Carroll's description of the committee did not involve the Selectmen at all.

"Where does that include the selectmen?" asked Plasko. "I want the budgets coming here; to delegate that to someone else would take serious Charter changes."

However, there was confusion from Carroll.

"I don't think I follow you Mr. Plasko - this is exactly what you voted," he said.

Chairman Allan Howard agreed with Plasko, saying that the purpose of the com-

mittee had become misguided.

"The intent of that committee was to come up with a facilities manager for the whole town, that was the one criteria," he said. "Not budgets, no budget items."

In response, Carroll said there seemed to be a misunderstanding in how his letter was worded and assured the board that no projects would be acted upon without Selectmen's consent.

Committee members include the School Committee chairman or designee, the Selectmen chairman or designee, the Finance Commission chairman or designee, the Superintendent of Schools and the Town Manager. They are joined by the schools' facilities manager, the library director and a facilities representative from the town side of government. The latter three members do not have voting power.

Selectman Helen Abdallah-Donohue made a motion to add two residents to the committee.

"They're the ones paying the bills," she said. "All of the people involved are government employees."

However, Donohue's motion was not seconded and died on the floor.

The board ultimately did not take action on the matter and the committee is still scheduled to meet on Dec. 12.

In other news, the board voted unanimously to accept an \$8,500 grant to purchase an electric signboard for the Department of Public Works (DPW).

In addition, DPW Director Mark Ryan said the department held its eighth annual snow and ice meeting.

"It's good to reinforce the expectations we have for everyone," he said.

This should be a clarion call

Your own police department and board of health are taking a stand against recreational pot shops opening in your town. These are the same people you call when you think you're in physical, mental and emotional trouble. They have no agenda other than your wellbeing, and right now they are worried about you and your family. Do you really want to ignore them?

It's true that Massachusetts voters, by a reasonable margin, supported legalizing marijuana. However Norwood did not mirror state support for the law and voted against its passage. So, right away there is reason enough to put a ballot question in front of Norwood voters in the spring on whether or not they want to prohibit the sale of cannabis products. Residents here have the right to block pot shops from opening within Norwood's borders, but the edict can't come from a Town Meeting vote or Selectmen. By law you, the voter, need to step up and cast a ballot, and this newspaper thinks it is important you do so.

A vote in support of banning

the sale of pot within Norwood's borders will not stop residents wishing to use marijuana from doing so. A ban on pot sales would be no different than a town maintaining a "dry" status, meaning liquor stores can't open, but anyone is free to buy it someplace else and consume it within the confines of the law.

It is quite possible contiguous towns like Sharon, Westwood and Walpole will pass their own ordinances banning the sale of marijuana, which means Norwood would be laying out the welcome mat to those looking to get high. Granted, this doesn't make them criminals or even less than law-abiding citizens, but a population of those looking to buy here, however small, may cause issues with public safety should they get stoned and perhaps get behind the wheel of a car, or maybe just becoming a public nuisance needing to be dealt with taxing public services and thereby costing residents money.

It is not lost on us that this may all be much ado about nothing and

marijuana will become as socially acceptable as having a beer or a cocktail. But supporting a measure prohibiting the sale of pot within Norwood's borders, at least for the short term, will buy some time to let other cities and towns allowing the sale to determine what problems will arise, if any, and how they dealt with them. There are also the issues of how to regulate and tax the drug and how to educate students about the dangers of marijuana, just to name a couple. Norwood has some major issues right now, does it really want to be on the forefront of integrating pot into its mainstream?

Failing a ballot question, Norwood Selectmen should be pragmatic and adopt rules that limit the number of shops to 20 percent of the number of liquor stores in their community, which is allowed by law. In addition, communities can restrict the shops' location, hours, and signage, and these are discussions that should be taking place right now, instead of waiting until the last minute.

Lee Leach, Town Carillonneur, who played Christmas Carols from the carillon in Memorial Tower.



Kelleher's new documentary celebrates hockey's golden boys

From the 1960s through the early-1970s, Greater Boston's high school hockey world was dominated by the kids from Arlington, Needham, Norwood, Melrose and Walpole.

Resident filmmakers Jerry Kelleher and Brendan King of 10th District Studios captured those years in their new documentary: "Banner Years: The Golden Era of Hockey in Massachusetts."

"Local rivalries matched the intensity of the [Boston] Bruins vs. the [Montreal] Canadiens," said Kelleher. "Border wars raged between Norwood, Walpole, Arlington, Melrose and Needham."


Within those five teams,

Kelleher said the biggest rivalry was between the Norwood Mustangs, coached by Donald Wheeler, and the Arlington Spy Ponders, coached by Ed Burns.

"Arlington was the powerhouse, Arlington won all the time," said Kelleher, adding that only once, in 1972, were the Mustangs able to slip past the Spy Ponders to win the state title. "It was an era when 13,909 would pack the old Boston Garden for the annual state hockey tournament."

Kelleher said he and King spent two years putting the film together and travelled around the northeast for interviews with former players and coaches.



“It’s a great collaboration,” Kelleher said of his partnership with King.

He said the film focuses on the careers of players such as Robbie Ftorek, Derek Sanderson, Mike Milbury and Richie Hebner.

“He was probably the best Norwood player,” Kelleher said of Hebner.

However, of those four players, Hebner was the only one who did not stick with hockey, as he was also an avid baseball player.

After graduating from Norwood High School, Hebner decided to pursue a baseball career and signed with the Pittsburg Pirates.

Despite being a member of Pittsburg’s 1971 World Series team, Hebner never forgot about hockey.

“Hockey was my first love, we’d have 4,000 people at a high school hockey game and probably about 10 people at a high school baseball game – but I was the No. 1 draft pick for the Pirates,” he said while being interviewed for the movie.

Hebner retired in 1985 and is now the hitting coach for the Buffalo Bisons, the Triple-A affiliate of the Toronto Blue Jays.

During his days with Needham High School, Ftorek was twice voted as the Most Valuable Player of the Massachusetts High School League. He also helped Needham win the Eastern Massachusetts Title in 1969 and 1970.

“When we were growing up, you didn’t go to prep school, you stayed and you played for your town, you played for your school,” said Ftorek.

Ftorek began playing professional hockey for the Detroit Red Wings in 1972. He also won the Silver Medal the same year playing for the U.S. Olympic Team. In addition, Ftorek was the Bruins’ head coach from 2001-2003.

Sanderson signed with the Bruins for the 1965-66 season and helped the team win its fifth Stanley Cup in 1972. He was also known as the league’s “tough guy,” racking up 98 minutes in the penalty box his rookie season.

Milbury came out of Brighton and had a stellar college career playing for Colgate University from 1972-74. During his junior year, he had 19 assists, the second-highest team total. As team captain his senior year, Milbury

recorded four goals and 26 assists for 30 points.

After Colgate, he went onto play for the Boston Braves and the Rochester Americans – the Bruins’ minor league affiliates at the time – before ultimately joining the Bruins during the 1975-76 season.

During his time with the Bruins, Milbury appeared in 11 of the team’s 12 Stanley Cup playoff berths. He was also the team’s head coach from 1989-1991.

Other former Norwood players in the film include Eddie King and Charles Donohue.

King said he remembered the nights when there was standing room only at the Garden.

“I think they had 12 buses just from Norwood alone packed with fans and they banged out the Garden – maxed it out – 13,909,” he said.

Donohue said the game schedule was much simpler then.

“In those days, there was no Division One, Two, Three – you just went in no matter who you were and lasted as long as you could,” he said.

Kelleher said high school teammates have remained friends decades later.

“They’re still talking about games from 45 years ago like it was last night,” he said. “It’s the nostalgia that people want – the purpose of this film is to bring back this Golden Era of hockey through vintage photos, rare game footage and direct testimony from the players, coaches and fans who lived it.”

Kelleher said the first showing of the two-hour documentary will be at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday, Dec. 10 at the Norwood Theater. Tickets are available for \$25 and \$23 for students and senior citizens. They can be purchased at the box office, over the phone at 781-551-9000 or online at norwoodstage.com.

“People from Florida are coming up to see the story, it’s crazy,” he said.

A former selectman, Kelleher said he got into filmmaking after 12 years in town government. His daughter was also playing three sports at the time, which added to his inspiration.

Kelleher said he initially pondered the idea of making 30-minute films, “then the whole thing just exploded.”

Reindeer Dash for children ages 3-10.

"That was a short road race for the kids, just to get things going," he said.

From there, the crowd rapidly continued to swell.

"There were hundreds of people on the Common, I would guess 300-500 altogether," said Howard.

As in years past, resident Linda Rau and Selectman Helen Abdallah-Donohue both read to Norwood's children. Rau read "How The Grinch Stole Christ-

mas" and Abdallah-Donohue read "Twas The Night Before Christmas."

"She and Helen have done these readings I don't know how many times," said Howard.

There were also music performances by the High School Madrigals and Master of Ceremonies David Cuddy, who played holiday songs on his electric piano.

Shortly after 3:30 p.m. Santa Claus, Mrs. Claus and the elves left the Guild Medical Center on the town's ladder truck accompanied by the high school marching band for the half-mile trip to the Common.

"There were about 100 parents and kids lined up to have their picture taken with Mr. and Mrs. Santa Claus," said Howard.

Selectman Thomas Maloney said his daughter is in the band and was part of the entourage.

"There were several hundred people there, so many children, it was wonderful," he said. "There was a long line [of parents and children] waiting to have their pictures taken with Santa and Mrs. Claus."

Assistant Town Manager Bernie Cooper had an even higher attendance approximation.

"It was well attended, I'm estimating 3,000-plus during the afternoon on the Common, not all at the same time, except perhaps when Santa arrived," he said.

Cooper said he was pleased that the weather cooperated.

"Because the audience is young, pre-school and elementary and their parents, weather is an especially important factor and it was

not bad for late-November," he said.

In addition, he thanked Norwood Bank for funding the event's hayrides.

"The hayrides were huge, they are always popular and are one of the very few horse-drawn hayrides left in the state that will travel off the farm," said Cooper.

He also thanked the Norwood Amateur Radio Club and Norfolk County REACT for their support.

Recreation Director Gerry Miller said there used to be a large pine tree, which was lit during the event's early years.

However, he said the decision was made about 20 years ago to take the tree down as it had begun to rot.

"The big tree they had in the middle was dying a slow death," said Miller, adding that the gazebo was built in its place.

Miller said having a gazebo is more practical as it lends itself to other events.

"It serves multiple purposes, more than a tree does," he said.

Miller said the Recreation Department has organized the Extravaganza for the past "10-12 years" and that the real planning typically begins in October.

"We work off a template, we follow a game plan," said Miller. "It's the collaboration of a lot of people."

Regarding the event itself, Miller agreed with Howard's Norman Rockwell comparison.

"It's like small-town America, you look around and all you see are smiles," he said.

Super saturation for Super Bowls

“Everybody gets a trophy.”

A movement which started out with good intentions has turned into a tired cliché and hyperbole, at least to an extent.

But when directed at the right issue, the notion that everybody gets a trophy has some clout behind it.

There will be eight high school Super Bowl champions crowned in Massachusetts this weekend, up from six the last three seasons.

It was probably unnecessary to jump from six to eight. For comparisons sake, Texas crowns 12 Super Bowl champions. Of course, there are quite a few more people in the Lone Star State than in Massachusetts (just under 28 million residents in Texas, compared with just under 7 million residents of Massachusetts, per 2014 estimates). Ohio, another football-mad state, crowns seven Super Bowl champions. Some 5 million more people reside in the Buckeye State than in the Bay State.

One thing Ohio also does differently than Massachusetts is the way it ranks its divisions. Rather than the confusing system the MIAA uses (1, 1A, 2, 2A and so forth), Ohio ranks its divisions using the criminally-underrated Roman numerical system (I through VII).

Just another thing that’s irking about the Massachusetts system. It’s not like Division 1A is a subset of Division 1; it is its own entity, crowning its own Super Bowl champion. It is the second-highest ranked division, so why should it not be Division 2?

The most recently used system in Massachusetts ranked divisions using Arabic numerals, 1 through 6. Not 1, 1A, 2, 2A, 3 and 3A. Is Division 7 or Division 8 considered too low a number, too embarrassing or something? The MIAA created this system of eight divisions, it could at least be transparent about it.

The move to eight Super Bowls also forced two of the games away from Gillette Stadium on Saturday. Both the “highest” (Div. 1, Xaverian Hawks vs. Everett Crimson Tide) and “lowest” ranked (Div. 4A, Maynard Tigers vs. Millis/Hopedale Mohawks) will be played outside of Foxboro on Saturday.

Instead, Xaverian-Everett gets a 1 p.m. kickoff at Manning Field in Lynn, while Maynard-Millis/Hopedale is slated for a noon start at Worcester State University.

Both are reasonable starting times, for sure. But the 9 a.m. kickoff between the East Bridgewater Vikings and St. Mary’s (Lynn) Spartans at Gillette?

The Patriots are playing at home on Sunday vs. the Los Angeles Rams, but it would have worked out wonderfully if the Super Bowls could have been staggered over two days instead of one, with four games each day at more reasonable hours for all involved.

While I do think Gillette is overrated as a venue for high school events (with a capacity of 68,000, how can playing in front of at most 20,000 people create much adrenaline?) the precedent has been set and it’s a shame kids aren’t going to get a chance to play there this year.

I’m sure the players, fans and everyone else at Xaverian and Everett are over it – the Hawks have played at Gillette in each of the last three seasons, the Crimson Tide in 2014 – but with all due respect to the field at Worcester State, I doubt this is what the Tigers or Mohawks were dreaming of when their seasons began.

But hey, they’re playing for the trophy.

And not to diminish the meaning of said trophy, which apparently everyone gets, but not all roads to the trophy are created equal.

The postseason itself has become more watered down than ever, thanks in large part to the addition of two divisions.

Side note, but just to further confuse everyone, central and western Massachusetts teams play an eight-week regular season, while teams from the north and south sections (eastern Massachusetts, or EMass) play seven weeks.

Also, only four teams in each central/west region

which is looking for its first win since Feb. 14, 2015 – the Mustangs went 0-19-1 last winter.

In place of Hingham, Duxbury and Pope Francis are the Mansfield Hornets and King Philip Warriors, each out of the Hockomock League. Norwood will play a home-and-home with Mansfield – including its season opener on Tuesday, Dec. 14 at Bajko – with a return game at the Hornets on Dec. 28. King Philip will visit the Mustangs at Bajko on Monday, Feb. 20, its regular season finale.

In league, Norwood will play each Herget team in a home-and-home series and each Carey opponent once. The Mustangs begin league play on Saturday, Dec. 17 vs. Braintree at Zapustas Arena in Randolph.

Norwood’s first crack at Dedham is on Wednesday, Dec. 21 at Bajko; beyond the intrigue of this being the Marauders’ final season in the Bay State Con-

ference, Dedham is coming off a season in which it swept the Mustangs – its first two wins over Norwood since 1988.

In all, the Mustangs will play seven home games at Bajko and three home games at Rodman.

Girls hockey

Norwood’s girls hockey team will play 22 games, which is the most allowed under MIAA rules. This will allow for six nonleague games, with both new and returning opponents from a year ago.

The Westwood Wolverines, Fontbonne Academy Ducks and Shawsheen Valley Rams return to the schedule this season, while the Quincy/North Quincy and Leominster/St. Bernard’s co-op have been dropped.

The Mustangs will play the Wolverines in the Walsh Tournament at the Canton Ice House over the holiday break, and will

face either the Canton Bulldogs or Dedham Marauders in the next round (even if Norwood winds up facing Dedham in the next round, it will count as a nonleague game).

The Mustangs will play a home-and-home series with Shawsheen Valley, a technical school located in Billerica, after facing the Rams just once last year at Janas Rink in Lowell.

A trip to the islands is also in store for Norwood, with a game at Martha’s Vineyard on Monday, Feb. 20 for its regular season finale.

Like the boys team, the girls will play each Herget Division team twice in a home-and-home series and each Carey Division team once. The Mustangs open their season with a league game on Saturday, Dec. 17 vs. Braintree at Rodman.

The girls will play five home games at Bajko and four at Rodman.

“They’re disciplined and they stayed with it. Congratulations to them; they played well. They played disciplined, they hung on to the ball, they fought hard the whole game.

Marc Murphy’s 59-yard touchdown pass to Tony Ortega on the game’s first play from scrimmage gave the Mustangs about as good a start as one could ask for.

But Norwood had only three first downs between then and their final possession of the game, with only one drive resulting in a positive net gain of yards.

The Mustangs fumbled the ball five times, losing possession on four occasions. The final lost fumble proved most fatal, as Dedham’s Billy Casey scooped up the ball and ran it in for a 14-yard touchdown and the Marauders’ first lead of the game, 14-7 with 5:11 remaining in the fourth quarter.

“It’s a shame, because we didn’t do it, but we had op-

portunities to put the game away,” Tighe said. “You give any team three or four fumbles like that and it’s tough to beat them.”

Mike King blocked two punts for Norwood, including one on Dedham’s first possession of the game. The Mustangs took over at the Marauder 24 as a result, but gave away the first of four fumbles, a sign of things to come.

Dedham tied the game on a lengthy 11-play, 80-yard drive with 6:47 to go in the fourth quarter on a Stephen McDonagh 15-yard touchdown run.

Casey’s scoop-and-score came on Norwood’s ensuing offensive series pushed the Marauders ahead for good, and on the heels of another three-and-out with negative yardage for the Mustangs, McDonagh scored once more from 10 yards out with 1:40 to go.

The clock firmly entrenched against them, the

Mustangs put together the kind of drive which had evaded them throughout the game – or all season, really.

Murphy completed three passes for 41 yards and ran for 19 more on the drive, which ended with a 10-yard scoring toss from Murphy to George Mason.

But Norwood couldn’t convert the onside kick, enabling Dedham to take a knee as the final seconds of its time as a Bay State Conference football team came to an end.

The Mustangs and Marauders will continue to play on Thanksgiving, whether Norwood ultimately joins Dedham in the Tri-Valley League or not.

However, the rivalry got a jumpstart on its status as a nonleague game this season.

Since the teams had already played once this season (a 12-6 triple overtime victory for the Mustangs on Sept. 23), the game on Thanksgiving was considered a nonleague game and will not affect Bay State Conference standings.

make the postseason, rather than the eight-team brackets you see in EMass.

So now that that’s all neat and tidy, of the 128 playoff teams in EMass, 35 entered with losing records. That’s 27 percent, or more than a 1 in 4 shot that a postseason team you pull out of a hat finished below .500.

With eight divisions in each EMass sub-region, that’s 16 first round matchups, thus 16 No. 8 seeds. Fifteen of the 16 teams finished with losing records (the 16th, Sacred Heart out of Division 4A, played only six games to finish 3-3).

The No. 8 seeds went 0-16 with an average margin of defeat of over 30 points per game (30.4). Only three games were decided by fewer than 20 points, 10 of the games blowouts of 30 points or more (Norwood vs. Falmouth, in Div. 2A, fell in the middle: the Mustangs lost 27-0).

It didn’t go much better for No. 7 seeds, which finished 4-12 between the South and the

North. Eight teams, or half of those seeded seventh, entered with losing records.

Eleven of the 16 teams which advanced from their respective EMass sections were No. 1 seeds; the South was particularly heavy on the top dogs, with seven out of eight division winners emerging being top seeds – with a combined record of 50-4.

All of this to say: the NFL could take a few lessons from the MIAA when it comes to postseason expansion. For years now, the word on the street has been the NFL wants to go to a seven-team bracket in each conference. But that’s another story for another time.

Less is certainly more in this case, however. I don’t see how it could be a cash grab for the MIAA to include all of these extra teams in the postseason, but it shouldn’t matter. I’d chop the postseason in half: four teams in each division.

If everyone’s going to get a trophy, you may as well have to earn it.

lane,” and felt the effects afterwards.

“Swimming one race was exhausting,” Rodger said. “Having to get back on the block and go again, I was drained. I’ve got to give the kids a lot of credit.”

Some notable alums who attended the meet include Megan Glynn – Rodger’s high school classmate – who was keeping up with members of the current team, and Katherine Lee, who is head coach of the Norwood Stingrays swim club.

“It’s only year three, I’m hoping it builds,” Rodger said after the current Mustangs defeated the former Norwood swimmers. “Different people have come and I think it just depends on the year and what’s going on with people. I think the words getting out there, and that’s what’s important. Norwood’s such a close community, so things like this are special.”

At awards night on Monday, junior Tori Mullen was named team MVP.

With the fastest 50 and 100-yard freestyles on the team, Mullen was the lone girl on the team to qualify for states in an individual event (the 200-yard IM). No Mustang on the girls side had qualified for states since Charlotte Rivard in 2014.

“Thinking about our sport and what it means to be the most valuable player on our team, it’s someone who can compete in any of the nine individual events and

earn points for the team,” Rodger said of Mullen. “Not necessarily the person that’s going to come in first in one or two events, it’s the person that can do every single individual event and do it well.”

Senior captain Rory Lake won the Coaches Award.

“She has been an integral part of this team for the last four seasons – this year as a senior captain,” Rodger said of Lake. “An asset to our program and will be missed next year. She is phenomenal individually and a critical member of the team on the relays. She really thrives in all aspects of the sport.”

The Unsung Hero award went to senior Julia Kiley, who Rodger said was “a well-rounded athlete and consistent in the pool.

“She was coming in where we needed her to come in, meet after meet in the distance events,” Rodger said. “She was the backbone of the distance events.”

The Kevin Curran Memorial Scholarship Award went to senior Brendan Hurley, who Rodger described as “one of the most sincere, kindest student-athletes that I’ve had the pleasure to work with.”

The award is given in honor of Kevin Curran, a Norwood resident who passed away in 2008. Curran was heavily involved in swimming in Norwood, and the community as a whole. Recipients of the award must demonstrate similar involvement in school and community activities while excelling academically.




